Our Private World

CBS, which was no network to take ABC's Peyton Place lying down, has come up with a new twice-weekly nighttime, or rather, nightmare, version of its 10-year-old daytime serial As the World Turns. Some time ago, in a burst of enthusiasm, CBS publicity proudly noted that the amount of time As the World Turns had been on the air was equal to 500 motion pictures the length of "Cleopatra." And, if that statistic wasn't enoughand it wasn't-they added that the scripts used by the program since its debut could reach a height of more than 411/2 feet.

They did not, however, mention their depth—and in this respect, at least, we think they were wise. However much depth As the World Turns may have had in the daytime, Our Private World at night has—you can bet on this—less. In fact, if it weren't for repeating everything twice, we don't think they'd be on twice a week. We recall one conversation which went as follows: "All the man said was, 'Can I help?' And do you know what I wanted to do? I wanted to murder him. Because he couldn't help. Does that make sense? 'Can I help

you?' That's all he said. And I hate him."

Created-you will pardon the expression-by Irna Phillips and William Bell, Our Private World is based on the efforts of a young divorcee, Lisa Hughes (Eileen Fulton), to turn over a new leaf in Chicago. For this task she meets a girl named, aptly enough, Eve (Julienne Marie). The latter, meeting Lisa on her first day in her job in the admitting office of a Chicago hospital, says, "My friends call me Eve. I have hundreds of friends, you know. Will you call me Eve, friend?" Then, when Lisa asks, "Next of kin?" Eve sobs, "Nobody-nobody in this big, wide, wonderful, stinking world." In the next script they have quite a talk about the word "admitting," too, but we'll spare you that.

Anyway, you get the idea. Both Lisa and Eve have problems, the chief of which seems to be Eve's family. Eve has two mother-dominated brothers and a mother herself, and if this show may be said to have a specialty, it is in its "Is there anything else, Mother?" scenes. The Eldredges, incidentally, are very rich. They pronounce everything very strangely, as if they were just about to sneeze-Mrs. Eldredge (Geraldine Fitzgerald). example, pronounces "were." "whirr"; and "words," "weirds." And honestly, when one of her sons says, "We're not as weird as we seem," both words and weirds fail. Altogether it is the first show we've seen in a long time where literally nothing is good-the idea, the producing, the writing or the directing. As for the acting, it has to be seen to be believed -and, believe us, it shouldn't be. The girls are bad and the boys are worse. One thing this show does, though. It makes Peyton Place look great. In fact, the only thing we cannot fault is the title, Our Private World. The mistake was in making it public.

This being summer, normally a time for figure-watching, here are a few figures to look at:

\$1,145,889,700 \$100,000,000 \$148,783,200 \$2,250,000,000 And here's what they mean:

■ \$1,145,889,700 is the combined income of ABC, CBS and NBC for the 1964-65 season. It's the largest figure in television's short history, and is expected to be surpassed, considerably, in the 1965-66 season. Business is so good that another network may soon be needed to take care of all the well-heeled sponsors who are clamoring for network time. Good news for UHF stations.

■ \$100,000,000 is what the networks are paying for rights to telecast baseball and football alone. This does not include talent and production costs.

■ \$148,783,200 is what one sponsor, Procter & Gamble, spent on television advertising in 1964—\$70,439,700 for spots on local stations and \$78,343,500 on network television. If you're interested, the second largest advertiser on television last year was General Foods with a total of \$70,874,800. There were 24 national advertisers that spent more than \$20,000,000 apiece on television in 1964, 14 that spent more than \$30,000,000, seven that spent more than \$40,000,000.

■ \$2,250,000,000 is the estimated total network and national and regional spot advertising income for the upcoming season.

You might recall a few of these figures next time you wonder why there is so much imitation of successful shows and successful commercial techniques on television, and why there is so little gambling on new types of shows and commercials.

The stakes are too high.

Actress JUNE BLAIR, DAVID NELSON's wife, is returning to The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet. She has been on a year's leave of absence from the show . . . 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
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

States, is color-blind, and started acting while he was still in his early teens.

As a high school freshman in Douglas, Ariz., Hickox got the lead in a student musical show. "That turned me on," he says. "I never could take school seriously after the acting bug bit me." Later, when his family moved to El Paso, Texas, he continued performing in school plays, spent his summers appearing in stock-company tent shows, and, whenever a traveling musical comedy played El Paso, ushered at Liberty Hall. "I saw 'The Desert Song' and Marilyn Miller in 'Sunny,'" he recalls. "I'd just sit there and drool." He went back to Liberty Hall a few years ago as star of "The Music Man."

Between his modest debut in Douglas and his triumphal return to El Paso, Harry took a couple of detours. He was a musician for a while and, just before he was drafted in 1942, a theater manager. Born in Big Spring, Texas, on Oct. 22, 1915, he learned to play the banjo as a boy, then switched to guitar before playing with such orchestras as Jack Teagarden's.

He went to the University of New Mexico at Albuquerque for a year and there, on a blind date, met Mary McConnell of Oxford, Ind. "We became very thick very fast," he says. He and Mary were married in 1938. They are still married, have no children, and live in the Hollywood hills.

In Albuquerque, and managing a neighborhood movie theater, Harry was drafted. Mary stayed on in that city, where she did a radio show on station KOB while Harry, in the Army Air Corps, traveled about New Mexico giving aptitude tests to recruits. Since he was color-blind and some of the tests were for color-blindness, he had to have the correct answers written out and at hand for reference. He was eventually assigned

to the induction center at Santa Fe, N.M. There, as a sergeant, it was his job to process the young scientists who were to work on the top-secret Manhattan Project at Los Alamos.

After the war, Harry and Mary headed for Hollywood, where they did radio shows on station KFI. Mary is still there, but Harry got an agent and began acting minor roles, usually in Westerns on TV and in the movies. He says, "I was the poor man that Roy Rogers saves the ranch for."

When he heard that auditions were being held in Los Angeles for the national company of "The Music Man," he put on his toupee and reported. The producer, Kermit Bloomgarden, asked him what he wanted to sing. When Harry said, "'Trouble,'" Bloomgarden said, "You are being unfair to yourself. "Trouble' is not only the most difficult song in the show but possibly the most difficult in all musical comedy. And we will be comparing your performance with that of the man who does it better than anybody—Robert Preston."

Hickox said, "I'm willing to stand or fall on this." He sang it, the listeners applauded, Bloomgarden said, "You win," and he was immediately given the job of understudying Forrest Tucker in the national company. Then he took off his toupee and auditioned for the role of Charlie Cowell, the anvil salesman, which he played for three years on the stage and eventually in the motion picture of "The Music Man." After the movie was completed, he played the lead role, Harold Hill, in New York and for a year on the road.

When Harry Hickox read for the part of Sergeant King in No Time for Sergeants—without toupee—someone said that he did not look like a sergeant. George Burns, production supervisor of the series, said, "He's an actor, and a good actor can look like a sergeant when the time comes." The time came, and he does.

After appearing in a ninth-grade production, Sutton, at 15, was cast as Antonio, the sea captain, in a Nashville (Tenn.) Community Theaproduction of Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night." The play was directed by Fred Coe, who, years later, was to become a distinguished television producer and play an important part in the latter-day career of Frank Sutton. In the cast-and also fated to play an important part in young Sutton's future—was Delbert Mann, who gave up acting to become a television and movie director.

One of Antonio's lines in "Twelfth Night" is, "I have many enemies in Orsino's court." Sutton read it, "Ah have minny enemies in Orsino's court." Coe corrected him gently, "That line is, 'I have many enemies in Orsino's court.' Indignantly, Sutton replied, "That's what Ah said—'Ah have minny enemies in Orsino's court.' In the years since, he has worked "long and hard" to remove all trace of his native Southern speech.

Born in Clarksville, Tenn., on Oct. 23, 1923, Sutton was the only child of a newspaper typographer. The family moved from place to place in Tennessee and Kentucky when Frank was a boy. He says, "My father had a temper. He'd have a row with a managing editor, so we'd move on."

"When you're an only child, the spotlight is always on you," Sutton says. "And then you grow up and suddenly realize it's not on you anymore." He had to grow up in a hurry—his father died when he was only 15, and his mother went to work as a proofreader on the Nashville Tennessean, a position she still holds.

Young Frank got a paper route to help out at home—and continued acting at the Community Theater. After being graduated from high school, he had a short-lived job as a radio announcer in Jonesboro, Ark.

He tried to enlist in every branch of the armed forces but was rejected because of his color-blindness. Finally in the Army in 1943, he was assigned to a Joint Assault Signal Company, composed of Army and Navy men. Within 18 months he took part in 14 landings in the Pacific, including Leyte, Luzon, Bataan and Corregidor. When the war ended, he was sent to join the occupation forces in Korea, where he wrote, directed and produced "The Military Government Hour," a radio propaganda program.

Back in Nashville, in 1946, he went to Peabody College and worked at the Community Theater until he moved to New York in the fall of the year and enrolled at Columbia University to study drama. There he met his future wife, Toby Igler, a graduate student, whom he married in 1949. Sutton left school for a year to tour "The Barretts of Wimpole Street," in which—at 25—he played the father of Elizabeth Barrett Browning. The newly wed Mrs. Sutton went along as production assistant. Back in New York, Sutton worked in live TV by day-thanks in part to the entree provided by Fred Coe-and went to Columbia at night until he got his degree in drama cum laude.

Another Nashville colleague, director Delbert Mann, gave him what he calls his "first big break"—a role in the motion picture "Marty," playing one of Marty's pals. This led to other important movie and television roles on both Coasts and eventually to Sgt. Vince Carter in Gomer Pyle, USMC.

Today, Sutton, his wife and two children, 11-year-old son Joey and 9-month-old daughter Amanda, live in an apartment in Beverly Hills. They have no plans to buy a home in the West. "I'm very nervous about anchoring anywhere," says Sutton. "Actors are like gypsies."



doggy commercials




A player shows little enthusiasm for a part shown him by script supervisor Billy Vernon.



So these 26 pooches were hauled in three station wagons and a van from the kennels of veteran Hollywood trainer Frank Inn to the Wilding-Fedderson studios to make a passel of dog-food commercials. Among these pitches was one in which 20 dogs would listen to a symphony concert in theater seats set up in the studios, then at intermission go to the lobby where they would be served dog chow at a bar.

The rehearsals and final performance during the long shooting day—9 A.M. to



9 P.M.—went off without untoward incident—and little wonder. Seldom had any group of Hollywood entertainers been more pampered and petted.

To avoid undue temperamental outbursts, Inn selected from his large roster only those "actors" who had, as he put it, "no personality conflicts." Then he made certain they would be well paid \$-\$50 a day for the "stars" (those in the front row) and \$35 for supporting players (those behind). He made sure of fringe benefits. At lunch break his actors

were trotted down 3rd Street outside the studio and back again. For relief, should any of the actors become ill or suffer stage fright, six "understudies" were held in readiness in the wings.

And no company could ask for more deferential treatment when it came to direction. Five "handlers," walking to and fro with squeaky animal toys in their hands with which to draw attention, would softly cajole: "Up, Gwendolyn; down, Morris; yawn, Cuthbert."

Down to Earth: The free ride's over. As of this Sunday, June 27, Comsat intends to collect fees for TV use of its satellite, Early Bird. Britain began charging last week, and the high cost of Early Bird has ruffled the feathers of enough U.S. broadcasters to produce a cutback in the use of the satellite by our networks. Comsat's rate (during peak hours) will be \$5245 per hour. For that price you can get your program from Andover, Me., to Early Bird (or from the satellite to the Maine ground station). To bring it down from the satellite by way of Britain's Goonhilly Downs station (or to get it up from the Downs) will cost another \$6270 per peak hour. That's the rate the British suddenly sprung on Bird fanciers a few days ago. To these charges you have to add several hundred more dollars for land lines on both continents, and before you're through, the hourly total is something over \$11,000. Our networks, which have been flying high, with free Early Bird privileges during the satellite's first few weeks in orbit, have been brought down to earth by the rate schedule. All of them have filed petitions with the Federal Communications Commission protesting Comsat's tariffs and asking the commission to suspend the rates and hold hearings to arrive at a "reasonable" schedule of charges. Unless costs come down, the networks all say, they will be willing to use Early Bird only on "the most unusual occasions."

Tall Tower: What's taller than the Empire State Building and designed to make television viewers happy? No, not the Jolly Green Giant, It's a 1700-foot transmitter now under construction in Moscow which, when it is finished, will be the tallest reinforced-concrete structure in the world. For a while, it was not at all certain that it ever would be finished. Four years ago some doubting Dmitris said it couldn't be done -unless the foundations were reinforced. Work was halted while construction experts and bureaucrats haggled. The skeptics prevailed over the objections of the original designers, the base was reinforced and construction of the tower resumed recently. It is now up to the 230-foot mark. The structure, which is to be part of a new 100-million-dollar national television center, is expected to triple the range of the six Moscow channels it will transmit

Appeal: Will pay-TV return to California? Don't hold your breath. The state's attorney general has filed notice of intent to appeal a County Court decision that opened the door for the revival of pay-TV, and the outcome may be in doubt for another year or two. It all started when the voters banned pay-TV. Next, the Superior Court ruled the ban unconstitutional. Now the case will be appealed to California's higher courts and ultimately, the U.S. Supreme Court.

First prize is \$155,820, and the owner of the winning horse is presented with a gold cup by the Irish Hospitals' Sweepstakes Organiza-

tion. The race is a mile and one-half on turf, and it features a walk-up start.

In 1962, the American-owned Tambourine II won the Derby. This year, three American-owned horses are entered: Mrs. Ann Biddle's Western Wind (trained by M. Dawson), John McShain's Baljour (M. V. O'Brien), and Joseph M. Roebling's Mourmelon (J. Cunnington).

Video-tape was added later, but I believe this to be the first national use of what might be termed an isolated camera.

In Europe, the coming of war in 1914 ended the innocence of a young and confident generation.

Americans were far from the conflict. President Wilson assured them that they were "at peace with all the world," and suggested that it was possible for a country to be "too proud to fight." By 1917, America was almost too rich for war: trade increased and fortunes were made on Europe's struggle.

The Allies courted rich, powerful America, but the isolationist spirit—personified by Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan, thrice-defeated Presidential candidate—wanted no part of the "foreign war."

Germany's bid for American sympathy was canceled by resumption of unrestricted submarine warfare and clumsy diplomacy. As the war continued, anti-German sentiment increased, Bryan re-

signed and isolationism waned.

Answer to last week's puzzle

Sheldon hits some crazy notes



...both as a free-wheeling trumpeter and as an actor who plays only 'me'

"Jack Sheldon," wrote one of the Nation's tougher critics after the unveiling of The Cara Williams Show last fall, "is an actor to watch—and an actor that other actors had better watch out for." Warming to the praise, Sheldon nonetheless denies the implied allegation that he is a scene-stealer. To begin with, he denies that he is even an actor. "I've just got those two expressions—straight ahead and straight continued

to the side," he says in a mellow, distinctively hesitant semidrawl that sounds like the notes he produces on the trumpet. "I just play me."

As he romps through the featured role of Fletcher Kincaid, free-wheeling, hip-talking, bachelor jazz musician, Sheldon is indeed playing himself: off-camera he's an easygoing, elfin-sized musician with an offbeat charm, a free spirit with a life style best described as blissfully casual.

Not long ago, while Sheldon was leading a jazz group in San Francisco, he received an urgent call from Henry Mancini, the composer-conductor. Mancini wanted him back in Hollywood at 9 the next morning for a movie recording date. The following morning, at the appointed time, Mancini and 39 musicians assembled at the studio. An hour later, Sheldon strolled in, trumpet under his arm.

"Sorry, Hank," Sheldon drawled. "I got fogged in."

"Now wait a minute." Mancini said firmly, "I called the airport and they said it's all clear in San Francisco."

Sheldon paused and nodded thoughtfully. His eyes were full of mock innocence as he confided, each word uttered very slowly: "There's more than one way of being fogged in."

"It broke everybody up," Mancini says now. "Just the way he said it and just the way he is. Jack Sheldon, who has more humor in his trumpet than any man I know, is one of the few musicians in town worth waiting for. I just hope success doesn't straighten him out."

So far it hasn't. Sheldon is still the same likable, far-out fellow who, when complimented on his horn, will say seriously: "Everything I am in this world today I owe to my mentor, Billy Cook, who taught me all the facets of music." It is a sly put-on, for Billy Cook exists nowhere except in Sheldon's ripe imagination.

In common with the character he has played on The Cara Williams Show, Sheldon will, on occasion, talk as hip as an ambassador from Birdland. "Twitched," in Sheldon jargon, is a euphemism for good, as in "He sure plays a twitched horn." Another Sheldon phrase to indicate quality is "chop"—"He blew a chop chorus." Wolfing down a plate of ribs, Sheldon, who is very strong with a knife and fork, will pronounce the ultimate in compliments. "That cook," he'll say, "sure burns some crazy grease!"

"Jack lives in a wonderful world of his own," says Jack Marshall, the guitar player and a highly respected composer for such shows as The Munsters. "The hip people have loved him for years, and now the public is latching on. Jack worked hard to become a good musician. Now he's got big eyes for acting, and he's working hard at that-so who knows how big a future he has?"

Recently, Jack Sheldon sat in the commissary at CBS Studio Center, where The Cara Williams Show was filmed and discussed his present and professional future. At 33, standing not much over 5-feet-7, Sheldon has a round, boyish face with an impish, quizzical, Huckleberry Finn air.

"If they ever find out I'm just playing myself, maybe that'll blow the whole gig," he said amiably. "Stan Getz saw the show one night, and the next day he called me and he said, 'Man, you were real natural.' I thought that was a pretty nice critique. Other friends of mine, musicians, they'll say to me, 'Man, you must be makin' a pile of bread on that show.' They don't realize it's not a gag, that I'm pretty serious about acting. Every day I read this book of Shakespeare's plays out loud to help my diction. Ever read 'Hamlet'? Man, I'd hate to play in a band if Hamlet was the leader. He'd take all night deciding what song to play first."

Sheldon, hardly an introspective

sort, shrugs off any attempt to isolate the wellspring of his humor. "In grade school," he says, "I remember this nun complained to my mother. She said, 'Jack doesn't do anything but just sit there, and everyone laughs and it disrupts the class.'" Born in Jacksonville, Fla., on Nov. 30, 1931, Jack was christened Berl Cyrl Sheldon Jr. Jack says, "As soon as I learned to talk, I asked people to call me Jack—after 'Jack Armstrong, the All-American Boy.'"

After attending parochial schools in Jacksonville, Sheldon went to Cranbrook School for boys just outside Detroit, on a swimming scholarship. At 12 he was already teaching classes in swimming. Today his mother operates a swimming school in Hollywood at which his wife, Patty, a petite brunette, is one of the instructors. (The Sheldons have four children, ranging in age from 10 to 2.)

Sheldon's first important job was with the Stan Kenton band. Later he joined Benny Goodman for a European tour, one of several outings with the maestro, for whom Sheldon's respect is boundless. "Playing with Benny," he says, "you became a musician, or else."

Julie London (he played in a band accompanying her on tour) was the first to encourage his bent toward humor, and soon he was developing his own comedy routines. Appearances on The Steve Allen Show, The Edie Adams Show and a CBS special called "The Nut House" brought him to the attention of producer Phil Sharp, who tagged him for The Cara Williams Show. Sheldon hasn't neglected his horn, which is no doubt fortunate because the Williams show goes off the network next fall.

He is dedicated to the most exacting kind of practice. Often, for privacy, he plays his trumpet for hours in a glen in Griffith Park in Hollywood. "The birds and squirrels dig the sounds," he says. "They are very hip."

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
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It has been a good year, supercalifragilistically speaking, for the British. And not far from the forefront of the English invasion of the Colonies is a well-designed blonde actress named Janine Grav, who is definitely, in the words of one television director, "not a standard 8-by-10 glossy." In a fistful of TV roles so far. Miss Grav has attracted attention with her understated talent as a performer, and a beguiling face-ovalshaped with slightly lopsided nose, large mouth and lonely blue-graygreen eyes-that subtly commands a second look. She also has that requisite of all performers—determination.

Once, in the foggy, foggy dew of winter in London, Janine purchased a Bikini, a small matter until its significance is properly measured. "Have you ever tried to buy a Bikini in the middle of winter in London?" she asks in her fading British accent. Any girl who can track down a Bikini in a London winter may find reaching stardom a comparative snap.

"It really is a marvelous time for English girls," says Miss Gray, who is half-English and half-Scottish and has been over here for a year now, acting in television and movies. "Julie Andrews is obviously leading the way. Julie broke all the rules, you see. Though attractive, she's not conventionally beautiful. She has sex appeal, but mainly she's a lady."

Janine projects a ladylike sex appeal herself, which has blossomed in guest roles in *The Man from U.N.C.L.E.* and 12 O'clock High and an Alfred Hitchcock Hour, among others. In the Hitchcock, she played a match-selling wench right out of "Tom Jones," eliciting rare praise from scriptwriter David Friedkin: "Janine fulfills the words. She departs from the page with a distinctive quality, a fresh approach. She has this offbeat attack that sticks with you." And from Quinn Martin, executive producer of 12 O'clock High: "She has an

interesting talent to go with those lovely looks. We gave her a difficult part and she did it to a "T"."

What Janine brings to an acting assignment is a tangible quality often lacking in American actresses her age -sound theatrical experience. Born 23 years ago in Bombay, where her father was stationed as a marine engineer for an oil company, Janine left India with her parents at age 5 and grew up in Weybridge, Surrey, England, After attending St. Maurs Convent and a dramatic school in Surrey, she launched her career in London-"I was a teen-age emcee." she says. As the mistress of ceremonies on Six-Five Special, a Shindig-like musical variety show on the BBC, she gained prominence and in time a flurry of dramatic roles.

For Janine the road was not altogether smooth. "In one flat I shared with another girl our beds were 6 feet long but only 2 feet wide," she says. "And we had a heater which worked only if you deposited one shilling. Being struggling young actresses, we frequently lacked shillings and we were often chilled to the marrow." For a time, she drove a London cab.

Along the way, Janine learned her craft in that extraordinary training ground-British repertory, where she also acquired a facility for accents. including American. She married an American, an Olympic runner named Herman Goffberg (the union was short-lived). Spotted by producer Martin Ransohoff playing James Mason's wife in "The Pumpkin Eater," Janine was signed for a brief, almost nude, comedy scene in "The Americanization of Emily." Ransohoff then summoned her to Hollywood for a top role in MGM's "Quick, Before It Melts." Since then she has branched out in television, with roles upcoming in a number of shows, including The Bob Hope Show and the new comedy series Get Smart!, in which she assumes a mittel-European accent.



DRAG EDUCATIONAL TV OUT OF ITS IVORY TOWER!

Millions would tune in to its programs if their eyes were only opened to what's going on

Stan Freberg, who frequently tells advertising men what is wrong with advertising, recently told National Educational Television affiliates what is wrong with educational television. He expected to be lynched by his audience, instead was asked to become consultant to the president of the National Educational Television network. Here are excerpts from what he said to the educators:

Millions of people now watching commercial TV, and bored to the gills with both the programming and the commercials, may, in the end, be the real audience for ETV. Educational broadcasters say they do not covet the "mass" audience . . . they say they are concerned with filling a void in television. I say to you, the void is bigger than you may have dreamed.

And I'm not concerned here with the daytime, classroom instructionaltype programming which, as an extension of our school systems, is generally filling the void. I'm speaking here of the challenge for you in those evening hours of television. Those hours chopped up and sold by the commercial networks as so many hunks of beef, and referred to, appropriately, as "prime" time. How many millions of the audience now watching Petticoat Junction and Gilligan's Island and The Flintstones inwardly yearn for a better way to spend an evening in the living room?

It's one thing to reach intellectuals and TV snobs, like me, and the "upward with the arts" crowd who couldn't wait for the educational channel to get under way in their city. But how about going out of your way to reach the average person who would go for a better evening's worth of TV in a minute, but doesn't even understand the meaning of the term "Educational Television"? It's not that he's an idiot . . . or has beer tastes . . . or likes Gomer Pule and The Munsters better than he would like Changing World or The Creative Person, given chance. It's just that he's apathetic and nobody's bothered to help enlighten him as to what ETV really is.

The same apathy that keeps a major spender like Procter & Gamble, say, from being stoned, keeps a vast audience of people from enriching their lives through ETV. Most of the time, it seems to me, ETV doesn't really make an effort to reach these people, choosing instead to reach out to the intellectuals, and then writes it off by saying, "Well, that's not our audience anyhow." We don't want to reach "the mass." Where would Christianity be today, if the church had chosen to seek out only those people who were already earnestly looking for religion; if they hadn't gone out of their way to try to educate the non-Christian "mass"?

Ask the man on the street what

educational television means and he'll probably tell you, "Mr. Novak." But don't write him off. Reach out to him. I know it isn't easy. As I see it, it's a problem in four stages. First, you are fighting a national apathy. Few people want to work very hard . . . few people want to go out of their way to help themselves or anybody else . . . few people care about doing their job better just for the sake of doing it better. The same apathy that keeps the public from going to the aid of a person being attacked on the sidewalk before their very eyes is the apathy that keeps them from going out of their way to find out what educational television means. They don't want to get involved.

And yet deep down, I believe they are dissatisfied. They know they are wasting away the evenings of their lives in front of the set, checking in their brains and just staring, and I believe they even are ashamed of their own apathetic state. Educational television could not only fill their evenings with knowledge, and open up their minds and enlighten them on a thousand subjects, and make them feel part of the world around them. and inspire them to care about things. -it could also open their eyes to the tragedy of their own apathy by doing a marvelous special study on "The Apathetic American." I'd love to do such a show myself.

Of course, you can't open their eyes if they're not looking at your channel. Well, how are you going to educate that 48.3 percent of those people surveyed who were dissatisfied with TV programming, if they're not even looking at your channel? You say, "Well, we do publicity . . . we let people know we're in existence." And you do . . . to an extent; and I realize most of it is on a tragically small budget. But the publicity I have seen on educational TV tends to be pretty stuffy.

You can't stretch the mind of the average person by telling him, in effect, "Stand by, we're going to stretch your mind now." Dr. Frank Baxter has said, "Educational television for too long has been the kiss of death because it sounds too dreary and instructional." I regret to report that to me at least, the radio spots that the erudite Dr. Baxter helped make in Los Angeles to promote that city's beautiful new educational channel were pretty much that. Dreary instructional. It's the and problem I find in doing work for the larger corporations. The car companies, especially, end up talking to themselves in most of their ads. I find that most clients, as a matter of fact, tend to talk to themselves or, at best, their competition. I told a large cereal company once that they'd spent millions on TV talking to furniture. Sofas, armchairs, here and there an ottoman.

People think it's dull

But at any rate I have now described the second of the four parts of the dilemma. To compound the first problem, apathy in general, the second problem, that of trying to reach out and explain to the layman what educational television is really all about, is not being solved in most cities. I'll wager that the people not now among your audience think of educational TV, if they think of it at all, as some dull sort of video classroom, period. That is because they've never even turned it on. And one reason many of them haven't is that in a number of cities, top of the apathy, and the whole thing being pretty vague to them, they have to lay out 50 bucks to get a UHF converter. That's the third part of this knotty problem. And how can you expect the poor guy to lay out the 50 bucks if you haven't explained to him, in terms he can understand, what ETV can mean in his life?

Of course we have an ace in the hole, in that all the new sets now being sold will be able to receive UHF. But my fear is not that it will be a long time before the audience will have traded in their old sets on new ones... my fear is that they will have given up on the medium altogether before we have a chance to show them a better kind of television.

But assume the guy comes out of his apathy long enough to be reached, by a station that knows how to communicate with him, and makes him see why he should go out and plunk down approximately 50 dollars, as I did, in order to receive UHF.

Now what? Now we come to the fourth and final aspect of the problem. Can educational television come out of its academic ivory tower long enough to examine whether or not it is educating by doing the most interesting, spellbinding, fascinating and-that terrible word-"entertaining" programming possible? I would like to say, in all sincerity, that the programming that has been and is being done on shows like The Creative Person and Changing World and the Intertel series, and other shows being done in many cities, probing and examining the controversial problems in their communities, are among the finest television being done.

However, I must report that the program my wife and I watched the other night, in prime time—an explanation of the human nervous system, showing each individual vein and nerve fiber—was, shall I say, only semigripping. Yet, as we sat there eating our dinner in front of the set, attempting to stretch our minds, trying hard to appreciate the detailed humanvein chart while chewing our steak, we were, somehow, glad. We were glad it wasn't in color. Of course

there were those who no doubt found it fascinating. My doctor . . . the man who was narrating it . . . his doctor.

And don't get me wrong. I think special-interest shows are a vital part of educational television . . . even if only 10 people care to watch a given show. But it seems to me that there are just a few too many programs where I'll wager that even the 10 people watching are stifling yawns.

Need not lower standards

It isn't that I think you have to lower your standards, or resort to showmanship for the sake of showmanship. And I don't expect you to stoop to the formulas of the commercial networks in order to dress up learning by renaming programs things like "Make Room for Einstein" or possibly "Compute Along with the Massachusetts Institute of Technology," But it seems to me that there has to be something in between I'm Dickens . . . He's Fenster and "An Explanation of the Nervous System." Sure, spotted here and there are brilliant shows, shows of such scope and controversy and depth that they could be done only on educational television. And it is at those moments that ETV stands alone in broadcasting and comes into its own.

But it appears to me that much of the time you're so worried about your special-interest audiences—and so concerned lest you stoop down to the mass, and so "Educational" with a capital E, that you're getting hung up on your own image. You have a challenge here such as education has never known. Madison Avenue and the networks have conspired to make commercial television a dreadful, deadly place indeed. And where will it all end?

I like to think . . . in the fourth network.

For, surely, educational television is the answer to millions of people who came to their sets hoping to have their minds uplifted, enlightened and stimulated by the medium, only to be fed a daily diet of hillbilly, doctor and monster shows laced liberally with teen-age "frug-athons," as Newsweek recently termed them, and punctuated every six minutes by the most maddening programming of all . . . the commercials.

But time runneth out. In those cities like Boston and San Francisco. where educational channels are a way of life, the void has been and is being filled. But in cities all over America where not enough is known yet of the wonders of ETV, I fear that these disillusioned millions of potential viewers will eventually snap off the little glass window for the last time and dump it in their garage, between the Atwater Kent radio, and the mah-jongg set, before educational television will have established a brain-hold in their lives. Do not expect that these people will seek you out. You must try to communicate with them, to let them know what television can truly be, if they will but tune you in.

Yes . . . the white tornado has all but devastated the people's air waves, and in lieu of the Government doing it, I should like to officially declare commercial television a disaster area. Educational TV would appear to be the only Red Cross truck in sight.

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'HULLABALOO' -it's real GONE

You want to know what's happenin', baby? Well, here's this girl with the baroque name of Lada Edmund Jr. and she's 17 years old, still showing the baby fat, and at the moment she is out in the middle of the Hullabaloo rehearsal hall with her confreres. dressed in a torn leotard top, levis and high heels, swinging her wild mane of vellow hair in circles like a kabuki dancer in the throes of harakiri, part of her face hidden behind enormous shades, hips grinding away in some kind of frug-monkeymashed-potato frenzy that would have triggered a massive coronary for the audience at a Minsky burlesque show 20 years ago, and screaming. Yes, she is screaming, yes, in little bursts of velps that sound like Lassie in trouble, until she hits the floor at the finish in a bone-crushing collapse. She rises, walks to a chair and sits. "I'm sort of known for my screams," she says, "I'm supposed to count but I worked it out so I can scream and count at the same time." So do not adjust your television set, ladies and gentlemen; there is nothing wrong with your sound. This girl is known for her screams, you dig? Hullabaloo is happenin', baby, and if it doesn't make it as your particular scene, you might as well go off somewhere like Greenland and commune with the reindeer à go-go.

Switch to another channel, you say? OK, there you have *Shindig* on ABC. The other one? You mean Ed

Sullivan and his weekly lineup of English rock quartets? Local television? The Clay Cole Show? The Lloyd Thaxton Show? Hollywood à Go-Go? Country à Go-Go? Dance Party? Teen Time? Go-Go à Go-Go? Like, you can't escape it. And don't bother escaping to the radio, eitherthat's where it all started. The odd thing about all these hit-record shows, whether lip synch (they play the record and the performer comes on and moves his lips) or live (the performer really sings the record, which they might as well play for all the difference it makes), is that they are nothing more than the TV versions of the disc-jockey shows which, to complete the circle, have been the only factor that has kept radio alive since the advent of television. The only thing radio had to call its own, and now they're taking that, too. Are you with it so far, reader à go-go?

All right, let us go to sources. Lester Gottlieb is a dignified, whitishhaired GAC executive given to muted pin stripes, who heroically takes full responsibility for the idea of *Hullabaloo*. "I'm guilty," he says. "I did *Hollywood Palace*. It's a good vaudeville show, sure, but it's more than that. It has a style and a look. We at GAC felt the next step was an extension of vaudeville, but why not for a young audience this time instead of an adult audience? A young vaudeville show."

Gottlieb blinks in self- continued

wonderment. "Of course, it would have to pick up the kind of audience that is already tuned in to the network, the way Hollywood Palace follows Lawrence Welk and holds those Welk viewers. Hullabaloo started out following Mr. Novak, so the young people were already there. In any case, we thought it was time the kids stopped getting cheap lip-synch shows. I hit on the word hullabaloo and it was obsolete. I looked it up in the Webster's and it meant 'causing a riot.' In this business you got to have a title.

"Originally I had this show in pure vaudeville form. I took it to ABC and they didn't like it. Maybe they were already planning Shindig, I don't know. Then a few weeks later I went to lunch with Mort Werner, vice president of TV programming at NBC, and he said, 'I'd like to do a young show. Twenty-five percent of the buying power is kids. Fifty percent of the population is kids.' So I said, 'I happen to have something for you.' And I told him about Hullabaloo. He said. 'I like the title.'"

'Development dollars' from NBC

Gottlieb then received a stack of "development dollars" from NBC and promptly called in 30-year-old Gary Smith, a slight, bespectacled producer whose wounds had just healed from a season with The Judy Garland Show. They devised the new format, with all the extras-the presence of high-fashion models to decorate the sets, the rotating hosts, the weekly "Go-Go" discothèque sequence-and hit the air in midseason. January is supposed to be certain death for premieres of new shows, and Hullabaloo almost fit the pattern when the first stanza presented starlet Joey Heatherton doing a bump and grind that sent the critics into shocked panic, but the show gradually gained its audience. By mid-spring it was gaining on the competition (McHale's Navy and The Tycoon on ABC, Red Skelton on CBS), and thriving.

These days Gary Smith sits pretty in a cork-lined office in Manhattan, drinking his coffee from mugs which have "The End" printed at the bottom. "I read the charts," he explains his producing methods, "and it's like picking the top horses. We book most acts three or four weeks in advance. But we can even get a record act this week. When some group gets a hit record, they figure they're hot. But they can't get a Sullivan shot. So they're waiting by the phone thinking, 'Maybe we'll get a Hullabaloo.' We like to have a little bit of fun with the rock 'n' roll groups. This week, for example, we have the Astronauts, a group from Colorado, singing 'Roll Over, Beethoven' in a setting of busts of composers and potted palms with the fashion models as a string quartet. I just told them that's how we do it. I don't get an argument from the Astronauts."

On a recent Monday morning Smith sat in his office wheeling and dealing with the performers. Leslie Uggams, that week's headliner, came in to discuss material. Then Dean Jones, the former Ensign O'Toole, arrived. He was the host of the week. Jones parked himself on the couch.

"We've decided not to do that gospel medley," said producer Smith. Jones' all-American face dropped. "Oohhhh, why?" he moaned, not at all like Ensign O'Toole.

"It's not us. It's not Hullabaloo," said Smith tersely.

"Who objected?"

"Me. The timing is wrong," said Smith, pointing to a newspaper headline that told of police brutality in Selma, Ala. "With what's happening in the country, this isn't the time for a gospel medley." Thus does Hullabaloo exercise its integrity à go-go.

Jones and Smith (could those be

their real names?) ran over the lyrics of "Ferry 'Cross the Mersey," one of the epic cantatas of our time, and Smith explained the facts to his host. "We control the studio audience to keep the screamers out. At the dress rehearsal we let in a lot of teenagers, but at the taping we only allow 25 percent of the audience to be teens. We estimate our viewing audience is 30 percent kids, 45 percent young adults and 25 percent adults, wives of performers, agents and managers. There used to be a popular backlash against this show when people felt it was like Shindig. But that backlash is going away. We also pay a lot more money than Shindia. We pay like Sullivan or Danny Kaye, the top variety shows-\$7500 is our top price, too. Dean would never go to Shindig, would you, Dean?"

"No," said Dean. His agent, a lady in a mink coat, nodded. A cigaret ash fell on her coat. "Be careful," she

said. "This coat cost \$5000."

The cast assembles

Two days later the entire cast of the week's Hullabaloo assembled in a rehearsal hall on 49th Street. The lineup, a typical assortment, included Miss Uggams and Jones, one Gene Pitney, the Astronauts, a rock group called Junior Walker and the All-Stars, a younger version of the New Christy Minstrels (can there be anything younger than the New Christy Minstrels?) called the Young Folk, an English chanteuse yclept Shani Wallace, and assorted dancers, technicians, drummers and agents.

As Gary Smith hopped about coordinating things and brandishing his clipboard, Lester Gottlieb observed the proceedings benignly. "You know, at the beginning of this show, acts were avoiding us like the plague," he confided. "Bobby Rydell gave us a plea of illness. Nancy Wilson was afraid it wasn't good for her image. Then one week we had Sammy Davis as the host. He dug the show, as they say, and he had a new record he wanted to push. Since then we've had no trouble getting acts at all."

The dancers leaped around and Lada Edmund Jr. screamed. Leslie Uggams and Dean Jones went into a side room and practiced a number that consisted mostly of "Yay-yay-yay, yay-yay-yay."

"Let's have the Astronauts' number

now!" called the director.

"You know," said Gottlieb, "the critics lump this show together with Shindig. We never felt like we were Shindig. We have Leslie Uggams, Peter Nero, Sammy Davis, Louis Armstrong. To be as young as you feel, that's the idea. This isn't a rock 'n' roll show. We don't think we're a rock 'n' roll show."

"Roll ovah, Bay-toe-vin, roll ovah, Bay-toe-vin, and tell Tschiacowsky the news!" sang the Astronauts, jumping until windows rattled in tempo.
