

as we see it

■ Since 10 of the top 15 shows in last month's ratings were comedies, and since the only new shows to make the top 15 were comedies-Gomer Pyle, USMC; Bewitched; and Gilligan's Island-the trend for next season is COMEDY.

There are other reasons why twothirds of the programs being developed for next season are comedies. One is that comedies apparently appeal to the young married housewives who are tremendously important in buying or influencing the buying being done in America today.

■ The other is that comedies don't involve viewers too much in characterization or plot. The viewers, then, have their minds uncluttered by drama when the commercial rolls 'round, and that makes it easier for. the commercial to make a deep, lasting impression.

(Just incidentally, do young women EVER talk about anything these days besides how white their clothes are?)

Of the 62 new projects the networks have under consideration, 36 are comedies aimed at the ladies who hold the purse strings. Eight are situation dramas (and that group includes some more evening soap operas), seven are adventure series, five are Westerns, two are mysteries, two science fiction and two variety.

In addition to the 62 accounted for, there are more programs under development by sponsors. Nine are being underwritten all or partly by General Foods, which has scored before with such hits as Danny Thomas, Andy Griffith and Gomer Pyle. Others are being financed by Colgate, Ford, P&G and Alberto-Culver. All of these sponsor-backed shows are comedies.

■ This means at least 42 comedy shows will be competing for network spots next season. So what else is new besides Ho Ho Ho?



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
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TV TELETYPE*: HOLLYWOOD: WALT ANDERSON REPORTS:

One happy event growing out of CBS's purchase of ABC's popular comedy My Three Sons (aside from large capital gains for entrepreneurs DON FEDDERSON and FRED MacMURRAY): The wedding between Mike (TIM CONSIDINE) and Sally (MEREDITH MacRAE) will finally take place next season on CBS. The purchase, which includes all past episodes of the five-year-old series, will put the show into CBS's evening schedule, and possibly into five-a-week daytime reruns.

McHale's Navy will make a second motion picture during the summer TV production break this year, and producers of some other comedy shows--such as Gilligan's Island and Mister Ed--also are talking full-length features . . . The syndicated documentary series Survival! is doing an episode about American "flying doctors" in South America.

DINAH SHORE's special of March 17 will be the first TV show to originate from the stage of the new Los Angeles Music Center. DINAH's guests: BOB HOPE, guitarists LAURINDO ALMEIDA and JOAO GILBERTO, and jazz organist JIMMY SMITH . . . If Hazel returns to the air next season, it may be in a new format and without co-stars WHITNEY BLAKE, DON DeFORE and BOBBY BUNTROCK . . . The first two-parter for Branded has gone into production here, in color. Titled "The Mission," it tells the full story leading up to the conviction of Jason McCord (CHUCK CONNORS), and features My Favorite Martian co-star BILL BIXBY as a heavy.

At CBS Studios here, documentary producer DAVID WOLPER has taped the pilot for a half-hour series to be called <u>Miss Television U.S.A.</u> The idea of the series is a sort of continuing beauty contest--each week a panel of celebrity judges selects a state queen from among five semifinalists, and the whole thing culminates in an annual Miss Television U.S.A. contest on a 90-minute special. How about that, girl fans?

Comics BILL DANA, whose NBC show was recently canceled, and BILL COSBY, who co-stars in a new series, \underline{I} Spy, scheduled for NBC this fall, will appear together on the March 20 Hollywood Palace. The following week singer NELSON EDDY plays the \underline{Palace} .

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

A REAL FISH STORY

IT'S ALL ABOUT A FEMALE BOTTLE-NOSED DOLPHIN WHO IS TRAINED TO PLAY A TV HERO

It's hard to believe, but the lady known as Flipper, with her smug smile, dreamy eyes and svelte figure, is even smarter than she looks. Take the word of her most ardent admirer and constant companion, trainer Ricou Browning:

"Any difficulty we have in teaching her to perform is usually our fault, not hers. We haven't yet found ways to make ourselves understandable to her as quickly as we should. Once we find a way to convey our meaning, she can do just about anything."

Browning is not alone in his high regard for dolphin brain power—scientists even now are trying to break down the man-dolphin communication barrier, Ricou results even though working under a handicap. He can't use voice commands while filming because they'd come through on the sound track, so he's limited to hand signals. Actually, Browning, a top scuba-diver, is a comparative newcomer to animal training. His first shot at it was the training of a dolphin for the 1963 "Flipper" movie (that was a different Flipper-Mitzi; TV's Flipper is a young lady named Suzy, 4 years old, 8 feet long).

But from this and subsequent film experiences, Browning has evolved his own technique for training dolphins—

using liberal doses of patience, kindness and herring (imported from Iceland). In preparing today's Flipper for her series, he swam with her in his skin-diving equipment until she (females are preferred; they're more cooperative than males) became familiar with him and his presence. He then picked out one of the antics she had been doing naturally and gave her a reward each time she repeated it. Next he introduced a hand signal to correspond to the stunt. Soon she began associating the hand signal with the trick and the herring, and performed pronto. Now Flipper performs more than 20 tricks.

Flipper's home is a private pond of sea water adjacent to Miami's Seaquarium. There she's cared for by Ric O'Feldman, a young handler. When it's time for underwater action, she's shipped to the Bahamas (the water's clearer there) along with several other dolphins who act as doubles. They're transported


in special, foam-rubber-lined boxes big enough to hold some 300 pounds of dolphin in about 4 inches of sea water. The water is sponged over the animals continually to keep their delicate skin from drying out and their eyes clean. Browning says, "Their eyes are much more sensitive than ours and we take great care to keep them free of sand and dirt."

One question arises on these Bahaman jaunts: Would Flipper escape if she had a chance? Thus far she's been filmed in penned-in areas. O'Feldman thinks, "She's too spoiled to swim away. Now she won't even catch her own fish. It has to be cut up and fed to her."

Browning would like to allow Flipper to roam, so she could be filmed in various locations, and this summer he just may turn her loose. But before he does he wants to have another female dolphin groomed and ready to replace her—ladies being what they are. continued

palms facing, back and forth.







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HOW A CORRESPONDENT SPENDS HIS DAYS—

AND NIGHTS in the city of three-hour lunches, 13-month salaries, 1000-year-old buildings and a 2700-year history

The route between my home and office in Rome winds through narrow streets, past reminders of 2700 years of history. It's only a five-minute walk, yet an instructive way for a foreign correspondent to begin his day in Rome.

The route skirts the Capitoline Hill, the most famous of the Seven Hills of Rome. Here Julius Caesar and other Roman emperors made offerings to the chief god, Jupiter. The Capitoline is now the site of Rome's city hall, with its tall tower clock that seldom tells the correct time—an appropriate reflection of the lack of Italian reverence for punctuality.

My morning walk to work takes me past the building where Mussolini had his office. A cardinal who later became Pope Paul II originally built this 500-year-old palace because it offered a fine view of a near-by horse race track. The palace balcony from which Mussolini addressed cheering crowds now looks down on Rome's honking traffic jams.

Before reaching my office I walk

past the door of a present-day figure as much venerated as Jupiter or Julius or Benito. This is the home of Sophia Loren. So far, I've never run into her, but the durability of Roman monuments on the way teaches

the value of patience.

Near the NBC office I stop in at the Stella (Star) Bar, Perhaps it should be made clear at once that in Italy a bar serves coffee, snacks, ice cream, pastry and, only incidentally, liquor. Its respectability thus established, let me go on to say that a bar is a good place for a correspondent to start his day. While Fabrizio operates the controls of the hissing espresso machine with the aplomb of a church organist, he relates what's on Rome's mind that particular day: the arrest of an Italian at the altar as he was about to marry his 12th wife without having divorced the previous 11 (his explanation was that the law does not permit divorce in Italy).

Actually my day began some hours earlier, when the phone dismissed sleep at 2 A.M. With the time difference it was six hours earlier in New York, a perfectly reasonable hour. when the New York editor dispatched a cable. In Italian accents the telephone voice groped its way through the cable's text: "Remain alert reaction to Khrushchev's resignation." I had already done a broadcast at midnight on the Italian reaction to the big event, and it seemed unlikely that any Italians would be reacting after that. Nevertheless, as I tried to drop off again I felt somewhat guilty for not remaining tense and alert, as the cable seemed to suggest, until daybreak.

Once awake for the day and fortified by a walk and the Stella Bar's coffee and ciambèlla (the Italian version of a doughnut), my next stop is the NBC office, situated in a building with an elevator which carries passengers up but not down. This idiosyncrasy results from the landlord's efforts to economize on electricity. That makes for quite a hike downstairs, since our office is on the fourth floor—which is really the fifth floor. You see, Europeans don't count the ground floor but consider the first floor to be the one above the entrance level.

It is this sort of thing to which an American in Rome must adjust. The correspondent gradually accepts the fact that the Liberal Party is really the conservative party of Italian big business. He discovers that Italy's Republican Party is allied with the Socialist Party. He learns that a cup of coffee costs seven cents if drunk at the counter but 10 cents if served at a table. A long hike in search of an address leads to the discovery that numbers often run consecutively down one side of the street and then continue back up the other side of the street. The American also learns that even though Italy has only 12 months a year like everywhere else. Italians receive extra payment at Christmas, known as the "13th month" salary.

The day's routine includes going through the newspapers (there are 12 dailies published in Rome), reading the mail, including innumerable handouts from various agencies (the United Nations' Food and Agriculture Organization headquarters in Rome, for example, issues periodic communiqués on such fascinating subjects as the state of the world's cocoa and sovbean crops), and submitting expense statements. One recent expense account listed this item: "Gondola taxi ride to interview mayor of Venice-2200 lire." The NBC auditor, who has become accustomed to such exotic expenses as the rental of an elephant during Jacqueline Kennedy's trip to India, approved the \$3.50 gondola ride without batting an eve.

Such preliminaries completed, I turn to the main work of the day—covering the news. This is not much different from covering the news in Kansas City, except that it's done in Italian. It's also complicated continued

by the reluctance of Italians to answer questions on the telephone.

This reluctance stems from several sources. The long era of Fascism has left a fear of wire tapping and eavesdropping, and it may not be a misplaced fear even today. Not that the Italian state is now given to tapping wires, but the telephone system is so erratic that it is not at all unusual to dial a number and find yourself inadvertently listening in on someone else's conversation. Even more important is the fact that Italians live in dread of taxes, and every unknown voice on the telephone is treated with the suspicion and uncommunicativeness reserved for the tax collector.

Vatican the big story

A principal part of the daily Rome beat is the Vatican. Within the ancient walls, which encompass an area that could fit in New York's Central Park seven times, is the smallest independent state in the world. When in session, the Vatican's Ecumenical Council is a major daily news story. It is much like covering any other international gathering. There are daily communiqués in six languages summing up the proceedings, there are briefings by clerically garbed press officers, there are leaks from ecclesiastics who have axes to grind. There are also, surprisingly and gratifyingly, flashes of humor. For example, when the Council was deep in debate on bestowing greater authority on the bishops and creating deacons, assistant priests who would be permitted to have wives, a prelate took me aside to sum it up. "It all adds up to this," he explained. "The bishops would have all the power. The priests would have all the work. And the deacons would have all the fun."

As far as television news reporting in Italy is concerned, the main problem is noise. Italians thrive on noise. They consider it the proof of existence. Consequently, the noisier it is, the more one lives. This complicates the job of filming a narration in front of a typical Italian setting.

For an NBC White Paper program we decided to film my contribution in the countryside outside Rome in the hope of finding a tranquil spot. In fields far from the main highway we found a stretch of ancient Roman aqueduct. We set Sunday morning for the filming in the hope that there would be fewer distant auto horns and overflying planes than on weekdays. In solitude and silence I began my commentary and had spoken only a few sentences when a roar of motors interrupted me. A caravan of trucks was parking near the aqueduct. Jabbering men and women in Roman togas spilled from the trucks, and technicians swarmed noisily over the countryside setting up reflectors, cameras and props. A movie company had chosen the same site and Sunday for its grandiose production.

Shouldn't have been a problem

It seemed that noise, for once, would certainly be no problem in the town of Ivrea, home of the Olivetti company, where we were doing a *Huntley-Brinkley Report* on the deteriorating economic situation.

We had chosen the roof of the city hospital for my narration. The hospital is situated on a hill overlooking Ivrea, and the entire area is posted with signs reading "Ospedale-Silènzio." I sat on the railing at the edge of the roof and started the narration: "The word Olivetti means typewriters to much of the world, but here in Ivrea in northern Italy Olivetti means the 'good life,' and that way of life suddenly is in danger." Suddenly I was in danger. An explosion rocked the hospital. I teetered on the railing. The cameraman grabbed the tripod to prevent the camera from continued

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toppling. We looked down from the eight-story roof and saw that excavation work was in progress on the foundation for a new hospital wing.

No correspondent's day is really complete without a proper Italian lunch. Italians take lunch very seriously. Everything closes down for three hours during midday for the national institution, the siesta, Before a waiter in Italy asks what you want to eat he finds out what wine you want to drink-white or red. Either shade lubricates an Italian's appetite and his volubility, but can stupify an American's mental processes. The lunch ritual also makes for a very long day, because Italian stores and offices, compensating for the long break, stay open late, and it is 8 P.M. before it is time to go home.

Home in Rome for us—my wife Nancy and our two sons, ages 4 and 2—is an apartment in a palazzo built by an Italian cardinal two years before Columbus discovered America. The fortress-thick walls, the great portraits of aristocratic relatives of the count who subsequently acquired the property, and the lofty ceilings and long corridors stimulate our cleaning

woman's imagination. She swears that when alone in the house she sometimes sees ghosts. These ghosts are more difficult to exorcise than were our downstairs neighbors.

When we moved into the palazzo we were literally shaken the first night by the jarring beat of rock 'n' roll music emanating from the floor below-which housed the Abruzzo Club, named for a region of Italy. The Abruzzo dance turned out to be a maddening twice-a-week affair. One night, when the music continued past midnight, I went downstairs in my bathrobe, like the classic figure in a million magazine cartoons, and rang the Abruzzo Club bell. A man peeked out. I told him I would be forced to call the police if the noise did not stop. He quickly apologized, and the music stopped immediately. Well, I thought, what accommodating people these Abruzzo members really are. Two weeks later I found out why.

The morning newspapers gave accounts of police raids on four illegal gambling joints in Rome. One of these was the Abruzzo Club. The noisy dances were only a cover for the gambling. Soon after the raid the Abruzzo Club moved out.

Not many days in Rome bring surprises as great as the police raid (which we had slept through). But there are lesser surprises. Like the bill for 4-year-old Jeffrey's kindergarten school including an extra charge for heat! Or buying cigarets in a store, asking for "uno," and being handed a single cigaret from an open pack (they're sold that way in Italy).

The oddities of life in Rome do not detract from its desirability as a place to live and work. In fact, when our second child was born here, we gave him the middle name Rome. Poor Daniel Rome may suffer at the hands of the class bully for his unusual middle name, but it will provide his parents in their declining years with a reminder of a gratifying assignment.

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

A Rumor: A rumor has been running rampant around the country concerning ABC's The Fugitive. The rumor, which has been detailed in hundreds of letters to TV GUIDE and Fugitive producer Quinn Martin, says that the final episode of the series has been shot, has already been shown on some stations, and that the onearmed man did not kill Dr. Kimble's wife after all. In the episode, the onearmed man purportedly tells Dr. Kimble that he saw Lieutenant Gerard do it-during what appeared to be a lovers' quarrel. They haven't actually seen this episode, the letter-writers say, but they know people who know people who have.

Well, rest easy, Fugitive fans. With The Fugitive ratings being what they are (at last look, 28.1; rank: ninth) Dr. Kimble may still be running long after the rest of us have stopped. Mr. Quinn Martin has no thoughts of a finale just yet. Not that he minds all this attention and speculation.

"People ask me, 'Isn't it awful about all these rumors?' I say, 'what's awful about it?'" Martin says. "It's marvelous that people care so much about the show. If you want me to get corny about it, maybe we've hit on such a universal thing that it gets into people's subconscious." Then he adds, "and all that baloney."

Nighttime Soaps: That newest programming bandwagon—nighttime ser-

ialized drama—seems to be gathering passengers like a beer truck headed for the alderman's picnic. Latest to jump on is CBS, with a spinoff from its daytime soap opera, As the World Turns. The nighttime version, which probably will debut in May, will take over ATWT divorcée Lisa Hughes, played by Eileen Fulton, as its main character.

And ABC, which started it all with Peyton Place, is expanding that series to three nights a week, adding Friday night to its Tuesday and Thursday broadcasts. What this will do to the Peyton Place spinoff, The Girl from Peyton Place, which had been projected for next season, is a question. It may now be jettisoned altogether, as diluting the already successful Peyton Place, or put into the two weeknights so far deprived of these typical slices of New England life.

Those two medical practitioners of television, NBC's Dr. Kildare and ABC's Ben Casey, also were contemplating some sort of serialization to meet the trend, but plans were not firm at this writing.

Moon Shot: Of the two space shots telecast last week — Saturn-Pegasus and Ranger 8—the latter held more interest, mainly because of its close relationship to our man-on-the-moon project. Ranger 8 carried six TV cameras which were to send back to earth pictures of the moon's Sea of Tranquility. If the pictures show that the sea is as tranquil as believed—relatively smooth, flat plains—the area probably will be chosen as the landing spot for the astronauts.

MAN IN PURSUIT OF HIMSELF



Bob Crane, actor and disc jockey, is running hard to catch up with a Jack Lemmon-Bob Cummings-Jack Benny image

It doesn't much matter which of his jobs you call the prime one. Either way, Bob Crane undoubtedly has one of the most profitable moonlighting operations going in the entertainment world, and one of the craziest schedules. It's not the money so much that makes Crane run, but an image he's after. His ambition is to be a Comic-Acting-Personality, a sort of combination Jack Lemmon-Bob Cummings-Jack Benny. And, though a not-too-young 36, at the rate he's been running lately he just might make it by Benny's age—39.

What keeps him busy

The Crane schedule is herculean. Up at 5 A.M., he drives to job number one, as a disc jockey at CBS Radio in Hollywood, a job that nets him \$75,000 yearly. At 10:30 he gulps a cup of coffee and sprints two blocks down the street to his second job as an actor at Screen Gems, adding \$50,000 to the annual haul. At 6 or 7 P.M., if he isn't attending a benefit, a dinner, or a show-biz opening, he launches his Thunderbird onto the freeway and wheels out to the San Fernando Valley to a suburb, Tarzana, where his wife, his three kids and his swimming pool, await him.

TV viewers, of course, know Crane best as Dr. David Kelsey, the flip next-door neighbor on The Donna Reed Show, whose wisecracking, definitely unsolid doctor image must rank somewhere near Medicare on the American Medical Association's annoyance list. The AMA notwithstanding, Crane frequently seems to add the only consistent dash of salt to a show that sometimes seems to be wholly saccharin.

Indeed, Crane, being essentially a cutup, frequently comes on a little too strong, especially within *The Donna Reed Show* context. It is simply

impossible for him to regard the family with the necessary awe. "I joke," says Crane significantly. "They see me as a very respectable married man. Sometimes they cut out 'scenes.' Once I had to ride a motorcycle with a teenager. They cut it. "Too suggestive.' Suggestive? That's a neat trick on *The Donna Reed Show.*"

The incongruity of the image Crane projected caused Miss Reed and her producer-husband, Tony Owen, to seriously consider changing Dr. David Kelsev's profession. Their cooled in other ways. This season there was a lot of fancy footwork about next season's arrangements. Crane's manager, secure in the belief that he has another Jack Lemmon on his hands, asked for more money for his client. This did not go over very big with producer Owen. "He ain't worth it," growled Tony a few weeks ago, "He's begging to be back, But he ain't gonna be.'

He's a frenetic disc jockey

Actually, if you happen to be doing a "family" show, Crane does take a lot of understanding. To understand him best, one should listen to his discjockey show heard locally in Los Angeles, one of the most frenetic oneman exhibitions in West Coast radio. It is an unpredictable mixture of records, interviews (frequently testy), news items, commercials, kidding, claptrap and corn. He frequently uses comedy lines from record albums and argues back at the voices or at the commercials. All of this is pulled together with expert timing. It is his proud boast that he can keep 'em laughing at the rush hour on a crowded Los Angeles freeway-and that isn't easy.

The Crane humor is neither subtle nor satirical. Crane has been known to play a sound-effects record of incessant coughing behind a cigaret commercial, or the noise of a motor sputtering and dying during an airlines ad. Yet, says Crane, advertisers seldom complain. "What the heck, what's to complain? They get three minutes for every one they pay for."

During his interviews, Crane takes the part of Everyman. When the commercials seem to be taking up more time than the guests, he'll complain to the engineer: "Come on now, I've got an interview to do. Cut out those commercials."

Some people suspect that the Bob Crane who says, as he did on his show, that "Tom Jones" was such a shocking film he wouldn't take his mother to see it, isn't for real. But he says he is a "square." He lives in a nice but hardly fashionable area in town. Way back in 1949 he married his childhood sweetheart, and he's still married to her. He neither smokes nor drinks. He never went to college and admits he can't tell Puccini from a pizza, or Sartre from a samba. Says an acquaintance, "He's not only a square, he's an insecure square."

It took him a while to get his career started. His high school ambition back in Stamford, Conn., was to be a drummer. And drum he did, first in the Connecticut Symphony Orchestra, where he was tossed out for "cutting up" during a Bach fugue, and later with various name bands. In 1950 he took a job at a New York radio station, later dee-javing in Connecticut before moving to the West Coast in 1956. Two years ago, what was intended as one guest appearance on the Reed Show was expanded into a regular part. That success, plus some bit parts in little-theater productions, led him to make tracks toward that New Lemmon Image.

Withal, Crane is an anxious, thinskinned man. If an irritable listener calls with a criticism, no matter how inane, Crane will brood about it until he's managed to rationalize the whole thing. He never appears at political benefits, for fear of criticism. And even such an innocuous event as a flower show can unnerve him. Not long ago he emceed such a show, and, knowing nothing about flowers, proceeded to ham it up. Later he worried and worried that he might have offended the flower lovers.

Crane remembers when he appeared at a benefit with Jack Benny a few years ago. Crane's performance ("Some of my friends say I sound just like Benny") met with enthusiastic response, which Crane was sure had annoyed Benny. "You know," says Crane glumly, "after the show, Benny never said one word to me, not even good night."

Afraid of compliments

He is often afraid that a compliment may turn out to be something else. Says Crane, "After my first part on the show, Donna said, 'Oh, Bob, we've been looking five years for you and . . .' and I ran. I was sure she was going to say, 'and, now that we've found you, good-by,' or something like that."

The Owen version differs somewhat. "We hadn't been looking for Crane at all. We gave him a one-shot, then signed him for a regular. But ask me what Crane added to the show and I'd say nothin'. We were just looking for a husband for Ann McCrea!"

So it came as no surprise to Crane when Owen finally announced he would not be on the *Reed Show* next fall. Crane already is shooting a comedy pilot for CBS, tentatively titled *The Heroes*, in which he plays the key role of a captured enlisted man in a World War II prisoner-of-war camp.

Crane is clearly playing the showbiz game, and playing it hard. In a rare moment of revealed anger, he said recently: "People say to me, 'Aw, you're just naturally funny. You don't have to work at it.' I don't care if that's what they think. But man, I do work at it. I work hard."



THEY'RE STILL ACCEPTING THAT INVITATION

At 72 (give or take a few years) MAE WEST has not ceased to attract males (some laden with TV and movie contracts)

For more years than a lady likes to count, Mae West—the first, the funniest and, some say, the greatest of all the modern sex symbols—has been issuing the same amusing yet infinitely promising invitation. And for a large part of those years audi-

ences have been enthusiastically succumbing to the forcefulness of a unique and apparently indestructible personality.

Mae—if she will forgive the intimacy—has lived 72 years that she admits to. She is still invitin' 'em up to see her sometime. And they are accepting with alacrity. She has, as it were, invited producer-director Arthur Lubin up. The result was an appearance with *Mister Ed*, strictly

tongue-in-cheek, which turned out to be one of the unexpected comedy delights of last season. This fall Mae was all set to pay a second visit to *Mister Ed*, but illness forced her to postpone it. If all goes well, she will make it sometime this spring.

She has invited the eminent movie director, George Cukor, up. Cukor, for 35 years a specialist in directing women, from Garbo to the current "My Fair Lady," was so enchanted that he hopes to make a movie starring Mae in which she will play a phony clairvovant. Little matter that he has to wait till her doctor gives the OK. "A woman doesn't become a great big personality like that by accident," Cukor explained recently. "For all the boldness, there is a certain discretion. No real vulgarity but only the wit and twinkle of an amusing mind. Why waste all that?"

Indeed, Mae invited me up.

This was the woman who first set foot on a stage with a Brooklyn stock company in 1897, worked her way through dozens of Little Nell parts into something much more inflammatory, ultimately set fire to vaudeville and the Shuberts to become the slightly singed toast of Broadway in the Twenties. She became a cause célèbre in 1927 when she appeared in her own play (the first of many) whose title ("Sex") was considered so wicked that newspaper ads customarily referred to it only as "that certain play." She moved on to Hollywood in 1932, dazzled them with "Diamond "She (retitled Done Wrong"), "I'm No Angel" and others; installed mirrors on the ceiling over her bed; commissioned a white marble statue of herself in the altogether: suggested that Dr. Freud, just then coming into vogue in the movie colony, might learn something from her; and generally tickled the town with her honest, non-niggling, direct-to-thepoint philosophy of life. "I won't say I invented sex," she said. "I will say in my modest way that I have rediscovered it."

In World War II she had a life jacket named after her. When William Randolph Hearst wrote, "Why doesn't Congress do something about Mae West?" she acquired a duo of lakes to commemorate her. In 1954 she came out of "retirement" to shepherd a passel of loin-clothed musclemen around the night-club circuit, thereby giving the lie to those unimaginative grumblers who said it was time for Miss West to fold up her sequins in favor of knitting.

Mae lives on the beach in Santa Monica. Her eight-bedroom house, replete with butler, cook, chauffeur, clerical staff and Cadillac limousine, is early 1930's "modern." the style of architecture which resembled the outside of an icebox. Inside, however, all trace of the workaday world vanishes. I fight my way through a forest of crystal and gilt, antique mirrors and candelabra that might look gaudy at Versailles. On the grand piano sits the famous nude statue. On the walls hang seductive oil portraits of the star in her distinctive full-feathered costumes. In the bar Mae's two pet South American woolly monkeys, "Baby" and "Pretty Boy," pace back and forth, chattering and grinning morosely. I have the distinct feeling that a curtain is going up.

Even though Maé, careful craftsman that she is, has been preparing for my visit for several days, there is a wait—naturally. This provides plenty of time to admire the artifacts of her colorful career. There is, for example, the photograph of that good filly, Mae West, which ran 5-furlongs at Belmont in 57 4/5; a headline from a 1954 issue of Variety, reading "Mae Breaking Records": a picture lavout on "Venus of 1937"; and a sentimental remembrance from her musclemen-a 3-foot gold trophy inscribed, "To the Queen of Men's Hearts from Your Athletes. We Love You, 1955," continued

Presently the butler arrives, bows from the waist and announces, "Miss West will see you now." Now I know the curtain is going up. We ascend the circular staircase. On the top landing I am confronted by a large mural full of romping males so archly satyric that they seem almost to parody themselves. I am ushered into the interview place—the boudoir.

I don't know whether to laugh or cry. Everything is gilt on white. The walls are white, the carpet is white, the tufted satin bedspread on the round bed is white, the satin canopy rising majestically to the ceiling is white. Only the TV set is darkcolored. Mae herself is dressed in a peignoir of beige lace, just the thing for casual afternoon wear, with a blonde wig above false eyelashes-a kind of Mount Rushmore of the cosmetician's art. She stands every inch the queen she is, next to two gilt chairs, strategically placed so she'll know exactly where they are. (She cannot see without her glasses.)

I admire the lady and the furnishings, in that order. She smiles Westily, makes a stab at the chair, sits, adjusts the drape in her peignoir and gets down to the fascinating business of why she's doing another Mister Ed. "My fans liked the other so well." says Mae, "I was forced to."

Mae plays hard to get

To hear Mae tell it, she is not only the busiest septuagenarian glamor girl in town, but the hardest to get. She estimates that she has turned down more movie and TV offers in the last 10 years than most girls get in a lifetime. Why? "Because they are not right for me. They are not Mae West." Having already published her memoirs, "Goodness Had Nothing to Do with It," in 1959, she is currently editing a book on extrasensory perception, rewriting her Mister Ed spot ("Nobody writes for Mae West like Mae West," Arthur Lubin explains). and writing a new novel. The novel is based on her own 1927 play, "The Drag," perhaps the first American play to deal in a non-niggling way with homosexuality. "After the novel comes out," says Mae matter-of-factly, "we'll make a picture of it. It has everything for a great evening's entertainment. Y'know, when I originally wrote it, I was asked not to bring it to New York-uh, it might upset the city."

The butler reappears bearing two tall, iced glasses on a silver tray. I cannot imagine what exotic elixir they contain. It turns out to be a cola drink.

So there we are, thinking young with Pepsi, and discussing "You're born with it," Mae is saying. She takes a dim view of the "sick sex" which seems to be so prevalent these days. "Not the good healthy normal sex," Mae says. "I inspire that. But really sex hasn't changed. There's just more of it." She pauses to excoriate the topless bathing suit. "That's going too far," she says. "I never had to resort to nudity."

Now Mae is in a reminiscent mood. She tells me how tough things were for her in the Twenties, how she had to put humor into her act to gain acceptance; how it was even tougher in the Thirties, after the Havs office cracked down on sex in the movies. forcing her to play even more for comedy, an alarming (by her lights) trend which culminated in 1939, when she was compelled to share top billing with W. C. Fields in "My Little Chickadee." As Mae puts it, "I stepped off m' pedestal. Until then I never co-starred with anybody."

She recalls with relish the Salvation

Army captain in "Diamond Lil," and how she stood on the stairway, wiggled her egrets, and told him, "I like a man in uniform and, honey, that one fits you grand"; and how J. J. Shubert did nip-ups and the only problem was to keep the customers from battering down the box office. She boasts that she has never boiled an egg in her life. Once, however, she did brew a cup of coffee on cook's night out. "I hadda send out—for instructions," Mae explains. "They forgot to tell me you had to turn off the heat. I never turn off—the heat."

Although she is much too smart to say so, Mae is appalled at the number of strictly egg-boiling females in TV. Asked about glamor in the medium, her look becomes pained, her eyes evasive. How does she dig family situation comedy—like *The Donna Reed Show?* "Donna who?" replies Mae abstractedly.

As for Liz Taylor...

According to Mae, movie glamor is in almost as sorry a state. "When they face the real thing, they're afraid," she opines. To her, Harlow was "merely acting sex," Turner was "a schoolgirl" and Monroe-"Well," says Mae grumpily, "they managed to do something with her." As for Liz Taylor, "She's a face." She thinks a minute. "Of course, she has some blood in her veins. But that thing with that fellow -uh, what's his name?-didn't do her any good. Women won't come to see you. Of course, I haven't seen 'Cleopatra.' . . I played Cleopatra once." Her voice trails off.

I ask her if it's true that she owns half the real estate in San Fernando Valley. Mae denies this. She owns the Ravenswood—the Hollywood apartment building where she lived for so many years—and "some other things." She explains her investment tech-

nique: "I'd drive by and see a pretty place. 'Buy that,' I'd say." One of the pretty places was three square blocks in what is now downtown Van Nuys. A few years ago she sold off a piece of it for \$1,100,000.

Mae is just enthusiastically discussing her plan to do two TV "spectaculars" yearly when the butler arrives to remind her that her agents are waiting downstairs. The timing is perfection. "In a minute," says Mae grandly, then to me: "I must create a certain excitement. Unless it's extra great, I just can't get interested"

"Thank you, Miss West," I say weakly.

She does not say come back up and see me again sometime. Instead she says: "I'm waiting for pay-TV. I'll bet I'll rate No. 1 on it."

I think, how charming! How Mae Westian! How ridiculous! At her age? And yet, on the way out—past the mural with the gold fig leaves, past the butler, past "Baby" and "Pretty Boy" and the statue and the two agents in the parlor—I make an urgent mental note not to take that bet.

'The Beverly Hillbillies' has changed their lives in practically every respect but one—

THEY'RE STILL SINGLE

One of the three, a sixtyish veteran of vaudeville, radio and night clubs, plays the part of a wispy grandmother still going strong in her 80's. The second, a shapely blonde in her late 20's, an ex-beauty queen and divorced mother of one, plays a blue-jean-clad 18-year-old tomboy. And

the third, a fortyish divorcée of cultural bent, plays a fortyish spinster bent upon conquest.

The three are as different off-screen as they are on. Probably only *The Beverly Hillbillies* could have brought together as disparate a trio as Irene Ryan (Granny), Donna Douglas

(Elly May) and Nancy Kulp (Jane Hathaway). Here's what they have to say about themselves and their lives. (The conversation actually was recorded in separate interviews):

IRENE: I call us "The Three Eligibles"—we're all different shapes and sizes, but we're all available. [Miss Ryan, too, is a divorcée.]

Donna: I'm not thinking of getting married again, but if I found somebody I was interested in, I'd adjust. But I don't socialize a lot. I don't go out a lot. I still get a little shy.

IRENE: When I played the Sahara in Las Vegas last year, I shook so bad I thought there was a loose board. Then, just as I was about to do my first song, I heard a child's voice out in the audience say, "Hi, Granny." I knew I was among friends.

Nancy: But you can't go anywhere any more. When I'm at the market I spend 10 minutes signing autographs, and then I come home with the wrong box of something—the person I gave the autograph to has got what I bought. It used to annoy me, but finally I decided to relax and enjoy it. Who knows—maybe next year people will be saying, "What ever happened to Nancy Kulp?"

Donna: I can hear people talkin' about me, and I keep movin'. But last Christmas, when I was down home in Louisiana, I was bringing my nephew back from church one Sunday and I saw a car that seemed to be in trouble. It was some people who had come all the way from Mississippi looking for Donna Douglas. They'd been waiting to see me.

IRENE: It's been such a satisfaction to me to know I finally made it.

Nancy: The big thing this show has brought me is prestige. For years I was just a good character actress. I don't consider myself a comedienne—I'm an actress. I may make people laugh, but this is a gift.

DONNA: I used to do all sorts of

parts, but when Elly came along I sort of fell into it. But I'd like to do records and pictures and a Broadway musical. I think I can do all these things if I make the effort.

IRENE: I've been working since I was 11 in all forms of show business except burlesque—I guess I wasn't the type for that. In vaudeville, when you stepped out on the stage, you had just 15 minutes to make it.

Donna: I don't expect to be around this business as long as Irene. I'm not hung on acting. I don't need applause. I love to give.

NANCY: No matter how successful you may seem to be, nothing has really changed if no change has taken place in yourself.

Donna: I'm patient. I have drive but not at the expense of anyone else. If the ancients could spend 60 or 80 years coming up with a few words like "Know thyself" or "Do unto others," I'm going to spend some time trying to understand what they meant by those few little words.

Nancy: When the show finishes filming in the spring, I'm going to load up my car—maybe get a trailer—drive East and buy a farm in Pennsylvania or Virginia.

IRENE: I spent most of my life in hotels. I've lived where I am now for the past 10 years. I built the house myself. I don't mean I built it with my own hands, but I planned it all. It's homey and cozy, not like a lot of these places that are just for show.

Donna: I love my little apartment. It's just 10 blocks from the studio—I can go home and shower and rest. I gave all my stuffed animals to Children's Hospital, but I still have my bird, Francis. He's named after St. Francis of Assisi, who loved animals. I respect animals—I feel their vibrations.

NANCY: I've moved three times since the *Hillbillies* began. The neighbors where I used to live **continued** would shout, "Hey, Miss Hathaway," when they drove by the house at night, but they never really spoke to me. I have more privacy where I am now than any place I've ever lived.

Donna: My family are all coming out this summer. They have been out twice before—about 10 of 'em. Some people may think it's strange that I don't have my son with me, but he's with people he loves and who love him. He lives with my folks. What could I give him, working all day, that he's not getting now? He got straight A's in school this year.

IRENE: When I was a kid in San Francisco I was thrown out of school for singing "Where Did Robinson Crusoe Go with Friday on Saturday Night?" in an amateur contest. The low point of my life was when the vaudeville theaters closed. My husband Tim and I were playing the Palace in Chicago when we got the word, and we just couldn't believe it. We'd been making \$750 a week. Right after that, NBC offered us \$50 a week, and we turned it down. But when they offered it again later, I said, "Well, we have to start somewhere." Just before the Hillbillies I was free-lancing in TV and pictures and working the saloons-fightin' those drunks.

DONNA: When I first came out here, I was in a bubble, but now I have my feet on the ground. I'm practical. I used to be idealistic, but now I'm a practical idealist.

NANCY: I'd like to take a year off and work for the Peace Corps. Not overseas—I like my comfort too much for that—but among the American Indians perhaps.

DONNA: I never had ambition or

direction. That's why objectives mean so much to me now. So many people think I'm such a little fluff, but I'm studying metaphysics and singing. You keep concentrating so you can do more.

IRENE: The worst three weeks I ever spent were waiting for word on whether I had this part. At first they said I was too young, but I said, "If you get anybody older than I am, she'll be too old to do the series." Then Paul Henning, the show's producer, called me up and said, "Granny?"

DONNA: Elly's taken over quite a bit of my life—there's not much time left for Donna Douglas. There's not as much of Elly as there used to be, either—I've lost 8 pounds.

NANCY: I always think of Jane in the third person—Would she do so-and-so? Recently when an actor on the show tried to tell me how to play a scene I said, "My dear young man, don't tell me how to play this character." Comedy has to be played so seriously. You can't just play it for laughs—you have to be honest. It's not, "Is this funny?" but, "Is it honest?" I can't get too broad.

IRENE: People don't recognize me when I'm not in costume, but once I was going down Sunset Boulevard dressed as Granny, we had to stop at a traffic light, and I caused a traffic jam. I've done personal appearances at fairs with the two kids, Donna and Max [Baer], and they have to put police outside the doors of our hotel rooms.

NANCY: My home-town paper has never ever mentioned my name, but I think I have one of the most enviable spots in the show. I don't have the responsibility of a star.

DONNA: I don't complicate. I keep it simple. I'm just a hillbilly, I guess.

Miss Ellen Madison takes the stand:

'My name is really Bergér. That's French, with an accent aigu over the second "e"—Bear-zhay.

She's just 21 years old, and she's married and pregnant. She is the greatest friend I could ever have in my entire life.

"I was born in Brooklyn, in 1936, but I don't talk as if I come from Brooklyn, do I? My voice is lower than a dolphin's. I talk like the girls I played in 'Taste of Honey' and 'Milk and Honey' on Broadway. I was pregnant in both plays. When I was doing From These Roots, the daytime serial on TV, I was pregnant for two whole years. I'm sick of playing pregnant women and fighters' girl friends. I was a fighter's girl friend in The Defenders, Route 66, The Fugitive and in 'Body and Soul' on Du Pont Show of

the Month. I was mentioned for an Emmy for 'Body and Soul,' Ingrid Bergman won it. I was also mentioned for my role in 'Prescription: Hypnosis' on Armstrong Circle Theater.

"I was educated in Brooklyn public schools and went to Bennington College. I majored in sociology at Bennington, but I left after a year and a half. I've always loved acting. As a little girl I made puppets, and I had an imaginary dog named Jerry. I was in the TV version of 'Henry Aldrich' while I was still going to Madison High in Brooklyn. I always wanted to be somebody and to have my parents look at me on the stage and say. 'That's my daughter.' All actors are children-bad children who are coddled and indulged. And they don't deserve it, because what they do is so transitory.

"I was married twice-the first time for six years to an artist, and then to Buck Henry of That Was the Week That Was. In Hollywood I stay at the Chateau Marmont and go in the pool every day. I have an apartment on Central Park in New York. My bedroom looks like an Indian fort. I love clothes. I have 500 dresses and 50 pairs of shoes. One day I went into Saks to buy a \$35 handbag and ended up with \$1500-worth of clothes. I'd really rather be married and have loads of children than anything. I was up all night thinking about it. I know just the man I want to marry. He's an older man, and he would be surprised if he knew I was thinking about marrying him."
