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
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
as we see it

A number of the Nation's sportswriters took issue with our recent suggestion that it is worth changing rules and otherwise accommodating television's needs if it means that millions, rather than just a few, can enjoy watching sports events.

Some were quite calm about it, like Dean Eagle, the respected sports editor of the Louisville Times, who offered convincing arguments against such television-inspired changes as automatic time-outs for commercials during some basketball games (a team with no time-outs left could be helped by an automatic time-out) and confining some bowling championship finals to one series or even one game (this places too much emphasis on luck rather than skill under pressure). Others were not so calm. You'd have thought we were recommending something serious, like abolition of their by-lines, press passes and free booze, rather than minor game and rule changes.

We hope they all saw some of the Masters Golf Tournament on television a few weeks ago. Certainly they couldn't have argued with the scheduling of final play so that the leaders would finish when the cameras were on, or the staging of the Masters jacket presentation for the cameras, or any of the other magnificent coverage by CBS producer Frank Chirkinian and his staff that wouldn't have been possible without some rule and tradition stretching.

Television people would be the last ones to seek changes in sports events that would lessen their entertainment value. There must be a way to eliminate such overaccommodation as Dean Eagle points out, and still make it possible for television to cover all sports well. Maybe the sportswriters have some suggestions. Constructive suggestions.



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

'We interrupt this program...'

THESE FOUR WORDS INTRODUCE NEWS BULLETINS THAT MAY PRODUCE MORE FRIGHT THAN LIGHT

You are seated in front of your television set intent on a drama. The hero is approaching a crisis. The story is rushing onward to a conclusion. You are immersed in the lives and problems of the characters.

Suddenly the actors disappear and on the screen flashes the word BUL-LETIN. You blink with reflex dismay at the abrupt wrench from your concentration. In the few seconds of silence that ensue, you regroup your mental forces and bring them to focus on the single word which, by now, is growing more ominous by the moment. Your heartbeat quickens. "We interrupt this program to bring you a special news bulletin from . . ."

Has it finally happened, you think? Is this really the voice of doom telling me that a larger drama—the atomic one—has reached its logical denouement? In the next instant, you reflect, I may discover that everything I am, and know, and hope to be is about to crumble. Or perhaps it's not that bad. Maybe it's only that the Chinese have entered the war in Vietnam and are pushing our forces into the South China Sea. That wouldn't be quite so bad. Or perhaps it's simply that some near-by missile site has had an accidental explosion and the atmosphere is being polluted with radioactive gases.

"... to bring you a special news bulletin from ..." A pause, and the announcer says: "President Johnson's cold has improved slightly, his physicians reported a moment ago, and he is expected to leave Bethesda Naval Hospital and return to the White House within the next 12 hours. This has been a special bulletin from ..."

You slump in the chair, relieved. Your heart returns to its normal pace, your scalp loosens, and you breathe out heavily. The actors return to view, and you discover them engaged in a heated colloquy, the motivations for which you will have to guess.

Vignettes such as this one happened frequently late last January when President Johnson suffered a flu attack and had to be taken to the hospital. A second outbreak of news bulletins accompanied the United States' retaliatory air strikes in North Vietnam, and the apparent escalation of that guerrilla war.

Those two breaking stories, coming close together as they did, returned public attention to a subject which has been argued hotly both by viewers and TV news officials for a long time now: the matter of news-bulletin interruptions and the abuses to which that practice is susceptible, especially in the atmosphere of intense rivalry in which the network news departments find themselves. On Feb. 11, as the Vietnam crisis was enlarging, Elmer W. Lower, ABC's news boss, memoed his staff: "We will interrupt regular programming with bulletins . . . as our own judgment dictates. We will try earnestly to avoid an air of alarm or crisis when one does not exist. . . . Let's keep our feet on the ground and inform—not frighten —our viewers. . . ."

Next day, Fred Friendly, president of CBS News, told *his* staff in a privately circulated note: "The news 'interrupt' bulletin . . . if used with judgment and discretion, is the best tool we have for getting vital news to the public quickly. But its indiscriminate use for competitive reasons or for promoting one's own image as a news organization is a disservice. . . ." Responsibility means restraint and wisdom, as well as alertness and energy, Friendly wrote. "We are in the news—not the panic-button—business."

A standing order in NBC's procedure manual says: "Only in the case of bulletins of transcending importance should the existing program be interrupted at once and without question and, even in such cases, the bulletin should be subjected to the tests of good taste in handling."

Thus, in the abstract, each of the networks has only the most publicspirited intentions about bulletins. They agree solemnly that to "cry wolf" by rushing helter-skelter to the airwaves with these jarring and sometimes frightening intrusions is to perform a colossal disservice both to viewers and to themselves.

But in practice, there are no rules, no hidebound criteria guaranteed to protect from error a news editor confronted with a hot story and the even hotter breath of the competition on his neck.

One day last year, for example, CBS went on the air with a bulletin that Nikita Khrushchev was reported dead. Their information **continued**

was based on an unconfirmed Reuters dispatch which proved to be in error. A moderate delay would have spared CBS the embarrassment of having to point out later that the Reuters report was, indeed, false.

A too-eager news editor at ABC interrupted programming to award viewers the intelligence that Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton had just been married in Montreal. An ABC news official, watching at home, said later, "I could have died a million deaths when I saw that one."

Splashed into Swan Lake

A "peak of irritation"—in the words of one New York TV critic—was reached on Feb. 21 when ABC's New York outlet broke in on a performance of the Bolshoi Ballet to report that Malcolm X, the Black Nationalist leader, had been murdered in Harlem as he was about to give a speech. That news could have waited, insisted the aggrieved critic, until the end of "Swan Lake," a matter of perhaps 10 minutes.

Traditionally, one of the most irritating aspects of news bulletining to viewers has been television's handling of airline disasters. Many local stations have been in the habit of breaking into their schedule at the first notification of a plane crash without waiting for fuller details, thereby worrying every viewer who had a relative or friend traveling that day. More responsible news editors are careful to get better information before interrupting: name of the airline, destination and flight number of the plane, time of departure, and so forth.

Recently, TV GUDE interviewed top network news officials to find out exactly how they feel about news bulletins, their use and abuse. "There's only one real criterion," Fred Friendly told us: "The public interest." Three guidelines assist CBS to a decision on whether or not to interrupt, Friendly said: "Is it a service that the people need at this moment, such as an alarm? Is the news of such great importance that the viewer would *want* to be interrupted? What program is in progress, and will the content of the bulletin fit tastefully into the context of the program?"

In his role as a news chief, Friendly says, "I have immediate access to every living room in the United States, and I must use that power with restraint. Even after all this time in TV news, I'm still awed by that responsibility. When I'm at home and see a news bulletin come on CBS, I think, "This better be important."

Julian Goodman, NBC's vice president of News, says he's had "innumerable discussions" on the subject of bulletins with his staff, and has decided that the key element is the experience and judgment of the news editor on duty. "We tend to support the decisions of these editors, one of whom is on duty 24 hours a day. Of course, they can't afford to make many mistakes."

Goodman maintains that NBC's procedure for getting a bulletin on the air is slower but surer than its competitors'. "We go through a few extra steps, one of which is contacting our broadcast-operations coordinator to find out the best spot in a program to insert the bulletin. You can't announce the death of an important figure in the middle of a comedy, and then come back to laughter. If we have to wait 10 minutes in the interests of good taste, we do so."

Jesse Zousmer, ABC's vice president and director of TV News, says, "The criterion is your reflex. If you try to draw up a document, you're lost. Therefore, one must countenance errors. Briefly, it's a matter **continued**

of using the best news judgment available and worrying about it later. There's no doubt that bulletins shock one out of one's reverie. But what's the alternative? Should we come on and say, 'In a half hour we're going to tell you something unpleasant'? The harshest critics of news bulletins are the same TV reviewers who are always saying we need more documentaries and public affairs shows. You can't satisfy everybody."

Are commercials interrupted?

A few cynical observers have claimed to discern the ugly face of economics peering through the fragrant rose garden of public service. How come commercials never seem to get pre-empted, they ask? Why do bulletins always seem to come in the middle of a program—where there's no financial sacrifice—rather than bumping a sponsor message? Nonsense, say the network news chiefs in unanimous chorus. Money has nothing to do with it, they insist; it's the nature of the news which determines when and how a bulletin gets aired.

Julian Goodman, voicing the consensus, says: "On many, many occasions we've pre-empted commercials for news bulletins. If it's the sort of story which must go on right *now*, we put it on whether it pre-empts a commercial or not. There's certainly no internal policy which advises us to leave commercials alone."

Speaking to the New York State Broadcasters Association in Albany on March 2, James C. Hagerty, former press secretary to President Eisenhower and now a vice president of ABC's parent company, advised TV newsmen "to take corrective action on our own" with regard to bulletins, lest "we be forced to do so by outside pressure of public condemnation." Hagerty called into question the networks' decision to "flood the air with special programs and breathless bulletins" during President Johnson's flu attack, when his life obviously was not in danger. "Admittedly, the President is the most important person in the free world. But honestly, didn't we all overdo it just a little?"

It appears at last that the networks are, in fact, realizing that they've been overdoing it a little; that viewers are painfully sensitive to the volatile potential in a number of international situations: to the confrontation of two world powers in Vietnam; to the proliferation of nuclear arms and the enlargement of the "nuclear family"; to the shifting policies and uncertain aspirations of a new leadership bloc in the Soviet Union. TV newsmen are the first to agree that such a time needs only the coolest and most responsible news reporting.

Solutions are forthcoming. One network has in preparation a "milliondollar piece of equipment" which would allow news editors to display bulletins instantly in a strip of lettering designed to travel across the bottom of a viewer's screen and thus not interrupt the show in progress. (Such a display is already in existence, but is not nearly fast enough for use with bulletins.)

Another network is investigating the chances of confining all but the most urgent bulletins (such as a national alarm) to the few moments when the credits are on view at the end of a show. Those seconds frequently are used for no better purpose than to promote the program next in view.

The object of any solution is to preserve us all from skipped heartbeats and mounting blood pressure; and perhaps to guarantee our right to sit through such shows as *World War I*, *Combat!*, and 12 O'clock High in some sort of peace and quiet.



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

Peabody Awards: For all its thoroughgoing criticism of television. the George Foster Peabody Awards Committee managed to find a few shows and people in the industry worthy of awards last week. In announcing the awards, Paul Porter, former Chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, commented sadly that "1964 was not a vintage year for broadcasting," and deplored television's "dreary sameness and steady conformity." But, he added, there were "bright spots" and these should not go unrecognized. The committee decided to make general awards rather than by categories as heretofore. The awards, for "distinguished and meritorious service" to the industry:

CBS Reports; NBC's Profiles in Courage; the NBC color special "The Louvre; Intertel, a National Educational Television Network publicaffairs show produced by the Council of the International Television Federation; William H. Lawrence, ABC White House correspondent; Mr. Joyce Hall; president of Hallmark, sponsor of Hallmark Hall of Fame; Burr Tillstrom for his moving Berlin Wall depiction on That Was the Week That Was; Julia Child, for her The French Chef program for WGBH-TV and NET; Norman Ross for his off the cuff talk show on WBKB, Chicago.

The broadcasting industry in general was cited by the committee for "inescapably confronting the American public with the realities of racial discontent."

"Good Night, Good Luck . . ." To the millions who hung on his every word nightly during World War II, Edward R. Murrow was as much a good friend as a famous war correspondent. He brought them the news in such terms that, as he put it, "it makes sense to the truck driver without insulting the intelligence of the professor."

To a later generation he was as much a symbol of simplicity and sincerity. When the country was torn by the controversy over the Red-hunting methods of Wisconsin Republican Sen. Joseph McCarthy, he quietly took Mc-Carthy to task on his television show, See It Now. To many, that show in 1954 marked the beginning of the end of so-called McCarthyism. Said Murrow later: "The timing was ripe and the instrument powerful."

After Murrow's death last week at the age of 57, in his home in Pawling, N.Y., of cancer, the President said of him: "He was a gallant fighter, a man who dedicated his life as a newsman and as a public official to an unrelenting search for truth.

Barbra: Barbra Streisand, 23, was given an hour of her own on which to shine last week, an unusual concession to one so young; and the consensus was that she carried it off. CBS treated her to the very best-if anything the lavish production seemed to get in her way. When the camera panned in on Barbra, just Barbra, her special kind of charm came through best-such as during her off-hand remarks while singing "Give Me the Simple Life," or when she sang her own down-to-earth version of "Second-hand Rose from Second Avenue." CBS liked the show so much it plans to repeat it.

'Gilligan's Island': The water's fine

(if you can ignore those sharp-toothed critics)

T wo tons of grainy sand lies an inch thick on the concrete-floored soundstage. A lush collection of authentic palm trees, flax, birds of Paradise, carpet grass and cut magnolias shimmers in the artificial moonlight. An actress dressed in a khaki safari outfit and pith helmet creeps into a hut built of bamboo and grass. **continued**

Milk oozes over his jugeared face and he tumbles out of his hammock onto the floor. The director yells "Cut" and the *Gilligan's Island* production crew responds with uproarious laughter.

television series-composed This mostly of primitive sight gags, pratfalls and low-brow humor-only several months earlier had, itself, landed with a thud on the sensitivities of the Nation's TV critics. "It is impossible that a more inept, moronic or humorless show has ever appeared on the home tube," wrote Rick DuBrow of UPI. Jack Gould, in the New York Times, called it ". . . quite possibly the most preposterous situation comedy of the season." In naming the show the worst comedy on the air, syndicated columnist Hal Humphrey added: "Gilligan's Island is the kind of thing one might expect to find running for three nights at some neighborhood group playhouse, but hardly on a Coast-to-Coast TV network."

In third spot

By late February, oddly enough, the shipwrecked septet had navigated into the third position in the Nielsen ratings. Clearly, it had emerged as the sleeper series of the year, confounding critics, columnists and nearly everybody else, save high school dropouts. "After those reviews," cracked Henny Backus, wife of one of the *Gilligan's* stars, "if this show is No. 3, then they've gotta recount the votes. Barry Goldwater must have been elected."

In the wake of its surprising success, the cast of *Gilligan's Island* took time recently to answer the critics and assay their good fortune. "I don't know why we have television critics,"

said Jim Backus (Thurston Howell III), seated in undershorts and a Tshirt in his dressing room. "To review a television show is a ridiculous thing anyhow. It's over by the time the review is published. The New York papers, especially, have a tendency to hate anything that comes from the so-called Hollywood film factories. They weren't reviews; they were character assassinations."

Alan Hale (the skipper), who has gamely tolerated soup thrown in his face and has hung his 275-pound girth suspended upside down from trees whenever the script called for it, was more philosophical. "They always say every knock is a boost," he explained. "Some of these critics talk in type just to keep in practice. Maybe they didn't feel good the night that they saw it. I still think that a few of the folks who have roasted us have way down deep had a couple of laughs watching the show. But it doesn't take a lot to please me, very frankly."

"I was not disheartened by the reviews," insisted executive producer Sherwood Schwartz, straightening his sincere black-and-olive striped rep tie. "Only a bit angry with the lack of understanding of what was being attempted. Here are the same men who are forever saying: 'For heaven's sake, won't somebody give us something other than the wife and the husband and the two children?' So you bring something else to the tube and you read very good reviews about the husband and the wife and the two kids with the same old story lines-the wife dented the fender and the husband doesn't know about it; she insulted the husband's boss and didn't know who he was; he forgot their anniversary. They're yelling and crying for a fresh approach. You give 'em a fresh approach, they kill you and praise the guy who's doing the same old thing."

Gilligan himself, Bob Denver, whose previous claim to fame had been a

lengthy tenure as the bearded beatnik Maynard Krebs on the old Dobie Gillis show, theorized, "I don't think the critics were ready for broad, silly, physical comedy. You have to adjust to it. They're entitled to their opinion. It's silly to put them down. But you can't expect seven actors to perform at their top, peak level in the first show. I didn't have time to be upset or depressed with the reviews, I was working so hard at the time."

Natalie Schafer (Mrs. Thurston Howell III), an accomplished actress who once was a protégé of Gertrude Lawrence, is making her debut as a TV series regular. "When you open in a play and bad notices come out." she recalled, fondling her Chihuahua, "you expect to fold on Saturday. And I expected to fold. I had moved to Hollywood, but I left most of my clothes in New York because I never was very sure about this being a great success. It never entered my head it would go on."

Their friends turned away

Even more upsetting than the barbs of the critics were the negative reactions to Gilligan's by friends of the cast members. "It got very fashionable to rap this show," Backus explains. "Sort of like caught on." Dawn Wells, the pigtailed actress who plays Mary Ann, was shaken by the indifference of her acquaintances. "So many of them looked at the show and said: Gee, you look good, you look great, or you look cute, or the photography's great," she recalls. "But that's all they said."

The greatest fear of producer . Schwartz was that such comments might undermine the show before it had a chance to build. "Actors are extremely sensitive," he says. "The members of the cast were disheartened by the reviews. I could tell by their long faces. The last thing I wanted was for the disappointment continued

to affect the performers."

To pacify his players, Schwartz gathered them together for a pep talk. "This is my fourth show on television," he told them. "My previous three shows, in every case, within six months after I arrived, they were in the Top 10. We'll be in the Top 10." This wild prophecy elicited little more than nervous laughter, but it did impress most of the cast.

Tina was not impressed

One of the exceptions was Gilligan's sex symbol, Tina Louise. "I was ashamed when I saw the first show," the redhead recalled, as she applied some perfume. "I had studied at the Actors Studio and I'd started to get some interesting roles and some good reviews. I mean like my scene was singled out in Burke's Law, and there were seven other stars. I only worked on what I wanted to work on in class, things like 'Desire Under the Elms.' Finally I realized that I had to start to go back to commercial work. I'd heard about what series are like, but I really didn't know how it would be. I found that I couldn't use my work at all in this show. It was quite a shock. In this medium, you perform, everyone performs. There's no such thing as a real moment, an honest reaction, because the show is like a cartoon. You're not acting, not the way I studied it. I wouldn't watch it if I wasn't on it."

Many of the millions who do watch the show, apparently, are more familiar with the problems of Dick, Jane and Spot than those of Method actresses. "It's amazing how children react to the show," says Miss Wells. "I have a little 3½-year-old neighbor who told me every plot of every show we've done. They remember everything. It takes a certain amount of intelligence to follow, but not much intelligence to analyze."

Schwartz, who created the show, echoes: "At the beginning of the year most of the fan mail was from kids. It's an obviously attractive-looking show to children who can't speak English. We have viewers from five years old up who just enjoy seeing funny things happening."

Russell Johnson, cast as the erudite "Professor," Roy Hinkley, adds: "I have a friend who teaches fourth and fifth grade English and he recommends this show to his classes. He says it's one of the few shows on television that children can watch, because it has a combination of humor and a lack of violence or blatant sex. It doesn't hurt anybody."

In truth, the show is one huge placebo, deliberately calculated not to offend nor to stimulate the audience into deep thought. One critic, Terrence O'Flaherty of the San Francisco Chronicle, wrote: "It is difficult for me to believe that *Gilligan's Island* was written, directed and filmed by adults. . . The cast is heavily larded with actors who should know better. I can only assume they were motivated by avarice alone." His assumption is not far from the mark.

"In this day and age I'm delighted to have the jcb, to be working," says Johnson, who recently purchased a new home. "Because it's cold out, boy. It's rough. If you're an actor you should work. You do the best you can with what you've got."

Miss Louise frankly accepted her part "just to get myself in front of the public quickly and have this mass exposure so maybe I can do something I would like to do. If you don't have exposure, you won't get to do anything. I didn't take it because I wanted to be in a television series. Currently, I get the second largest mail on the show." Denver leads in the weekly fan-mail tabulations. He has traded in his MG convertible for a new Jaguar XK E, a vehicle more befitting his status.

Many of the principals, despite the popularity of the show, have begun to have second thoughts about their overwhelming success and potentially lengthy commitment. "Sometimes in the silence of my lonely room," says Backus, who was recently bitten on the hand by a macaw and was obliged to take an antitetanus shot on the set, "I would like to do something maybe a little more worth-while or artistically satisfying. But I enjoy the money and I certainly enjoy the recognition. You're recognized much more than motion-picture people."

Her ego isn't satisfied

"When I went to New York at Christmas, I was recognized more than when I'm in a play," Miss Schafer agreed. "You get into a cab and they'll say: 'Aren't you Mr. Magoo's wife?' I'm being recognized, but by another kind of people. It's supposed to be very good for your ego to have people recognize you in the street. But I look around at the people and I think: 'Oh, dear, if they were just a little more attractive, I'd like it better.'"

There were telltale signs of unrest elsewhere. "I don't think I've reached my potential yet as an actor," Denver declared. "I did play Falstaff in college." Miss Wells concurred. "I've studied the classics," she said. "Shakespeare is my favorite. I'd rather do Shakespeare than anything." Moaned Miss Louise: "I don't feel fulfilled doing these shows. Most are not quite inventive."

"I dare say Miss Louise will always feel unfulfilled in what she feels are the extents of her talent on the show," Schwartz retorted. "I would think she would be delighted. She's an integral part of a major hit. What else does an actress want? I don't know what would make her happy. It seems to me that she's not a very happy person. I don't thoroughly understand her."

Schwartz is equally mystified, even today, by what he considers to be unenlightened commentary. "Not a single critic reviewed the show from its sociological aspects," he said, swiveling in a high-back leather chair while approving designs for Gilligan's Island hand puppets which will soon inundate the Nation's toy stores. "These are supposed to be intellectual people who I think would find this. They found it in The Beverly Hillbillies in its second year. But sometimes the public finds things the critics do not. The critics say it's a bad show, they want the public to agree. But God Bless America. It's a democracy. There ain't no critic who can climb into people's windows and turn off their sets. They tune in what they want."

FOR HIM THIS IS NO JOKE

Orson Bean, actor and comedian, is deadly serious

about the school he founded in New York

It's called The Fifteenth Street School, and the two most unusual things about it are (1) it was founded by a television performer, Orson Bean, and (2) its students don't have to attend classes at all, if they'd rather play in the school sand pile or just goof off.

This optional-attendance business is just one aspect of the revolutionary educational theories of A.S. Neill, a British child psychologist who founded England's famed Summerhill School and whose writings gave Bean the idea of starting his own school, modeled on Summerhill. "There was no such school in New York," says Bean, "and I wanted to send my little girl to one. I was making good money, and there was nothing I'd rather do with it than buy a building, hire teachers and start a school. I never dreamed I'd get in so deep."

Bean found his building (a four-story


structure on the edge of Greenwich Village), bought it for \$87,500 (\$35,000 down payment), hired four teachers (after interviewing about 50), received a charter from the New York State Board of Regents and opened the school last September. It now has 41 students (including Orson's daughter Michele, 4), in nursery school, kindergarten and first grade. Bean hopes to add a grade a year, until classes run all the way through high school. Tuition is \$1000 a year for first-graders, \$750 for the younger children.

The New York State curriculum is followed, but the youngsters are free to participate in organized activities (which they help select) or abstain. "The point of it," explains Bean, "is to get the child to take on responsibility for his own behavior. This is brought about by giving him freedom. We are not permissive. We have strict discipline, strong rules about respecting the rights of others. But the rules aren't arbitrary. They're based on common sense. We believe in the Summerhill phrase 'freedom without license,' that there is responsibility involved with all freedom.''

Bean has the title of Administrative Director of the school. "That means," he says, "I unclog sinks, change light bulbs and placate angry parents whose children weren't picked up by the bus this morning. If this ever falls through, I'll be qualified for a janitorial job."

Since the school opened, Orson, a regular on To Tell the Truth, has turned down many offers for TV series and movies because he doesn't want to leave New York. "I'm lucky to be a TV panelist," he says. "I can earn a buck with little work. That allows me to be here during the day.

"This kind of thing changes your values. The kids are so intense about things. Johnny gets so excited about the hippo he's drawn. It's important. When your agent calls you about a job, it's just not the same."

IN THE SPOTLIGHT DURING A BRIEF TV STINT, DOUGLAS FAIRBANKS JR. REVEALS HE'S NOT A SELF-CONFIDENT SWASHBUCKLER

As all those who watch old movies on TV must recall, there is a glorious moment in "The Corsican Brothers" when the young aristocrat-hero played by Doug Fairbanks Jr.—leaps on his horse, and, with swashbuckling elegance, dispatches his foes. . .

"... So, when we were filming one

of the Alcoa Previews," says Douglas Fairbanks Jr. about 25 years later, "Burt Lancaster asked me if I could still do that running mount. Of course I can, I said. And I did it too." The ex-swashbuckler smiles ruefully, and looks at his hand. "I did it—but I broke my thumb."

Mr. Fairbanks recently made a brief, if slightly ill-fated, return to TV. He was to have been host for four of the *Alcoa Previews*—behind-thescenes stories of show business—but the too-costly and chaotic series was stopped after two were filmed.

Fairbanks is not a major figure in the contemporary entertainment world. He is not even a minor figure after years of separation from this medium, in which he was once active. And yet Burt Lancaster is not alone in his curiosity about him. The legend of DFJr lingers on, reinforced by old movies, newspaper headlines and the glamorous aura of the name itself.

It is quite a formidable legend. On the record, DFJr's career is amazingly distinguished.

After a successful movie career in the 1930's, he went off to war and behaved like a fictional hero. As a member of Lord Louis Mountbatten's Commandos, he was the only American officer to command a flotilla of British raiding craft. He was in six major sea campaigns, 12 landings and 20 major military engagements.

The list of his citations and decorations for daring and gallantry in the course of World War II is impressive. Here is a brief sampling: the Silver Star, Navy Legion of Merit, British Distinguished Service Cross, French Legion of Honor and Croix de Guerre with Palm, Italian Cross of Military Valor.

Just prior to the war he served the United States as a diplomat. President Roosevelt sent DFJr as his personal emissary on diplomatic missions to Brazil, Argentina, Chile, Uruguay, Peru and Panama. After the war, Fairbanks traveled over the face of Europe on missions for the State Department, the Navy, the Marshall Plan, CARE and the UN. The Government still calls on his services regularly.

He is a driving businessman with a talent for making money. Fairbanks International, Inc., has world-wide branches dealing with patent licensing of new inventions, the arrangements of mergers, housing developments, hotels, motels. Another corporation controls movie production.

His most publicized distinction in recent years is the social life he leads in Britain. Since the days of Henry James, Americans have been fascinated by the subtleties of high-level Anglo-American relationships. And the fact that Doug Fairbanks Jr. and his wife, Mary Lee Epling, a former Virginia society girl, are intimates of kings and queens, not to mention lords and ladies, tends to keep the press in a fizz when it has nothing else to fizz about.

Fairbanks' friends include such eminences as Lord Mountbatten, the Marquess of Milford Haven, John Jacob Astor. He shares their fashionable pleasures, their fashionable disciplines and their fashionable scandals. He was one of the upper-class unfortunates whose private life was glamorously tarnished by the Profumo case. He is an honorary knight. He is a personal friend of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip of Britain.

Over the years this combination of movie swashbuckling, big-business acumen, military courage, international prestige, knighthood, and Cliveden Set scandal has coagulated into a highpowered and glittering "image." It comes, therefore, as a slight shock to meet Douglas Fairbanks Jr., who does not quite live up to this potent billing.

The man sitting at the table, calmly eating fruit salad and chatting about Burt Lancaster and running mounts, is not a particularly impressive figure. Were it not for the fact that he is famous, one would not give him more than a casual glance in a public place, unless one were unusually fascinated by men's clothing. He is a slender man with a tanned, bony, slightly weak face. His conventionally handsome features have been corroded and softened by age. His expensive, soberly sophisticated attire—the pinstriped suit, the heavy gold ring, the simple gold cigaret case, the dark red camellia in his buttonhole—looks more distinguished than he does.

He is far from being a swashbuckling personality. The peculiar truth is that he is acutely self-deprecatory. "I've never been terribly confident," he says, "but in the course of the years of having to make my life in public theatrically, politically, militarily, in business—I've developed a certain armor. Not letting one's slip show, so to speak.

"I go into a board-of-directors meeting, and for a flash of a second I'll get a feeling of insufficiency. I wonder 'Why are they listening to me?' I have to remind myself vigorously that I know what I'm talking about. On a diplomatic mission, I am mentally cap-in-hand. I feel I must make excuses for myself."

His impressive multiple career, as he tells it, is no tale of a daring young man who set out to conquer the world. It is rather the tale of a scared young actor who was afraid to put all his eggs in one basket. "I was successful enough in Hollywood," he says, "but I'd seen old stars, directors, producers, coming to me for extra work. It scared the devil out of me. Who knew what might happen to me? So I deliberately cultivated other interests-business and political interests-against the day that this might happen, to have an anchor to windward. As they started to grow, I retired gradually. I stopped while I was ahead. Faced with acting again, I'd probably be scared to death." continued

He is not a man of strong convictions or tastes. "To be perfectly honest about it, I'm not out of sympathy with anything. It's not necessarily a virtue. It's a little weak-minded. An old lady I know says, "The trouble with Douglas is that he likes everything he sees, and he sees everything.' Maybe I'm mentally backward."

Doesn't take himself seriously

Finally, he is a man who has built a life as a dilettante and knows it. "I don't know where I'm going," he confides. "I've never known where I've wanted to go. I'm incapable of ever taking myself seriously. As a young man I wrote, I sculpted, I painted, I played various instruments. I had a certain facility in all these things. People always said to me, 'If you keep at it, you'll be good.' Well, I didn't and I wasn't. To achieve greatness, one must be a monk and dedicate oneself to one thing. I wanted to do too many things."

In a world that generally likes both heroism and humility, one might think that DFJr, who is an astonishing combination of both qualities, would be almost universally loved. He is certainly enormously popular in many circles. If he is anything at all, he is socially successful.

But this social success has also boomeranged. He has been widely criticized as a social climber and a snob. Some of these criticisms have been mildly funny. One British newspaper spoofed Doug as saying: "As I was saying to the Queen, I hate a name-dropper."


When asked to comment on the charge of social climbing in his relations with the Queen of England and Prince Philip he declares, "I think the kind of people who launch these attacks on me suffer from inverted snobbery. They can't understand an American from show business being involved on any level of association with such people—except for doing benefits. When anybody comments on the relationship of theatrical people with anybody in another world, there's a leftover of the old idea that show people are mountebanks—denied burial in hallowed ground. The attitude is: 'How do they dare show their faces outside the circus tent?' The assumption is, it's a search for publicity. This is inverted snobbery."


This is a reasonable enough statement. But what is most interesting about it is what is missing: any reference to England's royal couple. Fairbanks may rattle off the names of the famous in his usual conversation, but he positively refuses to use the royal names in an interview, even when their absence hampers his sentence structure. In consequence, he produces the peculiar impression that he belongs to a primitive religious sect in which the names of the gods are unmentionable. The probability is that he is a snob-but a subtle one. What made Sammy run is not what makes Douglas Fairbanks Jr. runhe started out on top of the social heap to begin with.

He has many facets

Douglas Fairbanks Jr. is a complicated and contradictory man. He is a truly valiant soldier and an intellectual milquetoast—an artistic dilettante and a hardheaded businessman—a flamboyant movie star and a sober imitation of a British aristocrat—a worshipper of social rectitude who has had a brush with wild scandal. He is a man with an unusually distinguished career, who, at age 55, can no longer quite live up to his own biography.

In a strange way, he is best captured by the image of an aging cavalier who can still do a flying leap onto a horse, but who ends up ruefully contemplating a broken thumb.





THE WORLD'S MOST LOW-PRESSURE ACTRESS

At 22, Sharyn Hillyer believes it's silly to exist only for a career

"I never really thought very much about acting," said the cool young actress with the warm brown hair, the gloves and the vaguely Vogue-y look. "I like to act, but when I feel like it."

Among TV's younger actresses, 22year-old Sharyn Hillyer is a fine example of ambition in reverse. Recently she has taken to playing women of the world. But for most of her career her specialty has been playing everybody's favorite teen-age girl friend (her own description) in 11 Ozzie and Harriets, three Burke's Laws and heaven knows how many other shows. Whichever it is, she would rather do it than play Lady Macbeth, any day. "I just don't want to be the kind of girl who lives, breathes and exists only for her career," she says. "Nuts!"

Her idea of the great life is to have been born the daughter of a respectable California businessman, have a physicist for a stepfather (whom she "adores"), have been the bounciest teen-age cheer leader ever to have egged on the Downey High School Tigers, be crowned Miss Ideal Interlocking Widget of 1959, be "discovered" by Ozzie Nelson while parading her charms in the Miss California contest of 1960; and matriculate, by a process as natural as breathing, in the great, amusing (to her) world of TV, happily collecting the goodies along the way.

Which is her life.

The goodies, of course, have been prodigious. They include a husband, Bill Doherty, 12 years her senior, partowner of PJ's, a Hollywood night club, the "in" place several years ago before Whisk-à-Go-Go came along to take some of the play away. Sharyn loves to swing at PJ's; it's even better than cheer-leading.

The goodies also include a baby, Brett, going on one year, whom she bore, she says, with ease ("I was embarrassed, it was so easy," she says); and a house in fashionable (but not too fashionable) Cheviot Hills.


They include, too, such things as a short night-club tour with Tony Martin, undertaken in complete confidence that she could do anything. With Martin she was a dancer, among other things. Dancer? She never had a lesson. "But I knew I could," says Sharyn. "And it worked beautifully."

IRENE RYAN, Granny of <u>The Beverly</u> <u>Hillbillies</u>, commuted between Hollywood and Las Vegas every day during a night-club engagement. She left each afternoon at 5:15, worked most of the night and then flew back the next morning to work all day.
