


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#### as we see it

Schneider painted a lovely picture of television's future. It is a far different picture from that we see in radio, which long since has become fractionalized (several sets per home) and selective (there's a choice of many stations everywhere). In most areas these days, once you've heard the news, radio offers records, talking disc jockeys and very little else.

As for television's future, we keep thinking of the programs on the air in Los Angeles the week Schneider talked to the advertisers. In that city, where there are many multiple-set homes and 10 stations, nearly all the nonnetwork time was given over to hundreds of old movies and old TV series

Improvement and variety in programming will not just happen in television any more than they happened in radio. There must be planning. There must be direction. So far we have neither.



## 'I felt Hope and Hopelessness'

A TV news correspondent reports on her trip to Vietnam

I had expected the streets of Saigon to be full of barbed wire and tanks and soldiers and guns. So I was astonished to find, in the heart of downtown Saigon, stalls selling fresh flowers—flamboyant roses, ginger, jasmine, lotus blossoms the color of purple bruises.

To me, an NBC news correspondent assigned to Vietnam, Saigon was all paradox. The city is French in plan and French in architecture, with treelined boulevards and green squares. But the life on the streets is Asian. The pungent smell of nuoc-mam, a fermented fish sauce, pervades everything. There is a tangle of traffic and there are tawdry souvenirs to fool you into feeling like a tourist. But there are also grilles to guard against hand grenades in the restaurant where you're going to have lunch. And a sunny Sunday not long ago was shattered by the explosion of a land mine on a busy corner.

You have cocktails on the terrace of an American official's apartment. He shows you the bullet hole where a policeman shot at a Viet Cong who swung down over the roof last night, and he tells you that after the midnight curfew the Viet Cong clamber like cats over the roof tops of Saigon. Then you go inside for a candlelit dinner. . . . You can dine at a romantic roof-top restaurant. Soon it becomes a balcony seat for war—you see the fireworks and the red lines of tracers, and you hear the sounds of shelling from a battle three miles away.

On the eighth floor of the Caravelle Hotel, there is a bar where correspondents congregate. From about 6:30 P.M. on, the place is jammed. Only about half the men in sports shirts are journalists. The others are American soldiers. The Army encourages them to wear civilian clothes off duty, so it won't look as if these giant figures have taken over the country.

Most of them are helicopter pilots. They're hungry for someone to talk to. One of two very shy young men said one evening, "We're here on a three-day pass, ma'am. You'll never guess why." I couldn't. "Well, we made the first kill of the 1st Cav," he explained. "Funny, isn't it? You kill three Viet Cong and you get three days!" I remember that now, when the number of Viet Cong the 1st Cavalry have killed is in the hundreds—and so many of the 1st Cavalry have been killed. I wonder how these two have made out.

And the boy who was especially withdrawn and troubled one night. He'd had to kill a woman. He'd come down almost into the sampan to make sure she was aiming her rifle at him and was about to shoot. She was.

And the warrant officer who told me he couldn't write to his wife any more. "If I tell her the truth, she worries. If I write her sweet nothings, she doesn't believe me and she worries. All the girls in Columbus, Ga., do." When I returned, I phoned some of these wives. I couldn't tell them not to worry.

The Marines in Danang. They were grateful for someone to talk to, too. I spent most of my time there with the 9th Marines, and they were eagerly willing to be interviewed. In the long days between patrols, sitting in rain-soaked tents with floors of sand, anything was a diversion.

Alpha Company even forgave me for the reckless act into which the news "A woman's coming" precipitated them. They were so sure that any woman arriving there would be a num that they hastily tore down all their Playboy pin-ups.

I found the strange camaraderie among men-in-arms very touching and I was moved by the unembarrassed way in which they betrayed emotion about friends who'd been killed and wounded. They were calm about news of demonstrations against our policy in Vietnam. One young man summed up how continued

they felt: "Those guys just can't understand."

When you leave Saigon to go out into the provinces, you must go by plane, since the Viet Cong control almost all the roads. Tan Son Nhut Airport has a motley collection of commercial and military planes, one of which takes off or lands every 15 seconds. It is probably the world's most nerve-racking airport. One is not reassured by hearing an American pilot confess he has trouble understanding the English of the Vietnamese in the control tower.

You travel in whatever plane you can get. If you're lucky, it's one of the twin-engine Beechcraft, which are chartered by the U.S. mission. More often, it's a military craft. Maybe a helicopter—armed or "slick," as the unarmed ones are called. Or a C123 or a C130, the workhorses of the war.

#### Down on the Mekong Delta

When we had to spend several days in the Mekong Delta, we were billeted with a district chief, Captain Khai. The male members of the crew lived with four American military advisors in a sort of barracks, a stone's throw away from the chief's house. The men had invented a terrace from which to view the moon shining on the luxuriant foliage that borders the Mekong River, and had improvised a shower (I was truly grateful when they let me sneak over and use it).

I was housed in Captain Khai's large white concrete mansion. The ground floor was all office. It was there early one morning that Captain Khai interrogated 12 Viet Cong who, Intelligence had told him, had come into the village with two land mines intended to blow up the new beloved generator. Later, they were taken off to the near-by jail. These land mines weren't discovered. But three days

later, a road leading to the village was found to be mined.

The rooms on the second floor of Captain Khai's house all opened onto a long corridor that ran down one side-like compartments on a European train. The first room was the radio room, from which sounds blared all the time, even at night. Next came the dining room, one corner of it hung with blankets to give privacy to my canvas cot. Then there were three rooms in which Captain Khai, his wife and the four children still at home were disposed. At the very end there was a bathroom, with a basin and toilet, of which the family was very proud.

Captain Khai was a rotund, 40-year-old man with a dapper little mustache. He had fought with the French and he spoke French, and he had the quality of leadership. He was wise and brave in battle, and had won the respect of our advisors who fought with him and the regional troops. And he was wise and honest in his dealings with village and hamlet chiefs.

His wife was a frail, pretty little woman whose waist was hardly 18 inches around. She had once been a schoolteacher, but now she was a housewife and self-effacing to the point of being almost invisible. One of her children was at college, one in the army, and three little boys were at home. There also was a little girl so shy that she managed always to keep hidden behind her mother's flowing native dress.

The Khais belong to the Hoa Hao, a Buddhist sect. Outside their house was a curious shrine made of cast concrete and pebbles, with a bird like a phoenix and a dragon. It stood right next to the mortar . . . which, at this point in Vietnam's history, was more important. The house had been attacked by Viet Cong the night before we arrived.

The most optimistic time we had in Vietnam was with Captain Khai, visiting those "relatively secure" villages in his district where the people were voluble with pride in the schools and dispensaries they had built. These were places where our aid had done more than bring about physical things. It had generated leadership and responsibility and some sense of relationship to their government.

My assignment from NBC was as a noncombat correspondent. I went to see what war was doing to the Vietnamese people. I went to report on what was being done to accomplish the kind of social revolution which every developing nation wants, which the Communists falsely promise and without whose achievement the war would have no purpose.

I saw good things, like the accomplishments in Captain Khai's district and a refugee camp where local leadership was bringing benefits to the people. I saw horrible things, like the gruesome aftermath of war in the

civilian hospitals, where victims of the crossfire had walked or come in sampans or cycles, traveling 24 or 30 hours, shattered by tetanus-infected shrapnel or burned by bombs, I felt hope and hopelessness. Like my male colleagues, who were covering the other side of the war, I knew we couldn't abandon the Vietnamese. I knew the problems were monumental and it would take a long, long time to win this war.

People ask me if I was scared. Of course I was. Often. But most of the time I was so busy trying to see things and understand things, most of the time things were so intense, most of the time physical discomforts were so present that I forgot to be frightened. In some strange way I have been more scared since I've been home, looking back, than I was when I was in Vietnam. I hope I get over this feeling. There are at least a dozen more stories I'd like to go back and report.

## TO WHITNEY BLAKE.

ear Whit:

I hope you don't mind my calling you "Whit." It's the way you signed the Christmas card you sent me three years ago. That was when you were playing Hazel's mistress (you should pardon the expression) and before TV GUIDE ran the story I wrote about you. After the story appeared, there was a sudden coolness between us-no more Christmas cards. I thought it was a nice story, but I heard you were upset because I didn't take you seriously enough. For instance, I quoted Don DeFore, who played your husband, as saying your role reminded him of "a spectator at a tennis match"-vou just had to look back and forth while he and Shirley Booth did all the talking.

Well, as I don't have to tell you, they have a new girl in *Hazel* this season, and I'll be darned if I didn't get the assignment to do a story on her! Now I don't want to have *two* blondes mad at me, so I'm going to take this girl—her name is Lynn Borden—seriously if it kills me.

First of all, she got her start in that great incubator of acting talent, the Miss America beauty pageant at Atlantic City, which has already given us Rosemary LaPlanche, Bess Myerson, Lee Meriwether and Mary Ann Mobley. And Lynn Borden wasn't even Miss America—she was Miss Arizona and placed fifth ("fourth runner-up," is the way they put it) in the 1957 competition. At the time, she was a student at the University of Arizona, having moved to Tucson from her native Detroit, after a brief childhood stopover in Cleveland.

Miss Borden comes by her artistic

proclivities naturally: Her father—Bill Freyse—is the cartoonist who draws "Our Boarding House with Major Hoople." And that brings up an interesting coincidence.

Ted Key, who created the cartoon "Hazel," inspiration for the TV series, was once a writer. Years ago he did the screenplay for a proposed W. C. Fields movie in which the great comedian was to play Major Hoople.

In developing this project, Key worked with Lynn's father. When the movie project fell through, Key decided to become a cartoonist, and eventually created Hazel, which went on television, starring Shirley Booth and originally featuring you, Whit, but now featuring Lynn Borden, who was Lynn Freyse before she married a fellow student named Chris Borden in 1958.

By the way, Whit, the reason you were replaced in *Hazel* had nothing to do with your abilities as an actress, which I so unhappily failed to take seriously. According to the program's producer James Fonda, "At this point the show needed a change"; and after four years on the air, this was undoubtedly true. There were other reasons too, but they had nothing to do with you.

Shirley Booth—meaning no reflection, I am sure—says the change has "recharged our batteries." They have even given the new Mrs. Baxter more lines than you used to have; and a neighbor, played by Mala Powers, who was once Roxanne to José Ferrer's Cyrano, which should indicate something about serious acting.

Anyway, Lynn Borden did not reach her present eminence overnight or

without struggle. At college, where she majored in drama and psychology, she appeared in campus plays and got extra roles in Western movies shot at Tucson. In "Gunfight at the OK Corral," for instance, she rode horses for Rhonda Fleming and Jo Van Fleet. Lynn came to California during summer vacation in 1956 and stayed at the Hollywood Studio Club, where the aspiring young actresses live. She didn't manage to find work as an actress, but she did eat at the same Studio Club table as Barbara Eden, who now stars in I Dream of Jeannie. After college, she was a fashion model and appeared in TV commercials.

It was Lynn's love for drama and her capacity to rise above the crass

commercialism of her early televiwork that were indirectly responsible for her landing the role in Hazel. Last year, while she was San living in Francisco, where her husband was a disc jockey, she had an offer to go to New York to make some TV commercials. Her husband had no

objections. Lynn says, "Chris is behind me all the way"-unlike, she adds, "some men who won't even let their wives go out on modeling jobs." But she heard about a production of "Take Her, She's Mine," starring Walter Pidgeon, which was about to begin a run at a theater in Burlingame, Cal., near San Francisco. She realized that although she had done amateur theater, movies and TV, she had never done "a real professional play." So, despite the fact that "the money was fantastic," she decided to give up the sure thing represented by the New York commercials to try out for the play. After standing in line for four and a half hours, she got the role. It was while she was appearing in "Take Her. She's Mine" that she heard about the part in Hazel.

Today, with her husband, who is now filming TV documentaries, and a 12-year-old Labrador retriever named Duke, Lynn lives in a rented house above the Sunset Strip. In their spare time the Bordens enjoy the outdoors

-"we're not night people," she says. They are eager to have a family but meanwhile make do with the aforementioned Duke, whom they found lost on the desert in Arizona; plus a 1955 Mercedes-Benz 300 SL Gullwing, a 1910 American LaFrance fire truck and an ancient Rauch &

Lang Electric.

Lynn herself drives a 5-year-old Triumph, a gift from her husband-"the first car I ever really owned."

So that is it, Whit. Now that three years have gone by since that story, I hope you have forgiven me. But can you ever forgive Lynn Borden?



#### National

Whoops and Hoops: The unmistakable sound of crowing can be detected wherever the ABC crowd forgathers these days. The folks from what used to be called "the third network" are boasting that "the second season" has catapulted ABC into "first place" in the ratings race. They haven't started to shout it from the rooftops quite vet, but the mimeograph machines are working overtime, as ABC whoops it up about the new shows it introduced this month. "Batman and Blue Light overwhelmingly led their time periods," trumpeted the first bulletin. "Batman hits a 58.8 share on Thursday. No letdown in second night's viewing," was the breathless announcement the next day. And: "The Double Life of Henry Physe premiere hits 21 rating and 39.2 share." So it went, as the Arbitrons, Trendexes and 30-market Nielsens rolled in (the most crucial ratings-the national Nielsenshave not been published yet). Over at the other networks, meanwhile, they are muttering about "hula-hoop hits" and gamely predicting that after the novelty wears off, Batman and his "second season" side-kicks will come back down to earth.

Big Money: The largest cash prize since big-money quiz shows went out of style—\$50,000—awaits contestants in a new show which NBC hopes to get on the air later this season. This series, NBC is careful to point out, is not a

quiz show like those which disgraced television in the late-Fifties. The emphasis will be on physical, rather than mental, prowess. In the pilot show, for example, golfer Ken Venturi attempts to sink a tricky putt for \$500; if he makes it, he's invited back to double his money by performing a more difficult golf exploit—and so on, until the \$50,000 putt. Others in this episode are a woman ax thrower, an Army drill sergeant and a carpenter. The name of the big muscle show? The Big Money.

Dropouts: A pair of CBS comedy mainstays, Lucille Ball and Jackie Gleason, want to take at least one season off. Gleason's departure is definite. In a joint announcement, he and CBS said it was Gleason's decision—he wants "to take time out to develop new and exciting concepts for future projects" on CBS-TV. Lucy, however, is another matter. She insists she's through with the weekly TV grind for good, but CBS still hopes to change her mind.

New on Ch. 2: A half-hour series of Charlie Chaplin movies will debut on KTVU at 7 P.M., Feb. 13. Included are most of the comedian's two-reel silents and two longer films, "Tillie's Punctured Romance" and "The Gold Rush." Three movie debuts are scheduled for Feb. 13, 20 and 27 at 7:30 P.M.: "The Horse's Mouth," with Alec Guinness; "Billy Budd," with Terence Stamp, Peter Ustinov and Robert Ryan; and the semi-documentary war film "Pursuit of the Graf Spee."

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# PAISIES GROW BETTER WITH PEPPER

Pat Crowley adds the spice to her television show

was in a dressing room at MGM talking to Patricia Crowley one day not long ago. Which is one way of saying that I have a very good job.

Pat is a very beautiful girl, a lady who does not look like anyone else you have ever seen—not even the girl next door. She stands 5-feet, 5-inches tall and weighs 111 pounds but seems smaller.

She wore black-and-white checked slacks and a white blouse and an air of bland innocence. Her hair was kind of orangey-gold and her hazel eyes were luminous and moist. "They are moist because the doctor gave me some drops to put in them," Pat said.

"I am sort of scared," she said.
"I've been reading TV Gude and all
the people you talk about seem to be
in analysis. I'm not in analysis and
never have been so I don't know what
to talk about."

We mulled that a moment, and in the middle of the mull, Jeffrey Hayden, a director of *Please Don't Eat* the Daisies, which stars Pat Crowley, bounded into the room.

"Pow! Zam! KaZOW! That's the way it is with this show," he shouted, cried, vociferated.

"You know why? Because of Pat Crowley. And because of Mark Miller [her TV husband]. Everyone says, "They've got the greatest twins you've even seen and there's a shaggy dog and they have these other two great kids.' What they overlook is Pat and Mark. This show's got pizzazz—because of Pat and Mark."

"Don't listen to him," Pat said. "Jeff gets enthusiastic."

"What has Pat got?" I asked.

Jeff Hayden pursed his lips and nodded three or four times like a man who knows what he is talking about.

"Well, look at her—she's beautiful."
"Oh, stop, Jeff," Pat said.

"But what she really has is energy—stamina. And that's very hard to come by in a woman. It's a capacity for being in there all the time, giving it all, no matter what—when you're sick or tired or worried."

Pat: "You learn that on live TV."

"That's what the great ones have," Hayden continued. "They always perform at full strength, no matter what. And Pat has warmth, talent and . . ."

Whatever Pat Crowley has, the success of *Please Don't Eat the Daisies* depends on it, in large measure. So far, the show has not set the TV world aflame, but its ratings have been good enough to give it at least an even-money chance to continue.

Daisies almost foundered before it

got under way. Pat Crowley was fired and MGM made all kinds of racket about suing her for damages.

"Pat just refused to set foot on the lot until she had a contract in writing," says her husband, Edward Hookstratten, a Beverly Hills attorney. "The whole thing was handled by her agents and attorneys, and Pat was never directly involved. But she took a position and stuck to it.

"They wanted her to work continued



while her contract was worked out," he continued. "When she refused, they fired her. That was on Thursday. By Monday the contract was all set; she signed and went to work."

There was a story around that the row was caused by Pat's demand for her own hairdresser. "That was only a small part of the whole thing," Ed Hookstratten says, "and really not important. The important thing was to get the contract in writing."

"In a series, you can't hide what you are," says Paul West, the producer of the show. "Pat is a very kind person and there is a fine, girlish quality about her. We wanted a woman who thinks funny—not a comedienne—and that's a good description of Pat."

"Pat has been good on a lot of other shows," echoed Bob Stambler, associate producer, "but she's never really shown what she is. Now she's playing herself."

#### 'Herself' has been wed 8 years

"Herself" has been married eight years. She and Ed have two children, Jon, 7, and Ann, 4½. ("When your last name is Hookstratten, you give the children short names," Pat says.)

Ann is named for Pat's sister—now the wife of a Washington, D.C., physician—a very important woman in Pat's life. Pat says, "I got into the business almost by accident. Ann always led the way."

Ann was in "Carousel" in Chicago when Pat visited her and was given her first walk-on part. She was 10 years old, "I got bitten by the bug then," Pat says.

Pat and Ann were the only children of Vincent and Helen Crowley of Scranton, Pa. Her father was a section foreman in a coal mine. The family moved to New York when Pat was 7. "Mother always wanted us to

get out into the world and have opportunities, I think," Pat says.

"Because of Ann, I had it easy. Ann introduced me to the director who put me in 'Philadelphia Story' in Westport [Conn.]—my first big part."

Her first Broadway role was in "Southern Exposure," which was exposed for 20 performances. "I played a mature and hip woman of 23," Pat recalls, "and I was a fast 16. I was still in high school. But I was never really a child performer because I never gave up school. I was just on the stage or in live television during the summers."

Pat won the ingénue role opposite William Holden in "Forever Female" at Paramount. "It was a tremendous part and they were pushing me and the picture," Pat remembers. "There was an enormous amount of publicity—I really got a dunking. I was 18 then, and a young 18, and if it hadn't been for my parents, all that publicity might have gotten to me.

"My parents always told us not to let things like that get important. That was the first time I realized the value of the way our parents brought us up. I hope I do as well."

Unlike the general run of series performers who die of fatigue each and every day, Pat finds a half-hour show easy to take. "Everyone told me how tired I was going to be, but it hasn't been bad yet," she says. "I get home and I'm not tired at all. I could dance all night."

She does dance from time to time at The Daisy, a private discothèque. "Ed won't dance," she says, "but I can usually find someone who will."

Pat and Ed met when she was appearing in "Kiss Me, Kate" in Los Angeles in 1957, and were married within the year. Now they live in a pleasant four-bedroom house in Benedict Canyon in Beverly Hills. "We wanted a level lot where the kids could play and a neighborhood where there were lots of children. There

must be 25 children on our block—but it's a big block.

"We go for walks on Sunday, and last Sunday it took us four hours just to get around the block. We stopped and talked and swam in three different pools."

I spent most of two days with Pat, watching her work and talking to her between times. She was embarrassed when I asked what kind of a car she drove. "I was afraid you'd ask that. I had a little station wagon which I liked just fine, but Ed thought I ought to have a heavier car since I have to drive to the studio alone. You know what it is—it begins with 'C'—and it's black inside and black outside. A regular fortress. I'm still self-conscious about it."

#### Money is not motivation

Pat is deeply involved with her husband, children and home but she welcomes the chance to practice her craft. "Money was not my motivation for taking the series, although they are very generous to me," Pat says.

"She's got the best residuals in the

business," Ed added.

"Ed knows I enjoy the theater and enjoy working," Pat went on, "and the children are used to the idea that I work."

Pat gave me a funny-surprised look when I asked, "Is the marriage going to last?"

"It sure is," she said. "We are Catholics and there is a little solidity there."

I thought of her many years in the theater. "What was the best thing you ever did?" I asked. "What was your finest hour?'

"The first baby," Pat said. "That was the most marvelous thing. You can read all about it and hear all about it, but suddenly there you are. They hand you your baby and you realize you've done something pretty grand."

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# Oh, the sheer jollity

A housewife shares her recipe for fame and fortune

Want to burst into fame via a television commercial? Want to feel that indescribable "bang" at first seeing yourself on a television screen? Want to feel the sheer jollity of all the phone calls from all the people you've ever known, coming to you directly after you've been flashed on their sets? Want to experience the ego-building reaction that makes you conclude—"Gee, maybe I am talented!"

Well, I have stumbled on the formula for a successful TV commercial, and I say, "Heigh-ho! Let's all rake in those residuals." Here it is—the recipe that brought me fame, fun, residuals.

First you have to have a daughter who goes out-of-town to college and meets a boy who wants to marry her. Then you have to have parents who live out of town but will fly in a few days before the wedding. Next you must take an automobile and your daughter to the airport to pick them up. It is important that you be at the airport about a half hour before the plane's scheduled arrival.

A most essential ingredient at this point is your daughter's hunger, so that she will insist on going into the coffee shop for a sandwich. You, on the other hand, must be so anxious to be right at the gate the moment the parents' plane lands, that you crankily say, "Oh, Jane! I'll go only on the condition that we sit at the counter where I can have a cup of coffee quickly and leave if the plane lands—even if you are not finished." Your Jane must agree.

So then you sit at the counter, order, and your coffee comes quickly.

"How's the coffee?" asks the counterman.

"Mmmm, very delicious," you answer. (For some unknown, but obviously inspired, reason, I had really put it to a taste test.)

"Better than you make at home?"
"Oh, indeed, yes. This seems very
well-brewed and most aromatic—and
besides, we make rotten coffee at
home."

"Oh, I'm so glad you like it, because it's Sanka."

Your Jane now must register irk (probably because Mother is chatting so happily with a strange, albeit pleasant, counterman). "Why did you give Mother Sanka? She never drinks it."

"Well, it's a brand-new formula, and we're anxious to know what the public thinks."

Now you register surprise, because

what you drank really was delicious. "Is it really? I don't generally drink Sanka and this is very full-bodied and excellent in flavor. Is the new Sanka caffeinated or is it still Sanka-Sanka?"

"Sanka-Sanka."

"You're welcome," you must quip, bringing to the fore all the latent "ham" in you.

You carry on such banter and you notice that you just happen to be at the peak of your talent as a witty conversationalist. But you *must* dash to the gate, leaving the hungry bride still crunching away.

Outside the coffee shop a young lady with a clip board approaches you. "Would you please sign this release? You've just filmed a commercial for Sanka. Here is \$10 for your signature, and we'll let you know if your interview will be accepted."

You will notice then that shock and thought paralysis set in rapidly, but just as quickly your feminine instincts rally you out of your stupor and you wonder: "Gee! Was my hair combed? Did I speak nicely? Did I photograph ugly? Were my manners slobby?"

But there's no time to indulge these

vanities, because you're still desperately trying to get to that gate. So you glance at the name on top of the release, note that it is one of our most respected advertising agencies, sign, take the \$10 and flee.

Of course there are still 10 minutes to plane arrival, so you run back to the coffee shop to tell Jane of the glorious thing that has befallen you (and maybe tip her off to talk nice to the man so that she can be selected too). But you'll find the agency people one step ahead of you. You are confronted at the entrance to the coffee shop with the request that you not re-enter lest you reveal their plot and thus prevent candid reactions from other coffee orderers.

For about one hour you will try to recall all you had said to the counterman. You will be deliciously pleased with yourself as you muse over the clever witticisms you threw at him . . . and how bright you were to use all those appropriate commercial words like "aromatic," "caffeinated," "full-bodied." You begin to conclude that you are just a "natural" for this sort of thing.

Immediately thereafter you enter the illusionary phase. You see continued

yourself as the Arlene Francis of television commercials; you see your house guests swimming in the pool on your new estate and you retire your husband from his business to manage your residuals.

Your enthusiastic visions of a glamorously lucrative future degenerate into adolescent dreams as weeks become months and there's no word from your potential sponsor or that reputable advertising agency. Indignation gives way to rage and you pluck that \$10 bill you had enshrined on the family mantel and you just spend it on something dull—like groceries.

Now raise yourself from those despondent depths—because you just forgot to anticipate the length of time required for such a selective decision. Four months later you'll get a letter:

"Congratulations, your interview has been selected for use in Sanka Coffee advertising. Your comments shown in the enclosed scripts were taken from your filmed and recorded interview and are an accurate repro-



'And now, a word from our sponsor.'

duction of your remarks. . . . Would you please sign to that effect. . . . We would also appreciate it if you would initial the copies of the scripts. . . . Upon receipt of this material and as soon as the commercials are scheduled on the air, we will forward a check in the amount of \$95 for the initial on-air showings. . . Further payments to you will be forwarded under the terms of the Screen Actors Guild contract which you signed at the conclusion of your interview. . . "

Your first impulse will be to hire an agent and a publicity staff. But don't! First read the transcript of your conversation as it will be utilized for the commercial. And that's when ambivalence sets in—the unadulterated glee at having been selected and the abysmal disappointment of seeing your 50 lines of punctilious wit capsulized to four lines of dull responses. Oh, of course, each sentence will comprise your words, but the eclectic transcript reduces you to a most unfascinating "taster" and hardly the inspiration for a big boom in Sanka sales.

#### The residuals roll in

So when you sign your consent to the transcript, just be sure to toss away your "Arlene Francis" delusions, and just dwell on the amassing of residuals. This is fun! Never underestimate the generosity of whoever sets the scale of payments—be it the sponsor, the agency or Screen Actors Guild. So far I've received about \$1500 for smacking my lips over that aromatic brew, my commercial having been shown for two 13-week periods.

I haven't been asked to sign any autographs yet, but I am the TV luminary of our community, according to the butcher, the druggist and the gas-station boys. And I've learned to love drinking Sanka—which is fortunate, because whenever I'm served in a restaurant where I'm known, no will will serve me coffee!



#### Mr. Roberts

If you loved "Mister Roberts" as book, play or movie, don't see it on TV. In fact you're probably better off not even reading this—it will just make you mad. For the fact is they've not only broadened the bored life of the men of the USS Reluctant, they've made the show so broad that, when all else fails, they even put broads on board.

The trouble is that if there's one kind of character the average TV producer and the average TV writer simply cannot comprehend, it is the average man. And the central character of this show, Mister Roberts himself, is an average man who is also something which apparently puts him utterly beyond the pale—he is the average officer. Neither martinet nor one of the boys, neither the man who goes by the book nor for the history books, he is just a nice guy—and, as such, obviously, he's got to go, period.

On both Broadway and in the movies, you will recall, this part was played by Henry Fonda. And if, on TV, the absence of Fonda doesn't make your heart go all the way out to Roger Smith, still you have to admit that Mr. Smith does grow on you. So does Steve Harmon as Ensign Pulver—although he is no David Wayne, who created the part on Broadway, or Jack Lemmon, who broadened it for the movie. Mean-

while Richard X. Slattery, if not as menacing a captain as was James Cagney, is at least equally funny, and George Ives is fine as Doc.

In fairness, then, neither the cast, NBC in general, nor producer James Komack in particular, is really to blame for the difficulties. These stem directly from the fact that the basic ingredient of the book, play and movie was the background—the tedium of men condemned to fight not the fighting war but the dull supply war. On an ancient cargo ship, a kind of static island ferry, they are condemned, apparently for the duration. Men in war but not at war, they have all of the frustrations and none of the action, all of the tensions and none of the releases. To give all this meaning, to bring out all the dramatic values inherent in all the little things played against this background-like, for example, the cause célèbre of the captain's palm tree-it is essential that the tedium, the boredom, be there. And it was there-in the book, in the two-and-a-half hour play, in the two-hour movie. In the TV show it is not there. An hour's show might have had a chance. This half-hour job has none.

Lately desperate measures have been applied. In one recent episode Shelley Berman was piped aboard as Lt. Horatio Nelson Sims-but even he died, literally. A much better episode, in fact the best we've seen so far, was the one on your home screen last week. In this one, Alan Mowbray gives a wonderful performance as a native chief who has Madison Avenue ulcers and also has eight beautiful native daughters to marry off. One of them, Pamela Woolman, is named "Real Dish"-and, all in all, if you missed this show, try to catch it next summer. It isn't the real "Mister Roberts," but then, these days what is?

# Garry Moore takes to the streets to get back into television

R ven after a year and a half's abstinence from television, he's still the object of friendly salutes and surprised stares on Manhattan's streets. Passers-by study the familiar short, thick frame they had known for 14 years on their screens, the same brush haircut, dropping nose, and slightly pugilistic face.

Garry Moore and his "family"-

which at times included Durward Kirby, Marion Lorne, Carol Burnett and Dorothy Loudon—were canceled out of television's life in the summer of 1964 and in the interval, Moore has: (1) taken a nine-month trip around the world and (2) given some serious thought to his future—if any—as a television performer.

Next Friday night (Feb. 4) on ABC

—not CBS, mind you, the network which still has a long-term lease on Moore's services—he'll take a first, tentative step toward getting back in the TV swim: "Garry Moore's People Poll," it's called, a gimmicky and hopefully entertaining hour of interviews and opinion-sampling. "It's on the lighthearted side," he said the other day. "A romp through the mind of the average American. It will either be great or it will be terrible."

A romp through Garry Moore's mind is another kind of experience. In private conversation, he has all the show-biz electricity and "star quality" of a suburban husband leaning on a back fence, while trying to avoid the lawn mower, and telling a neighbor what he's been up to. Recently Moore worried a Caesar salad in a midtown New York restaurant, and talked about his recent life and expectations.

"I got back to this country last May, and spent two weeks holed up in Los Angeles just watching television. I missed seeing 'people' on television. Everything had gone over to actors and to film, to situation comedies—some of them quite good. But I've always felt strongly that TV zoomed to popularity because for the first time it was possible for one person to talk eyeball to eyeball with a lot of others.

"I feel it's a condition of life that everybody is essentially lonely, and that TV can relieve this loneliness."

A lot of viewers—but not enough—felt that the old *Garry Moore Show* did just that. Moore was vacationing in Barbados when he got the word, via telephone from his manager, that the show had been canceled.

"I went to the Caribbean thinking everything was OK," he said. "Canceling the show was [James] Aubrey's decision to make, and he made it. Had I been Aubrey [then president of the CBS-TV network], I would have done one of two things. Either cancel the show, as he did, or revamp it entirely and move it to a new time.

"Actually, the show was running out of steam. I was tired and bored with what I was doing. I personally think the time for that particular kind of show is past—the big production-number opening, and so forth. You can't do a feature like "That Wonderful Year' any more. People would throw rocks.

"I wouldn't want to go back to that same thing. I've done that. I can't do it any better than I did it. It would be like asking an author who's written a successful book to write the same one again and again."

Moore returned to New York from Barbados, finished out the season, then went off to a house he owns in Maine and "sat around for two months collecting my thoughts." According to Moore, his thoughts ran this way: "I'm 50 years old, and if I get locked into something now, I'll never get to see a lot of places and sights I've always wanted to see."

So in September 1964—as a new television season was just beginning—Moore and his wife left New York for Egypt, Africa, India, Thailand, Japan, Australia, Bora Bora, the Fiji Islands, Tahiti, and a lot of way stations in between. "I wouldn't let friends write to me about the television business," he says. "I kept myself purposely ignorant of everything that was going on."

When he got back to the U.S. last May ("hardly anybody knew I was in town") and started wondering where his career was headed, Moore had a visit from Jay Ward, TV producer (Bullwinkle) and perpetrator of some rather zany promotion stunts. They laid out the format for a "comedy-variety" show and offered it to CBS as a possible entry for next season. At this writing, CBS was still considering the idea, and its decision will have a critical bearing on where Garry Moore goes from here.

Several times since his show ended, Moore has voiced a strong continued

desire to work in the public-affairs end of television. "Fred Friendly [president of CBS News] called me after my show was canceled and asked if I'd like to get into public affairs. I told him I certainly would. But he was new in his job and didn't know CBS's policy about that, so nothing came of the offer.

"CBS has a rigid policy that entertainers do not get into news or public affairs. Their viewpoint is 'Once an actor, always an actor,'"

When a vice president of MCA Inc. named Sam Northcross came up with the idea for "Garry Moore's People Poll," CBS was given first crack at it, under the terms of Moore's contract. They turned it down. Says Moore: "We were delighted to find a more flexible policy at ABC."

Moore's exclusive contract with CBS still has nine more years to run, during which time he may not do a series for any other network, and must give CBS first refusal on any one-shot programs he cares to do. "I've asked for a release from CBS," he told us, "but they always give me an unequiv-

zip code helps keep postal costs down BUT ONLY IF YOU USE IT. ocal 'no.' Nobody can pay you enough to sit around and do nothing."

If CBS rejects the series format which he and Jay Ward are offering them, then, Moore says, "I'll be back in the same bind." His only recourse would be to initiate legal action against CBS in an attempt to terminate his contract, a costly step, but one which Moore insists he is ready to take.

Meanwhile, preparations for Friday's special on ABC have been occupying almost all of Moore's time. For the interviewing, he's traveled to San Francisco; Washington, D.C.; Chicago; St. Louis; Phoenix, Ariz.; and New Orleans, among other cities.


#### He wants 'people' in television

"There's a whole other country out there between New York and Los Angeles," he says. The program will use data supplied by the American Institute of Public Opinion, which is the parent organization of the Gallup polls. Interviewees will be asked questions about their habits and opinions, and then be informed where they stand in relation to national averages.

It's all part of Moore's private campaign to get "people" back into television. "The thing that put television on the map in the first place has been discarded," he says. "The reason, of course, is that it's better business to do filmed situation shows. The networks can re-sell them for daytime and syndication.

"If you go to someone with an idea for a show these days, the first thing he says is, 'Where are the residuals?' Television is a form of show business, but the accent used to be on 'show.' Now it's on 'business.'"

Moore pushed aside the remains of his Caesar salad, and said: "I don't see any hope for change. It isn't that I refuse to admit that I'm dead, but I do refuse to admit that my kind of television is dead."
