You really can't blame sportswriters for resenting television.

Television helped kill boxing—a justifiable homicide if there ever was one, but still a blow to boxing specialists whose words once were gospel to fans of the now defunct sport.

Television helped popularize professional football, bringing the games themselves into homes that once depended upon sportswriters to tell what happened at the stadium in Los Angeles or New York or Green Bay.
 Television made golf, once a richman's pastime, into a spectator sport. It made national heroes out of golf teachers. Television announcers were lionized, while sportswriters were asked to stand back, they were blocking the electronic camera's view.

Television provided an important source of income for baseball teams, and writers again faced the competition of instantaneous TV coverage.

Still, sportswriters could always take heart from the fact that they were the experts the public turned to for what happened out of the camera's not-quite-all-seeing eye, for interpretation, for amusing writing.

The writers, then, weren't too bitter --not until the games started changing to accommodate the competition. Television flunkies waved red caps to "gnal when there would be time-out (for a commercial) in a football game. The U.S. Golf Association split the grueling 36-hole finals of the National Open championship into two days of 18 holes each. "For television money," said the writers. New stadiums were designed with cameras in mind.

The writers burned. We would too, in their shoes. But down deep we're sure they agree that it's worth changing the games and the rules a little if it means that millions—rather than just a few—can enjoy watching sports events.

You've seen about the last of <u>The Entertainers</u>. TV's hard-luck show goes off the air March 27, to be replaced by a Londonproduced series called <u>F-6</u>. It's one more entry in the James Bond--U.N.C.L.E.-type sweepstakes, and stars PATRICK McGOOHAN (<u>Danger Man</u>) as a secret agent . . . STUBBY KAYE of <u>Shenanigans</u> is shuttling between New York and London, where he is the host of a popular British children's show.

MERV GRIFFIN starts his new 90-minute nighttime show next month, originating in New York (the same show vacated successively by STEVE ALLEN and REGIS PHILBIN). Westinghouse Broadcasting Company officials hope to pick up some of those ABC stations which had been carrying LES CRANE . . . DICK CLARK will do a special for CBS sometime in April. It'll be called "Where the Action Is!" and will feature FRANKIE AVALON.

NBC News has a number of documentary specials in the works: "Terror in the Streets" on April 6 deals with aspects of crimefighting across the land. The second in the <u>LBJ</u> series of specials, analyzing "The Great Society," goes on May 2. And the following week there's a special called "The Loyal Opposition." Others in prospect: A sequel to "Decision to Drop the Bomb," and an examination of voting problems facing minorities in New York and California.

Repeats of <u>Hullabaloo</u> will begin this spring and run through the summer . . ABC's <u>Saga of Western Man</u> crew went to England, Holland and to Plymouth, <u>Mass.</u>, for its <u>May</u> 10 show on the Pilgrims . . LEW AYRES--the original Dr. Kildare--has a role in "Kill No More," upcoming on Kraft Suspense Theatre.

Movie marquee--ABC's March 28 flick is "Paris Blues" with PAUL NEWMAN, JOANNE WOODWARD, LOUIS ARMSTRONG, DIAHANN CARROLL and SIDNEY POITIER . . . NBC has "Rhapsody" with ELIZABETH TAYLOR on April 17, and "Annie Get Your Gun" with BETTY HUTTON and HOWARD KEEL on April 24 . . . Two former ABC stars, RICHARD LONG and PETER BRECK, will be back with that network in next season's The Big Valley, starring BARBARA STANWYCK.

We're Missing a Bet in Monte Carlo

Many of our best shows are not entered in Prince Rainier's TV Festival

For hundreds of years the inhabitants of the Riviera have loved festivals. In the Middle Ages, for example, the Feast of Pentecost was celebrated with a race between naked girls—the prizes, it is recorded, being awarded from "municipal funds."

This year, in the principality of Monaco, at the International Television Festival, there were no naked girls, but there was just about everything else, including a genuine 13thcentury prince and a genuine 20thcentury Hollywood princess. And, if the latter was busy having a baby [Princess Grace gave birth to a girl on Feb. 1, two days after the festival ended.—E.], the former left no doubt that this festival is his personal baby. On my very first trip to the palace he asked me if it was true that Queen for a Day—a program by which, on his first trip to the United States, he had evidently been appalled—was still on the American screen. "No, sir," I replied proudly. "It is not." "Ah," he said. "You know, I always thought it was basically a cruel show."

Monaco's festival, personally founded by Prince Rainier, is now in its fifth year. This year 22 countries sent 110 shows—55 of which were placed by the Festival Committee into the finals to be judged by 15 judges from 11 countries.

The president of the judges was Renzo Rossellini, who is vice president of the International Federation of the Society of Authors and Composers and is also a brother of Roberto Rossellini. The two vice presidents were Julian Kuypers, a distinguished Belgian diplomat and writer; and Russia's Nicolas Kartsov, who bore the typically Soviet title of "Director of the Dramatic and Literary Programs of the Soviet State Television." There were also judges from several Iron Curtain countries-albeit one from each-while America had two judges. Hal Humphrey, a syndicated TV columnist, and myself.

And, lest any one of my faithful TV GUDE readers thinks I am not a big man in Monaco, I was officially listed as "Cleveland Amaury" and my official biography read, "At Hartford College, M. Amaury was president of the Hartford Grimson."

Ah, grim it was at ol' Hartford, but no matter. In any case, together in the *Chambre des Jurés*, the 15 judges watched television for six hours a day for 10 days, all the time wearing earphones over which translations were supplied.

In between times, accompanied by our wives, we attended a lunch at the Palace, a dinner at Government House, a play at the Opera House, a gala at the Sporting Club, etc.—usually followed by gambling at the Casino. And if M. Jean Broc, the manager of the magnificent Hotel de Paris, complains that, as he puts it, "In ze old days, ze gambling was for ze pleasure; now it is for ze winning," the fact remains that a good time was had

by all, even M. Kartsov. The latter apparently, though not entirely convincingly, spoke neither French nor English, nor even "Franglais"-which might be said to be the festival's mother tongue-and was invariably shadowed by his interpreter, M. Potapov, a man who has survived, so far, four changes in Russian administration. Another explanation for M. Kartsov's shyness may have been that two years ago a Russian judge. three days before the end of the festival, had a particularly gay evening, laughing and joshing with everybody. That was the last anybody saw of him-he spent the last three days in his room, where, it was explained, he was "indisposed."

The No. 1 prize of the festival, and the one closest to Prince Rainier's heart, is the prize for the program which best contributes to international understanding. This year the winner was the Yugoslavian documentary "Skoplje, Sixty-Three," about the Yugoslavian town destroyed by earthquake and rebuilt by international cooperation.

The most controversial show was a French documentary about Red China called "Fièvre à Pékin," filmed the day after America had, for the first time, bombed the North Vietnam bases. Although the show was not entered in the "understanding" category, the fact remained that it showed mass anti-American rallies. posters showing Americans with not hands but claws, one dripping dollar bills and the other dripping blood, and finally a pageant in a huge stadium in which actors, simulating American bombers, bombed innocent Chinese women and children. (Some of these "innocents," incidentally, were perhaps pictured in another scene in which we saw 12-year-old Chinese girls out on a target range firing machine guns.) I hazarded the opinion to the Hon. Tetsuro Furukaki, the dean of our continued

judges—he is not only "father of Japanese television but also former envoy to France—that it would seem a pity if "Fièvre" got any sort of a prize. "I think so too," he said gently, "but I think you should let that opinion come from one of the more neutral judges."

Later, standing at the window, still trying to let the fresh air in after "Fièvre," I was inconspicuously nudged by Heinz von Plato, the West German judge. "Isn't it interesting," he said slowly, in his stiff but correct English, with just the trace of an ironic smile, "that between us and those people we have just seen, we have, after all, the Russians?"

Our networks fail

How did America do in the festival? The answer, I am sorry to say, is not well. Of our three major networks, CBS saw fit to send no programs, ABC sent them but sent them to the wrong address and, though NBC did send some, it not only sent them late-meaning the interpreter had to make virtually a sight translation for the judges-but also at the last minute decided it wanted to substitute for the remarkable documentary "The Louvre," a show which might well have won, the curious special "The Fantasticks," which was, all the judges agreed, the poorest entry in the entire competition.

Of our other entries, Shelley Winters won the best-actress award for her "Two Is the Number" Bob Hope drama performance, and an honorable mention was won by Walt Disney's "The Hound That Thought He Was a Raccon." Beyond this, however, we won nothing. Although two Profiles in Courage dramas were sent—Mary S. McDowell and Thomas Hart Benton—the fact that there were two hurt rather than helped their chances. Also submitted was "The Battle of the Bulge" documentary. Good as this was, however, it was somehow unenthusiastically received by our fellow judges. In comparison not only with "Skoplje" but also with two Italian documentaries, one on Michelangelo and the other, of all things, on the Oppenheimer case, it seemed to lack both impact and unity.

America also had one independent entry, the Metromedia special "My Childhood," which had Vice President Humphrey and writer James Baldwin, voice-overing scenes from their early days. Again good in their different ways as these narrations were, there was little enthusiasm. Both childhoods seemed visually sparse and lifeless.

In contrast to America, Russia got herself great good will in two directions. In the first place, she won the childrens'-program award with a simple film called "The Winter Oak." In this a schoolchild, always late to school, finally so exasperates his teacher that she insists on going home to speak with his parents about it. On the way they walk through the woods, and he does not have to explain. The snow-covered trees, the animals, the myriad beautiful sights do it for him, and at the end the schoolteacher does not go on to his house but leaves him with an understanding wave.

Red humor

More important than this victory, Russia put on a humorous show. In one episode, a factory water pipe bursts and no one will fix it until the responsibility has been fixed, by which time the board of directors are up to their necks in water. In another episode, a robber holds up a telephone company and none of the girls at the switchboard will pay any attention. One girl is polishing her nails, another is talking to her girl friend, a third is talking to her boy friend. All in all, when the Russians start making fun like this, it seems there is not only hope for international television understanding, but for the world, too.

The Iron Curtain countries also did themselves proud. Czechoslovakia, for example, together with its distinguished TV-director judge, Edouard Hofman, won the "best adaptation from another medium" prize for an imaginative version of "Antigone."

As for Hungary, this country not only produced the most popular of all the judges, a charming gentleman named Istvan Dobos, but also under him—as director of all Hungarian TV drama—won the festival's drama prize for the third straight time, the program being an extremely touching love story of the composer Berlioz in the twilight of his life.

Two shows which literally made everybody feel good—and won prizes as well—were an inspired Italian musical parody of "The Three Musketeers" and a spirited Belgian documentary on pop art in various countries, wonderfully titled "Dieu, Est-Il Pop?"

U.S. was shortsighted

Today, looking back at the festival, I feel it was extremely shortsighted for this country to have made such a poor showing. Although Monaco's festival was little covered by the press in this country, it is widely and avidly covered by scores of the foreign press corps, and the commercial possibilities it offers in selling films abroad, let alone the intangible good will represented, would seem to dictate a less casual attitude on the part of American networks, particularly CBS. As for the other possible American exhibitors-the independents. National Educational Television, etc. -one can only hope that next year they will be fully represented. The way things are now, it is difficult indeed for the American judges to combat the arguments of the government-controlled judges that they are just as free as we are. We know they are not, but over in Monaco we hardly proved our case.

Over and over I found myself in arguments with the Iron Curtain judges, maintaining that there is, under our television system, at least freedom to criticize the government. "Ah," they said, "but is there freedom to criticize your networks?" "Yes," I used to answer, "there is—as long as you don't make the mistake of criticizing the networks you happen to be working for."

Government control

One thing is certain. Even in France the government control is appalling. The distinguished playwright Marcel Achard, who was one of three French judges, told me this: "In my country ze TV-pouf. It is nothing. Zere is a controlled committee, and zev are afraid of offending ze religions, ze governments, ze leaders, ze followers. ze majority, ze minorities, ze everything. Ze present-even ze past-is sacred." He told me that not long ago De Gaulle himself was watching a part-live, part-film documentary, Unfortunately, when the film part was supposed to come on, there was, as M. Achard put it, "pouf-nothing." "Ze next day," he said. "pouf-a new committee."

On the other hand, the judges from all the government-controlled countries were all utterly amazed, and shocked, by the continuing evidence of violence on American TV screenswhich they had seen on American shows sold overseas. "On Russian television," M. Kartsov told me, "we have very little murder, shooting, mayhem, or for that matter, crime of any sort." And I recall the Hungarian, M. Dobos, asking me, half in French and half in English, "Your shootings, your beatings, your cruelty -is it not le sadisme?" It was not easy to answer in any language.

'Hollywood Palace' aerialists do their flying in a parking lot

Since some acts you see on Hollywood Palace need elbow room, to say the least, they have to move to a parking lot for their performance. Which can raise a few complications.

On an unusually cool evening the cannon (top right) had to be warmed. If the barrel were not about 71 degrees, it would land the human ammunition, the Zacchinis, short of the net, 75 feet away.

At night the poles (left) became too damp, and thus slippery and unsafe, so the Nerveless Nocks had to perform in the afternoon.

Then there were the crowds—in the tot (where bleachers for 400 had been set up) and in the streets outside.

"If the people in Hollywood could get used to stores and houses around them being built like hot dogs and doughnuts," said executive producer Nick Vanoff, "we figured they could get used to anything. Yet we had to have city policemen plus page boys to manage the crowds.

"Myself, I can't stand to watch. I have acrophobia. When these aerial acts perform I make sure we have the phone numbers of about four doctors, an ambulance service and a hospital. When the Wallendas performed for us, after their tragic accident, they wouldn't use a net. So I had some men walk around underneath them with a net. I know it wouldn't have done much good, but still it made me feel better."

ONCE A GROUCH, ALWAYS A GROUCH



(Meaning 34 years, 308 movies, scores of TV shows)

It started with the Hollywood version of that grand old comedy classic "You Can't Take It with You." Charles Lane played a tax collector who cast a pall over an otherwise jolly household. He's been casting similar palls ever since, for 34 years, in 308 movies, and scores of TV shows as a tax collector or a grouchy millionaire or an acerbic banker.

Or as a Scrooge-like railroad trouble-shooter named Homer Bedloe who wants to do away with that monument to turn-of-the-century rusticity, the Cannonball Express. That's the role Charles Lane is playing these days, as a semiregular in CBS's Petticoat Junction.

It would be perfectly understandable if, after three and one-half decades of being hissed and booed, Lane's own disposition had turned sour. The truth is that Lane is a highly agreeable man who has long since resigned himself to playing meanies, and is happy with the security that being a meanie has brought.

He lives quietly with his wife Ruth in Brentwood, a fashionable Los Angeles suburb. They have two grown children, a boy and a girl. Like many men. Lane prides himself on a lifetime of work in his chosen profession. And like many men, he has his share of frustrated dreams. His favorite recreational pastime, like many professional men's, is golf. And next to that, listening to opera. He does not sigh for the good old days of Hollywood, as some long-time actors do; he thinks films are better than ever, and TV generally good. But he does express surprise at the fame his Junction part brings, a kind of fame he didn't come close to reaching in 30-odd years of movies.

Sitting in the Hollywood Brown Derby recently, a restaurant that attracts lots of tourists, Lane was asked for his autograph a number of times. He obliged, like a pro, but remarked to his companion, "I haven't been in here in years. What's this autograph bit anyway?

"Y'know," he continued, "I haven't gotten used to the power of TV yet. I'll tell you a secret. I'm even considering doing a personal-appearance tour. I never *dreamed* of doing it before—but they say that people flock to see any TV stars."

If he went on a tour, Lane would, of course, be doing skits and scenes, in the familiar old detestable Homer Bedloe role. I asked him the inevitable question: Doesn't he get tired of always playing the heavy? "Sure, sometimes. But you can understand typecasting-they have a part, and they want to get someone, quick, who they know can do that type of thing. Of course. I'm rarely a real villain-a murderer or the like. I'm the foil for the comic lead to play against. And often it's a meatier part than just an ordinary old good-guy. I've had a lot of fun."

Lane, who has no contract for

Petticoat Junction but plays Bedloe "whenever I'm written into the script," admits that the character is becoming nastier all the time. "I seem to get meaner and meaner, and the meaner I get, the worse my comeuppance. I mean, getting your head stuck through a hole in the canvas and being pelted with tomatoes—that's pretty bad."

You get the feeling Lane would like to add, "and that's also pretty ridiculous," but he doesn't. He has, after all, a living to make, and while he complains that "freelancing is a precarious business," he has done quite well over the years. Still, as with many stage-trained actors, there lurks a secret longing to return to the stage. Lane came to Hollywood from his home town of San Francisco back in 1930 and, like many others, joined the Pasadena Playhouse, learning his skill playing in everything from Shakespeare to Chekhov to Coward. "Tremendous training and discipline that young actors can't get these days."

The stage being a poor way to support a family, Lane stayed in Hollywood, making movies and, later, moving into TV. He has played in *Burns and Allen, I Love Lucy, a* short-lived series with Peter Lawford called *Dear Phoebe*, almost all the comedy shows from *The Real Mc-Coys* to *Gomer Pyle*, and an assortment of whodunits. He has had so many bit parts that he once said that one of the strangest experiences he's ever had was seeing himself in an old movie on TV without the slightest recollection of having done the role.

Now and then he has thought of trying his luck in New York, but each time decided the risk was too great. "Friends of mine went, and some were quite successful," he says a bit wistfully. "Maybe I should have tried, but it was too much of a gamble." Then he adds briskly, "So here I am, still in Hollywood, freelancing. That's something of a gamble too."

SUNDAY: 7:30, Walt Disney; 8:30, Branded; 9, Bonanza; 10, The Wackiest Ship in the Army (war comedy, with Jack Warden and Gary Collins).

MONDAY: 7:30, Hullabaloo (cut to a half hour); 8, The Mister and the Misses (girls'-school comedy, with John Forsythe); 8:30, Dr. Kildare (first of two weekly half-hours); 9, Andy Williams; 10, Run for Your Life (melodrama, with Ben Gazzara).

Colorful Year: All but two of these shows on NBC's fall schedule will be telecast in color (the exceptions: I Dream of Jeannie and Convoy. This high degree of color saturation is unprecedented, but hardly surprising. NBC is, after all, a subsidiary of RCA, which has been pushing color for a decade. There was a surprise, however, the day after NBC revealed its color plans. It came from CBS. That network's new president, John A. Schneider, announced that next year CBS would colorcast the Red Skelton and Danny Kaye shows, most of the films in its new weekly movie series, and a few other shows. Not a massive commitment to color, but a highly significant one. Ever since RCA began its big color push, NBC's enthusiasm for color has been matched only by CBS's apathy. But now, with this small concession, CBS has acknowledged that color is here to stay. No longer can it afford to ignore the fact that color-set sales are booming (3,200,000 sets now in use; predictions of 5,000,000 by next winter), and that viewers, sponsors and local stations are becoming ever more insistent in their demands for color programming. ABC, too, is heeding the multihued handwriting on the wall-it will increase its colorcasting next season to more than five hours a week. -Henry Harding

4:00 GEMINI SPACE FLIGHT

SPECIAL America's first two-man orbital space flight is tentatively scheduled for launching from Cape Kennedy at approximately 6 A.M. The Gemini flight, piloted by astronauts Virgil Grissom and John Young, is planned for three 89-minute orbits around our earth. Project Gemini is an important step in our schedule to land a man on the moon by 1970.

The networks will begin coverage of the countdown at 4 A.M., as Major Grissom and Lieutenant Commander Young prepare to enter their Titan-powered Gemini capsule. Following lift-off, the networks will continue their coverage of the flight until the astronauts are recovered by the aircraft carrier USS Intrepid off Grand Turk Island in the Bahamas. During the flight, there will be remote telecasts from the White House, the astronauts' home towns and NASA facilities across the country.

If today's launch is postponed because of weather or mechanical failure, the networks will resume regular programming, returning to Cape Kennedy on the re-scheduled flight date.

Why Mitch is moanin' mighty low

You don't have to be a music critic to detect a certain lack of harmony between the network, and the kaput kapellmeister and his fans

Inside Macy's a certain whiskered gentleman was being ogled fondly by a circle of shoppers, most of whom were 50 years old, and up. The focus: Mitch Miller—choirmaster of the now defunct NBC show Sing Along with Mitch—who was simply trying to buy a pair of socks.

One woman, slightly dumpy, her arms heavy with bundles, elbowed her way through the crowd, and stood face-to-the-bearded-face. She told Mitch she loved his show. Then she told him she was sore—and why.

"I'm mad because of my mother," the woman explained. "She's 84, and the only thing she lived for was Monday nights when you were on. She's sick about your being off. Everybody in my family's sick about it."

The woman wasn't the only squawker in the crowd. "My whole apartment house is mad because you're not on any more," a man offered. And the saleslady told him that her husband was "so unhappy when NBC yanked you off that I haven't been able to make him happy since!"

So the beefing over Mitch's cancellation went that day in Macy's. Or, rather, so it's been going, according to Mitch, ever since NBC **continued**

failed to renew him last September. This is the way Miller summed up the viewer reaction: "People are just plain mad."

And they must be. NBC has been battered by 17,000 letters of protest ("One of the highest quantities ever received for a show not renewed," is the way the network put it); and this reporter, after trailing Miller around Manhattan for three days, can attest that an impressive number of viewers are, indeed, distressed over their kaput kapellmeister.

One need not be an "insider," of course, to know that TV shows are dumped because of ratings. But "It ain't necessarily so," chirps Mitch. "My ratings were good enough and I was fully sponsored," he claims. Why, then, the blackout? "NBC saved money by knocking me off," he charges. "Just check and you'll see."



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So we checked. The result might be called a chronicle of a cancellationand the bitter reaction of the canceled show's star and his particular public. You don't have to skip to the last page to learn that it was Nielsen's numbers that dealt Mitch Miller his coup de grâce. (Last spring before Sing Along went into summer reruns, Mitch's Nielsen hovered between 11 and 14. A 17 rating is considered the cutoff point below which a show is highly eligible for cancellation.) The case history provides a revealing glimpse of what happens when a shining TV star starts to dim.

NBC: audience interest too low

We start at the end—and with NBC. Here is the official statement issued by the network regarding the ouster: "After three years, Mr. Miller's sponsor and audience interest had lowered to the point where we felt it was necessary to make a change."

Mitch, of course, disputes NBC's claim that his show had "had it." He says there are those 17,000 letters and all those people bellyaching to him on the street. "Besides," Mitch boasts, "I've just come back from a concert tour where we did sellout business everywhere. And NBC knows it too." Anyway, one of NBC's top brass knows it because, as Mitch tells it: "When we played San Francisco, Mort Werner, NBC's head of programming the very man who told me that I was through—had to use his influence with me to get his mother a seat."

Mitch goes on: "NBC had its '64-65 schedule tentatively set by January. I didn't find myself on it. 'Don't worry about the schedule,' Mort Werner told me. 'You'll be on it. We still love you.' Then, three days before my option was up in March, they told me that I was through.

"Later Werner came to me and said, 'The same kind of programming philosophy that prompted us to put you on as a new show in 1961 tells us that we should now find something new, fresh and exciting.' That completely took the wind out of my sails. Maybe they did have a new secret weapon in mind. So what do they come up with as my replacement? *Alfred Hitchcock*. What's new, fresh and exciting about *Alfred Hitchcock*?"

What does NBC have to say about all this? Very little, for after December 1963, Mitch's ratings bumped along at a level deemed less than satisfactory by NBC. By March 1964 he was neck and neck with CBS's limping *East Side/West Side*. Further, NBC maintains that Miller was only 68 percent sponsored for the first quarter of '64. It was able to slip Hitchcock in last fall fully sold. (*Next* fall, it now appears, Hitch will go the way of Mitch —the Hitchcock show does not figure in NBC's or anyone else's plans for 1965-66.)

Mitch: 'it's the money'

Mitch thinks he knows why the network isn't talking. "It's the money part they don't want to get into," he says. "Both my show and the Hitchcock show cost the same, \$130,-000. But NBC had to pay me \$35,000 a rerun and they got the Hitchcock reruns for nothing."

On the merits of the case, it would seem the network was entitled to make whatever business decision it deemed necessary. But Mitch looks at it another way. "I know that NBC doesn't owe me a living," he says. "And sure, I had something to lose by being canceled. For one thing, the \$7000 I cleared on every show. But it's not the money. I can live very comfortably on the royalties from my albums alone. What I'm genuinely concerned about is the viewer who wants-and is currently being denied -my kind of music. I don't say it was the best in the world, but it had an emotional appeal for many people."

Indeed it did—and still does. The sofa sing-alongers (Mitch says 55 percent of the audience actually *did* chime in at home) remain steadfastly loyal.

On an escalator at the B. Altman department store a mink-coated lady spotted Mitch and spouted: "You were beginning to make singers out of all of us. So what happens? They give us *Hitchcock*. Who needs *Hitchcock*? You go to bed scared to death!"

In a Grand Central Station bar a well-oiled commuter slurred: "What a hellava show you had there, Mitch. Boy, we miss you. Wait'll I tell my wife I met you. She'll kiss me for the first time in years!"

A show of viewer loyalty

Multiplied nation-wide, this sampling of viewer response undoubtedly would result in an impressive show of viewer loyalty. One may wonder, then, why Mitch's ratings were not flourishing. The answer apparently lies in the fact that the cancellation backlash is coming from Miller's hardcore following-a hapless group who, though loyal, have little effect on ratings. Dr. George Weinberg, statistics expert, once pinpointed this problem when he criticized the Nielsen scale as measuring only the proportion of people preferring a show and not the intensity of viewer involvement. Said Weinberg: "Nielsen washes away those shows that powerfully affect the lives of few but do not have great, general appeal."

One thing is certain. Miller's effect on the "few" was—and still is—considerable. That the minority appeal should always be sacrificed for the mass appeal is, of course, a TV problem of long standing. And despite Nielsen's and NBC's thumbs-down verdict, the bearded maestro isn't throwing in the TV towel yet. Says he: "There's a place for my show on TV and I'm going to find it."

But nothing else about Dorothy Malone is quite so clear

In the current furor over Peyton Place-network titans battling studio titans over story line, critics and citizens' groups denouncing the series, censors sharpening their blue pencils and networks falling over each other in their rush to duplicate the show's success-the news item went practically unnoticed. "Dorothy Malone, the Academy Award-winning actress now playing Constance MacKenzie in Peyton Place," it said in effect, "is huddling with producer Paul Monash demanding more to do and threatening to quit unless they begin to concentrate on her rather than co-stars Mia Farrow and Barbara Parkins."

Over the past few months I had had several talks with Miss Malone, and had brought away the impression of an aggressively pleasant yet tightly controlled woman who, in the tradition of the old-time movie star, cared more for appearances than realities. Throughout a stormy career she kept insisting that acting was "fun, fun, fun—not the agonizing job it is for some actresses." Marriage, the record shows, was inevitably "a wonderful institution" even though Dorothy had tried it once at the age of 34 with disastrous results. She and her husband, the fiery French actor Jacques Bergerac, had set something of a record for outspokenness in divorce court.

Now, however, she apparently had taken a stand in the celebrated Battle of Peyton Place (TV GUDE, Jan. 16 and 23). I had visions of the onetime Oscar winner (in 1956 for Best Supporting Actress in "Written on the Wind") locked in a battle of her own, commensurate with the standing she once had in the movie colony as one of its leading young actresses. I was certain that she would be anxious to talk about it. I still had a lot to learn.

When I arrived at the big white house in Beverly Hills she was nowhere to be seen. I was greeted, instead, by two little girls—shy, giggly and bewitching. They were home from their usual nursery school session, just for the occasion.

"I'm nearly 5," said one of them in



a high, piping voice.

"Tm already 3," squealed the other. I was dimly aware that the obviously planned presence of Mimi and Diane Bergerac was in line with the Malone policy of "fun, fun, fun," And yet I was equally certain that life could not be all fun, fun, fun for 40-year-old Dorothy Malone. As a young woman she had risen to the top in the business; and yet by her own admission she never really wanted an acting career. Her Oscar credentials should have entitled her to the best the town had to offer; and yet her career languished. There had been other such periods during which she turned to public relations for an airline and for a Dallas-based insurance firm.

The result was a wide- continued

spread confusion about who and what Dorothy Malone really was. Bergerac wasn't talking. Indeed, he had done it all in court. "Dorothy and her mother," he had told the judge, "distrust and disparage men. Me in particular." The many, many suitors who paid her court over the years were even less anxious to talk. One of them, actor Scott Brady, said flatly, "She's a good actress, period. I don't care to talk about it." Even to confidantes she remained a mystery.

"Look," one of her oldest acquaintances told me. "Everybody likes Dorothy but nobody knows her, much less understands her. I saw her every day for years and I don't."

Miss Malone appeared in a bright pink sweater, black fringed Capris and dark glasses which she did not remove during the entire course of the interview. We exchanged greetings, admired the children and got down to the business at hand. I asked her about the problems on *Peyton Place*. She replied by telling me how she grew up in Dallas, the product of an upper-middle-class Catholic family; how she majored in languages at Dallas's Southern Methodist University; and how she came out to Hollywood as "sort of a summer lark."

"Uh-about Peyton Place?" I ventured.



"Oh, yes," she said pleasantly, "I loved the part of Constance when I first read it. I have loved everything in my life. I have had fun. School was fun, those blue ribbons I won for swimming and horsemanship were fun, even grades were fun.

"You see, I never tried to build a career. I never really expected to be here in the first place. My mother certainly never expected I would stay. Not till I bought a house in 1955 was she really convinced."

'A lovely, feminine occupation'

Why had she persisted with acting at all? There was a pause. "Well, it's such a lovely, feminine occupation the makeup, the hairdos, the clothes. And then, too, you're not competing with men.

"I could have been just as happy doing any number of things. Teaching, for instance. I love children. Or dress designing. Or I'd love to travel overseas for the Government. The truth is, I have no ambition. Things work out better when I don't rely on my own judgment."

Her judgment told her Jacques Bergerac was a man with whom she had "interests in common; a softspoken Frenchman trying to learn American ways." Then they were married. "Suddenly he changed," she said sadly. "He wasn't shy at all. He went back to the old freedom-loving ways."

PLEASE, ALL ANSWER AT ONCE

A new TV teaching technique encourages student thinking

"Educational television is a one-way street," John C. Villaume, president of the International Correspondence Schools, said recently. "The individual viewer has no sense of participation, and as a result, tedium and boredom often set in." That needn't be the case any more, if a new TV teaching technique gains broad acceptance.

It's called Educasting, and it depends on a complex device which allows a student to give answers to multiplechoice questions while a lecture is in progress. Briefly, it works this way: The student sits at a simple console having five push buttons and a small TV monitor. He wears a headset, through which he hears the voice of the instructor, whose picture is appearing on a large television screen at the front of the classroom.

The lecturer sprinkles his talk with questions, and each time he does, the large screen displays quadrants containing the possible answers. The student is invited to press a button on his console corresponding to the answer he thinks is correct. When he does, a voice in his earphones tells him whether he's right or wrong and why. Simultaneously, a visual representation of the correct answer appears full-screen on his own monitor, thereby impressing itself firmly on the student's mind while he listens to why his choice was right or wrong. Then he presses a fifth button to clear his monitor, and the lecture goes on until the next question.

"It's a very simple thing, but it solves many problems in educational broadcasting," says Norman S. Livingston, president of TuTorTape Laboratories, Inc., which developed the system. (International Correspondence Schools supplies the educational programming.) "No longer need the student be a passive bystander during classroom use of television. This keeps him active, and even gives him individual attention."

It's expected that a broad range of subjects will lend themselves to this new style of learning: driver training, social studies, courtroom techniques for young lawyers (where a mock trial can be dramatized in "stop action," interspersed with multiple-choice questions), the teaching of job skills, and the instruction of illiterates in reading and arithmetic.
