

■ Pssst. We're being surveyed again. Don't look now but that young man who just ducked behind the potted plant isn't a CIA agent after all. He's a representative of Gallup & Robinson, the research outfit, and he's checking on color commercials.

About 10 percent of American homes now have color sets. Is it, then, worth-while for sponsors to spend the additional money to make their commercials in color when they'll be seen in black and white anyway by 90

percent of the audience?

■ Gallup & Robinson already has finished one of its studies—on the comparative effectiveness of color commercials on color shows, black-and-white commercials on black-and-white shows, and black-and-white commercials on color shows. (They check this by calling on housewives the day after a commercial is telecast, providing them with a brand-name cue, and seeing whether they recall specific points made in the commercial.)

It turned out that even with the relatively small number of color-set homes, color commercials are so much more effective than black-and-white that the sponsor winds up with his

money's worth.

■ This is what the first study showed: You are much more likely—55 percent more likely—to recall color commercials on color shows than black-and-white commercials on black-and-white shows.

■ You recall black-and-white commercials on color shows just about as well—or poorly—as you recall the same black-and-white commercials on black-and-white shows.

All of which could mean that if commercials are effective in selling you products when they're in black and white, you're going to buy even more when you get your color set.

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


How TV stars shed pounds —and dollars




Backus on a reducing machine. Rollers revolve; break down fatty tissue.




Anne-Marie Bennstrom supervises Clint Walker and Sam Jaffe in isometric exercise.

And they want them malleable and amenable to ease the masculine ego into such indulgences as beauty treatments, oil and massage for the hair, manicures for the pinkies, softening pads for the tootsies. To help them keep track of their exotic schedules, each man is pinned with a little cardboard clock schedule.

Did you know

'CBS Reports' never stops trying to open America's eyes

he "cowbarn" is CBS's massive production-center building hugging Manhattan's Hudson River. The center, which was a cowbarn long before CBS became a gleam in William Paley's eye, houses the CBS Reports production offices. The unit, a catacomb-cluster of viewing rooms, recording studios, and film cutters' cubicles, is situated at the end of a seemingly endless hall which appears, to a walker anyway, as prohibitive as U.S. Highway 1.

There's a reason, it seems. The CBS Reports offices are apparently "off limits" to all but "authorized" personnel. As one CBS press representative cautioned this reporter: "Don't look for a welcome mat up there. Strangers aren't trusted around CBS Reports."

That's putting it mildly. In fact, the sight of an alien body wandering about the premises (especially a body with pencil in hand) all but sends grown men scurrying into closets. As Fred Friendly, CBS News president, explains the clandestine climate: "Television news is a highly competitive business. You lose stories if you tip your hand." And Palmer Williams, the program's executive producer, adds, "We feel the walls have ears." Then Williams, a squarely built, singularly unassuming man, drops a pointed "Remember what happened to us with the KKK and NBC?"

What appears to have happened there was that NBC, learning that CBS Reports was planning to do a story on the Klan, threw three "quickie" Klan

reports into the Huntley-Brinkley newscasts.

Actually, it's all part of the normal network news game. CBS has its ears to NBC's walls too. There was the time CBS News producer Don Hewitt got hold of NBC's blueprints for the network's political convention coverage. He returned them after a husky NBC unit manager threatened to throw him out of a hotel window, but meanwhile he had a little time for studying.

But whatever reason CBS Reports has for keeping things under wraps, they do a bang-up job of it. For instance, this reporter, being shown the production facilities by the show's director of operations, David Buksbaum (a young guy with a fullback's build and a disposition to match), was allowed merely a peekaboo look into various rooms ("This is a producer's office. . . . This is a viewing room. . . . This is a film-cutting room")—exhibits which, all told, aren't anything to stop the presses over in the first place.

Later, a tall, baggy-suited man who turned out to be producer Joe Wershba barged into Williams' office and, spotting this reporter taking notes, growled: "Who's that guy over there? Is he on our side?" Williams told him that the note-taker was on TV Gume's side, and Wershba snorted: "Well, thanks a lot for warning me"—and stormed out of the room.

More than just competitive cloakand-dagger falderal is involved in the CBS newsmen's dedication to *Reports*, however. Thomas Whiteside, writing

in The New Yorker, once observed: "There is something of a mystic Masonic quality about Friendly's attitude toward the members of his unit . . . as though he regarded his men as bearers of a flag." To Friendly, the show comes close to a holy mission. "What the American does not know." he says, "can kill him."

Since the time of its first offering, "Biography of a Missile" in October 1959, the series undoubtedly has been the most distinguished in news documentary programming. (The only other regularly scheduled network news documentary is ABC Scope.) Sharing its time (Tuesday, 10-11 P.M., ET) with CBS News Specials, it has presented a kaleidoscopic gallery of contemporary problems and personalities. There have been profiles of such movers of our times as Eisenhower ("Eisenhower on the Presidency" in three parts), De Gaulle ("The Trials of Charles de Gaulle"), Dean Rusk ("An Hour with the Secretary of State"), the way we're all taxed ("The Taxed American") and the way we may be poisoning ourselves with pesticides ("The Silent Spring of Rachel Carson").

CBS Reports comes by its abrasive nature naturally. It was the battling successor of the late Edward R. Murrow's outspoken See It Now series, which Friendly, who's been president of CBS News since 1964, in those days co-produced. In 1958, CBS, then sailing smoothly on its fantastically popular quiz shows, axed the Murrow series. It had no regular sponsor—and it was troublesome. Friendly recalls: "When the end came, Ed and I were very, very bitter."

The bitterness eventually wore off, however. In 1959, the quiz-show scandals blew up in CBS's corporate face, and to salvage its image the network is said to have hastily reinstated See It Now under the title of CBS Reports. Friendly was placed in charge, and Murrow, on leave of absence (he denied it was because of a feud with CBS) served as reporter-narrator on numerous CBS Reports studies.

Friendly, an imposing (6-feet-2), loose-limbed man of 50 whom Carl Sandburg once described as always appearing "as if he had just got off a foam-flecked horse," acknowledges that the quiz mess had a part in CBS Reports' getting on the air, but adds characteristically candid cares?" He says, "Even if CBS Reports hadn't accomplished anything else, we proved that we could get controversial -and crucial-issues on the air."

That they did. In fact, CBS Reports' courage in tackling touchy (for TV) topics may rank as its major contribution. It certainly has made for its

most provocative programs.

The first such study was "Harvest of Shame" back in 1960. And the program, a shocking exploration of the plight of America's migrant workers, is today considered a documentary classic. Since then CBS Reports has boldly examined such vital issues as cigarets and lung cancer. continued

birth control, prayers in public schools and its most volatile subject, abortion.

Now Friendly, whose frequent tantrums were well known around CBS Reports, is still close to the show, but he appears harnessed, even placid, in the deep-cushioned confines of an executive suite. He admits: "I'm so ill-prepared for a large part of this job—the money side of the news, the legal end." Then, with some of the "foam-flecked horse" vigor Sandburg was talking about, he says, "And, so help me, before I get to be 65, I'm going back where I belong—producing documentaries in that 'cowbarn.'"

Indeed, CBS Reports people are a little "holier than thou" when it comes to the side of television that pays the bills—entertainment. It's more than the usual "detached cynicism" generally attributed to newsmen. Says Friendly: "CBS Reports cares little for the show-business world."

This single-minded dedication reflects Friendly's belief that television, as he puts it, "was meant to be a news medium." "There's a limit," he goes on, "to just how much entertainment can be created. You can be overentertained, but never overinformed. Years ago, I used to think that reality was far more exciting than fiction. Now I know it." Friendly acknowledges that many would disagree, but he argues: "The fact remains that shooting a man up in a rocket is more exciting than shooting a cowboy on Bonanza and seeing catsup seep out of his shirt."

On the bottom

The inevitable rebuttal, of course, is that an estimated 50 million people are watching Bonanza while CBS Reports, which habitually ends up on the bottom of the Nielsen charts, is seen by 10 million or so. Reasons for the series' general lack of appeal range from the time-worn "people never watch

public-affairs shows" to Friendly's own explanation that CBS Reports has "failed to involve people" in the issues it presents. "We haven't dug deeply enough," he says. "And we have to interpret more. In that area, we're really not as good as people think we are. But, at first, getting controversial issues on the air was trouble enough."

It undoubtedly was. Yet controversy, which Friendly calls "the most essential CBS Reports ingredient," has, to many, been conspicuously absent in recent CBS Reports programs. Friendly is aware of it. Early in 1965 he said: "I've told my people I want more controversy, not less," and he got it in the recent study on the Ku Klux Klan. "Yet even the Klan program," Friendly admits, "wasn't true controversy. Exposing the Klan for what it is, is pretty much staying on the side of the angels."

A right to be dull

But Friendly rationalizes that "We must have the right to be dull at times. We don't want people to think that we go only to fires." And he feels that the shortage of provocative programs will be alleviated when CBS Reports examines, in his words, "one of the stormiest issues we've ever gone after, homosexuality, in 'Homosexuality and the Law.' We are out to shock with this one. It's what we do best, and we've often forgotten that lately."

As for CBS Reports' future, Friendly is confident. To those who may believe that television is approaching the comic-strip level, Friendly is quick to blast back. "Time was when comic strips were all that many Americans would read. Today they're reading good novels and nonfiction works by the carload. Anyone who says the same isn't true for television viewers—when tens of millions are watching health tests and 'Ulysses'—is a damned fool."



The other noon, a tour guide, escorting visitors through MGM's TV establishment in Culver City, Cal., pointed out a young woman downing her Metrecal in the studio commissary. "And that," he said. "is Lee Kurty, who plays Nurse Zoe Lawton in Dr. Kildare." Lee Kurty raced to the nearest phone and relayed to her folks in Pittsburgh the news of this latest milestone in her acting career. The only thing unusual is that Lee

Kurty didn't trip on the way to the

phone and break her leg.

Lee Kurty is accident prone. She is also accident supine. Prone, she recently reached under the stove in her modest (\$160-a-month) Beverly Hills apartment and strained a muscle in her neck. Supine, she'd just fallen from her motor scooter, trying to navigate a curve up at Green Valley Lake, near California's Lake Arrowhead. Doubly battered, she lugged herself to a doctor, belabored him with a harrowing history of past mishaps and wailed: "Doc, what's wrong with me?"

"Young lady," he said scientifically, "you are a klutz."

A klutz, for the uninitiated, is a clumsy person, a bungler, an oaf who is all thumbs, and most of these dislocated. Lee Kurty is a klutz.

She is other things as well, not the least being a shapely (5-foot-6, 120-pound) blonde, delightfully direct about all things except her age (she says she's 26 but isn't), and understandably pleased with her job, where for \$500 a week she brings a medicinedropperful of romance into the otherwise antiseptic life of Jim Kildare.

Pleased with the role, but not ecstatic. It would be an understatement to say there have been meatier lines than those recited by Miss Kurty twice a week. Miss Kurty's progress in Dr. Kildare has been agonizingly slow. When she won the role over 200 aspirants this past May, the show's producers were alarmed to

discover she had never played before a TV film camera, except for a commercial, and had much to learn about the techniques of the medium. In addition, Richard Chamberlain, as Dr. Kildare, is a man adored by millions of viewing females who naturally will not take lightly his discovering permanent love. Finally, the new half-hour format of Kildare, though not quite soap opera. moves at a soap opera's pace, which is to say, barely. Thus, in "Hour of Decision," which ought to have been titled "Half Hour of Indecision," the script reads:

KILDARE: Zoe, about-about tonight? Zoe (anticipating him): . . . You can't make it.

KILDARE: I wouldn't be very good company. . . .

Zoe (understanding): Sure. Maybe next week.

By next week, of course, they still hadn't had that date. On the show of Oct. 18, Kildare did plant a kiss on Miss Kurty's creamy cheek, but he explained he was actually thinking of another girl, and Zoe responded: "That's all right. I'm glad I was handy." It isn't romance the way Romeo and Juliet went at it, but then whose is?

Lee Kurty takes all this with a cheerful show, but she has also taken to going about the set at the end of a working day, yelling: "More words! I want more words!" She means it. When she joined the Kildare crew, Richard Chamberlain was wildly approving. "I love her," he said. "She's super!" Today he is mildly approving. "Lee has come along quite well. She represents offbeat casting. She is not used to the camera. I guess I help her with camera angles and the rest. She has strong opinions. I had tons to learn when I first started. She is still not aware she has tons to learn. Why should she? She's young."

Lee Kurty agrees she is helped by Chamberlain ("He even

wants to put on my makeup for me"), but she adds airily: "I'd like to do a stage play with Dick. Then I'd teach him."

If Miss Kurty is bringing a refreshing directness to Kildare, it may not be a minute too soon. In its fifth year, the show has begun to show its age. It became a brief moment of pride to producer Douglas Benton early this season when Kildare finally caught up with The Legend of Jesse James in the ratings. And though Benton says, for the record, there is no talk about canceling at the end of the current season, Kildare is in trouble.

Accident prone

Not that cancellation after Miss Kurty's first year with the show is likely to depress the ebullient blonde. Laetitia Ann Kurty has been down before. Born 26 or 28 years ago in Pittsburgh, daughter of Andrew and Emma Kurty, she spent much of her childhood recuperating. There was an auto accident, plus a fractured skull, fractured elbow and fractured index finger of either the right or left hand. (Miss Kurty is not sure which.)

The fractured skull, at age 8, was the worst. She and another girl engaged in a wrestling match, and Lee fell backward, hitting her head against a curbstone. She was in bed for four months, and then had to promise not to ride her bike when she was up and about, because—she was told—the slightest bump might kill her. So she promptly rode other people's bikes. If the skull was the worst, falling from the top of a locker in the ninth grade was the most unusual. What was she doing atop a locker to begin with?

"How else," she asks rhetorically, "can you slide down unless you climb to the top?" She slid down, and wore a pillow for a week.

At the St. Francis Academy for Girls she encountered a strong-willed nun. Sister Liguoria, who insisted the girl read her lines in "Anne of Green Gables" more loudly, even though Lee was wearing newly tightened braces on her teeth that made talking excruciating. Liguoria inspired Miss Kurty and somehow made future difficulties seem less difficult. Lee became a drama major at Carnegie Tech in Pittsburgh, played summer stock for a few seasons, and went to New York in 1961, where she first worked as a guide for NBC. Progress was slower then than now. By 1963 she had advanced to waiting on tables at Howard Johnson's. She landed a role on the daytime TV soap opera Search for Tomorrow but lasted just three weeks, because-she says-"the writers didn't like my face." Then came summer shows at the Nutmeg Playhouse in Storrs, Conn.

She went to Melbourne, Australia, in 1963 with a touring company of "Barefoot in the Park," and six months later decided to go around the world, which she did with a single suitcase and a pair of sneakers.

Long shot pays off

Back in New York, she appeared in the short-lived "Absence of a Cello" on Broadway and then was tested by MGM for a role in the movie "The Singing Nun." She wasn't right (and she knew it) for the film, but Dudley Wilkinson, New York casting director for Metro, suggested she might be the girl for Kildare. MGM flew Lee to the Coast, tested her on a Thursday, and on Monday morning her agent telephoned the hotel where the girl waited word, and said: "How'd you like to be a television star?" Lee Kurty began to cry.

Although acting is nearly an obsession with Lee Kurty, she dabbles in other arts. She recently finished writing a juvenile story, "Yum Yum Poo in the Mountain." "Yum Yum Poo is an animal who looks like all the animals in the forest," she says. "I've taken the best part of each." She has also written poems but complains she can't get them published. "They're schmaltzy, and romantic, and they rhyme. Rhyming is very bad today." One poem goes:

"Search forever
It's never there.
Lost completely,
Who will care?
Alone comes tomorrow.
Love, just a little let me borrow."

Perhaps there are other reasons they have not been published.

She has dancing dates ("No one boy, but many friends") at Hollywood discothèques, drinks an occasional martini, takes guitar lessons and worries over her weight. It's supposed to be 115, but it's 120, and producers have been admonishing her lately to get rid of some of it. But mainly, there's her work and her accidents.

One day she leaned against the glass-top dining table in her apartment, and the glass cracked down the middle, smashing into slivereens. "I wasn't even sitting on the table," she explains indignantly. "Just resting lightly." Naturally shaken, she went to the bathroom to repair her face, and in the process pulled the sink out of the wall.

She is, she says, her own worst enemy, and not simply because any minute she is likely to break her pretty neck. "I am a perfectionist about my work, much too demanding on myself." When she is home on Monday and Tuesday evenings, she steels herself to watching the Kildare show, to assess her performance.

And when she sees herself, what does she say?

"'Yucch!' I say. 'There goes that klutz of a nurse!'"

"Uncle Miltie": The old pro is making a comeback. Milton Berle, television's first big star, will return next fall in a one-hour weekly variety show on ABC. Although a time period was not officially announced, it was reported it probably will be 7:30 Saturday nights.

In 1948, when there were less than a million sets, people stood before appliance store windows and crowded into bars to catch "Uncle Miltie" on Tuesday nights. By 1955, however, his popularity had waned. He returned in 1958 and 1960 in regular shows, but with little success, and since then he has done mostly guest appearances.

Shift: Less than a year after he succeeded James T. Aubrey Jr. as president of the CBS television network, 40-year-old John A. Schneider was promoted to a newly created post at CBS: group vice president-broadcasting. No sooner did he have the seat warm than he had a chance to use his new-found authority.

The promotion placed Schneider third in command at CBS behind chairman William S. Paley and Dr. Frank Stanton, president. In his new position, he was authorized to "coordinate the activities" of four CBS divisions-television, radio, news and stations.

Schneider was appointed on Wednesday. On Thursday afternoon he forbade news president Fred Friendly to televise live the Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearings on Vietnam. Friendly, considered a "strong personality," protested vigorously, but Schneider made his decision stick. NBC continued to carry the hearings, and CBS had televised Gen. Instead we found . . . a drive for financial success, an obsession about going along with the 'in' crowd, a lack of awareness of the world about them. In short, an ambition centering on a good-paying job, money, success."

Ban the Bombing Film: The TV banning of a documentary showing nuclear devastation is causing lively controversy in Britain. This film, banned by the British Broadcasting Corporation as "too horrifying," portrays the possible conditions in the county of Kent after it is laid waste by Soviet nuclear bombs.

Following a showing of the film, "The War Game," to a blue-ribbon audience of newsmen and VIP's, most newspapers said the BBC was correct in its decision, but for the wrong reason. The film was political propaganda for the "no nuclear deterrent" crowd, they said, without the balancing view that perhaps a nuclear deterrent was just what was needed to prevent such -Henry Harding scenes.

During these 50 years, Michelangelo worked for three successive Popes—Leo, Clement VII and Paul III—in Florence and later in Rome. Views of his sculpture, painting and architecture include the Medici tomb, the Laurenziana Library, the Piazza del Campidoglio, the Last Judgment fresco in the Sistine Chapel and the tomb of Julius II, his first Vatican patron.

Throughout his life, Michelangelo claimed that he was a sculptor and not a painter or an architect, but his Papal patrons did not listen to argument. At the age of 72, Michelangelo was made chief architect of St. Peter's in Rome, where he redesigned the structure, crowning it with the monumental dome that still dominates the city.

Ben Gazzara
is traveling first class
all the way
in the run of his life

e've spent \$20,000 for clothing so far and there's more coming. I got two tuxedos that are unknown to medical science. They cost a grand apiece. I got one in brocade; I haven't worn it yet. The producers are going crazy continued

trying to write a scene where I can wear a tux that we paid a grand for. Heh-heh-heh-heh-heh.

"I had seven pair of shoes made. Made! In Buffalo. I had copies done of some Italian shirts—\$24 apiece. Wholesale. People love the cuffs. Now I got 12 suits, 17 pairs of slacks, 34 shirts, eight sport jackets, about 19 sweaters. They got one whole trailer for my clothes. Heh-heh-heh-heh

"I intend to steal it all. The first day they cancel they're gonna have to chase me. At least I'll come out of this series with a wardrobe. Hehheh-heh-heh-heh. The budget guy told me: "The clothing bill! No actress on this lot ever spent more money for her wardrobe.' Heh-heh-heh-heh. I was named one of the 10 best-dressed men by the Custom Tailors Guild of America. A kid from the teeming tenements. I'm sartorially

Puffing on a handmade, 50-cent Jamaican cigar, Ben Gazzara was reveling in the success of his television series Run for Your Life, and some of its fringe benefits. He was seated in the most desirable booth at La Scala in Beverly Hills, disarmingly casual in a \$3.98 surfer's shirt and rumpled cotton slacks, sipping on a dry martini made with Bombay gin. The grunts of maniacal laughter that customarily punctuate his highdecibel conversation could easily be heard above the chatter of other Hollywood celebrities and the syrupy Muzak that filled the restaurant.

"Nobody can talk louder than Benny," his wife, actress Janice Rule, had warned. 'He's one of the great boozers," press-agent David Foster had promised. "He'll drink you to the floor." Gazzara was well on his way to proving both prophecies.

"I go big, big first class," he boasted, in a voice that was a cross between a purr and a growl. "In my dressing room we don't eat the regular steak. I order the bigger one, the New York cut. In the commissary I go the route. I'm the only one to have my own bottle of wine. Chateau Margaux. Chateauneuf Du Pape. Sometimes Bardolino. Heads turn. 'Who is that?' they're saying: 'Who does he think he is?' I break all the rules."

The 35-year-old actor, anticipating a long run for Life, has moved into a \$150,000 Westwood home formerly owned by producer Norman Panama. It came equipped with an L-shaped swimming pool, billiard room, film projection facilities and white pillars out front reminiscent of "Gone with the Wind." His two daughters were content with their own quarter horse, a bay mare named Ginger. He could luxuriate in being driven to and from the Universal studios in a blue Cadillac convertible, soon to be replaced by a Rolls.

There was not a cavity in his mouth, he still had most of his oilcloth black hair, and his weight had steadied at 168 pounds. But recently, after abandoning regular workouts in a gym, he was checking it on the scales twice a day. "You feel your body corroding," he admitted, "but who's going to get on the floor and do exercises? Who has the time? I drink for workouts. I either need a Bloody Mary to straighten up in the morning or I'm in a foul mood. I think I'm going to roar tonight. I have all weekend to take care of my liver."

For those seeking parallels, there seemed to be a distinct link between the high living being enjoyed by Gazzara since his show's emergence and the last fling of attorney Paul Bryan, the character he plays, who has been given two years to live with an unspecified mortal disease. (The malady is actually leukemia, ironically the same illness that killed "This is a Gazzara's own father.) boom town where people come to strike it rich," Ben observed, reaching for his second martini. "You either do or you don't. It's the roll of the dice. An enormous crap game."

Two years ago, the name of the game was Arrest and Trial, a 90-minute cops-and-robbers flop that had barely lasted the season, Gazzara was so disillusioned with the proceedings that he often departed the set punctually at 6 P.M., whether or not filming was completed. "I never should have done that show," Ben said, chewing on an olive with his even upper teeth and six capped lowers. "There was no dimension to my role, no passion, no humanity. I thought the character's personal life would be developed. All I did was ask questions. And how many ways are there to say: 'Follow that car'? Arrest and Trial I've written off as my television exposure year, so they'd know me in Cleveland. Detroit and the rest of the country. It was part of the continued

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Midway through the 1950's Gazzara was regarded as the hottest young Broadway actor since Marlon Brando. His first three plays—"End as a Man." "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof" and "A Hatful of Rain"-were runaway hits. An idealistic member of the Actors Studio, he flatly rejected long-term contracts and roles in films like "War and Peace" that would have paid him more than \$100,000 plus the use of a villa and a maid. "I was dealing with material in the theater that was rich," he says. "I figured it would last forever. Childlike dreams, I didn't think I needed the movies. When I think of it now, I can vomit. And here I am in Hollywood, grinding the mill."

A brilliant actor

During the summer of 1964, his motion-picture activities stagnant, Gazzara accepted a lead in "A Rage to Live." His salary for the pale replica of the John O'Hara novel, his first Hollywood movie in three years, was only \$25,000. Justifiably, the critics roasted the film, which was released in December. It hardly seemed that they were viewing the Gazzara that director Elia Kazan had once called "One of the three most brilliant actors in the English-speaking theater."

"I was not paid as much as I'm worth," Gazzara insists. "But coming out of a series that you despised, the idea of doing a film was mesmerizing. When you're not Clark Gable or Rock Hudson, and offered the plum parts in plum motion pictures, you're at a disadvantage. So I conned myself into doing 'Rage to Live.' You never realize the embarrassment you feel when you see yourself on screen not doing your best work. There wasn't material there for me to express myself. I will not even go to see it.

"Manuel!" Gazzara's buzz-saw basso ordered the waiter to his table. He selected Zucchini Primo, sausages and peppers and a bottle of Marques de Riscal. "Would you open the wine," he commanded, "and let it breathe?" After tasting it, he reminisced about Manhattan's Lower East Side.

"We became altar boys, my gang and I, at a Carmelite church on 29th Street," he recalled. "At the age of 8 I broke into the wine cabinet, got fried on that 14-proof Italian wine and got fired. I think I'm the only altar

boy that ever got fired."

Even with the acquisition of his new Los Angeles home, New York remains Gazzara's sanctuary, as well as his permanent residence. hangout, rather than show-business haunts like Sardi's and Downey's, is bar called Harold's Show Spot. Several years ago he helped organize a softball team at Harold's that ultimately played other bars for \$200 a man. Typically, Gazzara was the chatter guy in center field, delivering a nonstop monolog to his teammates. "I was the hollerer." he says. "What I didn't have in talent I made up in a nice, loud, boisterous. Leo Durocher-style hustle."

His sports career ended abruptly one afternoon when he tore some ligaments sliding into third base. His wife marched on the field, threw some tranquilizers into his mouth drove him back to their apartment on 79th Street and Riverside Drive overlooking the Hudson River. "It was Janice's place before me," says Gazzara. "I tell her I got married to get that pad. Heh-heh-heh-heh. Ten glorious rooms with high ceilings where French windows go up to the ceilings. The apartment symbolizes the possibilities to continue the work I once began to do. I came into the theater starry-eyed and thinking everything was possible. I can become very cynical about the theater today, because so much bad theater is

rampant. But my dream started in New York and it goes on."

Gazzara, who once could do no wrong on the stage, returned to in 1964 in "Traveller Broadway Without Luggage," a Jean Anouilh play. It ran only six weeks and lost \$150,000. In its aftermath he performed on a Kraft Suspense Theatre that served as a spin-off for Run for Your Life. NBC quickly bought the series for its 1965-66 schedule. But a month before the show went into production Gazzara found himself scrapping with executive producer Roy Huggins.

Pilot character shadowy

"When I did the pilot, I felt the character was shadowy," says Ben, "but this was a sales pitch to the network, merely to show them where the show could go. Then when I saw the first scripts, I thought: 'Here it is again. I can't play this character. I won't be the conventional leading man on TV. Out of the question."

After reading the scripts, he flew back to New York in a pique, boycotting a scheduled production meeting. For two weeks he sulked in his 79th Street apartment. Only once did he break the silence, in a long-distance conversation with Huggins. They wound up shouting at each other and resolving nothing. Gazzara's agent, attorney and business manager finally convinced the actor to make a second trip to Hollywood, but again he returned dissatisfied.

"There were many insults," Gazzara recalls, "and quite a few people's feelings were hurt. By his knowledge of television, Huggins knows what works with the masses. I was asking for something that would move me. I refused to be a shadowy leading man who asks the guest stars questions so they can act up a storm. That was Arrest and Trial. I never once thought his concept of the show would fail.

But I was fighting for my life. I knew I would go absolutely out of my mind if things stayed the way they were. My battle was to get Paul Bryan into situations where the human condition is exploited, explored. My scream was deepen, deepen, and it still is.

"I was also asking for more irreverence in the character, more of an antihero than he is. Roy resisted. We see now that Bryan is not an antihero and the ratings are good. So I have to bow to Huggins and say maybe he's right. But the struggle still continues, to get more humor, more irreverence. Now there is an uneasy peace. Like the UN. You don't have to like each other, but at least don't kill each other. At best, television is a compromise. The producer's job is to mount a show that will attract the masses. The artist's job is to keep his immortal soul intact.

"Hey, Manuel!" he bellowed. "Portateci bottiglia di questa continued



porcheria!" ("Bring us another bottle of this slop.") Manuel opened some more Marques De Riscal. "Calley!" Gazzara had spotted producer John Calley entering the restaurant and boomed his greeting across the room. "Ah, his voice in murmur rising over the crowd," said Calley, as the two friends shook hands.

A Sicilian peasant voice

"I do get loud, I know that," Gazzara admitted later. "My mother had a very powerful voice. An old Sicilian peasant voice. I am known to be misunderstood because I get boisterous and hostile and overvociferous. I feel that everyone is much too staid in this country. People whisper too much. And their conversations are much too subdued."

Nowadays, with the success of this show, Gazzara's voice is sounding even louder. His asking price for films has jumped back up to six figures. His deal for Run for Your Life calls for 12 consecutive weeks off to make a film, 20 percent of the series' profits and an opportunity to direct several episodes. "I hope," he says, facetiously, "I could be as good a director as Vince Edwards. Heh-heh-heh-heh."

Many of his more animated moments involve Jack Krupnick, a wealthy show-business buff who serves as Gazzara's chauffeur, standin, trouble-shooter and one-man retinue. Krupnick owns four race horses, a medical-supply business and a finance company. His greatest pleasure, however, is collecting Gazzara at 6 A.M., driving him to work, buying his cigarets, food and wine, turning on his dressing-room air conditioning and ministering to the star. For those chores, Krupnick gets \$100 a week.

"Whenever I'm unhappy," Gazzara says, "he gets on the phone and says: 'I'm holdin' The Man down. I'm holdin' him from walkin' off the set.'

He calls me 'The Man.' Yet he can buy and sell me. He's a millionaire.

"When Arrest and Trial was being canceled, he was sad that we were going to be leaving each other. He said: 'I feel like buying enough Universal stock and having a proxy fight and throwing out Lew Wasserman [the studio president]! Heh-heh-heh-hehheh. It was beautiful. My stand-in having a proxy fight. Heh-heh-hehheh-heh. Not only that, Krupnick has his own stand-in. Now he's giving me opinions about whether a script is good or not. 'You know a good writer?' he says. 'We'll buy him.' My stand-in! He promised me that if this show got ratings he'd get a Rolls-Royce and wear a chauffeur's hat. Well, I got him nailed, Heh-heh-hehheh-heh. I'm gonna hold him to it. And I'm gonna make him wear a damned hat. Heh-heh-heh-heh."

Despite his cackling, there exists a brooding quality beneath Gazzara's ebullient exterior. "While I'm happier today than I was eight months ago," he observes, "I don't think I'll ever be happy in television. It's like factory work. It's turning a dollar and getting exposure that perhaps may give you power. Run for Your Life could never fill my needs."


Money makes him more hostile

He lit another cigar and walked toward the door at La Scala. "I'm making an enormous amount of money," he said, "but it doesn't make me rest at all. If anything, it makes me more nervous and hostile. To entertain the masses, you have to compromise your taste. Too often I come home and take it out on my wife."

That night Gazzara's wife was at home, bedded with a virus infection. It was midnight and Ben was still restless. "I'm going over to The Daisy," he said, referring to a members-only discothèque, "drink a little brandy, and look over the scene. Heh-heh-heh-heh-"

The matriarch of 'The Beverly Hillbillies' explains how to prepare a real Ozarkian feast

Here's a feast fit for a Beverly Hillbilly -and for anybody else who has a hankering for some good, hearty country cooking. Granny Clampett whomps up meals like this for her well-fed clan in CBS's The Beverly Hillbillies, and you can do the same for yours. All you have to do is follow Granny's instructions in the recipes on pages 28 and 29. For those who are not fluent in Hillbilly-ese, translations of Granny's directions can be found in the right-hand column of the recipes, which have been excerpted from the book "Granny's Hillbilly Cookbook," by Irene Ryan and Cathey Pinckney (© 1966 by Renay Enterprises, Inc. and Cathey Pinckney), to be published soon by Prentice-Hall, Inc., Englewood Cliffs, N.J.





GRITS 'N' JOWLS

a heap o'grits	1 cup hominy grits
2 whole heaps o' boilin' water	4 cups boiling water
a little bit o' salt	1 tsp. salt
a whole heap o' cheese	8 oz., or about 2 cups of grated Cheddar cheese
a mess o' jowls	8 slices cooked, crumbled bacon or ½ cup chopped, cooked ham
some butter	2 tbsp. butter

Put the grits in the boilin' salted water and stir 'em a mite (30 seconds). Let 'em bubble and ''plop'' without boilin' hard for a good spell (about 20-30 minutes), a-stirrin' 'em off 'n on. Throw in the cheese, butter 'n jowls and mix 'em up 'til the cheese is melted. After you put 'em on the folks' plates, fix a piece o' butter on top before servin'.

And iffn you want a fancy lunch for a quiltin' party, put a poached egg on top o' the grits; you don't need 'nother thing 'ceptin' the coffee.

"Now you know right off," says Granny after finishing her third portion of her own Grits and Jowls, "that country-style cookin' is more than store-bought, butcher-cut, paper-wrapped, meat heatin'."

CRACKLIN' BREAD

Whenever you is brownin' a nice piece o' meat in a skillet, 'specially a juicy ham steak, leave the pan greased an' pour in yore favorite cornbread batter an' let 'er bake away.

Better yet, take some pea-sized pieces o' pig fat (the fat around a smoked ham, or bacon, is best) and sputter 'em in a skillet 'til they is a cracklin' away 'n nice 'n browned. Then throw in any ol' corn meal mixture for the most 'larrupin' treat of all. Leave them cracklin's right in the skillet so they crunches when you eats the bread.

RED EYE GRAVY A LA GRANNY

a juicy cut o' ham steak with lots o' fat around it	a medium-thick center-cut ham steak, or some slices of leftover ham	
a bit o' butter	1 tbsp. butter	
a cup o' java juice	1 cup black coffee	

Slash the fat 'round the ham 'bout every inch or so so's it won't curl while you is fryin' it. Melt the butter in a skillet and fry the ham 'til it's real brown on both sides. Take out the meat 'n pour in the java. When you mixes up the ham fat on top and the reddish soup underneath, you has real red-eye gravy. Splash it over the ham when you serves it but, best of all, save some to pour over hot biscuits.

SOME STRONG SPICED STRINGS

a bunch o' beans thet kin be	2 lbs. string beans, cleaned and with	
snapped, but don't snap 'em	only the tips cut off	
a whole heap o' picklin' juice	2 cups vinegar	
a quotom o' soured swamp water	2 cups water	
a dose o' dill	2 tbsp. powdered dill weed	
a grist o' garlic	1 large garlic clove for each jar	
some salt	1/4 cup salt	

Boil up your picklin' juice with yore water and dill. After she's boiled for a short spell (5 minutes), drop in them beans and let 'er all boil 'nother short spell (5 minutes). Add salt an' stir. Afore you put them beans 'n juice in hot (sterilized) little jugs (jars), put a peeled, scrubbed, gashed, clove o' garlic in each jug. Seal 'em off afterwards, but when you serves 'em, try servin' 'em cold too.

SASSAMANESH KETCHUP

a bunch o' bog bilberries	2 quarts cranberries, cleaned
a wad o' whoppin' onions	4 large onions, chopped
a whole heap o' picklin' juice	2 cups vinegar
a quotom o' well water	2 cups water
a mess o' short sweetnin'	3 cups sugar
a little salt	2 tsp. salt
a quotom o' pepper	2 tsp. ground pepper
another quotom o' red Injun root	2 tsp. mace
yet 'nother quotom o' phony pepper	2 tsp. paprika

Boil up them berries 'n onions in the picklin' juice 'n water. When they starts to bubble (simmer), add in the sweetnin' 'til it ain't seen no more. Then toss in all the rest o' the stuff, lettin' the whole thing bubble quietlike 'til it's thick enough for ketchup pourin'. Pour it inter hot (sterilized) ketchup bottles and seal 'em up tight.

BAKED A'LASSES

a heap o' sorghum	1 cup molasses
half as much earthy sweetnin'	1/2 cup brown sugar
hen's eggs, divorced	3 eggs, separated
some melted butter	2 tbsp. melted butter
th' bottom o' a pie outer-coverin'	an unbaked pie shell

Beat up th' egg yellers with th' sorghum, sweetnin' 'n butter. Beat up stiff th' whites o' th' eggs an' fold th' stiffened whites inta th' 'lasses batter. Pour it inta yore pie bottom an' bake a bit 'til she sets (30 minutes at 375° F.).



A NEW JAMES DEAN? WELL

Lee Majors of 'Big Valley' hasn't quite lived up to glowing predictions made for him

When show-business savants predict stardom for a new young actor, it is a common press-agent practice to hail him as, let us say, "the new James Dean." So it was with a tall, 24-year-old, blond, blue-eyed kid from Kentucky named Lee Majors, who plays Heath Barkley in ABC's The Big Valley.

The only difference in Majors' case is that he actually does resemble the late James Dean somewhat. He is a

kind of moody, introspective, yet devastatingly direct young man who lives alone on a three-acre ranch in Malibu along with two horses, 10 dogs, a raccoon and a burro; reads books about the power of positive thinking; and, when asked how he feels about women, replies, "They turn me on." He broke all the "humble" rules. Here was an ex-physical-education instructor who, before he tested for *The Big Valley* last spring, had never faced

a camera in his life; yet he was able to say with perfect equanimity, "After a few years in TV, I'd like to do movies. Seven years from now, if everything works, I'll be getting an Academy Award nomination."

Well, he may not get that nomination on schedule, but if he doesn't, it won't be his fault. Majors came into television at the beginning of the present season with about the noisiest send-off a young, inexperienced actor can get. Hollywood know-it-alls freely predicted that he would become an overnight sensation. Something about those boyish good looks, that Paul Newman stance, that faint James-Deanlike suggestion that, for all the virility, he could use a mother, caused ordinarily skeptical observers to flip their corks over him. Barbara Stanwyck, his co-star, found his "magnetism" irresistible, took him under her wing and tried to help get him over the litters that beset him during the early shooting. It was no secret among the cast that Majors was receiving the most attention and publicity. This caused annoyance to at least one other member of the cast, Peter Breck, who, like Dick Long (77 Sunset Strip), was once a star of his own series, Black Saddle. "They're obviously slanting things," groused earlier in the season. "They figure Lee will appeal more to the teen-age group. It's rude-unfair."

Breck was right. Majors did. However, as the season wore on, it became more and more evident that he was far from "the new James Dean." As associate producer Lou Morheim put it, "He's not exactly the rage of the network, but his fan mail is tremendous, twice as much as any of his costars." (If there was a new star who inspired more widespread hysteria, it was Roy Thinnes over on The Long Hot Summer whose unexpected success undoubtedly contributed to veteran Edmond O'Brien's sudden decision to quit the show.) What then is

Majors?

"Well," explains Jules Levy, one of his three producers, "you have to remember that there are five other stars. It took the *Bonanza* guys two years to catch on, Besides Lee isn't the whole show like—well, like Chuck Connors was in *The Rifleman* and now is in *Branded*.

"Anyway, who says Connors is a star? In Arrest and Trial he died. Stars are different from actors. I can get you actors by the dozens. I know great ones who can't get themselves arrested. This kid, on the other hand, jumps out of the screen at you. One day people will come to discover it."

Majors' own view of his "failure" to justify the great expectations of the know-it-alls is more direct and to the point. He says, "Everybody has to be compared to somebody. So with me it happened to be James Dean. I never knew the man. Actually you have to build your own image. I've found my place. I've something I want to give." A pause. Then he adds wistfully, "If you were a football player, wouldn't you want to go to the Rose Bowl?"

In the summer of 1963 no one had ever heard of Lee Majors. He came to Los Angeles fresh from Eastern Kentucky State College with a footballplaying background and a degree in physical education. He paid his rent working as a recreation director for the city of Los Angeles. Somewhere along the line it occurred to him that this was Hollywood and that actors were somewhat better paid than recreation directors. He got himself a dramatic coach, Estelle Harman; an agent, Dick Clayton, who also happened to have been James Dean's agent; and a faraway look in his eye. Two years later he was on the stage at CBS Studio Center rehearsing lines for The Big Valley, picked from several dozen aspirants for the same job. most of them professionals, as if-well, didn't everybody?

"It was scary," he

continued

remembers. "I was nervous. I still find it nerve-racking. I knew it would be mentally exhausting, though I was hardly prepared for the physical grind. But it was what I wanted to do. And I had confidence in my ability. I really did. All this James Dean stuff, a kind of humble magnetism. I'd rather be Steve McQueen, cool, composed; and Paul Newman, animal masculinity. And that's my idea, not the publicity department's."

Still he admits identifying with Dean. "Not that I got into trouble or had a bad time as a kid. I didn't. I was raised with loving care by an aunt and uncle who adopted me after my real parents died. But I didn't know I was adopted until I discovered it accidentally when I was like 12. I was hurt, resentful. Later I got depressions. That was when I took to reading books like "The Magic of Believing" and 'As a Man Thinketh.' Positive-thinking books, only more complicated. They helped."

They also fortify his belief—a very real one with Majors—that he will get to the top if only because getting to the top is the name of the game, and it is the game he has elected to play. Nothing else has much reality for Lee. He speaks uneasily of his marriage at 17 which ended in divorce, and of his 4-year-old son, whom he occasionally visits. He professes to dislike the Hollywood-à-go-go atmosphere. "If the party means wearing a tie. I won't go to it."

Instead he likes to stick around his Malibu ranch, a rustic one-bedroom affair with a horse corral, water out of a well, and all those animals which by and large he finds more dependable than people. Unfortunately his 6-foot boa constrictor died. However, he can always fall back on the ladies for company. And there are plenty, although he still tends to favor one Miss Patti Chandler, a model-actress of his acquaintance.

And he has developed another kind of friendship with Gloria Swanson, a celebrated swinger emeritus. She took him to New York's chic 21 Club. He wore a tie. They went walking down Fifth Avenue, looking, he says, "like a couple of country hicks, and she loving it."

Meantime his confidence has increased immeasurably. "I used to think I had to know every word of the script. I might goof up the shot. I don't worry any more. I say the lines the way that's comfortable for me."

Already he is looking forward to the summer hiatus so he can do a movie. "Movies are the major leagues. I'm going to take my time, look 'em all over. I won't do anything unless it is right. McQueen wouldn't. I have sent back three already." And he is set for at least three rodeos, a dodge he learned from the *Bonanza* folks and which brings in only m-o-n-e-y.

Where will it all end? Majors shrugs. "Is Cassius Clay as good as Joe Louis? Who knows?" he says.



The Wackiest Ship in the Army

If you've been put off this show by its title, don't let us, please, put you on. You were right. It's a tough title to live down to, but this show does it. In the episodes we've seen, about the only thing they haven't thought of putting aboard *The Wackiest Ship in the Army* is a full contingent of Wacs—and we hesitate to mention this because either they have already done it or now, reading this, they will.


The show started, we have learned from survivors of its first viewing, as all comedy. And then it developed, if such a word can be used in this connotation, into what it is today—which is a strange mixture of low comedy, high adventure and low dresses. Wackiest Ship has probably given more work to more actresses who can play Polynesian and Tahitian girls than anything since Trader Vic.


Based on the television thesis that wars are a scream—as long as they are at least one war before the one we're in now-the show offers us World War II. This war, which is now a family favorite, is seen through the eves of the men on board the USS Kiwi, a two-masted sailing schooner used for espionage missions. principal seafarers are, in the order of their professional rank-and we will resist a temptation here-Maj. Simon Butcher (Jack Warden), Lt. (j.g.) Rip Riddle (Gary Collins), a chief petty officer (Mike Kellin) and a gunner's mate (Rudy Solari). Although Warden and Solari have their moments, the general caliber of the acting and directing is so near sea level that we can only advise you to keep your eyes on the Kiwi. Under full sail, with a good breeze of wind, she is not only the best-looking thing on the show, she is also the bestacting. Mark well, too, occasional bits of seafaring humor-as when the lookout shouts, "There's some kind of a ship coming up fast on the left side of the front end," and the Skipper replies, "Thank you, Salty." It kind of gets to you, a line like that-even if it takes time.

And, make no mistake about it, time is one thing we've got. We saw one episode in October which we will swear to you is still going on. Nonetheless, to give the devil his due, the writers do come up with some very ingenious plots. Our favorite was one in which an ex-geisha girl named Plum Blossom (Nobu McCarthy) offered to guide the Kiwi to a Japanese island where a Japanese colonel was, she claimed, willing to defect to our side. The whole thing revolved around whether or not you believed Miss Blossom, Major Butcher didn't-and you shouldn't blame him. If you'd been in this show as long as he has, you wouldn't believe in your own mother.

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
