

• You want to know what in blue blazers is going on at the networks?

Well, at ABC, production people and announcers associated with sports shows wear them when they're on duty. The symbol on the left breast has white and blue for "ABC Sports"; red, white and blue for ABC's Wide World of Sports.

At CBS blazers were out for a while but now they're back and everybody who is anybody on a sports show wears one—talent, production people, even executives. All individually tailored, mind you. The emblem is always gold, always embroidered, always has the CBS eye as a central motif. But the emblem itself is different for each sport.

■ NBC has ruled that its sports people, just about everyone associated with a location show, should wear a navy blue blazer. The emblem is light blue with a gold border. "NBC" is in silver, "Sports" is—naturally—in gold.

The blazer blight is spreading and now many stations around the country provide them for personnel. At WFIL in Philadelphia, radio and television announcers wear bright blue jobs with the station call letters emblazoned on the pocket. Cameramen wear olive green blazers and radio and TV engineers wear navy blue blazers. We understand that some stations even provide their salesmen with blazers. We suppose the blazers are a status symbol, contribute somewhat to organization esprit de corps, and prevent some of the more outgoing lads from dressing like a bunch of race-track touts.

It all smacks a little of uniforms and regimentation, but you've got to admit that it makes the broadcasting people look pretty good. And, especially in sports events that are telecast, there should be some way for everyone to be able to spot immediately the men who are *really* in charge.



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
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TV TELETYPE*: NEW YORK: NEIL HICKEY REPORTS:

TOMMY NORDEN, the young co-star of <u>Flipper</u>, is leaving the series because of "contract conflicts," according to the producers. A talent search is on for a replacement . . . Singer JOHN DAVIDSON, lately of CBS's <u>The Entertainers</u>, has signed an exclusive fiveyear contract with ABC.

NEC will be doing a news special Sept. 19 on the surrender of Japan, and may do a documentary later on marijuana. That network's CHET HAGAN is writing and filming a show which will take a year to complete: It's called "Thoroughbred," and will follow a horse's development on its way to the Kentucky Derby.

National Educational Television has taped a full-length production of "The Play of Daniel," using New York's historic Cloisters as a setting. It's scheduled for NET's 92 stations on Christmas Eve . . . Singer DIAHANN CARROLL has dates with DEAN MARTIN (NEC, Sept. 16) and STEVE LAWRENCE (CBS, Sept. 27).

NBC is busy lining up experts on foreign affairs for its threeand-a-half-hour study of U.S. foreign policy on Sept. 7. Among those interviewed will be ROGER HILSMAN, A. DOAK BARNETT and ZBIGNIEW BRZEZINSKI, all of Columbia University; HANS MORGEN-THAU of the University of Chicago; ROBERT A. SCALAPINO of the University of California; and HENRY A. KISSINGER of Harvard.

NBC may eliminate that peacock as its color symbol. There'll be so much color on next season that his preening could get monotonous . . . NBC has been talking to KEN MURRAY about doing another special on Hollywood--along the lines of his home-movies show, which failed recently on Broadway.

Sports news--ABC's Wide World of Sports has the Japanese All-Star Baseball Game from Tokyo on July 31. The same net will offer the Thunderbird Classic Invitational Golf Tournament on Aug. 1, and in September, the U.S. National Tennis Championships from Forest Hills . . CBS has bought TV rights to the Blue-Gray all-star football game, to be played in Montgomery, Ala., on Christmas Day.

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LOOK WHO'S JOINED THE AFFLUENT SOCIETY Sportscasters, that's who

A native of Green River, Wyo., which isn't too far from Chugwater and Little Horse Creek, Curt Gowdy landed his first broadcasting job in 1943. He called high school basketball games in Cheyenne at a salary of \$18 a week.

Offered heavy sugar—\$75 a week in Oklahoma City, he moved there to do football, and, to make a short story succinct, he now **continued**

earns six figures annually, lives in an imposing estate in Wellesley Hills, Mass., owns two radio stations and has considerable other holdings, including a parcel of land he plans to develop in Arizona.

A stranger examining his financial statement is visibly impressed. Here, for a certainty, is a gentleman of formidable means, possibly a scion of Mr. Rockefeller. Or even a distant kin to Walter O'Malley. In any language, this is a fat cat.

Threat to doctors, lawyers

Gowdy numbers among a new group of affluence in American society, namely, sports announcers, who, in the race to inherit the earth, are posing a threat to doctors and lawyers. It is conceivable that the three one day will wage a massive war to see who gets all of it.

Unmistakably, athletic-event commentators have made the transition from radio to TV with results beyond what they ever envisioned. The banknotes are rolling in, making a mockery of the wages paid their colleagues in journalism, who, to supplement their measly rations, must climb trees for coconuts and set their nets in the lagoon.

The scope of Gowdy's enterprises, typical of today's successful announcer, is staggering. He does the game broadcasts for the Boston Red Sox. He also handles a variety of assignments from bobsledding to trout fishing for ABC's Wide World of Sports. He will do American Football League games for NBC this fall and will take in other laundry, such as basketball and possibly the World Series and a bowl game or two.

Equally occupied is Chris Schenkel, who recently signed a three-year contract with ABC guaranteeing him a minimum of \$125,000 annually. Mr. Schenkel, we regret to inform you, comes from Bippus, Ind. If you wish to know what they do on a rainy night in Bippus, we are unprepared to tell you, but little did Chris suspect, upon leaving his job there broadcasting high school sports, that people one day would besiege him in hotel lobbies and plead for his autograph.

Nor did Jim McKay, the host of Wide World of Sports and another TV celebrity, see himself in such fascinating ports of call as Hong Kong, Mexico City, Paris, Berlin and even Moscow. He goes to these places not to administer foreign aid, nor to peruse the Hilton Bedside Reader, but expressly to report events of such vital concern as sampan racing, snail hunting and snooker pool. At home, he does golf, bowling, tennis, football and scores of other sports which make his act one of the busiest in television.

Jim's beginning was noble enough. He served as a reporter for the Baltimore Evening Sun. Shifting to TV, he did a show—may the Lord forgive him—called *The Real McKay*, from which he branched into TV in earnest.

It may be reported, thankfully, that Lindsev Nelson never started with a show called The Half Nelson, Emerging from the Great Smokies, he went to work as a publicist for the University of Tennessee. His remarkable success as a play-by-play announcer is ascribed to his vision, said to have been sharpened in the "revenooer" country of his native state. As the voice of the New York Mets, commentator for NBC's college football, and veteran bowl-game announcer. Nelson rejects most other assignments today. choosing, instead, to clip coupons with his family in Huntington Bay, New York.

Jim Simpson, host of NBC Sports in Action, is another of the nouveau très riche, rising from obscurity in Washington, D.C., where he once did station breaks on radio. Today his beat is global, and he is as apt to turn up in Nairobi and Papeete as he is in Pottstown, Pa.

A former disc jockey in Philadelphia, Jack Whitaker of CBS also has made colossal strides in sports announcing, traveling the earth like Mc-Kay and Simpson. Jack Drees would move around more, too, but he's been unable to spare the time from the radio station he owns in Mobile, Ala., and the one in Pensacola, Fla., which he has just sold. It is plain that he has prospered broadcasting football, golf, horse racing and boxing.

How sweet it has been!

Life, irrefutably, has been sweet to these pros, but, alas, a threat looms out yonder in the form of the muscle men; that is, the former athletes now moving in on the TV commentary dodge.

Any guy who has shagged a fly ball, played in the U.S. Open, or booted a field goal is a television-announcing prospect these days. Few of the muscle men have turned to sportswriting, largely because cerebral requirements are stiffer, but they have qualified admirably for TV.

The CBS Yankees, for instance, are fielding as part of their television and radio team this year Joe Garagiola, Phil Rizzuto and Jerry Coleman. Then along the networks are such as Jackie Robinson, Leo Durocher, Tommy Henrich, Pee Wee Reese and the redoubtable Jerome Dean. For football, Paul Christman, Frank Gifford, Don Paul, Tommy Brookshire, Terry Brennan and Bud Wilkinson, among others, have been recruited. And when comment is needed on tennis, Jack Kramer is usually summoned, pretty much as Bob Cousy is for pro basketball.

If Kelso and Northern Dancer were available, the networks would sign them, sure as hell, for racing. But, in their indisposition, Eddie Arcaro and Bill Hartack are put on the air as turf analysts. As for golf, you can't tell the program without the players. To name just a few seen on TV: Arnold Palmer, Gary Player, Cary Middlecoff, Gene Sarazen, Jimmy Demaret, Byron Nelson and Bob Rosburg.

Understandably, the seasoned announcers on television resent the poaching of the muscle men, and, of course, journalists laugh with tears in their eyes when they note the fees paid for some of the inane blather dispensed.

But, according to Bill MacPhail, vice president in charge of sports for CBS, the muscle men are here to stay. "Many have bombed out," he says. "They have made us look stupid. But others with voice quality, poise and personality have done well, and they are accepted by viewers, who like to feel they are getting the benefit of the experts' experiences.

"Big-name commentators can be an asset in another way. They appeal to the advertiser. Many times, sales have been helped by taking athlete-announcers to lunch with clients who are fans, too."

Chet Simmons, director of sports for NBC, agrees that the muscle men figure to remain on TV but insists that rewards of all announcers are exaggerated. "Sportswriters often complain about their incomes, compared to those of announcers," he says, "but they fail to point out the hazardous nature of TV work. You can be doing well one season-and be out on your ear the next. A sportswriter doesn't have to worry, for instance, that his paper will lose the rights to baseball and he will be off his beat. Nor does his job depend upon the whim of some agency guy who may not like his necktie."

Truthfully, the journalist has never realized he has such a good deal. And, if someone will pass the tambourine, he will drop in a coin to help send an underprivileged announcer to summer camp.

It was all made to look real by having close-ups of Denver taken in a studio treetop before the fall, then as he hit the ground (actually a mattress).

A TV tour of the U.S. —with KGUN and KMRA

At crossings, you WTOP and WOOK in Washington, D.C., WISN in Milwaukee.

WHO is in Des Moines? WHEN is Syracuse? WHYY is Wilmington, Del.? In Madison, Wis.—WHA?

The answer to these questions is yes. They're TV-station call letters, and after considerable research I can state conclusively that they have more rhyme than reason; i.e.:

WHIO

Is Dayton, Ohio?

—but, unfortunately, they usually have little of either.

For example, it's KOOL in Phoenix, and it's KOLD in Tucson, according to the TV forecasts. To get WARM you have to turn on your radio way up north in Scranton, Pa.

What is WAVE doing in Louisville and WEAT in West Palm Beach? True, it's also WAVY in Portsmouth, Va.—but that doesn't WROC the boat in Rochester, N.Y.

KOLO isn't in Colo. but in Nev. And don't look for WIS in Wis.—it's in S.C. KLOE won't answer your call in the swampland, because she's in Goodland (Kan.).

WSIX in Nashville is on Channel 8. WATE in Knoxville is on Channel 6.

In Seattle, the King Family is on KOMO, while Perry Como is on KING.

KNOE and WYES are both in Louisiana.

You used to go "KCHU" in San Bernardino, Cal. That station went off the air, but you can still catch KHOL in Kearney, Neb.

It's all right to be a KARD in Wichita, a WHIZ in Zanesville, O., WISE in Asheville—or even a KOOK in Billings, Mont. You can get KUHT in Houston and KCOY in Santa Maria, Cal. But they'll KUSU in Logan, Utah (you'll also get KUSD in Vermillion, S.D.).

You may be able to KOAP with anything in Oregon, but stay out of California, where the stations are definitely unfriendly. They'll tell you to fly a KEYT in Santa Barbara. They may even KICU in Visalia. Keep under KOVR in Stockton, because someone will call a KCOP if you go to Los Angeles.

If you get hungry on your television tour, the pickings are slim. Of course, you'll find KORN in Mitchell, S.D., but the KOB's in Albuquerque. There's KAIL in Fresno, and, if you go for seaweed, the KELP is kept in El Paso (WWUP, Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.!). There's KAKE in Wichita.

There's plenty to drink, however. You can milk a KHOU in Houston or a WKOW in Madison, Wis., get KOCO in Oklahoma City, KOAC in Corvallis, Ore., KREM in Spokane, or WATR in Waterbury, Conn. (natch). If you crave something stronger, there's KGIN in Grand Island, Neb., or you can pull a KORK in Las Vegas. But if you get KROC in Rochester, Minn., don't KWAB about it when you wake up in Big Spring, Tex., with a big head.

You can buy a KOAT in Albuquerque (where they rarely sell them), WEAR it in Pensacola, Fla. (where they rarely need them). If you have a date with a KOED from Tulsa, she'll let you WATE in Knoxville, get WEEK in Peoria and WAST away in Albany, N.Y. If you don't WAKR in Akron, maybe she WOOD by the time you get to Grand Rapids. She definitely WILL in Champaign, Ill.-but you'll never KEPR in Pasco, Wash., because she'll run off with KRIS from Corpus Christi, who has KOIN stashed away in Portland, Ore. The only thing left for you is to move to Indianapolis and WISH.

On a cross-country TV journey such as this one, be sure to wemember: When you come to a wailwoad cwossing, you must WTOP and WOOK in Washington, D.C., but you WISN in Milwaukee. (The fact that you left your KAAR in San Diego makes this even more difficult.)



STILL ATTACKING HIS ANCIENT ENEMY— CONFORMITY

Walt Disney marshals the forces of his imagination to strike out in new directions – despite sneers of critics and 'sophisticates'

A cheerful group of men sits at a round table in the commissary, chatting, laughing and lunching. Their high spirits are not surprising. They are stockholders, and their company is doing well. Their annual report adorned with a photograph of Mickey Mouse leading a triumphal parade in front of a white, fairy-tale castle– says, in its very first paragraph: "Consolidated net profit after taxes . . . for the fiscal year ended Oct. 3, 1964 was \$7,057,435."

At a near-by table, a tall, heavy-set

man is chatting away, in his slow, affably rambling fashion, about his theories of color and composition. "Purpose," he says, "determines composition. Now, for instance, if I were to paint that stockholders' meeting over there..." Then, he grins slowly. "Well, if I wanted to *sell* it to them... I'd sure feature the Chairman of the Board."

It's a fanciful notion, in this case, because the affable, rambling man is somewhat in the position of the gold to the stockholders of a gold mine. It is from his amazing imagination that the "consolidated net profit after taxes" has flowed. He is Walt Disney. And he rarely bothers to go to stockholders' meetings.

The story of this curious genius has often been told. His is not only a household name, it is an international institution. Just last year, a prominent French publication recommended that he be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize: and President Johnson did award him the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the highest tribute a civilian can receive. He is one of the few men in show business whose names stand for something significantly larger than their own work; to say "Walt Disney" is to pay a subtle compliment to the human race which, in an age of chaos and conflict, still responds happily, eagerly and universally to the fantasies of this childlike genius. He has been called "innocence in action," and this is as good a way to describe him as any.

The details of Walt Disney's life have often been published. But all that is really essential to know is that his is a pure Horatio Alger story-the story of a very poor boy who was raised on a Missouri farm. who never finished high school, who worked incessantly to bring his innocent personal visions into existence. who succeeded after a series of bitter struggles, who rose to international fame by embodying some of mankind's most endearing characteristics in a mouse, and who has been free, ever since, to produce his very special type of fantasies.

His accomplishments, whether cartoons, nature films, movies, electronic wonderlands, or TV shows, are also unnecessary to list. There can be few people in this country who have not been exposed to some of them.

If his name and achievements are a matter of household knowledge, the man behind the name and achievements is not. He has never emerged, distinctly, as a personality in all these years. In part, this is due to the fascination of his activities, which have tended to divert eyes from the man engaging in them. But, more profoundly, it is because Walt Disney is one of the most disguised personalities alive.

His chief disguise is dullness.

At first meeting, as profile writers have attested with seasonal regularity, Walt Disney seems almost unbelievably commonplace. One prominent Hollywood writer says of him: "He's a mystery man. The biggest men in Hollywood are in awe of him. They call him 'The King.' And yet, whenever you see him, he's always dull and colorless. He has a halting way of speaking. You'd think he was a second-rate accountant."

More precisely, you'd think he was a first-rate hayseed. He is shy with reporters. His eyes are dull and preoccupied, his affability mechanical and heavy-handed. He gabs away slowly and randomly in inarticulate, Midwestern speech that would be appropriate to a rural general store. His shirt is open, his tie crooked. One almost expects to see over-all straps on his shoulders and wisps of hay in his hair.

This dull, rural affability is an acute depressant to conversation—which is apparently its purpose. If one has the patience to persist, however, tossing questions like yellow flares into the folksy fog, the fog lifts, a remote twinkle appears in the preoccupied eyes, and the man emerges.

"It all begins with dreams," he says, haltingly. "As a kid I was a dreamer. I'd sit in class and I'd be way off. What I was dreaming about I don't know. I was always getting lectured: 'Now, Walter, I know you're intelligent.' I was always a creative kid. I built things in the back yard. I organized the kids of the neighborhood to build a tree house.

"People say I still have continued

the innocence of a child. Maybe I have. I still look at the world with wonder, and with all living things I have a terrific sympathy. It was the most natural thing in the world for me to imagine that mice and squirrels might have feelings just like mine.

Not much formal education

"I didn't have a formal education to speak of. I had only one year of art in night school. But the way to get an education is to do something. You get yourself into a problem, and you'll do the research to solve it. I have a feeling that's what's missing in our schools—the tackling of the hard job, then the series of 'Ahh. . . I see now where I was off.' That's how you learn."

Walt Disney has worked ceaselessly since boyhood. "I've never known him when he wasn't working," says his brother, Roy Disney, who runs the business end of the Disney enterprises, leaving Disney-a shrewd businessman himself-free to concentrate on the artistic aspects of the work. "Money," says Walt, "is not my motivation. Money is a means to my creative end. Money doesn't excite me-my ideas excite me." Like all men whose greatest joy in life has been their work, Disney does not understand nonproductive people. "Somewhere, there's a spark of creativity in everyone mentally sound," he insists. "And yet, there are guys who don't want to work. They seem to lack this desire, this drive."

He claims that he does not condemn such people: "I envy them. I envy the guy who doesn't want to do a thing in life but go fishing," he says. But this is not strictly true. Like most purebred Horatio Alger heroes, he reveres the productive process in man, and he is opposed, on personal and political principle, to rewarding

the nonproductive. "I don't believe in people getting things for nothing," drawls the ex-farm boy, who is a political conservative. "We've reached the point where we can't get people to do all kinds of jobs any more. I washed dishes, I carried parcels, I delivered newspapers. It didn't hurt me."

But he is even more concerned about creativity than about productivity, if this fine distinction can be drawn. Throughout the years, he has hunted for originality as other men hunt for diamonds-and has literally spied on his own workers to see if he could detect a flicker of originality behind a derivative facade. "I learned early that a lot of talented people are often conforming to what is already being done," he says, in his slow, solemn way. "I've prowled around their offices at night, you know. . . and studied their work. I look for the things that will give me the key to their talent. The little things they love to do on their own. Often, they hide their own ideas. They're afraid not to conform."

Reputation as a tyrant

Disney's demand for creativity in his workers has won him a reputation as one of Hollywood's major tyrants. "He can't stand people who don't produce, people who are stupid," says one of his old-time workers. According to one of Disney's famous cartoonist graduates, Walt Kelly, creator of Pogo, Disney's reputation as a "tyrant" comes from those who "didn't measure up."

"I'd never say he was a tyrant," says Kelly. "He's an easy man to work for, *if* you're putting out. He is very demanding, there's no doubt about it. He can be fairly sharptempered and tough if people are stupid or unproductive, and this causes griping among those who don't live up to his standards. But if you are hard-working, he's an amazing man to work for. You learn an enormous amount, artistically. He helped to groom me, and I appreciated the experience enormously. I thought of him as a genius."

Artistically unique

Disney himself is artistically unique -a pioneer of form as well as of content. He has never followed Hollywood trends: he has set his own with a breathtaking independence that has been called "stubborn," "mulish" and "irascible." Typical of Disney's calmly walking one way, when most of the film industry was walking the other, was his confidence, when television began to encroach on the motion-picture business, that the home screen would not eliminate movies. "They were all screaming you had to have huge screens, spectaculars. . . . I went out and shot a little nature film ['The Living Desert'] . . . small screen. . ." He smiles wryly. "It was a hit."

He is perfectly aware that his work. which is usually wholesome-to-Victorian, bubblingly gay and sometimes lvrically beautiful, runs directly counter to those current cultural trends which stress corruption, misery and ugliness. "These avant-garde artists are adolescents," he says, frowning. "It's only a little noisy element that's going that way, that's creating this sick art. I don't think the whole world is crazy! Those plays like 'Wine and Roses'-cut it! I don't want to see that kind of thing. If I did, I'd go down to the county nut ward, or something-cut it!"

His own audience, he says, is "the honest adult, the one who hasn't reached such a level of boredom that he can't laugh or cry, that he actually wants this sick stuff."

The entertainment credo of this former farm boy has gone unchanged over the years: "Virtue triumphs over wickedness. Tyrannical bullies are conquered by our good little people, human or animal. There is the happy and satisfactory ending. There is no cynicism in me and there is none allowed in our work. I think we have made the fairy tale fashionable again."

Although Walt Disney has won perhaps more awards than anyone in show business, and has been acclaimed as one of America's contributions to the limited market of world geniuses, his work has often been called "corny," "syrupy," "saccharine," "escapist," "childish" and "shallow."

This has obviously bewildered and hurt Disney more than he will admit. "I don't like snobs," he says slowly. "You find some of the intelligentsia, they become snobs. They think they're above everybody else. They're not. More education doesn't mean more common sense. These ideas they have about art are crazy. They're the ones who call Disney a 'cornball' --There's another one of Disney's saccharine things.'

"Early in the game it bothered me. It doesn't bother me now. But it affects my artists sometimes. They read reviews in the New Yorker or Time magazine. They get all upset. I tell them, 'Oh, that's the way they are.'

Doesn't work for critics

"I don't *care* about critics. Critics take themselves too seriously. They think the only way to be noticed and to be the smart guy is to pick and find fault with things. It's the *public* I'm making pictures for."

He feels a lot less vulnerable in the company of men of substantial achievement than in the company of city-slicker reporters. He cherishes the tributes he has received from great men. "You've heard of Millikan?" he asks, with touching diffidence. "He was a wonderful person to talk to, a Nobel scientist at Cal Tech. He used to come over and have lunch with me. One day he called **continued**

and said, 'You know, what you're doing over there is somewhat akin to something we're doing.' He brought over 12 top scientists, most of them Nobel Prize winners. They questioned me endlessly. It was so interesting.

"The Russian film director Eisenstein was here all the time too, while he was working at Paramount, and Supreme Court Justice Burton. He's dead now. But I used to get letters from him all the time. He saw everything I'd ever made. So did Alex Woollcott . . . Henry Ford, too. He'd bring his engineers in to see 'Bambi.' He'd run it over and over"

Despite his vulnerability to attack and praise, Walt Disney is privately well aware that he is an amazingly gifted human being. And through the unpretentious and rambling discourse, one can detect a remote, well-concealed arrogance. It emerges in his estimate of his own work. He will not do temporary exhibits at fairs any more: "I'm interested in doing things of lasting value. It's heartbreaking to tear them down after two years." It emerges in his response to a question about his reputation as a "dictator" in his studios. "Benevolent!" he snaps. "You can't run anything by committee. Someone has to say, 'We'll go this way.'"

'What is a genius?'

In some sense, he knows that he is a genius, and has given some thought to this category of human being: "Oh, once in a while I make a bluff at being a genius," he drawls. "But what is a genius, anyway? Edison said it was 99 percent perspiration and one percent inspiration. That's what I think, too." Then the man who has worked incessantly all his life adds, with no awareness of contradiction, "The most important thing about me is that I have always lived for pleasure. I have gone on doing what I had fun doing as a boy. I am a pleasure-seeker."

At the next table the stockholders, still laughing and chatting, rise. They have finished their lunch. And they leave the commissary, waving in response to a friendly grin from their gold mine.

Then the gold mine himself rises. "You see them?" he drawls softly. "This has been a good year. 'Mary Poppins' is a hit. Everybody's happy ... but not me. I'm on the spot. I have to keep trying to keep up to that same level. And the way to do it is not to worry, not to get tense, not to think, 'I got to beat Mary Poppins, I got to beat Mary Poppins.'... The way to do it is just to go off and get interested in some little thing, some little idea that interests me, some little idea that looks like fun."

He leaves the commissary and walks past the building where men with movie cameras are coaxing a little dachshund to run off with a bone in a certain direction, past the building where men are installing complex electronic machinery inside marvelous robots that look like real people, to the building where men sit chuckling over their drawing boards as they bring the characters of Kipling's "Jungle Stories" to life.

There, Walt Disney stops. He leans forward, the affable rural fog dissipated long ago, his eyes piercing and intense. "Listen," he blurts out, "You want to understand? We're *living*. There's *work* to do. It never stops."

Then the man who is described as "innocence in action," the vulnerable hayseed-genius who has spent his life in a fairy-tale world, returns to the noble art of pleasure-seeking. And he disappears into the building with the austere silver letters saying "Animation" on the door, and a picture of Mickey Mouse set, like a heraldic symbol, into the tile floor.

Muffler: Finally, after two years of study, the Federal Communications Commission is moving to muffle tooloud commercials. Circulating among the Commissioners last week was an FCC policy statement (by the time you read this it may have been released) setting forth that "objectionably loud commercials are a substantial problem" and should be avoided. Among the practices causing too-loud commercials which the FCC urged broadcasters to avoid: use of reverberation chambers; strident, rapid delivery; lax control-room procedures; immoderate use of volume compression; high volume level of recording. The FCC statement said that, although it has no way of objectively measuring loudness, it expected "strict adherence." The National Association of Broadcasters also has a study on loud commercials underway.

High Dudgeon: Never—well, hardly ever—have the Emmy Awards been made without some kind of hassle attending. This year it concerns "My Childhood," a documentary about the early years of author James Baldwin and Vice President Hubert Humphrey, produced by Metromedia, Inc.

Last week, the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, after nominating "Childhood" for an award, unnominated it. Reason: An Academy ruling says that a show must be made available to at least half the national

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audience before April 30 of the nominating year, and up to that date "Childhood," though in syndication, hadn't made it.

In high dudgeon, Bennet J. Korn, head of Metropolitan Broadcasting (a subsidiary of Metromedia), promptly pulled his organization out of the Academy. Among other Academy headaches this year: Fred Friendly, CBS News president, has refused to allow his department to participate.

That Religious Beat: "Doesn't it get a little lonely sometimes, out on that limb, without Him? . . . Why try and go it alone? The blessings you lose may be your own . . ." To a jazzy beat, Stan Freberg has been composing singing radio commercials for the United Presbyterian Church, and last week he was discussing bringing the jingles to television. The Church would pay the production costs; Freberg, son of a Baptist minister, would donate his services. Generally, Freberg said, reaction to the jingles has been favorable, although "you have to tread very carefully in this area. But the Presbyterians are willing to experiment. They're enthusiastic."

Hello Again: Singer Kate Smith announced last week she is returning to TV with six appearances scheduled for next season: Two each on The Ed Sullivan Show, The Dean Martin Show and The Hollywood Palace. "I don't have to work," said Miss Smith, "but as long as my voice is still powerful, I feel that I should put it to use. It's a God-given gift."

It was used "live" on the early days of Roller Derby coverage, when director Dwight Hemion assigned a specific camera to watch Tuffy Brasuhn make her move from deep in the pack, and often later. With the advent of videotape, I felt that the continuity of the game could be preserved if we replayed the tape of "the isolated" immediately after the particular play. The application

was pioneered by the CBS crew at the Army-Navy game of 1953.



'A TIME TO SPEAK'

For 18 years, attorney Charles Morgan Jr. lived in Birmingham, Ala., "watching hatred build its empire and feeling the anger grow inside me." In this third in a series of programs examining the struggle for civil rights, Morgan narrates a pictorial essay of life in Birmingham, based on his autobiographical book.

For Morgan, the time to speak came on Sept. 16, 1963. On the previous day, the hatred in Birmingham had come to a head: Four Negro children attending Sunday school were killed by a bomb. "The entire city stared down the barrel of violence," says Morgan. "It had become a nightmare." Morgan expressed his anger to members of the Young Men's Business Club—then left Birmingham.

Morgan, who is now Civil Liberties Union director in Atlanta, discusses his early years as a lawyer, the social struc-

MCHALE'S NAVY-ITALIAN STYLE

Except for a few changes in shrubbery, you'll hardly be able to tell the difference


That venerable (108 episodes old) service comedy, McHale's Navy, is abandoning its Pacific island for the southern shores of Italy. None of the regulars, however, is being dropped (even Fuji, the Japanese POW, will be smuggled along), and although three new characters have been added, the basic **continued**

theme of the show (irritable captain vs. lovable commander and mischievous crew) will remain the same as it has been for the past three seasons. Only the scenery will be different, and the arduous 7000-mile journey will be made, with breath-taking American ingenuity, by simply going around the corner on the Universal lot.

Why the change of scene? Several days spent with the producer and cast yielded the answer to this momentous question, plus some first-person testimony revealing how the diverse members of the *McHale's Navy* crew feel about their lot in life after three years before the mast.

Si Rose, McHale's producer, has a corner office, with eight windows, on the ninth floor of Universal's new Tower building. (Joe Flynn of the McHale's cast insists that one's value at the studio can be gauged by which of the 15 floors you are on and how many windows your office has. "I



didn't know how important we were," he says, "till I saw Rose's office.") A mild, tired man who looks like an aging boy scout, Rose discussed the show's shift in locale. "After three years in the Pacific, we thought the Allied and Japanese forces had had enough of McHale." He grinned weakly and leaned forward over his spacious desk. On the walls around him were various large, framed photos of the *McHale's* cast in different inane getups and poses.

'New enemy, new relationships'

"You know, new enemy, new relationships," he continued, "a new dimension for McHale. We'll say he had an Italian grandmother and understands Italian. Which, of course, Ernie does." He looked pleased with that. "The ratings have held up pretty well, but next year we'll be up against Skelton and Kildare, both in color, and so really we're anticipating."

He went on to describe some of the new characters, in particular the Italian mayor who cooperated (for his own benefit) with the Germans, when they occupied his town, and now does the same with the Americans. "When it's to his advantage," Rose explained with considerable enthusiasm, as though it were the most original concept in television, "he understands English; when not, 'No capish.'" When questioned, Rose said the show had received only a halfdozen complaints about their making light of the war, all of them "a bit stuffy," but hundreds of letters from people who identify with the characters and situations. "And, of course, children love the broad, slapstick comedy, and the drama of the war is an added inducement. Horrible as it was, a lot of comedy came out of the war, and anyway, kids don't think so deeply."

The crew of McHale's Navy agrees: "Kids like it," says Bob Hastings (Carpenter), sounding like a banker. "My kids run from $16\frac{1}{2}$ to 9 and they all enjoy it. And anyone who's been in the service would too—we do a lot of things they'd like to have done."

Carl Ballantine (Gruber), who says everything as though it were a punch line, using his cigar for emphasis, feels the show fits the formula for TV success in its appeal to children. "I mean kids—9, 10. Kids buy the products or get them bought. We'd be even more popular if we were on earlier in the evening. Servicemen and kids. Wives tolerate it." Ballantine gets many letters from children; he quoted a couple: "'My dad's a crook,' they write, 'I wish he was like you.' Or, 'Gruber, how do you make a still?'"

Billy Sands (Tinker), with a kind of forced wholesomeness, describes Mc-Hale's Navy as "just sheer, crazy, inspirational fun," and attributes its success to two things: "It's so zany and they really care what happens to Parker and Binghamton."

Yoshio Yoda (Fuji) thinks, "It's fon. No one cahan deny dat. We a bunch o' hoppy nuts."

'Light and fluffy'

Joe Flynn (Binghamton) has a lawyer's smoothness: "We've had Noel Coward. Now the pendulum swings and it's pure slapstick. Tastes change. I prefer a more subtle brand of humor. I can't go overboard, but it's all right, it's popular."

And Ernest Borgnine (McHale) calls it "light and fluffy," though he adds, "I don't think a person has to gag it up so much to be funny—the situation takes care of that. Just use your heart and your head, I say."

The cast is equally unanimous in their opinions about the forthcoming move to the coast of Italy. The only thing that bothered Borgnine was leaving Fuji behind, which is no longer the case. Hastings feels the shift will give the show "a new bill of health," and Ballantine thinks there will be more scope. "There's more to do in a city than on an island." Yoda is happy about the move for more personal reasons. "Now no mohoe Japanese as enemy. I feel mohoe lelaxed about it. . . ." But Flynn is realistic: "It'll either get the series renewed for three more years or it'll destroy it and we'll end this year."

Phony palms to phony olives

He paused, then added, "I don't think anyone will agree, but I think I suggested the move. I thought it would give a new physical look—blue uniforms instead of khaki. And I thought we'd actually go to Europe. When a show starts aging, it has often gone to Europe. Danny Thomas went over. But we're not. We're just changing the phony palm trees to phony olive trees."

There is division in the ranks, however, as concerns going into a fourth season. Hastings "loves it" and doesn't get tired. "Tm well taken care of financially," he says, "so I have very few complaints." Ballantine is noncommittal, though he admits he'd rather be doing feature films. "I don't like imitations," he remarked. "I thought this was going to be an imitation of Bilko. It wasn't. It's the Dead End Kids." And Sands: **continued**

"You think it's tiring until you go to the employment office."

Flynn is philosophical. "I like it and I don't like it." He adjusted one of his gold-ball cuff links over lunch at the Beverly Hills Brown Derby. "I want to do a lot of things as an actor, play a judge, play a lawyer. You get tired of the same thing. But then I look at a successful show like *Life of Riley*—those people never really did anything again after that went off the air."

May run for state senate

Flynn has other interests in case of emergency. He owns the highly profitable parking concession behind Haggarty's, a fashionable women's store in Beverly Hills, and is seriously considering running for the state senate. He feels he's been "fantastically lucky" in his career. "When I went into this business, a fellow told me, 'Be the salt, don't be the roast beef. The beef is consumed in one evening. but the salt is always around.' He was right. The secret of having money is the consistency of employment, and I've been consistently employed for a good while."

Flynn's gold cuff links, squareshaped gold watch, large, gold-encrusted pinky ring, as well as the little initials on his shirt cuff, embroidered so that they face the person with whom he is shaking hands, were visible evidence of his affluence. That and his bearing, which is confident and relaxed.

He attributed the fight he had with Borgnine a season ago to "cabin fever." "Lock a bunch of people together," he elaborated, "and cabin fever breaks out. Well, we had a case of it, but we're all good friends now. I think we're too good friends. When this show is over it'll be a wrench. I spend more time with those guys than with my wife." And yet, having just completed a feature film in which he receives star billing, "Mc-Hale's Navy Joins the Air Force," Flynn readily admitted he would sooner do films all the time than television. "There's a nicer feeling, you get altogether better creature comforts, more time to think, play and create. Well, look," he added as the crowning example, "when we go on location for TV, we're driven in a truck. For the picture, we rode in a Cadillac."

Ernest Borgnine couldn't agree more. At work on his first major film ("The Flight of the Phoenix," with James Stewart) since he started the series (he was in the first "McHale's Navy" feature but not the second), Borgnine grinned happily over his creamed-shrimp-with-rice in the 20th Century-Fox commissary. "Sure, I love it being back in motion pictures. It's great. You're Mr. Star again. Here it's 'Hello, Mr. Borgnine.' At the TV studio it's 'Hi, Ernie.'" He laughed loudly, showing his teeth. "But seriously, if the TV series ends, I'm going to take a sabbatical from television and go back to motion pictures.

Feels he's in a rut

"Ours is essentially a comedy thing. Now doing comedy is fine up to a point, but once I created the character, it really played itself. I'm the pole around which the circus tent revolves—well, I've done that 108 times." He speared several shrimp on his fork. "I love repertory, you see, playing all kinds of different parts. We're like a successful stage show, doing the same thing every night.

"I remember I saw 'South Pacific' on Broadway the first week it opened—it was great—and then I saw the same show, same people, two years later and it was a different thing—all the freshness had gone out of it, everything was mechanical." He popped the shrimp into his mouth and took a plastic bottle of synthetic sweetener and squeezed about a quarter of its contents into his iced tea. "It's the same with our show," he continued. "We've got to the point where we don't even have to rehearse any more —in our mind's eye we almost direct ourselves. One director says, 'Just give 'em their head.'"

Now recognizable

Borgnine denied that the series had made him financially independent; it was difficult, he explained, because 25 percent of his earnings still go to Hecht-Lancaster, a provision he was forced to make in order to get out of a stifling contract with that company, which produced "Marty" and had him on an exclusive deal. What the series had done, however, was to make him immediately recognizable, which he hadn't been before, even though he'd won an Oscar.

Walking back to the set, Borgnine was stopped by a middle-aged woman who asked him to sign his name on a piece of paper. He said he'd be happy to, and his face stretched into a wide smile. The woman called to her male companion. "Hey, Harry, look, it's McHale!" The man waved from a few paces away. "Hiya, Skipper!" he said. Borgnine nodded jovially. "My kids watch you every Tuesday night," the woman said. "So do we. Hey, Harry, take a picture. Stevie won't believe I was with Skipper McHale. Take a picture."

Harry got his Brownie out and Borgnine stood patiently with the woman as her husband stepped back a few feet, aiming his camera. "Hurry up, Harry, take the picture." He snapped it. "Where should we send a copy?" she asked Borgnine. He acted as though he hadn't heard, said, "Thank you," and started away, beaming. The husband called after him. "We never miss a show," he said.



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Is 'Sunrise Semester' flunking out?

IT'S PRODUCING LOTS OF YAWNS BUT NOT MANY 6 O'CLOCK SCHOLARS

". . . Kak budto groma grokhotanye. Tyazhyolo-zvonkoye skakanye. Po potryasyonnoy mostovoy," he said.

The speaker, Dr. Robert Magidoff, white-maned and endowed with a borsch-thick Russian accent, was sitting, portrait-poised, behind a desk backed by rows of ponderous tomes in a New York television studio.

Magidoff, associate professor of Russian at New York University, was reciting from Pushkin. As he spoke, a TV crew went about the bustling business of taping his words.

On this particular program, crews don't always bustle. Cuecard-holding production assistants valiantly stifle yawns, cameramen do their level best to keep their lens-eyes alert, and stagehands (a genre difficult to arouse in the best of circumstances) snooze openly.

The program is CBS's prestigious caffeine campus, Sunrise Semester. During summer vacation, Sunrise's equally brainy brother, Summer Semester, takes over.

Jointly produced by CBS and New York University, Sunrise Semester is now television's sole network classroom; that is, college credit courses in such subjects as mathematics, psychology and Russian literature are taught via television. (Summer Semester, however, gives no college credit.)

But if such do-it-yourself home education interests you, be sure to get a good night's sleep. On most stations the shows are aired weekday mornings between 6 and 7.

Although a relative newcomer to the network (it's two seasons old), Sunrise Semester has been filling Manhattan morning air since 1957. WCBS-TV, CBS's flagship station, spawned the program. And if ever a series seemed a cinch to be pushing daisies, Sunrise Semester was it.

Sunrise was the first college credit telecourse to crack New York's commercial air time, though NBC's Continental Classroom and CBS's College of the Air were on the networks before it. And the way Sam Cooke Digges, then general manager of WCBS-TV, remembers it: "Even the press panned us—and before we premiered." True. Some papers even called "TV education at dawn" an "out-and-out hoax."

Digges held firm. Says he: "Even if we flopped as an educational experiment, I felt that one scholar talking could still be as entertaining as an overblown production number."

Show opened a lot of eyes

No one could accuse Sunrise Semester of being tricky and overblown. The show did, however, open a lot of people's eyes.

Much to everyone's surprise, some 200,000 New Yorkers got up to catch the first course (on contemporary literature); 700 of these were willing to cough up NYU's \$75 tuition fee. (The fee is now \$150.) And Sunrise's sleeper success also shook up New York's booksellers. Mere hours after the first lecture on Stendhal's "The Red and the Black," bookstores were stripped clean of this usually slowmoving classic.

But a few sleepy students garbled it a bit. One bleary-eyed soul went to a bookstore and tried to buy "The Red and Black of TV Repair," by Stan Hall.

By week's end, Variety, the shrewd

show-biz bible, had crowned Sunrise Semester "the first unquestioned hit of the 1957 television season."

As a network offering, however, the erudite Sunrise Semester may be flunking out. CBS doesn't have enrollment figures, but a spot check reveals that out of the 43 colleges utilizing Sunrise courses last semester, only a handful had enrollments of more than 25. One college official put his school's figure at 27—and called it "very low."

Can't use the Rockettes

One CBS station manager explained the viewer apathy this way: "We can't get people to watch CBS Reports. How can we get them up at dawn to listen to a lecture on Mediterranean Archeology?" And, according to one CBS official, Sunrise's yawny crew has a country full of company. Says he: "Education on TV is generally dull stuff. But what can we do about it? We can't back a professor with the Rockettes."

True enough. Some of the profs, however, have spruced the show up on their own. One, for instance, recently spiked the pre-dawn air by spouting a somewhat purple passage of J.D. Salinger's—drawing a hot letter of protest from a police lieutenant in Massachusetts. But the professor shut the officer up with his hastily dispatched reply: "You wouldn't leave facts out of a murder case, would you? As a teacher, I have the same responsibility."

As televised education, Sunrise Semester is, indeed, responsible. And the series is perhaps best summed up by Nancy Scanlon, a junior at Good Counsel College in White Plains, N.Y., who got up at dawn all last spring to take Magidoff's Russian literature course. Miss Scanlon says she found the program "staid," but stuck with it. "The information," she points out smartly, "that's the important thing."



Agnes Moorehead's recipe for TV success: THE STRENGTH OF AN AMAZON... THE GUILE OF A GENERAL... THE HIDE OF A CROCODILE

The set of Bewitched is in its normal state. That is to say, in a swivet. The morning has been spent doing pickups for a couple of old shows and preparing for afternoon shooting on the new. Director Bill Asher's stiff upper lip is even stiffer than usual: He is shooting so close to air date that all his stars have to do is sneeze to send the show into rerunning old episodes long before summer. The call sheet has been bollixed, some actors are late, the company is short a makeup man, and the afternoon setup is a man-killer. Most sinister of all, it is past 1 o'clock and Miss Liz Montgomery, the young star of the piece, is hungry.

In one dressing room Liz gulps a distinctly un-poltergeistlike hardboiled egg. Asher, who is also her husband, has soothing words with her. In another, Agnes Moorehead is being feverishly worked over by the makeup man, Tony Lloyd, who is trying to lop 10 minutes off the hour it usually takes to transform her into the vinegar-tongued Endora, TV's slickest witch. The dressing room with skitterish assistants. bulges stand-ins, press agents, even a man serving lunch, not to mention the press, jammed in between the second assistant and the catsup bottle. Even in her Pan-Cake makeup, Miss Moorehead is an imposing figure, a spirited hoss, classically proud, every inch the "fabulous redhead" and compleat professional the legend says she is.

If she notices the bedlam, you cannot tell it by looking at her. Her Kelly green suit is impeccably tailored. So is her self-containment. Only the surroundings seem out of place. "Pay no attention," she admonishes, closing one eye crazily to let the makeup man apply the eye shadow. "This is the treadmill. This is TV. Mad, hectic. No time to relax. Every second counts."

The makeup man's pencil curls the evebrow expertly, giving the face the

look of the devil. "The treadmill's a marvelous living," she continues. "But the actor who's creative gets terribly depressed. I've shied away. I'm not the treadmill type." She taps the script. "I haven't any idea about the story. How could I? I only got it this morning. I don't care how good you are, you get many scripts not up to par—what you might call 'hack.'"

Agnes Moorehead? Hack? The juxtaposition is somehow startling. This is the Presbyterian minister's daughter who began her career as a child in the corps de ballet of the St. Louis Municipal Opera (light operas and musical comedy), worked her way up through radio to fight Orson Welles' "War of the Worlds" (and help scare a nation half to death), starred for the same boy wonder in "Citizen Kane" and "The Magnificent Ambersons," rode out the blackball which Hollywood's fear of Hearst imposed, and went on to become one of the most versatile actresses of her timeperennial Academy Award nominee, distinguished stage actress, proprietor of her own one-woman show, and performer of the shattering tour de force "Sorry, Wrong Number," in which she wore both herself and her audiences to a frazzle before meeting her final grisly demise.

"You may be sure I didn't decide to go into TV," she is saying grandly. "I was trapped. I did the pilot sort of while I wasn't looking, if that makes any sense. I was convinced it wouldn't sell. How could witchcraft appeal to the general public? Uhhrgh! In this business you need the strength of an Amazon, the guile of a general and the hide of a crocodile."

So here is Agnes, her hide not really as tough as a crocodile's, only her spirit. Now the essential fact that emerges is that Orson Welles was and continues to be the single most influential factor in her career, and "Citizen Kane," the Welles movie which attacked Hearst in **continued**

the days when the publisher was allpowerful, her most symbolic acting experience. To Miss Moorehead there are still basically only two kinds of theater—Welles' kind and all others. "This man," she is saying, "will always be one of the great theatrical geniuses, a golden boy, the kind you see only once in a great while. Radio was at its zenith. Great shows, imaginative, exciting, an actor's dream. We lived theater. Welles could have had the greatest repertory theater in America. But after 'Kane' they crucified him. All he could do was leave."

Found herself blackballed

She sighs. "I was purely innocent of politics out here when the blackball started. Hedda Hopper told me, 'Isn't it marvelous, Aggie, you're in the middle of a feud?' But it was Hedda who asked in her column, 'Why do you [meaning Hollywood producers] have an ax to grind with this girl? She hasn't done anything.'"

Now she is talking as if there are just two of us in the room. "Today youngsters want their career backwards. It's the jet age and they want it quick! If they happen to be physically right they don't need the background. Think they want to improve themselves? No. Really learn something? No. They just don't love what they're doing any more."

Another side of Agnes Moorehead has just put in an appearance: The Presbyterian Minister's Daughter has joined The Dedicated Creative Actress. Together they make a charming couple. They also constitute the essence of Moorehead. They explain the fire, the flair for living, and the fine old-fashioned theatricality so typical of the woman. They explain the two stormy marriages, the first to an obscure radio actor in New York who simply could not deal with the high voltage Aggie's duality generated; the second to Robert Gist, the actor-turned-TV-director, who was considerably younger than Agnes and whose electrical charge matched hers in every jolting detail.

They explain her discomfort with, if not distaste for, the contemporary playwrights. "Albee isn't my dish of tea. I am not in sympathy—" the Minister's Daughter talking again—"with a play like 'Virginia Woolf.' It doesn't teach anything. It is neurotic, sordid." Of Tennessee Williams she says, "He has great theatrical flair, great poetic feeling—" the Creative Actress talking—"in which a delicate bud grows and grows. He nourishes it, then pours fertilizer over it."

They explain the Dior clothes. (She favors décolletage.) They explain the attachments—to Rosalind Russell, with whom she began her career at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York in 1928; to the late Phil Baker, the radio comedian of the Thirties, with whom Agnes learned how to play the comedy foil; to Debbie Reynolds, who "adores" her, loans her her \$40,000 dressing room with the carriage lamps and the wired music, and pays her the obeisance due the elder from the younger woman.

Not free with compliments

All her relationships are not so demonstrative. Agnes is not the type to be free with her compliments particularly of younger women. On the way to the stage she is asked how she feels about young Miss Montgomery, the second slickest witch. "She has a quality," Agnes says unemotionally. "Charm, warmth, intelligence. Of course, you know she plays herself. When I was an ingénue, we were always characterizing."

On the set the two women greet each other respectfully. Presently they go into a scene in an antique shop in which inanimate objects and dialog fly about the set with equal abandon. "They just don't make things the way they used to," Endora is complaining airily. "So many happy memories here ... Samantha, you're not *listening* to me. ..."

As they come out of the take, Asher says, "When Aggie takes stage, she takes stage—voom! You just don't look at anything else." Liz retires to her dressing room. To the specialeffects man who engineered the flying crockery, Agnes opines, "We're both magie, y'know."

'What's wrong with Agnes?'

Yes, always magic:

• When Agnes was a child in St. Louis her mother customarily greeted her with a "Well, Agnes, who are you today?"

"Today, Mother, I'm Katherine. I like to make an effect. People call it acting."

• At other times, people would say "But Mrs. Moorehead, what is wrong with Agnes?"

"Nothing is wrong. Today she just happens to be in a world where everyone hates her. Agnes loves to cry."

• When Agnes joined the St. Louis opera, her aunt told her father, "You're not going to let her go down into that den of iniquity, are you? First thing you know, John, she'll get her name in the papers."

• When Agnes was a young actress in New York, she was taken up by and appeared frequently in radio with Helen Hayes. One day Miss Hayes decided Agnes should be in pictures and therefore arranged an appointment with a certain East Coast talent man.

Agnes arrived trembling. The man looked her over coldly like a prize hog, eyes finally coming to rest on the striking but somewhat angular features. "Broken nose, huh?" he said at length. "Afraid you're not the type." "I told myself, 'Don't cry, Agnes, don't cry, Agnes!' But I did just the same. For three days. Years later I met him again at "The King and I.' I said, 'Have you ever had your nose broken?' He looked at me blankly. He didn't know what I was talking about."

• "The Magnificent Ambersons," as originally shot, had a complicated scene in which Fanny Minaver is told that she has lost everything—house, lover, sanity. The scene ran a full eight minutes without a cut, covered four rooms of the Amberson mansion, and took a full day to shoot. For an actress it was enormously taxing.

"Orson would say during rehearsal, 'Agnes, why don't you play it as if you were drunk?' I'd play it that way. 'Okay,' he'd say, 'now as if you were numb.' Then like a little girl . . . a meticulous old maid . . . I didn't know what he was doing. Hours later he said, 'Now, Agnes, go play it in one take!' I didn't realize until then that what he really wanted was a little bit of all four.

"When it was over someone said, 'Agnes, you must be worn out.' Worn out, ha! I was so excited I couldn't sleep for a week."

No time to relax

But those scented chapters are from a book of magic long closed. The new book is plastic-covered and it has to do with residuals and lead-ins and time slots and Nielsen races and advertiser appeal. "This is not," said the slickest witch, "an era of convictions. What it is is TV. It isn't like a feature. No time to relax. Every second counts. A person simply has to refuel. . . ."

Her voice trails off. The assistant director is calling. They are ready to shoot. The call sheet has been bollixed, they are still short a makeup man, and the next setup is a mankiller. Most sinister of all, it is past 6 o'clock....

In tweed suit, with mink stole thrown back (it is a chilly day for Southern California), the girl who very possibly is America's most popular new singer waits in a back booth at the Beverly Hills Brown Derby. Nancy Wilson has more class than anyone in the crowded room. Sitting there unobtrusively, speaking oh so quietly, yet distinctly, her beauty lights up the place.

A bus boy, who is accustomed to seeing celebrities every day, asks for her autograph, saying, "You're the first person I've ever asked." She smiles and thanks him in the soft voice that has been heard on this year's Oscar Awards show, on *The Hollywood Palace*, in *Burke's Law*, on the programs of Bob Hope (Hope— "She has broken more records than Jack Nicklaus, but I like the way she swings better"), Jack Paar and Danny Kaye, in a succession of hit records and in the Nation's top night clubs. Then she tells about herself:

"I was born in Chillicothe, Ohio, Feb. 20, 1937. I didn't stay there long —we moved to Columbus, and I grew up there. But my grandmother's place outside of Chillicothe is still the greatest place in the world to wake up.

"My parents were divorced when I was 5. My father remarried and raised me. I was the oldest of six kids. There was a piano in the house, and we all sang. I never wanted to be a nurse or anything like that—only a singer.

"When I was 15, I had a program on TV in Columbus twice a week. I sang requests and wished people a happy birthday. The night of the Oscars this year I ran into the guy who directed it, and I couldn't think of his name —the only name I could come up with that night was Rex Harrison, the Oscar winner.

"I went to college for a year, to Central State in Wilberforce, Ohio, but I left to tour with Rusty Bryant's band. I went to New York in 1959. I got a job as secretary at the New York Institute of Technology and sang weekends at clubs around town.

"My husband, Kenny Dennis, is a musician—a drummer—but now he spends most of his time running our music - publishing company and our talent - management company. I met Kenny 8 years ago when he came through Columbus with a jazz combo. In 1960 he asked me to marry him, just before I went to Australia on tour. I knew I loved him, but I didn't give him an answer. After 10 weeks in Australia, I got so homesick I started crying two hours out of Honolulu. My mother and Kenny were waiting to meet me at the Los Angeles Airport. He and I were married five days later.

"We have a little boy, Kenny Jr. He's 2. When he watches me on TV, he hums along with me, and when I go off the screen, he says, 'Mommy, come back.' I've been taking him on the road with me since he was six months old.

"Of course, we didn't take him along when we went to Montgomery. I had never been in the South before, but when I heard about Montgomery, I knew I just had to go—not to sing but to march. We didn't sleep for two days —flying down there, spending the whole day there and then flying back. It was a wonderful experience. I remember that a policeman smiled at me—a nice friendly smile—as I marched down the street.

"I'm not a professional Negro. I'm a human being first—an American second—and a Negro third, and I'm not the least bit unhappy about it."

Young Mr. Jennings, who is ABC's answer to Walter Cronkite and Huntley and Brinkley, has a pleasant, even delivery-even if he sometimes gets into the Brinkley rhythm and occasionally into Brinkley's much-toomuch-imitated trademark of biting off the ends of his jokes. When he first emerged on the scene, it looked as if the network had gone out of its way to go after the young audience and particularly the young girls (so many of the things the networks do these days seem to be based on the assumption that there are now 190,000,000 teen-agers in the country, out of a total population of 193,000,000). In any case, to counteract the "pretty boy" image, the network also went out of its way to point out that Peter's father was formerly a well-respected Canadian newsman and that Peter himself had started with his own weekly radio show at the age of 9.

All in all, if they didn't quite succeed in making Ol' Pete the Grand Old Man of TV, it didn't matter. Because Mr. Jennings soon served notice that he could succeed very nicely. thank you, without any build-up on anybody else's part. He is, first and foremost, technically competent. He varies his Teleprompter with notes which, we note gladly, when he does look at them, he looks at them firmly and bravely and not surreptitiously. Also, he fluffs amazingly rarely-even in the uncomfortable newsman's position of wearing an earplug and having to hear what's coming in and yet keep talking about something else. Finally, he has fine change of pace. He can give you real churchlike low tones-as he did on one recent broadcast when he intoned, "One of the most controversial issues throughout Roman Catholic history has been birth control"-and yet he has a very different way of giving you a different story in the same field. On the story of the Indians of Bombay giving Pope Paul two lion cubs, for example, he said, "It was, as one pundit put it"and we liked him for not taking the credit-"at least one case of Hindus throwing the lions to a Christian."

Above all, he is one anchor man who doesn't like to stay anchored. We recall in particular his broadcast during the recent floods—when he spoke from a rowboat taking a woman to her home. Also, before taking on the job at all, he spent three months in the South familiarizing himself with the integration crisis.

Finally, he is also no mean hand at, in a sense, biting the hands that were meant to feed him—as witness his recent report: "The Beatles, believe it or not, are being given a royal honor. Today they joined the somewhat astonished other members of the Order of the British Empire." That was all save Peter's close. "God save," he said quietly, "the Queen"
