Having messed up their own blackand-white television, the French are sure they're qualified to tell the rest of the world how color should be handled.

They've come up with a color system which they insist is better than ours and better than the West German system. They want all Europe to adopt it and they're selling hard in South America too. Most European countries seem to prefer the American approach but the French are unimpressed. They're driving full speed ahead.

■ To help convince possible customers, the French government, which owns, operates, supervises and dictates to French television, is planning to spend many millions of dollars for equipment and facilities to get its color system on the air in France by the fall of 1967. Whoopee.

This in a country that once insisted it had the only good black-and-white system—with an expensive 819-line picture—and thereby delayed the growth of television there so that France never has caught up with other Western countries. As for the vaunted 819-line picture, it is being quietly phased out in favor of the general European 625-line system.

■ This in a country that offers viewers eight hours of programs on weekdays on the basic channel and about two hours a day on the new second channel that very few of the country's six million sets can receive because it uses the 625-line system.

This in a country where the top television star is Gardner McKay of Adventures in Paradise and the most exciting show of the new season is The Man with the Rolls, known hereabouts as Amos Burke, before he became a secret agent.

■ Basically, though, there's nothing wrong with French television that a little less help from the French government wouldn't cure.

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Better get a new story.



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

'Face the Nation' counts the Sunday lost when it does not make a Monday headline

Gov. William Scranton of Pennsylvania took his place before the cameras and the three newsmen who would be his inquisitors. He began fidgeting almost immediately. A sheet of white paper lay face down on the desk before him. It would remain so through the program.

The scene was Cleveland, Ohio, June 7, 1964, during the Governors' Conference, a few weeks before the Republican National Convention. The day before, Scranton had met with former President Eisenhower at Gettysburg. The atmosphere had been one which indicated that Eisenhower had given his blessing to Scranton to "go out there and stop Goldwater" from getting the Republican Presidential nomination.

Now Scranton was on nation-wide television, and practically everybody—political leaders, press, the public—expected him to announce he was ready at last to come out fighting and seek the nomination. Instead, Scranton parried every question regarding his intentions, stumbled over his answers, and gave such a picture of indecisiveness that the leaders of both parties were utterly bewildered.

Moments before going on the air—CBS's Face the Nation was the program—Scranton had received a telephone call from Eisenhower telling him he would not be a party to a "Stop Goldwater" movement. The Governor was staggered. Had he misread Eisenhower's meaning at Gettysburg? There was no time to puzzle it out and plan new strategy. He had to go directly before the cameras.

Thus, Scranton sat before a trio of newsmen on network television for a half hour with nothing at all to say. He toyed with the sheet of paper which lay face down before him, but never turned it up; the paper contained his announcement that he would seek the Presidency.

It was the biggest news of the preconvention weeks. Scranton eventually did announce for the candidacy, but many politicians believed that his appearance on Face the Nation had hurt his image with the delegates too severely to be repaired in the short time before the convention.

Making news is indeed the business of Face the Nation—CBS's answer to NBC's Meet the Press, and ABC's Issues and Answers. These Sunday network interview programs count themselves most successful when the news they develop turns up in large headlines on the front pages of Monday morning's newspapers.

That's what happened last July 25 when Governor Rockefeller of New York announced on Face the Nation that he was taking himself out of contention for the 1968 Republican Presidential nomination and would seek a third term in Albany: when Governor Wallace of Alabama, on the Sunday after last year's Republican convention ended, told the Face the Nation audience that he had changed his mind and wouldn't run for President as a maverick nominee in protest to the Administration's civil rights programs; when Secretary of State Dean Rusk announced on a Sunday in March 1964-after receiving the news only minutes earlierthat two American fliers shot down over East Germany would be released by the Russians.

A pair of handsome young people named Ellen Wadley and Prentiss Childs—co-producers of Face the Nation—are responsible for delivering up these newsmakers to a national audience, as well as many heads-of-state whom they've chugged about the world to film for the program: Premier Nguyen Cao Ky of South Vietnam; President Nasser of the United Arab Republic; Prime Minister Shastri of India; Maurice Couve de Murville, foreign minister of France, and President Sukarno of Indonesia, to name a few.

"We spend a great deal of time knocking on wood," Ellen Wadley was saying at the CBS Washington studios recently. "Sometimes these interviews with foreign heads-of-state are filmed on a Friday, then rushed to Washington to be edited and are barely ready by air time on Sunday. If one plane is grounded by weather, we're without a program."

Prentiss Childs says: "It hasn't

happened yet. But we have a film on Portuguese bullfighting all ready to throw into the gap when it does."

In August 1964, Childs-who is the son of Marquis Childs, the syndicated political writer-was in South Vietnam to interview the then President. Nguyen Khanh. He left his room at the Hotel Caravelle in Saigon one afternoon to buy a gift for his wife. While he was away, a Viet Cong bomb exploded in a broom closet across the hall from his room, destroying most of his possessions. Childs remained at the Caravelle the rest of his stay-though the hotel was without water and electricity-on the theory that the Viet Cong wouldn't hit the same place twice.

The interview with Nasser of Egypt was a particularly prickly one to come by. One bright Thursday morning last July, Childs and Wadley received final okay for the interview from Nasser's representatives who said the President would be available Friday morning in Cairo. Miss Wadley and Martin Agronsky, anchor man of Face the Nation, hastened to the Washington airport and flew off to Cairo, arriving Thursday night.

Simultaneously, Winston Burdett and Frank Kearns of CBS's European staff left Paris for Cairo to join Agronsky on the panel. When the four of them were together, Nasser's aides informed them that the interview would not be held in Cairo after all, but in Alexandria, 150 miles north.

Hurriedly they rented two taxis—ancient Detroit-made castoffs—and bounced over bleak desert roads, finally arriving in Alexandria around 2 A.M. on Friday. After only a few hours' sleep, they rose in the morning to learn from UAR officials that the interview was postponed until 7 P.M., a fact which rankled, since every minute was important if the program was to go on the air on Sunday from Washington.

That evening Nasser con

received them, and the program went off without a hitch. Immediately afterward, Miss Wadley and Agronsky hurried back to Cairo by taxi, boarded a plane straightway, and flew with the film to Washington where they arrived Saturday afternoon—barely in time to process and edit the interview for showing on Sunday.

Another time, President Sukarno of Indonesia informed Miss Wadley and Mr. Childs that he'd sit for an interview on a particular afternoon. The deadline left only two hours for Miss Wadley to halt everything and get on a plane to Jakarta: She hurried home, packed three summer dresses, then drove to the Indonesian Embassy for a visa. Realizing there would be no time even to park her car at the airport, she left the keys with an Indonesian diplomat and hurried off by taxi.

On reaching Jakarta, she went straight to the President's palace, where the Face the Nation crew had converged from points in Europe and Asia. Sukarno took the opportunity to blast the Beatles as an example of degenerate Western culture.

Miss Wadley ferried her film back to Washington, having tarried in Jakarta only 24 hours. The interview went on the air the following Sunday, which was last Jan. 31. The lady producer's round trip had taken four days, eight hours and 17 minutes, during which she managed a total of 12 hours sleep.

Face the Nation started out on Nov. 7, 1954; then, early in 1961, CBS dropped it into a nighttime slot, where it was promptly chopped up in the ratings and went off the air until Sept. 15, 1963, when it reappeared with its two handsome co-producers and a new lease on life.

Miss Wadley is a blonde Phi Beta

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Kappa from the University of Arkansas who once wrote and produced radio shows for the Air Force in Germany. After 1948, she had various jobs around Washington, among them assistant to the Director of Special Events at the CBS News Bureau. In 1960, CBS made her a staff producer.

Prentiss Childs is a former actor who, after serving 17 months in the Navy and four years at Yale, was hired as a CBS News program assistant in 1956. He subsequently became producer of the network's religious program, Lamp unto My Feet, before taking over his present job.

On a Sunday morning in Washington not long ago, the Face the Nation. team gathered at CBS's studios on M Street to get ready for an interview with Congressman Gerald Ford of Michigan, the House minority leader. Miss Wadley and Childs sat in the office of the show's director, Robert Vitarelli, along with Martin Agronsky and Paul Niven of CBS and David Broder of the New York Times. who would act as the panel. As a makeup girl tucked tissue paper under the collars of Agronsky, Niven and Broder, Childs said: "This is the only one of the three political interview shows that is conducted in true press-conference fashion. There's no moderator, and the three reporters simply jump in with questions, following the answers wherever they lead. I think we're more news conscious than the others, and we're willing to gamble. Of course gambling is a two-pronged thing: You might have a great show or you might have a dud."

Shortly after Noon, the panelists filed out of the office and took their places before the cameras in the broadcast studio. Congressman Ford entered and sat down opposite them. Face the Nation was down to business: making headlines for Monday morning's newspapers.

Trouble is, the censors think the puppets are people too.



BEATEN AT THE POLLS

Like a real politician,
Dick Crenna needed popular
support but the voters
failed to respond

That was four years ago. This summer Crenna—whose show, Slattery's People, a ratings flop last year, had been the object of a dramatic 11th-hour rescue by the image-conscious overlords of CBS last March—was saying: "I decided to go for the whole ball of wax. I wanted to be the biggest thing that ever happened."

This fall, with the new season just weeks old and *Slattery* scuttled for the second time, Crenna was talking like this: "I still want that whole ball of wax. But in this bloody game, if you don't get a rating you're out of the ball park."

Actually, neither Crenna nor his show was allowed this opportunity. Slattery was canceled after its second episode this fall, on the basis of overnight ratings purporting to prove that not even the "new, improved,

more humanistic" Slattery was able to compete with the popularity of The Man from U.N.C.L.E.—an action strongly suggesting that despite earlier pronouncements, cost-per-thousand still ruled TV's people—even Slattery's.

Thereby hangs a suspense-laden tale, a kind of electronic Liza Crossing the Ice played against a background of snapping nerves, rating wars, network "images" and ambivalence in high places. Its principal player, Crenna, who is now 38, had built an enviable reputation as an actor in comedy from the age of 11 on-first in radio where he specialized in squeaky-voiced adolescents; later in TV as Walter Denton, tangle-footed bane of Eve Arden's existence in Our Miss Brooks; still later as the good-natured rustic, Luke, in The Real McCoys. He was well aware that he could have sat out the rest of his professional career as the "character man" the industry was certain he was.

Then one day in 1962 James Moser, the creator of *Medic* and *Ben Casey*, approached James T. Aubrey Jr., then president of CBS Television, with an idea which was to change everything. Moser had in mind a show about a young, Kennedy-like politician, along the lines of Casey, with the capitol dome substituting for the operating room. It pleased Aubrey that Leonard Goldenson of ABC had turned the idea down on the grounds that political shows were never really successful. Aubrey knew better. He bit—hard. Then he decided to cast Crenna.

As far as Moser and his associates at Bing Crosby Productions were concerned—from Bing's businesslike first lieutenant, Basil Grillo, down the line to producer Matthew Rapf—Aubrey might as well have suggested Jimmy Durante for the part. Crenna had been 26 years a "character man," a kind of grown-up Walter Denton, or at best a polished Luke McCoy. Moser wanted someone with the electrical charge of a Vincent Edwards. Yet . . .

"When the head man wants it that bad—well," says Moser, "you are hardly in a position to argue."

If Moser was surprised at Aubrey's decision, Crenna was even more so. He had come off *The Real McCoys*, a hit show, very much in demand—for comedy. "I was fighting the Walter Denton image," he recalls. "Then *Slattery* was offered. I thought it had a chance to be important, that it had something to say, that it could make its leading actor a star. Me."

Crenna was to discover that things are not always that simple in TV. In January 1964 a pilot was completed. Aubrey began second-guessing himself immediately. The pilot was "great" he told BCP. "But we'll have to get out from under the capitol dome more."

"It was that well-known Aubrey ambivalence," explains someone close to these early negotiations. "He wanted it but he didn't. We didn't know which side of Aubrey we were fighting, the literary Jim Aubrey or the merely commercial one."

Moser is more succinct: "What he was really saying was: Let's make

this into a political adventure show."

Slattery hit the air its first season in a fine state of confusion. The critics praised it lavishly. But "mass" audiences were another matter. Slattery became mired well below the 17 Nielsen mark and never rose to even that marginal level. Its then-competition, Ben Casey, also a Bing Crosby show, slaughtered it in the ratings.

This posed a mighty dilemma for everyone, particularly Aubrey, who already had a couple of clinkers developing that season and, as it turned out, a highly tenuous relationship with his own bosses. Yet he could not see tossing away that lovely bouquet of press notices. It was privately suggested that Crenna was not the strong leading man Vince Edwards was. Crenna says: "Everybody was looking for a whipping boy to salve their injured egos. I was a natural selection. I wasn't ready to buy that."

The 'doctor' prescribes

Meantime, "Doctor" Aubrey prescribed standard therapy. There were changes made in the supporting cast, specially among the women. The time slot was changed from Monday to Friday. Everybody began talking stoically about "riding the narrow line" between the qualities which were supposed to distinguish Slattery in the first place and the concessions to "mass audience appeal" to make it "popular." There was much conversation about "humanizing" Slattery. What was once a hard-hitting story of grass-roots politicking was fast becoming a kind of Terry and the Politicians.

By late January everyone assumed the show would be canceled. This included Crenna, who had already made a movie, a dog called "John Goldfarb, Please Come Home," for 20th Century-Fox, and now had a three-picture contract with MGM dangling before his bedazzled eyes. Sure enough, in February continued

Aubrey canceled Slattery.

A week later Aubrey himself was "canceled." CBS board chairman William Paley, tiring of the network's "fun and games" image under Aubrey, fired him. In his place he installed John Schneider, a handsome ex-station manager who wasn't supposed to know much about programming.

But Michael Dann, long-time CBS-TV vice president in charge of programming, was ready to take care of that. Under Aubrey, Dann had been little more than a figurehead, since it was Aubrey who decided what CBS would telecast. Now Dann saw his big chance. In mid-March Dann arrived in Hollywood, arranged a private luncheon with 25 of the town's top newsmen, and-over filet mignon medium rare-made a ringing pronouncement. "Slattery's People will remain on the air next fall," he said. "Our decision to continue it owes much to the fine reception and consistent support it has received from the critics and the public. Although the series has never been in the Top 10, we believe this hour of meaningful drama has a place on our schedule next fall." Dann seemed to be saving: Cost-per-thousand be hanged!

The announcement served to dramatize that CBS under Schneider was no longer the "fun and games network" and that Michael Dann was calling the shots.

Back at the studio, chaos reigned. Rapf had already committed himself elsewhere for the upcoming season. Moser, weary of the whole brouhaha, was off on a new project.

Still, a new producer, Irving Elman, was able to pull the "new" Slattery together. Crenna was induced to loosen his tie—in spirit as well as fact. The scripts began to incorporate dialog referring to "Jim"—the first time anyone had heard Representative Slattery's first name. A per-

manent "romantic interest" was supplied (Kathie Browne, who played a female newscaster), and a new assistant, Alejandro Rey.

Even the new CBS-TV president came around to visit the set. Jack Schneider extended a hearty hand. "Developing into the whole human being now, Dick?" "Yes," said Crenna happily.

Still, it was not enough. The week following the airing of the second show last September a meeting occurred in New York between Schneider, Dann and Bill Paley. Not long thereafter Dann himself appeared in the Hollywood office of Basil Grillo.

They didn't even sample

"Dann told me that the whole decision [to continue with Slattery] had been based on the premise that the format changes would gradually effect a rating change," Grillo recalls, "but the overnight ratings showed that Slattery was not even getting a sampling and that U.N.C.L.E. was really taking off. If you can't get people to sample a show, you're in serious trouble." A little later it was announced that Trials of O'Brien, another drama which was not doing well, would be moved into the spot in the hope its rating would improve.

So now where were all those fine phrases and dreams of glory? "Well," Dann told TV Gude a few weeks ago, "there are certain minimum requirements. This year Slattery was our lowest-rated drama."

So much for art—if that is the proper word for Slattery. A few weeks ago Crenna himself discussed it. "During the years we were doing The Real McCoys," he said, "we knocked off 19 shows, among them Playhouse 90. I know what the rules are. I don't ask for any miracles. The real shame is that the medium can't make room for a Playhouse 90. Just the same I am going to miss Slattery's People."

Strategic Withdrawal: Two of the Nation's most powerful institutions-the Columbia Broadcasting System and Frank Sinatra-are at war. The cause of it all is a CBS News special about Sinatra, scheduled for this Tuesday, Nov. 16. With Sinatra's blessings, a CBS News team had been preparing the hour-long documentary for several months. Things were going smoothly until Walter Cronkite arrived at Sinatra's Palm Springs pad to film an interview with the star. During the interview Cronkite asked some questions about Sinatra's personal life, which he refused, politely but firmly, to answer. Not long thereafter CBS News received a letter from Sinatra's lawyer which, in effect, announced that Sinatra was withdrawing permission to use film footage in which he appeared. One of the singer's press agents explained: "Consent was originally granted when Sinatra was led to believe that the program would be a commentary on his career as an entertainer in the same manner in which the network did news specials on the careers of Pablo Casals, Isaac Stern and Marian Anderson." But when they started asking personal questions, Sinatra balked. CBS took the position that this was a news program and nobody's permission was required. As the air date approached, the network was moving full speed ahead with its plans to telecast the program as scheduled, without changes. Two of its most attentive viewers will be a thin, angry singer and his lawyer.

'ABC '66': "We hope," said ABC-TV's president, Thomas W. Moore, "that this ABC '66 will be as signifcant as the Studio Ones and Playhouse 90s." Moore's hopes-and millions of viewers', too-are riding on a \$20,000,000 series which ABC intends to telecast next season. Moore unveiled the ambitious ABC '66 project at a news conference last week. The series will encompass drama, variety, comedy, musical-comedy and documentary productions derived from various sources, including some writers and performers who have not contributed to television previously. Moore ticked off a few of the programs already in the works: a play by Murray Schisgal (author of "Luv"), a musical with songs by Richard Adler ("The Pajama Game," "Damn Yankees"), an hour with Anthony Newley, a documentary recalling the wit of President Kennedy, an Easter drama, "The Many Worlds of Mike Nichols" (with Mr. and Mrs. Richard Burton, among others) and "The Ten Most Beautiful Women in the World." There will be 26 shows in all, plus six reruns. Most of them will run an hour, nearly all will be in color, all will be shown in prime time, at a regular weekly hour which has not yet been selected. "We have no illusions that each of these hours will be a total success," said Moore, "We want the right to fail. But we hope that out of this will come three or four sensational shows and maybe half a dozen really good programs." -Henry Harding

"THE SPANISH ARMADA"

ESPECIAL COLOR Emmy-winner George A. Vicas chronicles the 16th-century rivalry between England and Spain. Climaxing in the defeat of the Spanish Armada, the era saw dominance of the Christian world shift from Catholic Spain to Protestant England.

Focusing on the personalities of the opposing monarchs—Philip II of Spain and Elizabeth I of England—Vicas traces the events leading to the battle, and the battle itself is re-created with the aid of a replica of Sir Francis Drake's flagship the Golden Hind.

Philip II was the ruler of the greatest power in Christendom—the Spanish, Dutch and Italian kingdoms of the Hapsburgs, and the vast American colonies of the conquistadores. An absolute monarch "in fact as well as in title," Philip saw himself as the instrument of God's will on earth. In contrast, Elizabeth's



strength rested on her considerable political ability and her popularity with her people. Commerce, the basis of England's future empire, was one of Elizabeth's foremost interests.

HOW DID JACKIE COOPER ESCAPE THE CLASSIC CHILD-STAR FATE?

"Is Jackie Cooper a Midget?" cried Motion Picture Magazine in 1931. "Skeptics Can't Believe the Boy Wonder Is Only Eight Years Old."

The headline appeared after Jackie appeared in "Skippy," a big picture which made him a star and gave him a nickname that still sticks. And he was already a veteran of five years in the rough racket called motion pictures.

"I was 3 years old when I started in this business, and that was much too young," Jackie says today. "I really didn't want to be an actor but now I consider myself a pro—in my deportment, in my work and in my experience."

Jackie Cooper has at last retired from acting. At 43 he is head of Screen Gems' West Coast studio, the television division of Columbia Pictures.

One measure of his success in his first year is a wild flurry of building at Columbia: New sound-continued

stages are going up all over the neighborhood and new office space is being carved out for writers and producers.

Under Jack, Screen Gems produced six series for the 1965-66 season a total of over \$7,500,000 in solid commitments—and he is currently the golden boy in a golden business.

It is a cliché of the motion-picture business, and not necessarily true, that child stars wind up broke and emotionally shaky when the glory fades with the passing years. Jackie successfully avoided the pitfalls.

"I was always interested in a lot of things," Cooper explained. "I learned to play the drums. I raised quarter horses—and broke my own horses—and made enough money to pay for the animals. I got to be a pretty good sailor, good enough to sail some pretty big boats.

"Later I learned to drive racing cars and got to be good enough to drive for a factory in my section of the country.

Learned to fly

"I wanted to learn to fly an airplane and I did that. And I was a good enough skeet shooter to win one gauge division at my club. I've always been able to do things like that and still attend to my business.

"Then, too, I was always working," Jackie says. "I never had less than star billing in my life. That is important. Some of these people faded from the biggest thing in show business to unemployed actor; some of them rose and fell several times. That never happened to me. Things didn't go downhill until after the war."

It was during the war that Jackie made the only unpleasant headlines of his career: He was charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor while at Notre Dame University as a cadet in the Navy's V-12 program. "We were having a party at the LaSalle Hotel," Jackie says, "and several girls and boys crashed the party. One guy and a girl went into the bedroom and stayed all night. The rest of us had to be on the base by midnight and we had all cleared out."

Jackie was acquitted. The judge declared he found no evidence in Cooper's conversation or conduct of an immoral character.

The Notre Dame experience-and



his early days in the Navy—were galling ones for Jack. "I had very little classroom instruction," he says, "and I didn't want to go into the program. My mother was dead and my guardian advised it, so I enrolled. I flunked out after 16 months."

As one of the most famous young men of his time, Jackie was subjected to endless hazing at Notre Dame. While he was awaiting trial, the pressure built and Jackie exploded. He had a short, vicious fight with another cadet, and his opponent wound up badly injured in a hospital.

That fight and the trial may have been the beginning of Jackie's maturity. "I learned to make adjustments in the Navy," he says. "I had been a protected prodigy all my life, and in the Navy I began to understand about different kinds of people."

No job after war

After Notre Dame, Jackie joined the Claude Thornhill entertainment unit as a drummer. He was discharged as a musician second class. Today he is a lieutenant commander in the Naval reserve.

"I couldn't get a job after the war," Jackie says. "The town was full of men with contracts and the 4-F's who had stayed. Everyone told me I was either too young or too old.

"I was out of work, and I didn't want to stay around and let it show on my face. I went to New York to learn my trade."

Cooper did pretty well on Broadway—"I got marvelous reviews"—and toured as Ensign Pulver in "Mr. Roberts."

In a few years his name was at the top in television. He did a three-year stint in *The People's Choice*, and another three-year hitch in *Hennesey*, both top shows.

After Hennesey, Cooper went to work on a pilot called Calhoun. "I never wanted to act in continued



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Calhoun," he says. "I'd done two series and just wanted my own production company, but United Artists offered me so much money I just couldn't turn it down."

Calhoun never got past the pilot stage. "After that I really took a look at myself," Jack says. "What do I do now?' I asked. 'The best I can look forward to is to be a 50-year-old character actor and then a 60-year-old character actor.' I decided that if I couldn't go uphill as an actor, I'd change my business.

"I decided to concentrate on production, and no sooner had I said that to myself than Jerry Hyams, president of Screen Gems, offered me this job."

Cooper the executive looks exactly as he did as a child star. He has the same petulant lower lip, the slow smile and the aggressiveness which marked his youth.

A great weeper

Some of Jackie's most notable movie scenes showed him in tears and he remains a great weeper today. "I am the world's easiest audience," he says. Tony Bennett singing "Lost in the Stars" invariably makes Cooper cry.

He is a very precise person, and everything on his desk is arranged just so. If something does get out of line, Jackie quickly restores symmetry.

At 43 Cooper is a compact 5 feet, 10 inches and weighs 175. His handshake is very hard. He is a very male man, perhaps a bit overtailored (his shirts have two buttons on the cuffs and his loafers have little tassels).

On his left wrist he wears a gold ID bracelet with his name, blood type and telephone number. He also wears a black sapphire ring, a gift from Don McGuire, with whom he created Hennesey.

Most people like Cooper-and did

even before he became an executive. Not Don McGuire. "I have nothing but the worst to say of Cooper," he said recently, "and I am not going to talk about him."

Cooper is puzzled by this. "I can't understand his seeming dislike for me," Jackie says. "When we were together, he made nothing but money and we never had an argument. He is a very talented, very strange man."

Cooper has been married three times, to June Horne, Hildy Parks and now to Barbara Kraus Cooper. "When we were first married, Jack kept saying, 'No babies. No babies,' " says Mrs. Cooper. "Soon, he began saying, 'Let's have babies,' and we've been having them ever since." Cooper has a son, John, 19, born of his first marriage; and three children: Russell, 9, Julie, 7, and Christina, 6, born of his present wife.

"Jackie loves the thought of life and the women who produce it," says Jimmie Komack, a TV producer and former comic. "When we had our baby, he was at the hospital before the birth—rubbing my wife's feet."

Jackie is asleep at 9:30 almost every night and frequently has dinner in bed. "He even goes to sleep in restaurants," Mrs. Cooper says.

The Coopers spend their weekends at Palm Springs, flaked out, surrounded by hi-fi music. They get there by airplane, which Jack flies. He is a cautious man: "I never fly in a single-engine plane," he says, "and I want a co-pilot with at least 7000 hours."

Cooper has been called a driving, ambitious man. He denies it. "The worst thing that could happen to me would be to lose my life," he said recently. "I just want to work enough to keep up my insurance. I don't care what it is—second assistant director—maybe just play the drums."

It is quite possible that Jackie Cooper believes that. All of us are entitled to our private whimsies.





She is the archetypal "pop culture" chickie, and that's all there is to it: lithe, white-blonde, kinetic, shapely and young-permanently young. A middle-aged Joev Heatherton beggars the imagination. If there's a rhythm and flavor to these particular years in the United States, she's in touch with it.

At 21, the girl born Davenie Johanna Heatherton has frugged her way into the public imagination on Hullabaloo, the Dean Martin and Steve Lawrence shows, and Tonight, among others. Or wait, maybe that was the Watusi, the Jerk, the Chicken, the Pony, the Boston, the Monkey or the Philadelphia. Who knows? It's all part of the "new music" and the "new dance" which have the Nation enthralled.

It's what's happening, swinger will tell you, and Joey Heatherton is riding that musical surfboard of frenzy and release straight to a pot of gold. Oh sure, she's acted on Mr. Novak, The Virginian, The Nurses, Breaking Point. ("I always played the rebel.") But there are plenty of blonde actresses around, each indistinguishable from the rest.

Joey Heatherton, however, dances with the most boneless fervor, with the purest and most mindless lack of inhibition ever seen on television screens. It sets her apart.

If you suggest to her that fame has come suddenly, she studies you, a little disbelieving, and says: "Well, it's about time, Charley." She's been fighting the show-biz wars from the age of 14, when Richard Rodgers put her in his Broadway musical "The Sound of Music."

Her face is soft, round, and white, bereft of makeup except for a darkening about the eyes. ("It's too much trouble to put makeup on; anyway I don't think I need it.") Her lips are full, pale and frequently parted. The blonde hair is hacked short, except for a long forelock which falls over her left eye; when she dances, the hair flails and flops, as her head snaps to the music's beat.

Last summer she accompanied Bob Hope to the Dominican Republic to entertain American troops there. "I just walked out on the stage and they went ape," she recalls. "I wore, you know, a leotard and boots. They were all so googly-eyed. I sang the lines, 'I'm just a little girl who's looking for a little boy,' and some of them started running up on the stage. The MP's had to head them off."

In December she goes with Hope to Vietnam, which is a long trek for a girl who still lives at home with her parents (her father, Ray Heatherton, once conducted the "Luncheon at Sardi's" radio show) in suburban Rockville Centre, N.Y. She was graduated from St. Agnes Cathedral High School there, and also studied ballet for four years under George Balanchine.

These days she says things like: "I like pop art. I think it's groovy; the soup cans, and all that. It's very 'in,' kind of chic at the 'moment." About the sort of men she likes: "They have to have a great personality, be terribly charming and flexible. Flexible? That means to give in to the things I like, and not to expect me to give in to their preferences."

What about the new "pop rock" dances? "It's an outlet. We're working out our problems. You get a bad mark in school, you come home, turn on the radio, and let it out." In explanation, she crosses her forearms ahead of her, and does a modified "Jerk."

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

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Steve Lawrence

This show entered the lists this fall when Mr. Lawrence and his opening night guest star Lucille Ball rode through Shubert Alley on an elephant. At one point in the proceedings the elephant decided to lie downwhich, the way so many shows have been going this year, seemed like a wise move. In any case, in so doing she unceremoniously unloaded her distinguished passengers into the arms of fortunately alert fans along the way. All of this surely was caught by the cameras; but when we saw the show, of course, nothing. Everything smooth as silk about the ride-which illustrates not only how little imagination producers of a taped show have when, once in a blue moon, something happens which actually would be interesting, but also how you are being shortchanged by the "miracle" of tape.

Actually the very words "variety show" seem to mean nowadays anything but. Mr. Lawrence, for example, took off with the inevitable take-off of take-offs. Starting with "My own show . . . boy I feel good" and even the inevitable telegrams, "And here's another, 'You sang better than I ever did' and it's signed 'Dean . . . and Mrs. Rusk.'" Then, with Miss Ball came the inevitable take-off of the grand entrance. And finally the inevitable joking that Miss Ball was annoyed that he had referred to her

as "the first lady of TV." "I'm not. The first lady of television was Milton Berle."

By this time we couldn't tell a take-off from a take, and if you gave up the show right there we wouldn't have blamed you. But actually you would have made a mistake, for this is by no means all a bad show. To begin with Mr. Lawrence himself has some strong pluses, not only as a singer but also a host. He doesn't, like so many other hosts, come on as if he thought he was the greatest man since Adam and he doesn't try to hit you over the head with (a) his charm (b) his wit or (c) his voice. However, in reference to his voice. when he quietly sings a song like "You'll Never Know" he can be extraordinarily ingratiating.

On a later show he was particularly so, quietly singing "I Really Don't Want to Know." This show, incidentally, was a country-music salute to Nashville, and it was excellent. On the other hand a week previously we had made the mistake of watching Mr. Lawrence when he had as his guests Mr. Bobby Darin and Mr. Soupy Sales. Again we were subjected to endless take-offs of introductions. and a song sung by Mr. Lawrence with Mr. Darin and Mr. Sales still stands out in our mind as the worst we have heard this year, but we may be doing an injustice to Mr. Darin's rendition of "Get Me to the Church on Time." This, we promise you, he sang as if he had just misplaced the tune and lost the address of the lyricist. As for Soupy Sales, we can only say there is no accounting for tasteparticularly, unfortunately, his. Suffice it to mention that when he was working with the Dick Williams' kids he asked one of them how old he was "Five or six," said the boy. Our theory is the kid was Soupy's grandfather.



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
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
