### as we see it

■ Rep. Oren Harris, a Democrat from Arkansas, knows as much about television as anyone in America. It is his job to know, for as chairman of the House Commerce Committee, he must rule on all legislation that affects broadcasting.

He is, so far as the television industry is concerned, a most powerful man. He is also a moderate man with an unquestioned reputation for fairness. He is not easily perturbed and he does not often make sensational statements. It therefore came as somewhat of a surprise when he told the Association of National Advertisers that it was about time Congress spelled out some "reasonably specific and concrete national television policy goals" and "reasonably specific and concrete ways of reaching those goals."

■ Mr. Harris listed recent efforts of the Federal Communications Commission to set major policies for television on the authority of two words in the Communications Act of 1934: "public interest." For whatever authority the FCC exercises over broadcasters is based primarily on the fact that the FCC licenses stations to operate in the "public interest."

So long as "public interest" is a matter of subjective judgment, so long as no one can be certain whether television is a pure business venture or a combination business and public trust, the industry, the FCC and the Congress must waste time in pointless and inconclusive debate. So long as programs are designed to entertain most of the people all of the time, there can be no real improvement in what we see on our screens.

■ Congress, by defining television's freedom, by setting television's goals, would clarify once and for all time what it meant by "public interest." We heartily endorse Mr. Harris's statement.



'If there's anything I can't stand,
it's sloppy police work'

As everyone knows, The Fugitive is one of the most successful television shows on the air. It is the story of a supposedly innocent man, Richard Kimble, who is condemned for a murder he didn't commit. After escaping from jail, Kimble becomes a fugitive searching out a one-armed man who is supposedly the real killer. In doing so he is pursued by Lieutenant Gerard, who is determined to track down the Fugitive no matter how long it takes.

The success of *The Fugitive* has played havoc with the ratings of the NBC and CBS shows opposite it, and one of them, *The Doctors and the Nurses*, was in serious trouble at the beginning of the season. Several top-flight writers were called in to see what could be done to win back *The Fugitive* audience.

A friend of mine came up with the best suggestion for *The Doctors and the Nurses* show that I could think of. He suggested that in the first show of the season, in the first scene, a man be wheeled into the emergency room of the hospital, and as one of the doctors took the sheet off him, the audience would discover he had one arm. Just before he dies on the operating table he would gasp, "I am the one-armed man the Fugitive is looking for. Richard Kimble is innocent and I killed his wife."

Unfortunately, the producers turned down my friend's suggestion, and because they did, *The Doctors and the Nurses* is scheduled to go off the air. I have been a big *Fugitive* viewer

since its inception and I have some very strong ideas on the show.

I'm one of the few people who think Richard Kimble is guilty, and the main reason I watch the show is to see that he gets captured. My wife on the other hand thinks he's innocent, and we have terrible arguments over his fate. I feel so strongly about it that each week I bet her

\$20 that he's going to be caught. About 10 minutes to 10 I ask for my money, but she always insists on waiting to the end of the show, and so far she's collected \$480, which only adds to my determination to see Richard Kimble put behind bars.


What I would like to see is a new detective put on the case. Lieutenant Gerard, to my mind, is a bungler who has had over two years to catch Kimble, and has let him slip out of his hands time and time again.

One of the things that makes me livid is that every time Gerard is close on the trail of Kimble, he never bothers to look in the kitchen. What the hell kind of a detective is that? Sometimes I get so infuriated at Gerard I start screaming at him, "Dope, why didn't you have the back door covered?" This gets the neighbors pretty mad.

If there's anything I can't stand, it's sloppy police work. I only wish I could work on the case myself. Kimble has certain weaknesses that any detective could take advantage of. For one thing he's a do-gooder, and he's always helping people out of trouble. This slows him up considerably. If I were tracking him down I'd find the 100 neediest cases in every town that I thought Kimble was in.

Then I'd have them all staked out. Kimble is bound to show up at one of these homes or his rating would sink to nothing. I would also get NBC and CBS to post \$50,000 rewards for the capture of Kimble dead or alive. It would be worth it to them to get *The Fugitive* out of circulation.

It's obvious to anyone who watches the show that neither the producers nor the American Broadcasting Company is making any effort to see that Richard Kimble is brought to justice. If they were sincere in their efforts they wouldn't have a dummox like Gerard on the case, and my wife wouldn't be in to me for \$480.



Giant linebacker Sam Huff glowered across the field during a game with the Chicago Bears. Huff had a mike taped to his chest and a tiny transistor glued in his pads. But he forgot about that.

"What did you do that for, 88? You do that one more time, 88, I'm going to sock you one. You do that, you're going to get your nose broken. . . ."

Some Sundays later, millions of people caught Huff's snarling threat on TV. But not on a sports program. It was a documentary called "The Violent World of Sam Huff"—a segment of CBS's celluloid chronicle of modern-day hope, hokum and horror, The Twentieth Century. The Zoomar lens look at the brutal, whack-a-day world of a pro football star had a lot of viewers cringing that day. Chief among the cringers was the star cartilage-cruncher himself. "It was so real," Huff said, "it even scared me."

Now in its eighth year on the air,

The Twentieth Century ranks as the granddaddy of TV documentary programming, Produced by CBS News, the program is the creation of an exnewspaperman named Burton Benjamin. And since its initial episode, "Churchill: Man of the Century," in October 1957, The Twentieth Century has reeled off some prodigious chapters on contemporary history; among them composite portraits of Gandhi. FDR, and Dr. Jonas Salk. It has troubled youth ("Delincovered quents"); everybody's troubles ("Age of Anxiety"); taken a lighthearted look at America's crush on the family car ("Auto Biography"); and even replayed Hollywood's first ("The Movies Learn to Talk").

As Benjamin, now the show's executive producer, remembers the program's beginning, CBS was toying around with doing an historical series based on "Our Times"—historian Mark Sullivan's panoramic writings on 20th—



century life. To sound out the project, the network asked about 80 TV writers what they thought of the idea. One of them—Benjamin—told them in two words: Not much.

He recalls: "Sullivan's books, fine as they are, were too episodic for television." But he didn't convince CBS. Benjamin remembers: "The network told me not to call them—you know they'd call me."

As it turned out, CBS did call. In a conversation that began something like, "OK, you're so smart . . .," Benjamin was asked what kind of historical series he'd do. His idea: Focus on one personality or event, and in that way shed light on the times.

CBS put him on the pay roll. Benjamin, however, doesn't bow too deeply when taking credit for his creation. "The idea was basically so simple," he admits. "I can't see why someone hadn't come up with it before."

Benjamin's appraisal of what fol-

lowed: "Considering that our function is to report on history and not make interpretations, I'd say we have produced a valuable reportorial record."

As reportorial efforts, the films are, in fact, authoritative, immensely interesting and frequently brilliantly edited. Or, as critic John Crosby once put it: "It's hard to write about the show. It's that good."

Making a show "that good" is, of course, no cinch. And The Twentieth Century makes it even harder on itself by what Benjamin calls "starting at the end." He explains: "Most documentary subjects are se-continued"

lected on the basis of what film is available." Not *The Twentieth Century*. It settles on a subject, researches it thoroughly—and then worries about the film. And it can be quite a worry—especially with historical footage. As Benjamin says: "After all, you can't go out and shoot World War I."

True enough. But what film *The Twentieth Century* can't shoot, it hunts down. That's when the show's producer, Isaac Kleinerman, goes to work. "The bulk," he says, "comes from Government archives and newsreel houses."

The Twentieth Century is seen in 51 countries. This world-wide distribution has created some international feather ruffling. For instance, "Trouble in Paradise"—a report on Sweden's welfare-oriented government—had the Swedish press walking out of a preview.

But back home, The Twentieth Century has ruffled amazingly few feathers over the years. One reason was given by critic John Shanley. "The program," Shanley wrote, "sometimes has merely held the mirror up to past events" and "has no definite point of view." Nonsense, cries the series narrator, Walter Cronkite. "A point of view," Cronkite says, "is inherent in what you do or do not select to show." This, of course, is true. And if the series lags in controversial content, it's apparently due to what Cronkite calls "our refusal to get up on a soapbox." "It's not The Twentieth Century's business." Cronkite adds. "to tell people what they should or should not do."

There are those, however, who believe that what one documentary producer calls "The Twentieth Century's side-stepping of vital issues" is rapidly dating the series. The New York Herald Tribune's John Horn wrote: "New and exciting techniques in documentaries . . . and the realization.

tion of the necessity for tackling controversial subjects . . . makes *Twentieth Century* seem old-fashioned."

Benjamin boils at the criticism. Says he: "We never have—nor ever will seek controversy for the sake of controversy. But that doesn't mean we play it safe."

Benjamin adds: "The proof of *The Twentieth Century*'s effect lies in its ratings. You can't attract the number of people we do unless you're stimulating—and consistently so."

For a public-affairs show—traditionally the unwatched, poor relation of network programming—The Twentieth Century has, in fact, long been an envied odd ball. It rides reasonably high in the ratings (averaging 14 million viewers a week) and has always had its bills paid by a sponsor.

Benjamin feels that the series' extensive use of "eyewitnesses" to authenticate a script's narration, ranks as one of *The Twentieth Century*'s major achievements. The program's list of "eyewitnesses" is, in fact, eyepopping. There's been Haile Selassie, Franco, Willy Brandt, Brendan Behan, Gen. Omar Bradley—to name a few.

But an "eyewitness" can lead to headaches too. Benjamin found that out when he was in Honolulu filming "The Man Who Spied on Pearl Harbor." The "eyewitness" was the "spy" himself, Takeo Yoshikawa, an ex-Japanese naval officer whom Benjamin had persuaded to return to Pearl Harbor and re-enact his mission. All went fine until some of the local citizenry, aware that Honolulu has no statute of limitations on espionage, decided it was time Takeo was tanked.

To avoid embarrassment, Benjamin rushed his spy-star to the airport for a getaway. A Polynesian posse hot on his trail, Yoshikawa just made it.

Benjamin has said: "I believe that history is never really safe and that *The Twentieth Century* has served to remind people of that fact." Certainly, it has.

## An army of housewives gleefully supplies

In every American community there is a wife whose conversation jingles with brilliant and macabre wit. With a little luck, she can last to age 40 or so before a neighbor with a Doberman pinscher has the dog wipe her out for the good of the block.

I interested my wife in hypnotism, to divert her from colorful jibes at the neighbors, and she now threatens to go on the road as Morgana Le Fay, lady hypnotist. But it's safer than jokes. A friend has a more serious problem. His wife studied political science in college. Asked if she's still thinking of a career, she replies, "I want to be a Latin American dictator." We don't even know if she's joking.

I'm relieved to report that somebody is finally providing an outlet for wives like this. At 37 Phyllis Diller made her big break-out as a stand-up comedian. And that was not her triumph alone. She may never be known as Saint Phyllis, but she is helping to emancipate quite a number of those madcap ladies out in the suburbs who are in danger from Dobermans.

In Janesville, Wis., one of the schoolteachers has a wife whose mind flashes with caustic images. Like this: "He thinks he's saved a lot of money because he has never worked hard enough to need a deodorant." Instead of lancing the nearest male with that, she sent it to Phyllis, who paid money for it and added it to a huge collection of sayings about her own husband, "Fang" (also known as "Burpee," "The White Walrus," "The Old Buzzard" and "Idiot Boy"). The Janesville lady. Mary McBride, is, according to Phyllis, "my oldest, most prolific, top writer."

Phyllis works from her own material and the material of professional writers, but she has been especially successful in training a cadre of witty, bitterly brilliant housewives, who constitute a kind of secret CIA. Their snipings often make sense because they come straight out of the frustrations of kitchen and supermarket. With their help, she is gearing for a full-scale frontal assault on television. In Phyllis's timetable, a whopping television success is the next goal.

I talked to her when she was savoring sweet victory in Miami Beach, where she had once been fired after a single performance. Now she had a suite in the Deauville Hotel, and the moment I stepped into it I saw how closely akin she was to all those witty housewives who are still in their

houses. The suite was a dappled mess, the floor spattered with newspapers, crumbs on the couch, Vogue on the rug (my wife would have had the Vogue plugging the bathtub). Phyllis was dressed in a slouchy robe, and for just a moment I thought it might be somebody else altogether, a house-keeper maybe.

Onstage, Phyllis Diller is a splendid grotesque, but this woman was merely plain, housewife-plain. The first thing I remember thinking is, "Her legs are freckled." After that, there wasn't much time to think. The interview started out normally, which is to say drably, but going into the world of Phyllis Diller is like going into a house of mirrors. Everything gets strange and lopsided and hysterically funny.

Finally we were both

down on our hands and knees on the floor and Phyllis was pounding her fist into the rug and crying, "My IQ is 472—I was supposed to have been triplets!"

She followed this, as she follows everything, with a maniacal laugh: "HAH-Ha-Ha-Ha-AHH-AHH-AHH-AHH-AHH!"

The phone rang. Phyllis picked it up and had a conversation with one of her daughters. (She has five children.) The last thing she said was, "Tell her I'm gonna come over and beat her up." She put the receiver down and turned back to me.

"Teen-age girls, baby!" she growled

fondly. "So beautiful!"

In a New York restaurant one night Red Buttons tried to order honey, and Phyllis chirped, "We don't have any honey, but there's a guy in the kitchen who has hives." That went into one of the enormous books which are the center of her life. The first book is for the one-liners she invents herself, the second for the contributions from her CIA.

"Thousands of dollars, baby," she says, hefting her treasure house. "I've got a set rate—I pay \$5 a line. Sometimes more than five. I've got one line I paid \$60 for—'He lost so much blood, his eyes cleared up.'"

#### She wants casual wildies

What Phyllis wants from her housewives are the kind of casual wildies that would raise eyebrows at the next PTA meeting. She dived into one of her books and immediately hit one about a next-door neighbor, "Mrs. Clean": "I finally found out why her laundry looks so much whiter than mine—she washes it."

"Oh, that's heaven!" she cried, giving it a reading. "That's heaven! I got to put that in tonight. That's great, baby!"

She paid \$20 to Cliff Arquette Jr. for a joke she loves with something close to passion. The line is about "the sister of Captain Bligh" who comes home with rice in her hair, raising a question as to whether she has finally gotten married: "No such luck, a Chinaman threw up on her."

Phyllis, thumping herself with glee, cried, "It's worth a million, that line. Every night when I do that, honey, it's

just bedlam."

#### The ladies write

Television appearances made her style so familiar that ladies in the same brain channel with her began to mail her jokes-for-adoption. From Laura Himes of Mentor, Ohio, came, "My mother-in-law is built like a truck-she was standing beside a parking meter and somebody stole her knee caps." A Denver housewife named Ople Hoffman barraged her with some wry summations of the domestic untranquillities: "I told Fang I was doing a lot of art work for the bank. It sounded better than saving was overdrawn." Her CIA also includes some fanged males in unlikely places. "My mother-in-law is so old-fashioned," wrote P. A. Rotuno of Alpena, Mich., "she won't even wear a topless apron." And Mary McBride contributed, "Fang is so unmechanical. Have you ever seen anyone try to look at the engine through the ignition hole?"

While Phyllis gloated over the CIA and its stinging wit, Fang himself wandered into the suite. His real name is Sherwood Diller; they met when she was a student at Bluffton (Ohio) College. The jokes, he said, don't bother him. "You'd be surprised," he said. "They're pretty near the truth."

"When I was 3," said Phyllis, "I made up my mind to do something terribly special. I sat on a cushion in the corner and then and continued

there I decided to be special."

Thirty-four years later, she set up an audition in a night club. Without waiting to see how it came out, she quit her job-merchandising press-relations chief of a radio station. "My boss said he'd give me a leave of absence, and I said, 'Baby, I want you to replace me 'cause I'm gonna be a comic!" It was the brush-off in Miami Beach that indirectly fed her into the success that was waiting, "We were at the lowest level. We were living at a ratty little hotel in New York. Sixty dollars a week, baby, and you know, for a hotel, that's a joint. Nobody believed in me, honey. Until I had it-with like the money rolling into the agency -only one man there thought I was good. We borrowed clear to the signature. I was sitting there in New York, broke, but Paar kept using me on the Tonight show and from then on it was like a steady rise."

She gave up agents and says proudly, "Baby, I manage myself!" At 47, she considers that what has gone before is only the warm-up period.

"I'm just about ready to blow this time period," says Phyllis Diller. "The next period is gonna be more television and then the movies. I also want to sandwich a Broadway play in there somewhere. I don't know just when. It's like saying you're gonna have a baby—you've gotta get pregnant first."


## Second Thoughts

Once a year we indulge ourselves as well as our critics and criticize ourselves. In other words, we take a second look-a re-review. First and foremost, we think we overpraised Profiles in Courage and (at the other end of the spectrum) Wendy and Me, and overpanned The Munsters, The Roques and The Man from U.N.C.L.E. Not that Profiles in Courage wasn't good-it was, and at times greatbut much of the time it was also unnecessarily heavy and pontifical, and we think that was one of the reasons for its demise. As for Wendy and Me, a second look was one too many. The Munsters, on the other hand, seems more amusing than we originally thought it was. The Rogues, despite our irritation with billing David Niven as its star and then getting so little of him, was at least a comedy which deserved another year. And, as for The Man from U.N.C.L.E., either it has improved or we were too hard on it-our guess is both.

Among the shows we were sorry not to review this season before they went into reruns are, or were, The Alfred Hitchcock Hour and The Jack Paar Program. In its last days Hitchcock annoyed us by its preoccupation with teen-age hoodlums, women alone in houses at night, etc.—which are surely problems that deserve more than the thrills-and-chills approach. As for Paar, we are sorry to see him go. For all his pettiness and petulance. he put on a show which did have an inimitable touch-his touch. He had his favorites, yes, but when they're comedians like Nichols and May and Jonathan Winters and singers like Florence Henderson, not to mention off-beat items like the best surfing pictures we've seen, his going is a loss to television, make no mistake about it. His monologs were uneven-but at their best they were very funny. He could take the most overworked ideas and still come up with high amusement ("I remember when I was told about the birds and the bees. I was so shocked it was months before I could look at a sparrow").

From our mail, it is apparent that among the things which irritated viewers the most-at least those viewers who wrote—are (1) commercials, (2) canned laughter, (3) two good specials scheduled at the same time, (4) the use of the same celebrities over and over on the late-night shows ("Do those networks honestly believe," writes Mrs. L. K. Crumpacker, of Wichita, Kan., "we are still thrilled with these overexposed, often rude, egotistical bigwigs? These days only the amateur is fresh, surprising, amusing!"), and (5) the fact that we review only network shows and thus are forced to ignore many people's favorites. High among these, incidentally, were "The Solitary Billionaire," on educational television, The Mike Douglas Show and, as one reader put it, the "at long last" return of Merv Griffin.

Early Bird Auction: With each passing week, Early Bird proves itself more versatile, capable and sophisticated than its predecessor satellites. Last week it chalked up another first—a transatlantic televised art auction. Via the Bird, art lovers at famed Sotheby's in London and at Sotheby's New York branch, Parke-Bernet Galleries, bid on paintings shown in London.

About 600 persons in London and 700 in New York viewed the paintings on 12-foot screens set up in the two galleries.

Part of the show was viewed by an audience of the British Broadcasting Corporation, which helped set it up with NBC. For Sotheby's, it was a bargain. The cost was merely \$10,000, which went for television equipment. Use of Early Bird, still in the experimental stage, was gratis. The auction took in \$172,552.80, \$135,646 of which came from Americans. Said Louis J. Marion, president of Parke-Bernet, "It's an auctioneer's dream, having two markets bidding against each other."

And Track Meet: In other Early Bird business, ABC's dynamic young (33) vice' president in charge of sports, Roone Arledge, has lined up tentative coverage via satellite of part of the United States-Soviet track meet in Kiev for July 31-Aug. 1. If all goes well—and you know the Russians, it will be the first U.S. live television pickup from the Soviet Union.

In fact, the Early Bird coup was only the first of the week for the go-getting Arledge. He later lined up film of the Cassius Clay-Sonny Liston title fight, or rather encounter, for showing on his Saturday *Wide World of Sports* show on ABC.

Future Bird: Looking to the satellite future, RCA board chairman David Sarnoff predicted there would be communications satellites within 10 years that would relay programs directly into viewers homes. The prediction went much further than the concept announced earlier this month by ABC's chief executive, Leonard Goldenson, who revealed plans for a domestic satellite that would relay network programs to local TV stations.

General Sarnoff also suggested that all American international communications carriers be unified into one private company which could bargain effectively with foreign countries, most of which control communications as government monopolies.

First Lady: The Nation's First Lady, Lady Bird Johnson, has agreed to star in a television special. She will conduct a tour of Washington, D.C., probably on Thanksgiving Day, for ABC much as Jacqueline Kennedy did of the White House in 1962.

According to producer John Secondari, Mrs. Johnson's program will be "a study in urbanistics. We'll show the condition of Washington now, and how it is being changed for the better." Mrs. Johnson is chairman of the Committee for a More Beautiful Capital.

## Making a splash with 'FLIPPER'



Ivan Tors: 'Won't do anything any other producer can do.'

Animal-lover Ivan Tors
contends dolphins
are smarter than people
and has practically
proved it

My assignment was to write an article about Ivan Tors, executive producer of *Flipper*, the underwater saga which is making such a splash on the NBC network. I now quit.

I now quit because Ivan Tors, an animal lover, suggested I put a 12-foot python around my neck. I cannot write articles with snakes around my neck.

Before dodging the snaky choker, however, I did find out a few things: continued

1. Ivan Tors, sane and successful, is amazed and delighted by bottlenosed dolphins.

2. Dolphins, equally sane and even more successful (they do not have to produce television shows), are delighted by Tors and Company.

"It is a mystic experience for a normal human being to make contact with a dolphin," Tors says. "It makes me feel humility.

"Man is supposed to be on the top of the heap, but when you reach the dolphin, you are forced to recognize a superior creature."

#### Reaction to 'Flipper' plan

When plans for the motion picture "Flipper" were announced, the consensus was: "Nobody but an idiot would think of making a picture starring a dolphin." A variant: "Nobody but Ivan Tors would have the guts."

Tors, whose personal motto is, "I won't do anything any other producer can do," went to the experts. "Can dolphins learn to answer hand commands, surface on command, 'dance' on the water, pull a boat, retrieve objects from the water?" Tors asked.

The experts were unanimous: Dolphins could learn all that and more but it would take a minimum of six months of training.

Most previous trainers stood on dry land to coach their charges. Tors and his men—notably Ricou Browning, who first suggested "Flipper"—got right into the water with Mitzi, the dolphin who played Flipper in the movie. Mitzi had the advantage of earlier basic training under Milton and Virginia Santini, who run a porpoise-training school in Florida, and it took her just three months to master her movie role.

"The secret was getting into the water," Tors says. "Dolphins are

schooling mammals and are unhappy when they are alone. They readily accept human companionship. They like to be stroked and fondled. That is the key—affection.

"A dolphin has 84 sharp teeth, it weighs 300 pounds or more, it has 17½ horsepower of energy and can kill any shark," he continued, "yet no human has ever been attacked or bitten by a dolphin."

In the last few years, scientists have recognized the dolphin as an animal of high intelligence. The evidence is tantalizing.

"A dog will return a thrown object, but he always does it in the same way," Tors says. "I threw a swim fin into the water not long ago and Suzy Ithe dolphin who plays Flipper on television returned it a different way every time—once in her mouth, once under her fin, once balanced on her nose and once pushing it along against the pressure of the water. They are very clever and playful animals."

At Marineland of the Pacific, near Los Angeles, baleful moray eels were kept in a large tank with dolphins. One day, an eel bit a man cleaning the tank. Instantly, a dolphin grabbed the eel, surged to the surface and threw the moray out of the tank.

"In other words, the dolphin passed a moral judgment and acted on it," Tors says.

#### First experience a clincher

"But my first experience with a dolphin was a clincher for me," Tors says. "I threw two balls, a large one and a small one, into the water, and the big one hit Suzy right in the mouth. But she didn't pick it up. Instead she swam over to the small one, put it into her mouth and then scooped up the large ball in her open mouth. That way she could carry both balls on one trip.

"That is logic. Clearly Suzy was

evaluating data in a split second."

If that hadn't made a believer of Tors, an experience he had this spring would have.

"I was working with a dolphin underwater," he recalls, "a dolphin who did not particularly like me. I overworked and got winded and didn't know if I could make it to the shore. That dolphin got under me and carried me all the way to the dock. She sensed my trouble and acted.

"A thing like that almost makes you get down on your knees and pray."

#### Suzy, a remarkable lady

As viewers of Flipper know, Suzy is a remarkable lady. It is she who rescues the distressed, spreads the alarm, carries the message and pulls the boat. She has even been trained to attach a bomb to the hull of a ship —which suggests a military use for the peace-loving dolphins of the world.

The human players-Brian Kelly, Luke Halpin and Tommy Nordenare fine, but Flipper is Suzy's show. It is a good show appreciated by one and all except, perhaps. Jackie Gleason.

"Flipper's success was a surprise to us," Tors says. "So many other shows have failed in that spot—opposite

Gleason."

It succeeds, he believes, because it introduced a new animal friend-one with a perpetual, built-in smile-"plus a beautiful father-children relationship."

"The father image in the United States is in dreadful shape," he says. "A stronger image is needed and we

provide it."

Tors has had as much success as anyone in television. He has launched six series: Science Fiction Theater, Sea Hunt, The Aquanauts, Ripcord, Man and the Challenge and Flipper. "He's made six pilots and all six got on the air," says Leonard Kaufman, a Tors producer. "The usual average is about six or seven pilots for every show on the air."

Tors has been a vigorous critic of sex and violence on the tube. When a network pressured him to put more S & V into Man and the Challenge. Tors told his story to the Dodd Senate subcommittee investigating juvenile delinguency.

Carl L. Perian, staff director of the Dodd subcommittee, noting that network officials are toning down their material, wrote to Tors: "If any one man is responsible for this, I feel that you are that man."

"Ivan didn't go to Washington to pick up publicity," says producer Stanley Colbert. "He is a very moral guy and he was mad."

"I have nothing against sex and violence but I am against sex and violence on television at 7:30 in the

evening," Tors says.

It was widely reported that Tors was black-listed because of his testimony. Tors says, "I was so fed up with television that I didn't care if I ever did anything more. I didn't look for television work; I wanted to go back to feature pictures."

#### Tors hits headlines

Tors also hit the headlines when the Writers Guild of America, West accused him of working during a strike.

"I was a producer although still a member of the Guild," Tors says. "When they went out on strike, they didn't have anyone else to penalize so they penalized me-a fine of \$20,000. It was all settled without going to court. I made a donation to the pension fund-something like \$2000 '

Colbert illuminated another facet of Tors-he is a skillful storyteller. "Ivan always starts from fact rather than gimmick," he says. "Example: Francis the Talking Mule continued

was a gimmick—mules can't talk and never will. Flipper, an animal which responds to man, is a fact. Ivan can jack up a fact and slip 39 episodes of a series under it."

Ivan Tors was born in Hungary 48 years ago. He arrived in Hollywood as a writer in 1940. He served in an Air Corps unit during the war and was accepted by the OSS but was knocked out by a training accident.

In 1949, as an independent movie producer, he pioneered science-fiction films. He moved into television as producer of *Science Fiction Theater* in 1955. "That's when we first went underwater," Tors says. "It was a whole and new world of fantasy I could bring to the screen."

Every television series and motion picture Tors has produced has presented extraordinary technical problems. "Ivan knows as much about what can be done on film as any man in the industry." Stanley Colbert says.

Tors' research for his films has led him to a theory about extrasensory perception; to LSD, the hallucinating drug; and to psychopharmacology.

#### They call him the guru

He is a thoughtful man, a man of curiosity—"We call him the guru when he begins to expound," says his wife, the former actress Constance Dowling—and has read papers before scientific bodies.

Of LSD, he says, "It was one of the most profound experiences of my life. The experience opened creative avenues which will take me the rest of my life to digest—so much to digest."

Another strand of the experience opened Tors' eyes psychologically,

"For years I always had to be the first to do anything," Tors said quietly. "If there was a dangerous stunt to be done, I would always do at least a

test of the equipment. Once, when we were filming a burning jet plane, I stayed inside until it got so hot I couldn't stand it. I always had to impress myself.

"Under LSD, I questioned my motivation for that kind of thing. It came out that I had acted as a coward under Hitler. . . .

"Some young Jewish students were thrown out of the university by Nazi students and I didn't take a stand. I was from a mixed marriage myself, but by law I was an Aryan. But I didn't take a stand.

"I was carrying around a tremendous load of guilt over that and I didn't find out about it for 25 years. It helped explain the dangerous things I did—I had to take a stand under dangerous conditions."

#### Loving care does it

To prove out another theory, Tors became a partner in Africa, U.S.A., a wild-animal farm in the desert north of Los Angeles. His theory is that wild animals can be trained through affection rather than by force.

The farm harbors many lions—one of them is cross-eyed—tigers, elephants, cheetahs, jaguars, gorillas, monkeys, tarantulas and scorpions—150 in all including that blasted python. Every animal is handled at least once a day. It is a startling sight to see a pretty girl strolling about with a tiger on a leash.

Tors spends a lot of time at the farm, but his heart remains with Suzy. "As much as we expect of the dolphins now, we are constantly amazed by them," Tors says. "They even seem to anticipate our signals. They seem to sense what we want them to do."

He was silent for a long moment. "Yes," he continued, "as for the TV show the smallest reward is to have it a success. The greatest reward is to be with the dolphins."



#### Luscious Topping for a TV Evening/continued

Not a dessert for the calorie-conscious but one that is served as a luscious topping for a light meal. Hot, buttery, tender biscuits are split, drenched with ice-cold sugared berries and topped with sweetened whipped cream. The contrast of hot and cold makes this simple dessert outstanding.

## STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE (Makes 6 Servings)

1 qt. strawberries, hulled and cut into halves

2 tbsp. orange liqueur (optional)

3 cups sifted all-purpose flour

1/2 cup granulated sugar

4 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

3/4 cup (11/2 sticks) sweet butter

1 cup light cream or milk

1 cup heavy cream

1/4 cup confectioners' sugar

1 tsp. vanilla extract

Mix halved berries with liqueur and ½4 cup granulated sugar. Chill for several hours. Sift flour with baking powder, salt and ¼4 cup granulated sugar. Cut in butter until butter particles are the size of small peas. Add light cream all at once. Stir just enough to moisten dry particles. Turn dough out on lightly floured board and knead just a few times to shape into smooth ball. With rolling pin or with fingers shape the dough into an oblong about 6 x 9 inches. With sharp knife cut oblong into 6 3-inch squares. Put biscuits on a lightly greased cooky sheet. Bake in preheated hot oven (425° F.) for 15 to 20 minutes or until biscuits are deeply browned. While biscuits are baking, whip heavy cream with confectioners' sugar and vanilla until stiff. When biscuits are ready, split them while hot into halves. Spoon berries over bottom half. Top with second half. Add more berries and top with whipped cream. Serve immediately.

### GARDNER MCKAY

#### found his own paradise

From 1959 through 1962, Adventures in Paradise and its star, Gardner Mc-Kay, were among the big hits of television. The viewers loved the theme and the locale of the series, which transported them from their living rooms to the schooner Tiki and high adventure on the South Seas. And they also loved Gardner McKay, with his dark good looks and brooding ways. But the critics didn't care much for either the series or Mc-Kay, especially McKay, whom they scorched as one of "the new breed of beach boys making good in TV." One critic even described an actor after a bad performance as being "so incompetent he even makes Gardner McKay look good."


Such criticism would start even the most case-hardened acting die-hard looking for other work. In the case of McKay, of a moody and sensitive nature anyway, it put a complete damper on his enthusiasm for acting. After *Adventures* ended its network run in 1962 (it is still being rerun in syndication), he hied himself off to the West Indies to brood; and out of this brooding, I found on a visit to

him last winter, has come a decision to be a writer. His first project is a collaboration on a film about the islands. He'll also produce and star in it.

"Maybe I'm not the greatest actor in the world," he admitted at his retreat on Saint Martin island, "but nobody has given me much chance to improve. Directors are usually more concerned with keeping the front office happy." The years in Hollywood, he added, were torture for him because he is very much like his TV image of Adam Troy, a loner. He has always been that way. "Even in school, people stood apart and treated me as though I was in outer space. Maybe then I was. Anyway, I can't change that; I wouldn't want to."

On the island of Saint Martin, Gardner, serene under his straw plantation hat, can go native, relax, and be as much of an individualist and loner as he wants to be. Here he can walk along the beach, or explore the countryside in an old jeep, or just cloud-watch while listening to records.

His Saint Martin Shangri-La couldn't be a better hideaway had it continued



been conjured up by a Hollywood set designer. After a bone-rattling ride over a road that is more like a cratered creek bed, you reach a house built on a rocky ledge that hangs over the Caribbean, with both living and dining area completely open. It is isolated, without a telephone, and a rough 40-minute drive to any civilization.

It is exactly what McKay wants. "I hate Hollywood," he said, putting down a two-week-old newspaper. "I hate television series, agents, career women, uniformity of any kind, the playing of 'the game' that is expected of you, but especially Hollywood. This place, Saint Martin, is just great. I can go without a haircut and haven't worn a tie in six weeks. But I think I had better scare up a barber—this is too much," he added, running his fingers through the back of his Beatle-like haircut.

Saint Martin-half under Dutch rule and half under French-at this point is playing a doubly important part in McKay's life. There is the peace and relaxation he has found there, and it will be the instrument of his attempt at a new career. He is writing the screen story for "The Hurricane." a film about Saint Martin and the surrounding islands-Saba, St. Kitts and St. Eustatius. When I talked with him he already had done weeks of research, island-hopping by boat and small twin-engine planes. Working with Gardner is a talented screen writer, Aubry Goodman.

McKay's idea for his story came to him in a bizarre setting. One of the trips he took following his departure from Hollywood was into the jungles of Venezuela. He hired a canoe and four natives and paddled up the Orinoco River. "The extent of the solitude of that trip was most unnerving," he said. "For two weeks the four native guides stared at me, and I stared back while they silently

paddled through the jungle. But one good thing came out of all this staring —my story idea."

By the time the trip was over, Mc-Kay was most anxious to get his story on paper. After writing it, he needed someone with experience to polish it. "I was lucky to run into Aubry Goodman. Last October we started working together."

An old friend of McKay's, Janet Hanson, lent them her house, an ideal setting for the purpose, yet one that could be distracting. All living areas are completely open. "It's like living in a furnished jungle," said McKay, "complemented with stereo and electricity."


There is practically no social life. McKay had dinner a few times with the pretty daughter of the governor of Saint Martin, Poeky Beaujon, a redhaired look-alike for Lee Remick; but that has been about the extent of his gadding.

If everything goes as smoothly as McKay hopes, the script and production schedule of "The Hurricane" should be finished and ready by the end of the summer. The actual filming is expected to start Sept. 1.

"We want to film an actual hurricane so we hope to pick up hurricane reports and then track down the storm and film it. I don't think this has ever been done and if we live through it we'll have some very amazing film."

There are a few obstacles to Mc-Kay's project. Only recently he had to visit Chicago to fulfill a prior commitment to star in a stock version of "The Mousetrap," and he may have to stop any time during production to make good on a contract with 20th Century-Fox which calls for one picture a year. But by the end of summer he expects to be well started on his new career—the writing, directing (he will direct the actual storm scenes) and producing of "The Hurricane."

An Illinois cat kept chewing the spring cord on her owner's phone. We pleased everybody by providing a piece of *old* spring cord the cat could safely chew on.




