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as we see it

There is always a running battle between networks and advertisers as to which of them should control programs. The advertisers were on top for a while, but then came the quiz scandals and the Government insisted that the networks assume responsibility for what they broadcast.

They did better than that. They assumed ownership of what they broadcast so that today the networks own all or part of nearly every show they put on the air. There are some exceptions, but programs today are developed with the prior blessing and financial participation— of a network, which then tells advertisers which shows it has available for their sponsorship.

■ Recently the Federal Communications Commission revealed a staff study which proposes a limit of network program ownership. The FCC staff suggests that networks be permitted to own an interest in no more than half the programs they air from 6 to 11 P.M.—with the exception of news shows. Such a rule would eat heavily into network income by forcing them either to buy half their shows from outside sources or broadcast the programs brought to them by advertisers. The latter seems more likely.

Advertisers should, and do, operate in their stockholders' interest. Television networks must operate in the public interest. The two interests do not always coincide. And while networks always have the last word on whether to accept a show, big advertisers wield a lot of power.

We don't like the idea of three networks having complete control of programming either, but we feel the effect of the FCC staff proposal would be to give advertisers more to say about what programs the public will see. To our mind, that would not necessarily improve television. YOU KNOW WHAT REALLY TASTES TERRIFIC WITH A PEANUT BUTTER SAND-WICH? O.J. does. Guests on the Danny Thomas special coming up on NBC March 14 are Mickey Rooney and Jim Nabors. Yet little Lee Remick all but steals the show with a strip tease in which she takes off no more than a glove.

a real audience, a real theater [the set was a simulated old-time burlesque house], and everything seemed real to me. I felt excited when I stood in the wings waiting to go on. Then the audience began to participate. They were whistling and yelling, 'Take it off, take it off,' and it was great. Mickey said we should take the show on the road."

Another plus was her costume, designed by Ray Aghayan. "I had to look as if I were doing some bumps and grinds," Lee said, "and the clothes were a big help."

In the show Lee's dancing is so torrid it's stopped by the police before she can really get into her denouement—between the first and second gloves. Below, she is arraigned in court before Judge Mickey Rooney, as bailiff Jim Nabors and prosecutor Danny Thomas look pained.

The show, called "The Wonderful World of . . . Burlesque," was a natural for Thomas and Rooney, both of whom started in that branch of show business. Thomas was a "candy butcher" (one who hawks candy to the audience); Rooney was a child actor (his father was burlesque comic Joe Yule). In fact, Danny says, the first time he ever laid eyes on Mickey was at the old Empire Theater in Toledo, Ohio, when he was 11 and Mickey, aged 5, toddled out onto the stage singing "Pal of My Cradle Days,"

Random observations about TV in other lands,

by a television consultant

n Nigeria the authorities insist that the day's television schedule must be divided evenly between entertainment shows and educationalcultural programs. In 1960 Highway Patrol was considered an educational show because (1) traffic signals had just been installed in Lagos and Ibadan, and the show taught the audience what they meant; (2) because traffic cops had just been equipped with new uniforms, not unlike those worn on the show, and it was felt that Highway Patrol taught respect for men in uniform; and (3) because the good guys always won out over the bad guys.

This is one of the TV oddities I experienced in various foreign countries during a world trip I made for a large American broadcasting corporation.

* *

When I visited Japan, I concluded that these must be the world's TV wonder boys. Their industrial motto seems to be "Anything you can do, we can do better." I was shown a completely automated studio, with a manless camera and camera boom, which can be operated by remote control from the control room. Studios are equipped with a new kind of heatless light which the Japanese claim is superior to anything used anywhere else. And they have developed subminiature television camera. а weighing slightly less than three pounds, that can be carried in the palm of the hand.

There's an unusual station in Dhahran, in the Saudi Arabian desert, operated noncommercially by Aramco to keep oil workers and their families happy. Saudi Arabia, incidentally, recently contracted in the U.S. for a 13-station system; it has plenty of oil money, and its king does not intend to be outdone by tiny, oil-rich Kuwait, which already has a station.

More than 70 of the 114 members of the United Nations have TV. Among those that don't are such major countries as the Union of South Africa, Israel and Greece.

Despite the absence of TV stations in Israel, there are reported to be 6000 to 7000 sets in use there, picking up stations in Lebanon and Egypt. One engineer there told me he had received TV pictures from Rome. An engineer in Tanganyika also claimed that he had success in picking up Roman telecasts.

While Moscow has done everything in its power to jam or otherwise offset our Voice of America and Radio Free Europe broadcasts, it has attempted very little in the way of exporting its own TV shows. The Soviets have offered some of their best films to stations in Asia and Africa. But, as far as I could ascertain, there have been few takers.

Like Britain's BBC, Australia's state-controlled broadcasting service,

ABC, is highly respected and produces very good shows. Though competitive with commercial stations in various parts of the country, ABC tries to satisfy the demands of minority groups and is very sensitive to their criticisms. And so you can see shows about the life cycle of the bee, about raising aspidistras and about the habits of the mouse. Very interesting sometimes, certainly quite educational, but hardly conducive to large audiences.

There are two TV systems in Thailand-one operated by the Department of Public Relations, the other by the army-both very commercial and so competitive that their staffs were forbidden to fraternize while I was there. The proceeds are supposed to go into a general fund. but lots of evebrows lift when you question them about this. The Bangkok police apparently want a piece of the action-it was reported last year that they were bucking for a station of their own. Presumably the navy will too.

There's a strange station in Jakarta, Indonesia, which is the pride and joy of President Sukarno. Until recently, at least, it was on the air less than two hours a day, yet it has a permanent staff of more than 500 people, all civil servants.

Liberia got its first TV station in 1963, operated by Britain's commer-

cial organization, Rediffusion, Ltd. I visited Liberia in 1960, and one incident during that trip sticks in my mind. I was approached by a neatly dressed young man who, apparently, had overheard me discussing television. He asked me whether television would come to Liberia. I said I believed it would eventually. "Does that mean," he asked, "that we will be able to see Maverick here?" I said it was quite likely. "That would be wonderful," he said. "Maybe we could get Lassie too. And I sure liked Mr. District Attorney." I asked him how he knew about these shows, and he told me he had recently completed four years at Boston University as a law student and had had a TV set in his room. And now, as he had hoped, we are bringing American culture to his country via television.

We used to declaim pridefully that the United States had more TV stations and more TV sets than the rest of the world combined. That's no longer so. There are now more than 3400 TV stations in other parts of the world, while we have 669. And there are now some 85,000,000 sets in use in other countries, compared with approximately 65,000,000 in the U.S. There's a plenitude of brains and talent and subject matter around the world, worthy of mutual exchange and mutual aid, and certainly worthy of respect. We've given the world a lot, but we have a lot yet to give and a lot yet to get from other lands.

One Battle the Women Lost



WHEN 'THE NURSES'

NEEDED AID, WHO WAS RUSHED TO THE RESCUE? MEN, OF COURSE

You must be aware by now that last year's television entertainment, The Nurses, has been transmogrified subtly into this year's The Doctors and the Nurses, and is visible on the CBS network every Tuesday night. We set out recently to discover, on your behalf, the reasons for this metamorphosis, and the success, if any, of insinuating the careers of a pair of fictitious doctors into the already fervid lives of a pair of fictitious nurses played by actresses Shirl Conway and Zina Bethune.

The search began in the office of Michael Dann, CBS-TV's vice president in charge of programming, who is fond of calling himself the network's "program bureaucrat." "When Herb Brodkin [executive producer of *The Doctors and the Nurses*] brought the show to us in 1960," Mr. Dann said,

"I didn't feel altogether secure about it. It was a completely female-oriented show. Brodkin said he could find enough good stories to keep such a series going. By the end of the second year, it was apparent the show needed a fresh approach. I never criticized the production or direction. But I felt the series would be more popular than it was if the stories had wider scope-such as could be contributed by a couple of strong male characters in continuing roles. Brodkin didn't fight the idea. Last spring, we had a meeting and he said he'd go along with it if we could find the right actors."

The right actors turned out to be Michael Tolan, 34, and Joseph Campanella, 39, a brace of well-seasoned theatrical bird dogs who undertook respectively the roles of Dr. Alex Tazinski, a prickly but brilliant rebel of a sawbones whose eagerness to Get The Job Done usually transgresses his associates' more tender sensibilities; and Dr. Ted Steffen, boss of the residents at Alden General Hospital, and a bit of a sobersides who is frequently at odds with Tazinski.

From Mr. Dann's office, we hurried over to Plautus Productions in Manhattan's East Fifties for a chat with Earl Booth, the show's producer. "The whole series was too female before," Mr. Booth told us. "We used to have a dreadful time finding material that wasn't too soapy. We had settled into a sameness. The shows became too discursive, with not as much action or excitement as they should have had." Tolan and Campanella have brought the chance for greater involvement and variety, he explained.

Onward to the Pathe studios on 106th Street on the edge of Harlem, where The Doctors and the Nurses is filmed: Shirl Conway sits in a corner of the set between scenes and describes her own reaction to the changeover. "I was in the country one weekend when a friend called me and said: 'Are you sitting down?' I said I was and he told me they'd changed the title. I had two feelings at the time: one of defeat that perhaps I had failed the show somewhat: and secondly. I deplored the choice of title. I thought it was a pedestrian one, and I still do. Out of sheer diplomacy, I think it should be called The Nurses and the Doctors. The producers have made a lot of money out of the nursing profession, and it would have been more politic to give the nurses top billing.

"I've never been told why the change was made," Miss Conway continued. "But I've learned that compromise can be spelled with a capital C. I've lived through things far more important, and I know there's no sense in getting in an uproar about it. It's simply a fact, I suppose, that when the troops are getting low, reinforcements must be sent it."

In the first year of *The Nurses*, Miss Conway said, the nursing profession took a generally dim view of Alden General Hospital and the way it was run. "Now they've realized it's a program of entertainment and that we don't let them down if we inspire a few girls to be nurses. I've never had a sorehead letter myself. Nurses write to me and say, 'Thank you for showing middle age sympathetically,' or 'Thank you for showing that discipline and compassion can mix."

An assistant director summoned Miss Conway to the set and she departed, wrapped in a flimsy red robe, for a scene in an episode called "The Patient Nurse."

Herb Brodkin, who is also president of Plautus Productions, is a breezy, rough-cut man with a reputation for candor. He's also owner of one of the most impressive track records among all the old-line TV producers—three Emmys, two for *Playhouse 90* and one for *The Defenders*. He submitted to questioning one day recently on how *The Doctors and the Nurses* transmutation was accomplished and why.

"Like most decisions around here, I made that one, and for two reasons: first, the ratings weren't high enough, and second, stories for a pair of nurses were too hard to find. I've never had as much trouble with a series as I had with *The Nurses*, and primarily because of the difficulty in finding scripts. So we added a couple of men, and the nurses have, in effect, become supporting characters. There's no point in saying anything else. Part of the problem was that, in making things happen in a story, nurses are handholders.

"I hope Shirl isn't too upset about the switch. She's a wonderful actress, but she's no longer continued

the lead. She and Zina have quite a following, and the two of them are extremely valuable as supporting leads. The emphasis on the doctors in the show will continue to grow; it can't help but do that."

What the two men think

And what is going through the minds of the two men who are the object of this shift in emphasis? Michael Tolan is a Detroiter who started out playing bit parts on "The Lone Ranger" radio series and who subsequently did two movies and seven Broadway plays. He has performed the role of Lazarus in the just-released film "The Greatest Story Ever Told." "I used to watch The Nurses." he told us on a recent off-day from the set. "But it wasn't the kind of show you went out of your way to see. It was stuck with the problems of two nurses. Now it has a broader base, and I think the quality is the best of any regular dramatic show on television. Personally, I've never been happier in a professional situation. I wish, though, that we could change the title so people wouldn't think it was a daytime serial."

Joseph Campanella is an Italian-American New Yorker, a former Naval officer and a journeyman actor who has rarely been unemployed. He's convinced the show has greater validity now that there are doctors around to make the pronouncements on medical matters-a function which formerly had to be carried off by Shirl Conway and Zina Bethune. "The girls have had the load taken off them," he says. "Up till now, they've had to work a breakneck schedule. If Zina became ill, for example, the producers had to rush in a script for Shirl. For the first two years they were at the studio 12 hours a day, 11 months a year."

The strain, if any, doesn't show on Zina Bethune who, at 20, is one of the show's grand old ladies. "I don't know why the switch was made," she says. "They really didn't contact me about it. The series is no longer directed at women's problems, and as a result, I think the stories are more varied."

Generally, critics have reacted favorably to the format changes. The show-business weekly, Variety, reviewing the first segment of the new season, said that The Doctors and the Nurses, "a good dramatic series on CBS-TV for two seasons, is now a finer one and very possibly the best of its kind on any network line-up this year." Such laudations have been frequent lately. They're testament to the remorseless search for sound stories on the part of Brodkin and his cohorts, on their husbanding of writers, and an insistence on humane values in scripts-rather than on the gimmickry of operating rooms and exotic diseases.

An exploration of Negro attitudes

A segment earlier this season, for example, was a trenchant exploration of some current Negro attitudes, admirably acted by Ossie Davis, Diana Sands and Brock Peters. *The Doctors* and the Nurses doesn't score that heavily every time out. But in spite of a respectable batting average as a purveyor of higher class television drama, the series has not attracted audiences in great enough numbers to assure its health and long life as a member of CBS's nighttime family.

One cast member, however, has a plan to keep the series on the air forever. "We just keep adding more characters, see?" she explains. "Then pretty soon the series would be titled: The Doctors and the Nurses and the Patients and the Visitors and the Ambulance Drivers. That's 10 years' worth of shows right there."





DAVID'S DROOPING ... Success has left

Fugitive Janssen tired, tense and physically ailing

Some weeks ago, David Janssen interrupted a rehearsal with Angie Dickinson on the set of *The Fugitive*, because he had developed a tightness in his shoulder that had to be massaged away. By Miss Dickinson. This is no tragedy.

But it is symptomatic of presentday David Janssen, perhaps the hottest dramatic actor on television. Less than three years ago he accepted the starring role of *The Fugitive*, a part aptly described by another actor, who wanted the job and didn't get it, as "60 minutes of looking over your shoulder—for the audience."

This season the audience has caught up. Today *The Fugitive* is one of the most-watched hours on the air. And Janssen, after a spotty 27-year career that had run the gamut from indifferent to innocuous, is suddenly one of the industry's most-admired actors. He is also paying the price.

Success is rarely an unmixed blessing. Especially in Hollywood, where new billings and luscious pay checks are seldom as swollen as egos, and where a successful actor is termed "a sweet guy" because he hasn't pushed his aging mother downstairs recently.

Not so David Janssen.

"Success moves people lots of ways," says Quinn Martin, partner with Janssen on *The Fugitive* and the show's executive producer, Hollywood's euphemism for boss. "Some actors get paranoid. They turn on people. They become selfish. David has become more secure, easier to work with. He's the first guy in town who got nicer as the result of big success."

Alan Armer, producer of the show, says: "Janssen has flowered with success."

Unfortunately, the flowers have dark petals.

Janssen, who will be 35 this March 27. admits he is tired, tense and physically ailing. He is walking on a left knee whose socket would be no more painful if it were filled with razor blades. He snapped a ligament while pole-vaulting in high school, and has carefully postponed surgery because knee surgeons don't guarantee success. Now his time has about run out. He walks with a bouncy limp; and because of the melodramatic nature of The Fugitive-with its dashes down black alleys, plunges into icy rivers and savage brawls—the knee has taken a battering until it is today a pulp of torn tendons, bone chips and calcium deposits. When The Fugitive winds up shooting at the end of March, Janssen will be forced to undergo an operation to try to clear it up.

But it is the nerves that are most strained. David Janssen puts in an average 14-hour workday. He rises at 5:30 A.M., showers and dresses, and leaves his fashionable Trousdale Estates home in Beverly Hills before the sun is up. Or even before his wife, Ellie, is up. He doesn't get home until 8 or 9 at night. "Then I fall asleep in my mashed potatoes," he says dryly. When he doesn't doze off at supper, he staggers to the television set. "TV is my sleeping pill," he says.

This wry, almost apologetic manner keys David Janssen. For all the tension and physical exhaustion that have become part of his success, Janssen takes neither himself nor the success very seriously. During the episode with Miss Dickinson, the two embrace on Miss Dickinson's bed. It is a moment of small, nibbling kisses, reminiscent of the old Ingrid Bergman-Cary Grant scene in "Notorious"; and as they parted, director Abner Biberman suggested to Miss Dickinson: "You could take a bite of his ear on the way out." Miss Dickinson purred: "I'd rather he do it to me." and David Janssen excused himself hastily and fled to his dressing room, where he telephoned his wife.

Ellie Janssen, married to David since 1958, is most aware of what the pressures of 14-hour days mean. And she is concerned.

"He is physically tired. He pushes himself beyond his endurance. In a way he has to. He doesn't want to lead an existence that is solely eatwork-sleep. He must have a social life. He is smoking more these daystwo to three packs a day-and he is drinking more. He feels it gives him zing, it peps him up. Fortunately, I have a clue that tells me when he is really exhausted. Tiny white spots form on his cheeks. He'll come home from the studio, and I'll say, 'There they are,' and David will say, 'You can see them through the makeup?' and we both know he has to take it easy."

All is not bleak. A year ago Janssen found he was constantly clearing his throat. Assuming it came **continued**

from too much smoking, he cut out cigarets for a month. Not only did he put on weight and become even more tense, but the throat-clearing persisted. Delighted to discover it was not from smoking, but simply a nervous habit, Janssen began to light up again.

He had himself an ulcer

Or take his ulcer. Three years ago Janssen was sitting around after having completed "My Six Loves," a film so bad even Janssen's press agent Frank Liberman winces at the memory. Farther behind were three-plus years of a television series: *Richard Diamond*, *Private Detective*, a show begat in 1957 and buried in 1960 when doctors replaced private eyes as the big time-slot operators of the living room. In the words of Hollywood, Janssen was between jobs. In his words, "I was unemployed." So he had himself an ulcer.

Today Janssen views the ulcer and its departure with some small smug pride. "Thinking causes ulcers," he says, sitting back in his splendidly dark dressing suite at the Samuel Goldwyn set, situated in the same building as Goldwyn's. "Thinking gets rid of ulcers. I thought mine away."

Not quite. According to Ellie Janssen, he also takes gelatin compounds and other ulcer antidotes, and toys with the usual bland diet. With Janssen, the diet is enriched by quantities of black coffee, Scotch and brandy. His must be a very confused ulcer.

And success has its material manifestations. As the star of *Richard Diamond*, Janssen earned \$750 a week. As the star and partner of *The Fugitive*, \$750 a week becomes pocket money. Janssen has taken to buying up pieces of the desert in the Palm Springs area. When it was suggested his land holdings are worth something like half a million to a million dollars, he apologetically suggested they were worth a hell of a lot more. In September of 1964, the Janssens bought a swanky weekend home in Palm Springs, which Ellie Janssen calls "the best idea we've had in some time. The minute we take off for the Springs, David begins to unwind."

Success has also brought recognition. Last year Janssen won himself an Emmy nomination, and walked off with TV GUDE's poll of its readers as the year's favorite male performer. This is a big change from the old days. Janssen, the Nebraska-born son of a Ziegfeld Follies girl, was thrust into bit parts in the movies when he was 8, and after graduation from Fairfax (Hollywood) High in 1949 began filling minor roles in minor films. He made 32 movies for Universal, playing what Janssen calls "an agreer. The star would approach me and ask, 'Don't you think so, Harry?' and I'd agree, and disappear."

His pay check went quickly

Of those old film days Janssen says: "Most of my pay check went to my tailor, barber and masseur." He could have added his bartender. "I was less than responsible," says Janssen. "I had no obligations except to my own pleasure."

But along came Ellie Graham, in 1958, to give his life more meaning; and a few years later, Quinn Martin, to give his career more meaning.

Martin says: "David had never believed he was really a good actor. He had a bag of tricks to get by with. He'd blink his eyes or tug at his ears or stroke his chin. He was a glib, good-looking, well-dressed guy who refused to probe his own talent."

The first year on *The Fugitive* was a tough one for Martin. "David would argue with everybody about faults he'd found in the scripts. He baited directors. It wasn't nasty, continued

but he wanted to make sure people paid attention to him. He bugged me."

Success has changed that. "Today," says Martin, "David comes in and plays the role and leaves the production to me." The mannerisms have gradually disappeared. "He used them only when he was tired. I'd watch the dailes—the unedited film of each day's shooting—and I'd say to David: 'I counted two bug-eyes, one ear tug, and one chin pull. Tired?' And he'd say, 'You rat, you caught me.' The next day, there'd be no gimmicks. Just talent."

To David Janssen, the real big change is that he's working regularly at a job he likes, despite the unrelenting pressures. "I'm from Nebraska," he once said, "and I feel guilty when I'm not working. If I'd stayed in the picture business, making two a year, sitting around the rest of

the time, I'd go crazy, and become a boozed-up actor at 35."

He is now approaching 35, and though he is far from a teetotaler. he is even farther from being boozedup. He says he is happier these days than those days, that he leads a fuller life, and that he enjoys working on The Fugitive more than he has ever enjoyed work before. But he also says it is harder this second year than it was the first. "It's difficult keeping character fresh and reaching the deeper into his character to find more things he can do." He says he'd prefer putting in just one or two more years on the show, but executive producer Quinn Martin speaks grandly of five more years. "Five more years?" Janssen says dully. "Contractually, I suppose I would have to put in five more years, but-" And his voice trails off.

This, then, is David Janssen. He has to work increasingly hard to remain reasonably happy in his career, but the pressures of work create tensions which find no outlet other than more work. It is a vicious cycle, and Janssen may be beginning to show it. There are the tight muscles in shoulder and back; there is the interjected phrase "you know" thrust into every sentence, giving Janssen's speech a spastic quality.

Novelist Bernard Wolfe, a close friend of the Janssens for the past two years, suggests an explanation. "David is a man of considerable inner tension who, more than most of us, keeps it all to himself. What makes it worse is that David is not a fanatically dedicated person. If he were, all this grueling work would have more meaning for him. But he is not dedicated. He has great doubts as to the ultimate aim of it all, as to where it is leading him."

David Janssen is a decent human being who refuses to take himself, his work, or his success seriously. Meanwhile, his work and his success may be tearing him apart.

Night Shift: "My main reaction to the whole thing," said Les Crane, "is shock and surprise." There can't, however, be many other people alive who were either shocked or surprised by ABC's decision to cancel Crane's late-night show. The handwriting had been written all too plainly in the margins of Nielsen's ratings booklet. According to Nielsen. The Les Crane Show was being outpointed nearly three-to-one by NBC's Tonight Show. As a result, sponsors had been hard to find and ABC affiliates in some large cities had either dropped the show or were telecasting it in the wee small hours, following their late movies. Considering these facts, it would have been astonishing if ABC had kept the Crane show going. Instead, the network has replaced Crane with ABC's Nightlife, featuring rotating hosts. While the hosts are rotating, Les Crane will, according to an associate, "Go some place where it's warm and he can get back his tan."

Carson's Sit-in: Elsewhere along the night beat, Johnny Carson could be found conducting 15-minute sit-ins in his dressing room. He was sulking because the first 15 minutes of the *Tonight Show* (11:15-11:30 P.M., ET) are not telecast in New York, San Francisco and some other cities, yet he is required to slave over an opening monolog every day and deliver it during that opening segment, when only about half of his potential audience can tune him in. NBC explained Northern California Edition

that it has no control over the situation-stations decide for themselves whether or not to pick up the first quarter-hour. But Carson was not mollified. He contracted what he described as "a 15-minute virus," which kept him in his dressing room for that length of time. After two nights, the virus was cured, at least temporarily. Carson agreed to do the monolog during the first quarter-hour until he had a chance to hash things out with NBC's top programming executives (who were in Hollywood for the week, lining up next season's shows). The most likely solution to the dispute: NBC will permit Carson to while away the first 15 minutes with guests and music, then deliver his monolog after 11:30.

Senators at Bat: The Senate Antitrust and Monopoly Subcommittee wound up hearings last week on CBS's purchase of the New York Yankees. The senators had heard testimony from representatives of all three networks and of the Yankees, and from other baseball-team owners. They found only one witness who was opposed to the CBS-Yankee deal—Charles O. Finley, owner of the Kansas City Athletics, who has seldom found anyone who agrees with him about anything. Closing the hearings, Sen. Philip Hart (D., Mich.), the subcommittee chairman, became for a moment the spokesman for baseball fans everywhere. "If you want to speed up the game by reducing the time between pitches," he said, "I for one won't object, even if you say CBS made you do it." -Henry Harding

When she became upset, the emotionally disturbed 12-year-old girl spoke and wrote only in numbers. For instance, when she was angry, she cried out numbers ending in 4, the number becoming larger with the degree of her anger. Psychiatrists at Los Angeles County General Hospital called her condition a "numbers syndrome." Eventually they discovered that the numbers corresponded with those on Three Stooges bubble-gum trading cards, which depicted the moods of violence the girl felt but because of her emotional problems could not otherwise release. In 1963 her case became the basis of an award-winning Los Angeles television documentary called "Tell Me Not in Mournful Numbers." continued

Today Moe Howard, senior member of the venerable Three Stooges, gets tears in his eyes when he tells the young girl's story, for he, like his veteran partner, Larry Fine, is a sentimental man, whose memories go back far beyond the early 1920's, when they began stooging for comedian Ted Healy. The third Stooge, Joe DeRita, is a comparative newcomer. In 1958 he replaced Moe's late brothers, Shemp and Jerry (Curly) Howard, who over



the years had taken turns as third member of a knockabout act that has flourished for more than four decades, has made more than 200 two-reel comedies and is now enjoying fame and prosperity from release of those old movies on television.

A delight to children

To the dismay of many parents but the delight of their offspring, to whom the Three Stooges are a fresh and heady experience, the old comedies are shown on more than 150 TV stations. The Stooges receive no recompense from the showing of their old movies, but the renewed interest these have sparked has resulted in a thriving business in personal appearances and in a rash of low-budget but high-grossing feature pictures. The Stooges live well, have offices in a swank new building on Hollywood's Sunset Strip and have plans for a new television show.

In other words, they have come a long way.

Moe Howard has come farthest. This vear he celebrates the 50th anniversary of his first stage appearance. It was on a Mississippi river boat. The Stooge with the Beatle haircut, he comes closest to being the straight man of the zany trio. Off-screen he has been described as comporting himself "more like a wealthy ex-cab driver than an utterly extroverted clown." His clown's face is sad and lined, and gray shows at the roots of his dyed hair. On the river boats, far from his native Brooklyn, and later in smalltime stock companies, he played what he says were "highly dramatic roles" in such highly dramatic productions as "The Two Orphans" and "Ten Nights in a Barroom." After World War I, he and his older brother Shemp formed a blackface comedy team which played seven theaters in as many days in an era when the theater manager could fire an act after one

performance. Moe joined Ted Healy in 1921 "to help out for a few days" when a performer objected to being doused with water five times a day. Shemp came along two years later.

In 1925 the Howards and Healy saw Larry Fine and asked him to join them. At the time, Larry was onethird of an act called Haney Sisters & Fine. The sisters, one of whom became Larry's wife, sang and danced, while Larry played the violin and did a Russian dance simultaneously. Haney Sisters & Fine were described, possibly optimistically, as "a class act." Professionally, it was the last connection with class for Larry, a Philadelphian who got his start in vaudeville as the sissy in an act patterned after the "school act" of Gus Edwards'. After he joined Healy and the frères Howard, the act became variously Ted Healy & His Gang, Ted Healy & His Southern Gentlemen. Ted Healy & His Racketeers and, finally, Ted Healy & His Stooges.

When Healy decided to become a Hollywood character actor in the early 1930's, the Stooges started out on their own. Although Moe admits that some of their early comedies are too violent, he has said, "People want to laugh with their mouths, not their minds. Audiences want belly laughs. Rarely does a subtle line or a cute phrase send them into a laughing jag. It takes the old pratfall, a pie in the face, a good chase or a bop on the casaba to keep a laugh going. That's what we give 'em."

Rarely taken seriously

The Three Stooges have rarely been taken seriously, except by parents whose children start bopping their playmates on the casaba after watching them. But the publication Films in Review thought it saw something beneath the fright wigs and the slapstick. In a 1959 article it said, "The Three Stooges gradually began to utilize their screen personalities for more than low comedy. Moe's ineffectual field-marshaling developed into satire of the dictator that is in all of us. . . [Curly] suggested an oversized infant. . . Larry was reality's bridge between Curly and Moe."

That is pretty highbrow talk for the Three Stooges, whose attitude toward their latter-day success can probably be best described as one of wonderment. Ted Healy, who started it all, is dead. So are Shemp and Curly. But, after 40 years, the act still goes on. Joe DeRita, the newest member of the trio, is a former burlesque comedian whose greatest claim to fame is his performance as the menacing hangman in a Gregory Peck Western, "The Bravados." De-Rita is as much a member of the group as are Moe and Larry. "It's a threeway split," says Moe. "That's the way it's always been. I wouldn't know how to do business any other way."



WHY THOSE HILLBILLIES

From Land's End to John o'Groats, Jed Clampett and clan have



Strolling by night, as I often do, about the lanes of southern England, it is by no means uncommon to hear through cottage windows the unmistakable accents of *The Beverly Hillbillies*. There is, if anyone cared to pursue it, a decided thread of irony in these ancient cottages, some of them thatched, with leaded windows and centuries-old oak beams, overflowing with sounds so essentially 20th-century and American. What would Wordsworth have thought of it? Or, more appositely, Rudyard Kipling, some of whose best stories about England's distant past, like "Rewards

taken over, and a distinguished British critic isn't surprised

and Fairies," were inspired by the antiquity of this very landscape. He, as I have been told by local inhabitants, resented the intrusion of motor coaches, even when they came bearing vociferous admirers of his writings. How much more would he have resented the intrusion of the *Hillbillies*.

Any ironical reflections, however, would be very much beside the point, since, truth to tell, our English television, whether BBC or commercial, is, by and large, decidedly more American than native. True, there is a generally accepted conspiracy to ignore this self-evident fact. Newspaper editorialists, university professors and Members of Parliament like nothing better than to make pronouncements about how the BBC radio and television services are, by comparison with their CBS, NBC and ABC equivalents, not to mention other lesser breeds without the law like Radio Luxemburg, the admiration of the world. [The British do not like Luxemburg sending commercial programs into England.-ED.] Like so many such oratorical flourishes, engaged in to keep up our spirits in the days of our decline, this one is both ignorant and foolish. At a modest estimate, some 70 to 80 percent of the television programs broadcast in England are American, whether direct reproductions of American programs, like This

Is Your Life, What's My Line? (both now defunct after phenomenal runs), Perry Mason (still going strong), and, just breaking upon us in all its novelty and splendor, Peyton Place; or adaptations, like Emergency—Ward 10 and Double Your Money. The small residual home product consists of domestic soap opera like Coronation Street, and the BBC's more elevated offerings like Panorama and Monitor.

All the same, the Beverly Hillbillies are so American that eyebrows legitimately may be raised at their popularity in an alien land. A program as English in its own way as The Beverly Hillbillies is American, would be The Goon Show, which first introduced to a wider public such now international favorites as Peter Sellers. Spike Milligan and Harry Secombe. I cannot imagine the Goons making any noticeable headway in the Nielsen Stakes. Their particular brand of nonsense belongs to an exclusively English tradition of considerable antiquity, to which, for instance, "Alice in Wonderland" and the verses of Edward Lear belong. Why, then, should it work the other way round, and the Hillbillies enjoy a following in England when their weird idiom and eccentric behavior strike even many Americans as decidedly out-of-theway, if not downright imbecile?

The answer, I think, is: precisely because they are so **continued**

tremendously American. The fact is that we Europeans, whatever we may say to the contrary, are crazy about everything American, Indeed, I sometimes think that the more anti-American we purport to be in attitude, the more Americanized we tend to become in our tastes, our speech and our attire. Our children wear jeans, our songsters such as the Beatles all affect a kind of bastard Americanese, our restaurants serve frozen nonfood in the American style; our dancing, our dating, our pornography, our strips, our magazines, our musicals; above all, as I have said, our television programs-all, all American.

Soft drinks too

Nor is this passion for American products related in any way that I can see to a taste for them as such. You will find people downing innocuous American soft drinks, which have spread all over Europe in recent years, amidst the vineyards of France, the hop-gardens of Kent, the heather of Scotland and the bogs of Ireland, where, for centuries past, wine, beer, Scotch and Irish whisky have been produced to delight the heart and fortify the flesh of man.

There is probably some biological reason why human beings have a propensity to copy the ways of their successful fellows. In the 19th Century, when we English were on top of the world, "Fif O'clock Tea" and "Bifstek à Toute Heure" were as much in evidence in Europe as "Le Snack" is today. People then wrapped themselves up in tweeds as now they do in jeans; followed "Le Sport" and advertised English-type male attire as "Trés Snob," rather, than, in the contemporary style, swooning to Negroid music and sunbathing in as nearly naked a condition as is legally permissible. The vogue from China to Peru was to be English. Today, it is to be American. The American Way of Life has captivated all mankind, and as they succeed in realizing it (which, alas, is all too easy), everywhere in the world is getting to be like everywhere else.

Thus the vogue of The Beverly Hillbillies is as comprehensible as that of the Western. They are American folklore, and as such partake of America's sweet smell of success. We do not need to understand what we admire; if we did, how should we ever have had any heroes, or even gods? We accept the Hillbillies as unquestioningly as our forebears accepted King Arthur and his Knights of the Round Table, P. G. Wodehouse told me once that his books had a larger sale in Japan than anywhere else in the world. How, one wonders, could Bertie Wooster, Jeeves and the Drones Club possibly be comprehensible when translated into columns of Japanese characters read backwards? The point is that, to Japanese readers, Wodehouse's novels signify an England, far away, and, in their old-fashioned eyes, still admirable. They may not understand this England, but they are kind enough to go on admiring it. In precisely the same way, my English cottagers cherish the largely incomprehensible Hillbillies as signifying the America of large motorcars, wide highways and folded Playboy nudes so dear to their hearts.

Hillbillies ideology accepted

Moreover, the basic moral, or ideology, of *The Beverly Hillbillies* is as acceptable in England as in America. We, too, yearn after wealth which does not corrupt; after an innocence which triumphantly survives the possession of riches. We, too, can thrill over the spectacle of Jed and his ribald family constantly on the edge of succumbing to the lures of luxurious living, but always at the last moment pulling back and resuming their old, virtuous ways. In accordance with the principles of an Affluent Society as laid down by Professor Galbraith, we have rejected the outmoded Christian notion that the poor are blessed, but we should still like to be convinced that it is possible to be rich and blessed.

Hillbillies help morale

Here the Hillbillies are a great help. Week by week they demonstrate that, though possessed of great wealth, they can still just get through the needle's eye into the kingdom of heaven. Television, it seems to me, like popular culture generally, is largely dedicated to providing reassurance on precisely this score. The early Christians, in order to secure themselves against indulgence in sensuality and cupidity, persuaded themselves that their fleshly appetites were vicious and great possessions a handicap to virtuous living. The writings of the fathers and the saints are full of denunciations of sex and riches. Now, when we have created a way of life in which sex is our chief relaxation and riches our main pursuit, traditional Christian teaching in this respect would seem to require revision. We cannot accept the drastic notion of ourselves as sinners. Nor can we in decency just repudiate the fathers and the saints. A way out of the dilemma is to show, on the one hand, that the erotic transports of an Emperor Tiberius are available and permissible within the confines of monogamous marriage; on the other, that, like the Hillbillies, we can be rich and still successfully repel the assaults of the Evil One.

It is tempting to seek to devise (to use William James' famous phrase) a moral equivalent of the Beverly Hillbillies in English terms. What would be their Anglicized version? Well, let us suppose that continued

someone in humble circumstances wins one of the major prizes in the Football Pools- a national addiction, with a weekly turnover running into millions of pounds. Mum and Dad are besieged by enticing offers to live luxuriously; their daughter, Lil, is the target of alluring fortune-hunters, and their boy, Sonny, gives intimations of a propensity to drive sports cars very fast and fall into the hands of designing blondes. Virtue, nonetheless, triumphs. The family continues to live in its semidetached villa, Lil to be faithful to her childhood sweetheart, and Sonny to pursue his engineering studies at a nearby red-brick university.

A soap opera along such lines might well enjoy a certain success, but on reflection is seen to be unnecessary. The Beatles already fill the bill. If one tries to probe the fabulous



Wealth has come to them, and fame, but they are still the same simplehearted, inarticulate Liverpudlians that they always were. The Beatles are our Beverly Hillbillies. The Victorians, obsessed as they were with the lusts of the flesh, were always trying to demonstrate in their popular art that chastity could survive in the poor and the simple despite all the lures and stratagems of accomplished seducers. We, obsessed with money, seek in our popular art to reinforce the conclusion that the poor remain blessed even when they become rich.

Ubiquitous American television

The ubiquity of popular American television programs is quite astonishing. Lucy, in and out of pregnancy, has been loved in many lands and climes; a BBC program to signalize the 25th anniversary of the introduction of television showed rapt viewers looking at Gunsmoke in the torrid African jungle, on the banks of the sacred Ganges and in the parched Arabian desert. More people in the world today know The Beverly Hillbillies, it is safe to assert, than know President Johnson, or even the Pope. Backward or undeveloped nations are shown by means of television the way of life toward which they so ardently aspire. Such a thing has never happened before. No need to take on trust the rewards of toil and struggle; it is there, visible, on the television screen. The naked savage, living in penury and ignorance, sees with his own eyes all he may enjoy and become if, emulating the affluent societies of the West, he expands his Gross National Product, and educates himself into his Hillbilly Heritage.

Country Flannel Cakes/continued

For hearty early-morning breakfasts, leisurely brunches or late snacks—any time of day or night—hot, tender flannel cakes hit the spot. They're so easy to stir together at a moment's notice. Be sure the syrup is hot, and have quantities of crisp bacon and coffee ready to serve with them.

COUNTRY FLANNEL CAKES

(Makes about 12 6-inch flannel cakes)

1¾ cups sifted all-purpose flour	2	tbsp. sugar
2 tsp. baking powder	3	eggs
1/2 tsp. baking soda	11/2	cups buttermilk
1/2 tsp. salt	1/4	cup melted butter or margarine

Sift flour with baking powder, baking soda, salt and sugar. Beat eggs until thick and foamy. Stir buttermilk and melted butter into eggs. Stir in dry ingredients until mixture is just blended; batter will be lumpy. Fry cakes on a hot, lightly greased griddle until bubbles appear on the surface. Turn with a spatula and brown on other side. Serve flannel cakes immediately with hot peach-butter syrup.

PEACH-BUTTER SYRUP

(Makes about 2 cups)

 package (10 oz.) frozen sliced peaches
 cup butter or margarine
 cup honey tsp. cornstarch
 tbsp. water
 tsp. almond extract
 tbsp. lemon juice

Put frozen peaches into a small saucepan. Add butter, honey and lemon juice. Cook over low heat, stirring occasionally, until mixture begins to boil. Mix cornstarch with water until smooth, gradually stir into hot peaches. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until smooth and thickened. Remove from heat and stir in almond extract. Serve hot over flannel cakes. —Helen Feingold; photo by Midori



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
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Answer to last week's puzzle

Most actresses are good talkers. Most writers are not. Joanna Lee is an actress who became a writer. She has written scripts for such comedy series as 'Bewitched,' 'The Farmer's Daughter,' 'The Cara Williams Show,' 'The Flintstones' and 'My Three Sons.'

Joanna Lee is a good talker. Just listen to her:

I decided to be a writer five years ago, when I had an automobile accident and was out of commission for six months. I was on-stage when I was 3 years old. That was back in Newark [N.J.], and I was called "Baby Jonquil." My real name was Jonquil Jacobs. I had always wanted to be an actress. When you're an only child, you retreat through the utter and devastating loneliness to the land of make-believe. Then this one little accident goofed up my face, and I thought, "What kind of values are these?"

Mostly I played sexy roles. I starred in two movies—"The Brain Eaters" and "Grave Robbers from Outer Space." Mother decided that Hollywood needed me when I was 11. My father lost his money. That's what gives me my drive. I came out here with a USO troupe, singing and dancing. I never sing any more. Once when I came on, I saw a lady in the first row cover her eyes and say, "Not that kid again!" After that, whenever I tried to sing, I always saw that lady.

I've supported myself since I was 12 years old. I got a job at the May Company days and ushered at the El Rey Theatre at night. I had to lie about my age. I'm 32 now—the same age as Elizabeth Taylor.

When I graduated from Los Angeles High, I was chosen valedictorian of my class. My father was going to come out from Newark for the graduation. Then I flunked gym because I wouldn't wear gym clothes. I'd developed a voluptuous figure, and I was embarrassed. When I found out that I wasn't going to be valedictorian, I got on a bus and rode and rode. I still do that. If I get bugged, I get on a bus and just ride.

I went to college for a year and then quit to get married. My husband owned a shoe store. I was married for four years, and I not only kept house and had a baby but I was head of the Women's Division for Civil Defense; on the City Planning Commission for Santa Paula, Cal.; on the Central Committee for the Democratic Party; and secretary of the Federation of Junior Women's Clubs. My husband created Craig. Craig is 11 now. He writes, plays the guitar and does folk-singing. He taught himself beginning Russian. Once at Boy Scout camp he kept the kids awake all night reciting "The Martian Chronicles." He's a genius.

I'm going to UCLA, working on my A.B. in psychology. I like to punish myself. I have to miss *Bewitched* because I have a class that night, so I have someone take notes on it for me. The reason I write comedy is that nobody wants to know your sad story, and everybody wants to laugh. That's the bandwagon to get on. Besides, if you're filled with pain, it's easier to write comedy. TV is the comic strips. If I wrote a line of correct English, it would sound stilted. If I write seriously, I'll write a play. Some day I'll be a *real* writer.

'I'd like to be a real housewife'

Most comedy writers work in teams, but I work alone. If I could collaborate, I'd get married. I'd like to be a real housewife. I resent it when someone says to a housewife, "Aren't you doing anything? Why aren't you making a jug?" I happen to bake bread. One action is the same as molding the clay to make a jug, but who cares about a stupid jug? There's something groovy about the smell of home-baked bread. At Christmas time I paint, and bake cookies. I'm a very isolated person.

Joanna Lee lives in a hillside home in Benedict Canyon above Beverly Hills. The bookshelves are filled with volumes on Eastern religions, demonology and witchcraft. The walls are covered with modern paintings, one of which is entitled "Why Are You Sitting Out There Alone Playing Your Guitar. George?" In her bedroom is a jeweled television set, and over the bed is an old-fashioned sampler, put there by her mother, which says "Improve each shining hour."

MARTIN, who began his association with ABC on <u>The Untouchables</u> in 1959, has a new Feds-and-bad-guys series, <u>The FBI Story</u>, coming up next season . . The SMOTHERS BROTHERS will be JACK BENNY's guests on his last new show this season, April 16. BENNY's TV appearances next season probably will be limited to hour specials.
