Trials of O'Brien

If you think that Peter Falk is an overrated young man who looks like the late John Garfield and acts like a road-company James Cagney—and that, furthermore, he is inclined to make a federal case out of saying "hello" and yet plays a big scene as if it should have been handled in small-claims court—then you are not going to like this show. If, on the other hand, you think he is the coolest, hippest, In-est actor to come along since "The Birth of a Nation," then you are going to love it. For, make no mistake about it, this is Falk's show.

The man who was nominated for two movie Oscars ("Murder Inc." and "Pocketful of Miracles") and won a TV Emmy for "The Price of Tomatoes" is on the screen percent of the time, and even with a regular cast which includes Elaine Stritch and Ilka Chase and guest stars like Herschel Bernardi, Robert Blake, Buddy Hackett and Cloris Leachman, the show is still all Falk. He can tough-guy it and hard-heart it with anybody but the Supreme Court.

The question is, can he convincingly heart-of-gold it? Certainly not to the satisfaction of members of the American Bar Association, who protested the habits, manners and dress of O'Brien and also the fact that he (1) plays the horses, (2) parks his car in a no-parking zone, (3) throws his brief case, crammed with important papers, into the back of his open convertible and (4) is divorced and, apparently worst of all, is behind on his alimony payments.

Frankly, if we were CBS, we would be inclined to throw the American Bar Association out of court. All right, make O'Brien pay his parking finesbut don't, please, make him pay up that back alimony. Indeed, to us, the chief charm of this show is his exwife Katie (Joanna Barnes). There's something about the way she looks at him that makes you know that even if the writers make her act mean, she doesn't really mean to be mean-she's not all on the side of the Bar Association. And, for our TV girl-watching, she's the brightest new spot of the new season.

Finally, this show has another strong point going for it-that man McGonigle (David Burns), O'Brien's partner in prime crime time. A man who believes that, as he puts it, "behind every lock there is a human story," he is a superb character. And our favorite scene of this show so far was in the second episode, called "Bargain Day on the Street of Regret" —no kidding, that was the title—when McGonigle is going through the check lockers in the station, practicing opening them. The first two yield only two suitcases, then in the third he finds a bacon-and-tomato sandwich. "Now why," he said, "would anyone want to check a bacon-and-tomato sandwich? Ah, the incredible human comedy." It was bargain day all right -and no regrets either.

■ The silly season—in the United States, at any rate—usually reaches a peak in the spring. We're referring to that time of year when our young men and women erupt from college dormitories to ascertain how many can fit into a phone booth, or how many times they can flop around in a clothes dryer. Once, it was how many goldfish they could swallow.

It's all a bunch of nonsense and the results are meaningless statistics which we don't take seriously.

■ We do, however, think there is room for complaint when the silly season is extended to the fall by the networks, which work themselves into a frenzy, citing statistics to prove each is merely the greatest, the champion of the new season.

For example, hardly had the frantic first week of the new shows come to an end when ABC, CBS and NBC rushed into print with claims of clearcut, overwhelming rating victories.

■ Naturally they all cited imposing statistics to prove their contentions.

Statistics like these: CBS claimed victory in the week's over-all ratings, citing the National Arbitron figures, which read: CBS, 17.1; NBC, 16.5; ABC, 15.0. ABC, on the other hand, was partial to Trendex's 26-city totals for the same period, which showed it in first place with 16.5, opposite NBC's 16.0 and CBS's 15.5. Where does that leave NBC? Celebrating its triumph, that's where. Using Arbitron's numbers, NBC emphasized that it "won" the ratings battle on more nights of the week (3½, including one tie) than CBS (3) or ABC (½).

■ Confusing? You bet! Confusing and essentially meaningless since viewers had, at that point, no opportunity to shop around and see what was *really* on the air. The whole spectacle would be merely funny if it didn't also give rise to an uneasy feeling that the men at the networks are more concerned about statistical quantities than about program quality.

NET is putting together a six-part half-hour series to be shot in Spain. It will study that country, using the words of WASHINGTON IRVING, ERNEST HEMINGWAY, WILLIAM FAULKNER and other writers.

DAVID DORTORT, producer of Bonanza, has signed actor MICHAEL WITNEY for his proposed 30-minute color Western series to be called The Seekers. He's seeking two other lead actors . . . ROBERT YOUNG gets to play the title role in "The Admiral," upcoming on Bob Hope Theater. The show was filmed during a seven-day cruise aboard the carrier USS Kearsarge . . . FRANK SINATRA will have two orchestras on his Nov. 24 NBC special: NELSON RIDDLE's and GORDON JENKINS' . . MICHAEL DUNN, the dwarf actor, will soon make his second guest appearance on CBS's The Wild, Wild West in the role of Dr. Loveless, an evil genius.

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



How did THAT show ever get a sponsor?



"How did that show ever get a sponsor?"

"I could have picked a better program blindfolded!"

Do you think nasty thoughts like these as you dial across the the crazy quilt of new programs blanketing television at this time of year?

Maybe you'd like to know how programs are picked for sponsors. And by whom. I'll be glad to let you in on the ritual. For 10 years it was my job as Vice President in Charge of Television at one of Madison Avenue's biggest ad agencies. The sponsors I sold shows to are the blue bloods of American business and the new programs I latched on to were legion. ("Legion! Not a bad gimmick for a series, eh. Sam? We'll make it about this kid from Battle Creek, and we'll shoot it on the back lot where they got that desert left over from that Foreign Legion thriller and we'll give our kid a horse and a collie dog and a side-kick named Pierre who speaks with a French accent. You like it, baby? I'll guarantee it's dynamite!")

The television chieftain of the advertising agency, backed (from a safe distance) by other agency bigwigs, entices the advertiser to gamble on a new show. The price tag is anywhere from two to six million dollars. And there are four things to look for when you're evaluating that new property.

(1) "Likewise, I'm Sure." This is the safest kind of programming because it carbon-copies some other wellrated program as closely as the laws of infringement permit. As these laws are quite vague, you needn't worry about purchasing a show starring an outspoken housemaid. Of course it shouldn't be called Hazel. You might call yours Ethel, and of course you can't use Shirley Booth. But she isn't available anyway. Aside from these details, look for similarities of plot, sets and subordinate cast. "Likewise, I'm Sure" programming is a perfect reply to a sponsor who says, "Why don't you ever offer me anything like Bonanza? Now there's a wing ding of a show!" You might come right back at him with a drama called Briganza that takes place on a big Oregon ranch called The Sequoia, which is owned by Bill Wheelwright who has four sons. ("A real switcheroo, eh, Harry?")

(2) Credit Rating. Here's a surefire sponsor-pleaser. This kind of programming relies on the "track record" of the people who developed the show. The producing company (tell your prospective advertiser) is the exciting new Hollywood outfit, Gee-Whizz Films. The principals of Gee-Whizz are Marty McFlaberhoff, who used to be Mr. Big at the old How Come Studios. Marty's the money man; he gives the outfit stability; and for artistic depth he's got Ernie Levenberry, who wrote short subjects for Acme and that famous educationaltelevision documentary series called Whither Timber, which dealt with our dwindling woodland resources. Who's going to direct the series? A good question! He's none other than Al Flog, well-known to TV fans for his work in World-Wide Circus Time which was No. 37 in the Nielsen ratings several seasons back. So on down the line, through scriptwriters, film editor and wardrobe mistress. ("Believe me, Louie, the rating services will Top-10 this baby! It's got everything going for it!")

While you're weighing in the whodunit of a new show, don't forget the cast credits. Usually you're stuck with a star of the luster of say, Maximilian Kolodney, who was last seen opposite Helen Twelvetrees, or maybe Beverly Phlank, who played Tinker Bell in an off-Broadway "Peter Pan" (quite a ways off—at Skowhegan, Maine). This may discourage you and cause you to insist on some "offbeat names" who can be warped into "a fresh format." I mean something like combining Willie Mays and Chet continued

Huntley in a psychological Western, or Lawrence Spivak playing the role of a kindly football coach. ("Sounds top-drawer, doesn't it, Herm?")

(3) Integrated Programming. Now here's an approach to the medium that sponsors really go ape about because their commercials are integrated! This means that commercials flow smoothly out of the story—rather than coming as interruptions to it. ("This kind of epic, baby, will cause the directors to put a half tone of you in the annual report! Cross my heart!")

The men of the D.S.C.

Want an example of integrated programming? The sponsor is in the detergent field and the show is called D.S.C. Note how it fits right in with knights or doves and tornadoes because it features the men of the Department of Street Cleaning! ("Good skull work, eh, Larry, what with the police department and the FBI and the hospitals done to death?") If D.S.C. has too much of a military ring to it, we could call our series Men in Off-White; exciting episode after episode takes us into the everyday lives of the men who preserve our sanitation; their hopes and fears, their home life; the things they have inside their homes that they've collected in line of duty. ("Whatta backdrop for detergents, eh, Mr. Bushwick?")

(4) Distressed Merchandise. Just between us, baby, this is the safest kind of programming to recommend. Doesn't aim very high, so it can't fall very far. You can buy it late in September just before its first telecast. Or better yet, after a few weeks have gone past without a sponsor. The network is desperate. The packager is frantic. The price is slashed! And the concessions you get! Quick-escape clauses! Extra commercial positions!

Why hasn't this show sold before?

Maybe it's a real stinker. Maybe everyone who saw the pilot threw up. Don't be discouraged; it still could be a good show but offbeat. No one dared to take a chance. Maybe it was put together by the news department in order to win points from the Federal Communications Commission, and they made it good by mistake. It's got some other handicaps too. like being spotted right opposite the No. 1 rated program in all television. and as its feed-in-the show immediately before it-it has the lowest rated show in all prime time. ("The show may be lousy, but it's gonna come in with real efficiency and that's what the game's all about, eh, Dannv?")

Well, that's how to pick television shows. There's only one other thing you should know. How to play the numbers racket. This, pal, is basic. Businessmen insist on this when slumming over in show biz.

It could be your neck

You've got to come up with a rating prediction and express it in the most sacred of TV numbers-CPM-cost per thousand homes per minute of commercial. How do you come by this figure? You take the weekly averageaudience ratings of the time slot during last season's peak-viewing months (October through April). Then you add 25 percent to prove you have confidence in the new vehicle you picked. Then you divide this number into the sponsor's cost per episode of the show (time as well as talent) and you divide once again by the number of commercial minutes the sponsor gets per episode. That's the magic formula, kids!

A friendly tip, however! Don't dare put the CPM in writing. Because when your television turkey is staggering around next spring just asking to be slaughtered, the CPM can get your neck too.

So you told your kids you're not getting color to until somebody makes a portable?



This spring, the busiest actor in Hollywood was a man who had just celebrated his 79th birthday.


A typical day began at 6 A.M., when Edward Everett Horton reported to Warner Brothers Studio for the elaborate makeup he wears as the Indian medicine man, Roaring Chicken, in the new comedy series F Troop.

A typical five-day work week included one day of rehearsal, three days of shooting and one day off—with a typical day off including lunch with Laura La Plante and other old-time friends; a magazine interview; and dinner in the evening with Dorothy Stone, daughter of the late Fred Stone, and her husband.

And all the time, work on *F Troop* was being speeded up so that Horton would be free to play "Springtime for Henry" for two weeks in the summer theater at Canal Fulton, Ohio; and a six-week revival of "Carousel" in New York with John Raitt—or, as Horton calls him, *Mr*. John Raitt.

The "Mr." is an example of the unfailing and almost Old-World courtesy which is as characteristic of Edward Everett Horton as his habitual—actually compulsive—busyness. He has been constantly on stage or screen for 55 years now, and that's the way he wants to keep it. "The hardest work I do is when I'm not working," he says. "I didn't want to do a serial thing, a one-a-week program, but this sounded like fun."

Although Horton has a reputation as a hard man with a dollar, fun seems to be the keynote of his long career. When a man in his 70's travels 23,000 miles by bus doing one-night stands, as Horton did with Imogene Coca playing "Once Upon a Mattress" a few seasons back, he has to enjoy what he is doing. He certainly wasn't doing it for money. He has plenty of that, although just how much he does not know—or want to know. A few years ago the State of California bought most of his San Fernando

Roaring

Valley estate for a freeway, which now passes within a few feet of his home—and which, incidentally, swept away the guest house where F. Scott Fitzgerald spent a year shortly before his death. Horton's niece, who is an attorney, handled the negotiations for the property, which has become immensely valuable since the actor bought it in 1924. But, he says, "I told her I didn't want to know what they gave me for it. I want to feel that I have to go on working."

This great need to work—plus the reported Horton thrift—may possibly be both an inheritance from his Scottish mother, who died in 1961 on the eve of her 102nd birthday, and a desire to justify his career to her—

and to himself. His mother never approved of his acting. "To go to college and then be an actor!" he says in what must have been her shocked accents. But it was at Columbia that he did his first acting (he was born in Brooklyn on March 18, 1886), and it was soon after leaving school, in 1910, that he made his first professional appearance in a traveling company of "The Mikado." After acting in various stock companies throughout the East and Midwest, he went to Los Angeles to join a stock company there in 1919. He made his first movie in the early Twenties; and hit his peak in the early Thirties, after the arrival of sound, when he made a picture a month. But he never deserted the stage.

Despite the fact that he has appeared in movies which have become classics—"Lost Horizon," "Here Comes Mr. Jordan," a number of Fred Astaire-Ginger Rogers pictures and half a dozen directed by the noted Ernst Lubitsch—he never goes to see

sarcastic when he says that Otto Kruger starred in the 1934 movie of "Springtime for Henry" because "I wasn't the type." Horton has performed "Springtime" more than 2700 times since 1933.

Between plays, pictures and television, Horton lives in what he again self-deprecatingly—but with some accuracy—describes as "baronial" style on what is left of his 22-acre estate in Encino. A brother lives next door to him on the estate; a widowed sister lives in the big house with Horton; and her son and his wife live in a smaller house near-by. A flagpole stands above the freeway, and the flag flies day and night, a spotlight on it after dark. "If people don't see the flag, I get letters," says Horton.

In a town and an industry and an occupation where neurosis and frustration are the norm, Horton is a happy man. His pride in his home is evident, but even here he cannot be entirely serious. After telling the

his films, nor does he intend to watch F Troop. "It's so discouraging," he says. "On stage, we live by what our friends tell us. After a performance they say, 'Ed, you were wonderful,' and that's all we need to know. But in a movie you see yourself and say, 'Oh, no!"

He refuses to take himself too seriously and tends to deprecate his own talent. "I have only three expressions," he has always said. But there is sadness in his voice when he discusses the film of Chekhov's "Summer Storm," made in 1944, which he thought might "open up a whole new career—no more double-takems, but a serious actor with comic overtones." It did nothing of the kind.

And he becomes uncharacteristically

history of a pair of columns on the lawn which came from an old San Francisco theater that was torn down, he adds, "I think they give the place a Forest Lawn touch." He tells how he wanted to build a 60-foot-high octagonal tower, topped by an observation porch, the better to view the freeway, which he says "sounds like the ocean." But his brother said, "You're on borrowed time now—you wouldn't be able to climb to the top."

As for his role in F Troop, he says, once more self-deprecatingly, "I don't think I'm adding too much to the hilarity of the program, but Roaring Chicken is an interesting old character."

So is Edward Everett Horton.

Papal Visit: As a chapter of history and as a news story, the visit of Pope Paul VI to New York City was an event of major significance, making unprecedented demands on the resources of the television networks and their news departments. The networks rose magnificently to the occasion. They devoted virtually the entire day, Oct. 4, to coverage of the Pope. Through a massive pool arrangement (some 90 cameras spotted all over the city) and knowledgeable commentary by television's own news hands plus churchmen enlisted for the occasion, all of the sights-and many insights-were brought home to the Nation's viewers. Projections of pollsters' estimates indicate that, at one time or another during the 14-hour coverage, some 140,000,000 Americans tuned in to get a glimpse of Pope Paul on television; at its peak, the TV audience reached approximately 70,000,000. By dispensing with commercials during their comprehensive coverage, the networks lost a reported \$10,000,000 in revenues. But they gained something which may prove much more valuable in the long run-the esteem and gratitude of millions of viewers.

Peyton Replacement: Dorothy Malone will have a pinch hitter for several weeks while she recuperates from the surgery which saved her life. Along with last week's good news that the patient was out of danger and on

the way to recovery came word that Lola Albright had been chosen to replace Miss Malone in Peyton Place until she is ready to return to the three-a-week grind. Miss Albright, the blonde alumna of Peter Gunn, will turn up as Constance MacKenzie Carson in the Peyton episode scheduled for Dec. 10, and will carry on for perhaps five or six weeks while Dorothy, when she's ready, films new episodes to be telecast later.

First Casualty: The dubious honor of being the first casualty of the season has been bestowed upon Slattery's People, CBS's much-praised but low-rated political-drama series. Reprieved briefly after one announced cancellation, Slattery this time seems to be washed up for good. The show's star, Richard Crenna, commented: "I've always thought the ratings system was a stinking way to program. The [cancellation] comes prematurely, proving that they never intended to give the show a chance." Slattery will be replaced, as of Dec. 3, by a new, chromier model of The Talent Scouts Show Art Linkletter did this summer. Slattery is the first show to bite the dust this season, but it won't be the last. CBS is halting production on Rawhide and, come January, it will be replaced by a new series based on the movie "Clarence, the Cross-Eyed Lion." Meanwhile, rumors abound that NBC is worried about low Friday-night ratings and ready to torpedo Convoy and, possibly, Camp Runamuck. And ABC reportedly does not dig Shindig's early-season ratings and may cancel both segments of the twice-weekly series. -Henry Harding

TV DRAMA

With regard to the article in the Sept. 25 issue of TV GUIDE entitled "Can TV Drama Survive?" we would like to point out that the TV Code is not designed to stifle creativity in writers, nor does it do so in actual practice. The TV Code, section 1, paragraph 7, states in part: "It is in the interest of television as a vital medium to encourage and promote the broadcast of programs presenting genuine artistic or literary material, valid moral and social issues, significant, controversial and challenging adult themes." Television actually has made great strides in dealing with some of these issues. It is not that the Code has been responsible for these dramatic offerings, but it certainly has not served as a deterrent to drama of this type. If there has been a decline in the kind of drama which some writers would like to see more of, there are undoubtedly reasons for it. But from the Code authority point of view, the excuse of censorship through the TV Code is misleading.

Today's News and Tomorrow's

A hard look at what TV reporting is and isn't-and what it may become

Television news has won a good deal more time for itself than it used to have on the home screen. A full half hour for network national and world news, plus a full hour for local newscasts seems to be the new early-evening format. A number of stations have reached it, others are nearing it. How much news does the viewer get during these periods? Does he get enough to keep him well-informed? Is the news product that is fired off the screen at him improving?

The best answer today seems to be that the viewer gets a lot and misses a lot. The world is combed to bring him items; six or seven hours of filmed scenes pile up each day in every network news room. But-"A television news show is a front page," says Reuven Frank, producer of news specials at NBC. "It is not a full news service, like a complete newspaper." A simple calculation shows how right he is: The average television news story runs about a minute to a minute and a half, about 150 to 200 words, while a column of newspaper type may have a count of 1000 words. Mostly, television news gives the viewer the equivalent of the snippets of type on the front page under the headlines-not the "jumps" on the inside pages, where news stories are often carried over, in length and detail. Obviously, many facts about what is going on in the world do not reach the home viewer.

That is perhaps why CBS's Walter Cronkite said on a recent forum on New York's educational station. WNDT: "I do not think we cover the news." Cronkite, a thorough professional, whom many newspapermen admire as much as they do any news figure in television, was setting a very high standard at the moment; he certainly did not mean that important stories fail to turn up on his show. No big story is omitted entirely on television. If a House committee votes a subsidy for umbrella continued

makers because the severe drought has hurt their business, the television viewer will know about it. What he may not learn is how an anti-umbrella representative from a dry state was persuaded to change his vote during a long walk in the rain on which he was thoughtfully taken by three proumbrella congressmen. A small story. perhaps, but stories such as these make up the texture of our understanding. not to mention our enjoyment of the human comedy. They also help us to predict events, because by studying how men behave we become better at guessing how they will behave. But in Washington they say that while newspapermen will sit at committee meetings, week after week, following maneuvers and sizing up pressures, the television reporter will come in on the last day, when the vote is taken. which he will then report with great excitement to his office.

"They touch the surface," says Clark R. Mollenhoff, Pulitzer Prize-winning Washington correspondent for the Des Moines Register and Tribune and Minneapolis Star and Tribune. "They should be able to inform, to do it objectively and to do it on keybut that takes depth knowledge of a subject, which they don't have, or don't have time to acquire." A newspaper reporter, also, works through contacts he develops over the years. with many people, great and small, as he wanders through the world of affairs. The television reporter comes through like a parade, with his truck and his cameras. "A large part of

reporting is knowing people," says syndicated columnist Doris Fleeson. "But the TV people just meet the people at the top."

One reason television cuts out a lot of news detail is that it knows its "readers" can't skip anything. Television is terribly afraid it will bore them. Therefore every item has to be boiled down to a small enough compass so that the viewer can take all of it. News items are held down to about the length of commercials, a measure of time in which the industry knows the viewer can stand anything.

For similar reasons, network news shows detour around areas which might be expected to attract less than the total audience. They do almost nothing about news of music, of the theater, paintings and new books. Reuven Frank states the principle: "There's no subject that can't be covered on television. And if the audience is interested in a layman's way. we should cover it. But not if it is interested only in a specialist's way." If an outstanding theater star dies. that goes on network news, as of general interest; but if he gives a great performance, that is a national secret so far as network news is concerned, because it is, presumably, of special interest.

Strangely, this problem does not affect local news broadcasters nearly so much. Every freshman journalism student knows that local news is always of interest to local inhabitants: The opening of a new play is local news, and of importance to residents of the city in which it is being performed. One result is that local play



reviewers are becoming more prominent on television. The New York Times television critic, Jack Gould, recently reported that one play producer believed that reviews on the CBS-owned television station in New York had become the second most important influence in selling tickets (the first, of course, being reviews in The New York Times itself). In the age of the culture explosion, the networks thus find themselves turning large new areas of interest over to local stations.

Editorial opinion

One might perhaps expect the networks to fight for viewer attention by offering strong editorial opinions. But nothing of the kind is happening, in any organized way. "There are no editorials on NBC," is the word from that network. The nets even turn away from the word "commentator." "We have no commentators at CBS," says Fred W. Friendly, president of CBS News. "We believe in personal reporting with a sense of news analysis." Friendly outlines what he considers the three possible approaches to news broadcasting as follows: A straight reporter might say, he suggests, that the President walked in the rain and caught cold; an analyst, going into background, might recall that this had happened to the President once before, and had kept him from attending an important meeting; an editorialist would demand that the President stay indoors when the pitter-patter begins. "The editorialist exhorts the viewer to take a position, and this we don't do," says Friendly. "We illuminate, so that the viewer can make up his own mind, but we draw the line at making up his mind for him."

Here the networks turn another large area over to local broadcasters, who today are emitting editorials all over the country. Oddly, when the star reporters of television do network radio stints, they seem far more ready to express opinions that when laboring on the visual medium. Cronkite, Huntley and Brinkley, each of whom has a five-minute daily radio spot, all make remarks that have a certain bite. On radio, Cronkite has attacked our support of too-repressive governments in South Vietnam. Recently Brinkley referred, on radio, to Sen. Everett Dirksen as about the only member of the upper house with color-"He rumbles and roars and steams and bubbles like Old Faithful, sending up clouds of warm air," until, says this reporter. or analyst. everything around him becomes "a little soggy." Huntley bawled out France on radio not long ago; he said its war record was "less than exalted" and that a case could be made out that the continued "French summons to

greatness is a fantasy." On television, all these men seem to grow more reserved.

Chet Huntley agrees that perhaps there is "more room" on radio. "It's not because of any ground rules," he says, "or management rules. We're still feeling our way on television.

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We'd feel naked on TV doing a oneand-a-half-minute think piece. It's not because our bosses have said don't do it. Sometimes I speak up, and management says, gee, great. But all of us feel we have to be responsible. We're still feeling out the form."

One reason why network news program officials feel they can't offer editorials is that they serve stations with so many differing viewpoints. This approach tends, of course, to put the big network news programs into something like the positions of the newspaper wire services, as purveyors of facts, not opinions, to their users. Important segments of colorful and useful communications activity are thus entirely left to local stations. The network news show becomes only a part, sometimes almost a lesser part. of the total news-and-opinion diet served up by affiliate stations, just as the wire services' contribution tends to fade into the mixture that makes up a newspaper.

But network news programs certainly did not start out in life with the intention of being anything like newspaper wire services. They go on the local screen intact, unedited; their anchor men and reporters are the big stars of electronic journalism. How are they to keep their places in this fast-moving, changing field? What will happen as the years move on?

Since the networks want to keep stories short and avoid opinion, about the only route left, it would seem, is to do brilliant reporting. But there is a tendency, says Raymond P. Brandt, contributing editor for the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, for top-flight television newscasters to refrain from bearing down on newsmakers. It's not that electronic newsmen are afraid to be abrasive-Brandt thinks the reason is that they are concerned with their own "images," and feel it wouldn't be dignified really to bear down. This analysis may not be the final word on the subject, but there is a feeling, even among telecasters themselves, that perhaps network news has been too dignified. "I hope to see a somewhat less respectful attitude on the part of TV news," NBC's Edwin Newman has said, "I hope we will somehow manage to be a bit more jaundiced."

To a degree, what Newman hopes for has been happening, and this is perhaps the greatest area of encouragement for the news viewer. Television reporting from the Dominican Republic early this summer exploded the theory that our Government was being neutral in the rebellion, and may even have helped bring something like neutrality about. That television defied Government attitudes and told its story, suddenly made it a newly exciting medium, with potentialities going far beyond the Dominican story itself.

Irreverent reporting next?

Irreverent reporting, then, with the electronic shirt unstuffed, may be the next great development. "We want yeast," says Fred Friendly. "We want savvy. We want what comes out of a reporter's deep experience. There is no barrier to irreverence. Our reporters are going to dig, not just read." At ABC, news chief Elmer W. Lower promises that "the degree of editorial freedom that ABC News now enjoys on the television and radio networks can only increase in the future." Stories will remain short: the nets will rely on documentaries to give the backgrounds they can't crowd into brief daily reports. But, with the new freedom that seems indicated, perhaps television news will be able to evolve its own kind of excellence, within its own self-set limitations. That is the promise to the viewer who sits before his set, watching the results of annual network expenditures of well above \$100,000,000 for newsall his for the turn of a dial.

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
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


An artist's impressions—in picture and words

Red Skelton's dressing room sits like a small Noah's ark in a Sargasso Sea of props and spots behind a stage at the CBS studio where the weekly Skelton show is bruised and battered into being.


Before I could tap on the door, it opened and a very small Japanese gentleman emerged, wearing a beret and bearing two abstract paintings. I made my obeisance. But I had evidently been mesmerized by Skelton's powers of transformation. It was a Japanese gentleman and above him towered an unmistakable, unoriental and undisguised Red Skelton.

However, within two minutes of my entry into his dressing room, he had populated it with a crowd of fantastics, his imagination ejecting a stream of characters and his memory a flow of patter—a mixture of gems and purest corn that would have caused the original ark to founder.

Skelton's air of simple innocence and incompetence allows him to emerge unscathed from material that would normally sink without a trace under a more sophisticated delivery. Whether he has a one-man sounding board or a full studio audience, Skelton has a compulsion to entertain. Patter pours from him like the chatter of a ticker tape. He is a one-man humor computer, sensitive to any reaction, however uncritical, ready to dive into a morass of gags in the search for one which will disarm and break up his victim.

Skelton has the permanent air of the newsboy who made it and is forever wagging his tail. This effectively conceals his vast ability and the impressive technique which enable him to cope with his weekly exposure on television without shriveling his stature.

It is impossible to assess Skelton, of all people, during one brief meeting over a sketchbook. It suffices to say that he is a charmer by any standards. Corn merchant, master of the cliché, pratfaller, grotesque, whatever charges might be leveled at him—and he is magnificently culpable—it is enough that he is a great mime who gives pleasure to millions and one of the great clowns of our time. I, for one, am in his debt.











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

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
