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Flipper and The American Sportsman

Take a show with a static premise, poor actors, incredible dialog and highly improbable situations and what do you have? Not very much. But then you stir thoroughly, add water and, most important, a fish. And now what do you have? Flipper, probably the best new children's show on the air, and one which is curiously engrossing, week after week, for adults. There is tension even in the most ridiculous situations—tension somehow seems to justify plot after plot that you just know didn't, wouldn't and even couldn't, happen.

It's all due, of course, to that fish. And, make no mistake about it, Flipper, whose real name is Suzy, is not only no ordinary fish, she isn't even a fish at all. Like all good dolphins, she is a mammal; and as a porpoise with a purpose she's something. She can extricate Ranger Porter Ricks (Brian Kelly) and his sons Sandy and Bud (Luke Halpin and Tommy Norden) from virtually anything. On her

very first show she directed the rescue of a scientist trapped in a submarine, and in one recent episode she not only saved the park from a congresswoman (Maggie Hayes) who was going to close it up, but she also, on the way home, took care of a hurricane. And when dialog falters, as it invariably does on this show, she can even supply that. In fact, Flipper's warning-a fascinating, head-shaking "Unh-hunh"-is by now a good deal clearer to her audience than it apparently is to Ranger Ricks, a man without whose inevitable "I've got to go off on an emergency, boys; I'm leaving you in charge" there would be no plot at all.

In contrast to all this, for which NBC deserves high marks, ABC has come up with a four-episode, hourlong series covering the world of hunting and fishing and called The American Sportsman. Here the narration is inept, the fishing is boring, the bird shooting pathetic, and the "he-man" exchanges embarrassing ("Look at those ever-lovin' birds! Hey man! Cock-a-baby!"). And everything they kill on those African safaris, of course, they're killing for the good of the poor, fear-maddened natives, all of whom are apparently refugees from the latest Joe Levine picture. In one sequence actor Robert Stack "bravely" shoots, at a distance of approximately one light-year, a feeble old lion who is billed as a "killer" ("The tribe will remember a man named Robert Stack -a friendly, capable man, an American sportsman"). In another, Joe Foss brings down, again a country mile away, an elderly, bewildered onetusk elephant who is gently trotting along-and Foss, in turn, is billed as "standing in the way of the thundering, massive charge of a rogue elephant." In one show we heard the "Sportsman" defined as "the certain sense of good in each of us." Honestly, Sport, that's what the man said.


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

There's no doubt that people who buy color sets intend to get their money's worth. They're watching color programs no matter what's on the air at the same time in black and white.

The Bell Telephone Hour, as an example, is usually to be found among the bottom 10 programs in the over-all ratings. In most cities it is telecast in color on NBC. The Fugitive, one of the Top 10 programs, is telecast in black and white on ABC. In color homes, Bell Telephone Hour has a greater audience than The Fugitive. TW3 does better than Petticoat Junction and Peyton Place on Tuesdays. Hazel beats Peyton Place Thursdays. These are a few of the significant facts turned up by American Research Bureau, which sampled 4600 blackand-white homes and 4600 homes last November and recently released its findings. ARB says color programs get 80 percent more audience in homes with color sets than in homes with black-and-white sets.

In color homes, 13 of the 15 top programs were NBC color offerings. The black-and-white shows in the color homes' top 15 were NBC's Bob Hope special and ABC's Bewitched. In black-and-white homes, NBC managed to land only one program in ARB's Top 10, only four in the top 15. With viewers rushing to buy color sets in what the Wall Street Journal terms a "stampede" that has emptied the warehouses, it would seem to behoove all networks to telecast more of their programs in color. Soon (NBC says the time already has come) there will be so many color sets in use that whether a show is in color or not will greatly affect its over-all rating.


Eventually, of course, it won't make any difference. Nearly all shows will be in color so that color alone won't give a program an advantage over its competition.

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A VISIT TO A VIDEOLAND DISASTER AREA

The producer of 'The Entertainers' cries a lot—
and, boy, does he have reason! BY NEIL HICKEY

One day recently, a visitor asked Joe Hamilton—producer of CBS's *The Entertainers* and husband of Carol Burnett, one of its stars, how he and his staff occupied most of their time in the five-day work schedule required to fabricate the show.

"Well, we cry a lot," Hamilton

There was reason for tears. *The Entertainers* had won a reputation as television's hard-luck show, a sort of videoland disaster area.

It all started last year when CBS's program experts discerned in their 1964-65 schedule the need for a dab of bright color in the dark places where Garry Moore and his "family" once roamed. Bob Banner, who had packaged Moore's show, had an idea for a comedy-musical series built around a repertory company of players. CBS liked the idea and bought it without even asking to see a pilot. Banner then hired Carol Burnett, Bob Newhart, Caterina Valente, Tessie O'Shea, Art Buchwald, and a crew of singers, dancers and comics.

The Entertainers went on the air last September, and in no time at all it was arousing rampant apathy among viewers. The early reviews were disappointing and ratings anemic. But the producers believed that interest in the show would build.

It was, in fact, building slightly even though Carol Burnett had been jarred during a taxi ride, aggravating an old injury to her cervical vertebrae, just at the base of her neck. Then she entered a hospital for three weeks in October, and thus began an absence that was to last 10 weeks altogether and hurt the show.

Hurriedly, the producers began lining up other talent to buttress the show. They signed Imogene Coca; she sprained an ankle and was reduced to reading her lines from a swivel chair. Gwen Verdon was the choice another week; shortly before the taping she broke a bone in her foot, thereby

severely limiting her value to the show.

Still determined to snare the public's fickle fancy, Banner and Hamilton signed up a couple of rock 'n' roll groups. It helped the rating, all right, but it also drove Bob Newhart over the edge. He was quitting the show, he told them, because the studio audiences were so young they didn't understand his humor. ("I mentioned Wernher Von Braun in one routine," he told us, "and it was obvious from the response that few in the audience had heard of him.")

Newhart said he'd stay around until Carol Burnett returned, but after that he aimed to go home to California and play golf. Caterina Valente, who had planned to fill engagements in Europe in November and December, had pretaped her regular stints for this period but was unavailable to do any extra work. And Ernie Flatt, the show's choreographer, quit to create some dances for Mitzi Gaynor specials.

Show of threads and patches

Thus, for two months, *The Entertainers* became a show of threads and patches, with all the seams in plain view; a scrapbook of pretaped segments and unintegrated sketches, and frequently no continuity at all. It was the glummest period in the show's already unhappy childhood.

Finally, Carol Burnett's doctors announced she could return to action for the first show of 1965. Caterina Valente would be back the following week, and the brilliant Peter Gennaro was the new choreographer. Tessie O'Shea's option was not renewed, in the interests of cutting down the great on-stage manswarm which had characterized the show in the past.

For the first time, things were look-ing up.

But wait. The producers of the deceased musical called "Fade Out—Fade In" had something to say continued

about all this. Carol had been starring in the show (simultaneously with her TV chores) when she became ill. The show's producers had attempted to get an injunction to prevent some tapes she had made from being shown on *The Entertainers*. They had lost \$500,000, they contended, because of her departure.

At the same time, they had filed breach-of-contract charges against her with Actors Equity, the theatrical union. Miss Burnett promptly had filed countercharges alleging the producers were out to destroy her as a performer and were "attacking her personal and

professional integrity."

An extended series of rather embittered hearings got under way behind closed doors at Actors Equity to resolve the claims on Miss Burnett's services. And this hassle, too, would affect *The Entertainers* in about another six weeks.

What the doctors say

That's where it all stood as the New Year began and Miss Burnett rejoined The Entertainers at the show's rehearsal spaces atop New York's Park-Sheraton Hotel. Her neck swaddled in a padded support, she chatted with us about her recent life and hard times. "I'm going to be very nervous at the taping on Friday," she said. "Ten weeks is a long time to be out of action. This is like a whole new thing for me. The doctors don't think I can ever do rough comedy sketches again. No tap-dancing, no running, no falls. I can still make faces, though. They can't take that away. The only way out of this predicament is surgery, and neither I nor the doctors want to do that. We're hoping that isometric exercises"-she placed the heel of her hand to her temple and pressed hard-"will help, but it will be a slow process."

What about the show? Was she regretful about having joined up with it in the first place? "Well, you're always hoping for a smash hit, and this wasn't. It wasn't really publicized enough. At the start, the show had no focal point, such as a Garry Moore. And The Addams Family, which we were opposite then—a show with marvelous teen-age appeal—came on the air two weeks before us. So for many reasons we weren't doing too well in the ratings. It's a hard kind of show to make work."

Another hot potato

Around the end of January, yet another hot potato was dropped into *The Entertainers'* bubbling stew. Actors Equity ended its hearings on Carol Burnett's dispute with the "Fade Out—Fade In" producers. On Feb. 15, said an announcement, the show would reopen on Broadway and Miss Burnett would be back.

For public consumption, the story was that Miss Burnett felt well enough to resume her role, and the "Fade Out—Fade In" producers accordingly were dropping their breach-of-con-

tract charges.

So Miss Burnett resumed the bonewearying schedule of eight performances a week on Broadway, while continuing her already heavy responsibility as mainstay and backbone of *The Entertainers*—and all this while her physical condition was so unsatisfactory as to impinge seriously upon her on-stage mobility.

It was the last straw for *The Entertainers*. Miss Burnett's value to the show was now diluted even further by this added drain on her professional, physical and emotional resources.

"I'm beginning to believe that somebody up there doesn't like us," a cast member said, one day recently.

Apparently he was right. The Entertainers leaves the air for good this Saturday, March 27.

Jack Soo proves that a Japanese-American

isn't limited to opening doors or cutting lawns on TV

As Hal Kanter, the producer-writer and creator of *Valentine's Day* recalls the moment, he had flown to Las Vegas for the express purpose of hiring Jack Soo to co-star with Tony Franciosa in his ABC series. Soo, at the time, was headlining for the fifth straight year in "Flower Drum Song," the Rodgers-Hammerstein fortune cookie then rounding out its tenure on the Thunderbird stage. They conferred in the hotel, the 30-year veteran of the comedy-writing wars and the California-born nisei with deep pride in his Japanese heritage.

"Well?" said Kanter, script in hand.
"Well, I'll tell you this," Soo replied, "I'm not going to play an
Oriental Uncle Tom."

"You think I'd write such a stereotype?" Kanter demanded. "Just read the script. That's all I ask."

Soo reached out for the script-

"He took it," Kanter remembers, "as though it were a cobra he hoped wouldn't bite him"—and began, begrudgingly at first, to read. After he had read nearly a third of Kanter's dialog, a smile crossed his broad features and he nodded agreeably. He read aloud: "'Val and Rocky are seated alone in the living room. Rocky goes to mix drinks for two.'" He turned to Kanter. "That's all I have to read," he said. "When do we start?"

In the foregoing stage directions a subtle point had been registered—as Rocky, the flip-talking Oriental manof-all-work, Soo would be playing not a subservient but an equal, a drink-mixing friend to his employer (a free-wheeling bachelor-publisher played by Franciosa). An ineffably subtle point, to be sure, but to Jack Soo, born Goro Suzuki, it was a highly significant one.

Although Soo carries no banners, he is a man sensitive to the racial nuance. "I think it's a good thing, our show," he said one day, sitting in a canvas-back chair on the Valentine's Day set at 20th Century-Fox in Hollywood. "The public accepts Rocky. Now maybe they'll accept the fact that there are a lot of comtemporary Orientals. We're not a bunch of ricky-ticky stereotypes who do nothing but wash shirts and cook fried rice. Me. I can't even cook sukiyaki. Most Occidentals have no idea what my role of Rocky means to the image of the Oriental. what it means to see a Japanese-American who isn't a door opener or a lawn cutter. And we aren't preachy."

Sleepy-eyed and large-boned—he weighs around 190 and stands over 6 feet tall—Soo bears a slight resemblance to Robert Mitchum and sounds like Maxie Rosenbloom, which (as Rocky might say) is a long-shot parlay for anyone. Hal Kanter, whose close friendship permits him a personal kind of ribbing, calls him "an Oriental Phil Harris." Soo, Kanter insists, is "the only man on television with a CinemaScope face. His eyes are so far apart there's space for three noses. Jack Soo is also a dear, sweet, gentle human being."

Tony Franciosa agrees: "There's this winning sweetness about Jack. As an actor, he has a marvelous sense of reality and that makes his humor believable." After 20 years of marriage, Jack's wife, Jean, a tall comely brunette of Yugoslavian descent and a former New York model, has this to say about her husband: "Jack is kind. He's uncomplaining. He never forgets a birthday or an anniversary. He's wonderful with the children." (The Soos have three-Jayne, 19; James, 18, and Ricky, 13.) "I hate to sound like lucky Pollyanna but Jack really one in a million."

To find a detractor, in fact, one must return to Jack Soo himself. "I'm lazy," Jack says, his hands gripping and regripping a golf club. "I procrastinate. I worry all the time instead of enjoying what I have." When asked if Rocky is an extension of his own personality, Soo shakes his head. "Only in looks are we alike," he says. "Rocky is a schemer, an easygoing plotter. I'm a slow, cautious fretter. Rocky is free with his dough, a gambler. I'm—well, I tend to be frugal. If I'm close with a buck it's because I know what it takes to earn a buck."

Soo's awareness of the material can be traced, with no Freudian mumbojumbo, to his formative years during the Depression and to a bleak, dehumanizing period in World War II Japanese-Americans West Coast were corralled into what were euphemistically known as relocation centers. One of two sons born to George and Haruko Suzuki. both first-generation Japanese, Jack grew up in Oakland, Cal., in a mixed, non-Oriental neighborhood. The elder Suzuki, a tailor, died in 1929. Thereafter Jack's mother-she died in 1949 -worked as a dressmaker to support her two children. "I was what the Japanese call a 'yogore,' a bum," Soo recalls. "The first-generation Japanese. a proud people, like to see their sons study for a profession. But I had no eyes for a profession. I just lazy'd along, going to movies all the time."

Prodded by his mother, Jack attended the University of California at Berkeley for three years, uncertain of his professional goal. Young Soo had already felt the stirrings common to would-be performers—the attention from audiences at singing contests, the still-remembered applause of a junior high school class when Soo spoke for a half hour on sports in an oratory contest. When a stage company in San Francisco announced plans to present Philip Barry's "These Few Ashes," whose cast included one Oriental, Soo left college continued

for a stab at the theater.

After a brief run the play folded, and Soo, a fast hand with a quip, decided he was a night-club comedian. He tried his wings first at Andy Wong's Sky Room in San Francisco's Chinatown. "The laughter," he recalls, "was polite." Later he knocked around night clubs in the Bay Area, scoring no particular impact.

Uprooted by war

Then with Pearl Harbor was ushered in the peculiar chapter in history in which isolation was forced on thousands of Americans of Japanese ancestry. At first the Soo family—Jack, his mother and brother—was encamped at Tanforan race track near San Francisco, later being moved to Camp Topaz, Utah, where they lived for a year in barracks as virtual prisoners.

Today, the wounds to his dignity largely healed, Soo is inclined to view the episode philosophically. "Certainly it was unfair to assume that we weren't loyal Americans, but maybe it had to be done," he says. "A wrong was committed but the end result probably brought more good than harm. Relocation helped break up a lot of Oriental ghettos; it speeded up assimilation."

Soo's first postwar job was in a Chinese restaurant-night club Cleveland, first as bartender, then as resident emcee. He drifted around the Middle West, singing songs and telling snappy one-liners. By 1948 Soo was working at the Vine Gardens in Chicago as emcee-singer on the bill with a dour-faced young comic out of Philadelphia, a newcomer named Joey Bishop. A rapport quickly developed between the two and Bishop began including Soo as an informal unrehearsed part of his own act. "One night we started kidding around on the floor and we just kept it up," says Bishop, one of Soo's biggest boosters. "I'd say, 'Be careful, Soo, you can be replaced by a Bendix.' Or, 'You better learn those lyrics, Soo, there's a lot of slow boats leaving.' Real class stuff. Jack always had a sharp comedy mind and wonderful timing."

Soo adds: "Working with Joey for a year and a half was an education in comedy. Joey gave me confidence. He made me a pro." Soo moved on to Boston and for nearly 10 years he worked in clubs in New England. "Just when I was ready to throw in the towel," Soo relates, "from out of the blue, providentially, Rodgers and Hammerstein write a musical called 'Flower Drum Song.' It changed my life." Jack landed a minor role and served as understudy to the star, Larry Blyden, who subsequently left the show. Soo stepped in and played Sammy Fong, the glib Chinatown night-club owner, for the next five years on Broadway, on tour, in the movie version and at Las Vegas. leading to the fateful meeting with Hal Kanter.

The good life

Today, when he isn't worrying, Jack Soo enjoys his hard-won success with quiet pleasure. After years of apartment living and home renting, he has bought his first house, a four-bedroom home in the pleasant Hancock Park section of Los Angeles. He also indulges his hobby of golf-at his best he shoots to a 10 handicap. During the lunch break he usually gulps a sandwich alone in his convertible and then scurries across the boulevard to hit balls at a driving range. Kanter spotted him one day, wolfing down a sandwich in his car. "You shouldn't do that, Jack," he said, playfully. "Tourists will see you and think we're practicing discrimination."

"Okay," Jack said with a grin.
"When I eat my sandwich, I'll keep the top up."

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STALKING THE HUNTER



Lawrence E. Spivak,

In 1962, an article on Lawrence Spivak of *Meet the Press* appeared in Newsweek magazine. It was called "Question Man," and began with a take-off on the Spivak method of interrogation—a method which has been analyzed and described hundreds of times in the 19 years of *Meet the Press*:

Lawrence Spivak: General Washington, sir, on Sept. 19 you said, and I quote, "I hold the maxim no less applicable to public than to private affairs, that honesty is always the best policy." Did you intend that remark to be taken literally?

Washington: Yes.

Spivak: You said "always."

Washington: Yes.

Spivak: Am I really to understand then, sir, that during the whole of the Revolution—six years—you at no time misled the British in any way? Washington: Well, Mr. Spivak, I was not speaking of wartime there.

Spivak: General, you have not answered the question. You used the word "always." Do I understand that you are now saying you want to change that?

Washington: No.

Spivak: General Washington, "always" means wartime, peacetime, any time—I want to know if you think honesty is always the best thing to go with? Washington: Yes, sir, it is, but sometimes one must settle for next best.

Moderator: Gentlemen, I'm afraid our time is up. . . .

This type of interviewing, which Mr. Spivak directs impartially at all guests, has been described as "aggressive," "challenging," "probing," "nagging," "waspish" and "hounding."

Equally detailed passages have appeared in print describing Mr. Spivak himself, as he engages in this process. Newsweek has described him as "an exasperated baby owl . . . radiating almost total suspicion of his famous guests." And Bob Lardine of the New

York Daily News has written: "Spivak's eyes focus on the man in an unremitting stare. His voice, normally just a shade above a whisper, and Caspar Milquetoast-like in tone, suddenly becomes harshly demanding, with a nononsense quality to it."

But when these descriptions of the interviewing process terminate, there is a strange silence about the rest

of Mr. Spivak.

In fact, the rest of Mr. Spivak has proved singularly inaccessible to trained observers. NBC newsmen who have associated with him for years are unable to comment on his personality. NBC executive Bob McHendrix says, "I'm not aware of any of his characteristics as a personality. He's hard to characterize. At parties, he's very withdrawn. You'd never notice him. In the studio you don't know he's around. He walks over to his chair. Maybe he says a word to the director. Then he goes on the air and you see—Lawrence Spivak."

As for his opinions, no one for more than a decade has given any public sign of knowing what they are. Reporters characteristically complain that, in the words of Joe Botsford in the Milwaukee Sentinel, "Spivak was a tough man to interview because he was reluctant to express any views whatsoever."

The truth is, off the air Spivak projects almost nothing in the way of a personality. He is a little (5-feet-3), thin, pointy-nosed man who scurries around stiffly, speaking in a low, affable voice and looking utterly unimportant. He is an unusually colorless man, physically. He has a pale face, pale gray eyes, pale gray hair and he often wears spectacles with pale gray rims. Caspar Milquetoast is almost too swashbuckling a description. He is a pale gray, friendly little wraith.

And yet Lawrence Spivak has led anything but a pale gray little life. He has played a somewhat curious role in the American culture for almost four decades: He might well be called a broker of the intellect. The way some men deal in wheat and others in eggs, Lawrence Spivak has dealt in ideologies, usually controversial.

In the 1920's, while Spivak was still a budding journalist, the American Mercury magazine was co-founded and edited by the flamboyant postwar cynic, H. L. Mencken. "My aim," Mencken wrote, "is to combat by ridicule and invective, American piety, stupidity, and tin-pot morality, progressives, professional moralists, patriots, Methodists, osteopaths, Christian Scientists, Socialists, single-taxers—in brief, the whole doctrine of democracy."

Business manager, then publisher

In 1934 Lawrence Spivak became business manager of the Mercury and in 1939 became its publisher.

By then the Mencken vein had worn thin and the magazine turned its attention to a new enemy—Communism. "It was," says Spivak today, "the most intelligently anticommunist magazine in the country..." The Daily Worker kept an unrelenting blast on him, called the Mercury under his direction "the chief organ of the Fascist intellectuals in America."

In 1935 Spivak's union policies made headlines. His staff of seven office workers went on strike for higher pay and the Mercury announced the strike in a scoffing press release: "The World Revolution hit the American Mercury at high noon today. After a brief and polite skirmish, however, the embattled editors managed to hold the fort." Spivak insisted then, and still does today, that the strike was Communist inspired. Whether it was or not, some liberal newsmen berated him. Heywood Broun described Spivak and his colleagues as little Neros who watched Rome burn while "performing on penny whistles and continued

playing them out of tune." Intellectuals picketed the Mercury. Spivak gave the strikers their raise.

By 1945 Spivak was on radio with "Meet the Press," and he blasted with a vengeance such men as Henry Wallace and Sen. Claude Pepper. He advocated kicking the Soviet Union out of the UN: "I'd throw the Soviets out of there, and get down to business." And, calling the Federal Communications Commission a "small group of Government censors," he declared that the FCC "ought not now or at any time have the power to determine what programs go on American radio."

In a guest-column in the Washington Times Herald in 1947, Spivak emitted one of his last major ideological blasts: "When I was a boy, a liberal was one who looked upon the state as . . . a necessary evil, to be watched night and day. Today, a 'liberal' is likely to be one who looks upon the state as a panacea."

Sells the Mercury

It was one of his last blasts, doubtless because, in 1947, Spivak's show went on network television. After a brief suspension of the show by NBC and a series of ominous headlines ("Ad Lib Series Becomes Too Hot for Video," Variety, 1949), Spivak sold the Mercury in 1950 to a liberal Republican. Clendenin J. Rvan, and was never again heard from as an explosive ideologist. "I stopped being a fighting intellectual when I gave up the Mercury in 1950," he says. "I couldn't maintain my position as an impartial interviewer in the eyes of viewers if they knew my political philosophy or position on any particular issue."

His intellectual self-camouflage has been successful. It is impossible today to know what Lawrence Spivak thinks, by even the most penetrating scrutiny of his surface existence. His show is really impartial: He and his writers are equally thoughtful and probing—or random and shallow, depending on your point of view—whether their targets are Democrats or Republicans, liberals or conservatives, union leaders or businessmen. The testimonials that poured in from Washington on Meet the Press's 15th TV birthday in November 1962 came from such assorted people as the late President Kennedy, Adlai Stevenson, Hubert Humphrey, ex-Vice President Richard Nixon and Barry Goldwater.

He's anti-everybody

The former vigorously antibourgeois, antisocialist, anticommunist, antimodern-liberal, Spivak, has reduced himself, today, to one simple position: He is anti-everybody—with his eye on the equal-time section of the Communications Act.

What does he think, when nobody is looking? It's a little hard to say, even when one hears him discourse politically. Here are some of his opinions:

"I still think that the conflict between the individual and the state is the big problem of our time. I was disappointed that there wasn't a real conservative vs. 'liberal' debate on this issue during the last campaign.

"The question I ask is: How much freedom are we willing to sacrifice for how much economic security? I fear that if we keep allowing the Government to handle more and more of our problems, we'll get into trouble. Freedom is a personal concern with me. I couldn't live under any form of dictatorship. I've had something of a love-affair with the kind of country we inherited. I'm a romantic about the United States: It was the kind of country that my father could come to, penniless, as a young immigrant boy, and give me the opportunity of going to Harvard. The day this is finished, what we are is going to be finished.

"I'm strongly for free enterprise, for individual enterprise, for equality of opportunity—to let everyone run the race. . . . The old-fashioned liberal originally was a fighter against concentrated power in the Government. But the contemporary liberals are seeking more concentrated power.

"Socialist Norman Thomas once wrote a piece entitled "The Republicans and Democrats Have Stolen My Platform.' There's no question but that many of the things he stood for have been taken over by both parties.

"I suppose I'd love to be an anarchist . . . yet I see the curtailment of freedom as inevitable, as life becomes

more complex."

To put it more simply, Lawrence Spivak's heart is where Barry Goldwater's is, his head is where Norman Thomas's is, and his feet are planted firmly on the fence. A bipartisan man today, down to the roots of his being, he is ideally tailored for tenure in the world of the Timid Giant—television.

Does he cancel himself out?

There's really only one trouble with Lawrence Spivak's magnificently bipartisan personality. He may win awards, his show may live forever, and he may get fan letters from both the right and left . . . but in a very real sense he seems to have canceled himself out. Since he became a respectable television journalist, he has ceased to exist as a vigorous individual. All that is left of the once roistering little intellectual, who battled and crusaded incessantly for several decades, is a pale little man, with pale gray eyes, pale gray hair, and pale gray frames on his spectacles-a friendly little gray wraith, whose own associates can barely describe himbut who comes to life like "an exasperated baby owl" at 6 sharp on Sunday afternoons, with his nonpartisan "General Washington, sir, on Sept. 19, you said, and I quote . . ."







Decision: The Federal Communications Commission last Friday took another step toward curtailing network control of evening programming. In essence, the proposed new FCC rule would limit financial interest of the three major networks-ABC, CBS and NBC-to 50 percent of prime time shows exclusive of news shows. Reportedly, by a vote of 5 to 2-commissioners Robert E. Lee and Rosel Hyde dissenting-the FCC decided to ask for written evidence and comment from opponents and proponents of the rule. Oral hearings may or may not be held later. "What we're doing," a Commission official said, "is saying that we think this thing is worth exploring further."

Busted: For a fellow who's been fired, Robert Lansing is taking it rather well. Last week, ABC announced that Lansing will be replaced by Paul Burke (Naked City) as the star of 12 O'Clock High next season, when the show will be moved to Monday at 7:30. The network said it believed that the audience watching at that hour would be better able to identify with a colonel, as played by Burke. than a general, as played by Lansing.

"I am as happy about this as I ever have been about anything," said Lansing. "It's the ideal career-maker to make a show for a year and be a success in it." Lansing's apparent joy at being fired may have rested in the fact that ABC is thinking of putting him in another series, and there may be a movie in the offing.



THEY'VE GOT NO KICK COMING

A personable, agreeable young man with a quick smile, he worked his way up from a smalltime night-club act to a starring role on Broadway in "Bye Bye Birdie." But somehow he never quite made it in television, although CBS tried him out as a master of ceremonies and panelist and ABC put him in a short-lived Kaffeeklatch called Mother's Day. Now, seven years later, Dick Van Dyke is star of his own toprated TV show and of the movie box-office smash "Mary Poppins." He lives, with his wife and four children, in a comfortable, 37year-old home on two acres of land in the San Fernando Valley. He says:

"At first I wasn't even very interested in doing this show—I hadn't done any TV for a year. I don't know why they called it The Dick Van Dyke Show. It's been great for me, but the name didn't mean much.

"After the show was sold and we moved out here from New York, we lived in Mandeville Canyon in Brentwood, which is pretty exclusive. It took us about two years to find we weren't the Brentwood type. continued

"Next year will be the last one for *The Dick Van Dyke Show*. There are just so many ideas, and we've used most of them already. I have movie contracts with Disney and Columbia, and I'm planning to star in the screen version of John Henry Faulk's book, 'Fear on Trial.'

"We still have a lot of fun on this show, but we've quieted down. It used to be so wild on the set that we never got anything done.

"The great thing the show has done is make us all more secure financially. But there are other things that aren't so pleasant. When I went Christmas shopping, the security guards at the store had to spirit me out a back door to my car. I never did get any shopping done. Of course, there are some places I can go where people really know me, like church—just last Sunday we had a going-away party for our youth minister."

Although Mary Tyler Moore had been a dancer since she was 8 years old and had appeared frequently on television, she was probably best known for the role of "Sam," David Janssen's leggy secretary in Richard Diamond, whose face was never seen—only her legs. Now, married to an NBC vice president—her second husband—she lives in a new home in the plush Royal Oaks section of the San Fernando Valley. She says:

"Just recently I wrote a letter to the sponsor, trying to explain what this show has meant to me, and I couldn't. It means too much. It's more than a job, more than a fun thing.

"Losing the part of 'Sam' six years ago was the best thing that ever happened to me. I was getting scale—\$80 a week—and I asked for more money. The casting director said that any girl could play the part and be glad to get the \$80, so they got somebody else. But, after that, other shows seemed to want to use the girl who had played 'Sam.'

"When this came along, I was at the end of a cycle of shows that were on then—77 Sunset Strip, Hawaiian Eye, The Deputy and a lot of others. I wasn't attaining stardom, but I was making a living. I had never done comedy. I played the long-suffering wife of a criminal or the fiancée of somebody that needed Stu Bailey's help. I was the girl next door with freckles—anything but a sexy face.

"Now I have a multiple picture contract at Universal. I've been looking green at Doris Day films for a long time—I don't want to do Shakespeare. But it will be sad leaving this show when it ends. There has been real camaraderie here. Carl Reiner is like a father, Dick a brother, and Rosie and Morey cousins."

After nearly 10 years and two Emmy Awards as Sid Caesar's second banana, Carl Reiner tried starring himself in a TV show which he wrote and produced called Head of the Family. It did not sell, and eventually it became The Dick Van Dyke Show, with Van Dyke as head of the family and Reiner behind the scenes as writer and producer. Now, the very picture of a Hollywood producer, with bald head and big cigar, he says:

"This show has changed my direction completely. Basically I always thought of myself as a performer. Now I'd never go back to being an actor alone. Being moderator of *The Celebrity Game* [which returns to CBS on April 8] gets rid of my neurotic desires to be loved and applauded.

"I didn't have a day off for the first two years this show was on the air, including Saturdays and Sundays. I wrote eight or nine hours every day. Now for the first time I'm collecting residuals. I worked steady on television for 10 years, and when I heard Bob Hope talk about residuals, I thought it was just a local continued

joke, like the La Brea tar pits.

"When I won my first writing award, I couldn't get to sleep. I kept saying to myself, 'You're not the best writer.' My wife kept trying to reassure me. I guess these are the doubts we must have about ourselves, or we become fat cats—and fat cats don't catch rats."

Rose Marie—then Baby Rose Marie—was a star at 3 and a has-been at 12. By the time The Dick Van Dyke Show came along, she was appearing in night clubs and as a panelist and actress on innumerable TV game shows, situation comedies, dramatic and Western programs. Today, she and her daughter live in the same modest home they had five years ago, but last May her husband, trumpeter Bobby Guy, died. Rose Marie says:

"The thing this show has done for

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me is that people recognize me—they know me. It's given me a value—the name is valuable.

"This show is a happy thing. Once in a while Dick will get upset. When he does, he just gets up and goes to the kitchen for some popcorn. That's the only way you can tell. Sometimes when I'm home at night, he'll call and say, 'What are you doing?' I'll say, 'The dishes,' and he'll say, 'Why don't you come over and have a drink? We're just sitting around.' If you can say you love somebody without being mushy, I say we all love that man.

"I don't know what I'll do when the show goes off—probably more television. I've quit playing night clubs. Since Bobby died, I don't go for that sort of jazz any more."

Morey Amsterdam was one of the stars of television's early days, alternating with Jerry Lester as host of Broadway Open House, the first of the late-night shows. He had done local TV in Los Angeles and occasional acting jobs. He was doing guest appearances on various programs when he got on The Dick Van Dyke Show in January 1961. Now he and his family live in a "Chinese-Hawaiian-type house" in an exclusive area of Beverly Hills, and he says:

"There's practically no subject in the world I don't know a joke about, or if I don't know one, I'll make one up. I've been in show business for 40 years, but I've learned more on this show than I ever did before.

"In fact, this show has spoiled me. There's a rapport with other performers you don't get as a stand-up comedian. We spend more time together than with our own families. Top actors are amazed at the way we work, we've worked together so long. It's a mutual respect society—a combo—a syndicate—Laughs, Incorporated. No matter how big Dick Van Dyke gets, he'll never even know he's a star."—Leslie Raddatz



Covering Baseball in Houston

... at a cost of \$31,000,000

In the vast repertory of Texas stories is the one about the Texan who was seated at poker in London. "I'll bet a pound," said an English companion. The Texan countered, "I'll call that pound and raise two tons."

So it is with the citizens of Houston, who, in a sense, have called all bets and raised a couple of tons in the stadium-building poker game in this country. They not only have completed an arena of considerable beauty, but they have put a top on it and stand ready this spring to unveil Harris County Domed Stadium, the first all-weather ball park.

It will, of course, be the home of the Houston Astros (né Colt .45s) and will feature a translucent plastic dome under which some 46,000 seats will be sheltered, even when it rains. Nor will the heavy heat that visits the area in summer be a problem. The park is refrigerated. There is, however, concern over how Texans will respond to cold air.

Originally, the cost of the domed stadium was to be \$15 million. But when Walter O'Malley squandered \$18 million on Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles, proud Houstonians were not to be outstripped. They ran the cost of their park to \$20 million.

It then was announced that Shea Stadium in New York would come in at \$20 million, too. But Houston was game. It managed to get its cost to \$24 million.

New Yorkers made a final bid for the lead by spending \$25.5 million on Shea, which barely has a tarpaulin, much less a roof. But it **continued**

now turns out that Houston has blown an additional \$7 million on access roads, and the mayor of New York has conceded.

Apart from standing as a major civic triumph for the city of Houston, the new park is heaven-sent for ABC, which has signed a \$12 million contract with 18 teams in the big leagues to televise games each Saturday afternoon for two years.

Since, weatherwise, there is only one place in the majors positively reliable, the Houston park must, inevitably, come to be known as Standby Stadium. An ABC official disclosed that on those Saturdays on which weather is threatening the scheduled game, the network will look to Hous-

ton as its ace in the hole. That's provided, of course, that the Astros are home on that particular day.

For the service it is rendering its colleagues and ABC, Houston receives no more than one share of the television money, which will be divided equally among the 18 teams participating in the contract. But the club doesn't figure to be hard-pressed for cash if attendance at the unique stadium approaches what the Astros' management anticipates.

By a process known, presumably, as Astrovision, a team spokesman estimates that 1,500,000 customers will pass through the elegant portals of the domed park this year. This would be roughly 600,000 more than Houston had drawn in a single season and would double last year's attendance.

Chairman of the board and principal angel of the Astros is R. E. (Bob) Smith, who founded the club three years ago with 13 other investors, mostly oilmen like himself. The wealth of Smith is a source of grave conjecture in Texas. Paul Richards, general manager of the Astros, once wrote a skeptic: "Just to keep the records straight, and for your information, the last time the auditors counted R. E. Smith's money, they threw up their hands when the figure reached \$900 million."

Yet, there have been whispers in Houston that Mr. Smith is four-flushing with only \$750 million. It was noted at one time that his income dropped as low as \$500,000 a month. He refuses to dignify with an answer this base rumor.

Craig Cullinan Jr., grandson of the founder of Texaco, served as the original president of the Houston club but yielded the office to Roy Hofheinz, a former local judge, following a management disagreement.

Nor has this been the only ripple on the Houston water. Known at first as the Colt .45s, from the revolver of the same name, the club was forced to drop this sobriquet following a legal rumble with the firearms concern. "It is probably just as well," says Bill Giles, press attaché for Houston. "It gets us away from the cowboy-and-Indian flavor. Houston is known as the Space City and the training grounds of our astronauts. We feel that the nickname of Astros has a forward look."

Board chairman Smith doesn't underestimate the impact on civilization of the new park. Describing it as one of the wonders of the world, he adds, "The Harris County Domed Stadium will be as outstanding a sports arena as was the Colosseum in Rome during its day."

The chief difference, of course, will be the caliber of opposition lined up for the local martyrs. That is, the Astros are bound to be playing a softer schedule.

Reposing on 9½ acres in a central part of Houston, Stand-by Stadium is, unmistakably, an architectural novelty. Its roof is 208 feet above the playing field, equivalent in height to an 18-story building. Every minute an average of 250,000 cubic feet of fresh air will be drawn into the stadium by an elaborate cooling system controlled by a computer. A weather station on the roof of the building will feed temperature reports to the computer every 30 minutes, and the mechanical brain will adjust the air flow inside.

Another engaging feature of Standby Stadium will be a \$200,000 television gondola which operates by push button between the dome and the ground. Twenty-five feet in diameter, the 20-ton gondola will accommodate TV camera crews making overhead shots of the action. For baseball, however, they won't venture too low for fear of catching a Willie Mays fly on their collective spoot.

That echelon of Texas society wishing to detach itself from the masses is offered de luxe season boxes available on five-year contracts only. These stalls range in price for that period from \$75,000 to \$90,000 and should help stamp out poverty. Neiman-Marcus didn't do the furnishing, but each box is carpeted wall-towall and comes equipped with a TV set, ice-maker, bar, telephone and private bath.

The television will carry a closed-circuit picture of the game and pregame activities, a touch of luxury which just happens to suggest another Texas story. This involves the Texan who is 20/200 in each eye. He steps into his car, removes his glasses and starts the engine. His startled passenger inquires, "How can one with your eyes drive a car without glasses?" The Texan answers, "Prescription windshield."—Melvin Durslag

HOW ABOUT THIS, SPORTS FANS?


You've got to turn to the TV listings to see where these athletes are playing now



Back in the days when these photographs were snapped, none of the four gentlemen pictured would have been willing to bet that he'd win more fame as a TV actor than as an athlete. But that is what happened. All four left the playing fields and went on to become stars of network television series.

Chuck Connors spent five years (1946 to 1950) trying to win the Brooklyn Dodgers' first-base job. But Gil Hodges wasn't about to be dislodged, and the Dodgers kept Connors in the minors, In 1951 they sold him to the Chicago Cubs. He stayed with the Cubs long enough to play in 70 games, bat .223 and pose for the photo at left. Then he was farmed to the old Los Angeles Angels of the Pacific Coast League, where his luck changed. In 1952 he hit .321, slugged 23 home runs and endeared himself to the fans by clowning around on the field. He became friendly with some of Hollywood's big wheels, who got him started as a movie and TV actor, leading to starring roles in The Rifleman, Arrest and Trial and the current Branded.

Dennis Weaver finished sixth in the decathlon event of the 1948 Olympic trials. The picture below was taken two





string halfback for Oklahoma, under coach Bud Wilkinson, for three years (1951-53). As a senior, he made All-Big Seven and starred in Oklahoma's 7-0 Orange Bowl victory over Maryland's national-championship team. He played pro football for a year in Canada, with the Edmonton Eskimos, before trying his luck as an actor in Hollywood, where he eventually landed a co-starring role in The Eleventh Hour.

John Beradino was a major league infielder for 12 years, mostly with the St. Louis Browns. In 1948 (when the photo below was shot) he played on the Cleveland Indians team that won the World Series. He compiled a lifetime batting average of .241 before retiring in 1953 to devote all of his time to acting, in which he had dabbled since he was a child. Today he's starring in the day-time serial General Hospital.

years earlier, when Weaver was a mainstay of the University of Oklahoma track team. His sixth-place finish in those 1948 tryouts was not quite good enough to earn him a spot on the U.S. Olympic team. So Weaver enrolled in the Actors Studio and was on his way toward Gunsmoke and, this season, Kentucky Jones.

Jack Ging also was a star athlete at the University of Oklahoma. His sport was football (see photo above). Though he weighed only 155 pounds, he was a first-



'IS THERE NO WAY OUT OF THIS MADNESS?'

Newton N. Minow, former Chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, in an article written with Lawrence Laurent and published in TV Guide Jan. 30, 1965, pointed to the failure of present legislation governing political broadcasts and advocated new laws and liberal use of common sense. Among his recommendations was the repeal of Section 315 of the Communications Act which guarantees equal time for all political candidates; a gift of four hours of prime time during campaigns to each of the two major political parties and lesser amounts to the minor parties. Here is the reaction from network and broadcasting executives and political leaders.

'But their suggestion ... seems unrealistic'

Frank Stanton, CBS President

The Minow-Laurent article puts the case for the repeal of the abortive equal-time law concisely and persuasively. It is a most valuable contribution, with both deep insight and the orderly presentation of little-understood facts, to a discussion that is frequently bogged down in distortions and irrelevancies.

But their suggestion that broadcasters be required to put free time at the disposal of the national chairmen of the two major political parties seems to me unrealistic. Such time might well not be used in the interests of the voter, for face-to-face discussions like the Presidential debates of 1960, but for carefully planned set pieces and campaign advertising, solely in the interests of the party.

Providing lesser amounts of time to minority parties according to their votes in previous elections serves no significant purpose. Whenever a minority party has been a meaningful factor in an election, it has usually arisen out of conditions in the election year and the party did not even exist during previous elections. What constitutes adequate time for a minority party depends upon immediate circumstances.

Messrs. Minow and Laurent soundly remind us that the best assurance of the broadcaster's acting responsibly and fairly in presenting issues and candidates is his obligation to operate his station in the public interest. Rigid legal requirements can only impede his usefulness.

'...the wrong way of doing the right thing'

Robert W. Sarnoff, NBC Chairman of the Board

Mr. Minow makes a most articulate and persuasive case for repeal of the "equal-time" provision of the Communications Act. Many broadcasters, including myself, have long advocated this move. We still do, and Mr. Minow's support in this effort to gain for the broadcaster a journalistic freedom equal to the print media's is indeed welcome.

We do not, however, accept the premise that we must trade for this freedom, and, consequently, we disagree with his "compromise" proposal of requiring broadcasters to allot specified amounts of free time to major and minor candidates.

Mr. Minow characterizes this proposal as possibly "the lowest price any group ever paid for freedom." The response to that, it seems to me, is that no other individual or industry is required to pay for a Constitutional guarantee. If the principle of freedom of the press is valid at all—and what American believes it is not?—broad-

casters should not be singled out as the group obligated to pay for that freedom.

In short, Mr. Minow's proposal is the wrong way of doing the right thing. It is discriminatory and confiscatory. If increased exposure of candidates and issues is its aim, why not also compel newspapers and magazines to devote a predetermined amount of space to them? If reduced campaign costs are a factor, why not also require railroads and airlines to furnish so many miles of free transportation to the candidates and their entourages or hotels to extend complimentary food and lodging?

What Mr. Minow proposes is to compel broadcasters to do what they have been, and are, effectively prevented by law from doing on their own. It would subvert the broadcaster's ability to apply journalistic judgment in presenting vital information to the public.

"... there is a middle course..."

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D., Wash.)

As you know, this provision has been the subject of extensive hearings by my committee over the years. . . .

In 1960 I co-sponsored S. 3171, a bill which made it mandatory for a broadcaster to make a certain amount of time available for the Presidential and Vice Presidential candidates. Following hearings, Section 315 was suspended for the 1960 campaign, permitting the broadcaster to make the time available for the Presidential and Vice

Presidential candidates.

My committee reported a similar suspension for the 1964 campaign but, unfortunately, it was not enacted. I voted in favor of this bill in the committee and on the floor. I have an open mind but there are a number of questions that have to be considered before an across-the-board repeal can be accomplished. I believe there is a middle course, at least in the initial instance.

'... further relaxation of Section 315'

Sen. John O. Pastore (D., R.I.)

I am a firm believer that there should be further relaxation of Section 315. On a number of occasions I have introduced legislation that would suspend Section 315 to include Congressional and Gubernatorial as well as Presidential and Vice Presidential candidates. This would permit the broadcaster to demonstrate by action his ability to deliver on the promises he is now making.

It is my judgment that the broadcaster has reached a point of maturity and if the shackles are removed, he will be able to make more effective use of this powerful medium in enlightening the public during a political campaign. As to those who may have doubts, . . I should point out that the fairness doctrine would apply and Congress can always reinstate the provision of Section 315 if there is abuse.

"... no one has found a better...program..."

Rep. J. Arthur Younger (R., Cal.)

A broadcaster, licensed and supervised by the Government, cannot possibly enjoy the same individual enterprise freedoms enjoyed by the press, which is not licensed, supervised nor regulated by the Government and where the individual functions in a field where any person is privileged to start a newspaper or magazine so long as he has the finan-

cial backing to do so. On the other hand, no one, regardless of his wealth, can establish a radio or TV station without being licensed by the Government and being subject to Government regulation and supervision.

I have come to the conclusion that no one has yet found a better or more workable program than now enjoyed by the broadcaster under Section 315.

"...in complete agreement...on repeal..."

Mike Shapiro, Gen. Manager, WFAA, Dallas

I'm in complete agreement with Newton Minow on the repeal of Section 315 of the Communications Act and his reasons for same. Speaking personally, and not as a director of NAB, I think the four hours of prime free time for the two major political parties has a great deal of merit. I

would suggest no more than one hour per week, per party, be allocated in the month prior to election. Otherwise, if both parties decided to utilize this time in the last week the public—again—would suffer with political time taking over their choice of programs.

(The chairmen of the Democratic and Republican Parties

also were invited to comment but did not do so.)

"... we cannot agree with the proposal ... "

Vincent T. Wasilewski, President, National Assn. of Broadcasters

The NAB also advocates the repeal of Section 315, but we cannot agree with the proposal to require broadcasters to give free broadcasting time to each major political party. As former NAB President LeRoy Collins wrote in January 1962: "To require the radio and television industries to provide their facilities free of charge to certain Presidential candidates,

without imposing similar requirements on other types of communications, is a public policy I am confident you would not support. We see no valid reason for requiring the broadcasting industry to bear the full brunt of this expense, while exempting entirely other media of mass communications such as newspapers and magazines."

"... repeal the equal-time requirement"

C. Wrede Petersmeyer, President, Corinthian Broadcasting Corp.

His solution is a trade. Broadcasters should be required to give four hours of free time to each of the two major parties (with lesser amounts to the minor parties) each Presidential election year. In exchange they would get relief from Section 315. For this broadcaster, at least, it's "no sale."

What's the solution? It's easy. Congress should repeal the equal-time requirement. Once done, there will be a much more meaningful coverage of campaigns and political candidates by radio and TV stations. Broadcasters will at least be free to exercise some journalistic ingenuity in portraying candidates and probing issues.

"... minority parties... first to suffer..."

Nathan Karp, Natl. Campaign Mgr., Socialist Labor Party

Aside from the statutory obligation to make the minimum periods of free time available to each of the two major parties, the broadcasters, who are dominated by selfish corporate, material interests, would be free to determine who and what shall be heard over the publicly owned airwaves. The fact that minority political parties and their candidates would be the first to suffer by no means guarantees that they would be the only ones. . . Nine companies own

three-quarters of the stations reaching 40 percent of America's TV homes. [As] FCC Chairman Henry observed: "Repeal Section 315, let these nine agree to support one Presidential candidate, and that candidate is half-way home."

In these crucial times . . . it is of the utmost importance that the modern media of mass communication—radio and TV—be kept open for the widest possible discussion of the problems facing us and their possible solutions.

Mother has long green calling cards



You notice her, amidst all *The Munsters*, because she's the only "normal" looking one of the bunch—she plays Marilyn, the 18-year-old niece in the Munster household. But 28-year-old Pat Priest is anything but a "normal" young Hollywood blonde.

In 12 eventful years, Pat Priest has traveled the long road from Bountiful, Utah, to Hollywood and the status of TV series regular, with way stops as a fashion model, performer in TV commercials, star of her own local TV show, and belle of Washington society. She also is the daughter of Ivy Baker Priest, whose signature, if not face, is familiar to millions of Americans. It graces the bottom of countless dollar bills, for Mrs. Priest was Treasurer of the United States during the Eisenhower Administration.

To some, that circumstance might prove traumatic. But not to Pat, who is an immensely practical girl. "To me," she remarks, smiling her prettiest Junior League smile, "it's a pleasant

'plus' in the publicity."

Indeed, Pat is a self-professed expert at making the most of herself, from Bountiful to Hollywood. As a debutante she had "coming out" parties in New York and Washington. She was elected queen of the socially prominent Azalea Festival in Virginia, an honor shared in other years by Peggy Goldwater and Lynda Bird Johnson. She appeared in a Life photograph, with escort, attending a prominent Washington cultural event. Most girls would have figured they had it made. Not Miss Priest. She had an acting bee in her bonnet.

At 19, Pat achieved the ultimate of every all-American girl's dream—she married a tall, dark, handsome Naval officer, Pierce A. Jensen Jr., who among other things was 13 years her senior and had a glamorous job as Naval aide in the White House. The marriage was duly written up in all the society columns. One of the wedding gifts was a simple silver tray with

an inscription which read: "To Pat and Pierce from President and Mrs. Eisenhower."

But the acting bee, which was acquired way back in Bountiful, was not to be denied.

B. W.—Before Washington—Pat's mother, needing an entr'acte for a show she was doing for the Mormon Church, had Pat do a pantomime-to-records routine. By the time Pat had taken the act to Salt Lake City television, she had discovered that "Once you've heard the applause, you can't get it out of your system."

Then—in 1952—Pat's mother was appointed Treasurer. In Washington, Pat promoted herself a morning TV show over a local station where she interviewed guests and commented on

things feminine.


Then came a break. Her husband was transferred to Point Mugu, 50 miles north of Los Angeles. "I got myself an agent," says Pat. "We bought a house in Thousand Oaks—halfway between Point Mugu and Hollywood." She got two small parts in movies; did commercials; auditioned for several series including Gilligan's Island; took acting lessons; and finally landed the Munsters role.

"Ten girls tested for the part of Marilyn," says executive producer Bob Mosher. "We chose Pat because she had a matter-of-fact, utterly composed manner that we needed for Marilyn, who, after all, has to remain unmoved by her weird surroundings."

What advice may Pat offer now to aspiring actresses? "I'd tell them," she says, "to have two things: plenty of

money and a loyal husband."

Makes a lot of sense too. Pat's husband is now retired from the Navy and is in real estate. That gives him time to tend their two youngsters and get dinner for hard-working mamma. "He's so good-natured about it," smiles Pat. "But I'd better get a maid soon. I don't think I can impose on his good nature much longer."


