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### as we see it

■ There were some stirring words from the eminent producer-director, George Stevens, when he filed suit against Paramount Pictures and NBC to prevent them from editing and inserting commercials in his movie "A Place in the Sun."

"A fine motion picture," he said in a statement, "is a thing of value to both its creator and audience. . . . Using a film [to lull] an audience into a receptive mood for a quick cut to the loud blast and hard sell of commercials is a destruction of that value and a mutilation of the film.

"Imagine a play or a motion picture in any theater anywhere being interrupted innumerable times for the presentation of multiple commercial messages. No audience would stand for it. Yet, the American public is subjected to that endless process every day and night of the year on television. A motion picture should be respected as being more than a tool for selling soap, tooth paste, deodorant, used cars, beer and the whole gamut of products advertised on television. The audience too should be respected by being presented with a film as they remember it, and for those who have not seen it, as it was intended to be seen. Anything less is a degradation of the film and its audience," he said.

Few of us would disagree with Mr. Stevens' belief that movies on television would be more pleasant without editing and without frequent commercials. Indeed, this magazine has urged that there be fewer interruptions of all programs for commercials. ■ But without commercials to pay the way on television, tens of millions of viewers would never have the pleasure of seeing some George Stevens movies at all—even in slightly and hardly continuous form. And some Stevens-to our mind -is better than no Stevens at all.

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
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
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In an industry where shows come and go with the speed of a starlet changing boy friends, the durability of the latemovie is oddly reassuring.

Seldom, for instance, do you hear a television star plugging his competitive neighbors across the knob. A couple of years ago, however, NBC magpie Johnny Carson threw competition to the wind and saluted his toughest—and in some places only—nocturnal rival: the late movies.

"CBS's Late Show is having its 12th anniversary tonight," Carson cheered. "And to celebrate they're showing a new movie. Well, it's not new for them—but it's a talkie!"

Carson was, of course, only kidding about the "talkie" business. But there was no kidding about the popularity of movies on TV. Call the shows what you will, and they're called just about everything (i.e., Movietime, Million Dollar Movie, Movie Greats), the idea is the same. From before midnight right up until reveille, it is possible to lose oneself in a celluloid classic, goof off with a clinker, or merely sit back and enjoy what Hollywood did better than anyone else in the world—make movies.

And the late movie programs must be doing something right, because television has never come up with a more popular or profitable commodity.

Midnight movies on television go back 15 years or so. The first major network-owned station to try a regularly scheduled, night-after-night, late show was New York's WCBS-TV. That was in 1951. Before this the station had decided to throw in some "soundies" (shorts originally made to be shown in dime slot machines)

against NBC's then mighty Broadway Open House, a Tonight forerunner starring a wild comic named Jerry Lester and an Amazonian blonde called Dagmar. Richard K. Doan, the New York Herald Tribune's television editor who was then head of WCBS's programming department, recently recalled the effect of the "soundies" on Jer and Dag: "We were as much bother as a housefly is to an elephant," he wrote.

Doan eventually chucked the "soundies" and scheduled some features instead. Within a month, Broadway Open House had all but closed down and The Late Show was on its way to becoming part of the American language. Wrote Doan: "It was just one of those flukes that paid off."

"Paid off" is right. The present-day mathematics of midnight movieland are, in fact, staggering. The programs reel off in the neighborhood of a billion feet of film a year, the bulk of what Hollywood turned out between 1928 and 1960. And every inch of the crinkly celluloid is needed to keep the country's teleprojectors from spinning off emptily in the middle of the night.

Naturally, someone out there is watching. Who are the late-movie devotees? Just about anyone old enough to be up past midnight, it seems. "But the majority of a Late Show's audience," according to WCBS-TV film-department manager Bill Lacey, "are housewives. And housewives are still watching when the Late, Late, Late Show starts at 4 A.M. Goodness knows what they're doing up at that hour."

But whoever's watching, they're picky about their pictures. And the preferences appear to be surprisingly similar all over the country. "The highest ratings," says Lacey, "come from the kind of pictures Hollywood used to make-good old-fashioned Cagney and Bogart cops and robbers; romantic dramas such as 'Mildred Pierce': and Errol Flynn swashbucklers." Chuck Glance, director of public affairs and special events at KPHO-TV in Phoenix, Ariz., agrees. He explains, "People want the kind of pictures they grew up with: heroand-heroine romances and gangster movies and Westerns. Especially Westerns. Around here, Gina Lollobrigida doesn't stand a chance against Gabby Haves."

But if Gabby Hayes is keeping a lot of Americans up nights, non-romantic drama seems to be sending them under the covers in droves. "When we ran 'The Lost Weekend,' it bombed terribly," says WCBS's Lacey. "But then," adds Lacey wryly, "in New York, a lot of people watch the show in bars."

A late movie is a local station's most lucrative product. "If a picture costs us \$20,000 to lease," says Lacey,

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"we have that made up in two showings. A film carries 12 commercial spots, each costing about \$1000. A movie's lease can run up to seven years, so just figure out the profit." The profit, to be sure, isn't bad. "The networks," says one station owner, "found out just how popular and profitable movies are in 1961. That's what started the big push to get movies on in prime time."

### Novak vs. Garbo

Maybe so. But to countless cinema buffs, Kim Novak at a respectable prime-time hour can't compare with a Garbo goody at 4 A.M. The buffs are, of course, the late movie's hard-core audience, and, according to Lacey, "consider anything made after 1935 a first run." They complain some, too. "Mostly about our putting a Fields or Harlow movie on at dawn instead of 11 at night," says Lacey. (The reason, by the way, is simple. Fields, Garbo, Harlow, et al., have pretty much been played out on TV.) But a buff isn't easily put off. Says Lacey: "One man offered to pay us if we'd call and wake him up whenever Harlow was on."

Despite the popularity of TV's late movies, however, a lot of stations miss no chances in roping in insomniacs. In fact, the gimmicks and ballyhoo used by some programs would do Barnum proud. For instance, WHNB-TV in West Hartford, Conn., once formed a bona fide insomniacs' club—complete with badges and membership cards. Some 800 viewers signed up. But it didn't do one of them, a burglar, much good. Picked up by the police on a house-theft charge, the crook promptly produced his insomniacs' club card to prove he was

watching a late movie when the crime was committed. But card-holding insomniac or no, the judge said it would be two years before he got to see another late movie.

One of the most common of latemovie come-ons is the on-camera host. The late-movie hosts do everything from commercials to conducting cultural chats between pictures. One of the most durable of the genre is Acquanetta, a former Hollywood actress (circa 1940) who's been a movie hostess at Phoenix's KPHO-TV for 11 years. A dark-haired beauty, Acquanetta usually glides into a flower-laden set gowned and bejeweled, and reads her own poetry. "Acquanetta is lovely off-camera," says the station's Chuck Glance, "but a little hard to take when she's on." Still, Acquanetta seems to be on to stay. Explains Glance: "Her husband sponsors the show."

The main appeal of the late movies is the movies themselves. Says WCBS's Lacey: "You get people like Gable and Garbo acting in top properties with the high production values Hollywood has always put into pictures. That's something television has never been able to match. Even when a picture's a stinker, it's better than a lot that's on TV."

Not much argument there. And you can't beat the late-movie programs for inventiveness either. Take the time WLBZ-TV in Bangor, Maine, found it had a terrible war picture to show on a Fourth of July. No problem. They simply rallied together the station's personnel, built a pillbox on a hill, borrowed some gear from the National Guard, opened the back door to the studio and, cutting into the picture live, put on one of the dandiest battles New England has seen since Bunker Hill.

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# David Nelson-Director



David Nelson, who started acting in his parents' Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet show when he was 12 (he's shown above in 1952, when he was a veteran of 15), has finally managed to shake loose from his family long enough to direct a show featuring no one by the name of Nelson. It should have happened long before this, said the 29-year-old David, who has directed 11 Ozzie and Harriet shows, but producers figured that "because Dad has control over our show, I must have had lots of help."

David's break came when producer Elliott Lewis, whose wife appears as Clara Randolph on the Nelson show, asked to see some Nelson clips, then invited him to direct an O.K. Crackerby! episode. After seeing the rushes, Lewis said, "He's got it. He learned to direct comedy through his pores." Star Burl Ives told Lewis: "We've got to hang onto this boy."





# FOLLOW THE YELLOW-BRICK SUPERHIGHWAY

Liza Minnelli, starring in two specials this week, has broken the speed record on the way to the top

Once upon a time, as everybody knows, there was this little girl named Dorothy who went up, up and away in a Kansas twister and wound up in a place called Oz, the Las Vegas of its day. Before she got to the Emerald City, though, she had to make that long trip up the yellow-brick road, which wasn't easy, what with witches, Munchkins, lions, scarecrows and people of that sort.

Well, the years passed and she had

a daughter. And after a while the daughter figured it was time to carry on the family tradition and do the Oz bit, so she took off. Only this time it was a cinch. The yellow-brick road was a superhighway by then and you didn't have to walk it. You could drive in a Caddy. You didn't have to convince the Munchkins you were on the up-and-up because they remembered your ma, so they knew you came from good stock. Best of all,

you didn't have to pick up all those weirdo tinmen and lions along the way. So when our heroine reached the Emerald City—and she broke the speed record getting there—there was no trouble getting inside. All the big shots were waiting by the gate. "Come in! Come in!" they cried. "We've been waiting for another one for 20 years, baby!"

On top? Fast? Listen . . . the proof of this pudding is that Liza Minnelli, whose mother is called Judy Garland, has already starred in a Broadway show, is taking her night-club act to the Sahara in Vegas, has cut five albums, has appeared on The Ed Sullivan Show, Al Hirt's Fanfare, Hullabaloo, and something The Judy Garland Show. And this week she will be starring in two TV specials within two days (another record): the one on ABC called "The Dangerous Christmas of Little Red Riding Hood" (Nov. 28) and the one on CBS called "Ice Capades of 1966" (Dec. 1): and this Liza Minnelli is now 19 (count 'em) years old.

On the "Ice Capades" caper, Liza shares the spotlight with Arthur Godfrey. She will sing "Gypsy in My Soul" and she will wear shoes. "I just walk on the ice," she explains. "I can skate, but I don't like to do it on television unless I could come out and do double spins." In all other areas of entertainment, it appears that Liza can do triple spins with one leg tied behind her back. On the "Red Riding Hood" show, which is a "book" musical, she sings, dances, acts and does comedy in the company of Cyril Ritchard (the Wolf), Vic Damone (the Woodsman), and The Animals (the Animals).

Now, as to the Princess of Oz herself, she seems at first glance an unlikely celebrity. The phiz is irregular, though therein lies its charm. Capped invariably with a John Lennon-type "poor-boy" cap or some similar topper, she is the picture of the emerging

adolescent, all limbs, slouchy posture, lip chewing. First met between rehearsals, she sported a Navy pea jacket purchased at a 42nd Street Army-Navy store, and looked like her parents' child (her father is Vincente Minnelli, movie director). Having taped the ice show and premiered her night-club act in Washington, D.C. (rave reviews, standing ovation), she halted all for three weeks of "Red Riding Hood" rehearsals. "I can't figure out whether I really like being this busy or not," she said. "After all, I have my home life." What that consists of, for this unmarried teen-ager who shares a New York apartment with Tanya Everett, a performer in "Fiddler on the Roof," is heady stuff indeed. "I bum about a bit. Read. Go out to dance. Go to movies, watch television." Obviously such a compelling home life offers a strong alternative to fame, money, and glory.

Actually, Liza's home life has many mansions. She is engaged, as they say in show business, with no immediate plans to get married, as they say in show business, to a young Australian performer named Peter Allen who performed on the same bill with Liza's mother in the U.S. and Canada. Small world. In the absence of her swain, Liza's discothèquing and partying is done in the elite company of such luminaries as the flamboyant Baby Jane Holzer and her jet-setters, or, on more subdued occasions, with the energetic young Broadway dancing crowd of Liza's roommate.

But Liza Minnelli, who grew up in Hollywood with such contemporaries as Mia Farrow and Candy Bergen (when they grew up, that crowd, they really grew up), isn't really planning to stay home. "After about two weeks of doing nothing," she says, "I have to start doing something." Of course it isn't all marvelous. For example, there's Liza's birthday coming up. "I'll be doing the act at the Deauville Hotel in Miami. Can't

you just see me in Miami? I'll go down with my silver fox and my plastic heels." The laugh fades into a look of anguish. "I do not want to be 20 in Miami!" But that's show biz; you have to take the good with the bad.

Liza has been around it since she was knee-high, and she used to hang around the MGM soundstages watching the dancers work.

### Movies hold no excitement

"But I know movies," she says, "and they hold no mystery or excitement for me. I like live audiences. 'Flora, the Red Menace' [her recent Broadway show, not a big hit] was the best thing ever. I learned from George Abbott, the director, how valuable it is to be organized and how to be calm on stage." Of course, there is also good advice from her father ("He's so bright, he just knows. I call him if I need him") and her mother. Critics have noted a strong vocal similarity between Liza and Judy, an even stronger one between Liza and Barbra Streisand, but she disclaims any direct influences.

In the "Red Riding Hood" special, a tongue-in-cheek retelling of the tale from the point of view of the Wolf, she also seems a little Carol Burnett-ish. "I'm kind of whacky in this," says Liza. Rehearsing with Ritchard, who plays a fastidious wolf who abhors violence, she flaps about wearing her ever-present cap, munches tuna-fish sandwiches and laughs at the slightest quip from a fellow performer.

Producer Dick Lewine, who also did the highly praised Streisand special, looks on affectionately. "Liza was the original thought for this part," he says. "We never even went after anybody else. She has excitement for an audience. It's very hard to find a complete pro in a girl who can look like 15 or 16 and still really sing." Lewine, a savvy spotter of the bestin-breed, disclaims all comparisons between Liza and Barbra Streisand. "You can't compare. It's like apples and pears. Barbra's one of the world's greatest singers and a very special kind of comedienne. Now Liza, she's very conscious of Streisand, but so is every young singer today. It isn't accurate to say she imitates her."

He considers what Liza's "image" might be. "I think the desirable goal for her is to be Liza Minnelli. She comes to this business starting out with a lot more than the unknown kid from Iowa looking to get in the theater. But as for the people back in Iowa," he adds, alluding to the great unwashed public, "I don't think they really have a conception of Liza yet. There is no real image so far."

### Image still not clear

Liza's idea of her image is similarly loose. "You gotta figure out what you want to be," she says, "a personality or a fine actress who can do many things." Obviously, she opts for the latter. "If you have limited talents, stick to them, but if not. . . . Look, the only image I have is what I've done. I haven't a clue. If I would go out and play a prostitute," she points out, invoking the standard cliché, "it wouldn't hurt any image. It would just widen my scope."

The Princess of Oz finishes her tuna fish and begins on a cream-cheese-with-walnuts sandwich. She strolls over to Cyril Ritchard, who is quietly perusing his script, and impulsively kisses him on the head. He looks up and smiles abstractedly. Liza hops away. She smiles. She shrugs. She takes another bite. And one remembers that after the original Dorothy got through with Oz she went on to something called "A Star Is Born."

Notice to all pedestrians on the yellow-brick road: Get out of the way before you get run over.

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# THEY ONLY POINT A CAMERA

In Vietnam, the Congo, Watts and much of the rest of the world, however, TV newsmen find much more deadly equipment focused on them

All the lumps in television don't spring from ratings. Many of them are real, bruising and physical, administered to the few dozen TV correspondents, cameramen and soundmen who chase wars, race riots, civilrights stories and limited "incidents" where the bloodletting is fierce and quick. For example:

—NBC's George Clay, killed in the Congo, tape recorder in hand, while taking down the sound of warfare.

—ABC's Larry Johnson, cameraman, and Wally Oakes, soundman, wounded while covering a mine-clearing expedition in Vietnam.

—CBS's Laurens Pierce, assaulted by a segregationist while filming a trial in Mississippi.

Every correspondent, whether newspaper, radio or TV, takes his chances when he goes to a place where people are ready to kill each other. Yet the TV man is in special danger.

"You have to be where the action is," says Garrick Utley, the young, lanky NBC bureau chief in Saigon. "You can't fake it. You have to explain the war in terms of pictures."

Winston Burdett, who has covered much strife in his 25 years with CBS, recently returned from the Indian-Pakistani war, where he found his job especially frustrating.

"I spent six days trying to reach the front," he recalled. "When we got

there—five men in a jeep along with hundreds of pounds of equipment they wanted us to stay only 10 minutes and get out. We stayed 40 minutes, and shot a little bit of a battle."

Unlike the men who work in the sound and writing media, the TV crews can't get a "fill-in" from somebody else to cover what they have missed. They travel as a team. Their "pencil" on a short excursion weighs 80 or 100 pounds, consisting of camera, film and sound gear worth \$10,000.

In some parts of the world, they are shot at because their equipment looks like weapons. In Santo Domingo, an NBC cameraman was machine-gunned by a U.S. helicopter, apparently because his long-lens apparatus looked like a mortar, and because he was wearing an ordinary sports shirt such as the rebels wore. He dove into a ditch to escape bullets but hurt himself falling.

In some places in the South or in riot-ridden Watts in Los Angeles, TV newsmen have been attacked because their equipment looks like formidable weapons of exposure. More than one cameraman has been beaten, shoved or menaced by ugly crowds. On the other hand, local toughs have learned that a camera is not only a weapon of truth but a 40-pound steel weapon of defense that can land on an aggressor with impressive vigor.

"We are always glad to see TV guys on those stories," observed one veteran newspaperman. "When the crowds see them, they go after them and take the heat off us."

The truth is that combat journalism on TV has changed radically since the days of Korea or Suez. Films were then made by silent cameras with the correspondent adding sound later.

"In Korea, all we got was troopmovements," explains William T. Corrigan, director of NBC news operations. "And even 10 years ago. still had a shot of the correspondent in the field saying, 'I wish you could see this,' But now equipment and concept have changed all that. We've caught the 'copters over the rice paddies and just because we have these pictures doesn't mean we're going to use them-and that sounds cruel when you realize that our guys have been going through hell to get them. We are trying to marry pictures and words to get a greater understanding, and translate this war into a more meaningful picture for viewers."

The fellows in the field agree that what they get depends upon a combination of uncanny luck and canny connections. Whether it's Pakistan, Vietnam or Santo Domingo, it's hard to forecast where there will be action.

"If you want to start excitement in Saigon, just run out of the hotel with a camera in hand," says Utley. "Everyone will wonder where you're headed."

"Trying to find action is like throwing darts," comments ABC's Wally Bruner. "Also, at night you can't shoot because you can't use lights."

Grant Wolfkill, a cameraman for NBC, was held prisoner for almost a year and a half by Laotian Reds, and became a big story in himself when he was released. Yet he spent 10 days in India and Pakistan without delivering a battle picture.

That is why almost every bit of film is a scoop in itself, of varying proportions. Each team goes its own way. Morley Safer of CBS created a furor when he covered the burning of a Vietnamese town by American troops intent on flushing out the Viet Cong. ABC was the only one on hand for the Marine encirclement operation at Chu Lai. NBC had an exclusive at the recent amphibious operations.

However, though the competition is keen, it is not cutthroat. "We don't play kids' tricks on each other," says Burdett. "If relations are good, we even help each other out."

"You never scoop a fellow on an equipment failure," affirms Peter Jennings, who did a Vietnam stint for ABC. "You can sometimes carry back each other's films. There's only one guy I ever heard of who would turn on your amplifier when you weren't looking, so your battery would run down. He didn't do too well."

The sense of togetherness is overwhelming. A correspondent never speaks of "I" when he talks about his days in the field; it's always "we." The uniting of sight, sound and commentary knits the technicians and the reporters closely together.

"It's a buddy system," is the way commentator Jack Casserly of ABC puts it. "The sound- and cameramen make us look good."

None of the television people pose as heroes. On the other hand, no network pays combat bonuses. The overseas pay is the same, whether it's for covering a king's reception in Sweden or a drawn-out, hot little war such as the one in Cyprus that cost NBC's Alvin Rosenfeld the sight of one eye when a bullet caught him while he was driving a car. In the last year, each network has sent more than 30 men to Vietnam. Each has about a dozen men there now. It is a voluntary business; nobody is forced to go.


But they do, those who feel forced to sniff out the rice paddies, to push up the mountains in Kashmir. "They're a new breed," said one TV news executive. "A gung-ho bunch."













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# FOR THE RECORD



The Big Day: Unquestionably, there's something irresistible about a wedding-even a fictional one. All season long The Farmer's Daughter has been plowing along with mediocre ratings. Then the No. 5 episode arrives—the big day when Katy Holstrum marries her congressman-and, all of a sudden. The Farmer's Daughter is the top-rated show in the country for that week. This, at any rate, is what Nielsen's 30-city ratings say. The Farmer's Daughter jumped nearly a dozen points to hit 28.4, outpoll Bonanza (26.9) and make ABC the best man in the three-network competition that week-in that survey, at least.

Fan Mail: Some excerpts from letters received by Phyllis Kirk, of ABC's daytime talk show, The Young Set:

From Columbus, Ohio: "I would like to know if you are blackmailing ABC-TV. Why else would they permit a program to be televised that is intelligent, informative and controversial, as well as entertaining?"

From Ann Arbor, Mich.: "I hope that your sponsors and the network officials never find out how interesting, stimulating and purely enjoyable your program is, because if they do, they will probably cancel you."

From Norman, Okla.: "Congratulations on giving us what I believe to be about the only show in daytime that assumes that there are people at home who like to think!"

From Birmingham, Ala.: "You have

succeeded in bringing the daytime viewer something really good."

From Worthington, Ohio: "It's been like a breath of fresh air. I hate to jinx your show, but anything this good usually is taken off."

The Young Set folds up after its Dec. 17 show. The reason: low ratings. It will be replaced by two new half-hour series: Supermarket Sweep, a David Susskind production in which contestants will race up and down supermarket aisles to see who can grab the most groceries; and The Dating Game, in which young women will choose dates from among bachelors concealed behind a screen.

Dr. Allen B. Du Mont: One of television's most illustrious pioneers, Dr. Allen B. Du Mont, 64, died Nov. 15 in New York after a brief illness. Dr. Du Mont's most important contribution to the evolution of television was the development of the first practical cathode-ray tube, in the 1930's.

Demotion: Warner Brothers—with one ratings winner (F Troop), one so-so entry (The FBI) and two losers (Hank). (Mister Roberts) on the air this season-has undergone a change of command in its TV-production department. President Jack L. Warner has removed the current production chief, William Orr, and appointed Robert Lewine, once a CBS vice president, to replace him. Orr, who is Warner's son-in-law, will probably remain at the studio, perhaps in movie production. Meanwhile, Hollywood wits are busy telling each other, "Bill Orr has been demoted to cousin." -Henry Harding

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## Green Acres

Once upon a TV there was a show called The Beverly Hillbillies. And it came to pass that The Beverly Hillbillies became, if not great with child, at least with child, and in the course of time there was born Petticoat Junction. And if not so great was the rejoicing thereof—any more than when Western begat another Western—nonetheless, in the fullness of prime time, Petticoat Junction also brought forth a child. And this child was called Green Acres—which, we warn you, has a fearfully fertile sound.


We realize we've warned you about all this before. And we know you've done your best. But now it's up to the networks. If they're going to let these shows out at night, unchaperoned and in some cases even unattended, they're simply asking for trouble. The only answer is, obviously, show-control. In fact, what all of us need, on the part of all networks, is a rigorous program—you will pardon the expression-of Planned Showhood. If these networks must breed these shows, then let them be bred with love and care and understandingwith knowledge of bloodlines and dominant features and character traits. In this way, over the years, the defects can be bred out.

To breed out all the defects in *Green Acres*, however, is not going to be easy. We would start with breeding

out the idea-which, as you may know, is the one about the successful city man hankering for a farm. We rule it out as too old, even for the young. Next, we would eliminate the appearance of people from neighboring shows. All right, Uncle Joe (Edgar Buchanan) and Aunt Kate (Bea Benaderet) have their place, but their place is in Petticoat Junction, and we certainly are not going to tolerate their wandering around the back fences of all our other shows all week. If we allow this, one of these days, we suppose, they'll take a hot TV character and wander him through half a dozen shows

Third, we must breed out a terrifying defect in the laugh-track machine. We are not yet sure whether the laugh track on this show is stuck, or whether Green Acres is shot in a thunderstorm-but in any case we resent it. Finally, we also resent the fact that neither Paul Henning, the executive producer, nor Jay Sommers, the producer, can resist not just repeating a gag-not once, for heaven knows we would settle for that-but repeating it over and over. We still recall with horror seeing 22 repetitions of the gag about the tractor falling apart and 17 repetitions about the hired man playing with the gadgets on the Lincoln Continental.

On the positive side, Eddie Albert plays the lawyer (whose name, naturally, is Oliver Wendell Douglas) with remarkable aplomb, and Eva Gabor suffers the tortures of her position and the scripts with rare good grace. Pat Buttram, as Mr. Haney, is good, and there are even times when we like—albeit in far smaller doses—Eleanor Audley as the mother and Tom Lester as Eb. All in all though, Green Acres should be put to pasture as rapidly as possible and—let us make this perfectly clear—by itself.


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# WORLD WAR II WITH A LAUGH TRACK'

With an improbable premise and an unlikely star, 'Hogan's Heroes' is marching to TV popularity

The sweet smell of success is a heady aroma which, almost from the start, pervaded the otherwise drab confines of the set of *Hogan's Heroes*, a CBS entry which the smart money picked early on as a hit of the new television season, and which later justified this confidence by turning up as the toprated new show in the season's first national Nielsens.

The program, which concerns hilarious goings-on in a German prisoner-of-war camp—"World War II with a

laugh track," according to a quipsterwas dubbed "one of the sleepers of the next semester" by Daily Variety. Last summer, when CBS brought managers of its affiliated stations to Hollywood for wining, dining and viewing the new shows, they seemed to like Hogan's Heroes better than anything else they saw. And from Madison Avenue to Vine Street, the talk around the trade was similar in tone to that which preceded the premières of such hits as The Beverly Hillbillies and Gomer Pule, USMC.

"It has a good feeling," says Bob Crane, erstwhile Dr. David Kelsev of The Donna Reed Show and now Col. Robert Hogan of Hogan's Heroes. "Once when I appeared on The Dick Van Dyke Show, I said to myself, 'This is a team!' That's the way this show is-there's a rhythm."

The character of Colonel Hogan is a sort of upgraded Sergeant Bilko working behind the enemy lines, but Bilko is never mentioned as a precursor of Hogan's Heroes, any more than "Stalag 17" is.

Rather, Crane says, "It's halfway between Combat! and McHale's Navywith a little bit of the The Man from U.N.C.L.E. thrown in."

When asked to do a bit of comedy business which he objects to, he says contemptuously, "That's McHale's,"

and the bit is dropped.

Later he says, "They never want me to fall into a comedy style like Joe Flynn or Tim Conway of McHale's. Then if there's any romance, it's believable. I'm not Joe Buffoon. The lines have to mean something. But I was always the nut in my neighborhood-the wise guy. That's Colonel Hogan."

Crane's neighborhood was Connecticut-Waterbury, where he was born; then Stamford, where he went to school and started out to be a professional musician; and finally Bridgeport, where he really got started in radio as a disc jockey.

He still remembers the names-and recites them-of the competing disc jockeys on the New York radio stations when he worked in Bridgeport. and those on the Los Angeles stations when he went West nine years ago.

Crane himself has never liked to be known as a disc jockey-he prefers "radio personality." Wise guy he may be, but he admits, "I'm thin-skinned."

He remembers, and again recites word for word, things once written about him in a magazine which he considered unkind-that he is "a nottoo-young 36," that he lives "in a nice but hardly fashionable part of town" called Tarzana.

But particularly he remembers the quoted remarks of Tony Owen, producer of The Donna Reed Show and husband of the star, who indicated that he dropped Crane from the cast when, in fact, it was Crane who decided to pull out.

There is nothing of the wise guy in Crane's voice as he says, "I thought Tony was my friend-he was like a father to me. When I called him up about the things he said, he told me, "That's this business-you'll have to get used to it."

When Crane came to California, he moved to Tarzana because his old barber from Bridgeport had a shop there. Now he patronizes a Hollywood hair stylist at \$10 a throw-a move suggested by Tony Owen. "That's one thing I can thank him for," says Crane.

Continuing as a "radio personality" on KNX, Los Angeles, through most of the past summer (he no longer does the show), Crane got up before 5 every morning, was at the radio station by 6, spent two hours taping his program for release at 8 A.M., arrived at Desilu Studios, where Hogan's Heroes is filmed, at 8:15, worked until after 7 in the evening, had his dinner in town and then went home to his wife and three kids in Tarzana, where he studied his lines for the next day until he fell asleep. continued

Sometimes Crane didn't know his lines very well, but nobody seemed to mind. It's a happy set. "You hear about those other shows where they're having trouble," says Crane. "But it's not like that here." Which is all part of the sweet smell of success.

The only tacit connection between Hogan's Heroes and Sergeant Bilko is in the person of one of Hogan's creators, Bernard Fein. As an actor, Fein played the part of Private Gomez for four years with Phil Silvers' merry men. It took him that long to sell Hogan's Heroes, which, in its original concept, did not take place in a military or overseas setting but in an American penitentiary.

"I tried for four years to sell the show," says Fein. "Finally I gave up and decided to leave the business. I got on a plane for New York. Sitting next to me was a guy reading 'Von Ryan's Express.' The minute I saw it, I said to myself, "That's it!! I didn't even leave the airport when I got to New York—I bought a ticket back to Hollywood on the next plane. Albert Ruddy and I turned out a new script with the German POW camp locale, and four days after we finished it, it was sold."

#### Producer's doubts vanish

The immediate success of the program relieved some anxieties of its producer, Edward H. Feldman, who had some nagging doubts, not because of the nature of *Hogan's Heroes* ("It's something fresh"), but because of his own traumatic experience with a short-lived show called *Fair Exchange* a few seasons back.

"Everybody predicted it would be a hit," says Feldman. "When it went on the air, the reviews were all raves—I still have them. Even today people tell me how great it was. They just didn't watch it."

Or, to be a bit more specific, several rating services said they didn't watch it. . . .

One day four gentlemen from the CBS executive suite arrived on the Hogan set for a brief visit—the president of the TV network, in from New York, with three vice presidents in tow. Bob Crane and other members of the cast gathered around them. There was much laughter. Strangely, though, is was not the executives laughing at the comedians. It was the comedians laughing at the remarks of the executives, most of which were not even intended to be funny, and the executives looked a trifle puzzled.

After they had gone, actor Werner Klemperer, who co-stars in Hogan's Heroes as the prison-camp commandant, said, "Do they often come en masse like that? It's rather frightening."


#### Comedy for a change

Klemperer, son of Otto, the worldfamed symphony conductor, has made a career of playing villains of various nationalities, likes playing comedy for a change. "It's the sort of acting I prefer," he says. "It's a tremendous relief."

He would like to forget some of the non-comic Nazis he has portrayed, particularly Adolf Eichmann in a quickie production called "Operation Eichmann."

Klemperer's co-star, John Banner, who plays the comic Sgt. Hans Schultz, agrees. Banner fled Europe when the Nazis invaded his native Austria, but now he says, "It's wonderful to be able to laugh again. A program like this shows that the mind is stronger than all the weapons in the world—that even in a totalitarian country individualism sneaks through."


He pauses. "Just so people don't get prisoner-of-war camps mixed up with concentration camps. You can't make fun of a concentration camp."

# 'ZONKED'

Fired with gambling fever, thousands join the new California Gold Rush each week

In order to qualify for a place on Let's Make a Deal, a bizarre bazaar conducted each weekday afternoon by Monty Hall, you begin by showing up at the NBC studio in Burbank, Cal., with something to trade. This could be an item of great sentimental value, such as a snake, a spider, a myna bird, an old propeller, or a 50-pound cake of ice. One time a gentleman appeared with an Italian dinner which included antipasto, chicken cacciatora, spaghetti, cheese and wine. He never made the show but was recommended to Chef Boy-Ar-Dee.

Armed with your trading product, you will be placed in a monstrous line outside the studio where other aspiring participants will be dressed less than conventionally. One may be wearing a cage for a hat, with a hamster running around inside. Another may be attired as General Custer. And still others may be bearing signs, such as "I've quit pickin' cotton 'til Monty picks me" or "From the West Side of the Berlin Wall, I've come to deal with Monty Hall."

An hour or so before the start of the program, two of the show's three writers will come along, selecting people from the line. The two will be doing this mainly because they held the low cards in cutting the deck with their colleague earlier. Truthfully, the writers would rather let Sandy Koufax throw at their heads than face the daily line-up in which excited persons grab at their garments and scream, "Take me!"

On several occasions, jackets have been ripped from their backs. When they by-passed a lady who had brought a basket of fruit for trading bait, she threw a peach at one of them.

Of the 540 admitted to each show, 42 are picked for the "trading floor," from where an average of five get a chance at the loot. They swap the ragabash items they bring for cash or merchandise ranging in value from a few cents to a new convertible. And once they get their prize, they are given opportunities by Hall to make a deal for something else.

Smooth and suave, with a manner suggesting a refined carny, Hall never touts, but relishes a situation in which he can lead a trader to the brink of a big gamble. "I'm a con man," he says, "but a friendly con man. In a sense, I am displaying the walnut shells. They must pick the one containing the pea."

A 42-year-old Canadian, Hall earned a degree as a zoology major at the University of Manitoba. Trying to make money for medical school, he dabbled in acting and singing before turning to sports announcing. Soon he was conducting TV game shows with such success in Canada that he (a) forgot to become a doctor, and (b) was asked by CBS to substitute for vacationing Warren Hull on Strike It Rich. It was 1955. He has remained in this country since.

A veteran of other panel, quiz and game programs, Hall conceived the idea of *Let's Make a Deal* in 1963 with Stefan Hatos, a television producer who also has specialized in audience-

participation shows.

"The main difference between Let's Make a Deal and most other audience programs," says Hatos, "is that the participant can be stupid (and often is) and still win. He need have no knowledge, nor answer any questions. All he must be able to do is say yes or no when the deal is put to him."

What motivates a person's responses on such a program remains a mystery, but it does bring out the frailties in human nature. You detect the gambling instincts in some. Others ooze greed. Charitably, Hall compares the spirit of his traders with that of the American Pioneer.

"Say a person has won \$1000 worth of furniture," he says. "We ask if he wants to trade it for something behind a door. He will say yes, for the same reason the settlers said, 'We know what's in Salt Lake City, but we don't know what's beyond."

Housewives who will scream at the butcher when lamb chops go up two cents a pound find themselves gambling with hundreds, sometimes thousands, on Let's Make a Deal.

One day, for instance, Hall began by awarding a \$100 bill to a lady. She began to weep. "Never before," she confessed, "have I held a \$100 bill in my hand."

It was a tender scene, bringing moisture to some eyes in the audience. Hall then produced an continued

envelope, "Inside," he told the lady, "is either \$2 or \$200. Will you trade me your \$100 bill for the envelope?"

A strange transformation took place in this humble little woman, and suddenly she was Pittsburgh Phil. She went for the envelope. She found \$200 inside. Hall then whipped out another envelope. "This contains \$4 or \$400," he said. "Will you trade for your \$200?"

There was no stopping her now. She gambled-and won again. Next envelope: \$8 or \$800. She went. And she won.

"The audience went crazy," recalls Hall. "This lady who never before even held a C-note now had 800 bucks. Do you know what happened? I asked her if she wanted to trade it for what was behind a curtain, and, to everyone's amazement, she said ves."

pot of gold-a World War I motorcycle with a sidecar.

In the parlance of the show, she had been "zonked," a shattering experience which happens to approximately one of every five rainbow chasers on the program.

Producer Hatos submits that people are intrigued by the unknown. "Any time you shield with a curtain," he says, "something compels a person to find out what is behind it."

A lady who lived on a farm in Iowa won a mink stole. Again tears (a common commodity on the trading floor) flowed freely. "All my life," she blubbered. "I wanted a mink. This is the loveliest thing that ever happened to me"

Before the program was over, she traded her cherished fur for hidden contents behind a door-two bicycle exercisers.

Since the amount of cash and merchandise given away on the show is regulated by NBC—the prize budget averages roughly \$25,000 a week-it makes no difference to Hall whether his traders win. What isn't taken by participants one week is added to the total the next.

He does owe it to his muse, however, to spar with his guests, and with satanic delight, he leads married couples to the brink of war over whether they should keep their prizes, or continue dealing.

One day, a lady won a \$795 mink. Asked if she wished to trade for something behind the curtain, she said no. Her husband said yes. After all, the mink would look funny on him. "No," she repeated. He insisted. They traded -and got an \$845 TV-stereo.

Hall tempted them with another curtain. The husband said yes. The wife, no. She prevailed, thus costing them a \$3200 convertible. Now he was boiling. When Hall dangled the next deal, he said yes with feelingand found himself trading their \$845 TV-stereo for \$60 worth of salami. In



the end, the couple wound up with a gas range and some cookware, but relations were obviously strained.

Monty complains that few people realize the hazards attendant to his work. In their exuberance, women who collect booty have a habit of kissing and embracing him, sometimes too enthusiastically. A large woman winning a refrigerator and freezer once placed him in the care of a physiotherapist. She leaped on him, wrenching his neck. He required two weeks of heat treatment. Another happy lady beat him on the head with a stuffed animal, dazing him so that he lost the continuity.

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

# THE BATTLE that's fought

It's the Army-Navy game, which has been called 'the essence of the

Grantland Rice, the spiritual granddaddy of American sportswriters, once said that the Army-Navy football game is the heavyweight boxing championship, the World Series, and the Kentucky Derby rolled into one
—more a spectacle than a sports event.
This Saturday, at John F. Kennedy
Stadium in Philadelphia, that spectacle will be on view once again, the
66th meeting (Army, 31 wins; Navy,
29; 5 ties) of the midshipmen from

Annapolis and the cadets from West Point. For decades, the encounter has been recognized as the natural conclusion of the regular football season, as the only college game with truly national interest, and the only sports contest which fans expect the President of the United States to attendor have a good excuse.

Sportscaster Lindsey Nelson, who'll be handling his 11th Army-Navy game, recalls that last year Gen. William C. Westmoreland, commander of U.S. forces in Vietnam, authorized a special line broadcast of the gameinstead of the usual wireless-to ensure that his men got the play-by-play with no interference. Westmoreland's gesture was not an altogether selfless one; he had been superintendent of the Military Academy from 1960 to 1963, and not once during that term had his teams managed to beat Navy. Thus, his feelings about the Navy team approximated his sentiments about the Viet Cong. (Army won, 11-8, its first victory since 1958.)

The two academies will split more than a million dollars after Saturday's clash—a quarter of that deriving from NBC's purchase of the television rights, and the rest from ticket and concession sales. No crystal ball is required to predict the attendance: 102.000, the stadium's capacity.

"Television has figured in the Army-Navy game more prominently than you might suppose," says Lindsev Nelson. "Earl Blaik, formerly the coach of Army, used to keep a television set near the bench to get a better view of the opposition's deployment. The players' bench is the worst place in the stadium from which to see the game. Once, during an especially exciting moment on the field, I looked down to the sidelines and saw Blaik and almost the whole Army team clustered around the television set watching the action with the audio turned up. It was the best way to find out what was going on."

Nelson, by the way, may be the only man in Kennedy Stadium next Saturday who's in possession of both teams' game strategy even before the game starts. "The coaches continued

trust me with their plans," he says. "I need that information so that I can evaluate their performance during the game: how well they're executing their strategy. The two coaches know that their secrets are safe with me. One slip, though, and I'd be out of this business for good."

The first Army-Navy game ever televised was in 1945, when a few scattered viewers in New York, Schenectady and Philadelphia observed the action on primitive, prewar sets. That was in the golden age of Army football, 1944-46, when Glenn Davis and Doc Blanchard kept Army undefeated and untied for three straight years, except for an epic 0-0 struggle with Notre Dame in 1946.

#### Blanchard and Davis ran wild

Even though two of those seasons were in wartime, when most schools were not up to full football strength, it was still quite a record. Between them, Blanchard and Davis scored 10 of Army's 11 touchdowns against Navy in the three years. And Davis's 20 touchdowns in the 1944 season still stands as a record at West Point. The 1944 Army team came to the Army-Navy game after devastating victories over Notre Dame (59-0), Pittsburgh (69-7), Penn (62-7), Villanova (83-0) and North Carolina (46-0).

When Army beat Navy, 23-7, that year, Coach Earl Blaik received a wire which read: "The greatest of all Army teams stop We have stopped the war to celebrate your magnificent

success." It was signed, simply, "Mac-Arthur."

Before 1962's game, Navy had won three straight, and so intense was Army's chagrin over this humiliation that General Westmoreland had relieved their head coach, Dale Hall, and hired Paul Dietzel, a civilian, the first non-graduate of West Point in modern times to guide the Army team.

Dietzel's first try at ending the Navy victory streak was a 34-14 disaster, but his second saw one of the most frenzied and hard-fought games in the series' history, ending with Army in possession of the ball on Navy's 2-yard line, and frantically trying to get off one more play before the final gun.

With the score 21 to 15 and seconds remaining, Army quarterback Carl Stichweh brought his team over the ball, but so thunderous was the roar from the crowd that he paused and raised his arms for silence, so that his signals could be heard. But the clock kept running, and in the next instant the officials waved their arms, to end the game and award the ball to Navy.

Army partisans were shocked, having come so close to a possible tie. But the next year, 1964, Dietzel in his third attempt managed to crack Navy's armor. For most of the game, it was a duel between Stichweh and Navy's great All-America quarterback, Roger Staubach. In the fourth quarter, however, an Army field goal from the 20-yard line broke an 8-8 tie, and the cadets successfully bottled up the Navy in the remaining minutes, winning the game 11-8.

"Remember that these players are the best products of our country, the finest young men we can produce. The corps of cadets and the midshipmen will stand throughout the game, and you'll see players on the losing team crying on the way to the dressing room.

"It's remarkable the lengths they'll go to gain even a small emotional advantage," Nelson continues. "In 1958, for example, Army changed from its black jerseys after the warmup period and put on gray ones. Navy pulled a similar switch in 1959. They frequently paint slogans on their headgear and sew them onto their jerseys. Anything that constitutes a small surprise is considered fair play."

Students at the service academies are fond of making small wagers on the game, but since they have little money they frequently use bathrobes as terms of their bets. That accounts for the large number of bathrobes—bearing Army insignia—seen at Annapolis, and vice versa.

#### A lot of huckstering

For the city of Philadelphia, the game means about \$1.5 million in added business for the weekend. One obscure statistician has estimated that during the game, concessionaires will sell 150,000 hot dogs, 100,000 cups of coffee, 10,000 cigars, 10,000 chrysanthemums, 40,000 programs, 25,000 bags of peanuts, 12,000 badges and pennants.

That's a lot of huckstering. But it's all just stage dressing for the real drama being enacted on the field. As sportswriter Jack Clary writes in a recent book, "Army vs. Navy": "With the exception of actual war, it is the closest that each combatant will come to waging the life-death struggle for victory that is the essence of the military profession."
