They are the latest from the HANNA-BARBERA studio (The Flintstones, Yogi Bear), which is also doing an hour-long special for ABC of "Alice in Wonderland" written by BILL ("Jose Jimenez") DANA . . . DANNY THOMAS's young discovery, PICCOLA PUPA, does a Shindig June 9 . . . And MICHAEL BURNS, late of Wagon Train, has a comedy role in an upcoming McHale's Navy.

SHELLEY WINTERS makes her first dramatic TV appearance since winning an Emmy award last year for The Bob Hope Show "Two Is the Number." She'll be in a Hope drama based on a prize-winning short story by ELIZABETH TAYLOR. No, not that ELIZABETH TAYLOR. Still another TAYLOR-ROBERT-narrates "Star-Spangled City," a 60-minute JACK DOUGLAS (Bold Journey) special on the Nation's capital . . . In a Kraft Suspense Theatre, JEFFREY HUNTER plays a geologist. It sounds educational, but don't let it fool you. In the one-hour drama, hoodlums beat him up, attempt to kill him by putting poison gas in the air-conditioning vents, and try to throw him from a 16th-story window.

The number of Westerns will increase from 6 to 11, proof positive that if you give viewers escape with virile heroes, they'll pay attention to the commercials. The number of crime and adventure shows will be up too, while the number of drama and music-variety offerings will be fewer. Altogether there will be 99 network shows next season compared with the current season's 93. More half-hour shows account for the difference.

### Should television be banned from

Appearing on a TV discussion program several weeks ago, Walter Cronkite said: "I heartily believe that in 1968 the political parties ought to ban television from the floor of the convention hall. It certainly makes a mockery of the fact that this is a convention of delegates who are supposed to be listening to the speeches and tending to some sort of business on the floor."

Coming as it did from a prominent television newscaster who has covered many conventions for CBS, it was an eyebrow-raising and thought-provoking statement. For that reason we asked a number of other TV newsmen whether they agreed with Cronkite. Here are excerpts from their replies.



Chet Huntley, NBC: With all due respect to my friend Walter Cronkite, I can't believe he was altogether serious when he made this suggestion.

If Walter is condemning the noiselevel and the confusion on the convention floor, surely he is aware that this went on long before radio or TV reporters put in their appearance.

Walter surely must have observed that when the convention is significant and when its business is critical the degree of concentration is intense. The confusion increases in direct ratio to the degree of boredom coming from the speakers' rostrum.

It is on the floor of the convention where much of the story of a convention develops. How would CBS News have looked had it attempted to cover the struggle of the Mississippi Freedom Delegation for seats in the convention from the confines of an anteroom off the floor itself?

I can only say that my competitive instinct leads me to the hope that CBS News will elect, next time around, to pursue Walter's suggestion.

Mike Wallace, CBS: It's too bad Walter has been stuck up in that anchor booth all these years. If he'd been able to spend a little more time on the floor with us, he'd know that's where the action is.

Those speeches he wants the delegates to listen to—and all the other "business" . . . that's just nuts and bolts, useful but unlovely.

Besides, how can a reporter get arrested off the floor?

## the floor of political conventions?



Howard K. Smith, ABC: I disagree emphatically. Many things are wrong with our political conventions, but they were wronger long before television. Speeches and demonstrations that once lasted for hours now last only minutes. Thanks to television—and its floor correspondents—the viewer is generally better, and sooner, informed than is the spectator in the convention hall. When there is confusion, frequently it is the television or radio newsman on the floor who first provides the needed clarification.

William R. McAndrew, NBC News Chief: While we respect Walter Cronkite, we completely disagree with the position he has taken which, in effect, would infringe on television's right of access in covering a public event.

As long as the press is permitted on the floor of a political convention, television should be welcome.

Even more important, as long as the facts of political life are such that convention news is made on the floor—not on the platform—it would be second-rate journalism and, as a result, not in the public interest to restrict coverage.

William H. Lawrence, ABC: Like most revolutionaries, Walter Cronkite overstates his point; it will not cure the evils of national political conventions or the telecasting of them to ban us or anyone else from the floor. But there are some points in Cronkite's approach that ought to be taken into consideration. I feel that our cameras and reporters roving the floor do create diversions from the regular, more important business of the convention and that we thus encourage the limelight grabbers to create disturbances or otherwise attract attention that would not legitimately be theirs. TV production has lots of room for improvement-and cutting down on TV-created side shows would help both TV and the convention.



Robert Trout, CBS: The political conventions and the televising of them have got so fouled up that the only thing to do is cancel them and begin all over again.

The revised conventions should be run strictly by parliamentary rules, with attention focused on the business at hand. Then, television could concentrate on its main function, which is not so much to tell the story as to show it as it is being continued

created. The first delegate to ring a cow bell, blow a whistle, or inflate a balloon should go out the door right behind the vanishing television floor reporter.

Elmer W. Lower, ABC News Chief: To ban television from the floor of national political conventions is no cure for a venerable American political institution which has advanced into the 20th Century with a 19th-century format.

The entire convention program is long overdue for a revision. As most recently presented, the long hours of the sessions were not of continual interest to the delegates on the floor, the spectators in the balcony, or the vast radio and television audience at home.



David Brinkley, NBC: I could not disagree more.

First, if any news develops in a convention hall, it is far more likely to develop on the floor than on the rostrum. And if we removed our reporters and cameras from the floor, we would be confined to seeing the speakers' platform and listening endlessly to speeches, mainly empty and dull, while remaining ignorant of whatever was happening among the delegates. Does anyone really want to listen to five or six seconding speeches for a "favorite son"? I doubt it.

Secondly, the suggestion assumes

television goes to a convention in the role of a transmission belt for the politicians, that we should put on the air, unedited and unchanged and untouched, anything they care to do on the rostrum, however boring and however phony. Would a newspaper ever think of printing every word said in every speech on a convention rostrum? Would anyone read it if it did? My opinion is that television's job at a convention is journalism, to cover the news, whether it is on the rostrum, on the convention floor, in a back corridor, or in a downtown hotel. Our job is not to serve as a Western Union wire or Coast-to-Coast loudspeaker system for politicians to use as they see fit.

In short, I disagree completely and I think it is one of the worst ideas I ever heard.

Edward P. Morgan, ABC: The networks could—and should—demand that the National Committees put an end to the programmed nonsense (for example, the endless flow of nominating and seconding speeches) which drive away viewers and listeners. If the committees fail to agree, the networks should simply suspend live coverage of the conventions.

It is true that we electronic journalists frequently tend to shove a mike and a camera in the face of anybody and everybody on the floor for a "statement." We need to cure this "microphonitis." But this won't cure the disease of boredom and meaningless high jinks spread by the political conventions as they are now run. The networks can force an end to this malady if they will.

Harry Reasoner, CBS: I agree with Walter—this is one of several changes that would make the relatively new coverage of conventions more professional.



Peter Jennings, ABC: There are three simple reasons for the continued use of television cameras on the floor: In a fast-moving convention, much of the hard news emanates from the floor. Decisions are often made quickly and sometimes emotionally; as in any good form of journalism, one likes to be there as quickly and as accurately as possible. Second, if it is true that the television viewer is in essence a delegate-at-large at the convention, then the only way to really involve him is to take him to the seat of the delegate on the floor. Finally, and this could prove to be the most important factor, statements made to television on the floor in the heat of a political moment are invariably spontaneous and frank. This is infinitely better than a well-rehearsed, canned afterthought.

Sander Vanocur, NBC: If I did not know and respect Walter Cronkite, I could easily believe that he was an electronic Luddite. The Luddites were English workers who, from 1811 to 1816, went about trying to smash machinery which they feared would put them out of work. I know of no floor reporter who wants Walter put out of work. But the net effect of his proposal, if adopted, would be to put floor reporters out of work. Then, the anchorman, up in the booth, would tell viewers what was going on. Television, at its best, is the transmission of an experience. A Presidential convention is a unique political experience. To transmit it faithfully to the American people, we must take the viewer to the floor so that he can share in that experience.

If we were, in fact, making a "mockery" of the convention system, then I am sure that by now we would have been invited to pack up our equipment and urged to steal away in the night. Thus far, the two major political parties have not made such a request. Until they do, I don't think that it is in keeping with what I construe to be journalistic enterprise for such a suggestion to be made by a reporter.




Eric Sevareid, CBS: I'm not at all sure I would agree with Walter on this. The trouble was not the simple presence of the TV men on the floor; it was mostly in the way they were used. They would sometimes signal that they had politician so-and-so at hand and would be given air immediately whether they had a real story or not. In addition, some control-room people let the critics in the printed press panic them, critics who kept praising this network or criticizing that one because floor reporters got or lost an interview by minutes. This was silly. The critics notice these things because they watch three monitors at once. The general audience does not.

In effect, the printed press criticized TV for causing the confusion on the floor that the press itself stimulated. Not that this excuses the networks.

Producing a zoo show can be as much fun as, well, a barrel of monkeys—and just about as hard to manage. It isn't that the stars in Zoorama, the CBS program featuring the famed San Diego Zoo (Sunday, 5 P.M., ET), are temperamental in the Hollywood sense; they're just temperamental in the wild-animal sense—nervous and wary of people and cameras up close.

Gorillas are among the most nervous, and when a gorilla gets nervous, sometimes it can be fatal, though not to the gorilla. Host Bob Dale, whose role, says executive producer George Stantis, is "the guy from the sticks who knows nothing and asks the curator to explain everything," recently had his coat torn off by a gorilla. Another time a stunt man dressed as a gorilla continued

entered the gorilla compound. Everything was rosy until the gorillas got a whiff of man scent and began to get restless. The man-gorilla left hurriedly.

To lessen the impact of civilization on the animals, the zoo pampers them outrageously. Girls of high-school age are hired to feed and attend baby gorillas because they prefer the feminine touch. Penguins are fed vitamin pills by naving the pill placed within a fish's mouth; the fish is then dropped down the penguin's gullet. The polar bear area is refrigerated, and large chunks of ice are put in the water to keep it at just the right temperature.

The show is produced in three sepa-

rate, seven-minute segments—one segment, say, on polar bears, another on owls and a third on mice. All sorts of technical gadgetry is needed to show the animals at their best—a camera suspended from a 50-foot strato-tower for overhead shots, microphones at the end of booms or ropes to pick up sounds from shy or dangerous animals, and large glass boxes with which to film birds. These boxes confine the birds, yet make them appear to be flying in their vast, simulated rain-forest habitat.

The program, started locally 10 years ago, never has to dig for talent—the zoo with its 4500 animals (1350 species) is one of the world's largest.

# Why Atlanta will be the home of the Braves

# TELEVISION—WHICH MEANS MONEY— IS THE HEART OF THE MATTER

When Walter Francis O'Malley, the illustrious owner of the Dodgers, departed the friendly borough of Brooklyn for the pathless wastes of California, he ascribed his action largely to the success of the former Boston Braves in Milwaukee.

"We were drawing a million people a year in Brooklyn," said O'Malley, "and the Braves were drawing two million. That's a difference of a million attendance, right?"

A deduction of such brilliance resisted criticism.

"Well, at an average admission of two dollars," continued O'Malley, "it meant that Milwaukee had two million dollars a year more than we had, to put into its organization. If that disparity were permitted to last, it would be only a matter of a few years before the Braves would be the Yankees of the National League—and the Dodgers would be the Washington Senators."

Thus, O'Malley was inspired to leave Brooklyn in a move which was to change the whole structure of professional sports. He persuaded the Giants to join him on the West Coast, leaving the New York area without a National League team. And so were born the duckbilled platypi of the baseball zoo, the Mets. And, for the first time, big league baseball came to Texas with a franchise in Houston.

Not to be outstripped, the American League also voted to expand. And there is little doubt but that the success of the Dodgers and Giants on the Coast led to the transfer West of pro basketball. With the sports boom in high gear, the American Football League was established, prompting an expansion of the rival National League.

It is more than a little ironic that today the team which ignited this chain reaction should itself be standing on the doorsill of flight. A lameduck club in Milwaukee, the Braves are playing their last season in that community, having announced their intention to shift to Atlanta next year.

In Georgia they have been promised handsome revenues from radio and TV, very likely exceeding \$1,000,000 in their first season. This is a sharp improvement over the \$400,000 they received in Milwaukee last year. And, not surprisingly, they are getting less this year, considering that sponsors in Milwaukee see little future in aligning themselves with a team which already has its hat and coat on.

The Braves, in fact, are sending 18 games on television and 55 on radio to Atlanta this season, with Mel Allen, the erstwhile "Voice of the Yankees," at the microphone.

As this deathless prose is composed, the club faces a black year at the gate. Many Milwaukeeans are bitter. A civic group called Teams, Inc., is working feverishly to stimulate ticket sales, not for its love of the Braves, but with the hope of keeping alive the city's chances of landing another major league franchise.

The story of Milwaukee and the Braves is one of baseball's most unusual case studies. It shows how a community, beset with complacency, can lose its most valuable public-relations property, a big league club, and the millions in revenue that it brings into its city each year.

It shows, too, in the age of television, that profit transcends civic loyalties. Owners today pursue the loot, even if it entails idling a public stadium and roads leading to it.

It remains unaccountable what happened to Milwaukee's attendance. At first the Braves consistently drew 2,000,000 a year at home, but by 1962 and '63, the figure had dropped to under 800,000. It rose to a little more than 900,000 last year, but it wasn't enough to encourage the management to stay, mainly because TV and radio prospects had also declined.

"We began to have trouble with sponsors in 1963," says John McHale, president of the Braves. "An American League team had moved to Minnearolises". Paul and was beginning

neapolis-St. Paul and was beginning to dilute our audiences. Sponsors weren't easy to line up in '63. We finally came away with \$525,000 at a time in which O'Malley was getting a million for radio alone." McHale describes Milwaukee's TV and radio in

1964 as a "disastrous buy."
"A local brewery, mostly out of

charity, agreed to underwrite the whole package, including 30 TV games, for \$400,000," he says. "The brewery then tried to peddle part of the time but apparently didn't completely succeed. I have been told it had to keep more than it wanted."

It was then, according to the Braves' president, that the management gave up on Milwaukee. Guaranteed a Southeast network of six states, plus a new stadium, if it moved to Atlanta, the club yielded to these blandishments and proclaimed that it would play ball in Dixie in '65.

Apparently it was confident it could settle its contract with Milwaukee County, to which it was committed until the end of this year. Civic leaders, however, hollered police with such volume, and politicians made such threats, that the National League ordered the Braves to stay where they

were until their contract expired.

As for president McHale, he took off discreetly before the season even started. It wasn't the eggs that Milwaukeeans threw against his house. Nor was it the "For Sale" signs they planted on his front lawn. But when someone poured oven cleaner into his gas tank, he got the feeling that his romance with Milwaukee had cooled, and he fled with his family to Palm Beach, Fla., where he is now residing.

Manager Bobby Bragan, meanwhile, has been left to slug it out in hostile territory with a team which, interestingly, has a big shot at the pennant.

For roughly \$90, a viewer in Milwaukee can have a special antenna installed which will capture the televised games of the Cubs and White Sox in Chicago. Asked if the Braves could get these poachers out to County Stadium with a winning team this year, Bragan replied confidently: "I can't help believe that we still have friends in this town. I can walk into any restaurant and get a table—and I have yet to find oven cleaner in my gas tank."

# FOR THE RECORD



Disgruntled Newsmen: As if President Johnson didn't have enough to worry about these days, he now has a disgruntled TV-news corps to contend with. The three network news departments are united in their dissatisfaction with the White House's handling of Presidential TV appearances. The situation came to a head during the first few days of the Dominican Republic crisis when, on two occasions, the President took to the air on such short notice the networks were incapable of coping with all the problems created by the last-minute decisions. The network newsmen want, mainly, two things: (1) Earlier warning, whenever possible, to ensure that they will be ready when the President is; and (2) More specific information about what the President intends to talk about, to help them determine how extensive their coverage should be. A scheduled meeting between White House Press Secretary George Reedy and network representatives, at which these matters were to be thrashed out, was postponed by Reedy at the last minute, amid rumorsdenied by a White House spokesman -that the President was "furious" over the criticisms of his TV etiquette.

Thataway, Thataway: It finally happened. Someone put on the wrong reel of film and viewers in the West saw 10 minutes of *The Virginian* twice, missed another 10. Phone calls galore. NBC: "Just a human error."

Invitation Declined: ABC has disposed of its 10 o'clock actor, Robert Lansing (see cover story beginning on page 24), but getting rid of the character he plays in 12 O'clock High is a messier problem. How do you write an Air Corps general out of a TV series? Do you kill him off? Do you transfer him? Or do you just let him fade away and hope viewers won't notice? Of these three alternatives, ABC's brain trust prefers the first. The network's executives would like to see Brig. Gen. Frank Savage go down in flames, thus eliminating him neatly and, as far as the show's writers are concerned, painlessly. Accordingly Quinn Martin, 12 O'clock High's executive producer, has cordially invited Lansing to come back and play the big death scene. Lansing has declined, with no regrets -telling Martin and ABC, in effect, to go fly a plane. "I'm out of the show, and that does it," he said last week, with finality. The best bet now is that Savage will be "transferred" away from the base and from the series.

Color Marches On: The way things are shaping up, we can look forward to the prospect that the season after next will find virtually all nighttime network programs telecast in color. ABC and CBS last week both declared that they were stepping up color plans for next fall-each will colorcast about one-third of its nighttime programs. In addition CBS announced that all of its evening entertainment shows will be colorcast beginning September 1966. ABC will very likely follow suit. NBC is a year ahead of its rivals, with nearly all of its prime-time programs slated for color next season.

# ONLY YOU, SHERWOOD SCHWARTZ

One man believed in 'Gilligan's Island';

his perseverance made the show what it is today

At homes all over Hollywood one afternoon last November, CBS messengers delivered 3-foot-square packages wrapped in burlap and tied with hemp, bearing the label: Gilligan's Island Castaway Kit.

The boxes contained snake-bite antidote (a pint of Canadian Club), malaria cure (a split of champagne), a carton of cigarets (for smoke signals), hardtack (a stale bagel), canned K rations (for instant banquets), Gilligan's Island weather reports (the sunny Nielsen ratings for the previous month), and an invitation to a

shipwreck costume party celebrating the show's unexpected success.

The next night, some 200 members of the local press corps were shuttled via jeep-driven, 12-man lifeboat from the gates of the old Republic lot in North Hollywood to CBS Stage 2.

Inside, they were plied with screwdrivers (liquid) served in coconut shells, offered barbecued spareribs and fried rice, and confronted with the undulating delights of two sarongclad dancers from Central Casting.

"It was a good opportunity to gather and chat with some of continued

the critics who had blasted the show," said executive producer Sherwood Schwartz, beaming as six carefree male journalists struggled through hula lessons in a sandy island clearing. "We wanted to try to explain to them that we were doing a different kind of show, not the usual situation comedy."

In truth, however, the large turnout was a combination victory party and tribute to the tenacity of the crew-cut, 48-year-old Schwartz, who had created the series. Despite the worst collection of opening-night reviews since The Beverly Hillbillies, and the aggravations of network interference, Gilligan's Island had battled through as one of the season's biggest hits. "I suffered incredible agonies for months," Schwartz recalls. "Nearly everything went wrong."

He first conceived his story of seven characters marooned on an uncharted, uninhabited Pacific island in the spring of 1963, unabashedly using Robinson Crusoe as his model. "That book is like in the top 10 best sellers of all time," says Schwartz, once head writer on Red Skelton's show.

Within 48 hours after Schwartz's agent showed them a presentation, United Artists-Television advanced him the money to develop the show.

The title for Gilligan's had been plucked from the Los Angeles telephone directory. "I wanted the word 'island' and I wanted a name that automatically meant that it was a comedy show," he explains. "I wanted a happy name that was also funny, a name that would inspire this attitude in the viewer. I also believe in hard letters. G is a hard letter. The G's and the L's are crisp."

In a 10-page mimeographed outline, he described those who would be shipwrecked on the island. "What I hoped to portray were cliché characters," admits Schwartz, who holds Master's degrees in both zoology and psychology. "If I had taken seven off-beat individuals that nobody was familiar with and put them in a jungle, the audience wouldn't understand what I was doing. Each had to represent a different segment of society: the wealthy, the Hollywood glamor girl, the country girl, the professor, the misfit, and the resourceful bull of a man. Anybody who is watching can identify with somebody."

The costly, \$175,000 pilot took six days to film in a remote section of Kauai, Hawaii. Much of its financing was absorbed by CBS, which had become a partner in producing the show with United Artists.

#### Aubrey didn't like it

"Once the pilot was made, the troubles started," says Schwartz. "Virtually everybody at CBS liked the premise. Mike Dann, vice president in charge of programming, told me it was the best idea for a situation comedy that he had ever heard. Hunt Stromberg, then a West Coast vice president, was also very, very high on it. But Jim Aubrey, the network president at the time, disliked the show. From the opening gong he just didn't care for it. In meeting after meeting Aubrey was as discouraging as he could be. He tried to get me to change the whole concept."

Schwartz's huddles with the CBS brass virtually coincided with those of another TV writer, Merle Miller, who was attempting to sell Aubrey a series idea called *Calhoun*. Miller's incredible frustrations were revealed in the popular book, "Only You, Dick Daring!" Schwartz, who often entered Aubrey's office while Miller was leaving it, calls the history of his show "Dick Daring Jr."

Most of his meetings with Aubrey occurred in a beige-carpeted, first-floor conference room at CBS Television City in Hollywood. "All right,"

Aubrey snapped during one of them, jackknifing his elongated frame into a high-backed chair. "If you guys are in love with a deserted island, we wreck them there the first week. The second week they have a new adventure, they fix the boat and they're off someplace else." Schwartz fidgeted. "Jim," he said, "that's an idea for a show, but it's not my show."

Aubrey persisted. "I don't like the idea of staying there. I want a charter boat to take people to different places."

Schwartz refused to launch a charter boat. Aubrey went ahead and authorized another series about a charter boat, *The Baileys of Balboa*. His friend Keefe Brasselle was named executive producer. *Baileys* later was canceled after 26 episodes.

"Today," says Schwartz, "the network, the sponsors and the advertising agency think the star of Gilligan's Island is—the island."

United Artists, the co-producers, also took a turn at hobbling Schwartz. "Dick Dorso, who is no longer with UA, refused to allow me to do a song at the opening of the show," he recalls. "The only way I can establish who these people are and put them on an island is in a song. I was told no—no reasons given. That's a good enough reason, if you're a big executive."

A completed version of the Gilligan's pilot, without a song, was shipped back to New York. Schwartz appended a note indicating that the finished product did not represent his original thinking. CBS brass rejected the film, without explanation.

"To all purposes it was dead," declares Schwartz. "At this point I asked: 'Is everybody through with the film now? Can I do it my way?' So now I wrote the song that I'd been hollering was the only solution to the problem." With one finger he created a melody on a baby grand in his home, later adding the lyrics himself.

Then he viewed the assembled film footage, re-edited it, and rushed a

new version to Manhattan, where it was shown to a test audience. "This is the pilot I had in mind," he tersely wrote, in an accompanying memo.

"The results were phenomenal," says Schwartz. "CBS looked at them and threw them out, saying there was something wrong with the audience. That's how high it scored. They retested it twice more. Again the audiences indicated that the show would be a hit. This was in the final week of the selling season. They were locking up the '64-65 schedule continued



and my show was not on it."

At the eleventh hour, late one afternoon, Aubrey gave in and firmed the show. Then, with uncommon guile, CBS officials began to eviscerate their latest acquisition. "I attended more meetings," says Schwartz.

"'Who can identify,' they said, 'with a Hollywood actress? There must be a character who fits a larger audience.'

"I was told: 'Who's going to understand a billionaire?' They said: 'Make him a wealthy man; there are more wealthy men than billionaires.'

"I was told that the professor was colorless—a science teacher—what kind of flair does that have to it?

"The major battle that was fought and won was to keep the seven characterizations intact. Without them, the show could not have succeeded. Unfortunately, the pilot show is the one that meddlers have several months to analyze. The more something is analyzed, the more faults are found, whether actual or imaginary. I dare say, if one had a year to play with a show, and enough experts saw it, you'd have nothing left."

#### Actors were replaced

The CBS command, however, managed to win several skirmishes. Three of the actors who appeared in the pilot were discharged and replaced. Two extra days of shooting the new trio added to production costs. For this last-ditch revamping, a picturesque stretch of sand known as Zuma Beach, Cal., served as an excellent replacement for Hawaii.

The new shooting, plus continued CBS vacillation, resulted in a great scurry to get the first show into the can. "I think we did a marvelous job even getting it on the air," says series top-liner Bob Denver.

"Jim Aubrey still didn't like the show," Schwartz explains. "Three

scripts were written, but with a new show everybody has to approve the scripts before you can start shooting. Well, if Jim didn't like the show to begin with, it was predictable he wouldn't like the scripts. He didn't care for seven people on an island and all these scripts were about seven people on an island."

What eventually reached the air late in September was a pastiche of three separate shows, including half of the pilot, welded together by the CBS group think.

"I did not want this ersatz first show to air first," says Schwartz. "I wanted the pilot to air first. Unfortunately, I do not have complete creative control of this show and I was overruled. So a show that had been projected as our second or third show was shown first.

"It was an outlandish beginning. If you're telling a story about people who get shipwrecked, the only honest way is if the first show is about how they got wrecked. Instead, it was about how they were trying to get off the island. It's like starting on chapter two. You didn't know who they were. I think this affected the critics' reviews. Had it come later in the series, it would have been greeted in a different way."

But to the consternation of the critics and despite the many CBS monkey wrenches, *Gilligan's Island* was a success with the viewers, never dropping out of the top 40.

Last month, Schwartz sat in his tidy office beneath a wall cluttered with plaques commemorating the Emmy he won for writing on the Red Skelton show, and additional citations for writing honors on other Skelton segments and a play on which a Lucille Ball-Bob Hope special was based. Having weathered both network and critical pressure, he sagaciously described some of the reasons for his show's popularity.

"I'm an enormous believer in uniforms," he said. "One of the big rea-

sons for the success of many shows is identification—the sheriff with the badge and the hat, the doctor with his white jacket, as opposed to the newspaper-reporter shows. These have failed because the actors look like other people. Whether you like my show or not, you tune into Gilligan's Island and in one second you know what show you're looking at.

"They say familiarity breeds contempt. I think it breeds viewers if you can get people familiar with your pattern. People watch for patterns. not the same thing every week, but the general outline. They want to keep seeing the same kind of thing. Shows that go all over the placeall you have to do is look at the anthologies-go down the drain, one after another. If you come into people's homes, you're their friends. They want you to be who you are, they don't want you to change. What they want to change is the dialog, story and the scene."

As Gilligan's Island wound up its first season, Schwartz was already plotting changes in dialog, story and scene for 1965-1966. Methodically, on legal-size yellow tablets, he noted possible situations—a deposed South American dictator is dumped on the island and subjugates its denizens; a lion escapes from a sea-borne zoo shipment, washes ashore and terrorizes the island inhabitants; two Russian cosmonauts make a landing.

One of Schwartz's sure-fire story ideas, sadly, will never be seen on the tube. "A toothache on this island, which lacks all the facilities of modern dentistry, would make a hilarious episode," he mused. "But I have a big respect for sponsors and I guess I'll never use it." Gilligan's Island is partially bankrolled by Crest, at a cost of about \$40,000 a minute. "If it meant keeping a sponsor," sighed Schwartz, crestfallen, "I would even consider sitting on the side of the class that has the most cavities."

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Marlyn (pronounced somewhere between Marlon the actor and marlin the fish) Mason has appeared in The Roques, Bonanza, My Three Sons. Valentine's Day, The Lieutenant, The Bill Dana Show and The Real McCous. to mention a few: she stars in a stillunsold pilot film for a new TV series called Tell Aggie; and she'll be guest star of the first five Ben Casey episodes next fall.

She denies allegations that she is a swinger-a somewhat suspect term bearing overtones of la dolce vita. She says, "I adore men, but I'm looking for the sort of man who would send me flowers." Then, wistfully, "If men would just send flowers."

If they did, the flowers would go to a small aerie above the Sunset Strip overlooking most of Los Angeles through a picture window which fills one entire wall of the living room. Whenever Marlyn passes the picture window in dishabille, she waves, "Just in case anyone is looking," but no one could be, because the house is high above its neighbors.


Although she was once married, for a year and a half to musician Ray Henderson, she now prefers the single life. When she is working, she comes right home from the studio, takes off her makeup, studies her lines for the next day and then goes to bed. "I don't kid around," she says. "If I don't get enough sleep, I wake up with the most beautiful circles under my eyes. I'd like to look good when I'm 50."

Marlyn is 24. She was born in San Fernando, Cal., on Aug. 7, 1940 and started acting when she was in junior high school. At 13, she appeared in a play at The Players' Ring in Los Angeles and later starred there in "Heidi" and as Becky Thatcher in "Tom Sawyer." At 15 she did her first television show, Matinee Theatre, At 18 she and her sister auditioned for Harold Minsky at the Dunes in Las Vegas-"as dancers," she emphasizes-and were sent to Chicago to entertain at a

bankers convention. She says, "I thought Las Vegas was East. It was a big thrill to go all the way to Chicago." Later, she appeared at the Desert Inn in Las Vegas before returning to Los Angeles. There she starred in "The Billy Barnes Revue." which was "my real launching pad."

She could be doing more television than she is, if she and her manager did not insist upon guest-star billing. While waiting for the right part to come along, she spends her days playing tennis, riding a bicycle, and studying singing, dancing and acting.

To make up for the flowers men don't send, she has surrounded her living room and the adjacent sun deck with 52 potted plants. Says she, "When I'm not working, I go to the unemployment office, pick up my money and then rush to buy some more."

## Helen Traubel:

# She's a lot of woman...

The rather robust, not particularly elegant but nonetheless complimentary description which appears above applies literally, figuratively, and in spades to Helen Traubel, who occasionally plays Tony Franciosa's mother

in Valentine's Day on ABC.

She is 20 pounds less woman than she was back in the 1940's, when she was the reigning Wagnerian soprano of the Metropolitan Opera Company, but that still leaves a lot of woman. Her departure from the Met in 1953 is probably typical of her and is linked in part to television.

She had done a guest appearance with Jimmy Durante. She did it with some misgivings: "When he asked me to go on his show, I wondered what I would do—just stand around and laugh?"

When Durante suggested that she do a night-club appearance, she again had misgivings, but she had herself booked into the Chez Paree in Chicago on her way East for the Metropolitan season.

Her singing of "St. Louis Blues" in a night-club floor show brought nationwide publicity and a letter from Rudolf Bing, manager of the Met, disapproving of her loss of dignity.

She promptly resigned from the opera company, saying to Bing, "I took my dignity where I went."

She still has a great dignity, but it is leavened with fun and laughter and joy in life, as it always was. For the Met itself was not all dignity. Lauritz Melchior, the great Wagnerian tenor who sang opposite her, used to cross his eyes and put funny things under his helmet to make her laugh onstage. Amazingly—since her great laugh comes with such ease—she never did.

The laugh has been with her all her life. Hearing it, her mother used to say, "You'll never be a lady." That was in the days when Helen was a little girl back in St. Louis, where she was born on June 16, 1903.

Her father didn't care whether she was a lady or not. He had a box at Sportsman's Park and took her to the ball game every day. Eventually she bought an interest in the St. Louis Browns and kept it for a while in their descendants, the Baltimore Orioles.

She is a great TV sports fan: "I get so excited I feel like putting my foot through the tube." But she is a TV fan, period: "I watch everything. You couldn't tell whether it's a good show or a bad show by me. I even like the commercials."

She and her husband, William Bass, have four television sets in their Santa Monica, Cal., apartment, including a small one on the dining room table: "Before we got it we had been eating all our meals at card tables because we didn't want to miss anything."


Concerning her role in Valentine's Day, she says, "I have a wonderful opportunity to learn a little something at my stage of life. Of course, I'm really not an actress. I just react. I'm a singer. In opera, there's just so far you can go in acting. You put your left hand up one year, then the next year you put your right hand up.

"These are the mellowing years—I'm just coasting along. But sometimes I wonder how much you can wring out of a career. I hope I know when to quit. I think I will. I'm terribly self-conscious. I see myself on TV and say, 'Oh, no, no.' I'm older than I thought I was. I think, 'What that must be to work with!'

Hal Kanter, producer of Valentine's Day, says, "It's so wonderful just to have her around."

Tony Franciosa says, "She and my own mother are from entirely different worlds, but they're alike in one respect—their warmth. Helen Traubel has such great warmth."

GENERAL Robert Lansing was fine
DIED on 10 o'clock missions, but...

You can't say TV networks don't advance our scientific knowledge. Only a few weeks ago, for example, ABC succeeded in isolating a brandnew species of human being—the 10-o'clock actor.

His name is Robert Lansing.

As the star this season on ABC's 12 O'clock High, Lansing helped attract a large enough audience at 10 o'clock on Friday nights to give the show a respectable rating against its competitors—Jack Paar on NBC and Slattery's People on CBS.

Accordingly ABC has renewed 12 O'clock High for another year—but Lansing will not be back. Reason: The show moves next season to the 7:30 Monday time slot, and (to continue the alleged logic of the unrevealed ABC executive genius) Bob is a warm, talented star only at the mysteriously magic hour of 10 P.M.

Lest any reader accuse TV Gude of pulling his leg, Variety, the showbusiness trade paper, offers testimony from 12 O'clock High executive producer Quinn Martin, who said at the time, "ABC is very high on Lansing, and asked me to find another series for him. They said they want him for a 10 P.M. show. Had we remained at 10 P.M., Bob would have continued."

Ever since the story broke in print, Hollywood has been trying to figure it out. One observer speculated that to appeal to the 7:30 audience, which contains more juveniles, the show will have to feature more physical action, which calls for a younger star.

That is sound reasoning—except that Robert Lansing is younger than the actor replacing him, Paul Burke.

Another "expert" reasoned that the earlier audience will demand a more versatile star. Yet Lansing has starred in stage roles ranging from the lead in the farce "Charley's Aunt" to heavy dramatic parts in plays by Eugene O'Neill and Tennessee Williams.

Still another reason advanced was, "ABC does not feel the audience

watching at that hour will identify with the lead character, a U.S. Air Force general. Consequently, Paul Burke has been signed to star next season, playing a colonel."

Being pigeonholed as a 10 o'clock actor—a classification previously undiscovered by students of the thespic art from Stanislavsky to Lee Strasberg—might be expected to enrage Lansing, especially since it meant losing an astronomical paycheck. But Lansing savs he isn't angry.

"I can't hate ABC," he says. "Hating a network would be like hating Dodger Stadium. Maybe I could be sore at the individual executive, but I have no idea who he is. My contract was with Quinn Martin, and he's the only one I've talked to. I can't be mad at Quinn, either. He says it was the network's decision, and I have no evidence to make me doubt him."

Yet when Martin offered Lansing the opportunity to remain with 12 O'clock High next season, playing Paul Burke's wing commander, a character that would be of considerable dramatic importance but would appear only occasionally, Lansing refused.

"That's not what made me bow out," Lansing said. "When I realized what changes would be made in the show for that younger audience, I knew 12 O'clock High couldn't be the same quality show next year, and 12 hours a day is too long to work at something you don't like."

Lansing has already had offers for other TV series; but, at least for the moment, he is rejecting them. This is true to form; he refused quite a few before selecting 12 O'clock High. One series he turned down—according to Quinn Martin, not Lansing—was called The Fugitive.

Instead of diving back into TV, Lansing hopefully intends to concentrate on working in feature films, where not only the stature is higher and the money better, but careers last longer. As he points out: continued

"Once an actor stays with a series too long, movie producers lose interest in him. TV is great for a certain amount of public recognition. Then, if he can leave TV when he's riding high, he's in a position to make his move—the way Steve McQueen, James Garner and Rod Taylor did."

Whatever happens, Lansing will continue to act. He regards his profession as proudly as the Mayos do medicine. Acting, he says, has enabled him to overcome the inner scars of a frustrating childhood and become, in his mid-30's, the solid citizen he likes to think he is.

#### Mature and professional

"He's the most mature and professional actor I've ever met," says 12 O'clock High producer Frank Glicksman. "To prepare for this role of Brig. Gen. Frank Savage, Bob read everything he could find about World War II pilots, and interviewed as many as he could. He also became a pilot himself. Then he induced a psychiatrist friend to read the published diary of Gen. Frank Armstrong (the war pilot upon whose exploits the series character is based) to help explain why a general reacts to various situations as Armstrong did."

Such intense preparation paid off in



surprisingly warm reviews. TV Gude's Cleveland Amory, who scatters praise as Silas Marner did gold, wrote, "Make no mistake about it. Robert Lansing is magnificent." Others repeated the phrase "dedicated actor" so often that one observer questioned "such singleness of purpose and dedication to the mere art of acting."

Replies Lansing: "I don't take myself that seriously—but I do take seriously what I'm doing because it's the way I spend my life."

He was born Robert Brown in San Diego at the dawn of the Great Depression and his early years are a kaleidoscopic blur of temporary homes. His father, a charming but impractical young salesman, roamed the Southwest pursuing "that big deal."

When Bob was 9 the town was Seagraves, Texas. One night he sneaked under a loose flap into a visiting tent show. To escape the realities of his impoverished, unrooted home life, the young gate crasher grabbed hungrily at the pleasant make-believe world he saw created onstage—and determined to become an actor. The next morning, he volunteered for the grammar-school play, then immediately began driving himself with the total-commitment intensity that still carbonates his life.

Back in California a few years later, he kept polishing the dream in school plays, charity bazaars, back-yard kid shows, etc. When, as a teen-ager in Los Angeles, he learned that he'd have to serve time in the Army, he quit University High School, enlisted, served his two years and started hitchhiking from Los Angeles to Broadway.

Stopping in Fort Wayne, Ind., to visit an aunt, he became an actor with the local civic-theater group, a radio announcer and a teen-age husband. Two years later, the Lansings took off for New York. Using his GI Bill benefits. Robert enrolled at the American

Theatre Wing's dramatic school.

To the world, the late Forties were a time of prosperity; to the Lansings it was a rerun of the Depression. When funds got so low Bob had to sell a pint of blood for \$5 eating money, his wife decided she couldn't take any more. Bob didn't blame her and they're still good friends.

Back in the theatrical salt mines, he spent the next year chauffeuring a traveling repertory company's bus 37,000 miles—and acting every night after he found a place to park.

In New York he married a gifted actress named Emily McLaughlin (currently co-star of ABC's daytime serial *General Hospital*). A year or so later, with both unemployed and broke, Emily became pregnant.

#### A change in fortunes

Their fortunes changed. Cast soon after young Bobby's birth as the psychiatrist in the stage version of Tennessee Williams' "Suddenly Last Summer," Lansing was named one of that season's two best off-Broadway actors. (The other—George C. Scott.) That success led to his first Hollywood TV part in Alcoa Presents.

Lansing's hunger for information—as if to make up for his interrupted formal education—has led him through groaning shelves of books about archeology, scientific crime detection, wood carving, art, entomology and a dozen other subjects. He has become adept at scuba diving (adept enough to teach it), painting, flying, skiing, horseback riding (to be ready for working in Westerns), and judo (for his role as Detective Carella in the old 87th Precinct series).

If Lansing should succeed in movies—sometimes difficult for TV-oriented actors—he would gladly bid TV goodby. So, if you're eager to see television's only network-designated 10 o'clock actor, catch him in the summer reruns of 12 O'clock High.

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#### Branded

This show is NBC's all-too-obvious Western switcheroo on ABC's The Fugitive. Instead of the unjustly accused murderer, we have the unjustly accused coward. Branded stars, as exCapt. Jason McCord, Chuck Connors, who, we will admit at the outset, is not our idea of a man to carry a show by himself—if for no other reason than because, despite his 6-foot-5 height, he is regularly being beaten up by men who don't come up to his elbows. NBC's idea of keeping down the violence is apparently to keep down the height of the guys who do it.

In any case, McCord's life is a constant struggle to set his record straight—to prove that, in the Battle of Bitter Creek, he didn't run away. But it's a rough go, because, as the theme song has it: "All but one man died | There at Bitter Creek." Don't let this discourage you, though. In almost every episode a lot of people keep coming back from the Creek—and, the way we see it, there were more men engaged at Bitter Creek than at Normandy on D-Day.

The show is basically so thin—without any regular characters except McCord—that, to make up for it, the

producers have evolved some of the most involved plots since "John Goldfarb, Please Come Home," and we hesitate to mention this for fear they'll use that plot too. In one recent episode a girl who hates Mc-Cord because she lost her brother at Bitter Creek nonetheless needs McCord's testimony to save her ranch from a large group of small bankerswho, incidentally, also beat McCord up until she comes to his rescue. In another episode McCord comes to an abandoned town where there is a crazy preacher named Joshua Murdock (John Dehner), whose two sons, Micah and Malachi, promptly beat McCord up, and the third, Obadiah, probably would have too, but he died -vou guessed it-at Bitter Creek.

Wal, suh, ol' Josh is not about not to avenge this, and since he has three Indian prisoners named Grav Eagle (whose real name is Iron Eves Cody). Red Arm (X Brands) and Blue Hawk (Eddie Little Sky), his plan is to set Red Arm and Blue Hawk loose at one end of town with knives, and Mc-Cord loose at the other with his saber -which, the last time we saw it, was broken when he was drummed out of the regiment. But McCord is no man to stop for details, and he first hits Red Arm over the head with his saber and ties him up, and then goes after Blue Hawk, who passes up a chance to kill him ("I could have killed you," he says enigmatically, "but I have no desire to open the old wound of Bitter Creek") but is instead killed by Malachi, whereupon McCord throws his saber at Micah. knocks him out, takes his gun and shoots Malachi. "Forget your vengeance, Murdock," he says at the end. "You can't bring old things back. Not your sons, not Bitter Creek, not this town "

It's good unenigmatic advice, and we hope NBC takes it.


