

CBS Sports Spectacular will air three Santa Anita stakes races this season, each featuring purses of more than \$100,000. The video tapes, televised the day after each race, will be seen Feb. 27, March 6 and March 13.

The John Forsythe Show has been renewed for at least the rest of this season . . . And Peyton Place seems secure until the end of summer. ABC has picked up the thrice-weekly serial for 76 more episodes . . . The Armed Forces Radio and Television Service plans to air TV specials in Vietnam for servicemen. Producer JOHNNY GRANT made one show which co-stars BOB HOPE, DEBBIE REYNOLDS, YVETTE MIMIEUX, PAT BOONE, DONNA DOUGLAS, IRENE RYAN.

"Revolution of the 3 R's" is the title of ABC's April 7 special dealing with breakthroughs in teaching methods. VAN HEFLIN narrates . . . JAMES FARENTINO and FABIAN have joined a projected NBC series called <u>Sullivan's Place</u>. It's about three brothers who search for their missing father (Sullivan) and in the meantime run his trading post on the Amazon River.

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

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as we see it

■ We are at the brink of a revolution in television programming. The signs are clear:

1. All three networks are involved in production of two-hour films for television. This means the current trend toward more full-length movies will continue. Next season there will be prime-time network movies on Sunday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings.

The new NBC contract for the baseball Game of the Week provides for three night games to be telecast

during prime evening time.

3. The new CBS contract with the National Football League provides for seven games to be telecast on week-days during prime evening time. NFL officials have indicated that their plans for the future call for more profootball games and telecasts at night.

■ In a few years, movies and sports events may dominate some evening network schedules. This is bound to bring about what the experts call "fragmentation" of viewing, with Dad looking at one set, Mother at another and the kids at still another.

It may also hasten development of independent "taste" stations devoted to specific types of programming, just as in radio we now have classical music stations, talk stations, rock 'n' roll stations, and so on.

■ The little situation comedies, the action dramas, the routine Westerns that now fill the evening TV schedule may be on their way to the oblivion


so many of them deserve.

The network scramble for new shows each season, Hollywood's frantic grinding out of more of the same, the seasonal pilot viewings at agencies, which all but preclude the possibility of turning out quality programs, may be replaced by sensible planning, careful production, discriminating buying.

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THOSE WERE THE WILD OLD DAYS

When television was young . . . it was a lot more fun

"Now it's time to meet Humpty Dumpty!" Uncle Henry's jovial voice boomed out to the children in the studio. That was my cue, as prop boy for the kiddy show, to open a sliding panel and push out a large papier-mâché puppet. But this morning I'd gotten fouled in the puppet's strings, and the harder I tugged the more tangled I became.

"Where's that Humpty Dumpty?" called Uncle Henry, as the kiddies in the studio squealed with delight. "All together, kids! Where's Humpty Dumpty?" To my horror, Uncle Henry slid open the panel, exposing me, wrapped in strings, to the cameras. "Why there he is with the prop boy!" said Uncle Henry in wide-eyed innocence. "Say, 'Hi, Humpty, Hi, prop boy!"

This sort of unstudied virtuosity isn't likely to be seen on today's well-planned, well-rehearsed network broadcasts, but in television's earlier days as many as half a station's

shows, like *Uncle Henry*, were local. The stations were shoestring operations with few scripts or rehearsals. Performers often ad-libbed shows. Anything could happen—and did.

My own introduction to that casual world came one October afternoon when I reported to a station in Cincinnati for my first day as prop boy. I was appointed "boom man" on the show Louie's Clubhouse.

Louie emceed old Our Gang Comedy movies, telling a few jokes and doing commercials between the film portions. The boom man was responsible for keeping the mobile microphone above the heads of performers. I was led to a small derrick with a microphone dangling at the end.

"This is the boom," said the crew chief. "That's the mike out there at the end. This handle turns it right and left. Turn this crank and you move it forward and back. Unlock this nut and you can swing the whole boom left and right, up and down.

Keep the mike about a foot in front of Louie's nose, low enough to pick up his voice and high enough to stay off camera. We're on in five minutes." He turned and walked away.

I was still fumbling with the boom when the cameraman came in and winked at me. Then Louie, in T-shirt, knee pants and top hat, ran into the studio. He threw himself on the piano stool and broke into "That Old Gang of Mine" as the red light on the

camera blinked on.

I furiously cranked the microphone over his head, then saw the cameraman looking at me and clapping his earphones with the palms of his Thinking the microphone hands. wasn't picking up Louie's voice, I lowered it to inches above his top hat. The cameraman ran over to me, picked up a pair of earphones hanging on the side of the boom, and slipped them over my ears. Then the cameraman turned the studio monitor toward me and I saw the microphone showing on the screen. I swung it up hard and it crashed into the studio lights hanging from the ceiling. "Settle down, settle down," said the voice in the earphones. "Just watch the monitor. If you see the mike, it's too low." I turned and looked through a plate-glass window behind me. It was the director, grinning at me.

When the show was over, Louie came up to me. "We don't worry about a few mistakes," he said. "Just

don't let 'em throw you."

Louie had summed up the station philosophy. The real heroes of that day were those who could use their wits to keep going no matter what. One announcer, a tall Chicagoan, was so relaxed that he gave directions to the cameraman while on the air, calling him "Lensy." His big client was a discount house specializing in whole rooms of furniture for \$99. He was doing this spot one evening when the large studio sign showing the client's name crashed to the floor. With

aplomb that won the respect of all of us, the announcer stretched out on the floor next to the battered sign and said, "Down here, Lensy, where prices are always rock-bottom."

Not all announcers were professionals. One businessman-turned-announcer was Bargain Bob, the jovial owner of a local discount store, who sponsored wrestling matches. Bob delivered his own commercials, spiced with his own brand of humor, in a studio adjoining the ring. His favorite routine was to insult Crazy Carl, the star of the circuit.

One time, he was delightedly telling viewers of the thrashing he'd give Crazy Carl if the two ever met, when the wrestler, large as life and twice as menacing, burst through the studio door. Badly, overmatched, Bargain Bob fled to the control room, leaving Crazy Carl to break up his display in full view of the TV audience.

At the next commercial break, viewers saw Bargain Bob standing amid the wreckage of his products. "And if he ever comes back," said Bob, "he'll get more of the same."

If not a fighter, Bargain Bob was a salesman. One time he delivered, with irresistible sincerity, the commercial for a \$19.95 set of unbreakable dinnerware. To demonstrate the sturdiness of a plate, he dramatically slammed it on a counter. It broke in half. "All right," he said, "\$15.95."

But some mishaps couldn't be met with a quick ad lib. Dick Steel, an announcer with a deep, authoritative voice, was once doing a commercial for a shockproof, waterproof wristwatch being offered by a local jeweler. Dick would drop the watch into a washer, then extol its virtues while the camera panned to the mouth of the throbbing, sudsing machine.

Dick finished his spiel with supreme confidence, turned the machine off and asked, "How did our watch stand up to that brutal punishment?" He fished the watch from continued

the machine and held it up to the camera lens. It was completely battered. Dick's voice boomed triumphantly, "And now, back to Home Theater."

Performers weren't the only ones who could rise to station fame in those days. Occasionally an imaginative director could make a name for himself. Early one morning we were showing a Ginger Rogers musical. At the same time, one of the control-room monitors showed a horror film that was being previewed so that it could be checked for commercial inserts. timing and good taste. Ginger was wrapping up a knock-'em-dead dance routine before a 125-piece tie-andtails orchestra as the preview monitor showed a broken-necked villain eerily playing a flute in the tower of a Gothic castle. The director on duty, a veteran whom I'll call Dick Snow, got an inspiration. "Take the preview film chain," he shouted to the startled engineer. "Lose it," he commanded a moment later, then settled back. The station switchboard was soon swamped with calls from drowsy viewers who could have sworn they had seen a broken-necked flutist in the Hollywood Bowl orchestra.

Antics like that helped relieve the long hours of working under constant pressure of the studio clocks, and at the same time molded the staff into close fraternity, complete with initiations. The victim of one of these informal initiations was a serious young announcer who had come to us from a small station in Georgia. With visions of fattening a slim pay check, he spent weeks convincing a local paint store that he could double the store's sales with television advertising. The owner finally agreed to sponsor a one-minute commercial during prime Saturday evening viewing time, and the elated announcer

used every break in his Saturday daytime schedule to practice his delivery. The night of his first paint commercial he ducked into the dressing room early for a nap, leaving me with instructions to wake him a full hour before air time. He didn't know the director on duty was to be Dick Snow, he of the pixy bent.

Snow had me set the dressing-room clock ahead one hour, then shake the dozing young announcer and shout, "I forgot to wake you! You're on in 30 seconds!" The startled announcer grabbed his coat and ran down the hall to Studio A. As soon as he got in camera range, the cameraman signaled that he was on the air.

As our victim unknowingly went into the commercial before dead cameras, the world went crazy. A door opened and Cookie, the station's mongrel mascot, ran in, barking loudly. The "idiot" sheet from which the announcer was to read showed large Chinese characters. When he began his demonstration, he found the brush stuck in paint that had hardened like cement. "Well, I think this proves that our paint will dry to a hard, lasting finish," he manfully ad-libbed, beads of perspiration breaking out on his forehead. Then the studio lights began blinking off and on.


Stationed off-camera, I pulled a rope attached to the paint-can display counter and sent it toppling over. The camera pulled back to reveal a scene of total devastation. Then all the lights went out. Completely unstuck, Georgia had to be led from the studio. But he proved himself a trouper when he later delivered the real commercial without a hitch.

Shortly after the incident I left the station to enlist in the Air Force, and I've never been back. Some of those I worked with went on to join the big networks; others have dropped from sight. But they all stand 7 feet tall in my memory.

daughter is a IV star

The plight of the parents of Miss Debbie Watson,

who is 16 and is 'Tammy'. . . . BY JANE WILKIE

hen, as happens in Hollywood, an apple-cheeked filly thrusts herself into the corrosive world of show business, its veterans often react with horror, proclaiming that the body and soul of an innocent have been committed to the altar of self-destruction.

Debbie Watson stirred more fore-boding than most when, at a lamb-like 15, she appeared out of left field to take the title role in last season's ill-fated Karen. Undaunted by the axing of that show, she appears this year as ABC's Tammy in TV's version of the Louisiana gamin whose movie portrayals lined the pocket-books of Debbie Reynolds and Sandra Dee.

So, by now, people have been dread-

ing Debbie's deterioration for well over a year. You couldn't, they said, make a kid like that a star and expect her to survive unscathed. This was a girl who baby-sat for the neighbors and did the family ironing.

Debbie herself speaks of her career before television as though she had trod the boards since the turn of the century, yet her experience had consisted only of bit roles in assorted small theaters in the towns of Anaheim, Long Beach and Tustin. It had been a less-than-whirlwind career, which she refers to as "off-Broadway."

Yet, as she ends her 16th year, Debbie Watson miraculously remains wide-eyed, without a trace of cynical squint.

It is rather her parents who have

been derailed. Having spawned the most ebullient teen-ager in town, Eugene and Kittie Watson had already found it quite enough to endure mascara in the washbowl, a surfboard on the patio, and the phone wire twisted into tortured tails. Then they were suddenly confronted with the world of The Actress, a profession as foreign to them as basket weaving.

Living quietly in the far-off suburb of La Mirada on Mr. Watson's income as a purchasing agent, they sensed no more pitfalls than if Debbie had announced she'd become a nurse. "Children," opined Mr. Watson, "do what they want in life, so why object?"

Thus, in the fullest spirit of parental cooperation, the Watsons sat five nights a week for five weeks on the Long Beach pier with rented fishing poles, while on the stage of the near-by Community Playhouse their only daughter gleefully went through her picayune paces in "Gangway." For this and all ensuing jobs and auditions, the Watsons drove Debbie to and from appointments, twiddling thumbs far from home while she crooned "I Love You, Conrad," in "Bye Bye Birdie," or was married in "Brigadoon" with "the veil and everything, and me only 14."

Shortly after, Debbie was chosen for the role of Karen, and subsequently that of Tammy. And through it all—for the 7 A.M. makeup call at Universal City Studios—Kittie Watson has risen at 5:30, dug Debbie out of the sack (no mean feat), and driven her (one hour) to the studio.

It makes little difference that Debbie has her driver's license; she still sleeps in the back seat "because I'm so foggy in the mornings." Inasmuch as the law requires an adult present on the set with a working minor, Mrs. Watson has found herself imprisoned on sound stages five days a week. At the end of the long studio day—during which Debbie works and attends school on the lot, and Mrs. Watson has nothing whatever to do—there is once

more the Santa Ana Freeway, at evening commuting time a jungle on wheels requiring an hour and a half to reach La Mirada. And in La Mirada each sunset sits Eugene Watson, long home from work and waiting for his dinner. Occasionally he has company—Debbie's dates, who are also waiting.

Kittie Watson's housekeeping has gone untended until weekends, family dinners have stretched into jet-set hours. In an emergency when Mrs. Watson must stay home, there is a scramble to unearth someone willing to substitute as Debbie's "set guardian."

The pattern has continued, except that since the first air date last fall life in La Mirada has disintegrated even more. The Watsons' phone rang endlessly until a new, unlisted number restored a modicum of peace. Marriage proposals started coming in, from a few fans, right after the first showing of Karen—"since then a million I guess," says Debbie. The doorbell shrilled at all hours, leaned on by La Mirada's younger set. In a neighboring family with two sons, the sibling rivalry for Debbie's attentions turned into a triangle, with the Watsons hung on the third point. And Mrs. Watson's dormant ulcer has sprung to life again.

Debbie herself seems to take all of it in stride, including the bone-breaking job of heading a TV series and crammed evenings of the inevitable homework and script study ("Tammy is more difficult than Karen because she's more real—I have to think about what she's saying") plus the personal-appearance tours to New York, Chicago, Washington, D.C.—and Japan, where she was mobbed on a train platform by Oriental Watson buffs.

But there has been a change, subtle and unsettling. It is not easy for a parent to tell any 16-year-old what to do; it is an age of emerging independence, and this is compounded when the daughter is working at a full-time job in a world continued

completely alien to her parents and earning more each week than most adults do in a month. Bedtime has become a hassle. "She's dead tired most of the time but won't admit it," says Kittie Watson. "I have to take the chance of her getting mad at me every time I insist she go to bed."

For the worried parents, her physical endurance has become a matter of concern, brought home to them pointedly the night when, after a trying

day, Debbie suddenly slumped over the dinner table, head in hands.

In other directions, however, the Watsons see no cause for alarm, for Debbie shows few signs of going the way of all Hollywood flesh. She is achingly aware of the fun she has missed at Buena Park High and still clings to her school friends, who bring their teen-age problems to her. "I feel older than they are now."

She considered the acquisition of her Mustang convertible the most exhilarating experience of her life until a couple of months ago, when she became engaged to Richard Orshoff, 21, a University of Southern California student.

She eyes her considerable bank account (the Watsons do not touch her earnings except for the cost of lunches and commuting gasoline) with the idea of college, and has entertained a notion "for seven whole months" that she will become a kindergarten teacher—a possibility no one takes seriously. To date she has no idea of asking her parents to move closer to the studio. "I think that would be horrible of me. The father is head of the house and it's his work that determines where the family lives."

What the parents do not realize is that stardom often results in the loss of all sense of life's values. The subtle trap of show business is closing in on Debbie, who has already taken the bait of excitement, glamor and a fat income, and does not deny she has thought of renting an apartment for herself in a year or so. Rationalizing, she says, "Kids leave home when they begin college, so I guess it'd be all right for me to have my own place."

Leaving home is the first flight for new wings, and the cynics say the apartment will be in posh Bel-Air, that Debbie will soon drip with sables and eventually will even hire a press agent. And Kittie and Eugene Watson, although they will not admit it, must have some second thoughts.



TV will explore the eerie world of Jacques Cousteau in a special

In "The World of Jacques-Yves Cousteau," one lives in a huge sphere (18 feet in diameter), wears a foam-rubber suit with an ebonite vest to keep warm and talks like Donald Duck. Captain Cousteau's "World" is the ocean depths, and viewers continued

will tour it via a National Geographic special on CBS in April. They will see six men in the midst of an experiment in which they lived and worked on the bottom of the Mediterranean, not surfacing for 21 days, 17 hours and 16 minutes, the longest man has remained at such a depth.

One of several similar projects which have been exploring the ocean floor as a place where men may live and work (others are being conducted by the U.S. Navy and by oceanographer Edwin A. Link), Cousteau's experiment was aimed partially at aiding the off-shore oil industry.

Previously, off-shore oil rigs could not be located below 150 feet. The old helmeted, inflated-suit diver could remain below that depth for only short periods because the deeper he went, the longer his periods of decompression on the way up, and the greater the danger from bends. Cousteau demonstrated that his men could live with a repair job on the bottom and undergo decompression later when the job was finished.

In his experiment, called Continental Shelf Station III, or Conshelf III, Cousteau sank his "house" to 328 feet off Cap Ferrat on the French Riviera. Then he set up a "Christmas tree," a rig which controls the output of an oil well, thus proving men could work efficiently underwater. Communications with the surface were maintained via closed-circuit TV. Entry and departure was through an open hatch in the bottom of the sphere; pressure inside kept the water out.

The "oceanauts" breathed a mixture of oxygen and helium, which was circulated through long hoses when the men worked outside the sphere. The helium causes the rough, chirpy, Donald-Ducklike voices you may be hearing in the special.

Lunavision: "Live from the moon" is the prospect in store for television viewers when America's astronauts make their first lunar landing. Just before the Soviet Union landed Luna 9 on the moon, Max Engert, who is in charge of NASA's lunar TV project, described the out-of-this-world television show our space agency is planning. The three astronauts who make the trip will take a compact sevenpound TV camera with them. When they are launched, the camera will be mounted above them, pointed at them. After they get into orbit, they will be able to unfasten the camera and point it anywhere. The moon landing itself won't be telecast—the small landing craft that will carry two astronauts to the moon (the third stays in the mother ship, in lunar orbit) won't have a large enough antenna to carry pictures back to earth. Once the craft lands, however, one astronaut will unfold and erect an antenna, and the world will be able to tune in and watch our men on the moon. Let's see Batman top that!

Paar vs. Carson: Jack Paar, who of late has been AWOL from the mudslinging wars, has returned to the fray with a blast at the man who succeeded him as star of *The Tonight Show*. Johnny Carson, it seems, had told an interviewer that, unlike his predecessor, he shuns on-the-air discussions of public affairs, since he is not equipped to talk about such matters. And, he added, Paar was no better equipped.

Paar struck back in a New York Times interview. "It's the first opinion I've ever known Carson to have," he said. "His show is only a third of what I did. What has Johnny Carson developed on television? What new talent has he presented other than the second coming of Skitch Henderson?" As for the second coming of Jack Paar, it is not imminent. Asked whether he was itching to return to TV on a regular basis (he'll do a special in May), Paar replied: "They say I'm an egomaniac and I'll be back, but I have no plans. I have no drive to get back into it."

War News: ABC, CBS and NBC all have been devoting more time in recent weeks to consideration of the Vietnam issues, and they are planning to continue escalating this coverage. Sunday, Jan. 30, for example, CBS set aside 90 minutes for an illuminating-and sometimes angrydebate among five members of Congress. That same afternoon The Frank McGee Report on NBC included an interview with the controversial Vietnam dissenter Prof. Staughton Lynd. A couple of days later CBS had an interview with a more influential dissenter, Sen. J. William Fulbright. All networks carried President Johnson's report to the Nation Jan. 31 and portions of the UN debate Feb. 2. In future, the weekly ABC Scope will devote itself exclusively to the Vietnam crisis; CBS will send two of its top news hands, Charles Collingwood and Harry Reasoner, to Vietnam; and NBC will present a series of news specials, including at least one from Geneva via Early Bird (whether or not peace talks are held there).

'THE DIVORCE DILEMMA'

This report focuses on divorce, one of the major social problems in the U.S., where one out of every four marriages will end in the courts.

Unlike many countries, the U.S. has no unified divorce code. In some states, grounds for divorce are loosely defined (mental cruelty, incompatibility); in others, like New York (where adultery is the only ground), couples are faced with giving perjured testimony or seeking their divorce elsewhere. Cameras view two popular destinations for the divorce-bound: Reno, Nev., and the Mexican border town of Juarez. In interviews, divorcées describe the pros and cons of the out-of-state divorce.

Many experts feel that our divorce rate can be cut by pre-marital and marital counseling. Cameras visit Detroit, where parents who file for divorce are offered expert counseling.

Profane and ill-tempered, he is described by others in the unhappy New England community as a "damned little bully" who has "as much sense as a flea"; and one resident sums up the general reaction by saying, "I don't like that kid."

Through the electronic miracle of television, young Rodney has become a likable, square-jawed, fair-haired, clean-cut teen-age idol. And not only that. When, in the script of ABC's Peyton Place, his father left town, he took over the care and supervision of his younger brother, thus becoming that rarity—a teen-age idol with father-image overtones.

Ryan O'Neal, the ambitious actor who plays Rodney, comes closer to the television incarnation than to the original creation of the late Grace Metalious. Probably the principal point of resemblance is that Rodney, at 14, was thought "adorable" by eighthgrade girls. At 24, Ryan O'Neal is certainly all of that.

The little girls read about him in their fan magazines ("Ryan O'Neal's Love Secret"). They write him the fan letters that indicate he is one of 20th Century-Fox's most popular stars.

Since discovering his phone number, when the house where he formerly lived went up for sale, they call him daily, so that the messages from his answering service are a series of "Judy called," "Laurie called," and "Sandy called and says she loves you." Finally, now that Ryan has two reallife children, the teen-agers have even made a father image of him ("Ryan O'Neal's Love Secret," it turns out, is the two babies).

But admiration for O'Neal goes beyond the younger set. Paul Monash, executive producer of Peyton Place, who looked up and said, "He's it!" when Ryan came to be interviewed for the role of Rodney, says, "He's extremely aware—a bright guy."

Monash was familiar with O'Neal's work in *Empire*, a now-defunct TV series starring Richard Egan. Although Egan had never seen O'Neal act—they were gymnasium acquaintances—it was he who suggested Ryan for the part in *Empire*. "It was just a matter of Ryan himself being so impressive," he says.

O'Neal got his first break in 1959 as stand-in for Jerome Courtland, star of a syndicated series, Tales of the Vikings. Courtland, now an associate producer for Walt Disney, says, "I think of Ryan as a very, very good friend—a kid brother. When I first saw Peyton Place, I was amazed at how polished an actor he had become."

Courtland would also probably be amazed to learn that the "kid brother" was eating his heart out during those Viking days, for Ryan O'Neal is anything but the somewhat bland, typical American boy he may appear. Tales of the Vikings was shot continued

in Germany, where Ryan had gone with his family—his father, play-wright-novelist Charles O'Neal; his mother, actress Patricia O'Callaghan; and his younger brother, Kevin, now also an actor.

Rvan-born Patrick Ryan O'Neal in Los Angeles on April 20, 1941-had grown up with his peripatetic family in Mexico, the West Indies and England but went to high school in Los Angeles. By the time he went to work as a stand-in in Tales of the Vikings, he wanted more than anything else to be an actor. He memorized everyone's lines and eagerly tried out for whatever parts came along. But, in ridiculous boots with 4-inch-thick soles to make him as tall as Courtland, he had to step aside when the assistant director, in movie parlance, called, "Second team out-first team in." Then, standing on the side lines, Ryan mouthed the lines to himself while the scene was being shot. Even today the voice of the successful actor and teen-age idol is bitter as he says. "I couldn't stand it."

Manifestations of bitterness or frustration are rare in Ryan O'Neal. But he can become angry and show it, as he did upon returning from Germany, when a studio casting director promised that he would find something for him and ended up offering him a job

as bus boy at a Sunset Strip coffeehouse. Those were the lean days for young O'Neal. While his family was in Europe, he was trying to make it in Hollywood. He had small parts in Dobie Gillis, Leave It to Beaver and a few other TV shows. Universal Studios put him under contract for a time ("They were looking for a young Doug McClure") but did not renew.

Finally, thanks to working out at that gym with Richard Egan, he got the chance to do *Empire* for a season. Then came *Peyton Place*. When he got the role, he says his first reaction was, "Where's my horse? I had never done anything like that before." Now he is "deeply grateful" because *Peyton Place* has given him "an importance in the industry," and as time has passed, he has become increasingly pleased with his role: "The character has become a man, which is important to me as Ryan O'Neal—I'm a married man with two children."

The confusion of Ryan O'Neal the married man, Ryan O'Neal the hip teen-age idol, and Ryan O'Neal the serious actor, becomes evident in his attitude toward his co-star, Mia Farrow. When she returned from her highly publicized yachting trip with Frank Sinatra last summer, Ryan greeted her with "What did you do on your vacation?" But he can also be disturbed by the extra-curricular activities of Miss Farrow. "I have never

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seen them together," he says. "As far as I am concerned, Frank Sinatra doesn't even exist. If I let myself believe anything else, it would affect my relationship with her and hurt my performance."

But he is anything but naive. In fact, his behavior on his first date with actress Joanna Moore, now his wife, would be worthy of Rodney Harrington himself-the original Rodney, not the TV version, Miss Moore, five years Ryan's senior, is a blonde beauty from the South who insists that she never really wanted to be an actress ("In Georgia, a girl looks for a man"). When she did a guest appearance in Empire, which was filmed in New Mexico, Ryan took her to a Santa Fe hot-spot called the Senate Lounge. There he had a pre-arrangement with the waitresses to serve double drinks to the girls he brought in and to make his drinks weak.

After a few hours and quite a few

drinks, Joanna suggested—archly, Ryan thought—that they leave. Then, when they got outside, to his amazement, she said, "Could you take me to a church?"

"A church?" said Ryan, his Rodneyesque plans tumbling about him.

"There is a Catholic church around here, isn't there?" she said coolly.

Thus, at 1 o'clock in the morning, Ryan took her to church, knelt beside her while she said the Rosary and then politely escorted her to the place where she was staying.

Ryan O'Neal and Joanna Moore were married in April 1963. They have two children and have recently moved into a new \$100,000 home. Architecturally, the house is a combination of old Southern manse—a bow to Joanna's ancestry—and the Peyton Place City Hall—a bow to the place the money came from.

Rodney Harrington never had it so good.

JONGER DAN JE DENKT

It means 'Younger Than You Think' and it's Belgium's show for old folks

Leon Vanderbeke, a venerable 91year-old, leaped from the sofa and unleashed a few high kicks that would not have disgraced a cancan girl. What, you may well ask, would induce a dignified, retired blacksmith in the 10th decade of his life to punt holes in the air level with his own bald head. Answer: There was a television camera in the living room.

Vanderbeke was, in fact, performing his party piece for the benefit of a program, on the Flemish network of the Belgian television service, whose ripples may spread far beyond this little country. It is called Jonger Dan Je Denkt (Younger Than You Think) and it is an acknowledgment of a shadow now falling across every Western nation—the problem of an aging population.

In a small country the shape of things to come is often clearer than in a nation the size of the United States. Belgium's compact 10,000,000—about the population of metropolitan New York—can be seen as a single unit from Brussels despite a language division that makes it necessary to have separate Flemish and French stations. As a result, the growing number of senior citizens is not merely a statistic, and the pressure to deal with the elderly in human terms seems to have built up more quickly in Belgium than in the U.S.

One of those stoking the fires was a persistent gerontologist named Prof. Herman Le Compte, who is credited with forcing the idea of a program for older people (not about older people, mind you!) into the action stage. Turned away because Belgium, still trying to recover from the loss of the Congo, has to count its francs, he came back to argue it would be more expensive not to spread the message that senior citizens are only young people who have been around a bit longer.

With births and deaths nearly in balance, and people living longer, Professor Le Compte said Belgium could not afford an army of the aged vegetating in the home, tended by its grown children. The old Belgian idea that after she had raised her family the housewife could quit working and become "a lady" was no longer acceptable. Television, he said, could help refresh the minds and reinvigorate the bodies of the older generation so it would be more self-reliant and less of a burden on youth. His idea: Let Belgium lead the world by making all

this the subject of a TV series.

Producer Lieven Gijpen admits he was not enthusiastic at first. Television time is precious in Belgium. The Flemish network, which serves 62 percent of the population, is on the air only three and a half hours a night. Viewers pay an annual license fee of 980 francs (about \$19) and the idea is to give them their money's worth with programs of the widest popular appeal.

But Gijpen had an older-generation problem of his own, and discovered his experience was being repeated in many other Belgian homes (as it will be in most countries in time). So Jonger Dan Je Denkt went on the air on a Saturday morning in January 1965. It has been promoted to 7:30-8 P.M. every other Wednesday for 1966 because it manages to insinuate its theme of "live young" in a program

"In this field," Gijpen said, "we are more advanced than the United States. We are trying to prolong active life, more often a human problem than a financial one. It isn't easy to do a program for old people. You soon discover you must not dwell on the past; viewers must not be allowed to forget they live in the present.

format intended to provide entertain-

ment for any other age group.

"We aim at the 60-to-65 age group—these are the people who are on the threshold of growing old—but we have many viewers in the 70's and 80's. We don't talk about illnesses. We talk about staying healthy. We have a number of famous geriatricians who advise us and who come on the program to give the audience the sort of advice on retaining vigor for which they would have to pay heavily in the consulting rooms.

"One of our specialists advised the old folks to go out and have a drink of whisky or beer. He said it might not help them physically but it would certainly be good for morale." continued

Gijpen breaks his program into half a dozen items, starting with a few minutes of carefully prepared exercises, a slower version of the sort of warming up young people might do. These are arranged so they can be done standing up or sitting down, and every program opens with a warning to stop any exercise before the point of fatigue. The old folks at home take their cues from the old folks in the studio. George van den Bempt, a veteran broadcaster on physical fitness, worked out the routines. Gijpen thinks it is the only course of its kind.

One popular spot might be called gadget-of-the-week, a demonstration of a device of particular value to old people. A rocking chair was recommended one week for its mild, beneficial exercise and for stirring up any old codger who simply sat in a chair and did nothing. A Swiss inventor sent in eating utensils with thick, round handles for old hands no longer able to grip firmly. And also coming are books printed in large, bold type on extra-white paper for old eyes.

Another of the chores of the program hostess, Liesje Moelants, a handsome 45-year-old—"the perfect age for this show," Gijpen said—is to read news of special interest to older people. Any change in pensions or the local medical service for the elderly is explained, usually with cartoons. Miss Moelants also interviews "The Laureat," a very old person of unusual agility who is selected each program to give his recipe for a long, active life. Our high-kicking friend, Vanderbeke, attributed his spryness to hard work and Belgian beer.

Then there are newsreels about events involving older people. I saw one film of a group having a snowball fight at the seaside. "We all know the old folks go to the seaside in the summer," Gijpen said. "Why not the winter as well?" For a moment of controlled

nostalgia, old newsreels of 30, 40 and 50 years ago are shown—e.g., the first plane flight to the Congo in 1922—so viewers can say: "I remember that."

But nostalgia comes in small doses on Jonger Dan Je Denkt. It took shrewd programming to keep it from overshadowing the key entertainment section, which Gijpen realized would have to win and hold an audience. It was a calculated risk that came off.

"We went looking for stars of yesteryear, now in retirement, who we thought might be persuaded to come out and do their old turns for us," Gijpen said. "Our purpose was doubleedged. Many of them are legendary names on the stage or radio and attractions for that reason alone. But, more important than nostalgia, we chose those who had weathered time the best and our audience could say: "Well, look at her! I saw her 40 years ago and she can still sing and dance."

"It's only a step from that to thinking, 'Why can't I try to be just as youthful?' On one show we re-created the operetta 'White Horse Inn' with the principals of 35 years ago, including Nini de Bael. She is now a cafe owner in Antwerp but she was glad to appear for us. May Dale came back to sing the soldier songs of 1939. We also introduced past sports heroes for the same reason-not so much because they were famous cyclists, our national sport, or soccer players, or billiards experts, but because they were still vigorous and our audiences would draw the right conclusions."

All this has been done on a budget so limited there was grave doubt the series would resume in January, right up to the deadline in early December. Belgische Radio en Televisie is not sponsored, which is a pity, for all that detergent and cosmetic money could be used to bring home the philosophy of Oliver Wendell Holmes:

"To be 70 years young is sometimes far more cheerful and hopeful than to be 40 years old."

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where seldom is heard an encouraging word

Up in the Universal City hills, at the permanent Shiloh Ranch set. The Virginian company is making preparations to marry off Roberta Shore to Glenn Corbett (now off the show, she had come back for this one marriage episode). A little surrey stands in front of the ranch house, a "Just Married" sign tied on the back, with a couple of old cans and high-button shoes to drag along behind. Unusually, all the regulars are on the set today: James Drury sits Buddhalike in his camp chair, surveying the scene from behind his sunglasses. Miss Shore is sitting in her chair reading a newsmagazine, "Johnson looks so tired." she says. Doug McClure, in a yellow vest and blue shirt, is gamboling on the grass with Roberta's stand-in. Lee J. Cobb is just finishing a game of cards with two cowboys. Randy Boone strums his guitar. And Clu Gulager sits on the porch, between his knees a brown paper bag, out of which he fishes a pipe, pipe cleaners, tobacco, matches. "I got this pipe in Tanganyika," he says, then: "Err, Tanganyika, Tennessee," and grins.

Clu Gulager says things three ways: as though he is issuing a proclamation, as if he is leading you on and at any moment will say, "Really had you believing me, didn't I?" and the third way is—lengthily: "I started out as a Shakespearean clown. You know who Jean-Louis Barrault is? I

worked with him in Paris. I acted all over—London, Paris, New York. Next year I'm going to direct my own film, going to make it in London. It's going to be part European, part American, part Asiatic [he chuckled there], and part Clu Gulager, I would say, a part Clu Gulager. It's gonna be a really different kind of film—a study of an old man. You know how old people study things? Study their hand [Clu studied his hand], study their stomach [Clu studied his stomach]. This is the kind of thing I have to do, you understand what I mean?"

Diane Roter (a new regular, playing Cobb's niece) corners Boone and his guitar next to the porch. "Can I touch your guitar?"

"Uh-huh." Randy smiles slowly, holding up his index finger. "One finger."

"Will you teach me a chord?"
"Uh-huh."

McClure and Corbett are wrestling on the ground. Corbett gets up and Doug tackles him gingerly.

Doug McClure likes physical contact; on the set, he can usually be found tumbling about with a fellow actor or rolling on the grass with a willing ingénue. Just like Trampas, by gosh. Doug doesn't like it when magazines publish stories about his private life. "It's like you have a criminal record. They print stuff that has

nothing to do with your work." Of course, he doesn't like it when they write about his work either. "They say I'm getting better! That's an awful backhanded compliment. I'm a good actor! I'm a good actor!" Taller and thinner than he appears to be on television, Doug has more white teeth than Burt Lancaster—but then he doesn't like references to his looks. "I'm a good actor!"

Randy is the first one ready in his dress-up suit for the next shot in the wedding sequence, but he can't tie his bow tie, saunters about asking people if they know how; a wardrobe man finally does it for him. Three small children ask him for his autograph; he grins and signs his name. "Can I have your autograph?" he says.

Randy Boone is an anachronism. In the ultramodern Universal commissary, he eats lunch at the counter. his quitar in his lap; in the nervous, streamlined world of television he saus the sort of "homey" things press agents get paid a fortune to dream up for their clients. But Randy is guileless. On Los Angeles folk: "People here talk real rude. A guy can't say anything without puttin' a dirty word in there some place. Back home, in North Carolina, anybody looks at your airl funny-well, it just can't happen. Here, everyone looks at your girl funny . . ." On television: "One time, back home, Ah was watchin' a show an' wonderin' what's gonna happen to this fella. An' then suddenly Ah thought to m'self, what do Ah care what's gonna happen? Ah got better things ta do-an' Ah switched it off. Ah still go ta the movies 'cause that's about th' only thing to do on a date."

Finally the shot is ready. Roberta and Glenn are to run out of the ranch house, followed by the rest of the regulars and welcomed by several assorted cowboys. Cobb and the

newlyweds are to get into the surrey, while Doug, Randy, Clu and Jim mount and ride after them as they go up the road and over the hill. Drury is asked to remove his sunglasses for it; he does. "Do we throw rice?" asks a cowboy. "No, stones," says Cobb.

Lee J. Cobb doesn't like Virginian. When a young actor came on the set to begin one segment, Cobb met him with, "My condolences." If he hates the series so much, why doesn't he just quit? "I am obliged to stay with it." Why doesn't he break his contract? "Well, you know, there is an awful lot of money involved." But Lee Cobb feels he is slumming; he looks at you with tired, glazed eyes and says, "I'm ashamed of it." He has been ashamed of it for three years and, it seems, he is going to keep right on being ashamed of it and keep right on taking all that money.

Everyone is given a handful of rice, and the scene is filmed. As the surrey goes off, Doug leads the riders in pursuit, waving them on with a broad overhand gesture, presumably just in case anyone forgets which way they're going. Something proves unsatisfactory and the cast is asked to repeat the scene. "We're gonna do continued

it again," Cobb calls out, "because some wise guy, instead of throwing rice, was throwing Rice-a-roni."

Drury strolls over to the tree, near the camera, and asks an assistant director when he thinks they'll be through; he wants to catch a 6 o'clock plane. The man assures him that he'll make it. "Hey, come on, fellas," Drury yells anyway, "let's get this done, huh?"

James Drury is temperamental: He refused to be photographed or interviewed for a magazine article on the series unless the piece was only about him and the cover photo of him alone. On location, he sits impassively in his chair, dark sunglasses hiding his eyes. A bit overweight, the actor has a boyish smile of enthusiasm when he feels like it-moody, stubborn touchiness when he doesn't. A fine heavy, he is still a trifle uncomfortable in a heroic pose, Jim Drury, the Virginian. but no Gary Cooper.

Meanwhile, away from the ranch, in his office high up in the new Universal Tower, The Virginian's executive producer, Norman Macdonnell (who spent 10 years with Gunsmoke). talks: "Over-all, the characters don't have as much depth as the Gunsmoke cast-and I'd like to make them a little more fallible, more human." The large, distinguished man with dark mustache and grav-white hair, leans forward in his chair. "I asked Randy. 'What is your character doing in this series? What does he want?' Well.

we're giving him a goal this yearhe's saving money to get himself a ranch. With Doug we'd like to this too-and to get from the ho-ho-that's-rich-doubletake stuff. Doug can be a very good parlor comedian. And sometimes he oughta get out and hit someone."

Does Macdonnell have any changes in mind for Cobb? "I don't think anybody is going to change Mr. Cobb." The producer grins wearily. "He's going to be Mr. Cobb. But I would like to do the same thing with Lee, I'd like the Judge to lose his temper once in a while. But, you see, all the principals have a preconceived notion of what they want to do, of their image. I wanted Drury to be sitting on his bunk with a darning egg, and sewing his socks up. Well, he didn't want to do it-didn't fit his image. He may be right, but I had a feeling if we saw the Virginian sewing up his socks. he'd be more human."

Back at the ranch, the second take of the wedding exodus has worked. The actors have settled down.

Randy strums a chord, reads the first verse of a poem he wrote called "The Last Train": "Many's the time I've stood at the station/And watched those big trains go/Just to hear the leavin' sounds they make/And hear that whistle blow . . ."

Doug is sprawled under a small tree, Roberta's stand-in at his side.


Clu leans back in his chair on the porch, puffs several times on his pipe. "Did I tell you? I'm gonna do a stage production of Molière's 'The Miser' -in French ..."

And so it goes with The Virginians.

Batman

Nowadays, it seems, we not only have good guys and bad guys, we also have bat guys. And, if this show is not to be taken seriously, it certainly is to be taken serially—for each episode is double-barreled to come to you on two successive nights. This means that if you have the misfortune to have another engagement the night of Part 2, well, you've bat had it. One cliffhanger between Parts 1 and 2, for example, had Boy Wonder tied down and apparently about to be carved up by the foul "Riddler." In Part 2, however, it turned out Riddler merely wanted to take an impression of Boy Wonder's face. "His face," Riddler chortled, "sure makes a great first impression."

The whole show, on first impression, may not be as great. It is, after all, trying to be all things to all men. Still, it is the season's most talkedabout offering. Children, bless their evil little hearts, are apparently supposed to take it at face value, while us old folks are supposed to like it because it's so far "out" it's "in," and also—sort of the way we go to bat for old movies—for its nostalgic value.

One thing is certain. The show is technically superior—in photography,

color, pace and direction-to any of its Bond-type competitors, and it also has by far the most ingenuity to be found anywhere in TV spyence fiction -all the way from the batmobile to the batzooka and the batarang (boomerang, of course. Are you OK in the belfry?). Besides all this, the lines are double-leveled too, for old and young-not only by the actors, whose exclamations range from "Curses!" and "Great heaven!" to "Holy haberdashery!" and "Great heavenly sunshades!" but also by the off-stage announcer who favors us with "What foul trickery are the fiendish Riddler and his evil Molehill Mob up to now?" and "Oh, the irony of it! The horror!"

The acting is, unfortunately, almost equally curious. Adam West may be excused by the fact that it isn't easy to be convincing as millionaire Bruce Wayne and Batman-and at the same time convince half the viewers you're for real and the other half you're for fun. But Burt Ward, who, as Boy Wonder Robin and Dick Gravson, has a far easier role, is far less easy to excuse. Fortunately, they are surrounded by fine regulars like the Police Commissioner (Neil Hamilton) and Aunt Harriet (Madge Blake), and they also have going for them possibly the best thing about this show -the idea of special guest villains. Although Frank Gorshin handled "The Riddler" as if he had done one too many impersonations, Burgess Meredith was superb waddling through his role as "The Penguin." and the list of other "Hissable Enemies No. 1" left no doubt as to the show's future. Our only worry is that Hubbell Robinson (top-ranking television executive) once said the entire history of television could be written under one title, "What's New, Copycat?" If this is so, can't you just see those "creators" at CBS and NBC now that the word has gone out? Not just copycat, of course-but copybat.
