

ED BEGLEY signed for his first Slattery's People role, as a retired political fund-raiser in an episode titled "Question: Is Democracy Too Expensive This Year?" . . . Peyton Place is adding a new regular to the cast: actress MARIETTE HARTLEY . . . Universal is exploring still another field of TV production with Surf Beat, a half-hour musical dance show that would be taped in color at various Southern California beaches.

Dr. Kimble, thanks to the penchant for pioneering that permeates programming plans at CBS and NBC, will be but one of many television dodgers and searchers come fall.

Already NBC's bold venturers have introduced Branded, the story of an Army Indian fighter (good ole Rifleman Chuck Connors) who is courtmartialed for cowardice, and who then wanders the West searching (at least every Sunday night) for ways to prove that he isn't a coward-he's a regular tiger.

CBS's creative brains have ordered a Herb Brodkin show for fall which will be titled Coronet Blue. It hasn't been cast yet, but the hero is a 20th Century 19-year-old amnesia victim. Each week he searches for his identity, turning up clues but never quite

finding out who he is.

ABC, with its Fugitive in danger of losing the searching championship, is presently deciding whether to enter another challenger-titled A Man Called Shenandoah. This M.C.S. would be played by Robert Horton, former Wagon Train scout. He too would be amnesia victim, but there's a switch. He would be an amnesia victim in the Old West, and he would be searching for his identity among cowboys and Indians and like that. ■ It is heart-warming to know the time, creative effort and trouble that going into television program planning these days. Everyone is searching, searching, searching for something really new, really different, really unique. Searching, searching. . .

NICK THE NETWORKS

Okeene, Okla., is the site each year of a stellar attraction described as a live rattlesnake hunt. The rules are uncomplicated. Men set out in teams to track and capture diamondback rattlers, which they return alive to Okeene. The critters are dumped into a pit and then dispatched. What this does to the balance of nature has never been explored, but it does do something for Okeene: It has landed the town on television.

It doesn't, you see, require much of a sports event these days to snare the interest of TV, what with all three national networks engaged in a zany scramble to fill time on the weekly sports shows they offer.

In the language of Madison Avenue, this is the era of the basket weavers, meaning that if you were to stage, say, the All-Inca Basket-Weaving Championship in Peru, the networks would bid on it.

What's more, you could hold them up for a price.

In what was considered a staggering upset, Okeene asked no fee of ABC last year to film the rattlesnake hunt for *Wide World of Sports*. It offered, in fact, to toss in a few snakes for the exposure.

To Roone Arledge, vice president in charge of sports for ABC, this harked back to the golden day in which the network was king of all the minor sports it surveyed. Proponents of

handball, Irish hurling, gymnastics, parachute jumping, canoeing, and scores of other events that rarely make headlines camped on the networks' doorsills, pleading for a chance to show their pastime to the public.

"To illustrate how things have changed today," says Arledge, "all three networks received a form letter last year from a table-tennis group announcing that it was accepting bids for its championships. The conditions were listed formally. Bids would be sealed and due in the office of the secretary no later than such-and-such a date at 11 A.M. And the association would reserve the right to offer its presentation on the basis of amount bid, air time and the manner in which the network proposed to cover."

"Three years ago," says Bill Mac-Phail, vice president in charge of sports for CBS, "a certain sports group not only offered us its event free, but volunteered to pay the line charges. Today, it is asking \$50,000." Mac-Phail won't identify the group for fear of rival networks snatching the package.

"When we talked to a horseshoepitching outfit in Arkansas," says Stuart Schulberg, producer of NBC Sports in Action, "we were referred to its agent in New York. The competition is such these days that if nine Indians in the Yukon are staging a smoke-signal contest, we continued have to worry, when approaching them, whether another network has been there first."

ABC's Arledge has discovered that foreign sports groups have been quick to learn about American prices in television. Not long ago he talked to the leader of a French cycling organization about filming a 30-minute segment of a race. "He began," says Arledge, "by citing the \$1,800,000 that is paid for the National Football League Championship game, roughly a three-hour show. At that rate, he told me, a half-hour of his event should be worth \$300,000, but he said he would settle for the bargain price of \$150,000. He settled for much less."

Nor was there anything square about the high divers of Acapulco, Mexico, the gentlemen who do gainers from a towering cliff into the narrow bay below. "We wanted three guys to make one dive each," says Arledge. "The head of their group told me that the fee would be \$100,000. I laughed. 'That's three times the budget of our whole show,' I said. 'Forget it.' He told me to wait; he would go into conference again with his colleagues. When he returned, he said, 'We'll do the dives for \$30.'"

The networks admit frankly that they have been confused to such an extent by the basket-weavers' prices that logic today doesn't always dictate their reasoning. Says Jack Dolph, director of sports for CBS: "We bid for NCAA football and lost to NBC, which offered \$13,044,000. Well, next came the NCAA track meet. We had no idea of what to bid. Just for the hell of it, we submitted an offer of \$13,044. We got it."

ABC and CBS are generally agreed on the formats of their weekly sports series. It has been their experience that irrespective of what viewers are watching—barrel jumping, roller skating, water skiing, bobsledding—they prefer action to education.

"Documentaries, for instance, are murder where ratings are concerned," says MacPhail, "When Paul Richards was manager of the Baltimore Orioles, we did what we felt was a first-class, 90-minute story on him. It bombed. We tried 'Birth of a Ball Club,' the story of how the Los Angeles Angels were founded during the expansion period. It laid an egg, too. And we didn't have luck with 'The Story of a Cowboy-1963' in which we tried to explore what goes through the mind of a guy (Jim Shoulders) who rides a bucking bronco or a Brahma bull for a living. The average viewer, we have found, likes competition."

According to Arledge, the deadliest sports show is one involving an erudite blackboard talk, or an expert explaining how to do something, such as strike a tennis ball or cast a fishing line.

"I don't mean to imply that intelligent explanations have no place in a show," he says. "But they are effective mostly when keyed to action taking place or coming up."

On NBC Sports in Action this year, Schulberg is trying interesting things that other networks have found less than sure-fire—for instance, a profile on golfer Chi Chi Rodriguez and an in-depth look at training for a marathon run.

In the view of Roone Arledge, the World Championship Demolition Derby, which ABC televised in January from Islip, N.Y., is better suited to TV. In this little number, 200 stock-car drivers engaged in a series of heats in which they rammed each other's machines, backed into each other, and tried literally to knock competitors out of business. The only car spared was the ambulance.

Little attempt was made to probe the minds of the principals, presumably for fear of coming up emptyhanded. The drivers were sharp enough, however, to nick ABC \$4000 for TV rights. This sign is not kidding.

TRIBUTE TO THE PEACE CORPS

Dinah Shore's education in Nashville, Tenn., did not prepare her for the songs on her ABC special this Monday night (Feb. 15). It's a tribute to the Peace Corps, in which Dinah shares the stage with Harry Belafonte and with Sargent Shriver, director of the Corps, who joins them for a few moments (photo, right).

An international flavor permeates the show. The dancers (above) come from various foreign lands. Belafonte sings in six languages. And Miss Shore sings in six, most of which she did not learn at Hume



Fogg High or Vanderbilt University. "Bharat Mata," for example, must be sung in one of the 800 dialects spoken in India. To learn its nuances, Dinah needed help from an expert. Mrs. Nirmal Singh, wife of a member of the Indian consulate in New York (where the show was taped), spent four hours painstakingly writing out the words of the song phonetically. After that, it took Dinah just an hour to learn to sing it. Then she was ready to tackle songs from Iran, Brazil, Jamaica, Chile and the Philippines.



HOW THE DUTCH PLUGGED A HOLE IN THE DIKE

This time a TV signal was pouring over the border of Holland, and it took a military operation to stop the leak

It was the most exciting military operation in North Sea waters since Germany's submarine wolf packs roamed them during World War II. The Dutch Navy, aided by helicopters and airborne police, struck swiftly, and halted an invasion by, of all things, television.

They closed down the only "pirate" television station in the world. In so doing, they were, in effect, also acting against some dangerous American infiltrators-Ben Casey, Mister Ed. Bob Cummings, Rin Tin Tin and

Popeve, among others.

The background of this extraordinary action goes deep into the losing fight by European countries to dictate the television tastes of their peoples. No other nation gives its viewers the freedom of choice that Americans have. Most other countries even started out with take-it-or-read-abook monopolies. But discontent with this television force-feeding produced so much pressure in some countries that a second network, often commercial, had to be permitted.

Naturally some of the shrewdest minds in finance wondered how to cash in on the desire for still more alternatives. A group in Italy formed Free Italian Television in Milan in 1958, but police seized their transmitter before they could go on the air. Surveys were made of the chances of beaming programs from the postage-stamp countries of Andorra, Liechtenstein and San Marino, but the geographical locations made it difficult to reach a profitable audience.

In radio, the financiers of unauthorized stations found they could circumvent government regulations by going to sea. They began operating from ships anchored offshore, or from artificial islands, outside territorial waters. There are now a number of these "pirate" stations in operationoff the coast of Holland, where Radio Veronica has been transmitting from a luxurious ship since 1962 without interference; off the British Isles, where three ships and two artificial islands are purveying rock 'n' roll and other popular sounds to the United Kingdom; and elsewhere along the coast of Europe.

The pirates have amassed considerable booty. One company, for ex-

ample, which operates two of the ships beaming programs to Britain, takes in approximately \$42,000 a week from advertisers; its expenses are less than \$17,000 a week. This indicates an annual profit of more than a million dollars. (It appears, however, that these halcyon days are coming to an end. The 17-nation Council of Europe, which meets at Strasbourg, France, is expected to pass an agreement outlawing all unauthorized stations; but it will take many months of litigation—and of continued prosperity for the pirates-before the stations can actually be closed down.)

The television people watched the golden radio harvest with intense interest and envy. Then, about a year ago, three Dutchmen proceeded to build an artificial island out at sea and erect TV and radio transmitters on it. They got an Amsterdam bank to finance their \$3,000,000 enterprise and picked a spot six miles off Noordwijk—a couple of miles from Radio Veronica.

Radio TV-Nordzee was the name chosen for the island, which looks like the hundreds of drilling platforms used by oil companies, except that instead of a drilling tower it is topped by a 300-foot antenna mast. The station started test transmissions in mid-August and was operative by Sept. 1, taking as its television target the richest part of the country-Amsterdam, The Hague, Rotterdam and Utrecht, a potential market of 1,200,-000 sets. Despite government intervention it obtained a television transmitter from the Radio Corporation of America, but it made an effort to minimize the expected reaction from the Dutch Parliament by scheduling its main programs in hours when the approved networks were not functioning.

For example, it gave its opposition the prime 8 P.M. to 10 P.M. period unchallenged and bucked it directly only from 10 P.M. to 11 P.M. Nevertheless, the Dutch legislature acted as though the main dikes were leaking. Some M.P.'s even wanted to cut short Parliament's vacation—done only in times of national emergency—to legislate the station out of existence because its steel legs were resting on the "continental shelf" (meaning that part of a nation projecting into the ocean underwater).

The government shied away from anything as extreme as recall of Parliament, and Radio TV-Nordzee went on to grab an audience of about 500,000 sets quickly. To tell the truth it did not have much to beat. The national channels are operated by companies affiliated with political or religious groups and the programs are directed often at sectional rather than general interests-worthy documentaries on church work, solemn discussion panels, "cultural education" programs. Viewers plodding home after a hard day's work-and no one works harder than the Dutch-complained about the lack of entertainment. But they got few feature films, few series.

They offered U.S. programs

Radio TV-Nordzee, like most successful European stations, offered a proven backbone of American programs, which included, in addition to the sinister quintet mentioned earlier, Wagon Train, Laramie, 87th Precinct, My Three Sons, Leave It to Beaver and The New Breed. Its immediate popularity—\$100,000 worth of time sold in its first month—sealed its doom. Members of Parliament, alarmed at the way their government station's audience was being tempted away by the slick American entertainment, demanded action.

On Dec. 14 the upper house finally passed a law forbidding "artificial technical installations" anywhere on the continental shelf and continued

Queen Juliana promptly signed it. But Prime Minister Victor Marijnen felt he had to proceed cautiously because ownership of the island had suddenly been transferred to Explotacion de Construcciones Maritimas (Excomar) of Panama and its operation to High Seas Television, Ltd., of London.

Holland mobilizes

This might raise new problems as they were foreign companies. Behind the scenes, however, there was frantic activity. Holland was, so to speak, mobilizing its forces and getting ready to use a sledge hammer to crack a peanut. The Royal Dutch Navy was assigned the role of protection and transportation. Representatives of the state police, the Ministry of Justice and the Posts and Telegraph Department were briefed on landing tactics from helicopters.

Radio TV-Nordzee went on the air as usual the morning of Dec. 17 with its first radio transmissions. It played its signature tune, an old Dutch chantey which translates to "Plucky Boys, Tough Guys." Then Sonja van Proosdijk, a lady announcer, opened the first radio record-request program of the day, which had an estimated

audience of 800,000.

At 0755, the naval auxiliary vessel Delfshaven took up a station some 200 yards from the platform and a helicopter dropped a flare which lit up the area. Two minutes later it was joined by two other helicopters and the whirlybirds began to zero in on the island. They put down a boarding party of 10 policemen with bright orange life-jackets over their black uniforms. The first man, Police Captain Evert Gerritsen, had to maneuver gingerly because a high voltage aerial lay across the deck and there just happened to be a good deal of abandoned gear of various description clogging the only landing area.


Once in possession of the island, the police lowered the crew basketa cage operated by a crane-and brought up reinforcements from the ship. The post office experts tore loose the aerials while rope ladders were held ready in the Delfshaven in the unlikely case of resistance by the dozen Anglo-Belgians manning the island-who had orders not to interfere with the take over. At 0807 listeners heard a bump while Miss van Proosdijk was announcing that the next disc would be "Paradise," recorded by Anneke Groenloh, a 21year-old Indonesian whose husband is a Radio Veronica disc jockey. The announcer's voice simply faded outand Radio TV-Nordzee was silenced.

At that moment Dr. J. G. Hartsuijker, Public Prosecutor of Amsterdam, declared the island Dutch territory, not much of a territorial acquisition considering the far-flung colonies over which the flag once waved, but a steel platform is better than nothing.

Battle moves to courts

Now the battle has moved to the courts. Eric Bent, a London printer, believes his English company, High Seas Television, Ltd., is outside Dutch law. The Panama company also has retained lawyers. The British have an additional deep interest in the island. Lloyds of London insured it for £900,000 (\$2,520,000) for collision, loss or damage. It will not say whether there is a clause relating to seizure.

For Dutch viewers, mourning the loss of their alternative network these long winter nights, there may yet be a happy ending. Dr. Bot, Minister of Education, Arts and Sciences (which includes broadcasting) wants to introduce commercial television. He said that when that happens, he will favorably consider an application for a license by the owners of the island—whoever they may be at the time.

While living in the White House, Mrs. Kennedy had seen a Westinghouse Broadcasting Company series, America: The Artist's Eye, in which there was a five-minute sequence on the White House, and she suggested a full-scale documentary on White House art. The project was undertaken, then suspended because of President Kennedy's assassination, and was just recently completed. Narrated by Fredric March and his wife, Florence Eldridge, the program will be televised in April on Westinghouse affiliates in Boston, Cleveland, San Francisco, Pittsburgh and Baltimore, and on other stations.

Changing Times: Where will it all end? is the lament of "dyed-in-thewool" sports fans. More and more, television is molding, changing, shaping the Nation's sports to suit its own whims, fancies and demands.

In golf, the United States Golf Association announced last week that henceforth the National Open Championship would be played in four days instead of three, as previously, and the National Amateur Championship would be switched to stroke instead of match play—all more or less in the name of television.

Extending the Open to four days means that it may now be shown on TV on Saturday and Sunday, instead of only Saturday (when it finished with 36 holes) as heretofore. Changing the Amateur to stroke play means that it now will be run much as any protournament, and become more amenable to TV handling. Previously there were only two players, the finalists, on the course on the last day of the tournament.

In baseball, umpires were put on notice by Commissioner Ford Frick that they would indeed be under the eye of the isolated camera on ABC's Saturday Game of the Week. There had been some doubt, since an umpire's prestige could hardly suffer more than by having his wrong call rerun for all to see almost immediately after he made it.

And in Manhattan last week, local college athletic directors were accused at a sports luncheon of taking the game of basketball away from the students by silencing their banging drums and cheer leaders. Perish the thought, the athletic heads demurred. But for the benefit of any lamenting, dyed-in-the-wool sports fans who might be listening, Manhattan College's Ken Norton put it bluntly: "Of course we've made concessions to television. This is a new medium and we must adjust to it."





the Nazis herded over 15,000 children and
their families into the "model ghetto" of
Terezin. There they lived, for six months
or a year, before being finally transported
east to death camps like Auschwitz. Of
these 15,000 children, about 100 survived. The Terezin children who did not
return left a legacy in paintings and
poems that reflect their painful life and
uncertain hope for the future.

'The great thing about Andy Williams,' Charles Pomerantz said, 'is that he never really left Wall Lake, Iowa.' I nodded glumly. I had no particular desire to meet the boy next door. Especially at the NBC studios in Burbank, California. "Andy's offices are le dernier mot," exulted Pomerantz, a short, harried man who himself is le

dernier cri in press agents. The anteroom walls were covered with blown-up stills of *The Andy Williams Show*. "You notice, most are of the guest stars," Pomerantz said. "Andy's so modest." I waited for testimonials about his loyalty and bravery; but the tack was changed. "I bet this is the first office you've ever seen that had a crystal chandelier." I allowed that it was and began to prowl around. "It cost \$55,000 to decorate," Pomerantz assured me, as if the sum expended was a guarantee of the taste exhibited.

The furniture was an attractively eclectic mixture of good modern and fine French antiques. A copy of Kiplinger's Washington Letter rested on a Louis XVI desk. "Andy's deeply interested in the War on Poverty," Pomerantz explained. Shelves were filled with pre-Columbian artifacts and there were two Picasso etchings on the walls, "Here's a Miro," Pomerantz said, adding helpfully: "M-I-R-O." I thanked him. "If Andy Williams buys a painting," he said, "the artist's value automatically goes up." I wondered what Picasso and M-I-R-O might think of that, but kept my own counsel.

Singer enters singing

A door opened down the hall and suddenly a familiar, husky baritone voice flooded the corridor:

Who can I turn to when nobody needs me? My heart wants to know and so I must go Where destiny leads me.*

"That must be Andy," whispered Pomerantz. And indeed it was.

But not the Andy Williams the warmup had led me to expect. More than most performers, Williams is the victim of his image makers, who have not been able to decide exactly what he is. A small-town boy? A culture vulture? A set of tonsils with ears? Or even an Abby Mann intellectual. sponsor of a cause a week? He is not a hippy, like Bobby Darin. He does not, like Robert Goulet, look like a refugee from an escort bureau. He doesn't pretend to lap up the sauce on stage, like Dean Martin. The chicks don't come home to roost, as they do with Frank Sinatra.

Who is Andy Williams?

Then what is Andy Williams? Or rather, "who"-for "what" is a word that belongs to the personality molders. He is a reserved, highly intelligent young man who almost from his first words gave lie to the impression that he had never left home. He knows the score and has been out at night in the big city. If you doubt it, listen to him sing the lyrics of a Cole Porter song. He's made the scene. He is affable, low-keyed, and almost unflappable. In the world of show business, these are pejorative adjectives: Anyone not a neurotic is a square. Even his staff has become conditioned to thinking of him in these terms. It is a bum rap. He makes \$1,000,000 a year, drives a \$30,000 Rolls-Royce convertible, is married to a beauty from the Folies Bergères, Claudine Longet, and is an art collector with impeccable taste. "I have a recurring dream," he says. "I save Picasso's life and he takes me into his house and says, 'Whatever you want is yours." If this is the boy next door, it is a pretty racy neighborhood.

Still the legend persists. Partly because a boy born in Wall Lake, Iowa, will almost by default be typecast as something out of a Busby Berkeley

college musical. And partly because, in one sense, Andy Williams never has left home. Unlike so many performers, who hide their childhood away in a closet, Williams is very close to his family. His parents show up for the taping of every TV show; and his brothers, Bob, Dick and Don, who broke up the Williams Brothers' act in 1952 to raise families of their own, rejoin him every year for a one-shot appearance on his show.

But this is a show-business family and Andy Williams is show business to his fingertips. He has been a performer for more than 20 years and is one of the few entertainers ever to make it both as a member of a top-flight group and as a single. Two decades in show business would knock the corners off any square. Williams exhibits a longrange shrewdness about his career that he never picked up in Iowa. He knows where he wants to go and exactly how he is going to get there. If his equanimity is seldom compromised by his professional demands, it is in large part because he has ceded the dirty work of his career to his personal manager, Alan Bernard, a partner in a firm he owns with Andy's brother Don, and vice president of Williams' own company, Productions.

His manager, smart and tough

If Bernard ever showed up in Wall Lake, the local citizenry would take one look and run for their tornado shelters. He looks like a Nazi Gauleiter and has been known to act like one over the bargaining table. He has straw-blond hair and the silhouette of an artillery shell. One executive who has had dealings with him refers to him in extremely unflattering terms. Another says, "He's not a very nice young man." Perhaps. But he's a very smart one. He engineered the purchase for \$500.000 of Cadence Records.

Williams' label before he switched to Columbia. The purchase was made only to ensure that Cadence would not re-release Williams' old records at a cut-rate price. "They'd be selling them with toothpaste down at the drug store for 12 cents each," Bernard said. "It would undercut all the current stuff." Bernard plans to sell Williams' old tapes to Columbia. I asked him what he then planned to do with Cadence. "Sell it to the Everly Brothers," he smiled. The Everlys also used to record for Cadence.

Bernard's fine hand can also be seen in Williams' new seven-year film contract with Universal Pictures. Williams wants to be a film star, but he also wants to avoid all the well-known pitfalls along the way. So he and Bernard have laid new plans carefully. In his first picture, "I'd Rather Be Rich," Williams took third billing behind Robert Goulet and Sandra continued

Dee. His contract calls for him to be second banana behind a film star of the first magnitude—"anybody in the top 20 box office."

Insurance against failure

Not that he wants to play second fiddle forever. But if a picture in which he is co-starred with Tony Curtis, say, or Gregory Peck, fails, the blame falls on them, not on Williams. "I don't want to bomb out in a picture at this stage," he says. "I'd be dead. But if the picture is a hit, some of the credit is bound to rub off on me." The contract is also insurance against Universal's "sticking me into something like 'Tammy and the Doctor,' which does me no good at all."

I mentioned "Td Rather Be Rich" and said that Robert Goulet did not seem to fit into the category of superstar. Williams looked stricken. "Sandra Dee was the star of the picture," he said. "She's the biggest thing on the Universal lot."

What bought the Universal contract. the equanimity and the Picassos is, of course, The Andy Williams Show. So far this season, the Monday night variety hour has enjoyed healthy ratings. If there is anything bothersome about the show, it is the difficulty in getting good guest stars. "We use two guests a week," says Williams. "That's 50 a year. But we also have about 50 sponsors. That wipes out a lot of good guests because of sponsor conflict. Dick Van Dyke, Mary Tyler Moore, Andy Griffith, a lot of people we would like to get. So we've got to scout around for other people."

That week, the scouts had dug up Jill St. John and Gene Barry. The show worked out its kinks slowly during rehearsal. One skit was thrown out, and Barry laid on heavy hints that he would like to do another song. "I've always wanted to do a duet

with you, Andy," he said. "There's a nice song on my album . . ." Williams practiced his golf swing. There is a fine line of distinction drawn by Williams' staff between "entertainers" (e.g., Bobby Darin and Julie Andrews) and "personalities" (Jill and Gene). Shows starring the latter involve a lot more work. "You've got to understand, these people aren't performers," says producer Bob Finkel. "They're motion-picture people. So we've got to keep it simple." Andy agreed. "Jill can't sing very well, but she's in a big production number where the sketch calls for her to be bad. So it will all work out." Jill seemed unperturbed that the skit was written to her talents. "They couldn't get a singer and they couldn't get a dancer." she said. "So they hired nothing."

'Hail to the Big Chief'

The day before the show was taped was Williams' 34th birthday. His staff was ready with a birthday party. It was like an office party anywhere. There were joke gifts and domestic champagne. The cake was frosted with pink elephants and topped by a single candle. A card, signed by all the staff, said: "Hail to the Big Chief." In timehonored tradition, the guest of honor feigned surprise at the party-though he could hardly have been unaware of the secret solicitations of a dollar each to pay for the spread. "I just called my wife," Williams said, "and was complaining that nobody did anything for me." The writers supplied him with a few jokes and then everyone sang "Happy Birthday." Someone asked if he could switch from champagne to Scotch and was directed to a portable bar in another room. The bar was concealed in a large, leatherbound copy of "Paradise Regained." "Regained?" the guest said. "I didn't know Andy ever lost it." He hasn't lost it. It is, however, a paradise far from Wall Lake, Iowa.







This is JIM BACKUS?



If you can't figure out what kind of man he is after reading this story, imagine how baffled his friends are

The script of a wild, slapstick, masquerade-party episode of *I Married Joan* some years ago called for Jim Backus to wear a femme-fatale evening gown. After he was shoehorned into the low-cut ensemble, the exposed portion of his manly chest was defoliated by a makeup man's razor.

That weekend Backus flew home to Cleveland to see his father, Russell Gould Backus, a socially and financially prominent industrialist. The next day, Backus père and fils dropped by the staid Cleveland Athletic Club for a steam and a massage. As they stripped, the elder Mr. Backus spotted the shaved heart-shaped outline on his son's chest. Before Jim could tell him about it, his father groaned. "Get dressed quick, son, before any of my friends see that. I've got a hard enough time explaining you now."

People have been trying to bring Jim Backus into focus, to explain and pigeonhole him all his life, but nobody's done it yet because he's as full of contradictions as a Perry Mason

cross-examination.

• He has loved golf with a passion since he was a teen-ager, when he was good enough to play charity exhibitions against Bobby Jones and Walter Hagen—yet he never touched a club from 1930 to 1947.

• He's the zany life of gay cocktail and/or break-up-at-dawn parties, but

he does not drink.

• He's so sensitive he has a genuine horror of hurting anyone's feelings—yet he's always late for dates, even

with producers.

• He fled Cleveland to get away from what, at that age, he regarded as "Life in Squaresville"—yet today he owns, and uses, more outdoor, decorated—with-clever-sayings barbecue aprons than anybody in Ohio; worries about the crab grass at his Bel Air estate; and reads the stock market reports before the sports page.

Talk to people about Jim Backus,

you find the focus getting even fuzzier. From good friend and golfing-partner Donald O'Connor: "There's really only one thing to say about Jim-he's the funniest man I know, bar none." From Abe Levitow, director of The Famous Adventures of Mr. Magoo, Jim's NBC series: "I don't know any funny stories about him. Off-camera, he's a solid, legitimate-citizen type." From Sherwood Schwartz, one of the industry's top comedy writers and creator-producer of Gilligan's Island, Jim's CBS series (Backus is the first actor ever to star in two first-run network series telecast opposite each other): "He's a wild. far-out comedian whose character is so rich vou have to use him sparingly, like sweet cream in a recipe."

Through all the character analyses. though, runs one common thread-

everybody likes the guy.

"You know why they do?" his old friend Everett Sloane asks, "Because he's a walking press agent-for other people. He'll tell you Bob Denver [Gilligan in Gilligan's Island] is the greatest instinctive comic he's ever worked with: that Henny [Jim's wife. actress and accomplished sculptress Henriette Kavel is the greatest wife since Madame Curie; that he has the greatest barber, tailor, caddy, etc. And he means it. He's a walking booster club. When I get depressed, which sometimes is like every 40 seconds when I'm not working, I call Jim and he tells me what a fine actor I am. He never loses the argument."

Backus also thinks well of his own talents. You can't be as good an actor as he is without a fat, well-fed ego, but he doesn't let it warp his world. When he visited London a few years ago, I Married Joan (in which he costarred with the late Joan Davis) was No. 1 on British TV. One rainy afternoon Backus came out of the Garrick Club after a late lunch. While he and some members of London's sedate theatrical club waited for a cab, a

nearby school recessed. Within minutes, Backus was surrounded by kids wanting autographs. "You're crazy," he velled, pointing to the other men-Sir Laurence Olivier, John Mills and Trevor Howard, "Get their autographs. They're actors!"

As a teen-ager, Backus dreamed of becoming a golf pro, until, in a school play at Kentucky Military Institute. "I heard some people-my familyapplaud me, and I was hooked." After graduation, he worked at a Cleveland radio station before going to New York and enrolling at The American

Academy of Dramatic Arts.

After appearing in a few flop plays. Backus became one of a small group of radio actors who seemed to work every show—an elite Thespian corps Backus dubbed "Actors Anonymous." which included Richard Widmark. Barry Sullivan, Frank Lovejov, Macdonald Carey and others who later went West. "We got no billing on shows, no publicity, no fan mail. We worked every day and every night for millions of listeners, but the only ones who recognized us were studio janitors -and even they didn't know our names."

During that period, two important things happened to Backus-he married Henny, and he was cast on the Alan Young comedy show (written by, among others, the same Sherwood Schwartz) to play an outlandish character named Hubert Updyke III, the richest playboy in the world. Aficionados of that era of radio still delight in recalling some of his wonderful "rich" jokes-like "I'm having trouble with my windshield wiperhe keeps falling off the hood."

The success of Updvke made Backus a "name," and led to his many and varied picture and TV roles.

When Schwartz created Gilligan's Island, he didn't intend the Thurston Howell III 'role to be as important as it is with Backus playing it. Another actor had already continued

been cast and was getting ready to leave on the following Saturday with the rest of the company for Hawaii, where the pilot was filmed. Meanwhile, Backus was holding back from signing to play in a different pilot.

"I'd already worked in two weekly shows. Nobody outside the business knows how physically and emotionally tough it is to do a series. As Robert Stack said during the run of The Untouchables: 'To do a series, you don't have to know how to act-just how to survive.' If it runs three years, for example, those 50-page scripts you memorize every week add up to the equivalent of memorizing 'War and Peace,' 'Gone with the Wind,' 'Anthony Adverse,' 'From Here to Eternity' and 'Carpetbaggers.' By the end of that time you have trouble remembering your own phone number.

"It's like childbirth, though. While you're going through it, you swear 'Never again.' Then, when it's over, you forget the pain, and find yourself fascinated by what to an actor is Russian roulette—picking the series you think is best, and the one which has the best chance of getting on the air. They're not always the same."

Backus was about to sign for the other series on a Friday last spring—the day before the *Gilligan* company was leaving for Hawaii—when Sherwood Schwartz called. "I've got a show I want you to do," he said. "But you can't see the script. If I showed it to you, you'd belt me. The character has seven lines. If you do it, though, we'll build the part."

"Well," Backus recalls, "every actor has heard that jazz before, but because it was Sherwood. I signed on."

Between making episodes for the two series, doing both voice-over and on-camera commercials, acting in an occasional feature picture (he's in the still-unreleased "John Goldfarb, Please Come Home") and appearing at an average of two benefits a week, Backus is one of the busiest citizens in Hollywood. He's happy about being in such demand, except for one thing. It cuts down on his golf, which to Jim is more of a religion than a sport. A low handicap player, he's good enough to have finished sixth in last year's Pro-Amateur division of Bing Crosby's annual Monterey Peninsula Tournament and Clambake.

Though Jim, now in his early 50's, is looking forward with some relish to a few years of Adventures of Magoo and Gilligan's Island interfering with his pitching and putting, his wife isn't quite so ecstatic. The fly in Henny's ointment is that in Gilligan's Island Jim plays the husband of Natalie Schafer. Not that Henny is jealous of Natalie. After all, Jim has had significant roles in more than 50 features with Marilyn Monroe, Jane Russell, and other delectables.

Hotel clerks leered

"Movie audiences, though, seem to realize it's all make-believe, but TV viewers take things much more literally," Henny says. "For example, they saw Jim play Joan Davis's husband for three years, and to them he was her husband.

"We'd go away for a weekend. Hotel clerks would see Jim register 'Mr. and Mrs.,' then look at me and leer."

Henny asked Jim to explain to the clerks, but because Henny is still lovely and shapely, Jim felt that trying to explain would only make it look worse. When Henny insisted, and Jim still refused, Henny determined to change his mind. The next time a clerk leered, then asked Jim, with a "you-gay-rascal" smile, "A double bed?" Jim turned to Henny.

"Dear, do we want a double, or twins?"

Looking at Jim demurely, Henny replied, "That's entirely up to you, sir."


