as we see it

• We know of nothing more annoying to viewers than having to choose between two outstanding special programs scheduled at the same hour. The most recent example of this was "Melina Mercouri's Greece" on ABC opposite Lorne Greene narrating "The American West" on NBC. Such conflicts have occurred at least three times this season.

Recently we commented favorably on a suggestion voiced by Hugh Downs to set up some sort of official clearinghouse for specials. Thus when a network set a date and time for a special, it would call the clearinghouse and register its date and time after making certain no other network had already done so. No one would *have* to avoid a registered date, but there would be a kind of gentlemen's agreement that everyone would.

Tom Moore, president of ABC Television, then proposed that the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences act as the impartial clearinghouse, and the Academy's president, Rod Serling, assented. He said he would seek the reactions of CBS and NBC. The reactions: CBS-"Worth considering." NBC-"No comment." Some broadcasters ridiculed the Downs-Moore proposal. "Any time Tom Moore wants to find out if someone has a special scheduled on a certain date, he can get the information easily enough," one executive said. "Besides, there's evidence that each of two specials on the air against one regular entertainment show attracts more audience than it would as a single special on opposite two standard entertainment shows."

We still like the idea. Why don't the networks go all out for minority viewers in this case and give them a chance to see *all* of the specials offered during the season?

• It's *well* worth considering, CBS, and *deserving* of comment, NBC.

THE PROGRAM THAT COMMITTED SUICIDE IN FULL VIEW OF MILLIONS

A British satirical show put the noose around its own neck When David Frost as chairman of the panel of Not So Much a Program, More a Way of Life, a British satire series, asked Peter Sellers whether he had ever been to a fortuneteller and, if so, what had happened, the answer brought a gust of embarrassed laughter from the studio audience. It also busied the switchboard of the British Broadcasting Corporation with protests from angry viewers.

The incident was headlined in next morning's newspapers, but none reported what Sellers had said. It is one of the curiosities of the age of TV satire in England that a remark carried into millions of living rooms, and to the ears of children and grandmothers, may not be fit to print in family newspapers.

Nor can I repeat in this family magazine Sellers' shockingly explicit description of what went on between him and the clairvoyant. Two of the other three panelists that night happened to be Americans. Writer-agent Harvey Orkin groaned, "Off the air with Peter Sellers!" Humorist S. J. Perelman gave a glassy-eyed impression of a stunned yak.

While the BBC prepared yet another gallant defense of its efforts to extend the horizons of free speech on television, Sellers blithely commented: "I suppose what I said might possibly shock some people, but there doesn't seem to be any problem about what you say on the BBC these days."

As it turned out, he could not have been more wrong. For March 14, the date of that program, is now recorded as one of the nights television satire attempted to commit suicide in the land of its birth after only two years of promising existence. Some pinpoint the first sign of the death wish a couple of weeks earlier, when a clumsy effort to caricature the Catholic attitude toward birth control brought demands in Parliament for apology.

Producer Ned Sherrin, 34, the re-

formed lawyer who devised Not So... (as he abbreviates it) and its tart predecessor, That Was the Week That Was, was not among those who saw either furor as a danger signal. Instead he related with relish how Al Capp, who was a guest on the show, had reacted to the birth-control sketch when he read the script at rehearsal.

"He was flabbergasted," Sherrin chortled when we chatted at the time at Lime Grove Studios. "'Are they going to let you do it?' he asked. Did you notice how silent he was on the program? I've never seen Capp quiet on television before." Capp, in fact, did appear to be trying to shrink into invisibility as Dee Wells, who writes a column for a London newspaper, slugged out the population explosion with Norman St. John Stevas, a Catholic Member of Parliament.

Sherrin agreed that the sketch was controversial, but, he said, he had created the show for "people who can switch on their sets without switching off their minds."

Not So . . . was given an unusual time slot—45 minutes each on Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights. Frost, an astonishingly mature chairman for his years, had the mission of provoking three or four good talkers into comment on pertinent topics, often introducing the subject by means of a sketch or song performed by a talented repertory company.

The program was launched Nov. 13, which was, predictably, the very night the protests began. The remark that started the phones ringing was: "Did you notice on TV the other night that the new Chancellor of the Exchequer looks just like Jesus Christ?" Two days later the High Commissioner of Kenya was demanding an apology for a skit in which actor John Bird, in a beaded cap and carrying a fly whisk in the style of Jomo Kenyatta, suggested that the Kenya opposition had been coerced out of existence.

"It was," stormed the continued

High Commissioner, "a pernicious attempt to deride and hold up to contempt the head of a friendly state and flagrantly distort recent constitutional events...."

In the next program Frost blandly referred to the protest and said they had decided to give Kenyatta a chance to reply. This was followed by a sketch in which Bird again pretended to be Kenyatta. This time the director general of the BBC, Sir Hugh Carleton Greene, had to move into the situation with an explanation to the High Commissioner that Britons knew how to evaluate political caricature.

The detractors increased

And so the program bumped along from controversy to controversy. It wasn't as penetrating as the original TW3—"You can't scream as loudly three times a week as once," said Sherrin—but on occasion it was brilliant, and it had its staunch defenders.

The program's detractors, however, were more vocal than its supporters. The Football Association objected to an attack on referees; the chairman of the House of Commons Broadcasting Advisory Group claimed a sketch slighted religion; the Salvation Army newspaper "War Cry" charged Not So . . . with hypocrisy, distortion and sex-exploitation. The BBC gamely resisted these pressures and those exerted by various other groups.

Then came the birth-control sketch, in which a priest appeared to be persuading the mother of a numerous brood to interest her husband in still another child. Twenty-three members of the House of Commons signed this motion: "That the House condemns the action of the BBC who have outraged the conscience of . . . millions of TV viewers . . . by transmitting a disgusting and grossly offensive sketch . . . and deplores the flagrant and nauseating attack on the dignity of family life and calls for an immediate improvement in the standard of such transmissions and demands a public apology by the BBC...."

The leader of the House of Lords, the Earl of Longford, a Catholic, denounced the sketch as "criminal." Sir Hugh did the best he could under difficult circumstances. He wrote Simon Mahon, the M.P. who had originated the parliamentary protest, agreeing that the sketch was open to criticism but pointing out that St. John Stevas had been able to balance it by presenting the Catholic position on the same program.

Then Kenneth Adam, director of BBC-TV, made it quite clear that there had been an apology only because the sketch was off target and not because it tackled birth control and the Catholic stand thereon. "Satire," he said, possibly hoping Sherrin would take heed, "has got to be precise and accurate if it is to avoid the wrong kind of offense."

A friend in Parliament

In Parliament Tom Driberg offered a countermotion demanding that producers for the BBC (which is financed by license fees paid by all set owners in Britain) continue to have the right to experiment. This was heartening support from the top down but, alas, Not So . . . gave very little help to its friends. The painful process of harakiri accelerated with the Sellers incident and continued on the night of March 26, when the program additionally dismayed those Americans who happened to be watching, including myself. An actor portraying Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara spoke of "selected" targets in North Vietnam. What selected targets had the Americans in mind? Hospitals!

One of the panel, Iain Macleod, a possible future Tory prime minister, immediately protested. Frost lamely tried to defend the sketch as fair.

There was worse to come that same night. Another panelist, Bernard Levin, a well-known newspaper columnist, described former Prime Minister Sir Alec Douglas-Home as a "cretin."

Politicians are fair game for satire, and no one recognizes this more than Sir Alec. He whimsically concedes he does not have a television personality, and he made no protest at all when a dummy in his image kept appearing in a fake ventriloquist act on earlier Not So . . . programs. But whatever might be one's political feeling about Sir Alec, he is a man of integrity and courage. (Flat on his back for two years, he quipped after a spinal operation: "They've performed a miracle -putting backbone into a politician.") Levin's attack provoked another counterattack from Macleod, who accused Levin of "crude, vulgar words of abuse." Said Levin: "Well, I withdraw the word cretin." He suggested "imbecile" to replace it.

Still time for a reprieve

Even political opponents of Sir Alec resented these remarks. The newspaper Daily Mirror headlined an article on Levin "The Man Whose Tongue Ran Away with His Head." It said Levin "now has the distinction of having played a major part in executing a TV program..."

Although it was the 11th hour, and the warden was figuratively in the death cell ready to lead the condemned to the scaffold, there was still time for a reprieve for the program. Incredibly, instead of playing it safe until the end of its first series, April 11, Not So... insisted on placing the noose around its own neck only two nights later.

On the afternoon of March 28 one of the great ladies of Britain, the Princess Royal, aunt of Queen Elizabeth, died suddenly while her brother, the Duke of Windsor, was still recovering from a frightening operation on his eye. That very night the program put on a sort of comic-strip operetta account of the romance of the Duke of Windsor and his duchess—a romance that once shook the throne.

The sketch had been recorded on tape some time earlier, and its use that night was an appalling error in judgment. To many it seemed an invasion of the Royal Family's grief.

The inevitable happened within 48 hours. Sir Hugh disclosed that the show would not be returning in the autumn, although Sherrin had confidently expected that it would. "Satire has given us a great deal of trouble," Sir Hugh said with British understatement. "The difficulty is to combine freedom of expression with responsibility. The format used is not entirely successful."

Sherrin does not agree. "Personally," he said, "I think there was only one error—the decision to put out the Windsor sketch on the day his sister died. It was meant good-naturedly but, unfortunately, people tend to believe that if it's on Not So... it's meant as a slam."

The pity of it is that television needs programs with courage—which Not So...had—and judgment, which it too often did not. Sherrin believes someone else may come up with a satirical idea next season which may, at least, keep alive the climate of open discussion on television.





FALL "GUY

Dick Van Dyke is one of those rare birds who can play light and low comedy and lovers," says Carl Reiner, producer of *The Dick Van Dyke Show.* "In other words he can play the boob, the sophisticate and the sincere lover and you believe him."

Although Dick Van Dyke is noted for his chameleonlike ability to assume almost any type of role, there's no doubt that his forte is comedy, and one essential ingredient of comedy—low—is a talent for falling down. Here he demonstrates how to **continued**

fall off a ladder, comically. As he puts it, it's "Mr. Fumbles trying to be Mr. Helpful by showing the little woman how to change a light bulb."

All during his career, from early night-club days to his present TV show, the fall has had an honored place in Dick's comic repertoire. Back in 1958 he and producer Aaron Ruben (The Andy Griffith Show, Gomer Pyle) did a pilot called, of all things, The Dick Van Dyke Show. It was a variety program along the lines of the Gleason and Skelton shows. Van Dyke says, and "I did a monolog and sketches and fell down a lot. But it never sold. Then we did another pilot called Poor Richard, a situation comedy in which I fell a lot too, and it didn't sell. Now, finally, I'm getting paid for falling."

Carl Reiner, who has seen Dick fall as often as anybody, concedes that he is quite expert at it, but Carl has some theories of his own on falling.

The more dignity and pomp present in the fallee before he falls, the funnier it is, according to Reiner. "That's why we laughed when Chaplin kicked people in the rear. If he kicked a bum we didn't laugh. It was always a big fat rich lady."

The fall is useful in comedy because it provides the important element of surprise. In one *Dick Van Dyke Show*, "Father of the Week," Dick in his role as comedy writer Rob Petrie uses a fall to demonstrate surprise in comedy to a schoolroom full of kids. "When I walked into this classroom," he explains to them, "you didn't expect to laugh because I just walked in and sat down. You expected that. But suppose I came in like this."

He goes out, runs back in, catches his hand in the door, makes a face, and finally trips and falls, and gets a big laugh, thus demonstrating his point better than if he'd talked all day.



A fascinating study of the master of suspense as he bows out after 10 years on the air

As of May 10, Alfred Hitchcock presents no more. After 10 years on CBS and NBC, this series leaves the air without fanfare—NBC did not even announce its departure, simply failed to announce its renewal. The ratings of *The Alfred Hitchcock Hour* have gradually slipped, although not catastrophically, and, according to an NBC source, "We merely found Mr.

Hitchcock a little too costly." Hitchcock fans will still have summer and syndicated reruns to console them, but the Master will no longer toddle onto the screen in prime network time, fit himself gently into his own India-ink profile, and deliver his flannel-mouthed, lugubrious jokes.

"We must be philosophical about this," says Mr. Hitchcock about his television demise. "As we all know, TV is a great juggernaut and we're all nuts and bolts attached to it. Sometimes the nuts and bolts fall off." He will be financially afflicted by this decision, of course, but artistically speaking it does not move him profoundly. Just before the decision was made he was complaining about the difficulty of doing good work on TVabout "limited economics and external controls, complaints about stories that are too strong, stories that might shock X or Y." In fact, apart from keeping his eagle eye on the scripts, Hitchcock has had little to do with the practical work on the show itself.

Needless to say, the Hitchcock organization—an economic and artistic institution known all over the world —will still continue to pursue its profitable activities of movie making and of mystery-magazine and mysterybook publishing for its huge international audience. And, if scaring millions of people out of their wits every year is success, the Alfred Hitchcock organization is one of the most successful in history.

Readers may have wondered what it is like to stroll through the portals of the Hitchcock world in which innocent young girls are murdered with foot-long carving knives and thousands of birds descend fiercely from

the skies to attack a helpless mankind. It is quite an astonishing experience. For at the creative heart of this vast universe of stylized horror, seated in dead center like a motionless Buddha, is . . . a great big baby.

There is something inordinately babylike about Alfred Hitchcock. At 65 he still resembles one of those bald, solemn, overfed bundles with pudgy, motionless arms that one sees in prams in the park, staring out into the world with sober eyes. He compounds this impression by toddling around the room and talking of his childhood as if it were yesterday.

"As a little boy," he says in his slow, flannel-mouthed way, "I always loved ad-ven-tchah. One of my favorite pastimes was to find out where the end of the trolley line was, where the bus went, what it looked like. Later I had a passion for timetables. If you took Cook's Continental Timetable you could take an imaginary ride on the Orient Express. I had a large map of the world and I used to make flags for steamship lines. And I'd follow shipping all over the world with these flags stuck on pins. I saw life and the world as an exciting, romantic adventure. This is one root of my work."

He was a lonely, ugly-duckling child of a London poultry dealer ("I don't remember ever having a playmate"), and a lowly member of that rigidly stratified society at whose pinnacle rides a monarch in a golden carriage. He did not feel significant, welcome, or safe in his own world. To this day Hitchcock speaks of the terrors that beset his childhood, terrors that lurked behind apparently innocent and virtuous façades: "I was terrified of the police—of the Jesuit Fathers—of physical punishment—of a lot of things. And this too is the root of my work."

There is every reason to accept this self-analysis. The name Hitchcock has come to mean a special amalgam of these two elements, generated in a far-off yet omnipresent childhood —an amalgam of romance and of dread in changing proportions.

It is the dominantly romantic Hitchcock who has won the reputation of being one of the finest cinematic artists in the world. Building on his love of ad-ven-tchah, the shy young man entered the early world of cinema. At 21 he was designing titles for silent films. By 23 he was an assistant director and writer. And guite suddenly he was famous as one of the most inventive movie makers of his time. His achievements are too many to list; some of the most outstanding are "The 39 Steps," "The Lady Van-ishes," "Rebecca," "Lifeboat," "Spellbound" and "Rear Window." (The last four were all nominated for Academy Awards for best direction.) More recently: "North by Northwest," "Psycho," also nominated, and "The Birds."

The dominant trade-marks of great Hitchcock movies are profoundly revelatory of the man himself—as the short mystery plays which have appeared on his TV show almost never have been.

Hitchcock's best movies are unabashedly romantic. Slender civilized heroes like Cary Grant and icy exquisites like Grace Kelly people the Hitchcock universe, in which they have breathtakingly exciting adventures on trains, on ships, in far-off places. continued

The adventures, of course, are punctuated with horror. In the finest of Hitchcock, horror is a subtle theme achieved by the insertion into an otherwise normal situation of a devastatingly frightening detail. For instance, one sees a serene nun walking at a slow, peaceful pace behind a stretcher bearing a motionless body, swathed in bandages-and suddenly, one sees the nun's feet; she is wearing high heels. The scene of mercy is instantly transformed into a terrifying kidnaping-all the more terrifying because the nun is a symbol of good.

An analysis of his approach

When the Encyclopaedia Britannica asked Hitchcock to write its authoritative article on film production, Hitchcock included an analysis of his own approach to horror. "The more original directors will want to present melodrama in a revolutionary way, to take melodrama out of the dark night, into the bright day, to show murder by a babbling brook, adding a touch of blood to its limpid waters . . . so there emerges a kind of counterpoint and sudden upheaval in the ordinary things in life."

Unlike other directors who require anywhere from a half to two dozen takes, and additional "protection footage" to cover themselves. Hitchcock plans his work in advance in every detail and shoots directly from his script, aware of the dramatic impact of every moment. The New Yorker magazine once described some aspect of his work as "unconscious," and to this day it irritates Hitchcock: "The stupid idiots! As if I don't know what I'm doing. My technique is serious. I play that audience like an organ. I am consciously aware of what I am doing in all my work."

Hitchcock is a violent perfectionist in his work. "Hitch insists upon perfection. He has no patience with mediocrity," says Bob Burks, his longtime director of movie photography. "He demands that the work be done at the highest possible level of execution," says Norman Lloyd, his executive TV producer. And like all perfectionists he is called "a tyrant." One critic has described him as "a cynical, self-absorbed, even sadistic technician devoid of pity and perception." Lloyd, who reveres him, compares him to Churchill and describes him as "ruthless, but tender."

Says Hitchcock: "I dislike conflict, but I won't sacrifice my creative principles. I draw the line at my work. If anything stands in its way, then there's difficulty. I loathe people who give less than their full effort. That's deceit. How can you do creative work with that undercutting? I cut such people off." In this area of his life, Hitchcock is an impressive and, to many, a frightening figure. As Lloyd puts it, "He has his own center. It is not egotism. It is not false pride. He has identity. He has a powerful presence. You feel it. And you can take it or leave it."

And . . . alongside the imposing Master, stands another Hitchcock, dominated by his childhood fears.

He has always been an ugly duckling, a little gauche. He thus describes himself at 23 when he was already directing pictures: "I was an uncommonly unattractive young man. And I had never been out with a girl in my life." Today at 65 he is defiantly making a joke out of his appearance, which still pains him. "A few years ago I caught a side view of myself in a store window and screamed with fear," he said laughingly to a reporter. And he is the one who drew that moundlike profile and decided to step into it pompously, once a week, to herald his TV show. The man who secretly dreams of looking like Carv Grant is the first to mock himself-for fear of being mocked. continued

Alfred Hitchcock / continued

He is still a lonely man, although surrounded by cooperative workers and professional adulation. He has a devoted wife and only a few close friends. ("I have a couple of real friends," he says, "a couple of businessmen.") He has little to do with show-business people. A profile writer once described Hitchcock's way of waiting, aloof, for a crew to prepare a new camera set-up: "He is likely to be sitting alone in his dressing room, with the look of a fat boy who has run away from the cruelty of his contemporaries."

He is still traumatized by social snobbery and, as is his wont, reverses it mockingly. He boasts to reporters of his antisnobbishness. He told one that he gave up a Bentley that he owned because it was a status symbol. He told another, "I am proud to own a Klee, a Vlaminck and a Dufy -but I keep them in my country home for my own enjoyment, rather than putting them on display in our Los Angeles house for status purposes." He owns a comparatively simple house in Bel-Air and has turned the kitchen into the most important room in the house, where he and his wife spend much of their time, in the manner of an upperclass butler and cook. "My wife cooks and I help her wash up," he says.

Doesn't care for people

At his root, Alfred Hitchcock does not care for people, most of whom do not live up to his romantic ideal. At times this dislike emerges candidly: "I don't have a high opinion of the human race," he says, "there are so many people who want the best fruits of life and yet don't have the ability to attain them—and resort to other means." In "The Birds," only expediency kept him from ending the movie with the total destruction of the human race. But he had to content himself with lesser horrors.

This Hitchcock, in whom the fears almost obliterate the romance, is the mediocre version of the man. This is the stodgy, grisly, shallow, show-off who makes himself an object of mockery, and who is not particularly original or interesting outside of his work. This is, unfortunately, the man who is probably best known to the TV audience. It knows Hitchcock as the grisly clown, and relates him to a series of plays which he did not direct.

'A means of telling a story'

In Theatre Arts, Lawrence Kane once wrote: "The film to [Hitchcock] has always been simply a means of telling a story, but the story has never been the means of telling something greater. One is left with the unhappy impression that the man himself is devoid of personal philosophy; a fact which is not only confirmed by, but would seem to account for, his increasing interest in technical trickery." There is some truth to this. The fears have taken a serious toll of the man-and seem to be increasingly corroding his art, in recent years. Says Hitchcock: "It is difficult to characterize me. I have a forbidding dead-pan exterior and an internal shyness. People are in awe of me. and they shouldn't be."

He is wrong. They should be in awe of him. It is an amazing human being who sits in the center of that scary universe, like a morbid, elderly cherub still wrapped in the spiritual swaddling clothes of his childhood. He is a strange, unique man who has tried to be true to the dreams of babyhood, and who has never recovered from its terrors. Whatever his flaws, when he is great, he is very, very great. It is TV's good fortune to have had him, if only as a script editor, for 10 years. It is TV's bad fortune never to have had him at his best.

Fan Letter: Robert (Shad) Northshield, general manager of NBC News, received a fan letter expressing admiration of his network's Dominican Republic coverage. "If you don't," the letter read, "I personally will put up your Dominican Republic men for an award." NBC officials proudly made copies of the note, sent some to their news crew in Santo Domingo, posted others on the walls of the news room in New York. Trouble was, the man who wrote the fan letter to his friend Northshield was Walter Cronkite, who has sworn allegiance to CBS. When Cronkite heard that his letter was being exploited by NBC, the fan hit the ceiling. "That's hitting below the belt," cronked Walter. "If that's the game they're going to play, I could dig out a whole file of notes they've sent us congratulating us on things we've done in the past. I haven't been so mad in 50 years." In "Who's Who," Cronkite lists his age as 48.

Pay-TV Victory: California's ban on pay-TV is unconstitutional, the state's Superior Court ruled last week. Last November voters had approved a proposition outlawing pay-TV. As a result, Subscription Television, Inc., was forced out of business in California. Sylvester L. Weaver, president of the pay-TV firm, filed suit, and Judge Irving H. Perluss now has upheld Weaver's claim. He ruled that the ban violated the basic rights of freedom of speech. The initiative, he said, was aimed at "a speculative and Northern California Edition

illusory evil"—the fear that pay-TV might destroy free television. The state is expected to appeal. And legal action could go on for years.

Back in Uniform: Captain Kangaroo has re-enlisted, much to the relief of mothers all over the country whose children have been kept hors de combat by the Captain's antics for nine-and-a-half years. A dispute with a co-owner of the Kangaroo show had earlier prompted Bob Keeshan, who plays the Captain, to announce that Captain Kangaroo would leave the air after this season, to be replaced by Mister Mayor, Keeshan's new show which is now telecast Saturday mornings. The dispute, however, has been settled, and Captain Kangaroo will be at the old parade ground six days a week (Mister Mayor will depart) come September.

TV and Elections: Three research projects-one underwritten by ABC, the other two financed by CBS-have come to the same conclusion: The telecasting of election returns and projections made before the polls closed last November had no significant effect on the behavior of late voters. ABC hired researchers from the University of Michigan to conduct a study of voting patterns in 48 states. CBS concentrated on California, sponsoring two independent studies of election day behavior in that late-voting state. ABC's researchers went so far as to conclude that early projections of results would have little effect on any elections, even a close contest.

A Journey With Joseph Wood Krutch'

SPECIAL COLOR. "At first glance, the spectacle seems too strange to be real," says the distinguished guide: authornaturalist Joseph Wood Krutch, whose televised tour of Arizona's Sonora Desert won critical acclaim in 1963.

The journey is by mule from the Grand Canyon's rim to its floor (where the Colorado River flows). 

GEMINI SPACE FLIGHT GUIDE

SPECIAL The Gemini IV space flight, America's second two-man orbital mission, is tentatively scheduled to be launched from Cape Kennedy at approximately 6 A.M. tomorrow morning.

NASA's flight plan calls for Majors James A. McDivitt and Edward H. White to spend more than four days (98 hours) in space. The 63-orbit flight is part of the U.S. effort to land a man on the moon by 1970. If tomorrow's countdown goes according to schedule, recovery of the Gemini capsule will begin next Monday at approximately 9 A.M.

Following lift-off, network coverage will originate from the Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston. In addition to the programs listed below, the networks will offer continuing progress reports beginning tomorrow afternoon. ABC plans 60-second bulletins on the hour through 11 A.M. 

Answer to last week's puzzle

He's almost invisible in the glare of success



DICK YORK, A COMPETENT ACTOR, HAS LEARNED THAT NO MERE MALE CAN COMPETE WITH A COUPLE OF WITCHES _____ By Edith Efron

> **O**n a desk in one of the executive offices of Screen Gems studios in Hollywood is a pile of press clippings. It weighs about 10 pounds.

> Every one of the clippings is a favorable article about *Bewitched*, that cute little show about the witch-nextdoor (and her advertising- continued

man husband) that has a good part of the Nation in a tizzy. And the subject of every article is the witch herself—with a few kind words about her witch mother.

The advertising-man husband is almost never mentioned.

His friends are indignant

Actor Dick York, who plays the husband, may in fact be the first actor in television history to play a leading role in a No. 1 hit show and remain practically invisible in the full glare of success.

Dick York's friends and colleagues are indignant about this state of affairs. Some blame Dick's peculiar state of invisibility on the press.

"The critics are shallow!" blasts producer Danny Arnold. "They're obvious. I don't think it's a good, critical job to be that obvious. If your job is to pick apart professionals doing a job, it's your job to be aware of how skilled those professionals can be. It's important to realize what Dick contributes to the part. People are sympathetic to the witch solely because of her relation to him. A witch who is interested in being a housewife to an American male is interesting. If she just went around being a witch, nobody would care. He supplies the motive for everything she does."

The witch mother is just as indignant. "This is ridiculous," she says. "It's a No. 1 show. You have to assume the supporting parts are pretty well done. Dick plays a very important part. Nobody can hold up a series by himself or herself without support, unless it's a one-man or one-woman show. Ignoring Dick isn't constructive criticism. It's absurd."

The witch herself apparently is so distraught about the phenomenon of Dick's invisibility that she goes so far as to deny it altogether: "I don't think anyone underestimates Dick as an actor, because I believe anyone who watches him work appreciates his talent."

As for Dick, he smiles a long-suffering smile and gives a totally different explanation for his invisibility. "The two witches," he says, "are by far more spectacular than I am. I'm just a human being. And I'm identified by the critics as being just like themselves. I, too, am watching the witch from the sidelines. Besides I guess it's a lot more exciting to identify with someone superhuman than with someone normal. . . ." Then he sighs. "Maybe it's me. I don't think so, but the only way to tell if it's me or not is to kill me off in one show, give the witch another husband and see if I'm missed."

Mystery is unsolved

That seems far too extreme a way to solve the mystery, so it will have to remain frankly unsolved.

Meantime, what is the invisible Mr. York like, off-screen?

His official Screen Gems biography states, with a prophetic ring, that he "represents that type of Average American lad who seldom elicits a second glance from most persons."

It is more or less true. Physically, Dick is prototypically American: he has a tall, lanky, basketballplayer's frame and his face could be readily used on "Drive Carefully" or "Thirteen Days 'Til Christmas" posters. Only his eyes are unusual. They're huge, brown and sad, as the witch puts it, " like those of a springer spaniel my father used to have—called Dick, strangely enough."

He has had a steady if nonamazing theatrical career since childhood, when he starred in Chicago in such radio serials as "Jack Armstrong, the All-American Boy" (he played Billy Fairfield, Jack's best friend). He went to New York in 1950 to do a radio show called "Michael Shayne." "It had wayout kid acting parts," says Dick. "The writer on the show wrote scripts involving dope addicts and maniacs and so on." Dick impressed this writer considerably, so the writer suggested him to an agent, and eventually Elia Kazan hired him to play a role in "Tea and Sympathy" on Broadway in 1953. He was nominated by the Drama Critics for best supporting actor, but didn't win. "I got one vote, from Henry Hewes of the Saturday Review," says Dick.

Other highlights of his professional career are the movie "My Sister Eileen," in which he did a dancing and singing role; "Bus Stop" on Broadway; the movie "Inherit the Wind," with Spencer Tracy and Fredric March; and on TV, two years ago, he appeared as a social worker in a series called *Going My Way*. It did not last very long.

He has won compliments as an actor from such directors as Elia Kazan and Stanley Kramer and such critics as Walter Kerr, but he does not have a major reputation. His present producer, Danny Arnold, says, "I think Dick is underrated and underestimated as an actor. He has a very good understanding of comedy, he is equally proficient in drama. I've seen his work. He's very good."

Dick himself has a somewhat diffident attitude toward acting. He does not belong to the ranks of the passionate. "I don't work because I love it," he says. "In our household, work is something Daddy does to provide us with things we need for our physical comforts... I love other things more than my work."

His primary interest in life seems to be his family, about which he talks a great deal, which delights some people ("He constantly talks glowingly of his wife and children," says the witch, approvingly)—but makes other people sleepy. he was 15 and she was 12. Years later they married and now have five children, three girls and two boys, ranging in age from 3 to 12.

A variety of interests

Besides his family, however, Dick has a variety of other interests. He is interested in "man's presumptuous brain," reads a lot of experimental psychology, is a partisan of "Gestalt therapy." "What is the self? That's the \$64,000 question," he says. "It was ignored by Freud. He skipped over the self very conveniently. Otto Rank, in searching for the self, fell into the religious vein. He started to tap man's creative ability and came under strong attack by psychiatric circles. The self, as I understand it, is the accumulated physiological, intellectual, creative substance of anyone living in the absolute now without the restriction of environment, interjected teachings, nonapplicable knowledge."

He writes short stories about children: "Tm fascinated by the 4-yearold mind." He writes science-fiction stories: "My last one was based on the microscopic world. The idea was that our world might be a drop of water in someone else's world."

He paints: "I hallucinate to paint. I start out with a stream of consciousness idea. I turn on the tape recorder. I start talking into it, reporting what I see. As I see it, various colors become part of the mood of the description, start forming onto the canvas. I paint compulsively. I have to complete it. Sometimes I'm very surprised to see what I painted." These "surprises" are nonobjective—"ideally, like Jackson Pollock."

He sculpts. He thus describes one of his pieces: "It's four-dimensional. I try to incorporate all religious teaching—the Old Testament, the New Testament, Confucius, Buddha, The Agnostic—one figure representing all. In the front you see Adam—a cloudlike Adam. Eve is beside him on the ground looking into an empty cradle. As you revolve it, the back of Eve's head becomes Woman. And Adam, from the back, is crucified Christ. Then Eve becomes the Virgin Mary from another angle. There are six different perspectives." The meaning of this sculpture, says Dick, is "man's search for something beyond himself."

He is a religious man. "I believe in God. I'm looking, and I'm open to any and all ideas and thoughts that can come close to pinpointing why all of us are here."

Dick York is a man about whom there are two schools of thought the school that calls him "shallow" and the school that calls him "deep." Dick is very aware of his critics. "They say that I'm not articulate enough. I have difficulty in expressing myself on a vocal level. Things that seem very clear to me semantically leave a great deal to be desired." One of his critical acquaintances describes him as "foggily pretentious."

The witch likes him

But his supporters are loyal indeed. The witch is very fond of him, and the witch mother has this to say: "I probably understand him better than the others. He's rather profound, you know. He has a spiritual quality. I am a religious girl. I have a great faith. This creates a rapport between us. Actors who have this spiritual quality often understand each other without much communication."

It's a little difficult to sum up Dick York, who spends his life on "means of expression" but does not yet have anything specific to express. When asked how he would sum himself up, Dick says, "I'd say 'Dick York is a man who's looking for something. He's still looking for a self.'" It seems a valid way to describe him.

CBS FACES ANOTHER

That troupe of tumblers called the Mets have been giving the Yankees fits at the box office

On a quiet day in August last year Charlie Finley, the proprietor of the Kansas City Athletics, was relaxing at his farm in Indiana, talking to a newsman on the telephone. Charlie confided that a funny thing happened to CBS on the way to the studio. It bought the New York Yankees.

The news, leaked prematurely, hit with the impact of a night stick, and buyer and seller alike became subjects of one of the roughest editorial lashings in sports history.

The old owners of the Yankees were attacked for their shocking lack of loyalty in peddling a club that had won 14 of 16 pennants. CBS was accused of making a power grab, attempting to gain control of baseball on television. Cartoons pictured the Yankees wearing caps that bore the CBS eye as the insignia. Jackie Gleason was mentioned as the next New York shortstop. And it was hinted that a network man would step out on the field before each game and "warm up" the crowd, as he might the audience before *The Danny Kaye Show*.

Inevitably, the ruckus led to a Senate hearing, which is very fashionable in sports these days, and guardians of public trust proclaimed afterward that they would give further study to determine whether baseball was subject to antitrust legislation.

Today, the once-rising waters have receded, and CBS is left to run its \$14,000,000 Bronx baby without even the benefit of Mel Allen at the microphone. Uncoupled by the Yanks after several billion words of service, Mel has shifted to Milwaukee.

To get the story of CBS reflections on the recent commotion and to hear its plans for the future, TV GUDE conducted an interview with two network officials closely connected with the Yankee project, Michael Burke, vice president in charge of development, and William MacPhail, vice president in charge of sports.

Asked if CBS expected such a volatile reaction to its purchasing the ball club, MacPhail blamed the rhubarb on Charlie Finley. "If he hadn't spilled the beans, giving the story to a Midwestern writer," says MacPhail, "the New York press probably wouldn't have been so upset. Scooped on what they felt was their story, they reacted more strongly than if the news had been released through usual channels."

Vice President Burke insists there is nothing unorthodox about his company's buying a property in the entertainment field. "We have invested in several Broadway shows, including 'My Fair Lady,'" he says. "We also own a guitar company, a record company, electronics laboratories and other things. We are well diversified. The whole disturbance over the Yankees seems to have resulted from a false assumption that a hidden motive lies behind the deal. We have no intention of controlling baseball on

television. And even if we had such a notion, we couldn't get away with it. Remember, we are only one of 20 clubs in the major leagues."

As things now stand in the majors, 18 clubs are tied up in a two-year package with ABC. Only the Yankees and Phillies are excluded, inonoring previous commitments. Asked if the Yanks will join the package when their present contract expires at the end of this year, MacPhail was evasive.

"To start with," he answered, "we're not sure if the present package will be successful this season. This isn't a nice, clean deal like pro football, in which members of the National Football League steer away from each other's games. The ABC baseball game on Saturday often must buck the local games. And coming into New York, where the Yanks and Mets televise, there can be three games on TV simultaneously. From what I understand, ABC could lose its shirt."

Assuming it doesn't and the package is around next year, will the Yankees join the group? "That hasn't yet been decided."

Announcer Allen, once regarded as a Yankee institution, and manager Yogi Berra were fired at the end of last season. Was the hand of CBS behind these strokes? "The decision to let Allen go was made before we bought the club," says MacPhail. "Berra was released during our regime, but CBS did not make this recommendation. It merely went along with the judgment of the club officials, the same ones who were running the team before we made the purchase."

It is an inexplicable but undeniable fact that the Yanks, for all their artistic success, are facing a boxoffice threat from a troupe of tumblers in Queens called the Mets, who attracted 1,700,000 fans last year, the second largest draw in baseball. The Yankees drew 400,000 less and plainly are frustrated in the knowledge that they have the game's winningest team, are the top attraction on the road—and play second violin in their own town. How does CBS plan to meet the Met menace?

"We're still new in the baseball racket," says Burke. "We want to get acquainted with the business and study the competitive climate. It's safe to assume that we will be stimulating some fresh thinking, but, for the moment, we are leaving the Mets to the Yankee management."

A lingering argument in baseball has involved conflicting interests in which several other club owners hold stock in CBS. What is the network's position on this? "We have no position," says Burke. "There are roughly 20,000,000 shares of CBS stock outstanding. What is held by competitors of the Yankees is so infinitesimal that we don't care if they keep it or not. It's a matter for baseball to decide."

Of more vital concern to some is the fact that CBS, a giant news medium with more than 200 TV and 230 radio outlets, is now big in baseball. Could this result in managed sports news over its network? "Our sports commentators have no restrictions where the Yankees are concerned," says MacPhail. "They are free to treat them editorially as they would any other team."

Officially, then, it would seem that the wraps are off. But listeners aren't advised to stay up nights waiting for CBS sports commentators to take advantage of their freedom.

Official, Bona Fide and Genuine

An appearance on 'Celebrity Game' is reassuring to the celebrity who's not sure he's a celebrity at all

Although rain had been pelting down all day, by late afternoon the fans began gathering at the artists' entrance to CBS Television City in Los Angeles. They were there to see the celebrities and to seek their autographs.

How did they know that the nine men and women who soon started arriving one by one were, in truth, celebrities? Why, because the name of the program on which they were to appear later in the evening was *The Celebrity Game*, that's why! Just appearing on the show certifies this, not only to the humble fan but also to the celebrity himself. "That's one of the things they like about it," says someone close to the program. "They like to appear with other celebrities —it's reassuring."

The celebrity is not a latter-day phenomenon. Actors, actresses, writers, painters, athletes, explorers and even scientists have been celebrities in years past. Florence Nightingale was a celebrity, so was Buffalo Bill. and Steve Brodie became one when he jumped off the Brooklyn Bridge. But the present era has marked the emergence of the de facto celebrity, like Zsa Zsa Gabor, noted for nothing in particular except just being a celebrity. Miss Gabor's acting career has been undistinguished; she does not sing or dance or write or paint; she did not discover radium. But she once had her eve blacked by Porfirio Rubirosa, also a celebrity (it would have meant nothing otherwise). Her name has been linked romantically with that of fellow-celebrity "Baby" Pignatari. And she was married for a time to Conrad Hilton, a celebrity who flies whole plane-loads of other celebrities around the world to his hotel openings and whose son was Elizabeth Taylor's first husband. So. you can see that being a celebrity is much more than just being Albert Einstein or Dr. Schweitzer.

Although Zsa Zsa has appeared on The Celebrity Game five times, she was not one of the mixed bag of big and not-so-big names who braved the rain to tape the program which will be seen Thursday, June 3. The nine celebrities there for that show can all act or sing or dance or be funny. They are also typical of the program's attempt to offer something-or, rather, someone-for all segments of the celebrity-hungry viewing public. For the older crowd, female, there was Douglas Fairbanks Jr., certainly a big name in any league, although he hasn't been doing much lately. For senior-division girl watchers, there was Janis Paige in a low-cut dress. For movie fans, there were Robert

Mitchum, certainly the major "catch" of the program; Anne Baxter, a former Oscar winner, and June Allyson, who had a couple of things going for her—a fair-to-middling name, plus being the relict of Dick Powell, one of the founders of Four Star Television (*The Celebrity Game* is a Four Star production). For the young folks, there were singers Jack Jones and Donna Loren. And, finally, to make with the jokes, there were Jan Murray and Allan Sherman.

They arrived, hurrying through the rain from the CBS parking lot, pausing at the artists' entrance to sign a few autographs, then going down the long corridor and up in an elevator to Studio 41, to be greeted backstage by a buffet and the program's producers, Merrill Heatter, nephew of the old newscaster ("Oh, there's good news tonight!"), and Bob Quigley. The greetings of the two producers varied. depending upon the star. They were diffident to Fairbanks and Mitchum. more at ease with June Allyson and Allan Sherman, whom they knew, and at first did not even recognize 18vear-old Donna Loren, who slipped in quietly with her mother.

· Finally greeted, however, and invited to partake of the buffet-shrimp, Swedish meatballs, ham, turkey, potato salad-Miss Loren, making her first appearance on the program and thus for the first time a bona fide. card-carrying celebrity, asked, "Will someone brief me?" She was whisked into a dressing room with a largish man named Stan Dreben, who spent the entire preshow period buttonholing the celebrities and taking them away for such private briefing sessions. Dreben is identified only as "a member of the production staff" who tells the participants "how to press the buttons and things like that." But since co-producer Heatter does this just before the taping begins, and Stan Dreben is a comedy writer who has supplied jokes for Milton continued

Berle, Joey Bishop, McHale's Navy, Broadside and Pete and Gladys, the suspicion persists that he helps members of the panel with what CBS calls the "witty explanations of their votes" on the air. Later, during the show, in reply to a question about dieting, Donna Loren said, "My mother always told me that if you don't watch your figure, no one else will," which prompted Jan Murray to say, "Is your mother a writer?"

While all the briefing and eating was going on backstage, Carl Reiner, host of *The Celebrity Game*, was conducting a rehearsal of sorts onstage, without his toupee, using prospective contestants as stand-ins for the celebrity panel. Thus, the rehearsal probably looked pretty much the way the program did a couple of years ago, when Heatter and Quigley started it on NBC, without celebrities, as a daytime show called *People Will Talk*. The panelists and contestants alike were just the ordinary run of extroverted TV-show participants.

Because NBC slotted People Will Talk opposite Password on CBS, it did not last long. Last year CBS was similarly unkind when it threw the new, celebrity-studded version of the show into the breach opposite NBC's Bonanza, after Judy Garland went off the air. But The Celebrity Game did well enough to merit another chance, this time opposite ABC's top-rated Peyton Place. Because of the competition, Heatter and Quigley say, "We can't make the questions too innocuous."

The questions remain fairly innoc-

uous, however, CBS once reluctantly permitted a question involving sex appeal but only on condition that the word "sex" not be emphasized or used by itself without being immediately followed by "appeal." Questions are often slanted at specific members of the panel. The one about dieting on this particular show was aimed at Allan Sherman, who had recently completed a diet. When George Jessel was a panelist, there was a question about divorce, and once when Zsa Zsa appeared, there was one about whether a woman should return a man's gifts when they part.

But, innocuous or not, the questions all have only one real reason for being—to produce laughs when the celebrities give their "witty explanations." Heatter and Quigley both believe that, despite its title, *The Celebrity Game* is a comedy program rather than a game. The ideas of the two producers vary in one detail, however. Heatter says, "We don't think of it as a *game* show but as a *comedy* show. It's a very thin game." Quigley says, "We like to think of it as a comedy show, but of course we have a strong game going."

Thin or strong, the game goes like this: A rotating panel of nine Hollywood stars is given frivolously controversial questions and asked to agree or disagree with them. After their decisions are recorded, three contestants guess how the stars voted. The celebrities then offer witty explanations for their votes. The size of the contestants' cash prizes depends upon how well they guess. The celebrities get \$500 each.

The rehearsal over, Carl Reiner came backstage to greet the guests and then left to don his toupee and the dark suit he wears for the show. One of Hollywood's most successful and respected citizens, he is creatorproducer of *The Dick Van Dyke Show*, writer of big-budget Doris Day movies, multiple Emmy winner as actor and writer—a man of dignity and substance, with bald pate, big cigar and serious mien.

But the toupee startlingly transforms him into the ever-smiling, too-eagerto-please, just-this-side-of-vacuous master of ceremonies. Reiner has said, "Being moderator of *The Celebrity Game* gets rid of my neurotic desires to be loved and applauded."

The show ran its course, and the celebrities got lots of laughs with their "witty explanations" and comments. In fact, there were so many laughs that the program ran 12 minutes long. This did not disturb the producers, who would edit dull spots out of the tape. "We keep the gold!" said Merrill Heatter afterward.

When the evening was over, the fans were back again at the artists' entrance, with their stubby pencils and their ball-point pens, pushing forward damp pieces of paper for the celebrities to autograph.—Leslie Raddatz





The Hollywood Palace

There's a song that goes "I played the State, the Capitol, and people said, 'Don't stop. Until you've played the Palace, you haven't played the top.'" And we'll come close to going along with this. We admire Ed Sullivan for doing his show live, but the fact is ABC's Palace, on tape, seems more alive. Also, a few times a season, particularly on anniversary occasions -they observe several a year on this show-vou can count on having as host the one and only Bing Crosby. To say that Bing is the best somehow seems not enough. At singing, acting, or just being himself, name your best —and Bing is better.

We recall particularly this year's celebration of the show's first birthday. With a cast that ranged all the way from Ed Wynn and George Burns to Tony Martin and Cyd Charisse, it was one of the fastest-moving, most pleasant variety hours we have seen all season. "Is this the place where the birthday celebration is?" Wynn started things off by asking Burns. "Sure," replied Burns, pointing to a sign. "See BC." "Gosh," Wynn replied, "I didn't know Bing was that old." And, still later, Bing, together with Frank McHugh and Beverly Garland, did a great vaudeville spoof of "If You Want To Be a Top Banana" one which was such a carefree presentation of all the old bromides that somehow you couldn't have cared less that they *were* bromides: "I have a dog named Ginger." "Does Ginger bark?" "No, Ginger snaps." "Who was that ladle I saw you with last night?" "That was no ladle—that was my knife." Somehow, when Bing does it, it's not only different, it's great.

Other hosts on this show have included Burl Ives, Pat Boone, Eddie Fisher, Victor Borge, Robert Goulet and even Debbie Reynolds, who hosted the first Hollywood Palace, before there were any anniversaries, andyou won't believe this-she was good, too. On a recent "special occasion"commemorating Louis Armstrong's 50 years in show business-Edward G. Robinson was a bit rambling in praise of the peerless Satchmo, but there was a wonderful closing when Armstrong joined with Jimmy Durante in the rousing "Old Man Time." Still another interesting hour earlier this year was hostessed by Bette Davis. With inimitable confidence Miss Davis talked a kind of songiloquy, "Single," and was theatrical poise itself when it came to introducing the other guests. We liked best Barrie Chase dancing "The Girl from Ipanema," the amazing high-pole Nerveless Nocks (This is one time, with no net, when we thoroughly appreciated the fact the show's on tape-they couldn't have fallen) and finally Jan Murray's very funny, if not notably new, monolog about a father whose daughter has had her first date. "There he stood on mu rug," he said, of the young swain. "Attila the Hun." But later father and boy became friends. "We had coffee. and talked. And three hours later he was still talking-even after the coffee and truth serum ran out."
