Probably the closest thing to <u>The Munsters</u> to come out of Universal so far is a pilot called <u>The Willies</u>. GEORGE GOBEL stars as a hotelkeeper who is haunted by the ghosts of a couple of remote ancestors --played by HANS CONRIED and KATHIE BROWNE--who have been dead since the time of the American Revolution . . . Further evidence that this is the last season for <u>Wagon</u> <u>Train</u> is supplied by Universal's casting of JOHN McINTIRE in a pilot for a comedy series called <u>The Shady Acres Mob</u>. Also in the pilot: SPRING BYINGTON (December Bride), ANDREW PRINE (Wide Country) and McINTIRE's wife, JEANETTE NOLAN.

After a period of experimenting with <u>Rawhide</u> "specials"--such high-priced episodes as the one written by STIRLING SILLIPHANT and starring DEAN MARTIN as a gunfighter--CBS is returning the series to its original format. Co-producers BRUCE GELLER and BERNARD KOWALSKI are out, and former producer ENDRE BOHEM is in again. BOHEM's first move was to hire back former regulars SHEB WOOLEY (Nolan), ROCKY SHAHAN (Scarlet) and ROBERT CABAL (Hey Soos).

Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, which in 1957 fired cartoonists WILLIAM HANNA and JOE BARBERA and went out of the animation business, is now back in it. A new MGM animation-visual-arts department has been established in Hollywood to produce TV cartoon serials, commercials and some new "Tom and Jerry" cartoons for theatrical release. "Tom and Jerry" creators HANNA and BARBERA have in the meanwhile (with <u>The Flintstones, Jonny Quest</u>, et al.) become TV's top independent animation producers.

The pilot for another experiment in Westerns, The Wild West, has just been completed here by CBS. The series, which is probably the first Western to reflect the influence of the late IAN FLEMING, co-stars ROBERT CONRAD (Hawaiian Eye) and ROSS MARTIN (Mr. Lucky) as a couple of undercover agents for the U.S. Army. CONRAD plays an officer, and MARTIN an ex-actor . . The pilot for The Long, Hot Summer, starring EDMOND 0'BRIEN, has been completed at 20th Century-Fox. The project is a serial, to run as one 60-minute segment a week.

• The headline on the advertisement in the New Yorker read: "IF YOU WATCH ONLY 2½ HOURS OF TELEVISION THIS MONTH, YOU'LL HAVE ENOUGH TO THINK ABOUT FOR THE REST OF THE YEAR."

It was early in January and, as it happened, we already had seen 2½ hours of television—"The Hollywood Deb Stars of 1965" and 90 Bristol Court. (That's one of the things they pay us for.) Did we have enough to think about for the rest of the year? You betcha. Enough for three years.

This advertisement was a product of the Television Information Office, the broadcasters' propaganda agency. TIO's purpose is to convince viewers that television programming is better than it seems to be. Which isn't easy, what with one thing and another. TIO therefore spends most of its time and money bragging about Sunday afternoon shows, some Sunday morning shows, and such special events as bowl games, Presidential football Inaugurations, and the occasional specials and documentaries that appear during prime evening time.

This may be good public relations, for all we know, and we wish TIO luck. We've often made the point ourselves, advising readers to watch less and enjoy it more, but one would think that spokesmen for the television industry would take a different tack—such as "IF YOU WATCH ONLY 2½ HOURS OF TELEVISION THIS MONTH YOU'LL BE MISSING 60 HOURS OF GREAT ENTERTAIN-MENT AND VITAL INFORMATION." But that wouldn't really be honest, would it?

Maybe TIO is doing the best it can, considering what it has to work with.



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'IS THERE NO WAY OUT OF THIS MADNESS?'

The former FCC Chairman points out

the failure of laws governing political broadcasts

and urges completely new legislation,

punctuated with large doses of common sense

To those who study communications the most amazing thing about the 1964 political campaign is that voters, politicians and broadcasters survived it with senses still in good working order.

It was a campaign in which the Federal Communications Commission ruled:

A United Fund appeal by President Johnson might require all stations to give "equal time" to all political candidates for President.

A news conference by President Johnson—attended by reporters from all networks and from periodicals all over the world—did not qualify as exempt from the "equal-time" laws. Among other things, the FCC ruled, it was not a "bona fide news event." A 17-minute speech by the President, however, on American reaction to a change in Soviet Union leadership, a Chinese Communist nuclear explosion and the results of the British elections was exempt from "equaltime" requirements.

Does this sound like the logic of the Red Queen (". . . It takes all the running you can do, to keep in the same place. If you want to get somewhere else, you must run at least twice as fast as that!") in "Alice Through the Looking-Glass"? Indeed it does. Yet, in fairness to the seven members of the Communications Commission, they—like the politicians, the broadcasters and the public—are victims of antiquated legislation, muddled legal precedents and a wavering, quavering public policy.

What is needed is a complete overhaul of the law and some common sense about modern political campaigning. I have a suggestion for overhaul of the so-called "equaltime" law, Section 315 of the Communications Act—which I will go into in a moment—and I believe this recommendation could go a long way toward solving, if not solve entirely, the heretofore vexing equal-time problems of past campaigns.

The law—Section 315 of the act and the 1959 amendments—is hopelessly out of date. It says, in essence, to the Federally licensed broadcaster: If you give or sell broadcasting time to one candidate for a political office, each of his rivals must be given or sold "equal time." (The rules also require that the same rates, same discounts, and other terms apply to all.)

This law made good sense when it was written into the Radio Act of 1927. There were only a few hundred radio stations, and congressmen were concerned that time would not be made available to all persons who sought an office. The same language was carried over into the Communications Act of 1934 and, with minor refurbishing, it stands in a time when the United States has nearly 6000 radio stations and 600 television stations.

Still, the law might be simple to administer if there were actually only two parties in our much-praised (by both parties) "Two-Party System." But there are more than two political parties, and the smaller parties want equal time too.

Broadcasters usually had a simple way to avoid a Niagara of free political time. Since the splinter parties are usually poorly financed, they are unable to buy expensive broadcast time. Therefore, the broadcasters willingly sell time to the two major parties and avoid the whole question.

This means that the cost to the two major parties keeps going up. No one even argues any more that television is the single most expensive item of the national campaign.

Those 1959 amendments, mentioned earlier, made certain kinds of news programs exempt from the equal political time rules. Congress was jarred into enacting this legislation when the FCC applied the law, literally, to a mayoralty election in Chicago. Here's what happened:

In Chicago, there is a frequent candidate for almost any office, named (legally, he says) Lar (America First) Daly. At last count, he had run for various offices more than 20 times and had yet to win an election. In 1959, Mr. Daly was a legally qualified, write-in candidate for mayor and he wanted "equal time" after Chicago television stations broadcast filmed news coverage of incumbent Mayor Richard Daley greeting the President of Argentina.

Lar (America First) Daly appealed to the FCC, and the Commission ruled that Daly, indeed, was entitled to just as much television time as Mayor Daley had received.

This led a Congress that was not amused to exempt certain kinds of programs from the equal-time requirements. The exempt programs are:

- 1. Bona fide newscast.
- 2. Bona fide news interview.
- 3. Bona fide news documentary (if the appearance of the candidate is incidental to the presentation of the subject or subjects covered by the news documentary).
- 4. On-the-spot coverage of bona fide news events (including, but not limited to, political conventions and activities incidental thereto).

This leaves, of course,

the need for a definition of "bona fide." In legislative hearing, Congress decided the test would be whether the program is under the control of the broadcaster. If control rests with the politician—if he can control content or the questions to be asked in an interview—then the program is not bona fide and is subject to the equal-time law.

A second test is whether the program is one that is regularly scheduled. This gets away from the special documentary, produced and broadcast solely in connection with an election.

Along the way, the FCC has ruled that an appearance by a television station's weather reporter, who was running for the Texas House of Delegates, was not subject to equal time.

An Indiana municipal judge appeared regularly on a "Traffic Court" telecast. He became a candidate for mayor and his rival appealed to the FCC. The program was ruled exempt.

A Texas congressman filmed a "report" each week and sent it to a station in his home district. It was telecast as a segment of a regularly scheduled news program. Upon appeal, the FCC ruled that such a program wasn't exempt from the equaltime law, because the content was controlled by the congressman.

Such minor cases provided the background for the weird (but completely legal) activities that took place in the 1964 campaign. In September, President Johnson was scheduled to make a formal, televised appeal to citizens for support of the United Fund. Station owners asked the FCC if this would be subject to the equaltime law. The answer: Each station must decide for itself whether the President's appearance would be a bona fide news event. The chairman of the Republican National Committee advised networks that he would not ask for equal time, but the networks avoided the program.

On Sept. 30, in response to a letter from the Columbia Broadcasting System, the FCC ruled that President Johnson's news conferences would not be exempt from the equal-time law. The FCC said these were not regularly scheduled, and, furthermore, the FCC indicated, were not subject to the control of the broadcaster.

This reasoning drew an angry dissenting opinion from Commissioner Lee Loevinger. He noted that one publication had referred to FCC equal-time rulings as an "inventory of idiocies" and, added Loevinger: "I... protest the addition of another item to this inventory."

Loevinger also noted that the FCC had ruled a "Governor's Radio Press Conference," broadcast weekly, was exempt. Loevinger wrote: "The only relevant point of difference between the Governor's press conference . . . and a Presidential press conference was held weekly whereas the Presidential press conference is held only when the President believes there is news."

But if things were difficult after this ruling, they became **continued**

worse after President Johnson's Oct. 18 report on international developments. Dean Burch, chairman of the Republican National Committee, called the speech "political" and demanded that the three television networks and four radio networks give equal time to the Republican Presidential nominee, Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona.

The networks, citing a 1956 decision, said the program was exempt from equal-time requirements. The National Broadcasting Company made one exception: It was willing to give Burch 15 minutes to state the Republican position on the three items dealt with by the President.

Burch took the 15 minutes. He dismissed the three developments discussed by President Johnson, and devoted most of his television time to discussing current morality and appealing for funds with which to buy TV time for Senator Goldwater. He said he needed "about \$500,000" to match the grant the networks had made to President Johnson.

Burch didn't stop there. An appeal to the FCC was rejected. The Court of Appeals heard arguments and voted 3-3. This, in effect, upheld the FCC and cleared the way for the case to go to the Supreme Court.

By a 6-2 vote, the Supreme Court declined to hear the case, but Associate Justice Arthur Goldberg had a biting dissent. He cited a number of FCC rulings which he said "have not been wholly consistent" and he added: "These varied holdings of the Commission and the express language of the Act confirm my view of . . the need for full immediate argument and speedy decision of this case. "The importance of the question is, I believe, plainly apparent.

"The statute reflects a deep congressional conviction that in our free democratic system all qualified candidates should be given equally free access to broadcasting facilities regardless of office and regardless of financial means if any candidate is granted free time."

Mr. Justice Goldberg added that nothing in the statutes made a President who is also a candidate exempt from the law.

(Meanwhile, CBS said it received and refused equal-time requests from Eric Hass, Socialist Labor Party; Clifton DeBerry, Socialist Workers Party; Louis E. Jaeckel, the American Party; and Yetta Bronstein, the Best Party.)

The Republicans tried once more. The fourth appeal was made to the FCC under the 15-year-old "Fairness Doctrine" that compels a station to give all sides a hearing on controversial subjects. The FCC decided, 5-1, that Burch had no case.

And this was only one of the most striking examples of the great confusion that surrounds all the laws of political broadcasting. There were complaints from Texas (Senator Yarborough vs. Republican George Bush) to the Virgin Islands (concerning a disc-jockey candidate) to California (where the Socialist Labor Party demanded time equal to the debate between Democrat Pierre Salinger and Republican George Murphy).

Is there no way out of this madness? There is a simple, direct way out. I hope it will appeal to the public and also to the problem-ridden men who must deal with the enchanted quagmire of political broadcasting rules. The solution involves two compromises.

AND ALSO TO THE PROBLEM-RIDDEN MEN...'

First, the politician must decide to trust the broadcaster. He must decide that his safety lies in the number and variety of stations and that the best interests of the people will be safeguarded by this diversity. This faith calls for complete repeal of Section 315 of the Communications Act, abolishing every segment of the "equaltime" law. This leaves political broadcasting to the broadcaster, although he must still answer to the FCC on questions of balance, fairness and public interest when his three-year license comes up for renewal.

The first step, then, is to give the broadcaster the same kind of political freedom that the press enjoys. We would say to him, "We believe that your own civic interests and the desire to appear fair to your listeners will make you work for the public interest."

A companion measure, however, goes with this and it may be the lowest price any group ever paid for freedom. The second step is to make available, during the month preceding Election Day, four hours of "prime" free time to each of the two major political parties.

This would tend to limit political campaigning. Radio and TV, along with the jet airplane, have made the July to November campaign a tedious bore, a burden of massive proportion to the campaigners, and a needless anachronism. The time would be assigned to the party, not the candidate. and it would be the job of the chairman of the National Committee to decide how this time would be used. The four hours could not be in those favorite hours for public service broadcasting, between Midnight and 7 A.M. It would have to be in prime evening time, when most citizens find it convenient to look at television.

Lesser amounts of free time would be assigned to minority parties, on the basis of the number of votes, or the percentage of votes that a minority party received in the preceding election, or petitions it could muster in this current election.

The campaigns, most of us agree, are much too long. For this reason, the offer must be limited to the last month of the campaign. The guarantee of four free hours, of course, does not prevent either major party from buying as much time as it can find or the broadcasters wish to sell.

For the broadcaster, loss of revenue in eight hours—every fourth year would be a small price to pay for political broadcast freedom. From all accounts, broadcasters are already spending a comparable amount of money every election year on headache pills.

An example has already been set by one broadcaster, Thad 'Sandstrom of WIBW, Topeka, Kan. He sold no political time in 1964. He gave time to all candidates and reported his happiest election year in history. There were, for once, no complaints.

The furor and arguments of recent years have been created by over-concern for the broadcaster and the politician. Actually, broadcasting laws are not intended to give solace and contentment to station owners; nor are they written for the convenience or advantage of politicians. The laws are supposed to be for the benefit of the citizen who needs the greatest possible information about candidates and issues before making a choice in the privacy of the voting booth.

To make the complexities of political broadcasting disappear, all Congress has to do is to put the voter first.

AND AWAY SHE WENT

Elizabeth Allen climbed steadily upward after her start on the Gleason show

Tall, gray-eyed Eli:abeth Allen has come a long way since she delivered that famous one-liner—"And Away We Go"—on *The Jackie Gleason Show*. She has chalked up a Broadway success (in "Romanoff and Juliet"); played in road companies of "South Pacific" and other musicals; completed four films ("Donovar's Reef" with John Wayne, the latest); and made appearances on *Combat!*, *Ben Case J*, *Burke's Law*, *Slattery's People* and other series. And now she is rehearsing for the female lead in the new Richard Rodgers musical, "Time of the Waltz."

A solid record for a girl whose only training was three years of modeling when she auditioned for *The Gleason Show* as a "sort of pass-the-time lark." But one thing you should know about Liz Allen: When a lark happens to turn into an opportunity, she's the girl who will work hard to take advantage of it.

When Liz was 17 she left the family hearthside in New Jersey, took a New York apartment, became a successful model, toured Europe and married a German aristocrat, Baron Ca l Von Vittinghoff-Schell. The marriage lasted two years. "He was very nice," she says. "It would have lasted longer, but it was just lots and lots of party time." At her husband's suggestion she auditioned for *The Gleason Show*, became an "Away-We-Go" girl. She joined the Helen Hayes Repertory company and now she's very much an actress, and single. "Marriage rarely works out when you're struggling on the way up" she says. "You have to give up a lot to succeed, and anyone who says different is lying."





Down to the sea in



Top photo: David Hedison, who plays the captain of the Seaview, takes a dip in 20th Century-Fox's moat and picks up the 4foot model of the submarine. Behind him are the 8- and 18-foot versions; in foreground, a 1-foot mini-sub and a 31-inch submarine of more conventional design. Photo above: Technicians pull the largest Seaview model, an 18-footer, into the water. Riddle: What is sometimes 4 feet long, sometimes 8 feet, sometimes 18 feet; can be found in two indoor tanks, an outdoor moat and a lake; and looks like a 400-foot submarine cruising the seas? Answer: The Seaview, the futuristic sub that is the one indispensable element of ABC's brine opera, Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea.

On the TV screen it does indeed look like a 400-foot submarine. This is, of course, an illusion, and a very elaborate one. The Seaview is really three miniature fiberglass models. And the sea they voyage to the bottom of is either of the two indoor tanks at 20th Century-Fox's Hollywood studios. Actually, only two of the model subs -one 4 feet long, the other 8 feet -ever are submerged. The third model -18 feet long-is used only for surface shots, filmed on a lake at the Fox Ranch in Malibu Canyon, Cal., or on a 5-foot-deep moat on Fox's back lot (where these photos were taken).


The three Seaview models are only part of the Voyage's miniature fleet. There are, in addition, subs of various sizes that can be used as enemy boats or as part of the American Navy. And there are "mini-subs" which photograph 22 feet long but in reality come in two much smaller sizes—1 foot and 2 feet. They are the subs which are ejected from the Seaview's underside for exploratory missions. Price of the models: about \$200,000.

To complete the illusion of the Seaview, there are sets representing sections of the submarine (control room, officers' quarters, bridge, etc.) in the Fox studios. It is on these lifesize sets that Richard Basehart, David Hedison and their Seaview shipmates go to sea.

Inauguration Notes: The best way to describe the Presidential Inauguration, possibly, is to say that it was solemn and gay-solemnity rather than wild enthusiasm marked the speeches and parade; gaiety the various Inaugural balls in the evening. Probably the most solemn note was struck immediately after the President took his oath. He turned to Mrs. Johnson and their eyes met. The look on both their faces - affection, love, pride - was unforgettable. For gaiety, there was Arlene Dahl, a large feather jouncing at a strategic spot in her décolletage, describing her dress to Nancy Dickerson at one of the Inaugural balls. "... and this feather," she told Nancy flatly, "comes off as soon as I get off camera "

Realistic Approach: Last week in the trade newsletter Television Digest, an interviewer asked ABC President Leonard Goldenson about Peyton Place, which some critics have accused of placing too-heavy emphasis on sex.

Goldenson says his Standards and Practices department has watched over the program closely, and "we feel that Peyton Place has been produced on a very fine, high plane and certainly not subject to criticism.... Peyton Place attempts to realistically approach the problems of life as they might exist. The moral of the program is such that it can influence young people as well as older people in the right way.... We have received letters from Parent-Teachers Associations complimenting us on the show. They say that this is the best form of education to the pitfalls of sex or other young folks' problems and they hope the show continues."

Not all of the PTA, however, has recommended Peyton Place as an aid to education. Mrs. Jennelle Moorhead, national president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, says a review of the show in the December issue of the PTA national magazine was, in fact, quite derogatory, to wit: The program "... is indistinguishable from the soap operas that inhabit the daytime air. Mia Farrow is a beautiful girl and a fine actress. It is a pity to drown her talent under froth and scum."

Up, Up, Up: Federal Communications Commissioner Robert E. Lee said last week he believed a fourth TV network, composed of UHF stations, may be formed by the end of 1965. "I have no inside information," he told a meeting of the Station Representatives Association in Chicago, "but I know there's thinking on it by a number of people. I do know there's a need for another network."

In 1965, said Lee, 35 new UHF stations will be added to the 130 now broadcasting; 85 to 90 more are expected in 1966.



Dear Bob (I mean Dear Pen Pal):

It will seem ridiculous to you, but this is the first free moment I have

had since I arrived a week ago. I am writing this sitting under a hair drier so's not to waste precious time. We are leaving for the country in an hour and will be gone three days. This morning, after Leslie Blanchard washed my hair, we turned around only to find that the hair drier had disappeared from its customary place. Quite a feat when you consider the size and weight of a professional hair drier. It was 10 Sunday morning. Everything was closed, of course. Phone calls back and forth and finally the manager broke into the hotel beauty shop to get us a drier. We are taking it along with us to the country. Doesn't every girl travel with a professional hair drier when she goes scampering in the Nordic woods?

After traveling in an airplane for 16 hours, one does get a little balmy, particularly when you lose an eight-hour day some place—then step off the plane to face a press conference in Swedish. I felt a little funny about it, too. After being in America for so long and then coming over to do a special on Sweden—they could have resented that, I think, but they didn't.

I cried a little when I saw my mother. Then all the photographers wanted me to cry for them. How do you cry when you have already finished crying? Then I was led out a door and into a big black limousine. It was dark and I could have been any place in the world—Chicago or New York or London. I felt in limbo—not anywhere. Only the next day, when Stockholm showed itself, did I realize where I was.

My family thinks we are filming the family tree, and keeps coming up with "wonderful" ideas for the special. After I had three hours' sleep the first night, the family, the press and radio and television people all started converging on me—an army of people with various goals—re me. Not to mention the director, the producer, the writer and the publicity man. So my day of rest for readjustment after the flight never happened. It won't happen until I get back to the U.S., I guess.

So far my conversations have been with Prime Minister Tag Erlander, Mr. Erik Boheman, former Ambassador to the U.S., and, for intellectual variety, Ingemar Johansson, the boxer. The men on the crew all speak different languages, none of them English, which hampers Don Taylor, our director, somewhat because he speaks only English. I'm not helping because I speak only Swedish now.

Life after work is rather normal shove food down, fall exhausted into bed, get up and sit in the living room since you can't get to sleep and boom!—there's a mouse behind the wastebasket. Ring the desk. Little boy comes and by that time the mouse has disappeared. Boy gives me a strange look. Ten minutes later

spider appears. Ring desk again. Boy with can of spray. Spider loved the spray. He was back again last night and the night before. So was the mouse.

I was delegated to ask him to appear on the special. We met at Riche restaurant and I was nervous as could be. That was before he came in. When he came in he made me *very* nervous—is it correct to say "nervouser"? I was wearing my "intellectual" dress but even that didn't help. I blushed and almost fainted.

Von Sydow is that kind of man, a Prince Charming, but nothing put on. He is entirely simple, gentle and direct and interested in *you*. There is a wonderful purity to him. He's terribly sexy, too. He looks so deeply into your inner self that what is deep inside you comes surging up—and that's almost too much to handle.

He agreed to visit the Drottningholm Theater with me for the show. And, after working a long, long day, the crew told us they had missed the last three shots because there was no film in the camera! Then the crew went to dinner and I had to persuade Von Sydow to come back after his dinner and shoot for three more hours. He was wonderful about it.

The Drottningholm Theater was built in 1766 and they still have perform-

How do you spell hectic? I didn't

tell you this: While I was walking with Max von Sydow at the old theater the other day, I looked up and saw a young man with two children. He was pushing a baby carriage. "Hey!" I hollered and jumped over a hedge and grabbed him. It was my brother. I've been so busy I haven't had time to see him. He was just on his way to the market and didn't know I was anywhere around. That's the way it's been. Whenever my family wants to see me, they wander around until they see the lights and they know that's where I am.

The other day we were shooting at one of the big squares and a woman came up and said, "Hello, Inger." I didn't know her, of course. She turned out to be a lady who used to be my baby sitter—that is, she sat with me when I was a baby. Another time we were shooting on the street and I heard, out of the blue, "Hey, it's the farmer's daughter—hot diggety dog." A couple of American kids.

We have spent the last few days in the "real" Sweden—Dalarna. This is where I was born and it is a wonderful part of the world and different from any other. The people are warm, independent, and unconforming and outgoing.

The guy driving the camera truck didn't know what he was doing and I had to pedal like the very devil to keep up with him and then slow down and smile and contemplate nature and then pump like crazy to catch up again. This went on for four days.

The weather was terrible but it finally cleared and we all went up to the top of the mountain, where the view is superb. We started shooting at the exact spot where Bergman .filmed the rape scene in "Virgin Spring." Bad spirits must still be there because the minute we started, it began to hail.

We've worked seven days a week ever since I got to Sweden and I've averaged about four hours' sleep. I had planned to go to Paris and to Moscow—but there's just no time left.

One day, an elderly couple came out to greet me in the forest. They didn't know me. They just thought I should be welcomed. Wasn't that nice? Later they gave me presents—a hand-woven mat and a pillow cover. And another man gave me a wooden flute he had made the night before. I'll play it for you when I get back.

You and your mouse poison. Baaaah. Your friend and Max von You-know-who's, Inger

THE MAN WITH THE \$175,000 SMILE

He's Jack Lescoulie, whose ability to convince viewers that he's everybody's next-door neighbor has made him the most prosperous announcer in the business

Everybody talks about Jack Lescoulie's teeth but nobody does anything about them. "I was once accused," he said the other day, "of reading the casualty list of an air crash with a smile on my face. That was a lie. I did too much flying during the war to be flip about such things. But I'm me. I smile a lot. I don't know what to do about it. I've either got to be me or they'll have to get rid of me."

Nobody at NBC or the *Today* show —which Jack Lescoulie has decorated for 12 of its 13 years—has suggested anything that drastic. He and Frank Blair, who has been on the show during its entire tenure, are part of the dawn in the minds of two generations of Americans. "Frank and I, collectively, have been on television more than anybody in history, including all the Presidents put together. Many young married people were 10 years old when they began watching us. Now they have their first child, and we're actually picking up a whole new generation."

Besides his teeth, the other truly impressive thing about Jack Lescoulie is the eternal and unmitigated bloom of his boyish good looks. An NBC biography lists his birthdate as Nov. 17, 1917. Is it correct? "That's the best I can do for them," he says. "You can never tell when somebody might want to retire you." Other estimates than NBC's place him in his indeterminate middle 50's, but it ought to be recorded that he looks not a day older sitting in his office in Rockefeller Center reminiscing about the Pleistocene Age of radio (which was approximately when he got into it) than he does on your TV screen.

Perhaps the secret of his mirth and youthfulness is contained in the soothing phrase: \$175,000 a year—because that's how much he earns these days, which isn't bad for a semi-reformed trombone player and survivor of a score of low-budget cowboy epics in which he usually played bad guys. A lot of that 175 G's comes from the making of TV commercials.

Ask him who's the top announcer in the business, and he says: "If you mean in terms of money, I am. For the last seven years I've been the highest paid announcer in television. It's not a secret that I've always played the game rough, and not been easy to get. I take on only a few accounts."

Al Morgan, *Today*'s producer, attests to Lescoulie's effectiveness: "He's deceptively good. He's the darling of old ladies and kids. I've never seen a performer get the kind of mail he does—cough remedies, fishing advice, everything. There's lots of warmth in Jack on the air. He kids around a lot, and then suddenly he says something very penetrating."

Perhaps the most penetrating estimate of Jack Lescoulie comes from the man himself. "I've made a career out of being a guy you can't resent for small things," Lescoulie says. "I buy my clothes off the rack so that my suits aren't too well fitted. The hair isn't too long or too short. I wear ties which can't be resented by any potential buyer of the products I represent. This gets you to the people. It's being the ideally-dressed salesman. I believe you've got to take every edge you can get."

Lescoulie is serious about this hot pursuit of normality; he consciously woos acceptance by casting himself as everybody's next-door neighbor, by being liked as a regular fellow by regular fellows, by walking the straight and narrow path between big-city sharpness in dress and manners, and the wide-eyed, wide-lapel ingenuousness of the hayseed.

Therein lies the secret of Lescoulie's longevity as a TV personality. "The closer you come to being yourself on the screen, the longer you last," he says. "I can think of at least three examples of big stars who let it slip out that they were not really nice guys at all, and it damaged their careers. On television, there's always the risk of a quick shot in an offguard moment, a chance insight; and if you're playing a part, you'll be exposed."

Paradoxically, this same remorseless nice-guyism which earns him the \$175,000 is a trap which frustrates his fondest professional ambition. "I'm an actor," he says, "and a good one. But I've pigeonholed myself as a smiling, aging juvenile announcer who knows a little about everything. People won't think of me any other way. This can't do me a bit of good, professionally. I'd love to play a psychotic heavy, something really mean, the worst kind of dirty rat."

He has indeed been an actor—at the Pasadena Playhouse, on radio shows, in movies and on Broadway. It was his acting career, in fact, which indirectly healed a breach between himself and *Today*'s novelist-playwright-producer Al Morgan. "When Al and I first met, we clashed," Lescoulie remembers. "I didn't like him as a producer, and he didn't like me. I was brash enough to tell him how to do things. We scarcely even said hello.

"Then one day Al approached me and said: 'I just remembered where I've seen you.' I said, 'I'm not surprised. I'm on the *Today* show.' He said, 'No, I mean in an acting job. You played the lead in a **continued**

production of "No Exit" on television around 1950.' He was right. Since then, we've gotten along fine."

Jack Lescoulie is best defined in one of his parts as a charter and enthusiastic member of what an associate disparagingly calls the "sentimental drinking society" which convenes daily at Toots Shor's. The loosely organized "society" is characterized by a certain locker-room bonhomie: the total recall of recondite sports statistics; and the unremitting shuttling of taxis, limousines and buses between the restaurant, Yankee Stadium, Shea Stadium and Madison Square Garden. High priest of the society is Jackie Gleason, whom Lescoulie calls his best friend.

His day starts at 3:45 A.M.

Today's announcer cannot tarry long, however, even in the bosom of such camaraderie. By 3 P.M., he's driving back to his \$30,000 home in a middle-income Long Island suburb, there to do "what most ordinary suburban fathers would do" with his daughter, 11, his son, 9, and his Irishborn wife, Bridie. He's up at 3:45 A.M. the next day to start all over again.

Lescoulie's involvement with the world of show biz began at the age of 8: His mother was a variety actress and his father a technician in movie studios. With his brother Bud and sister Sylvia he was put on the stage in a kiddy act ("It was the world's worst act") and played various West Coast vaudeville circuits and PTA meetings. Later he won a Shakespeare-declaiming contest—a scholarship to Pasadena Playhouse.

In 1935 actor Walter Hampden brought him to New York with a play called "Achilles Had a Heel." The critics found "Achilles" vulnerable, and the play lasted seven days. It was a year of living in second-rate hotels and eating in beaneries before he got another role (in a Melvyn Douglas vehicle called "Tapestry in Grey"), and that one lasted three weeks. He hoarded his salary, however, and bought a bus ticket back to California.

After that he was a cowboy in lowgrade Westerns and an itinerant radio announcer. With writer Nat Hiken he developed a radio show called "Grouch Club," which was picked up by NBC. He and Hiken subsequently brought the show to New York, where it ran into sponsor trouble and was dropped. "Broke in New York all over again," he remembers.

By that time, however, the war was on; he joined the Army Air Force, was assigned as a combat reporter and flew 25 missions. Back in New York, he performed all manner of radio jobs, once again fell on hard days, and even hired out to a summer resort in the Poconos as a singer, hoofer, trombone player and funnyman. CBS hired him for its program department about the same time NBC was developing a new morning show for Dave Garroway, to be called *Today*.

A lot to smile about

NBC had interviewed scores of men in the attempt to find a personality who would fit gracefully with Garroway. Lescoulie auditioned and got the job immediately. Since then, he's been riding a rising curve of popularity and affluence.

Perhaps the most often-quoted remark about Lescoulie belongs to Jackie Gleason. "Do you know why you were never a big hit in radio?" Gleason asked him one day. "No," said Lescoulie, guardedly. "Because they couldn't broadcast teeth," said The Great One.

Lescoulie's grin continues to be one of television's most durable monuments. And it's a natural grin—he's got a lot to smile about.



Candid Camera

Let us start out by saying that, for pure pleasure, we turn on *Candid Camera* as often as any show on the air—and, unlike some of its Sunday night neighbors, we hope it goes on forever. It is fine art, for it not only holds the mirror up to nature in general but up to our natures in particular and in the end literally gives us Robert Burns' gift to see ourselves as others see us.

It is, in short, the television medium used to its fullest advantage, and everybody on the regular staff-Allen Funt, Durward Kirby, Bob Banner, Elliott Joslin-deserves high credit. As for the irregulars, two of our favorites are Betsy Palmer and the peerless double-talker Al Kelly. Some weeks ago Miss Palmer did a screamingly funny scene as a dentist who lathered her patient. "A little bit of soap around the mouth," she explained, "keeps away the germs." Mr. Kelly did a masterful job on a speech to a group of Macy's clerks who could, of course, understand nothing. Afterward, however, during the question period, a man who had said "I'm not with you 100 percent" was then given a double dose of double talk. "Now." he said, "you're talking."

But the great thing about this show is that it does not belong to the celebrities-it is one show where the public is, literally, the star. As such, of course, not only the joke, but the jokee, must be good. The most difficult character in comedy, Cervantes once said, is the fool, and he must be no fool who plays the part. No one enjoys the fun when it is cruel, and to this show's credit it is rarely so. At its best, it's terrific. We recall, for example, the woman driving up to a filling station with no engine in her car ("It was there," she said, "a while ago"), the voice that spoke from inside a mailbox ("How do you think I got in here? I fell in") and the elephant who tried to climb into a phone booth ("Honey, you won't believe this, but there's an elephant trying to get into the booth!" "Well, what does he want, John?").

This season has also had some classics-from the very first show, when some unsuspecting "helpers" of a TV repairman were stunned when baseballs and hot dogs came hurtling through the TV screen, to a recent January show, when a steelworker was exhorted to join a ballet class ("The only thing we insist upon is that you bring your own leotard"). Our only worry is that Mr. Funt lately seems to have given us less of this sort of fun and more of his camera vignettes, which, while interesting, are not what we tuned in to see. We also take a dim view of some other new ideas-such as demonstrations of what happens to jokes when they are repeated. Finally, Mr. Funt is far more fascinated than we are with children's dialog. We, too, are pushovers for cute faces and cute conversation, but not at the expense of what made this show great.

THE SECOND BANANA WHO KNOWS HIS PLACE

It's far enough down the stalk of 'The Joey Bishop Show' so the star's skin won't be bruised "The third time seems to be a charm," said a friend a few months ago, referring to the third and finally successful marriage of a mutual acquaintance. "Don't know quite why," said the friend. "Maybe he found the right girl, finally. And maybe he learned something along the way."

That conversation came to mind recently as I talked with Corbett Monica, who plays Larry, writer and friend of the family, on *The Joey Bishop Show*. For if there's one question most often asked it is, "How come it's working so well with you and Joey, when others have tried and failed?"

The question, of course, refers to the fact that, in the last four years, the Bishop show has undergone more changes than an actress's hair color. Actors, directors and producers have been placed and replaced in roundrobin fashion. In the first two seasons the second-banana spot went from Joe Flynn to Guy Marks to Corbett Monica, leaving a trail of very unhumorous off-stage dialog. All this presumably while Bishop was struggling to find the right format for his talents.

The most outspoken former second banana is Flynn, who began the whole thing back in 1961. "They kept reducing the part," he recalls. "My contract was for 13 weeks, but after seven, I was out. The reason given, and I quote-'You're taking too much light from the star.' My reason, and you can quote me, was simply that I'm a funnier man than the star is." (This wasn't Flynn's only difficulty in adjusting to second-banana roles. After leaving Bishop, he hooked on with McHale's Navy and became involved in another fight-this time a fist fight-with the star of that show, Ernest Borgnine.)

Marks followed Flynn on the Bishop show and lasted 18 weeks. His comment is more cautious. "I was signed for 18 weeks, and I did 18 weeks. I think any trouble came from all the pressures on Joey trying to put the show together."

But Monica, now in his early 40's, is in his third season as a regular, and perhaps the best answer to his staying power is the one given by Sheldon Leonard. Leonard, production chief of the company that makes the show, says, "Corbett came in at the right time. Joey's more relaxed now, more mature, and settled down with the format. But then, too, I think Monica has a flexible personality."

A visit to the set offers some idea of that flexibility and why it's necessary. The show is well named, for it's a Bishop production from beginning to end. The scripts are raw clay for Bishop to try out, to change, to mold into a finished product. The director occupies a chair that says "Director," "Cut." and occasionally calls out Bishop shapes the show as if he were shaping an enlarged comedy routine. One particular morning he spent four hours pacing out a five-minute bit. He calls it "almost Method comedy" and he is determined that his comedy will be "honest," that the characters' behavior be motivated, and not just a series of "gimmicks."

As he worked, some suggestions were made. "Have Monica bust a painting over your head," somebody ventured. "Too cliché, too old-fashioned," replied Bishop. Yet a few minutes later he was himself suggesting a pie-throwing routine.

Perhaps three times in four hours, Monica made a suggestion. Bishop received them with respectful consideration, yet somehow none of them were incorporated into the final script. All the while, as Bishop talked, directed, changed lines and routines, Monica listened, said "Yes, that's good," to Bishop's suggestions, then patiently went through a complete change the next moment when Bishop decided it wasn't so good after all.

Yet to conclude that Monica is simply a yes-man for Bishop's ideas is wrong. For while Bishop appears to run a one-man show, there is obviously tremendous respect, as well as friendship, between the two men.

They met, years ago, when both were traveling night-club comics on their way up. Both came up the hard way. Corbett Monica (his real name) was born in New York, raised in St. Louis, one of five brothers his mother had to support after his father died. The brothers all went to work as soon as possible, Monica starting out as a dance instructor. A friend talked him into trying a stand-up comedy routine at a local night spot. It took, and he was on his way.

Before moving to California, the two comics lived in the same neighborhood in Englewood, N.J. Monica's big break came when Bishop, subbing for Jack Paar on the *Tonight* show, booked him for an appearance.

Today Corbett lives with his wife, Helen, and four children in Beverly Hills, right across the street from the Bishops, and they do a good deal of socializing. No question that the personal rapport helps on the show. As Bishop once remarked: "I'm not going to keep a second banana if the chemistry doesn't work." Yet friendship doesn't always make for a good business relationship, and perhaps the key reason for Monica's survival on the series is that he does not feel threatened by Bishop. "I don't regard myself as a second banana," he says, in his quick soft-toned manner that is so strikingly similar to Bishop's. "In TV, every man's a star. I consider myself a comic star in my own right. Sure, in the show, Joey's the boss, but I'm not what you'd call servile."

When you bring Monica back and pin him down as to exactly why he gets along so well on the show, he puts it this way: "It's facing the truth of a situation—on any set there are moods and turmoil. I accept them. I know I have something on the ball, and it's going to happen for me, too."

LES CRANE, like JACK PAAR and ARTHUR GODFREY before him, now has something of a TV family too: CLEVELAND AMORY, JULIUS LA ROSA, MARTY INGELS and MARTA CURRO are the brethren who'll be appearing at irregular intervals . . "The Best on Record," an NBC special featuring recording stars, goes on the air May 13 . . . TOM BOSLEY plays SEN. GEORGE W. NORRIS in a March <u>Profiles in</u> <u>Courage</u> . . . NBC presents the International Beauty Spectacular from Long Beach, Cal., sometime in June.
