President Johnson has been criticized for using television to communicate with us directly—and often. Many of the critics are newspapermen, some are television executives who are unhappy, not about his use of television, but about the way he has gone about using it.

The television men would like more notice of his appearances, more time to prepare for a Presidential message. They also would like to know in advance what he intends to say so that they can decide whether to put him on the air live, or tape his talk for use at either a more convenient or a more popular viewing hour.

Newspapermen can't enjoy being continually by-passed, with the President's words going directly to the people instead of first being processed through their typewriters. And they resent the replacement of press conferences by television talks which preclude questions from the press.

The President knows, as we all do, that his tremendous ability to persuade is as much in his personal manner as in what he says. For him to make an important announcement only to newspapermen would be as out of character as Cary Grant writing a love letter to the girl next door instead of showing up himself.

• While each President has his own style, and the communications media must adapt to that style, it also is the custom for Chief Executives to adapt to the needs of the communications media and the public. The questions of expert reporters, and the replies of the President, on all subjects of public interest are vitally needed.

We hope President Johnson will continue to appear on television to talk to all Americans—at his convenience. We also hope he will hold regular press conferences—televised press conferences—at which reporters from all media can question him.

More Second Thoughts

One cannot re-review the past season without coming to grips-and possibly even stagehands-with the show which, ratings or no ratings, has become the biggest thing since Amos 'n' Andy. When we originally reviewed Peyton Place favorably, we were subject to many slings and arrows. We couldn't care less about a show's rating—we are, in fact, happier to have played a minor role in saving, say, Slattery's People, than we are liking Peuton Place. We do. however, wish to state that for all the jokes about "Datin' Place," any criticism of it as being "dirty" is unjustified. Peyton Place has held up extraordinarily-it is well produced. well cast and, generally speaking, well directed. We still have, however, criticisms, chief among which is Peyton pace. The show has an irritating habit of making a federal case out of every conversation. At the wedding, for example: Rod: "Your mother looks-beautiful" Allison: "You were going to say 'happy," weren't you? Why didn't you, Rod?" Rod: "Why didn't I say 'happy'? Why didn't I. Allison? I don't know" Etc. etc. Another criticism we have is of Allison (Mia Farrow). If she can't get another emotion-or even another boy friend-would it be too much to ask for her to get another speed?

Elsewhere on the acting front, we would single out, for the number-one actress of the year, the peerless Flipper. And then, for comedy, we would double up on Jim Nabors and Frank Sutton in Gomer Pyle, USMC, and Elizabeth Montgomery and Dick York in Bewitched (York, incidentally, has really grown on us). Seriously, though, and for serious drama, we give you that splendid quartet-Richard Crenna in Slattery's People, David Janssen in The Fugitive, Vic Morrow in Combat! and Robert Lansing in Twelve O'clock High. Perhaps the most amazing thing about all these gentlemen is that they have been on, all season, in hour-long shows, in which they were on screen almost every minute, and still you never get tired of them. Morrow is truly extraordinary; and if it is true that ABC has let Lansing go because "the public doesn't buy the fact that a general can have problems," we suggest to ABC and the public that they read the news these days.

Finally, speaking of the news (and the network news departments which love to take full-page ads telling each other how great they are), it was a season in which no new top newscasters, other than ABC's Peter Jennings, were developed, and NBC's president made the extraordinary statement that he didn't want, on his network, any "commentators." Elsewhere on the discouraging side, ABC's late-night effort. Nightlife. stands out as a monument to futility -even when they did finally come up with the right man. Dave Garroway, they didn't seem to know it. On the encouraging side, on the other hand, a fourth commercial network began to loom as a real possibility, educational TV grew, if slowly (what they need, of course, is live network connection), and CBS, acting with something less than alacrity, acquired a new television president.

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

The disorganization man the experiences of the noted minnesinger during his 'i've got a secret' days by Allan Sherman

Today, thanks to his success as a singer of song parodies, Allan Sherman is rich, famous and overweight. But it was not always thus. Back in August 1951, he was poor, unsung and overweight. He was also out of work.

He had been eking out a living in New York as a TV comedy writer, but on this particular Monday in August he had no job. With another unemployed TV writer, Howard Merrill, he dreamed up an idea for a game show and set out to sell it to Goodson and Todman, producers of one of 1951's hits, What's My Line?

What happened after that is part of the story Sherman tells in his autobiography, "A Gift of Laughter,"* which Atheneum will publish this summer. This two-part series of articles was adapted from the book.

The scene: Todman's office. Sherman and Merrill made their pitch, Todman consulted Goodson, and ...

Bill Todman handed me a singlespaced typewritten sheet of paper. It was a Letter of Agreement between Goodson-Todman Productions and *The Undersigned*.

They were buying our show!

I smiled at Howard Merrill, and he smiled at me. Yesterday we were out of work. Today we're rich. Television tycoons.

Waiter, champagne for everybody!

I read the Letter of Agreement, in which The Undersigned did thereby transfer, assign, sell, rent, lease and bestow all rights to their original television idea entitled *l've Got a Secret* to Goodson-Todman Productions, including rebroadcast rights, world-wide subsidiary rights, motionpicture rights, dramatic rights, musical rights, toy- and souvenir-manufacturing rights, human rights and civil rights.

Todman offered to let us use his solid-gold fountain pen. We read on: "For these rights Goodson-Todman agrees to pay The Undersigned the sum of one dollar (\$1.00)."

Waiter, make that Kool-Aid.

Howard gulped. "I don't know," he said. "One dollar . . ."

I put an end to his doubts. "What the hell," I said. "We need the money."

And so we signed the Letter of Agreement, which also included a promise that if and when the show went on the air, Howard and I would each get a royalty of \$62.50 a week, and one of us would become Associate Producer at \$125 a week.

(A few years later Goodson-Todman Productions sold *I've Got a Secret* to CBS for three million dollars. I sent them a wire: "NICE PROFIT, FELLAS.")

It was eight months before the show was sold to a sponsor; three more months before our one-page outline was translated into a television program. Three months of looking for perfect panelists, playing the game over and over in all-night sessions. Mark Goodson shouting commands. Bill Todman nodding wisely. Mark Goodson shouting questions at Howard and me. Bill Todman playing with his solid-gold stopwatch. Mark Goodson exterminating the bugs in the show. Bill Todman offering the ad-agency people a Scotch, Mark Goodson hunt-andpecking the rules of the game. Bill Todman pacing the floor. I was the Associate Producer (The job had fallen in my lap because, luckily for me, when the job came open, Howard Merrill was employed).

We went on the air June 19, 1952. Our host was Garry Moore. Our perfect panel consisted of Orson Bean, Louise Allbritton, Laura Z. Hobson and Melville Cooper. This perfect panel lasted two weeks. So did the original format of the show. After all those months of taking out the bugs, we had a regular insectarium on our hands.

The first show was a disaster. I used my friends as the contestants. My friend Sheldon Keller, with his secret, "I'm wearing a girdle." The wife of another friend revealed, "My husband snores." (My wife later told me the trouble with this secret: Everybody's husband snores.) The celebrity guest was Boris Karloff: "I'm afraid of mice."

(We kept inventing insipid "secrets" like that one for the Celebrities until the night Monty Woolley was our guest. For him we concocted: "I sleep with my beard under the covers." After the panel guessed it, Henry Morgan asked, "Now Mr. Woolley, do you really sleep with your beard under the covers?"

"Of course not, you bloody idiot," shouted the Yale professor-turnedactor. "Some damn fool named Allan Sherman told me to say it.")

At first we had two sponsors, Carter's Little Liver Pills and, on alternate weeks, Prom Home continued

Permanent. The president of Prom Home Permanent was violently opposed to Laura Hobson, and later to Nina Foch and Faye Emerson, because they had straight hair. His idea of the perfect panelist was Harpo Marx.

Anyway, the president of Prom didn't like the show. The morning after the first program he canceled his half of the show. However, *I've Got a Secret* kept going.

I worked like a fiend. Some nights I'd miss the last train home and I'd sleep on the couch in the reception room. Mark Goodson was the first one in every morning; he'd wake me up and make me tell him dialect jokes until everybody else came in.

There were only three of us working on the show: A boy who opened the mail and stapled it, frequently to his thumb; me, the Associate Producer and \$125-a-Week-Television Tycoon; and that indispensible girl who in television is called the Production Assistant.

She phoned Mount Everest

We had a Production Assistant named Adraia. One morning I heard on the radio that Sir Edmund Hillary had reached the top of Mount Everest. I couldn't wait to get to the office. When I got there, I said: "Adraia—get Sir Edmund Hillary on the phone."

"Who?" she asked.

"Sir Edmund Hillary."

"Where?"

"At the top of Mount Everest."

It had never occurred to me that there might not be a telephone booth at the top of Mount Everest.

I'll give *this* to Adraia—she placed the call. And by George she did get the *bottom* of Mount Everest, where there *is* a telephone booth. Then she said to me, "He's expected down in a month." "Too late!" I yelled Goodsonesquely. "Tell them we need him now!"

Adraia started to cry, but she told them through her tears.

Once, I called the Air Force public relations office and said, "Our show is on Wednesday nights. Why don't you have somebody break the crosscountry jet speed record on a Tuesday or a Wednesday, and we'll put him on the air right away?"

The officer in charge said, "Oh, we couldn't arrange anything like that. We have no control over those things."

Two weeks later, a Navy jet flew from Los Angeles to New York in three hours and 23 minutes on a *Tuesday*. The pilot, on the show the next night, was Marine Maj. John Glenn. He later became the first American to orbit the earth.

Our ratings went into orbit too. Goodson bet me \$10 we wouldn't pass What's My Line? In a year he paid.

I went into Bill Todman's office to ask for a raise. Todman was a Telephone Maniac. He talked to you only in little spurts between phone calls. "Sit down," he said, as he poured himself a Scotch. Then he buzzed his secretary: "Get me Henry Ford!"

You're looking for a \$5 raise and he's calling Henry Ford to have a Lincoln Continental made to order.

I didn't get the raise. Todman gave me something he assured me was better than money. He amputated the *Associate* from my title and made me Producer.

Mark Goodson was a Memo Maniac. Everything had to be written down. If you sneezed, Mark sent you a memo that said, "*Gesundheit*."

One day I walked into Goodson's office. "Stop this memo madness!" I pleaded. "At this rate you will exhaust the world's supply of paper by noon of Aug. 9, 1961. Stop, I beg you! Lumberjacks are felling Canadian forests to satisfy your insatiable craving! Desist! Give them a few decades to reforestate! At least let them plant a few little acorns!"

Mark answered me by memo.

But I couldn't answer his memo, because I had a backlog of 2½ years of memos waiting to be dictated. Mark said this was because I was disorganized. I say it was because I didn't have a secretary to dictate to.

On Jan. 31, 1955—more than 2½ years after the show began, I still didn't have a secretary. I dispatched this memo to Mark Goodson:

to: MARK GOODSON

from: ALLAN SHERMAN

subject: I'VE GOT A SECRET SECRETARY

As soon as you have some time, I would like to outline to you the reasons why we could make profitable use of a secretary in the <u>I've Got</u> <u>a Secret</u> office. May we discuss this further at your earliest convenience?

I did not get a secretary. To dramatize the issue, I typed up this memo:

For weeks I wrote all my memos in gibberish. But Goodson and Todman were obstinate. Then, President Eisenhower declared it was National Secretary Week. (He really did.)

to: MARK GOODSON, BILL TODMAN from: ALLAN SHERMAN subject: A SECRETARY FOR "I'VE GOT A SECRET"

I know you'll both be pleased to know that next week has been designated by President Eisenhower as "National Secretary Week."

To be without a secretary during "National Secretary Week" is, as we all realize, un-American.

And so, gentlemen, not for me but for my Country, can I have a secretary, please?

Thank you very much, and God Bless America.

So they finally promised me a secretary, after three years of waiting and dreaming.

What would she be like? Blonde? Redhead? Slinky? Curvaceous? Sexy, throaty voice? Prim? Wild? Blue eyes? Exotic perfumes?

I could hardly wait till Monday. Then Monday came. At the stroke of 10 my new secretary walked in. His name was Roger Peterson.

GLEAMING DETAILS OF A LOVE AFFAIR

Jewel-like equipment lavished on antique autos attests America's romance with the motor car

Next fall sometime—no date set—you'll be seeing the jewel-like items pictured on the opposite page in a CBS News special called "The Great Love Affair." The gadgets are accessories on antique cars which will be a part of the special about to t automobile life in America—from antique cars to junkyards, including, CBS says, "the guy who washes and fondles his car every Sunday afternoon."

For the filming of the antique-car segment and these pictures, about 35 to 40 cars from the collection of 1000 or so owned by Bill Harrah, the Reno gambling-house operator, were taken out to the desert. Harrah himself test-drove a Duesenberg, got it up to 90 mph before he threw a rod on a hill.

Somehow it seems they just don't make 'em this pretty any more.

WHEN SHE COUGHS, DOZENS OF PEOPLE CLUTCH THEIR PAY CHECKS

"Molly Bee," says a New York agent who never goes west of the Hudson for more time than it takes to sign a Hollywood contract, "will never be a star. Oh, maybe in Iowa. But not in this town. Which is where it counts."

Molly Bee, in white kid boots and black suit, her hair tied back in a braid and a fur coat over her shoulders, sat in the Palm Court of Manhattan's Plaza hotel, sipped a Grand Marnier and ruefully allowed as how he was probably right. "I am just too darn lazy," she said. "But"—and here she grinned impishly—"I have gotten to the point where every time I cough, dozens of people clutch their pay checks."

Tommy Sands' press agents say that he would rather not talk about Molly Bee. "He still thinks she's great," they say, "but it was all a long time ago, and he's married now."

"A long time ago" there was a highly publicized romance between Tommy Sands, boy singer, and Molly Bee, starlet. So highly publicized was it, in fact, that writer Ezra Goodman saw fit to immortalize it as an example of fan-magazine hyperbole in his acidulous history of the film capital, "Fifty-Year Decline and Fall of Hollywood." Today Molly denies that the teen-age affair was inspired by publicity, but she is certain that publicity interred it. "His managers were afraid we would get married," she says, "so they did the natural thing: They made dead sure we were always in different cities."

Afterward, there was a round of

what Molly calls "one-shot, smile-forthe-photographers dating," and, almost inevitably, a short-lived marriage to a nonprofessional about which she is remarkably casual today. "When Connie Francis's marriage broke up after four months," she recalls, "I called and said, 'Darn. Yours lasted one month longer than mine."

"When Molly was with Tennessee Ernie Ford and me, she was like a young Doris Day," says Cliffie Stone, the country-and-Western host who gave Molly her first break on his Hometown Jamboree, a Los Angelesbased TV show, and then managed her career for several years. "When I saw her later she was dreadful. They had her singing torch songs. They muddied her image."

Granted Stone's bias (he was, of course, no longer managing her), he did have a point, although it was probably less a question of muddying the image than of finding one. As a member in good standing of the country-and-Western clique, a tightly knit group of which Jimmy Dean has said, "There is almost no friction," Molly liked her work and the people she worked with. "You can get thrown in with a rough crowd in show business," she has said, "but I was lucky. I never got near them."

Instead there was Ernie Ford, whom Molly met on Hometown Jamboree and later worked with for nine years on his own shows. "Ernie was in his black-tooth-and-overalls stage then," she says, "but he was still tremendously dignified and continued

so kind to me." Once, in an abortive attempt to convince Ford that she was growing up, Molly spent several months learning to smoke in secret. When finally she sprang her surprise, Ford, whose characteristic aplomb could not be dented by such minor rebellion, simply pulled out his matches. "I," says Molly, "was crushed."

There was Jimmy Dean. "Jimmy and Ernie are entirely opposite," Molly explains. "Ernie is sophisticated and Jimmy is wild and funny, a Peck's bad boy."

'Cute as a bug'

"Ol' Moll," says Jimmy Dean, "is cute as a bug. No temperament. And she breaks me up."

And there were others whose paths she crossed, among them Julio Di Benedetto, producer of *The Jimmy Dean Show*.

"I was on The Dinah Shore Show when Molly was with Ford," Di Benedetto says, "and we used to pass each other in the parking lot after work. I saw Molly grow up. She turned into one of the most secure performers I know, one of the rare ones who don't need a retinue to tell her what to do."

It was cozy, no question about it, but it was also frustrating. The general critical opinion of Molly Bee, when it did not consist of ignoring her altogether, was abysmally low and pushed even lower than that by a string of fourth-rate movies. "Those movies," Molly tells everyone today, "are shown only in prison. To the lifers."

A television editor who still remembers this period vividly says: "Molly Bee is a very young, rather bland singer of cornball music. Not a subject you can sink your teeth into."

As the chauvinistic New York agent implied, Molly had limited appeal, and a change was definitely in order. Torch songs in night clubs, instead of Western music at rodeos, seemed to be it.

"You should have seen her in Miami," says Allan Sherman, who worked with her there one winter. "There she was, alone with a guitar in a room full of people waiting to hear jokes about matzoh balls. I never knew what a hick I was until I saw Molly Bee, who I had thought of as cornball, go to work on that crowd. That girl can do anything."

If she cannot, no one can fault her for not trying. So far this season she has combined night clubs and rodeos with semiregular appearances on the Dean show.

It is this last that she really prefers. "Night clubs give me a chance to look sexy," she says, "but there is always that friendly drunk in the front row. Television, on the other hand, is quick and clean. The camera is like a microscope. You can't fool it. Some day, I'd like to do my own show, like Dinah Shore."

"Well, I think she could handle it," says Tennessee Ernie Ford, "but like everyone else, and I'd tell her this, I'd have to see a pilot."

Backstage at the Colonial Theater, where the Dean show is taped, Molly talked about what comes next. "I like working," she says, "and I'd never deny it. But a career is awfully unfulfilling in itself. I come home at night to a strange hotel. I go upstairs, order dinner and turn on the television. What kind of life is that?

"If I were married, I think I'd pull a Doris Day and turn everything over to my husband. I *want* to get married again, but there are three problems: I couldn't marry anyone in show business; I couldn't marry anyone outside show business; and—all the best men are married already."

"Molly Bee," a secretary in a New York publicist's office sums up, "is one star I like to see come to town."

Gemini IV: As this issue went to press, Huntley and Brinkley were swapping folksy small talk across a crowded NBC table, Walter Cronkite was intoning the gospel according to CBS, Jules Bergman was doing his impersonation of Tom Swift for ABC, and Jim McDivitt and Ed White were whirling around the globe at something better than 17,000 miles per hour, in the midst of their anticipated four-day Gemini mission. Television coverage of the flight to that point had been illuminating, inspiring, suspenseful - and, at the same time, frustrating. Everything that could be conveyed by camera or microphone was passed along to viewers. Our astronauts, however, were far beyond camera range; we could, at times, hear them, but for a visual medium. this is like mustard without a hot dog. Despite some notable firsts-the live audio pickup during the "space walk," NBC's colorcast of the launching, the transmissions to Europe via Early Bird-it was, through no fault of television, which did the best it could, a weekend of watchful waiting. with more waiting than watching.

G-Men and TV Men: The FBI is keeping close tabs on the ABC series that will bear its name and dramatize its exploits next season. It became known last week that the bureau had granted clearances to the four regulars signed to appear in *The FBI* Northern California Edition

(Efrem Zimbalist Jr., Stephen Brooks, Lynn Loring and Philip Abbott) and that the backgrounds of other actors may be scrutinized before they are permitted to work in the series. At least one member of the Screen Actors' Guild has reportedly complained to his union that this clearance procedure is tantamount to blacklisting. An FBI spokesman, however, maintained that such precautions were necessary to protect the bureau's reputation. "We will not," he said, "permit anyone with a Communist, subversive or substantially derogatory background to portray any part in the series."

Commons Debate: The United States Senate and Great Britain's House of Commons have at least one thing in common: a reluctance to permit television cameras to invade their chambers. It would seem, however, that Britain's legislators are a bit closer to entering the electronic age than America's. Whereas the Senate has shown no interest at all in the proposal, offered by Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R., N.Y.), to permit telecasts of some debates and roll calls, the House of Commons on May 28 was willing to debate a similar motion, and did so for five hours-deciding ultimately to shelve it for a few more months. A committee will study the question and bring it up again later in the year.



Ah, what a charming, sophisticated, madcap playboy! Hah! MEET THE REAL GIG YOUNG

The handwriting is on the wall. And the atmosphere on the set of The Rogues is thick with talk of impending cancellation and explanations for the show's failure: "It's too sophisticated for the public." . . . "Its greatest charm is literary—the witty dialog is flying right the audience's over head." . . . continued

Lewis Allen, one of the directors, perches on the arm of a couch and says gloomily, "I don't think either the heroes or the heavies are too believable. A lot of the heavies aren't really credible—and the heroes aren't really heroes. What are they, really, but people with nothing to do but run around stealing from rich men?"

In the background, apparently unconcerned over the fact that his show is collapsing beneath his feet, one of the heroes-who-isn't-really-a-hero twirls with ostentatious grace as he walks back and forth across the set, learning his lines. It's Gig Young (born Byron Barr in St. Cloud, Minn.), whose primary fame comes from a long career of playing foil to such stellar leading men as Cary Grant, David Niven, Rock Hudson, Errol Flynn and Clark Gable, but who is best known to the TV audience as that charming con man, Tony Fleming.

He's a second-string hero

Gig's career as a second-string hero seems only natural when one watches him in action. On *The Rogues* set he is the very model of a modern Madison Avenue operator. Tall, slender, graceful, he has the conventional good looks of a collar-ad model; a brittle, flirtatious charm which he flashes on and off at will; and a distinct touch of decadence. He looks as though he is committed to the role of "polished portrayer of playboys."

At close range, however, one discovers that this flash and dazzle is what is known in some circles as a thin candy shell. In fact, Gig Young is a strangely bad job of external miscasting. He simply does not fit his callow act.

For one thing, he is deadly serious about acting. A successful Broadway star and winner of two Academy Award nominations, he is considered,

by such an expert as Anatole Litvak. to be one of the finest actors in America-and he lives in the fairly closed world of serious actors. His friends include Christopher Plummer. Bette Davis, Franchot Tone and Eli Wallach. Although The Roques was his first chance to win the kind of popular fame he has never had, he is calm about its demise. "A lot of people are saying, 'It's too good for the audience and it's above them.' Above them, my foot," he says. "The truth is that a lot of people watched The Rogues and really liked it. A lot didn't, possibly for the reason Lewis Allen gives. But so be it-I am philosophical about it. There's a Broadway show I want to do."

He is clearly a man whose profession is the all-consuming interest of his life. "I care about *nothing* more than acting," he says positively. He is given to lengthy discussions of plays, characterization problems and acting. And interpolated in these discussions are such comments as: "Acting is the exaggeration of life. The bigger you can blow it up and make it look real, the better actor you are." . . . "Any actor who is dedicated, who loves what he is doing, cannot take his mind off it."

Marriage is another subject on which Gig Young is articulate—understandably, since he has survived three of them and is now embarked on his fourth. After one nonfamous wife, he married dramatic coach Sophie Rosenstein, who died; then Liz Montgomery of *Bewitched*. His current wife is another unknown—Elaine Garber Whitman, a friendly, pixyish ex-realestate agent who says of Gig, "It would be absurd to say he doesn't have any faults. But I can't think of any"; and of herself, "My trouble is that I don't find fault with anyone."

The statistics of Gig Young's romantic history tend to support his cheerful playboy image; but, in fact, they stand for a string of catastrophes and unhappy divorce cases. Young's comments about marriage tend to be cutting. "I don't take off my hat to those poor wretches who've been together for 40 miserable years. You have a right to look for perfection and idealism in your marriage, the way you do in your work. If a marriage isn't ideal—and it has to be *very* ideal to be ideal—the quicker you get out of it the better."

One of the big reasons for marital failure, he claims, is female deception. "Girls will use any device to get married," he says. "They're *sick*. They go out with you. They want to do anything you love to do. Then you marry them. Suddenly they don't like to go fishing. They don't like to go walking in the woods. They become themselves. I think you should be able to take a girl like that to court and sue her for fraud."

A friendly, candid man

Gig is a man who likes to talk. One lady journalist, after spending an afternoon with him, wrote, "By the time we parted company I felt I had known Gig Young half my life." He does create this impression. When the gadabout mask goes down, he is a friendly, candid man. He is also amusing. His conversation is punctuated with poker-faced cracks, to wit: "There are many directors in this town who are successful through no fault of their own." And, "Some people hate me because I look like I have the world by the tail. They're mistaken. It's Howard Hughes who has it by the tail." And, "Shelley Winters is not my idea of heaven." Unable, in some connection, to remember the name of Saint Augustine, he refers to him as, "You know, whatsis name, that guy who became a saint, who was a great swinger."

All in all, Gig Young is a walking illustration of the old adage—You can't tell a book by its cover. He's something like a slightly jazzy paperback-with serious essays inside. This is exactly the point that everyone who knows him instantly makes about him. Says Tom McDermott, head of Four Star studios. "He's one of the most deceptive fellows I've ever met. There's that seemingly glib exterior. and inside you find an analytical, intellectual actor, not an emotional one. I'd never have expected it from Gig." Says Rogues writer Ivan Goff: "He's a much more serious person, much more concerned with work and life than he shows on the surface. His facade is happy-go-lucky, lighthearted. But he cares enormously, desperately about what he does and what he is." Says Ben Roberts, another writer, "On the outside he's gay, sophisticated; a handsome man with a twinkle. Then, surprisingly, you discover he's intelligent, sensitive and real. The juxtaposition is unexpected."

Gig Young knows that his "outside," as he puts it, is not like his "inside." "There's something about me," he says, "that doesn't want my 'inside' to show. I adjust my 'outside' to the people around me." And then he adds, "A person who was on the outside what he was on the inside . . . who did everything he did because he really enjoyed it without reference to what other people thought"-he grins ruefully-"that would be a pretty great guy. I'm not sure I know anyone like that, but I do think it's possible. That would be a really strong person-solid all the way through."

He should probably treat himself like a reversible overcoat. If he could manage somehow to wear himself inside-out, it might revolutionize both his image and his career.

HEAVEN HELP THE MEN IN BLUE

The jolly pastime

of second-guessing the umpire goes electronic

The "breakup" play in baseball is a stroke by which a base runner, facing a force-out at second, attempts to foil a double play by upsetting the infielder who is making the relay.

This is accomplished by plowing into the man, usually with spikes high, and knocking him off balance, if not on his countenance completely.

To one watching the breakup on television, about all that has been visible has been a puff of dust, followed by a quick switch to the action at first. But the isolated camera—TV's newest sports gadget—has changed all that, offering a replay to satisfy even the most sanguinary viewer.

"Once football fans see what happens at second base," says Maury Wills, shortstop for the Los Angeles Dodgers, "they will forget about the Packers and the Bears."

To offer a fragment of what goes on, Wills recalls the time that Jim Hart, the San Francisco slugger, charged toward second with the idea of thwarting a double play. "When I have the ball," says Maury, "it's the responsibility of the runner to keep his head down." Apparently, Hart overlooked this. The ball struck him on the forehead. "He hit the ground and lay unconscious with his eyes open for maybe five minutes," says Wills. "I thought he was dead. Had the isolated camera replayed this, we might have created the biggest fuss since Benny Paret."

It isn't, of course, the purpose of the isolated camera to offer hairraising pictures, but more to give the viewer a close-up look at what actually happens on the field. So popular has the new device become that all three major networks now use it, often setting up as many as three isolated cameras at a single event. ABC, which is televising Saturday baseball, comes to each game equipped with one for the batter and at least one other to cover base runners.

Football and basketball also are prime subjects of the isolated, which doesn't ignore the minor events, either. Bob Trachinger, director of operations for ABC, experimented with the camera at the U.S. Olympic water-polo trials last fall. "Placing the isolated under water," he recalls, "we found out what really goes on in that sport. We played back some of the hairiest action I've ever seen."

What he means is that viewers partial to drownings were ecstatic.

Technically, the isolated camera is a simple piece of equipment whose pictures are fed to a video-tape machine. By the mere pressing of a button, the tape is rewound. A second press of a button rolls the tape foreward for viewing—all within five seconds.

CBS and ABC both claim to have developed the isolated camera, but credit for practical application generally goes to a 31-year-old Philadelphian named Tony Verna, a sports director for CBS, who first experimented with it at the Army-Navy football game of 1963. Making a study of both teams' offenses, he instructed the isolated cameraman personally on what action to cover. With only one camera to follow five potential receivers and three ball carriers, he naturally guessed wrong often. In one early game, he confides, he guessed right only six times. But by increasing the number of cameras, the networks can capture more action for replay.

Understandably, qualms have developed among heavyweight thinkers in the National Football League over situations in which an official may be stabbing at a decision which a guy sitting at home can make with certainty, just seconds later. Football needs this, of course, like a hole on its 50-yard line, especially on those occasions on which the video-tape replay shows the official to be wrong.

For what comfort it may be to refs, the replay can vindicate the official's judgment, too. In a game last year between Detroit and Los Angeles, David Jones, an L.A. defensive lineman, appeared to jump offside. The referee, however, ruled illegal procedure against Detroit lineman Jim Simon. The decision was met with boos from the stands, but those little old experts at home knew better, because the isolated replay showed that Simon was the culprit, humping a shoulder to draw Jones offside.

What the new camera is going to

do for baseball isn't fully established, but umpires are less than rapturous over the possibilities.

"There's no doubt about it—it's going to create heat," says Al Barlick, dean of National League umpires, "but we're taking the position that, regardless of what picture a guy sees in his living room, it is not as accurate as what we see in the flesh. Secondly, on plays at first base, the umpire not only operates by sight, but by sound, as well. [The pop of the ball in the glove.] What camera is going to capture that accurately?"

Barlick insists that umps will not be running scared in the presence of the new monster, but plainly his profession won't be helped. In a game, for instance, that ABC did during the spring, a runner sliding into second was ruled safe, presumably because the shortstop missed the tag. The isolated replay showed the shortstop's glove brushing the slider's leg.

NBC, the first network to use the video tape in color, also is playing it cool, pointing out that it isn't unduly concerned over the possibility of rhubarbs.

"We brought up the matter with the NCAA, whose college games we carry," says Chet Simmons, director of sports for NBC, "and they said they had no objection to arguments resulting from the instant replay. And the American Football League is delighted that the camera will focus more attention on its game."

Simmons says assuredly that problems developing from the isolated camera will be overshadowed by the unusual insight to sports it will offer. "At golf tournaments we televise," he says, "we will use the isolated camera on the 18th green. If, for example, Arnold Palmer misses a 2foot putt, we may catch the facial reactions of his gallery. This is something you don't often see."

Seen even less, of course, is Palmer blowing a 2-foot putt. BY DEE PHILLIPS and BEV COPELAND


RIDING HIGH on the waves of INDIGNATION

Milburn Stone, Gunsmoke's cantankerous Doc, comes up with some salty observations on the course of the venerable Western

For 10 successful seasons Milburn Stone has faithfully portrayed *Gunsmoke*'s Doc Adams as a contentious, cranky, querulous old bachelor insulting Marshal Dillon's integrity, overlooking Miss Kitty's questionable character and needling the unkempt Festus unmercifully.

Off-screen, the dedicated Doc also remains in character—contentious, cranky, querulous—especially about what is happening to his favorite TV series, *Gunsmoke*.


Mustache bristling, Stone pulls at his proboscis just as a disconcerted Doc would do. "I wouldn't presume to



know how to run a network, or be the producer of a show, but I do know the flavor of *Gunsmoke*. You can detect the changes."

Perhaps years of immersion in the role have imbued him with—subliminally—the Doc-like traits he so admires. In person it becomes a moot point as to where Doc tapers off and the real Milburn Stone emerges.

Over the years Stone has earned respect and a grudging admiration for his pugnacious protection of Doc's image and his vehement insistence on professionalism. As a born-and-bred Kansan whose lineage dates back to



the very period and place which *Gunsmoke* emulates, he is also unofficial keeper of the *Gunsmoke* code.

Stone's indignation rose to a boiling point last fall when then-producer Norman Macdonnell (who originated the series with writer John Meston), was given his walking papers by the network. "We were all stunned," recalls Stone. "They called Norm over to CBS at 6 o'clock one evening and told him the news." Britisher Philip Leacock, heretofore a director, was named to his first producership. "And," snorts Stone, "the scripts coming through now are written by people who don't understand the show at all.

"We're also getting into something else that I certainly don't agree with," grumbles Stone. "They're bringing in guest stars."

Producer Leacock presents an incongruous contrast to the Kansas colloquialisms which surround him. He is aware of the resentment guest stars can create, but feels competition is good for the regulars. In fact, he feels it's "awfully good for us to have a good outside actor give us a breath of fresh air occasionally."

Here again, Stone

disagrees. "We're Matt, Kitty, Doc and Festus. We have no other identity. A Jean Arthur, a James Whitmore, a Betty Hutton are one-shots. Their fans will tune in, but not necessarily again."

But for all his pseudo-irascibility, Stone is regarded with tolerant affection by his co-workers—even Leacock. "I must say," admitted the producer, "I'm in sort of a mellow mood towards him today—he's not on the set—but there are moments when I could say different things. He may be a bit irascible sometimes, but you have to put up with that in good actors. He's a bit dogmatic, but he's also great, great fun."

The champion storyteller

For all his outward gruffness and studied sarcasm, Stone is the champion storyteller of the cast and usually livens up a dull day with his sense of humor. He hides his sentimentality behind an aphorism which he tosses off—"The only way true men can show their love is to insult the hell out of each other."

Stone's insults have encompassed the rest of the cast. "I spent the first three years hating Jim (Arness), I couldn't stand him professionally-or his attitude," Stone explained. "He'd be late or wouldn't show up-never apologize. And once he was there he'd clown around." Finally Stone exploded at rehearsal one day. "I told him we were diametrically opposed and I felt he did not belong in the business at all. I said, 'I've read my contract and there's nothing in it that says I have to put diapers on you or wait for you. And if you ever show up late again, buddy, you'll have two things to explain-not only where you were, but where I went!"

Stone sheepishly admits he wouldn't have blamed Arness if the 6-foot-4 giant had tossed him right through the ceiling. Says Stone, "When I was through he looked me right in the eye and said, 'You're absolutely right.' Stone slapped his knee. "From that moment on I began to love that guy. He's a great big wonderful cub bear."

Since that episode, this same great big wonderful cub bear negotiated a partnership for himself in *Gunsmoke*, and just last fall reportedly sold it back to the CBS television network for a neat capital gain.

Meanwhile, back at the tirade. . . . Finished with Jim, Stone took off on Amanda Blake and Dennis Weaver (who has since departed the show for his own series). Angered because he felt they didn't take the show seriously enough at first, Stone continued in high dudgeon.

"My feeling was that they just didn't belong in the business. I've been in it all my life, and I feel that people who make a living at it, even a meager one, are the luckiest people in the world. How many people wish to God for a chance like we had? Then to see people fluff it off ..."

Some of Stone's fervor evidently was contagious. Today he admits Amanda balances precariously between "school-teacher sweet and dance-hall tough—a slender tightrope!" As far as he is concerned, she is the world's greatest Kitty Russell.

'Nine funerals' for Weaver

As for Weaver, Stone snorted, "We had about nine funerals over him" when he left the show after three abortive attempts. The death of Chester, however, gave birth to a new character on *Gunsmoke*, Festus Haggen, the only white sheep in a clan of outlaws, played with a scraggly beard by otherwise handsome Ken Curtis. Fortunately, Ken's professionalism meets with Stone's exacting standards. Ken replaced the recently married Amanda and the dear-departed Dennis Weaver in personal appearances with Stone at fairs, rodeos and horse shows. The veteran vaudevillian ("Stone and Strain, songs, dances and snappy chatter," circa 1920's) still loves the excitement of a live audience—and the money to be earned helps toward the purchase of such accouterments of TV stardom as a luxury yacht.

'He doesn't pull any punches'

Curtis is almost adulant in his admiration for Stone. "Mil is one of the most entertaining fellows I've ever been around in my life. But when he decides to do something, he doesn't pull any punches. You've got to admire him for it, because he really stands up and fights. He's one of the most honest guys I've ever met. He gets a little salty now and then, but always for a reason."

This season, Stone's brand of salt spiced up the set considerably, sometimes keeping the front office in a stew. He took umbrage at one particular script recently and the resultant effect on Doc. "Tve never seen a more obvious attempt to inject social significance into a *Gunsmoke* show. I'm not anti-anybody. But this was like saying, 'Now this next act is for you people in Little Rock. Pay close attention.' Certainly all men are brothers regardless of the color of their skin." Stone was building to a high pique just remembering.

"In this scene, Doc was supposed to walk out of the hotel and get into this philosophical thing. I said, 'I know what somebody had in mind here, but it's not Doc.' It was completely out of context. It was about the fifth rewrite, and the final argument was that the speech was necessary because the show was running two minutes short. So I said, 'What the hell, why don't I sing and dance? I could. Hell, yes. Let's throw that in, too!'" To accuse this Stone man of sentimentality would produce a derisive snicker. However, he admits that his Kansas heritage has been a talisman of sorts. He started in show business in Kansas, playing tent shows; went to New York and made his Broadway debut in Sinclair Lewis's "Jayhawker," a play about Kansas set in the Civil War; and has spent the last 10 years performing in a replica of Dodge City, Kan. And his new 46foot yacht he has christened the Jayhawker, of course.

Proudly Stone boasts, "My mother was a Kansas pioneer who lived in a sod house—the oldest of nine children. My first wife was a Kansan. My second wife is a Kansan. My daughter was born in Kansas. And I patterned Doc largely on my grandfather, Joe Stone, who was in the Civil War. You could say I never really left Kansas."

A cinch for next year

Stone can now afford to be disillusioned. "Everybody keeps saying we're [Gunsmoke] a cinch for next year. I still don't believe it." He grinned suddenly, looking 20 years younger than Doc. "I've made a bet every year for the past three years and lost them all—that Gunsmoke wouldn't be back." Doc just lost his bet again. His shingle will remain in Dodge next season.

"I don't concern myself too much because I know I can't do anything about it. They [CBS-TV] have me for one more year. After that it's my option, and I don't believe I'd do it.

"Actually," his blue eyes twinkled, "I own a property—I mean a TV series. It's set at the turn of the Century, about the time the horse and buggy was being replaced by the Model T Ford."

The main character? "Why do I want to prove to somebody that I can play a lawyer? He's a doctor. Why not just go on being Doc?"
