Unless Vassar and Radcliffe have some as-yet-unannounced plan to stage a Valentine Bowl, we have seen the last of the bowl games until next winter. It's a shame, because the bowl season is fun while it lasts—and it lasts only slightly longer than the football season itself.

There are, however, a few holiday or weekend hours during the bowl season that are open, and to fill those voids the National Collegiate Athletic Association has been asked to approve an Aluminum Bowl, a Santa Claus Bowl and an unnamed bowl. That has a nice ring to it—Unnamed Bowl.

■ The Columbia Broadcasting System wants to promote, and telecast, the Santa Claus Bowl, and well it might, because CBS has not been doing at all well in the bowl business. NBC in the past season had five bowls to its credit—Sun, Sugar, Senior, Orange and Rose. ABC was next with four—Liberty, Bluebonnet, Gator and Hula. CBS only had one—Cotton.

Nor does he admit the six pro football specials to the list. Obviously the Kumquat Bowl (regional stations) doesn't qualify (it's for youngsters), but the Camelia (regional stations) does, and so do several that weren't past telecast this season—Mineral Water, Tangerine, Pecan and Grantland Rice.

If there is any more time open next season, we'd like to suggest the ultimate bowl game—the All-Bowl Bowl. Coaches would select the most valuable player after each bowl game. These players then would be qualified to play in the All-Bowl Bowl. Interested, CBS?



The French are producing
a wild, wild Western that must have
General Custer spinning in his grave

The story goes that President Charles de Gaulle, as part of his present anything-you-can-do-France-can-dobetter campaign, demanded to know why all the cowboy-and-Indian TV programs came from the United States.

"But mon général," said an aide.
"Cowboys and Indians are the American West. They have always been the only ones to make these films. I mean, where else could they be made?"

"Right here in France," snapped le grand Charles. "The Americans make films about the cancan and Toulouse-Lautrec, don't they? Why shouldn't we make films about the West?"

Whether the patriotic scene above ever took place is debatable, although there are versions of it current in television circles in Europe. But if it did, it would help explain a program that has Americans in France clutching at each other in wild disbelief.

It is called *Les Indiens*. It is written and directed by a Frenchman. It is produced by a Frenchman. The cast is overwhelmingly French. The exteriors were all filmed in France. Yet, dang mah ornery hide, *Chérie*, if it ain't all about cowpokes and Injuns and *chercheurs d'or*—pardon, prospectors—in the Old West.

Ils sont partis par-là! (They went thataway!)

Does this cast of characters sound familiar? Believe me, any resemblance between Les Indiens and an American treatment of the same ingredients is purely coincidental. After watching one Sunday night segment recently I

moseyed over to the elegant Left Bank bunkhouse of the creators of the show to tell them I did not know whether to laugh or cry.

Pierre Viallet, the writer-director, said that, oddly enough, he had the same reaction when he saw the standard American usage of cowboys and Indians. The trouble, he said, while young producer Paul de Senneville nodded vigorous "oui, oui's," was that Hollywood had plastered legend over legend until the truth about the Old West had been totally obliterated.

France (I gathered) was doing its usual cultural service to the world by peeling off the clichés to show American Indians as they really lived—and spoke. And while he did not expect anything to stop the deluge of American movie Westerns, the French public should see the real thing on TV and draw its own conclusions.

Nous serons au passage avant eux! (We'll cut them off at the pass!)

Viallet, a charming fellow, said he had been twitted by a Danish producer about the alleged fiat from General de Gaulle, but the real inspiration for the series came from the remarkable craze for dude ranches and for Indian lore now raging in France. Thousands of middle-aged Frenchmen vacation happily in rugged conditions in the Camargue ranches north of Marseilles pretending to be cowboys, and more thousands work in shops all week and at the weekend don feathers and paint to pretend to be Indians.

On the way to the Left Bank I had seen in the big shops window displays of Indians in full headdress, moccasins, Indian-style handbags and the like, and Viallet said part of this was due to the success of his TV show, which already had inspired comic books about its characters, and seven records of its very attractive theme music.

"Our make-believe French Indians are in some ways more authentic than the American extras," continued

Viallet said. "One of them even performs a sun dance which has been forbidden in America because it involves self-inflicted wounds. Before we started shooting, my cast made for me Big Medicine. We smoked the Pipe of Peace and they named me Chief Looking Glass because I'm always looking in my camera viewfinder."

Quand vous dites ça, souriez! (When you say that, smile!)

Viallet's un-American passion for authenticity was still in high gear when, impressed by the French cowboy-and-Indian talent available, he started work on the series. Scouting for suitable range country he decided on the Sologne plateau in the middle of the country and the Alpilles area of the Camargue. He was told these resembled the Dakotas (he hasn't been to the American West himself) and since the tribe which lived in the

Dakotas was the Crow tribe, he wrote his story about the Crows.

"How did you like the dialog?" he asked with a faint smile.


Always mindful of America's debt to Lafayette, I said I liked the French narration, which links the scenes, but possibly because of my faulty French I did not seem to catch everything the Indians were saying.


"No wonder," said Viallet, his smile broadening. "They are supposed to be Crow Indians so, naturally, they are speaking in the Crow language."

"Naturally," I murmured.

Viallet said he got the Crow dialog out of a dictionary compiled by missionaries and he assumed it was all right since there had not been a single complaint from a Crow-speaking viewer. Sometimes there are three languages going at once. Indians are talking Crow. Characters playing French settlers are speaking French. And those portraying Americans—cowboys, troops, sourdoughs, etc.—are







chattering in English. The French narrator interprets the action, to keep purely French viewers in the picture.

Au même temps au ranch . . . (Meanwhile, back at the ranch . . .)

Viallet and De Senneville have chosen to tell Les Indiens in 26 episodes of only 15 minutes each, but they think the narration enables them to pack a lot more action into that period than might be expected. The story is, basically, the love of Mato (Alain Emery), a Crow brave, for Wany (Rosenda Monteros), played against the developing contacts of whites and Indians about the end of the American Civil War.

"There have been hundreds of American films about the Indian era," Viallet said, "so we looked for a different angle. We take a moment in time and history when the Indian was not sad, as he is usually shown, but when he was mostly gay and filled with joie de vivre. We see the Indians


not from the white man's point of view but from the Indian's. And here is another new thing. In American films the squaw has a very small part. In our series she is important."


There is a French orphan, Caroline, who is working in a saloon run by one of the American villains, Latimer (Martin Caille). An Indian falls in love with her and wants to pay court to her, but Latimer claims it would lower the tone of his establishment if his girls ran around with Indians.


"This is one of the big emotional conflicts," Viallet said.

Another conflict arises when Latimer discovers that the "healing fluid" the Indians get from a well, provided for them by The Great Spirit, is oil! Fortunately, the American Army arrives in time to prevent any major fighting. The relations between the Army and the Indians are good. Viallet thinks the hostility between them (in American films) has been overplayed.

for its stockholders and obliged to operate in the public interest.

I'd call a meeting for 7 A.M.

Three months ago, on becoming chairman of the board of the IOU-TV network, I conducted an experiment possibly unique in television history. I requested that the vice presidents in charge of entertainment and public affairs programming, together with a representative group of producers, join me in the board viewing room at 7 on a weekday morning to watch an entire day's programming on IOU-TV until sign-off time at 1 A.M.

The reason for this arduous exercise was the belief that few of those engaged in the top levels of the industry had ever viewed the television set sufficiently, in a consecutive manner, to acquaint themselves with the over-all substance and impact of network output on a day-to-day level. The compilation and synthesis of the confidential notes made at the viewing gave significant evidence to warrant a radical, long-term overhauling of network standards and procedures in

the interests of the medium, the advertisers and the public alike. For the consensus arrived at from these notes revealed two grave and major dangers threatening the present system. One is increasing intolerance of, or indifference toward, commercials. The second is the growing dearth of talent. Each affects the other so profoundly that no changes in programming can be initiated without changes in advertising procedures. Commercials are an integral part of programming, affecting not only the content and natures of the programs themselves but the values and habits of the American public.

Existing patterns, if only because they are now profitable and because surveys tell us that the majority of the public find television satisfactory, will be extremely difficult to change and, inevitably, will involve financial risk and loss.

Standing still, however, will not only involve an even greater loss to the medium in terms of profit and prestige, but will also lead to regulatory acts of Government and to the growing dearth of creative talent.

Having myself examined a crosssampling of letters received from the public during the last six months concerning commercials, I can testify that the general tone of the letters was overwhelmingly one of mounting impatience, derision or indifference.

If, however, we broadcasters and agencies continue to react to ratings rather than to the public voice, the Federal Communications Commission does not. It has in its files massive evidence of viewer complaint against commercialism which will inevitably lead to restrictive measures. Equally dangerous for the health and freedom of the industry is the cumulative effect of excessive commercialism on the talent it needs to fill its schedules. This scarcity of real talent is, I contend, due to the limitation of creative freedom by commercial priorities.

I have therefore come to the conclusion that this network must initiate the self-preservative step of establishing a new code regulating the amount, placement and quality of commercials.

The industry as a whole stands to gain by the cooperation of all the networks in working out this new code. If such cooperative efforts should fail, then this network must lead the way alone, regardless of risks and short-term losses this would entail.

The first objectives of the code would be to reduce the percentage of time per hour of programming allotted to commercials, and the duration of each commercial. Next, the practice of bunching short commercials during the over-all—and reduced—time segment allotted them would be standardized to parallel the magazine custom of concentrating advertising at the beginning and end pages and leaving the center core of text relatively free from interruption.

The following categories of pro-

grams would be exempt from commercial interruption: news broadcasts, coverage of national and international events, and any other programs considered by the network to be vital to the public information or enlightenment. No newscaster or commentator, furthermore, would either introduce or deliver a commercial message, since this secondary function as salesman inevitably diminishes his primary value as an independent newsman.

Drama (but not daytime serial drama) and children's programs would be interrupted only at those points approved by the writer, the producer and the director. Placement of commercials in serious drama would be entirely at the discretion of the writer, who would be authorized to approve them only at what he (not the advertisers) considered "natural breaks." He would, furthermore, have the final veto on commercials which he considered detrimental to mood and continuity.

No commercial messages would be delivered by any performer on children's programs, or during the program itself; and none would be addressed directly to the child viewer, The soliciting of children for commercial gain has long been one of the disgraces of American television.

Under my directives, moreover, IOU-TV is establishing a department concerned exclusively with screening of commercials. This department is to be headed by a vice president previously unaffiliated with broadcasting, manufacturing, or merchandising, and staffed by rotating monthly panels of independent "jurors" chosen from various walks of life and paid per diem for their opinions based on credibility (not only as to the claims of the product but to the actions and comments of the purported users), veracity, taste and entertainment value.

In the opinion of the test-viewers, IOU-TV has been continued

performing its function well in public affairs programming; therefore it will not be dealt with in depth in this memorandum.

It is in the entertainment field, however, that the growing dearth of writing talent should be a source of deep concern for the industry. Unlike the print and theater media, there is not one writer of real stature now working on a regular basis for television, and the few well-known writers who have lent their names to recent series have, it seems, either withheld their talents or allowed them to be progressively eroded by commercial exigencies.

There is not, in our test-viewing consensus, anything wrong with the existing categories of entertainment programs, whether situation comedy, drama series, variety, soap operas, games, or the almost disappearing single play. But there is a lot wrong with the material that goes into them. It is written by formula and committee on the assembly line of the Hollywood canning factories instead of on the typewriters of single writers of talent and imagination.

With a few notable exceptions, television entertainment has failed to adhere to standards of truth and literacy held by the public affairs programming. These standards can be regained only through the massive recruitment and development of new creative talent for filmed or taped scripts. The overpowering economic advantage of residuals in film production has caused most of them to be made in Hollywood, where technical facilities and competence are greatest but where there is no equivalent of the talent to be found on the East Coast or in the Middle West. In spite of its great former era of movie-making, Hollywood appears unable to create a climate in which real talent can flourish.

My first proposal, therefore, would be to establish our main film and tape production centers in New York and Chicago, possibly moving the expert technical crews from the West Coast to add professional luster to the wealth of writing and acting talent available in both areas.

A second step toward the discovery and development of new talent could be to take a leaf from baseball and invest in a television farm club, or series of clubs. This network would then buy and support a selected group of local stations (VHF or UHF) for the deliberate purpose of program experimentation in which new writing, performing and producing talent could be given outlets free of rating and advertising pressures.

A third step would be to grant financial aid to the best basic training schools in the country, in all branches of creativity.

Whatever profitable television could give to sustain these very unprofitable, but vitally necessary, schools of music and drama and dance would be triply repaid by the enormous pool of talent nurtured and trained there. With the aid of much-needed funds, they could in time provide the kind of writers, composers, performers, and repertory groups who would give to commercial television the material it now needs.

These proposals are highly controversial and entail great risks. But their implementation is not impossible if all of us concerned realize that commercial television is—in spite of present high profits—at a crossroads. If it remains predominantly a selling medium rather than a public enrichment, it will inevitably bring upon itself the double yoke of Government regulation and public apathy.

If the stockholders, the sponsors, and the broadcasting executives to whom this memorandum is addressed do not believe this, it is suggested that they undergo the viewing test and then, if still unconvinced, demand my resignation.

It is already in writing.

Actually, there are five real guns on The Man from U.N.C.L.E., four for the U.N.C.L.E. men (the goodies) and one for the Thrush people baddies). There are also two rubber models of the guns-for hitting people over the head. Sam Rolfe, producer of the show, says the guns cost about \$5500 to develop and produce.

Rolfe says, "I wanted one gun capable of shooting single shots or rapid-fire automatic shots, with sound or silently. I also wanted sleepinducing darts, explosive bullets, and just bullets; and a gun that could convert to a long-range rifle. I wanted everything in the U.N.C.L.E. guns, and the one thing I forgot, I had put on the Thrush gun-an infra-red light so the Thrush people could shoot at night." The guns were put together by the MGM special effects department.

Also a silencer

There is also a silencer on the snout of the U.N.C.L.E. gun which the Thrush gun doesn't have. "I like to think of the Thrush gun as wearing a sneer," Rolfe says.

Real gun aficionados among viewers are quick to spot what is real about the guns and what is not, and to write in about it. Says Rolfe, "We try to pad out the parts of the guns on the show whenever we can, to make them more prominent, and thus get more fan mail." At last count, this came to about 500 letters a week.

The producers of the show have a sort of underlying philosophy about the guns, which executive producer Norman Felton tries to convey, tongue-in-cheek: "We don't kill anybody any more with the U.N.C.L.E. gun. We just put them to sleep. And afterwards they're better off. They're nicer to their wives and kids after being hit with one of Mr. Solo's darts. The Thrush gun, of course, kills."

Too Much, Too Often: A televised news conference is in progress...

Reporter: "Can you tell us what the President is doing now?"

Doctor: "I believe he has just blown his nose."

Reporter: "Did he use one tissue or two tissues?"

Doctor: "From the information I have, it was a one-tissue blow."

And so it went, in the parody that opened the Jan. 26 installment of That Was the Week That Was. For once, TW3 was right on target. In satirical terms the sketch reflected what viewers all over the country had been complaining about to each other—the excesses in TV's coverage of President Johnson's illness.

The Nation has only one President, and his health is of vital concern to every citizen. Properly - and commendably - the TV networks brought the public the facts about the President's hospitalization quickly, and they covered the story thoroughly. Once they had established, however, that there was no cause for alarm, and once the basic facts had been reported and analyzed, there was no need for the orgy of newsless bulletins and repetitious news specials that followed. Periodic, brief reports, at logical intervals, would have been welcome. But the constant, jarring interruptions for reports of insignificant facts served only to emphasize that TV's journalists were suffering from a severe case of bad news judgment.

Churchill: Much more professional was television's coverage of the death of Sir Winston Churchill. From the first bulletins, through the memorial tributes and Telstar pickups of the mournful scene in London, to the melancholy pageantry of the funeral, television performed in an exemplary manner. Vicariously, through television, Americans were able to pay tribute to a valiant man whom they loved and admired and whose death moved them deeply.

Senate TV?: Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R., N.Y.) is nothing if not persistent. He believes the Senate should permit TV coverage of crucial debates and roll calls. In May 1963 he introduced a resolution aimed at accomplishing this. It received a lukewarm reception and died in committee. Now Senator Javits is back again with the same resolution - he reintroduced it last week. Will it get anywhere this time? Probably not, the senator concedes. But he is certain that telecasts from the Senate will eventually be permitted. It will happen, he believes, as soon as the public demands it: but so far the senators have received little pressure from their constituents.

NAB's Choice: After a six-month search the National Association of Broadcasters has found its new president—right under its own nose. The NAB has picked Vincent T. Wasilewski, 42, to become its new leader, succeeding Gov. LeRoy Collins. Wasilewski has worked for the NAB since his graduation from law school 15 years ago. He has been executive vice president of the organization since 1961.

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Answer to last week's puzzle

JACKIE GLEASON on: Sin, Music, Plato, Pity and Other Subjects



There is respect in their voices when they speak.

Says Ronald Wayne: "He's a unique man. He understands acting, directing, production, writing, music, lighting. He has a high-level intelligence. If you bring a problem to him, you see the thinking process going on right under your eyes. His mind is working while you're talking. And he comes up with the solution."

Says Philip Bruns: "My colleagues at the Old Vic and the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art were Peter O'Toole, Rachel Roberts and Albert Finney. In this country I've worked with stars

ranging from Emlyn Williams to Billie Burke. And I'd say that this man is the most creative star I've ever worked with. This man thinks for himself. He has great intellectual, creative power."

Says Frank Bunetta: "He's an amazingly intelligent man. He learns with lightning speed. He's a demanding man. He can't stand stupidity. He's quick, and he expects everybody to be that quick. He thinks what he is is normal. He's so intelligent things seem self-evident to him."

These are not speakers at a testimonial dinner. They are, continued respectively, a producer, an actor and a director. One by one they have sat down beside this reporter in a dark Miami Beach auditorium during rehearsal and have talked extensively about their star. Not one has any idea of what the others have said. The man who is the object of these unusual tributes is Jackie Gleason.

Particularly since he won an Academy Award nomination in 1962 for his role in "The Hustler," people have become increasingly aware that the highly successful Gleason is not only a talented comedian but an amazingly gifted serious actor. Nonetheless, these tributes to his intelligence have a dissonant ring—as if they clash in some profound manner with the Gleason "image." Despite universal acknowledgment of his talent, Jackie Gleason seems still to be seen by most people as a Rabelaisian caricature, a man who

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swills down liquor by the vatful, who consumes pizza by the ton, who spends money by the bale—a gross, bawdy Pagliacci. Or, as Jackie himself puts it, with a touch of bitterness, "People see me as a fat, flashy fellow, a figure of loquaciousness and rioting. It's true enough. I drink. I make no bones about it. I'm fat because I overeat. And when I get a contract for a lot of money, I'm glad about it. But there's more to me than that."

Controversial Ideas

And of course, there is more to him than that. For one thing, he is a man with an unusually vivacious intelligence and with a colorful, articulate way of expressing himself. Here is a random sampling of his opinions.

On modern music: "The lives people lead are so limp today that they crave modern music. It seems to give them some stiffness, some rhythm, some beat, some illusion of purpose. But it provides only temporary relief. It goes nowhere. It leaves them with no feeling."

On Plato: "Plato was one of the stupidest men in the world. He thought that if a child was strong he should be made into a soldier; if he was active he should be made into an athlete. He completely forgot human desires in building his system. It was the stupidest thing he could do."

On delinquency: "I hear people say we can erase juvenile delinquency—all we have to do is build another playground. That's ridiculous. What do you do on a playground—shoot a couple of baskets? What's wrong with kids today is mental unemployment."

On educational television: "They say we should have educational programs on TV. Who will select the education? Who will select the philosophy that television will present to the public? That's the guy I want to meet. Once we have that in television, we have

what is almost a dictator."

On pity: "I dislike pity in any form. I think it's an excuse for cowardice. The great masochistic tranquilizer is self-pity. If you have a problem and you try to figure it out—that's much more heroic than moaning and groaning and whining."

On sin: "I've always believed that most sins are committed not because of the inability to control them, but because of the ability to perform them."

Jackie Gleason is also an idealist who can speak candidly about his ideals. One sunny morning on a Miami golf course he sat peacefully on a bench with a half mile of velvety grass rolling away behind him and communicated some of them to us.

"Life is so quick," he said thoughtfully. "If you got to the end and you discovered that you'd accomplished nothing, that would be a terrifying shock. That, I think, is the real fear of death—the fear that you are wasting your life.

"As far back as I can remember, way back when I was 5 years old, I wanted life to be lovely, warm, thrilling. I wanted life to be beautiful and I wanted to contribute something to its beauty. That's why I became an artist. I escaped from reality into the world of illusion.

"All my life I've had a purpose, a central theme to my existence. People who lack a purpose are unhappy, directionless. They're dissatisfied. Worst of all, they can't do anything well. It frightens them. People give up too easily. They don't accept the necessity of struggle. They don't realize that without obstacles to surmont, without the courage to surmont them, there can be no achievement. Courage, confidence in yourself, is one of the most necessary requisites of any kind of personality."

Jackie himself is a man of astonishing self-confidence in the realm of his work. But when he speaks of his own abilities, he is not boasting. His eyes are serious, his voice is calm, almost impersonal—as though he were evaluating his own artistry from the outside. "I have no use for humility," he says. "I am a fellow with an exceptional talent. In my work, I stand or fall by my own judgment."

Outside the realm of his work, however, Jackie Gleason's imperious certainty collapses. He talks of the world outside of show business as though it were an unknown and unknowable territory. "The world is mystery," he says. "Science gives you proof without certainty. Faith gives you emotional certainty without proof. Intelligence and logic are hazardous, risky instruments. You can't know anything definitely."

He is not a brave man

In this unknowable universe Jackie is not a brave man. In it he does not "stand or fall by his own judgment." He submits to rules devised by others which he does not fully understand. He is engaged in an unending and often anguished struggle to understand and comply with the moral tenets of Catholicism. "You must have rules," he says. "You can sin and rationalize it away, but when you have a set of rules to go by, it makes it a little more difficult to explain away your iniquities."

Gleason is humble, almost childlike in his admiration of men who are "spiritual." Two of his closest friends are actor Jack Haley ("He's a deeply spiritual man. I love a person who has spiritual intentions, spiritual desires and goals") and Bishop Fulton J. Sheen ("I absorb his spirituality, his knowledge, his intelligence"). Even his highly publicized friendship with Toots Shor he describes in essentially moral terms: "Toots and I share our inadequacies. But it's our very knowledge of values that enables us to share our inadequacies." continued He accepts the Catholic doctrine of original sin and his deepest concern is over the issue of moral guilt. His discussions with Bishop Sheen revolve endlessly around one theme: "How do you determine moral responsibility? Is the same act equally immoral if committed with different motives? How guilty are you?" He also is given to long discussions about volition with lawyer Edward Bennett Williams: "What is free will? How free is a man to choose his acts? Where exactly does moral responsibility lie? How guilty are you?"

He is two distinct people

Jackie Gleason has a foot in two worlds. In the world of "illusion" he is proud, independent, courageous—he is "The Great One." In the world of "reality" he is uncertain, self-castigating, fearful—he is "The Guilty One." He is almost two distinct people, with completely contradictory and warring mental characteristics.

Both "The Great One" and "The Guilty One" are branded into the comedy he purveys on the screen. It the mentally efficient One" who is the decisive judge, the powerful artist, the practical promoter of his theatrical enterprises. It is the know-nothing "Guilty One" who actually contributes the characterizations that have become so famous over the years. Jackie's characters, he says, reflect his own "view of good and evil." He discusses his sinners: "Reggie," he says, "lets moral inhibitions fly. He drinks. He goes with girls. He kicks his mother in the teeth. Charlie Bratten, the Loud Mouth, is insecure and tries to make his fellow man small so that he can gain some stature—a sin we are all guilty of. Ralph Cramden is a classic example of the inadequate who believes himself adequate but who must face reality." Even more significant are the characters that embody Jackie's concept of virtue. They are the two helplessly unintelligent buffoons—The Poor Soul and Crazy Guggenham (played by Frank Fontaine). "The Poor Soul is perfect. He's virtue. He's the square. He's a good Christian. Crazy Guggenham, too, is the embodiment of innocence—not very intelligent, childlike, kind." The strange truth is that The Poor Soul and Crazy Guggenham are satires on the Christian virtues; they are Jackie Gleason's versions of Dostoyevsky's "The Idiot."

Whatever one may think of Jackie as artist or thinker, one thing is obvious. He is a fascinatingly complex human being and not a caricature. Why has he been seen throughout the years chiefly as a Rabelaisian gimmick? Partly because of the bawdy, ribald, liquor-loving character he assumes on the TV screen; but more than that, because of his off-screen publicizing of this aspect of himself. Why does he do this?

Essentially a shy man

Jackie himself claims that he talks about these matters to the press "because I'm honest about them." His director, Frank Bunetta, says: "I think Jackie talks to the press about fatness and drinking because he thinks that's all they'll understand. It's actually hard for him to talk about the things that matter a lot to him." And Philip Bruns: "Jackie is essentially a shy man. He's inhibited in talking about the things that are most important to him. I think he hides behind all this talk of fatness and drinking. It's a defense."


Whatever the reason, the fact remains that the Gleason image is a distorted over-simplification of a complex human being. There are millions of men who overeat in this world, millions of men who drink too much. But there is only one Jackie Gleason.


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For brunch or a quick munch after TV viewing, try this excellent, hearty dish that is easy and quick to prepare. It's a good way to use leftover ham. The sauce is quite versatile and can be used over asparagus, broccoli and fish as well.

EGGS BENEDICT (Makes 8 servings)

4 English muffins

1/4 cup butter

8 slices smoked cooked ham, heated

8 poached eggs Paprika Water cress

HOLLANDAISE SAUCE

3/4 cup butter

6 egg yolks

2 tbsp. lemon juice

1/4 tsp. salt

Dash white pepper

2 tbsp. boiling water (if needed)

Prepare sauce first, keep warm over hot water until ready to serve: Cut butter into three equal parts. Put egg yolks and one piece of butter into top of double boiler over hot but not boiling water. Stir quickly with wooden spoon until butter melts. Repeat with remaining two pieces. Remove from heat, beat for a minute. Gradually beat in lemon juice. Add salt and pepper to taste. Replace over hot water and stir until sauce is smooth and slightly thickened. If water becomes too hot, sauce may curdle. If it does, just beat boiling water in until sauce is smooth again.

Cut muffins into halves and toast. Spread with butter, add ham slices, top with poached egg and spoon hollandaise sauce over the top. Sprinkle with paprika and garnish with water cress. Allow two portions for each man.

To poach eggs easily, fill shallow pan such as a skillet with about $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches of water. Add salt. Bring water to a boil, lower heat until it is just simmering. Break eggs (cold from the refrigerator) into a small bowl, one at a time. Pour carefully into simmering water. Cook several at once, simmering until white has become solid and yolk is still soft. Remove from water with slotted pancake turner. To prepare French-style poached eggs use a small saucepan filled with salted water. When water is simmering, stir rapidly with a spoon to make a small whirlpool. Drop egg into center of whirlpool, and simmer. Cook one at a time. This kind of poached egg looks like an oval-shaped white ball.

She's finally getting a chance to laugh out loud

After years of playing solemn roles,

BEVERLY GARLAND
is enjoying comedy with Crosby on television
and security at home

Soon after The Bing Crosby Show was uncorked for viewers on ABC last September, Beverly Garland, who plays Crosby's wife in the series, strode into a hardware store in Hollywood. A clerk beamed with recognition. "Miss Garland!" he cried. Then the manager of the store, brushing the clerk aside, scurried to the fore. "Miss Garland!" he fluttered in turn, pumping her hand. "How can we be of service? And, incidentally, Miss

Garland, we would be honored if you would like to open a charge account with us." Summoning up a fixed smile, Miss Garland purchased a hammer and a batch of two-penny nails and departed—and she has yet to return.

"Fifteen years I'd been going to that same hardware store," she says. "and I was always just another customer. Fifteen years of no special attention and no mention of a charge account. What did they continued

think, anyway—that now I'm playing Bing Crosby's wife and I'll pay my bills faster? To that attitude I have one word: nuts!"

And thus, with the foregoing glimpse of Life in Hollywood, Obsequious Merchants Division, we see one of the characteristics native to Mrs. Fillmore Crank, otherwise known as Beverly Garland. That is her wary, sensitive independence. It is accompanied by an unswerving candor. "Sometimes," Beverly concedes, "I




have a big mouth." Sometimes, moreover, she puts her foot in it. Over a decade ago, when Beverly received her first break, in the movie "D.O.A.," a Hollywood journalist asked if she thought the picture would win an Academy Award. "I don't know," Beverly replied airily. "There're a lot of good pictures out this year."

In cold print the remark struck the producers of "D.O.A." as flippant disloyalty, if not insubordination of the troops. "They said I was 'ungrateful,' "Beverly says. "So the word was passed around town and, although no one would ever admit it, I was blackballed in pictures for three long years."

Beverly Garland, seen at close range, is a slender, intelligent-eyed. well-featured young woman-her face, with its good cheek bones, is more interesting than conventionally pretty. She is flamboyant, talkative, flip. She is also intense, self-driven, as taut as a cello string. And she bestirs varied reactions. Says an actor who has known her for years: "It's too bad Bev Garland isn't bigger-she'd make a great Amazon." Another suggests: "Beverly has got to be the most actress-y broad in town." But Ross Martin, her teammate through 58 outings of Stump the Stars, sums up: "She's a warm, lovable nut, and I wouldn't trade her for two pitchers and an outfielder." A publicist of long acquaintance adds: "All right, Beverly is loud. She has a bawdy laugh that would do credit to a Polly Adler. But this is a good dame, a solid dame."

Beverly ponders her own solidity. "Maybe I do come on strong, and people sense in me a strength and a positiveness," she says in a voice that pings with strength and positiveness. "It's really the way I look and act, not the way I am. I've played so many strong female types that sometimes I begin to think I'm like that myself. But once Continued on page 26

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


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RCA Stratomaster (on TV set, left). For all VHF and UHF channels (2 through 83).

you cut through the protective coating. I'm strictly molasses."

Lighting her own eigaret and blowing out the smoke in a typically big gesture, Beverly continues: "Sure I talk a lot and I'm keyed up. But I have changed in some ways, and not everyone sees this change. I'm more mature; I'm not so terribly ambitious or hard-driving. I'm not always 'searching,' trying to find myself. Today I wonder if there's anyone on earth I'd trade places with—and I can't think of anyone. That's security."

Security, to Beverly Garland, is her successful marriage-now in its fifth vear-to Fillmore Crank, a tall, casually handsome, graying-at-the-temples, well-off builder and land developer. The Cranks have a baby daughter. Carrington Kendall Crank, born in January 1964; and Crank, a widower, has two nearly grown children. Crank calls his wife "Casev." a joshing tribute to her role as Casey Jones, the lady cop, in her syndicated Decoy series. When they first met on a blind date, Beverly, who at one time had been married for four years to an actor named Richard Garland, was unimpressed. "Accustomed as I was to actors. I thought Fill lacked the old ring-a-ding," Beverly says. "I didn't recognize substance in a man. On the second date he asked me to go bowl-Bowling? Wasn't that what squares did? Neither of us even knew how to hold a ball. Eight months later we were married."

During the six years between her marriages, Beverly played the Holly-wood field. 'Let's see now, there was Rod Taylor," Beverly recalls bemusedly. "He was fresh from Australia and he didn't have a dime and I thought he was the maddest, most fabulous; most exciting man I'd ever met. I gathered he thought I was pretty fabulous, too. Then I had to go on a movie location, and when I

came back Rod was dating about 16 other girls. Well, I just got tired of competing with those 16 other girls, and I said good-by. Charlie.

"And there was David Janssen, who was having his troubles at the time. Something about whether his *Richard Diamond* series would be on or off. I was right there to comfort David. But I think he thought of me as a kind of Mother Superior, which ended that."

Beverly Fessenden—the Garland she retained as a professional name after the dissolution of her first marriage—was born 30-odd years ago in Santa Cruz, Cal., an only child. When she was 4, the family moved to Glendale, where she grew up. After attending Glendale College for a year, Beverly plunged into acting in a summer-stock company at Laguna Beach.


After her ill-fated venture in the movie "D.O.A.," Beverly slowly gained a foothold in television, often playing gun molls, heavies or tragic females. In 1954 her performance as a pregnant leukemia victim in the initial *Medic* won her an Emmy nomination. Her presence in a pilot soon became regarded as a good-luck charm. Altogether she has appeared in 25 pilot films, including *Dr. Kildare* and *Kraft Mystery Theatre*.

After gracing the pilot for Stump the Stars, a charade game show, Beverly became a permanent panelist. "The truth is, Beverly made the show," says producer Mike Stokey. "This is that rarity, a girl who can be funny and sexy at the same time." Beverly found Stump the Stars an ideal outlet for her natural exuberance. "Oh, I gave it the works, and a funny thing happened-people liked me," she says with a trace of awe. "For the first time I got fan mail. Lucy Ball saw me on the show, and she said, 'Say, why don't you ever do comedy?' The idea began to seep through."

Previously, for 12 years of television drama, it had been continued

Beverly's rueful boast that she had smiled only once, on The Nurses, and through tears at that, "I came back from doing The Nurses in New York." Beverly says, "and I told my agent, 'See, I can smile.' And he said, 'Sure, baby. Now I've got a great part for you-you play this dope addict.' The story of my life." However, in the wake of Stump the Stars, she played a light-hearted role on The Farmer's Daughter, in a script written by Steven Gethers. When Gethers became producer of The Bing Crosby Show, he suggested Beverly for the wife's role. "Without her it wouldn't be the same show," says director James Sheldon. "She adds that right, complementary dimension."

Recently, as Beverly Garland sat in a canvas chair and engaged in a typically intense, animated, finger-shaking conversation, several women visitors were being escorted through the set of *The Bing Crosby Show*. One of the visitors was obsessed with an urge to which she promptly yielded.

"Beverly Garland!" she said, reaching over to clutch the actress's hand. "I just loved you on Hollywood and the Stars!"

"You loved me on what?" Beverly gulped. A quick recovery. Then: "I mean—er, thank you very much."

As the visitor trailed off, Miss Garland turned perplexedly to a friend. "I think," Beverly said, nodding, "that she meant Stump the Stars. But"this an afterthought-"at least she meant well, didn't she? I mean, she wasn't some Hollywood storekeeper kowtowing to a 'star.'" She reflected momentarily. "Some star! A star is Ingrid Bergman, Bette Davis, Joan Crawford. What I am is a working professional, an actress. To me, acting is blood. To me acting is like taking four quick pep pills. Acting is pleasure, excitement, abandonment. I get all that-and I've got security, too."

SHIRLEY TEMPLE's half-hour comedy series pilot--titled Go Fight City Hall, although that may be changed to just The Shirley Temple Show-has gone into production at 20th Century-Fox. MISS TEMPLE plays a social worker. Also in the show are JACK KRUSCHEN as her supervisor, and CLORIS LEACHMAN as a co-worker . . . The same studio is filming The Legend of Jesse James, a half-hour Midwestern with newcomer CHRIS JONES in the title role.

Screen Gems is building a series around singer-comedienne KAY STEVENS . . . Producer AARON SPELLING decided to reshoot the ANNE FRANCIS <u>Honey West</u> pilot (originally a <u>Burke's Law spinoff)</u> in a new 30-minute format . . Title changes: IRWIN ALLEN's new science-fiction project, originally <u>Space Family Robinson</u>, is now <u>Lost in Space</u>. And the title of <u>SHIRLEY JONES' Happily Ever After pilot is now Dream Wife</u>.
