

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

## as we see it

• Knocking television shows—especially early in a new season—is not only easy, it's fun. And it gives one status.

In all too many circles the general attitude toward nighttime television is one of scorn. Conversationally, that is, and the more bitter the wisecrack, the bigger the laugh. Everyone watches, of course, but it's considered bad form to admit it. Many say, "We just watch the news and sports. There's nothing else worth-while."

■ If all the people who say they watch only news and sports did watch only news and sports, Walt Cronkite would have more viewers than Peyton Place, and Huntley-Brinkley would outrate Bonanza.

They do watch other things-obviously. They watch the comedies and the Westerns and the adventure shows. And the serials. And the movies. But millions of others are watching those programs too, and to be in these days, one can't admit doing what millions of others do. One has to be different. Next time a statusseeker says that there's nothing on the air worth his time, show him the musical programs and dramas and lectures and discussions your local educational channel carried last week and ask how many he watched. Then ask how many network specials or documentaries he watched. Odds are he spent his time looking at the very frivolous network shows he complains and wisecracks about.

■ Maybe some day it will be *in* to tell the truth; for everyone, or nearly everyone, to admit that he not only watches several hours of entertainment shows a week but that, even though there's plenty of room for improvement, he actually *enjoys* watching them. It may even be *in* for those who complain that there's nothing enlightening on the air to watch some of the enlightening programs that *are* on the air.

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# THE DAY THE MOVIES RUN OUT

It's not too far away—and TV officials are already biting their nails

It's a truism of American life that most people love old movies on television. I mean how many times have you seen "Casablanca" late at night? Who cares, right? It's a great flick, and you'll keep watching it as long as they keep playing it.

And this season, for the first time, you're getting no fewer than eight full hours of feature movies spang in the middle of prime time: four on NBC (Tuesdays and Saturdays), and two each on CBS (Thursdays) and ABC (Sundays). That's a lot of expensive time being handed over to old—and not so old—celluloid from the Hollywood movie mill.

This reliance on feature films is all the more remarkable since the day is not long past when network bosses considered the showing of movies in prime time to be simple bad form-an abdication of programming responsibility. Then, on Sept. 23, 1961, NBC broke the ice with Saturday Night at the Movies. ABC followed suit on April 8, 1962 with its Sunday Night Movie. The last holdout, CBS, has fallen into line this year, and that makes it unanimous: Movies are big biz on TV and a staple of the prime-time week. The threenetwork tab for feature films this year will run to \$35,000,000.

But there's one big horsefly doing the backstroke in this otherwise placid and soothing ointment: While the demand for movies on TV is *up*, the supply is *down*. Way down. In fact, a clever math student with pad and pencil could compute the day and hour when the bottom of the barrel will be reached. Egad! What a vertiginous thought: The Day the Movies Run Out.

Some network heads scoff at any suggestion that the bottom *ever* will be reached. They point out that the downward curve of motion-picture production appears to be reversing: Paramount is nine pictures ahead of where it was last year at this time; United Artists, 4; Warner Brothers, 6; and the independents, 19. Both MGM and Disney also are up.

But the question is a many-sided one. In the summer of 1961, the backlog of features unreleased to TV stood at 2200; two years later, that figure had dwindled to 1500. This summer (1965) the total was around 875, but some of those are not suitable—for a variety of reasons—for TV presentation, and others will be withheld by the movie-makers for re-release in theaters.

"Broadcasting," a weekly trade magazine, made a survey last June and came up with this tally of first-run features still available from the major American companies: Seven Arts, 300; MGM, 200; Paramount, 175; United Artists, 50; Universal, 50; Warner Brothers, 50; and Columbia, 50. And . . . that's all!

Each prime-time movie series requires a package of 30 films per year. Twenty of these are shown twice during the year (adding up to 50 weeks), leaving two weeks for pre-emptions. NBC therefore needs 60 new films per year for its two series, and CBS and ABC need 60 between them, for a total of 120.

As it happens, the major film studios have been turning out features lately at the rate of 130 to 150 a year (versus 200 to 300, 10 years ago). But only a fraction of those-as well as of that backlog of 875 unreleased films-are top-grade fodder for network TV. Some are far longer than the optimum 95-100-minute running time, necessitating heavy editing and consequent injury to the story line; some are too sexy or too violent for television; many are in black-andwhite and are therefore dead weight in TV's new rush to full color; many simply were box-office bombs and aren't going to draw any better on TV than they did in theaters.

Thus, when the backlog is expended, the major studios' continued

annual production, at the current rate, won't be enough to keep TV supplied with desirable, first-rate feature films. The scramble already is on. ABC recently paid \$8.4 million to MGM for 15 pictures, plus six twohour features made especially for TV: CBS, which already had 90 films in its vaults-enough for three years -bought 20 more in August from Columbia Pictures for \$8 million. giving rise to rumors that the network would launch a second prime-time movie series this winter. NBC has enough film for two years of Tuesday-and-Saturday-night movies, plus another 30-film package which would fill half their needs for a third year; and they're shopping for more.

#### Prices are up

And prices are going up. Until recently, a single first-run film cost the network around \$300,000; a year's supply for one prime-time series thus set them back \$9,000,000. Deals made in the last few months, however, have shown an impressive boost in that scale: The price now is closer to \$400,000 per picture. But even at that price, the networks consider these pictures a good buy.

The problem is a little different for local stations—which show flicks at odd hours during the day and late at night—than it is for the networks. They can run films of low quality, films in black-and-white, ancient Charlie Chan epics, antique Laurel and Hardy comedies, and even—in the small hours—the gamier kiss-andclutch potboilers which would be unsuitable while the kids are still at large in their Doctor Dentons.

As a result, the local stations—except in big cities having four or more channels, of which there are about 20 in the U.S.—are in better shape than the networks and won't feel the pinch quite so soon. (In those 20 cities, however, the competition for titles is already severe and their predicament approximates that of the networks.)

One of the oddball things about this whole subject is that hardly anybody wants to give you the straight story. MGM, for example, refused flatly to discuss it with TV GUDE. Network programmers are eager to convince you that things are rosier than they seem, an attitude they hope will lend luster to their own crop of films. Some film studios bewail the shortage so as to drive the price of their inventory up.

One executive who did chat with us was E. Hal Hough, vice president of program services for the CBSowned Television Stations Division. "An irony of all this," said Hough, "is that the growth of television caused a downturn in movie production, beginning in the middle 1950's, and now television itself is the victim of that decline. Between 1930 and 1964, Hollywood produced 15,800 talking pictures, and all but about 800 of those have been released to TV."

He said the CBS-owned stations (of which there are five) have enough films to last at least until 1970, and after that a limited number of foreign films ("sword-and-sandal epics," he called them) will come into use, as well as replays of some of the more highly rated features.

#### 'Networks are searching desperately'

Donald Klauber, executive vice president and general sales manager of Seven Arts, told us: "There certainly won't be a supply of films commensurate with that of two to five years ago. The networks are searching desperately for pictures. They're going to have to be less arbitrary in the future about their standards."

Allen Cooper, director of corporate planning at NBC, claims that "there are never 'enough top quality films" to go around; that it's more difficult now than ever before to get a good prime-time package since the competition is up and the supply is down. He feels that the demands of TV, and the importance of TV money to a film's ultimate financial success, will be a force in the future in changing film-makers' thinking: fewer movies like "What's New Pussycat?" and "The Sandpiper," which are inherently unsuitable for prime-time TV.

But what's the real solution to the Great Movie Drought? There's no single answer. The most commonly mentioned measure is an expensive, industry-wide program of two-hour feature films made specifically for television—films which would be released, after their TV run, to movie houses abroad.

Mike Dann, CBS's programming boss, estimated recently that the motion-picture industry, in concert with the networks, will one day be turning out scores of such tailor-made features every year. Thomas W. Moore, president of ABC-TV, says that they may be "the way drama and anthology will come back to TV."

NBC, with Universal TV, actually has made three such features already, one of which, "The Killers," was deemed too violent for TV and was released straightway to theaters. The others, "The Hanged Man" and "See How They Run," were something less than successful artistically, took too long to make and came in over the budget. "It's not been a happy experiment so far," said an NBC man, "but we're still at it."

All this bustle of activity underlines the possibility that movies on television—as we know them now are doomed to a lingering death. And TV without movies is so grim a prospect one can scarcely contemplate it.

Probably the longest wedding ceremony in history (it took three days for the bride and bridegroom to utter their final "I do's") will be seen by perhaps 25,000,000 viewers on Nov. 1. That's the night The Farmer's Daughter (Inger Stevens) and Congressman Glen Morley (William Windom) will be wed after a romance that has dragged on since 1963. The ceremony has everything that \$75,000 could provide, including a supporting cast of eight electricians, four costumers, two makeup men, three hairdressers, a drapery man, two scriptwriters, 56 extras, four stand-ins, 15 actors and a flower man (even though the blooms were artificial).



### Honey West

The idea of a Jane Blonde, or perhaps we should say a Woman from A.U.N.T., was obviously bound to occur to one of the great brains of TV sooner or later. Somehow we had always hoped it would be later but now, in the fair form of comely Anne Francis, she is upon us. And if, among the score or more of James Bond type shows, you have so far managed to miss this miss—well, you haven't missed much.

Miss Francis' publicity speaks of "the finely etched performances she gives on stage, in motion pictures and in television." To us, though we'll grant she is fetching, the idea of her etching anything, in *Honey West* at least, is—well, far-fetched. However, if you're in doubt as to whether this show is meant to be taken seriously or is a satire, the very casting—or miscasting—of Miss Francis to begin with should set your mind at ease: Her unsuitability for the role is proof it's a spoof.

As a spoof, it is quite possible to enjoy this show—especially the kind of scene, for example, where Honey and her co-star Sam Bolt (John Ericson) are practicing karate and he says, "I hate to hit a lady," and then, again, "If only you weren't a lady" and she blurts, "Let's leave sex out of this." We liked, too, early in the opening episode, the scene in which she promised a new employer, "We'll do our best. We've already done our worst." Somehow it gave us hope that the spoofing would hold up for future episodes.

Unfortunately, this hope was quickly dashed. Most shows exhibit a certain amount of originality for at least a few weeks, but Honey West reached rock bottom at the very beginning of its very second episode-a museum theft which was a carbon copy, and not a top one at that, of the movie "Topkapi." We liked the third episode ("The Abominable Snowman") better-Honey and her partner uncover a ring of dope thieves operating around snowman paperweights. Here our favorite scene was when Aunt Meg (Irene Hervey) was serving as go-between translator watering down the fireworks in a savage exchange between Honey in a bubble bath and Sam in the living room. Miss Hervey is a fine performer. So, too, is Bruce, Miss West's ocelot. He can etch a performance for us any time.

Honey West isn't quite a honey of a show, nor is it exactly a lemon. There are enough sweet spots to satisfy a not-too-discriminating palate, but for our taste, they're too few and far between.

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

Bill Cosby admits that 'money is of the utmost importance to me'

Bill Cosby is the co-star of *I Spy*, an adventure comedy redolent of heroin, huggermugger, karate, mayhem and understated humor, which appears in color on the NBC network every Wednesday night.

Note must be made that Bill Cosby is a Negro—the first to be starred in a network drama series in the United States.

This comes as no surprise to Bill Cosby, who gained fame as a comedian. He's been a Negro for 28 years.

But the starring of a Negro may say something about the NBC network and the State of the Union, coming as it does 102 years after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation.

Asked why he signed a Negro for the part of a CIA undercover agent, Sheldon Leonard, executive producer of *I Spy*, says:

"There was no motivation. The part was conceived for a white man—but a whole man, a man of humor, physical fitness and competence.

"I had signed Robert Culp and I looked around for his counterpart. Then I saw Cosby on one of the variety shows and a bulb lit up—I was sure he was the man I wanted.

"I make an intensive underground investigation before choosing a person for a long-range project of this sort. From every source I learned Bill Cosby was a tireless worker, a man striving to do his best.

"I called Grant Tinker of NBC and told him I had found a young comedian who had every quality we were looking for. 'In one way he is different,' I said. 'He is colored.'

"'That's just great,' Tinker said. 'I think I speak for everyone at NBC when I say that.'"

Later, Tinker said, "We did not set out to get a Negro to star in a feature. We think it is right and proper, but it was not planned in any sense."

"Cosby comes on as an engaging, warmhearted, intelligent man," Leonard adds. "If anyone takes exception to this man because of his color, it will have to be some nut."

As for Bill Cosby, a former track star with a highly mobile face and a voice with many tricks, the most important thing is the chance to get rich. "Money is of the utmost importance to me," he says.

Cosby has no visions of sugar plums, low-slung, high-powered motorcars, yachts, penthouse apartments or other trappings of the rich. "If this series goes five years, I will be only 33 and rich," Bill says. "Then I can stop and do something I'd enjoy more. I want to be a schoolteacher. That would be a real challenge."

Three years ago, Cosby was tending bar in a cellar saloon to supplement "no income" as a sophomore at Temple University, Philadelphia.

There he probably would have

stayed—except for a fortuitous sense of humor. Bill entertained his customers at the bar with bits of dialog which were so successful that a friend suggested: "Get out from behind that bar and get on a stage."

Bill moved next door as a comedian at \$12.50 a night. Today, three years later, he is one of the fastest-rising comedians in the business. He is a \$15,000-a-week comic at the Nevada resorts and commands smaller, but still not paltry, sums from night clubs and college concerts.

His third record, "Why Is There Air?," was released in August. His first two, "Bill Cosby Is a Very Funny Fellow—Right!" and "I Started Out as a Child," were good sellers and "Child" won a Grammy award. "He's had a remarkable career for a man who doesn't tell jokes," said Norman Cornyn of Warner Bros. Records.

In a sense, Bill is ad-libbing his autobiography on stage, displaying a sharp comic sense as he rambles on. He talks about life in a poor family in Philadelphia, street football and teen-age dating, and takes off on some remarkable flights of fancy: Noah's colloquy with the Lord; a referee setting up conditions for the American Revolution; the plight of a sabertoothed tiger, Ralphie, who lisps because he has only one saber.

Cosby does not banter about racial issues. "I started with some of that stuff, but I wasn't comfortable with it," he says. "The whole question about Negro comics is this: If they colored us white would we still be funny?"

Bill Cosby has a record of being funny which stretches back to the sixth grade. "William would rather be a clown than a student and feels it is his mission to amuse his classmates in and out of school," wrote his teacher. And later, "He is affable with a personality most pleasing and he tries to get by on that...."

"I was a con man," Bill continued

says today. "I found if I got people laughing I could con along on the work."

Bill's teacher, now Mrs. Paul Nagel of Washington, D.C., could not be conned. "I worked Bill to death," she said recently. "And the more I worked him the better he was."

Bill's report card showed the result. When he entered Mrs. Nagle's class, his first report was SIIISSSUSUSS-SSSSUIU—with S meaning "satisfactory," I "improving" and U "unsatisfactory." His last report was SOO-OSSOSOOSOOOOOOOO—with O meaning "outstanding."

#### Failed in 10th grade

Cosby's memories of Mrs. Nagle undoubtedly color his ambition to be a schoolteacher. "She made a big difference to me," he says.

Bill backslid and failed to pass in the 10th grade. Instead of continuing school, he joined the Navy. And saw the error of his ways: He completed high school while in the Navy and won an athletic scholarship at Temple as a trackman.

After his first appearance as a comedian in Philadelphia, Bill moved on to Greenwich Village. "I had to broaden my humor," he says, "and I had to work in places with a little more class."

Bill was playing The Shadows in Washington when he met Camille Hanks, a very beautiful girl and a student at the University of Maryland. "On our first date, I did everything but propose," Bill says.

Camille's mother looked on Bill with distaste. "On that first visit I was making \$450 a week," Bill says, "and when I went back I was making \$750. Her mother was suspicious about that. She didn't see how I could be making so much money. Anyway, she didn't want any entertainer running away with her daughter."

Camille was sent away to relatives in Virginia. "I could understand her mother's feelings," Bill says, "but I had feelings of my own."

But "love is a greater law . . . indestructible . . . like a lovely rose" and Bill and Camille were married in January of 1964. Their first child, a daughter, Erica, was born this April while Bill was in Hong Kong shooting an *I Spy* episode.

In the spy drama, Robert Culp plays Kelly Robinson, a tennis bum who is actually a United States intelligence agent. Cosby, also an agent, plays his trainer, Alexander Scott.

Cosby is most grateful for Culp. "Bob gives me the help I need," he says. "As an insecure entertainer coming in to work as an actor, I need all the acceptance I can get—not just handshaking, but real acceptance. Bobby gives me that."

As for the routine before the cameras, Bill says, "I find it challenging but not hard—as long as I get enough sleep and learn my lines. At first I was wooden. I spoke without expression. I had to learn that the face speaks, the muscles of your neck, your hands, your eyebrows all act. Bobby gives me the help I need."

Robert Culp, who starred in *Trackdown* and has written many TV dramas, wrote four *I Spy* episodes, two of which have been aired already.

#### Take turns up front

"I realized how strong we would be as a team," Culp says, "but at first the other writers couldn't find the relationship. They all tried to put me in the front seat and Cosby in the back seat and that isn't the idea. We are actually almost mirror images of each other. Sometimes I take the back seat and sometimes Bill does."

As to Cosby the actor, Culp says: "He is the fastest natural study I've ever seen. He is cramming 10 years of education into a few months. No novice, no matter how talented, can come up with performances like Bill.

"Of course, he's not a novice. He is involved in his comedy as an actor. But to become another guy and have another guy's emotions with a bit of hero juice thrown in—that is painfully hard to learn."

Sheldon Leonard, the executive producer, says, "I defy anyone to say Bill's not been acting all his life."

As for Bill himself, he is working very hard at his new craft.

"This is a job an actor could have had," he said. "I do feel a bit guilty about that because there are very few —a minute number—of Negro actors working or making money. I want them to say at least, 'He's not an actor but he did try.' I don't want them to say, 'He's not an actor and didn't even try to be.'"

#### A language of their own

Culp and Cosby have a very close off-stage relationship. They have developed a kind of double talk. They talk about "the wonderfulness of your selfulness" and of the "sorrowfulness" of things. "Miles"—stemming from Miles Davis—means "get in there and work for yourself" and they use numbers deriving from karate strokes.

"Our wives are even a little jealous because they can't understand our talk sometimes," Bill says.

So in his first few months before the camera, Bill Cosby seems to have met every test. He likes the work. "It's just like college here," he says. "I know all the people. It's like a family."

And if everything continues well and if several million people like Cosby, Culp & Co.—some lower-class neighborhood school in Philadelphia can expect a new physical education teacher along about 1973.

His name will be Bill Cosby, excomedian, ex-actor.

#### National

Football Fight: Amid much grumbling from rival NBC, ABC last week signed a \$15.6-million contract with the National Collegiate Athletic Association to televise college football games for two years. The Associated Press said it learned the agreement calls for an option for the following two years, 1968 and 1969, for an additional \$17 million, which would increase the price tag to more than \$32 million for the four years.

NBC. currently telecasting the games, complained bitterly about the NCAA's decision not to entertain bids for the package. Said Carl Lindemann Jr., vice president of NBC Sports: "The action is a discredit to amateur athletics and reflects exceedingly poor business judgment." Herbert J. Dorricott, chairman of the College Television Committee, said the NCAA believed ABC would "present college football in the best possible creative manner. The NCAA members remember with great satisfaction ABC's fine presentation of college football in 1960 and 1961."

Industry sources believed the NCAA wanted a network that would devote its facilities exclusively to college football. NBC is now in the midst of a five-year, \$36 million contract with the American Football League; CBS has a two-year, \$28.2 agreement with the National Football League, which expires this season.

The Big 10: The season's first Nielsen ratings are off the presses, and it appears the old stand-bys are still successfully on top. The report, for the two weeks ending Sept. 26, included the week of the premieres and the week after. Four of the new shows made the Top 10, with Bonanza holding on to its familiar spot as No. 1. The line-up, in order of finish: Bonanza (NBC), Bewitched (ABC), Gomer Pyle (CBS), Dick Van Dyke (CBS), Hogan's Heroes (CBS), The Lucy Show (CBS), Andy Griffith (CBS), Green Acres (CBS), A Man Called Shenandoah (ABC), F Troop (ABC).

Farewell: Mister Ed's proprietor, straight man and best pal, Alan Young, has disclosed plans to leave his long-time partner. "I don't want to be a daytime entertainer, and the show is now on at 5 P.M. [Sunday]," Young said. "People suddenly say, 'What ever became of Alan Young?' I would ride along with Ed for years and years if he could get into prime time."

Friends say Young might change his mind if *Mister Ed's* producers make him the right kind of offer. Young is working on a new comedy series, *Mr. Phipps Goes West.*

Astronauts Walter Schirra and Thomas Stafford

**SPECIAL** COLOR The Gemini VI space flight, America's first rendezvous-docking mission, is scheduled to be launched from Cape Kennedy at 8 A.M.

The Mission. Astronauts Walter M. Schirra and Thomas P. Stafford are to meet and join their craft to an Agena capsule under day and night conditions. Maneuvers are to begin in their fourth orbit, and plans call for docking to occur over the Pacific. Recovery is scheduled for 8:25 A.M. Wednesday, in the Atlantic.

The Lift-offs. Gemini VI requires rigidly precise timing. After the Agena launching (8 A.M.), any delay in Gemini's 9:41 P.M. lift-off will affect the flight. Brief delays may postpone the rendezvous. A 25-minute hold would require a second attempt at 11:21 A.M. A 25minute hold at that time would force a one-day postponement.

After the lift-offs, network coverage will originate from NASA's Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston, the White House and other sites. If the flight is postponed, the networks will resume regular programming, returning to Cape Kennedy on the rescheduled flight date. (Live)



### NUTS TO EVERYTHING BUT GOLF

Chuck Connors doesn't extend this philosophy to his wife, but it goes double for Noel Coward

Golf is a pastime holding in its clutches some 7,000,000 innocent Americans. It is a compelling game, pretty much embracing the pretzeleating principle, which is to say that those who once indulge can't stop.

By his own admission, Kevin Joseph Aloysius (Chuck) Connors is hooked on golf. Unable (as a professional baseball player) to hit a moving ball, he is fascinated by the ease with which he can belt one that doesn't curve, sink or even float. Thus, on some days he plays as many as 54 holes of golf and makes it plain that the game transcends in importance about everything short of life, family and flag.

With a twinge of contempt he has shunned the social exercises of Hollywood. New York intellectuals he will give you for your birthday. The Broadway stage, phooey. He begrudges—in fact, refuses to yield—time to a facet of his trade known as the build-up, which would include publicity tours and premières, and he wouldn't be found deceased at the so-called "right" cocktail parties.

We were seated in the living room of his most costly single possession, a \$100,000 cantilever-design home reposing atop the Hollywood hills. He had just returned from a round of golf in which an 83 had enriched him by \$6, and now the man who has starred in three television series (The Rifleman, Arrest and Trial and Branded) was prepared to discuss the Chuck Connors of today, in contrast to the one of several years ago, and to explain certain actions which had led some in his business to appraise him as less than a princely fellow. continued

Chuck acknowledges criticism directed at him, and, with a thin smile, he offers the significant aphorism, "Knock me, but leave me a future."

A native of Brooklyn, where he was raised in a \$30-a-month flat in which the family got hot water by boiling it. Connors developed as a schoolboy athlete who went on to play pro baseball. With the Dodgers and the Cubs, he had what is known in the game's idiom as a cup of coffee, meaning he never ate too well, and eventually drifted to acting, landing his first part in 1952 in an MGM movie called "Pat and Mike." Chuck played a state trooper entrusted with one line which he was to bark at Spencer Tracy, the leading man. It was, "Never mind! I'll take charge here!"

"I was so scared merely being in the presence of such a star that the words froze in my mouth," recalls Connors. "I needed 15 takes for that single line." Loss of speech is no longer among his failings.

In 1958, Connors got his first major break, the lead role in a shoot-'em-up television series, *The Rifleman*, which lasted five years on ABC and is still one of the top shows in syndication.

Next, he shifted to the part of a suave, swinging lawyer in *Arrest and Trial*. The show didn't last as long as Connors did in the major leagues. It was through after one season.

But it wasn't the end of Chuck. He rebounded powerfully last year as Jason McCord, the hero of *Branded*.

As a person, Connors admits he has changed. Some will testify that it hasn't been for the better, but Chuck is willing to debate this.

"After I got started in *The Rifle*man," he begins, "I got a big head. I felt the world was made for me. I was one of those poor, sick, sorry guys who gained something known as 'stardom,' and I thought I was something special. I didn't realize at the time that I was nothing more than a ball player who got lucky.

"Well, they told me I had to attend this function and that one and stay in the spotlight and build up my image. So I did what they said. Remember, I'm a dumb ball player. They tell me to bunt, I bunt. I was soon attending the right premières, appearing on the right shows, being seen in the right places, eating rich foods and staying up late. And, in return, I was being bored to death and traveling in circles I despised."

"When did you make this discovery?" he was asked.

"I made it at a cocktail party of intellects one night in New York. The place was lousy with important people. Among them was Noel Coward, whom I had never met. I walked over to him, put out my hand and said, 'I'm Chuck Connors.' He answered, 'Of course you are.'

"I spent the rest of the evening thinking about this. To myself, I repeated the lines. 'I'm Chuck Connors,' I said. And he replied, 'Of course you are.' It depleted me and I began to wonder what the hell I was doing with people like that. I belonged with slobs who pumped your mitt and said, 'Glad to know you, Connors.' I was out of my class. I felt it was time I wised up."


"What did you do?"

"One by one, I started eliminating things I didn't like. The first thing that went were those phony cocktail parties. Then I cut down on public appearances. These tub-thumping tours are a lot of bunk . . . 10 Nielsen cities in 12 days, with two days reserved for New York, the first for TV and radio shows and the second to meet the syndicated writers. I resented this time and pined for all those beautiful golf games I was blowing in California. And for what? If your show is in the Top 20, you don't need the tours. And if it isn't in the Top 40, all the tours in the world won't help you."

In speaking of New

York, Connors seemed to be bottling some strong emotions. He was asked what he has against the Big Town.

"My complaint is only against the arty intellectuals there," he replied. "New York is a fertile ground for eggheads. They exchange sophisticated ideas and decide for the whole Nation what's good and what isn't.

"Another thing they do that sours me is make an intellectual appraisal of everything. Some things don't require intellectual appraisals, like, say, fighting with your wife."

"How do you and your wife settle your beefs?"

"We scream at each other until we're tired. Then we quit. But in the egghead belt, man and wife sit there and analyze each other, and I say vou can have it."

"Do you aspire to the New York stage?" he was asked.



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"Ten years ago I did. But now you couldn't give it to me. What do they have there? Dirty dressing rooms, no air conditioning. The hell with it. Give me a horse-and I hope the eggheads feel as sorry for me as they do for John Wayne."

"Has the press treated you fairly?"

"Truthfully, I've had a beautiful press. Maybe better than I deserve. I've caught some knocks, but the only one that ever bugged me was a review of Branded by Cleveland Amory last season in TV GUIDE."

Once known in Hollywood as a gregarious and good-natured sort, Connors, in the eyes of some detractors, has been transformed into an uncompromising know-it-all with no compunctions about dumping old associates. He has, in order, released his agent, lawyer, press agent and Branded producer. Charges of disloyalty anger him, and he counters heatedly that all he is doing today is comporting himself more maturely.

"In the old days," he points out. "I never stood up for my rights. I exerted no muscle and accepted everything that came along. I've learned better today. In this business, you learn the hard way. I released my agent and lawyer for no personal reasons, but only because I didn't feel our relationship was working to my advantage. It was a simple business judgment.

"I wasn't fully responsible for the dismissal of the Branded producer. My partner in the series [Goodson-Todman Productions] and the sponsor had suggested that we change producers, and I merely went along."

Divorced from his first wife, who bore him four children, and now married to Kamala Devi (see photo, page 19), a striking, well-bred actress from Bombay, Connors consorts socially with few people in his trade. "I have only three friends who are actors." he says. "They are Glenn Ford, David Janssen and Bill Bixby. We have a

big thing in common-golf."

Since Connors was once a devout Catholic, he was asked if he suffers religious qualms over his divorce and remarriage. "Not really," he says. "I have no formal religion any more, but I still believe in God. I place a big premium on brotherhood and try my best to treat people decently. Occasionally, I drop into church, but it might be any church, not one in particular. Happily, Kamala's thoughts on religion are similar to mine. Marrying her was the luckiest thing that ever happened to me. It's only since I've been with this girl that I've come to see what is real and what isn't."

Connors has grossed a considerable amount of money in television and motion pictures, but he confides that he is anything but well-heeled. "I'm far from the millionaire class," he says. "To start with, I pay heavy alimony and child support. Then there are others in my family and Kamala's that I help. I am also in the 70-percent tax bracket. Summing up, I am pretty much free of debt, but probably worth no more than a quarter of a million."

Among his more treasured holdings is a modest home he owns along the fifth hole of the Canyon Country Club in Palm Springs. "When I get out on that course," he says, "I get fearless and I give myself a fight talk. 'Acting doesn't own you,' I say. 'You're now 44. You could stay in this business maybe eight more years, maybe less. You used to sell insurance. You could do it again. And you could probably step out tomorrow and make \$50,000 a year as a sportscaster.'

"Mind you," continues Connors, "I'm not going to do anything rash, because I'm getting along well and I've got no kicks. But my business doesn't scare me the way it used to, and it never will again."


Chuck left his visitor with a piece of philosophy that has required a little laundering. In effect, he said: "Nuts to everything except golf."

### Quinn Martin is a hot TV producer, and here's how he works

If there is a New Wave amidst all the calculated blandness of commercial TV, this man is it. Quinn Martin. 43. Solidly built. Bright. Perceptive. Prepossessing. The kind who plays the game without arguing the rules.

He has a wife, three young children, an IQ of 148, wears monogrammed shirts and carries an attaché case initialed "QM" without the periods. He gets to work at 10; sees rushes at 11; customarily lunches at Musso & Frank's, the venerable downtown Hollywood restaurant, about 1; takes his family to the races on Saturday, to the movies on Sunday night.

He takes sitz baths-vou can't read a script in the shower. The son of a pioneer film-cutter who yearned to be a producer, he began his career in the cutting room, hit the big time as producer of the original two-part "Untouchables" in 1959, went on to produce the series, while moving into the good graces of Tom Moore (then program chief, now president of ABC-TV). Later he made The Fugitive (also for Moore), the great success of the 1963-64 season. Today with 12 O'clock High in its new early-evening time slot, and The FBI being brought on with all the urgency Moore himself can muster. OM looks and behaves like a king.

His power is based on his personal reputation as a creator, a cutteroriented sense of the dynamics of filmed action as opposed to spoken dialog ("Movies have to move . . ."), and an unerring instinct when it comes to divining popular tastes.

He appreciates above all that TV is a game . . .

QM THE GAMESMAN: Monday A.M., office. QM, immaculate in a seersucker jacket, laces his fingers and talks.

"There's a game you play. I have a lot of people to please. The network. The sponsor. The studio that puts up the production facilities. Most of all myself. It gets tougher as you get bigger. QM Productions, wholly financed by ABC, employs 400 people. I have duplicate offices at Warners and Fox-Western, where The FBI and 12 O'clock are shot. We shoot more in depth than any other company. I'm putting \$10,000, \$12,000 more up there on the screen per show.

"Some producers deal mainly with script. I control quality from the rushes. I'd rather create an illusion out of hunks of film.

"My producers are really head writers. Their job is to mold a script to our approach. I let my directors direct. They are the ones who have to relate to the actors. I go on the set only when there's big trouble . . . ."

Naomi Bross, QM's secretary, pert, pretty, protective, comes in with a list of phone calls. (QM seldom answers calls—he calls back.) She goes out. The phone rings.

"Oh, hi, Don. . . . Cut stuff looked good but you're going to have to restage the gunfire. Couldn't miss at that range and we don't want our FBI boys to look like idiots." Click.

"I figure I make 10 good Fugitives a year," QM is saying. "Ten that are pretty good, 10 that are shot just because you have to shoot something. I go in for retakes if I can, or, if I can't, try to cure the worst faults in the cutting...."

Phone again. It is the agency man for *The FBI*'s automobile sponsor. The company wants main titles with the "institutional feel." "Don't worry," QM says. "I have a couple of title roughs here now. See them later in the week. . . ." Click.

"What you gotta do," QM is saying, "is call the Beverly Hills Hotel, set up a meeting and *make* 'em feel happy."

He picks up a sheaf of papers from the pile on his desk-casting memos, production reports, location scouting reports, unsigned contracts, scripts, weekly property progress reports from Fugitive producer Alan Armer, 12 O'clock producer Bill Gordon and FBI producer Charles Larson, "The boiler plate of business arrangement," he explains. "Got to keep hammering away at it. The only way to stay alive. You see, I don't romance the president of the network. . . . I don't do any of the things you're supposed to . . ."

QM AND THE NETWORK HEAD: Front booth, Musso & Frank's. QM is recalling how, when *The Untouchables* became a series, Moore said, "I'll take it if Martin produces it." He is trying to recall how audiences failed to respond to his show, *The continued*

New Breed, with Leslie Nielsen. How The Fugitive was the invention of another, Roy Huggins, who also invented Maverick. "Huggins wanted his wrongly-convicted murderer to behave like a jerk, since society was treating him like one anyway. I conceived Kimble as something less bizarre, a put-upon but decent person."

QM MEETS THE FBI: Office. Monday P.M. "Mention the FBI and you get a reaction like the Flag and Mother.



So when Moore asked me to do the show I wasn't too enthusiastic. Then my ego tells me, this guy wants to gamble \$14,000,000 on my ability. When you're riding high you got to handle yourself right . . . .

"So I will convince the FBI they shouldn't look like boy scouts! They're people, aren't they? So humanize 'em.

"None of it's Shakespeare. I can't tell my grandchildren I worked in the greatest art form. Once you've acknowledged that, then you can go."

QM AT THE RUSHES: Tuesday A.M. Room 2. Deep leather chairs, worn. A musty smell. This is the place where Chaplin, Fairbanks and Pickford watched their rushes. Production men, cutters, casting people, the three producers. No directors. They stay on the set. And no writers. Making a late entrance, QM, bonus player in the game of big-time TV.

The Fugitive rushes come first. Right away his brow furrows. The actress in the living room sequence is keying the scene too high. It bugs him. "Where did we get her?" QM wants to know. Calm her down, Alan, Baby. And watch that hip twitch. We'll cure it in the close-up.

Efrem Zimbalist Jr. is a magician. He can make a line like "This is the FBI, Powell!" sound like brand-new stuff. Paul Burke, Robert Lansing's replacement in 12 O'clock, watches his old general (off-scene) go down in flames. The moment is symbolic, its impact not lost on QM. "Paul can do the bravura things," he enthuses. "Things Bob couldn't—or wouldn't. It'll give us a new dimension."

QM AND THE STARS: On Stage 5. Janssen is explaining to actress Joanna Moore that there are a lot of one-armed men in this country. QM is as enrapt as if he had never seen the scene before. "That Janssen! Tremendous," he mutters. Janssen should know by now how good he is. He doesn't. QM tells him. QM is getting him a bonus. Not that David needs the bonus. Only the reassurance.

-

Back in the office Fugitive producer Alan Armer is on the phone. Armer can get Hope Lange or Barbara Rush (Julie Harris can't make it) to play Lieutenant Gerard's wife in an upcoming two-parter. "Rush is hot. Get her," QM says. Click!

Phone. Paul Burke. "The scene with Andy Duggan? Beautiful! . . . Fine, Paul, but I don't want you to get over-trained. You look great the way you are. . . ." Click.

"Paul worries about his looks," QM is explaining, "David about the performance. Zimbalist is just plain great—all the media studies show he was the ideal choice. Leslie Nielsen, I don't know where I went wrong there. His cop was just too muscular to appeal. As for Lansing—too grim, too tied up. I tried to help Bob, but I don't think they liked it in Wichita ....."

Phone again. It is the designer of the handsome, hip but noninstitutional main titles for *The FBI*. "You lost out to class, elegance and the Constitution. Sorry, but that's the name of the game." Click.

QM, MAN WITH A PAST: "I would always fake it and get A's at Fairfax High School. I started out to be an architect but then the Army came along. I became a cutter because I'm a realist, and it was the only job offered. I became a writer to get credits so I could move into production.

"My father, Martin Cohn . . . a great guy. But he wasn't smart about people. And he didn't have the confidence you need, to *know* you have the right answer. He produced a picture or two at MGM. But he ended up where he started—a cutter.

"When I think what he could have had! I'm proud of him—the schnook."

QM AND THE CLINKER: Friday, Room 2. A rough-cut of an earlier Fugitive. It is, as they say in the trade, magnificently mounted. Otherwise it is one of those scripts you shoot "just because you have to shoot something."

QM watches like a man in a trance, automatically praising what there is to praise, his responses perfectly conditioned to the hard-core realities of TV. Never mind if the story stumbles and falls, just go on to the next one. Will audiences believe this outlandish tale? "They'll believe it in the third year," says QM.

THE COCKTAIL PARTY QM: Saturday P.M. It's been an exhilarating week. QM stands amid the welter of famous and quasi-famous at a Beverly Hills cocktail party, shirt newly minted, tie knotted just so.

"I love my business," he is saying. "Some day I want it to run itself. Take the family to Europe, do a movie. But I'll tell you one thing. I'm not the guy who asks himself who am I and what is the meaning of life? After 35, forget all that soul-searching, set yourself a goal and go!"

### THE SAD STORY OF



(It was going great till the President tuned in)

The uproar over the prime-time serialization of *Peyton Place* seems academic for people who, like myself, have had experience in Brazilian television. Two years before Allison asked the question: "Why did you say good morning that way?," another gentle story of murder, adultery, illegitimacy and mild assorted trivialities began a daily run at 7:30 P.M. on a Rio de Janeiro station.

The serial was written by an outspoken Brazilian playwright, Nelson Rodrigues, whose most important message in previous stage plays had been shock, forced realism and a lot of legs. The time slot was the traditional dinner hour when, as in most South American countries, the whole family is present, from the 2-year-old child to the 90-year-old granny. As for the cook and the maid, they peek in at the living-room TV set while serving dinner or cleaning up the kitchen.

The story, Renuncia, meaning "Resignation," was organized in daily 15minute chapters. It was meant to last a maximum of 40 chapters and was geared to the tastes of the hard-working classes, the factory employees, the menial laborers, the cooks, the maids, the gardeners, all of those people whose salaries were low but whose dreams were quite high. It included. of course, a standard rich-but-mean girl, a poor-but-kind young man, an old-but-smart Negro nurse, the evils of money, the beauty of hunger, an aunt-and-nephew relationship, banthe-bomb manifestoes and many other selected problems a viewer might enjoy. And a lot of legs.

Protest was not long in coming: From the "intellectual" quarters came the cry accusing Rodrigues of commercialism, which meant he was making more money than they could ever count; the church mentioned the serial as "dirty and unmentionable"; and critics were appalled by its lack of purpose. They obviously had not been watching the serial's daytime counterparts.

The programs were taped in São Paulo—at a lightening pace—then distributed all around Brazil. Actors with evening plays that same day, and rehearsals for two or three programs for the next afternoon, were handed their scripts and given a couple of morning hours to rehearse "on camera." In the afternoon the tape would be recorded, usually on the very first try, regardless of the quality of the acting. Scenes were seldom repeated or revised before the actual running. Mustaches might fall, doors fail to close, or telephones ring off-cue; mistakes were corrected only for future chapters. One of the heroes almost died of asphyxiation when a prop man used pesticide to simulate fog! There were no retakes. By the time characterizations and other details were finally mastered, the 39th of the 40 chapters had been shot and all the improvement was crammed into the last scenes.

:

At first the series seemed doomed. Then it slowly picked up as more and more people shrugged off the critics and began watching it. Sound familiar? The growing popularity meant many dinners were being served cold because the maid was paying attention to that night's episode. It also meant that entire families, in the less affluent classes, were gathering together in small rooms to watch a neighbor's set.

Now sponsors lined up; the stars of the show became national heroes. In a land where soccer players, rhinoceroses and popular singers run for office it was rather lucky that no elections were in sight. Picture Constance and Elliot in the Senate. Allison as Secretary of Defense and Dr. Rossi presiding over the AMA! The stars were lionized in the streets, constantly interviewed, their every move covered by the news media. Manchete and O Cruzeiro, Brazil's leading magazines, published extensive articles in which it was difficult to distinguish between the actors' lives and those of the people they portrayed.

Three days after the series ended, in the middle of a radiant afternoon, a large movie house called the Astoria, in a fashionable part of Rio de Janeiro (Ipanema, where the girl came from), was rented by the station, converted into a TV auditorium and completely taken over by hundreds of screaming people, while hundreds more were turned back at the doors. The occasion was a repeat, live, of the last episode of the serial, with happy kisses and walk-toward-the-distant-horizon included. After every kiss, the audience gasped, cheered, fainted, shrieked, applauded and asked for more. The performance had to be repeated three times for the crowd that paid its way into a theater to see the last scene of a TV serial.

Nelson Rodrigues went on to his next serial, by now doubling as the announcer for the summary of previous chapters. Critics began to read into it such significantly social messages as the fight between good and evil, and Freudian interpretations abounded in literary magazines. Other stations in Rio started their own series. The soap-opera craze was on, with now-common "last-scene shows."

And contests were held testing the public's knowledge of actors' private lives, with prizes ranging from a free ticket for a taping session to a day spent with the star. The actors toured the country, receiving high honors, keys to cities and lifetime contracts with sponsors and stations.

Then, at the height of their immense success, prime-time TV serials were dealt a hard blow by one of those typical impulsive acts which are so characteristic of Brazil. It is said that then-president João Goulart (whose later ouster had no connection with TV serials, Rodrigues notwithstanding) walked into his living room to find his two very young children watching a particularly lewd chapter of a popular serial. It took him exactly one week to write, publish and make official an executive order forbidding the showing of serials before 10 P.M.

The audience, made up for the most part of people who worked 10 or 12 hours a day, had no stamina for late-night shows, including serials.

So they faded fast. But not for long. When Goulart's government was toppled in 1964, his successor, Humberto Castelo Branco, rescinded the ban. However, the new serials are so bland that even the children are bored.

Vikki was born in El Paso, Texas. Her father sent her mother there from San Gabriel, Cal., just before Vikki was born. That's where he was born so he wanted his child born there, though the other six Cardona children were all born in San Gabriel.

Vikki started singing when she was in high school, but before that the family always gathered around and sang at barbecues—her father and her uncles and the kids. Her father was very strict—he permitted her to go to only four football games all the time she was in high school. Vikki mostly stayed home and helped her mother take care of the other children. "It was an old-fashioned Latin family," she says. But when she started singing, she went all over—Palm Springs, Reno, Las Vegas—with her father's consent. He said, "You've been brought up right, and I trust you."

Vikki will be 25 soon. "When I'm on *Hullabaloo* and those kids look at me, I really feel old," she says.

Vikki doesn't look old—or Latin. She has blonde hair and fair skin. And she cries when she sings. The first time her publicity man saw her cry, he said, "That's a great *shtick* keep it in the act!" It really isn't a *shtick*, but when her father hears her use words like that, he says, "How come you speak Spanish with such a Yiddish accent?"

Of course, Vikki isn't Spanish or Mexican, and neither are her father and mother. But her grandparents are Mexican and Vikki is proud of it. She has Spanish furniture in her new Beverly Hills apartment. And when she was in Japan, she recorded a Spanish song, "Cuando Caliente el Sol," in Japanese.

Ah, so-si, si.




