Hogan's Heroes

This is the TV season, as you may have heard, of the fun wars. And of all the fun wars, the funsiest to the TV networks, judging by the number of shows devoted to it, would seem to be World War II. But don't despair, you fans of other wars, your day will come. (Our own favorite, for example, was the War of Jenkins's Ear —and we've even got a script all ready—but it would be just our luck to have to sit through three seasons of the 100 Years War before we even get a decent network earring.)

In any case, given the premise that all's fun in love and war, it is not surprising that CBS decided to have a fun go at old "Stalag 17," the POWcamp romp which was a proven commodity on Broadway and in the movies. And, from the opening theme song of *Hogan's Heroes*—which is, incidentally, the best theme song we've heard—it is clear that Bing Crosby Productions in general, and Edward Feldman, Bernard Fein and Albert Ruddy in particular, not to mention some fine fun writing by Richard Powell, are on the right laugh track. The show is fast and funny and, far from being limited, as might have been expected—after all, there would seem to be just so many possibilities in a POW camp—is, in fact, the opposite.

Indeed, this show seems to provide week after week a fuller half-hour of fun than almost any other on the air-all the way from the fun tunnels to the friendly police dogs. The prisoners lead a life that is so easy to take, it actually makes you feel sorry for the people they do so constantly take-their captors, who are after all, their captive audience. For one thing, these prisoners have a Communications Central which would put a network Election Night headquarters to shame. For another, well, we can only say that in one episode they had both a girl-a baroness, no less-and an airplane. And before the season is over we firmly expect them to have a go at their own space shot.


We have only one reservation. In by far the majority of the comedies on your screen this season, the acting is superior to the writing. Hogan's Heroes is one show where, in our opinion, the reverse is true. Colonel Hogan (Bob Crane) is a little too satisfied with himself for our taste, and both Klink (Werner Klemperer) and, perhaps most of all, Schultz (John Banner) could come down just a notch. We're not asking for English underplaying-although the English prisoner, Newkirk (Richard Dawson), is our favorite-but we do object when we see scene after scene between Hogan and Klink, say, or between Schultz and almost anybody, where the whole exchange is played as if they were both in front of a mirror. This is a funny show, fellowsbut, please, let us be the ones who are most amused.

How Hugh Downs made a dream come true

Hugh Downs had just returned from skippering a chartered 65-foot ketch, the Thane, some 7000 miles. He had sailed her from Fort Lauderdale, Fla., through the Caribbean and the Panama Canal, across the Pacific to Papeete, Tahiti, with way stops at the Galápagos and other islands. It wasn't exactly the equivalent of Columbus's first voyage; yet it wasn't every day that a television personality of Downs' stature performed such a feat, and the press gathered in NBC's Rockefeller Center offices to hear all about it.

Why? was the first question.

"It was a dream of mine," Downs answered, still bearded and tanned from his odyssey. "It was **continued**

not a life-long dream. I had never thought of crossing the ocean under my own steam until I'd done some navigation. But this whetted my appetite, and it would not be satisfied until I'd tackled the whole ocean."

Then too, there was the wish of many stars to "get away from it all," to "re-establish anonymity," as Downs put it. But in his case it proved almost too easy, as he learned once he got far enough away from Fiftieth and Sixth. "On one island," he related, "a group of women from Iowa chatted with me and they didn't know who I was, which gave me a flick of alarm. I began to wonder whether, if I took off my beard, they'd know who I was."

First mate on the Downs crew was H. R., Hugh's 20-year-old son. Downs' wife Ruth and daughter Deirdre, 16, did not make the voyage. Mrs. Downs joined the male contingent in Panama, and again in Tahiti, along with Deirdre, for the trip home. "My wife sailed the Canal with us," Downs said, "but stayed away from the ocean. She's not such a good sailor."

Did Hugh Downs get what he was after? He did—long sunny days at sea, visits to exotic islands, his soughtafter "anonymity," and a goodly share of adventure, even a share of "misadventure." Several times the Thane was hit by storms, and once Downs fell overboard. "It was the closest I've ever been to death," he said.

He had gone on deck during rough weather to smoke a cigar. It was dark and suddenly, he said, "the boat went out from under me. I must have grabbed the lifeline as I fell, for I found myself in the water hanging on for dear life. I got a leg over the railing and crewmen pulled me in. It all happened so fast that when I got on board my cigar was still lit."

Downs also never had time to become frightened. "It wasn't until I went below to my bunk and started to think about it that I began to toss and turn and shake," he said.

OF ATTENTION

Alice Pearce is becoming a celebrity as a witch's nosy neighbor

Customers coming into Pesha's Framing Studio, a tiny, cluttered shop in West Hollywood, are sometimes puzzled when they see the proprietor's wife. Their expressions say, "Haven't I seen you some place before?" But increasingly they recognize her instantly as Alice Pearce—or, rather, Gladys Kravitz, the nosy neighbor of Elizabeth Montgomery in *Bewitched*.

Miss Pearce, who has spent most of her career playing uncouth, unattractive characters—from the cold-plagued Lucy Schmeeler in "On the Town" to a strident mother shrieking, "Chester! You didn't brush your teeth!" in a toothpaste commercial—is actually a quiet, gentle lady of impeccable background, genteel upbringing and artistic bent. Pesha's Framing Studio is a profitable avocation for her and her husband, actor-director Paul Davis, who changed his name from Pesha Darshefsky.

Alice Pearce did not change her name. The daughter of a banker, now retired, she asked her father's permission to use the family name professionally. He agreed, although neither he nor her mother has ever entirely approved of Alice's acting. Today, after a dozen Broadway shows and as many Hollywood movies and television programs, Alice says, "My mother still hopes I will give up my idea of going into the theater." Concerning her being drawn to the theater in the first place, she says, "The reasons are probably so complex that we wouldn't even *want* to know them." But in Alice Pearce's case it was probably the story of the shy, lonely, plain little girl—and, like many actresses, an only child—who found in the theater an extension of her own fantasies, and the applause and recognition she needed.

Her father was sent to Europe to manage his bank's affairs there when Alice was only 18 months old, and the family lived over the years in Brussels, Antwerp, Rome and Paris. Alice says, "I never had much contact with other children, so I lived most of the time in a fantasy world." When she was 8 years old, in Brussels, she starred in a school production of Molière's "Le Malade Imaginaire." From that moment on, she knew she wanted to be an actress.

At 15, she was sent back to New York, her birthplace, to boarding school. She went on to Sarah Lawrence College, where she majored in drama, spending vacations with her parents in Europe. Now she says, "It's not good to go to Europe when you're young. When I was there, I wanted most of all to go to the drug store and have a soda, and I couldn't."

After receiving her A.B. from Sarah Lawrence, she worked in a summer theater in Maine, painting scenery and making intermission coffee. Back in New York again, she made the rounds of the agencies with no success, finally going to work at Macy's selling bloomers. Although continued

she says, "I always wanted to be part of a shop," she does not remember this part of her life pleasantly, and now, in Pesha's Framing Studio, she says, "I don't try to impose my taste on customers. I like a plain gold frame but, of course, that isn't at all good for the business."

Pesha is her second husband. They were married on Sept. 20, 1964, and have recently bought a small home but with a studio—above the Sunset Strip. "It's the first real home I've ever had," Alice says. "I never even knew about a garden." Her first husband, songwriter John Rox, composer of "It's a Big Wide Wonderful World," died suddenly in 1957, nine years after their marriage. Concerning the tragedy, she says, "If I hadn't been working, I would have lost my sanity."

There probably isn't an actress who has worked more steadily. After selling bloomers at Macy's and doing a season of summer stock, she got her first important break in "On the Town," in which she played Lucy Schmeeler on Broadway and in the motion picture. Then came a tour with Tallulah Bankhead in "Private Lives," and leading roles in "Look, Ma, I'm Dancin'" and "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes." More Broadway shows and movie roles followed, as the "Alice Pearce type" became known and in demand. When director William Asher needed a neighbor for Miss Montgomery in Bewitched, she got the job.

She likes the job, her first series role. "I like earthy parts," she says. "They're a rebellion against my background." But most of all—like the homely little girl in Brussels long ago—she seems to like the recognition, of a sort she never received in all the years of plays and movies. Now people come into the frame shop and recognize her, and their faces light up and they say, "Won't you come to our house and hang the pictures?"

Rendezvous: Nothing television accomplished in its superb coverage of last week's Gemini rendezvous could possibly compare with the prodigious achievement of our men in space and the wizards on the ground who brought them together. Still, with every new space adventure, television introduces some new wrinkles that improve its service to the Nation's viewers. The principal innovation this time was telecasting of live transmissions, via Early Bird satellite, from the recovery ship in the Atlantic. Considered realistically, spacejourney telecasts are still basically radio shows, embellished with ingenious simulations of the various stages of the flights. Every time out, however, we move a step closer to the day-and it can't be far offwhen television cameras will be with the astronauts all the way.

Viewer's Complaint: One influential viewer of Johnny Carson's Tonight Show has a complaint. Robert E. Lee, a member of the Federal Communications Commission, told an interviewer a few days ago: "I don't want to say anything against Carson. He's a great talent. But there have been four or five incidents on his show over the past year which would raise some eyebrows." Describing himself as a frequent Tonight Show watcher, Lee added: "I'm not a prude. In fact I'm one of the greatest dirtystory tellers in town... but I do feel

that late-night shows are getting pretty close to the line of indecency." Carson, Tonight producer Art Stark and NBC brass rallied to the show's defense. Carson: "Sometimes people just get caught up in things and say something that they shouldn't have. They usually wish they hadn't afterward. I've done it myself." Stark: "Any freewheeling, ad-lib show tends to spill over sometimes. I think, in the main, the show is really kept within the bounds of good taste." When Lee's FCC colleagues were asked to comment, most of them replied that they were asleep when The Tonight Show was on the air.

Realignment: On Dec. 13 NBC broke its silence and issued an official announcement clarifying somewhat Robert E. Kintner's status: Kintner, now president of NBC, will move up to the chairmanship Jan. 1. At the same time, Walter D. Scott will be promoted to president and "chief executive officer," Julian Goodman to senior executive vice president and Don Durgin to president of NBC's television network. This alignment, insiders say, is temporary; Kintner is expected to leave in March or Aprilfor reasons which have yet to be revealed-with Scott replacing him as chairman and Goodman becoming NBC president.-Henry Harding.

No doubt, being a STAR is FUN, FUN, FUN

Only trouble:

John Forsythe keeps forgetting his status,

and few remind him

In the noisy commissary at Universal City Studios on the other side of the Hollywood hills a few weeks ago, John Forsythe eyed the lunch menu and said hungrily: "What I'd like is a *rare* hamburger." But what he ordered, with a touch of regret, was a *medium* rare hamburger.

Nobody has ever told John Forsythe that this is not how a star behaves. What a star wants, a star gets. And John Forsythe is a star. A big star. For five years he was Bachelor Father to a growing-up niece; now he's bachelor father to a whole school of girls in the new half-hour NBC color comedy, *The John Forsythe Show*. He owns half the show. He is 47 years old and looks 10 or 12 years younger. He has a handsome, healthy, happy family that adores him, even if his daughters, Page, 14, and Brooke, 11, think his jokes are corny. He is well-read, hip to the latest in music and art. He can converse with equal fluency on politics (he's a liberal) and baseball (recently he won a \$10 bet that he could name the lineup of the 1930 Philadelphia Athletics, including the four starting pitchers). He knows good wines. He lives in posh Bel Air. He is on the board of trustees of the exclusive girls' school his daughters attend. He even has had a mild ulcer.

In short, he is a star, with all the star's trappings, and he ought to be able, by gosh, to want his meat rare and have it rare. But medium rare is as far as he'll go. John Forsythe comes close to being the Walter Mitty of show business.

Not a true Walter Mitty. Mitty could never have been a star. Forsythe is. It's just that it keeps slipping his mind, and everyone else's as well. Peter Kortner. continued

tweedy young producer of *The John Forsythe Show*, says: "The biggest compliment I can pay John is that after five minutes you forget he is an actor."

Forsythe's wife, Julie Warren, a former actress and singer, says of her husband: "John is a controlled personality." The Forsythes have been married for 22 years. Forsythe is about as opposite to a bachelor as a man can be. "Flitting from flower to flower can be very wearing," he says. Then he adds hastily: "I think."

What he denies himself

This is how "controlled" a personality John Forsythe is:

"What I'd really like is a sports car," he says. "But it would look so show-offy." Instead, he settles for a near-sports car, a Thunderbird.

And: "I don't have to diet—" Forsythe is a trim 180 pounds, a shade over 6 feet tall—"but my wife is always dieting. You know women. So I find myself dieting, too. No potatoes with that hamburger, please." He loves potatoes.

And: "My secret desire is sailing. But I have the sailor's problem—a wife. Julie hates sailing." Recently Forsythe bought a 30-foot sloop. Julie made it clear he had to get rid of either boat or wife. Boat went. Forsythe sold it to a close friend. "Now I sail with him," he says, in some small triumph. Very small.

And finally: "Tve never seen John take the heat," says actor Guy Marks, who plays Forsythe's side-kick on the new show. Marks is a stand-up comic who speaks a vivid side-of-the-mouth argot. "We go to the track every Sattidy. Nothin' rattles him. Nothin' makes him take the heat. We both had the same horse in the last race the other day. The horse led wire to wire. Then he got nosed out at the finish. I blew up. Forsyte—" which is how Marks says it—"just smiled and said, 'Good night.' Nothin' ever bothers him."

Marks is not quite the person to see for an objective estimate of Forsythe. Marks will say of Forsythe: "There is vintage here. He's like a bottle of wine that is aging beautifully. And we are not down to the last drop of good nectar. Far from it. It tastes just beautiful. I told a writer in San Francisco that John is like a fine thread of silk. I should a told the writer about the vintage wine. He'd of appreciated it more."

So how did John Forsythe age this way?

He was born the son of a Wall Street junior executive on Jan. 29, 1918, in Carney's Point, N.J., then a town of 300 persons across the river from Wilmington, Del.

The Forsythes moved to New York when John was 6, and thence to the Connecticut suburbs. Forsythe vaguely wanted to become a writer, and more particularly a sportswriter. In summers he worked at Ebbets Field, the old home of the Brooklyn Dodgers, doing the field announcing. You know, "Now pitching for the Dodgers, Van Lingle Mungo." It was during this time Forsythe saw an image destroyed. Babe Ruth joined the Dodgers, as a coach, in 1938, and the first day the Babe came down to the dugout, young wide-eyed Forsythe edged up close to his long-time idol. Ruth promptly burped delicately and then proceeded to explain how in 1927, when he was hitting 60 home runs for the Yankees, he rarely showed up at the Yankee Stadium unless he had six or seven belts of booze. "I was crushed," says Forsythe. But then Ruth was never a controlled personality.

From here, Forsythe got jobs in such radio soap operas as "Helen Trent" and "Stella Dallas." "I played the weak young brother who was always killed in auto accidents," he says, which is quintessential John Forsythe.

He joined the Air Corps when World War II broke out, spending most of his time in Moss Hart's "Winged Victory." He married Julie Warren in 1943.

Forsythe was a charter member of Actors Studio in New York, and his career started to prosper. He replaced Arthur Kennedy in Arthur Miller's searing drama "All My Sons," hating every minute of it. "I had to hit my father and curse my mother. Every night when it was over I'd collapse." Forsythe says he is by inclination a comedian, with absolutely no desire to play Hamlet. "Doing tense emotional scenes sets my teeth on edge. Comedy exhilarates me." Comedy so exhilarates him these days that when he gets home from the studio, he has one drink, eats supper, and collapses by 9.30

Fills in for Fonda

He again filled in, this time for Henry Fonda, in the title role of "Mister Roberts," and then starred in "Teahouse of the August Moon" for almost two years. Warner Brothers brought him to Hollywood, where in 1956 the motion picture exhibitors voted him one of the top 10 new stars. He was by then 38 years old; he'd been acting for nearly 20 years.

Movies never were Forsythe's dish of tea. "I always had the feeling I was stealing something," he says. While making "The Trouble with Harry," director Alfred Hitchcock said to Forsythe: "Let's go see the dailies." The dailies are the unedited film of each day's shooting.

The idea appalled Forsythe. "I can't," he said. "It makes me all wet."

"My boy," Hitchcock lectured grandly, "this is not a business. It's a game. And we are the most grossly overpaid players in the world. Don't take yourself so seriously."

Though Forsythe has tried to absorb the lesson, he has been only partly successful. When Forsythe got together with Peter Kortner and NBC and Universal City bigwigs to plan the current show, the question of title came up. The series deals with an Air Force major-Forsythe-who suddenly inherits from a wealthy aunt an all-girls' school in San Francisco. Such early titles as The Major and the Minors and The Mr. and the Misses were eventually vetoed. It was then suggested the show simply be The John Forsuthe Show, After all, that's what it is, even though he is backed up by such performers as Elsa Lanchester, Ann B. Davis and Guy Marks.

"I was terrified," Forsythe relates. "It was such a huge responsibility. I never realized before that I was the works."

But *The John Forsythe Show* it is, and, audiences willing, it will be for some time. And after that?

"When this series is over," Forsythe says earnestly, "what I'd like to do is become a sportscaster. ABC offered me a job doing color broadcasts of sporting events—golf tourneys, skiing, track meets. That's what I want to do."

He wants to do it so ardently that when ABC offered him the job before *The John Forsythe Show* was launched, he reluctantly turned it down. Actually, he says, "My wife and agent—in that order—nixed it."

And so he will continue doing this sort of work, a "grossly overpaid" player who wants very much to believe it is a game, but who has had an ulcer to disprove it. For this is John Forsythe, one of the more deft comedians in the industry, a star who lacks the bigness of stardom, the expansiveness, the sweeping gesture, the carefree manner, the flamboyance, the zest and gusto of a star. He is, instead, a man who is terrified because that is his name on the title of his show, and now he must sink or swim on his own.

Even the camel was temperamental

What happened when they made an electric knife commercial in the desert so the audience would get the point

In Sahara's 125-degree heat, white-shirted Tony Russo directs camel and rider.

Problem: how to film a 70-second commercial in color for television which will bring home to viewers' minds—whammo—that a cordless electric knife will cut food anywhere, any time, miles away from the nearest electrical outlet.

Solution: "We go to this big desert, see, and we have this sheik ride up on his camel. He gets off, rubs an Aladdin's lamp, and poof—a whole tableload of food appears right in front of him. He rubs it again, and poweee there's an electric knife in his hand. So he makes himself a sandwich."

And that, heaven help us, is just what they did, though it wasn't all that easy.

Tony Russo (hatted and whiteshirted in the picture above), a producer for an advertising agency handling the General Electric cordless knife account, left the U.S. for Paris one day last June. There he picked up some French technicians and flew on to Rabat, in Morocco.

They proceeded to Casablanca, where they met actor Brad Forrest, who had flown from Paris specifically for the job. They bought tomatoes, cheese, bread, meat, and lettuce to use in the film, and moved on to Azemmour, 45 miles distant. But the landscape around Azemmour just wasn't right somehow, so they threw away the food, which had spoiled, and drove south to Marrakech, 135 miles away. The desert still didn't suit them, but they paused to film some background and buy more food before heading across the Grand Atlas Mountains to Ouarzazate. Still no decent desert.

From there it was onward continued

across the Anti-Atlas Mountains to Zagora. Russo and his party set up headquarters in that town and before dawn drove south for three hours into the Sahara. At an Arab army base along the way, they rented a camel and trainer for use in the film.

Finally, they found a great, rolling seascape of sand where no electrical outlet could even be *imagined*. Quickly, they set up the camera, dressed their actor in Arab robe and headgear, and prepared to shoot.

The camel, however, had other ideas. He growled, snarled, refused to be mounted, and gave every indication of not wanting to appear in a TV commercial. Around 8 A.M., when the sun was high, a caravan hove into view, and the intrepid film makers rented a second camel—fortunately, a more stage-struck one—and managed to complete their long shot.

Now the problem was to get the close-up of all that yummy food, and the cordless knife cutting it. The temperature was hanging around 125 degrees; Brad Forrest, the actor impeccable in his sheik costume from the waist up, where the camera was focused—stood in his undershorts to achieve the greatest possible ventilation. (See picture, preceding page.)

Out came the food from the cooler, and onto an inlaid table propped up on stilts to camera height. But while the camera was being made ready the food was spoiling. Tomatoes began shriveling and bursting in the heat; the lettuce turned black; and a block of cheese simply collapsed in a shapeless, gooey mess.

No matter how fast they worked, the sun worked faster. After three hours of sweaty frustration, Russo and his men gave up. They went back to Zagora. From there they made their way back to Paris.

Was the whole expedition for naught? Nay. In a park called Ermenon Ville, a few miles outside Paris, Russo found a small replica of a Moroccan village and even a patch of sand which looked quite like the Sahara.

So they rounded up some more food, hired another actor, hauled out their inlaid table and shot the close-up without a hitch. Later they spliced this to the long shot, made in the Sahara.

Total cost of the operation: \$20,000.



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Answer to last week's puzzle

Those journalistic Jeremiahs, the television critics, are at it again.

Every fall they dutifully squat in front of their TV sets, gaze upon the networks' new programs, shake their heads sadly and trudge over to their typewriters to spread the word that the newly arrived television season is the worst ever.

You'd think that by now the critics would have run out of ways to say that television has hit a new low. But no, they're a resourceful, plucky group. This year they are in especially fine voice. Listen to them:

"The new television season is fulfilling its promise. It promised to be dismal, and it is proceeding along those lines."—P. M. Clepper, St. Paul Dispatch

"The vast wasteland seems to have been reactivated as a landslide of mediocrity."—Bert J. Reesing, Cleveland Plain Dealer "Last season and the year before almost seem like the golden age of television by comparison."—C. J. Skreen, Seattle Times

"From our vantage point, last season was the worst in recent years. This season must go down as being even more tragic."—Del Carnes, Denver Post

"With a few exceptions, the new entries of the 1965-66 season make the good old days of the roller derbies and professional wrestling seem positively scintillating."—Cynthia Lowry, Associated Press

"The disaster has been almost total, the greatest conglomeration of perfunctory tripe that has reached the home screen in many a September." —Jack Gould, New York Times

The unanimity of opinion about the season-as-a-whole, however, is not carried over into the critics' reviews of individual shows. We sampled the writings of more than 40 daily-newspaper reviewers in all parts of the country. Each of them found at least a few new series that weren't "tripe." But no show received unanimous approval. For that matter, no show was panned by all of our critics either, though several came close and, over-all, there were considerably more unfavorable reviews than favorable.

F Troop, with more than 80 percent of the critics in its corner, scored best in our survey, followed closely by another military comedy, The Wackiest Ship in the Army. Then come The Dean Martin Show, Trials of O'Brien, I Spy and Get Smart! Not far behind, rounding out the critics' Top 10, are The Big Valley, Hogan's Heroes, The Loner and The Steve Lawrence Show.

The wild slapstick of *F Troop* was appreciated by some of the most hardto-please reviewers. John Horn of the New York Herald Tribune wrote: "It's a surprise, a healthy protest and a lot of laughs." Lawrence Laurent of the Washington Post: "*F Troop* is a genuinely funny TV show." Donald Freeman, San Diego Union: "I may be soft in the head, but I laughed at *F Troop*." But a few harder-headed types remained unmoved. "Too far out," said the Chicago Sun-Times' Paul Molloy. "Everybody presses just a little too hard," complained Percy Shain of the Boston Globe.

As for Wackiest Ship, Bernie Harrison of the Washington Star spoke for the majority when he said that the series "got off the ground with one of the best introductory shows I've seen in a long time." A minority report was submitted by, among others, Jack Anderson of the Miami Herald, who called the program "rudderless."

Reactions to Dean Martin's opening show seemed to depend on how susceptible the reviewers were to the special brand of charm dispensed by Martin and his clique. Most critics agreed with Jerry Coffey of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, who enjoyed the "amiably sloppy hour of music and in-group therapy." But a few were not captivated. Harry Harris of the Philadelphia Inquirer, for one, denounced Martin's "contempt for the viewing audience."

Those who like Trials of O'Brien really like it. "The best of all the new offerings," wrote Anthony La Camera of the Boston Record American. "The slickest show of all 33," agreed another Bostonian, Eleanor Roberts of the Traveler. "It's a great show," said Denver's Del Carnes. On the other hand, those critics who don't like Trials of O'Brien share peculiar symptoms. "The whole show left a bad taste in my mouth," said Terrence O'Flaherty of the San Francisco Chronicle. And 3000 miles away his New York alter ego, Ben Gross of the Daily News, was similarly afflicted: "[O'Brien's] shady manipulations leave a bitter taste in the mouth," he wrote.

Get Smart!'s supporters, like O'-Brien's, were wildly continued

enthusiastic. Bob Smith, Chicago Daily News: "Get Smart! is easily the wildest, funniest new show of the season." Bob Trimble, Fort Worth Press: "The year's funniest and best show." Larry Wolters, Chicago Tribune: "The funniest and brightest show of this incredible season." Forrest Powers, Minneapolis Star: "One of the funniest shows I've ever seen on television." But there's one in every crowd—Dick Gray, Atlanta Journal: "It wasn't very funny."

"The Big Valley," wrote Rick Du Brow, United Press International, "is a great big brawling, lusty, rich-looking, blood-and-thunder Western." Bob Smith's minority opinion, though, was coated with acid. Said Chicago's Smith: "I heartily recommend Big Valley to anyone who likes to watch people getting beaten up and shot." Hogan's Heroes, too, found the critics in sharp disagreement, though most of them wrote favorable reviews. For example, Fairfax Nisbet's in the Dallas Morning News: "It is delightfully implausible, but so hilariously funny and full of surprises." But several were severely critical of the POWcamp humor. "I consider it distinctly sick," said Henry Mitchell of the Memphis Commercial Appeal.

Reactions to The Loner and The Steve Lawrence Show, the last two entries in the critics' Top 10, were less impassioned. "The Loner is a series with strong potential," reported Minneapolis's Forrest Powers. "A hokey affair throughout," dissented Hal Humphrey in the Los Angeles Times. Walter Dutton of the Los Angeles Times found The Steve Lawrence Show "a highly enjoyable hour"; but Ann Hodges of the Houston Chronicle rated it "a mild disappointment."

Two shows—O.K. Crackerby! (subsequently canceled) and Honey West —also received a few more yeas than nays from the critics. The other 21 new series, however, all batted less than .500 in the critics' league, though The Long, Hot Summer, Lost in Space and The Wild. Wild West did come close to breaking even. The Long, Hot Summer, in particular, had some very ardent enthusiasts. C. J. Skreen in Seattle went so far as to predict that it "quite probably will rank as the major hit of this television season." But the views of Eleanor Roberts in Boston ("racy, titillating trash") and Jack Gould in New York ("It is for those who savor dark sex and violence in surface characterizations") were more representative.

Those who panned Lost in Space and The Wild, Wild West did so with gusto. UPI's Rick Du Brow on Space: "It's like a live-action cartoon, complete with robot which goes around shouting 'Destroy, destroy,' and which may or may not be one of the show's writers." Terrence O'Flaherty on West: "President Grant has all the laugh lines."

Toward bottom of barrel

As we head down toward the bottom of the reviewers' barrel, we find Run for Your Life ("Unless things improve, euthanasia will be dramatically. if not morally, justified"-O'Flaherty), Green Acres ("If you hated Beverly Hillbillies and if you despised Petticoat Junction, you're going to loathe Green Acres"-Bob Smith), A Man Called Shenandoah ("Headed for TV's Boot Hill, and the sooner the better"--Kay Gardella, New York News); and Mister Roberts ("Nothingsville"-Vince Leonard, Pittsburgh Press).

Then come Laredo ("Just another saddle-worn banality"—Dick Hoffmann, Chicago's American), The Smothers Brothers Show ("How could two brothers have done this to each other?"—Anthony La Camera), Convoy ("Should have been torpedoed" -Millie Budd, Houston Post) and Please Don't Eat the Daisies ("It is not funny"-John Horn).

Which brings us to the lowest depths of the new season—the 10 new programs which were most warmly roasted by the critics. They are (we're still moving down toward the bottom of the list): I Dream of Jeannie ("Drivel"—Don Freeman), Gidget ("A bad movie has become an idiotic TV series"—Lawrence Laurent), My Mother, the Car ("It is horrid"—Bert Reesing), Camp Runamuck ("How bad can a show get?"—Barbara Tiritilli, Chicago's American) and The FBI ("Melodramatic swill"—Laurent).

Continuing downward: Mona Mc-Cluskey ("Unrelieved disaster"—Bob Trimble), Tammy ("Sugary enough to bring on an epidemic of diabetes" —Barbara Tiritilli), The Legend of Jesse James ("A bore on the draw"— Gould), Hank ("The show needs help, and so do the people who put it together"—Bernie Harrison) and The John Forsythe Show ("Forget it"— Will Jones, Minneapolis Tribune).

Despite this storm of critical abuse. even these 10 orphans managed to find at least one reviewer who had something nice to say. Paul Jones of the Atlanta Constitution wrote: "Of the new shows I have seen on pilot film. I rate I Dream of Jeannie as the most delightful." Fort Worth's Bob Trimble enjoyed My Mother, the Car: "Surprisingly enough, it is funny." Mona McCluskey was "a lot of fun" for Aleene MacMinn of the Los Angeles Times. New York's Ben Gross labeled Hank "a show packed with pleasant comedy." Dick Gray The FBI: "Last night's said of opener moved faster than any other hour all week." And San Francisco's Terrence O'Flaherty loved Camp Runamuck: "I found the première to be the funniest show of the season."

As usual the newspaper critiques don't seem to have had any significant effect on the success or failure of the new shows. This is no surprise to the critics. Every year they see their favorites—Slattery's People, The Rogues, East Side/West Side, The Richard Boone Show, Playhouse 90, et al.—get shot down by the public and the networks, while the likes of Gilligan's Island, The Beverly Hillbillies, Peyton Place and Petticoat Junction survive withering reviews and continue to darken their TV screens season after season.

Of this year's new shows, F Troop, Get Smart! and Hogan's Heroes, which rated high with the critics, also stand tall in Nielsen's ratings. But Trials of O'Brien. The Wackiest Ship in the Army. The Loner and The Steve Lawrence Show, which the critics also campaigned for, are not doing at all well in the polls (CBS has already discontinued the Lawrence show), while A Man Called Shenandoah, Green Acres, I Dream of Jeannie, Laredo and The Legend of Jesse James, all dismissed contemptuously by most of the critics, have scored well in the early ratings.

Area of agreement

Still, the reviewers can derive some satisfaction from the news that most viewers agree with their low opinion of a number of shows. Convoy, for one, has been canceled. And Camp Runamuck, Mister Roberts, Mona Mc-Cluskey, Tammy, The John Forsythe Show, Gidget, Hank and My Mother, the Car all are suffering from a most serious disease, tired ratings.

What our critics' survey adds up to, then, is this: The reviewers, this year as in the past, are united in their despair over the state of television, but they reserve the right to disagree with each other about which shows are less abominable than which other shows. And viewers reserve the right —and exercise it freely—to ignore the critics' opinions (including our own critic's) completely.

'Fellow Americans...'

Susan Seaforth, now acting in a soap opera, would rather run for Congress

Most Hollywood starlets seek the traditional rewards of their labors: a closetful of mink, their name in fluorescent paint on bumper stickers, frequent comparison with Jean Harlow, and a swimming pool shaped like a dollar sign. Not so Susan Seaforth, 22-year-old veteran of some 100 TV shows. She wants to run for Congress.

Before reeling backward in total disbelief, consider the supportive findings. Last year Susan (1) went to Washington to testify before the House Judiciary Committee on behalf of prayer, (2) addressed the Platform Committee of the Republican National Convention, (3) stumped several states with the sons of Presidential candidate Goldwater and (4) worked for the election of Sen. George Murphy.

And she numbers among her friends Sen. Strom Thurmond, Barry M. Goldwater (her study holds a framed letter) and Peter Lawford, no stranger to political doings—who also happens to be executive producer of the movie "Billie," in which Susan plays big sister to Patty Duke.

She made the trip to Washington in May 1964 with fellow Hollywoodians Victor Jory and Coleen Gray as a part of "Project Prayer," an attempt to get a constitutional amendment permitting prayer in public schools. Susan may not have accomplished her mission, but she certainly managed plenty of publicity. She insists, however, "I do these things because I believe in them. I was surprised when the wire services covered."

As for her appearance before the Republican Platform Committee—well, she sort of appeared. Many meetings were held in San Francisco, many of them in hotel rooms. Susan appeared at such a meeting before a segment of the Platform Committee to do some pleading for her favorite cause, prayer,

Later, at a Goldwater rally, she met Barry Jr. and Mike Goldwater, and ended up stumping California, Louisiana, Missouri, Michigan, Colorado and New York.

Things Susan has undertaken strictly for "publicity" have not always worked out so well. In 1963 the cosmetologists and beauticians made her a "Deb Star." "Didn't do a thing for me," says Susan. And a motorcycle ride to the Academy Award ceremonies in a full-length brocaded evening gown wasn't very fruitful either. Press and television cameras ignored her.

But then Susan does everything in a less than usual way. Instead of dating leading men, she prefers attorneys, an archeologist, stuntmen, wranglers and a policeman.

When Susan was born in San Francisco, her mother, actress Elizabeth Harrower, is reputed to have said on first sight of her child, "She's lovely, now bring me mine." Which may account for quite a lot. When Susan was 2, her mother divorced her father and moved to Los Angeles, where she eventually put Susan (at the age of 5) in show business. She made her first real impression at 11 in a *Lassie* segment which required her to feed some tainted meat to a dog. Her press agent still maintains that this led to her being hated by American children.

Only later did she adopt what friends call her "Miss Liberty stance." Even now she marches in Fourth of July parades the way some people do their morning isometrics. She and her mother live with her 81-year-old grandmother in a house that is an architectural smörgäsbord of Old English, Viking and small-town U.S.A.

Meantime Susan is pretty busy acting. She plays Carol West in The Young Marrieds, a daytime soap opera. She also filmed a pilot with Edd (Kookie) Byrnes called Kissin' Cousins, which didn't make the grade.

They say this is the age of gimmicks on TV. If so, then Susan Seaforth is a shoo-in. What other Hollywood starlet wants to be Everett Dirksen when she grows up?


