The Legend of Jesse James

There are Easterns and there are Westerns, and the twain should never meet. When they do, as in this show, you haven't got either an Eastern or a Western—you've got a Midwestern. The trouble is that the producers, having decided to give us an outlaw for a hero, then proceed in script after script to make him, if not an inlaw, at least not all bad. And it's not easy to make, out of a robbing hood, Robin Hood.

In the very first episode last fall, Jesse was approached by a man who had a plan to rob a bank in St. Joseph, Mo. Well sir, Jesse wants no part of this because—remember now—he isn't all bad and St. Joe, Mo., is the one town where his family has, he claims, maintained a degree of respectability. When the man goes on with the plan anyway and kills a friend of the James family, Jesse, who isn't all good either—you've got to remember that, too—sets out for revenge. In another early show, another

man brings Jesse a plan to rob a train carrying gold. And Jesse agrees—this time, however, he proves his not-all-badness by telling the guy to take only the gold and not waste time robbing the passengers.

Well, as you can see, the line is getting thinner, but you've got to hand it to those producers—they keep trying. In another episode, Jesse almost gets his brother and himself shot, all because of love for a colta horse, that is, not a gun-which he has bought from a kid for \$50. In the end, he not only gives the colt back to the kid but also doesn't even ask the kid's father, who did the shooting, for his \$50 back. Finally, in a recent episode, while robbing another train he takes the whole show to tell a pompous editor why he has a right to be bad-how, as a boy, he saw his father hanged by Federal troops for failing to divulge Jesse's whereabouts. When he gets through, the editor asks, "Even if part of it is true, how do you justify what you're doing now?" At this Jesse relieves the editor of his billfold and says. "I don't even try."

Which is, of course, just what the producers should have done in the first place. Nor are the endless justifications made any easier by the acting of Mr. Chris Jones, who plays the late Mr. James as if he were a threeway cold tablet comprising equal parts of the late Mr. James Dean, the present Mr. Marlon Brando, and a difficult teen-age girl. In justice to Mr. Jones, however, the scriptwriters don't make it any easier for him. Among other things, they have him always bossing around his older brother Frank (Allen Case), who is not only a good actor but is also the one who should have been boss of the whole gang. In any case, in real life, you'll be glad to know that, after Jesse was shot, Frank went on and lived out a respectable life.

as we see it

■ A few months ago, you will recall, Batman became the first prime-time half-hour show to carry four one-minute commercials instead of three. Actually, viewers didn't mind the extra commercial because the time was taken out of clutter—billboards for sponsors, network identification, etc.

When ABC recently proposed to its affiliated stations that not only Batman but other shows seen from 7:30 to 8 P.M. (ET) carry the four one-minute commercials, the stations balked and the network had to table the idea.

Publicly the stations have two fears:

1. The extra one-minute commercial might turn into three 20-second spots, thereby irritating viewers.

2. If ABC adds one minute from 7:30 to 8, it could also do it throughout prime time—up to 11 P.M. Result: overcommercialization. Especially if CBS and NBC were to follow suit.

■ Privately their concern goes beyond viewer reaction to more commercials. They know that if the networks had time for more commercials, those commercials would be the same spot ads the stations now book themselves, and for which they collect 100 percent of their time charge. When networks run the spot ads, the stations collect only about 25 percent of their normal time charge.

If the networks were to add one minute all evening, their combined additional revenue could be about \$300 million—much of which would come out of station income. Reduced station income would eventually lead to reduced station service to viewers.

Just incidentally, the stations now have less time of their own to sell at night. Once a network could legally contract for three hours a night from a station—option time, it was called. The FCC outlawed option time because the networks had too much power over stations.

■ Now that it isn't compulsory, the networks take more time—at least three-and-a-half hours a night.

HOW THIS SUMMER'S TV CROP WILL GROW

Some new shows are sprouting amid the usual row-upon-row of reruns

Lord Byron was talking about the Greek isles when he wrote "Eternal summer gilds them yet," but to America's TV watchers, "them" might just as easily be the dramas and comedies and Westerns that flitted across their screens all winter long.

Television long ago decided to husband its reservoirs of ingenuity and energy during the easeful summer months when potential viewers in large numbers are flocking to beach, brook and glen to savor nature's own "special" in living color. Thus, the

great body of TV fare for the dog days consists mostly of midwinter programs brought back for a repeat performance—not necessarily by popular demand.

The custom has the virtue of economy, the networks have observed, and leaves them free to devote the full weight of their creative talent to minting shiny, new, but not necessarily or even preferably original, series for the fall.

This summer will be a typical one. The prime-time feature films will all be returnees from the September-to-April first-run season. On Wednesday, July 20, ABC starts a second night of movies (Sunday is the other movie night at ABC), to run right up to première week in September. (The Big Valley moves to another time spot and The Long Hot Summer goes off.)

There are some *new* shows on the air this summer season.

ABC's Ben Casey and The Jimmy Dean Show have already been displaced for the summer (neither, in fact, will return in the fall) by two of these, British-made adventure dramas titled, respectively, The Avengers and Court-Martial.

The first stars Patrick Macnee as a high-style secret agent who conceals his dangerous professional life under a patina of dilettantism. Beauteous Diana Rigg is his partner. And the other is about a pair of Army lawyers (played by Peter Graves and Bradford Dillman) who vie in the courtroom over the destiny of military men accused of crimes.

CBS's regularly scheduled summer replacements are these (all times Eastern):

Hippodrome (Tuesdays, 8:30-9:30, starting July 5)—Red Skelton's standin for the summer is a circus-variety show "with heavy comedy emphasis," according to Mike Dann, CBS's program chief. Produced in England, the show will have a different American comedy star as host each week, and

besides the comedy, will display many leading European circus acts.

Hippodrome hosts will include Trini Lopez, Eddie Albert, Jack Carter, and Woody Allen. The guests: Dave Clark Five, Nancy Sinatra, Shari Lewis, Gerry and the Pacemakers, the Kessler Twins and Allan Sherman.

The John Gary Show (Wednesdays, 10-11 P.M., starting June 22)—Gary, a singer, has been a guest 12 times on The Danny Kaye Show, and he'll be filling Kaye's slot for the summer. The job amounts to an audition for Gary, to see, as Dann puts it, "if he can make the grade in a winter prime-time show. Remember, that's how Andy Williams got his show."

Among Gary's guests will be Danny Kaye himself, Liberace, Eddy Arnold, the King Sisters, Leslie Uggams, Bob Crane (Hogan's Heroes), Vikki Carr and the British rock-'n'-roll

team Chad and Jeremy.

Continental Showcase (Saturdays, 7:30-8:30, starting June 11)—From 100 hours of tape CBS has chosen the material for 14 summer programs featuring European variety acts that appeared on Bavarian television in recent years. The host will be Jim Backus of Gilligan's Island and he'll be introducing such international talent as Petula Clark, Juliette Greco, and the Japanese Peanuts rock-'n'-roll group. It's music, comedy, and dancing, shot originally in Munich.

NBC has four replacement series: Kraft Summer Music Hall (Mondays, 9-10 P.M., starting June 6)-Singer John Davidson, whom you may remember as a regular on last season's short-lived The Entertainers, replaces both Andy Williams and the occasional Perry Como specials. Mort Werner, head of programming at NBC, says: "Davidson is a bright, up-and-coming guy, and we've put him in the hands of producer Bob Banner, who has a reputation for doing this sort of thing well. It will be a young, fresh, musical show." continued

New for Summer / continued

Mickie Finn's (Thursdays, 9:30-10 P.M., started April 21)—That's the name of a real night club in San Diego, Cal., where the patrons clap hands and sing old-timey music to the tune of banjos and brass. NBC has reproduced it at their Burbank studios, and hopes to capture some of its infectious atmosphere. Says Werner: "It's really 'Hail, Hail, the Gang's All Here' sort of thing, with the audience joining in a musical performance." The show has already replaced Mona McCluskey.

The Dean Martin Summer Show (Thursdays, 10-11 P.M., starting June 16)—The comedy team of Dan Rowan and Dick Martin will be hosts for these comedy-variety shows, and they'll have with them such performers as Lainie Kazan and Frankie Randall. Dean Martin's regular show goes into reruns May 12 through June 9.

Sing Along with Mitch (Fridays, 8:30-9:30 P.M., starting April 29)—Instead of Sammy Davis Jr., who won't be back in the fall, you'll be getting a summer-replacement sampling of 19 of Mitch Miller's old communitysing programs, culled from the fourseason run which that series enjoyed on NBC. The bearded maestro will be seen at his customary choral-directory chores, with the song lyrics superimposed on the TV screen.

A sprinkling of specials

Beyond these weekly diversions, the summer season also will bring a sprinkling of specials in the entertainment, sports, and news sectors. NBC, for example, will show six specials made at the famous London Palladium and featuring some of the variety acts currently appearing in that hallowed British citadel of show business. A band of well-known American performers—Lorne Greene, Jonathan Winters, Kate Smith, Hugh

O'Brian, Roger Moore and Fess Parker—will be the hosts. The first in this series will be seen in May.

ABC has in prospect for June 16 an investigation of recent findings in the field of extrasensory perception, an hour-long study called "The Baffling World of ESP."

CBS will repeat a number of its entertainment specials during the summer. On successive Fridays at 10-11 P.M. (June 3 and 10) CBS will repeat the much-acclaimed concert readings by Sir John Gielgud called "Ages of Man." An original half-hour animated special, based on the Peanuts characters of Charles Schulz's comic strip, goes on June 8 at 8:30 P.M. It's called "Charlie Brown's All-Stars."

For girl watchers, CBS will carry the Miss Universe contest on July 16 (10-11:30 P.M.) from Miami Beach, live and in color.

Sports fans have it made

However, it's the sports fans who will best be served in the attenuated days and warm nights ahead. On June 18 (6-7:30 P.M.) and 19 (6-8 P.M.) ABC will carry the U.S. Open golf championship from the Olympic Country Club in San Francisco, and on July 3 the U.S. Women's Open from Hazeltine National Golf Club, Chaska, Minn.

On July 8 and 9, the British Open golf championship will be visible here via Early Bird satellite on ABC, and on July 23 and 24 you'll be able to see the PGA golf championship from the Firestone Country Club in Akron, Ohio. Also on July 23 and 24, the much-heralded U.S.-Russian track meet from Los Angeles will be seen in the U.S. on ABC and in many other parts of the world via Early Bird. On Sept. 3, ABC will present the U.S. Men's Amateur golf tournament from Merion Golf Club, Ardmore, Pa.



games: the Coaches All-America game on July 9, coming this year from Atlanta (9:30 P.M. to conclusion); and the College All-Star game from Chicago on Aug. 5 (10 P.M. to conclusion), which matches the Green Bay Packers, champions of the National Football League, with college graduates headed for the professional ranks.

CBS, as part of its gilt deal with the NFL, will be doing four preseason, prime-time football games, two in color, all on Friday nights: Aug. 12, 19, 26, 9:30 P.M. to conclusion and Sept. 2, 10 P.M. to conclusion. Then on Sept. 3 CBS will carry, via Early Bird from the Royal Birkdale course in Southport, England, the Carling World golf championship (4:30-6:30 P.M.).

If you're a baseball fan, NBC is the place for you this summer. Starting April 16 and continuing through the summer, they're broadcasting a game in color every Saturday, and in addition will do three night games; on Memorial Day, the Fourth of July, and Labor Day. The network also is handling the All-Star baseball game from St. Louis on July 12.

Can you beat Player or Marr?

NBC also has two golfing events scheduled. First comes National Golf Day on May 30, pitting the U.S. Open champion (Gary Player) against the PGA champion (Dave Marr). Golfers across the Nation will try to beat the winner's score. The \$100,000 Buick Open is telecast next (June 11 and 12), from Grand Blanc, Mich.

In the news and public-events sector: ABC will carry on with its weekly scrutiny of the Vietnam war on ABC Scope. A number of CBS Reports programs will be repeated on Tuesday nights, among them: "Ku Klux Klan: The Invisible Empire" (June 28);

"Watts: Riot or Revolt?" (July 26); "I.O.U. \$315,000,000,000" (Aug. 2).

In the same Tuesday night period, CBS also will repeat a num! er of its specials from last season: "An Essay on Bridges," (June 14); "The Search for Ulysses" (June 21); "The Great Love Affair" (July 5); "The Best of Sandburg" (July 12); "Sinatra" (Aug. 23) and "Our Friends, the French" (Aug. 30).

Two-parter on late President

A two-part NBC White Paper called "The Age of Kennedy" will be visible on successive Sundays (6:30-7:30 P.M.), May 29 and June 5. Arthur Schlesinger Jr., an aide to the late President, is consultant for the series, which will consist of films, still photos, and recorded reminiscences not seen or heard previously.

Another White Paper, "Organized Crime in the United States," is scheduled for Thursday, Aug. 25. The program will pre-empt the network's entire prime-time period (7:30-11 P.M.) and examine four major areas of crime in the Nation: narcotics, loan sharks, betting and policy gambling.

NBC also will be doing three other news specials during the summer: "The Right Wing," a study of radical conservatism in the U.S. (June 12, 6:30-7:30 P.M.); "The Undeclared War," a show about so-called "wars of liberation" since 1945 (June 15); and "Siberian City," a description of life in Irkutsk, a Russian scientific center in Siberia (July 20).

Well, that's a brief guide to help your thinking when you're deciding whether to hit the trout stream or the tube. The main thing to remember is that the great mass of summer television will be old programs brought back for reprise just as in past years. But if you shop around selectively, you can still find some original programming sprinkled in among the retreads.

How the U.S. brought 'vo tuyen truyen hinh' to Vietnam



There's more to his car than

"My Mother, the Car restates the ancient Oedipal legend, reactivating man's most primitive feelings. The series is a gold mine of psychoanalytic insights, unintended by the producers, but guided by that buried part of the infantile mind which still lives on within their adult mentality." So says Dr. Charles Ansell, president of the Los Angeles Society of Clinical Psychologists—one egghead who cherishes his televoyeurism and is not ashamed to admit it.

"Jerry Van Dyke acts out every man's basic dream," contends Dr. Ansell, who also happens to be Van Dyke's headshrinker, "to conquer the mother and have her for himself. Jerry is in complete possession of his car/mother. She is powerless when he locks the garage door."

In his role of small-town lawyer whose late-lamented Mom has rein-CARnated herself as an old jalopy, Jerry doesn't always find himself in the driver's seat. Mom is forever honking her raucous horn petulantly or smacking him on the posterior with a smart swing of her door. She turns right when he signals left. And when Mom's not boiling over, backfiring or blowing a gasket, she's telling the poor guy what to do via her radio.

"All my difficulties stem from my relationship with her," explains Jerry Van Dyke, the mobile-faced young actor with the contagious lopsided grin who plays this hapless fellow, Dave Crabtree. "She tells me what to do and I have to do it."

They do have their moments of filial affection, car and son. Jerry scrubs her back, worries about her high oil pressure, buys her a snug-fitting fan belt, takes her to a drive-in movie for her birthday. "Sometimes I think it's a show about a guy *stuck* with a car," Jerry admits wryly.

In the first episode, "Mother" says to Jerry (in the dulcet off-screen intonations of actress Ann Sothern): "Honey, let's get something straight. There's only one person I'll talk toyou!" According to Dr. Ansell, their private communication has to be kept secret in order to sustain the fantasy -the wish to be all-powerful. "An infant feels that since all his desires are gratified by his mother, he therefore must indeed be powerful. In Jerry Van Dyke and his car, the fantasy of omnipotence is thus subconsciously fulfilled for every television viewer."

Dr. Ansell holds that the series is a first-class primer on the developing Oedipal situation. "In life the father becomes a rival who stands in the boy's way. In the series, Captain Manzini, the antique-car collector, will stop at nothing to gain possession of Jerry's car. In life the Oedipus complex is ultimately resolved when the boy accepts the father. But in the series, father-image and son continue their rivalry week after week. Manzini may be the richest man in the world, but Jerry retains sole possession of his mother, the car."

Sigmund Freud himself might well have cited Gladys Crabtree as a model case history. (Gladys, of course, is the name of Dave Crabtree's garrulous Mom, whose human form, at least, departed these parts in 1948.) And certainly Gladys would catalyze the creative juices of Philip Wylie, noted for his discovery: Momism.

keeping up the payments

In the pilot of My Mother, the Car, Dave protests: "Look, Mom, it's great having you back. I just don't understand why you thought all this was necessary." Mother's reply is simply, "You need help, Son," and she says it with finality.

All of which prompts the query: "Will the real Mrs. Van Dyke, the actual mother of the true-life Jerry Van Dyke, please stano up?"

Turns out she's a little lady by the name of Hazel from Danville, Ill., currently residing in Phoenix, Ariz., with her husband of 42 years, L. W. Van Dyke. "Our real mother," says Jerry's older brother, Dick (of *The Dick Van Dyke Show*), "is just about diametrically opposite the one Ann

Sothern plays. That car-mother is jazzy and hip. Our real mother thinks her main place is in the kitchen. Pretty much a square, you might say."

"Actually, Mother's the staid, strait-laced type," says Jerry. "She was the backbone of the family, ran the whole caboodle. She was domineering. Dad didn't exactly set the world on its tail and Dick went out on the road with his act. I was the youngest, so she kind of focused everything on me. Whether going along with her or fighting it, I was very close to my mother. I could behave myself at home but, brother, I was the demon of Danville when I got out of the house. With her it was always, 'What are we going to do continued

about Jerry?"

It took the Demon of Danville only six years to get through high school, flunking his freshman year and periodically getting expelled for such pranks as releasing pigeons in the study hall and driving his jeep through the building during classes. "I finally got my diploma, though." Jerry relates. "In the middle of graduation on the football field I set off a giant firecracker. Dad stood up in the bleachers and yelled, "That's my boy!" I won't try to describe the look on Mother's face."

Jerry was 20 years old before he learned his father's given name was not "Cookie," the nickname the elder Van Dyke answered to all his life as a traveling cookie salesman among the country stores of central Illinois. "Those country storekeepers lived for Cookie to come in, give out free samples, have some laughs. He'd spend two hours in a store telling iokes. Dad was the clown. Always with a story. Off the top of his head. Like on a golf course once someone said, 'Cookie, what's your handicap?' Dad came right back with, 'Poverty and a wife.' That's the way he was."

A lot of Cookie must have rubbed off on his younger son. Jerry says: "I was the village idiot, the clown, the personality kid—always falling on my face for laughs. I was vice president of my high school freshman class. I knew everybody."

Apparently something of Hazel rubbed off on Dick. Jerry says: "Dick was the good boy and I was the bad. No matter how well I did things, Dick could always do them five times better. I always came out the loser. Like even today, my press clippings have headlines like 'My Brother, the Star.'"

Dick says: "Jerry and I were talking the other day about who has the biggest closet of pilots that never sold. Of course I was able to do mine in relative obscurity. Unfortunately for Jerry, his bombs were all in the glare of publicity."

Jerry's two biggest bombs were his stint as the bumbling resident-comic on The Judy Garland Show, and as host-emcee of an inane CBS game show, Picture This. But he has scored. too, on Tonight, The Andy Williams Show, The Ed Sullivan Show and Hollywood Palace. That is, he got laughs. Jerry's act as stand-up comic -a kind of havseed routine with banio and corny jokes-evolved over his 16 years in show business. He told second-lieutenant jokes and chow gags with the U.S. Air Force for four years. After discharge he emceed his own afternoon version of Tonight on a local station in Terre Haute, Ind. After that he traveled over the country for three years playing strip joints. "They'd heckle the old baggy-pants comics but never me. They always said, 'What's a clean-cut kid like you doing in a joint like this?' Actually I was learning my trade. You've got to get started the best way you can."

Today Jerry Van Dyke works in Hollywood, commuting in his white Jaguar convertible from his comfortable suburban home in San Fernando Valley, where he's strictly a homebody along with his Danvillebred wife, Carol, and their two small daughters. Things are quiet around Jerry's house, with seemingly nothing in the way of emotional entanglements, unresolved conflicts, or intrafamilial rivalries to so much as ripple the surface of the swimming pool.

It's only at the studio that Jerry maintains active membership in a family recapitulating man's primordial psychopathology. As Sir Max Beerbohm once commented: "They were a tense and peculiar family, the Oedipuses, weren't they?" Of course, Sir Max hadn't met the Crabtrees: Gladys and Dave.

Or the Van Dykes: Cookie, Hazel, Dick and Jerry.

Two-Medium Man: For two and a half hours, shimmering in glorious ABC color, movieland's aristocracy paraded and posed in their annual Oscar awards show last week. Emcee Bob Hope was as flip as ever ("Welcome to the agony and the ecstasy") and Miss Lynda Bird Johnson was radiant on the arm of George Hamilton. "I've always watched on TV," she told the mob of reporters, "and it's nice to be here in person."

Lee Marvin (he did M Squad and dramas on TV) picked up the best actor award for his performance as the gunfighters in "Cat Ballou"—the first television-series star ever to win the motion-picture prize. "I owe a lot to television," he said after the ceremony. "It gave me exposure; it introduced me to the audience."

Stop Press: For weeks columnists have been carrying the rumor, and in the pine-paneled playrooms and bistros of Hollywood it has been topic A: Would Mia Farrow leave Peyton Place? "No comment" was the word from Twentieth Century-Fox (producers of the show) and ABC officials. Then the star herself was contacted. "Yes," she admitted, "I am negotiating with Fox. I am leaving in June." Fox and ABC plan a joint announcement of the big news sometime this week.

Reason Enough: Like a lot of viewers the Federal Communications Commission has been curious as to why

some shows have been canceled in mid-season, and has asked the networks about a few shows in particular. NBC answered last week, laying it on the line regarding Convoy and Mona McCluskey.

The two shows, said the network, were among the 10 lowest rated on the air, affiliate stations were cutting them off in favor of local or syndicated programming, and they were losing money evidently because of negligible sponsorship. Which would seem to be that.

In its answer, NBC suggested that the FCC might be carrying regulatory jurisdiction a little far with such questioning. The agency originally had stated its inquiry was started because "the practice involved may affect the public interest."

Cited: The First Lady also is first lady of television. The George Foster Peabody Awards Committee honored her for the special, "A Visit to Washington with Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson on Behalf of a More Beautiful America," which was telecast on ABC last Thanksgiving and Easter.

The Committee presented 15 awards in 11 categories. Awards for entertainment went to "The Julie Andrews Show" and "Frank Sinatra—A Man and His Music," both on NBC, and "My Name Is Barbra," starring Barbra Streisand, on CBS. Frank McGee of NBC, Morley Safer of CBS, and Los Angeles station KTLA, won awards for excellence in the news category.

Safer was especially cited for "his courageous accomplishments in presenting the realities of the Vietnam war."—Henry Harding

THE REAL BALL

Brush-and-pencil impression of an exceptional woman

BY RONALD SEARLE

It is an undeniable fact that there have been few women clowns, just as there have been few women painters of any great stature. Certainly there are female grotesques, and their antics are enough to make continued

the strongest flesh creep.

The female form, like the female mind, hardly lends itself to the broadest ranges of slapstick, parody or satire. Both succeed in limited, clearly defined and admittedly delightful areas. But on the grand, sweeping, all-embracing level—never.

It is difficult to envisage either a female Grock or a female Picasso, just as the mind boggles at the spectacle of females wrestling in mud.

There are exceptions to all loose generalizations of this sort, and Lucille Ball is an oasis in a wilderness empty of talent. She is no Grock, but to say that is not to diminish her stature. Like all exceptional artists she is unique and unlike anybody else.

For 15 years she has been exposed on television and it is not unreasonable to say that much of the material she has waded through would have grounded a good-sized battleship.

No human being can maintain an impeccable standard under the conditions imposed by the television sausage-machine. But even when her material has the putrid glow of a

Dickensian lobster, the odour does not cling to Lucille Ball.

We come to watch Lucy and, just as we excuse Chaplin a series of atrocious films for the privilege of watching him, we enjoy Lucy simply because she is there.

During a rehearsal of *The Lucy Show*, Stage 12 looks more like the *Place de la Concorde* during the French Revolution than the Desilu Studios in Hollywood; and Lucille Ball becomes a one-man guillotine. In unfamiliar curlers, pink stretch pants and executive glasses, her sharp editorial mind chops gently and calmly, but mercilessly, at the deadwood as she refines a shambles into visual entertainment, rather than an interlude to keep the commercials apart.

Direct, uncluttered, lovable and, above all, professional, this refugee from B pictures has become an international incident. Lucy's show is running in 49 countries, which indicates a common denominator of extraordinary proportions.

Perhaps the secret is that Lucille Ball responds to contact with human beings and is able to bring them warmth even through film. It is significant that *The Lucy Show* remains one of the very few television shows to be filmed entirely—with all normal production hazards—in front of a live audience. The laughter one hears is real and is responding to the show seen.

Comedy and clowning that are not nourished on reality wither in their own vacuum and cease to exist. An ungenerous mentality produces small-minded results. Nobody could accuse Lucille Ball of either of those weaknesses.

Her heart is in the right place and it is not on her sleeve.

SO WHO COUNTS?

Well, actors insist that their union does, because \$7,000,000 a year is at stake

One day not long ago the Screen Actors Guild received a phone call from a certain actor in Oceanside, near San Diego, Cal. This actor was incensed. He had been watching a certain San Diego channel which had been running a certain episode of a certain syndicated continued

\$

private-eye series in which he appeared. Running it, said the actor, who was good at counting, for the fourth time. Now this particular channel was entitled to run this episode only three times. The actor knew because he had been paid residuals for only three times. Somebody was being—uh, careless with his money.

The Guild's Television Residual Department immediately went into action. The producer of this particular series, a small independent, said he had no record of the episode's being run more than three times. The distributor swore up and down that it "was only the second or third time" it had been run. The Guild ran an intensive check of the newspaper logs, of TV GUDE (one of the residual tracers' principal tools), and of the San Diego station managers. The check revealed the interesting fact that while the series had run only three times on the channel in question, it had had a previous run on another channel. The actor was entitled to additional residual payment from the producer for the extra show. In all, the actors involved in the additional showings of this series, thanks to the Guild's vigilance, netted some \$26,000.

Just routine

This sort of thing is routine for SAG's residual detectives, as they like to call themselves. Richard E. Mentzer and his staff of 11 are now instrumental in collecting \$600,000 to \$700,000 a month in domestic residuals -\$52.672.280 worth since the first Guild contract calling for them was written, back in 1953. They are, in effect, policemen monitoring an operation so vast that not even the producers can always keep track. While the Guild is constantly catching them up in "errors," it also runs to earth discrepancies which might otherwise go entirely unnoticed. Thus the producers are inclined to accept at face value the Guild's findings. They had better, because in the last two years the operation has been expanded into the field of foreign residuals. The new contract, covering shows from the fall of 1964 on, calls for an actor to be paid from 15 to 25 percent of his basic miminum salary for each half-hour episode rerun overseas, depending on how often it is run.

This has led to really incredible complications. It has meant that the Guild's staff must include language experts capable of reading and interpreting the 28 or so periodicals that do program logging throughout the world -magazines like Bravo (Germany), TV Times (Australia), TV (Portugal), Télé 7 Jours (France), TV Maga-(Lebanon)—plus innumerable newspaper TV supplements from Brazil, Japan, Hong Kong, Kenya, New Zealand, Sweden, Ireland, Mexico and Malaysia. Luckily, some of these are in English. The Swiss guide is not only in English, but covers three countries, France, Italy and Germany.

The SAG's residual staff includes a French girl, a German reader and two girls who can read Spanish. They have to be doubly wary because foreign countries have the annoying habit of changing titles. Burke's Law, for example, is known as Detectivo Millionario (The Millionaire Detective) in South America; Gunsmoke as La Ley del Revólver (The Law of the Revolver); The Beverly Hillbillies as Los Ricos Beverlys (The Rich Beverlys); and The Addams Family as Los Locos Addams (The Crazy Addams).

Every once in a while the tracers run afoul of a real stickler. A few months ago SAG's Spanish reader came across a listing in La Prensa, published in Buenos Aires: "La Caldera del Diablo," it said sinisterly.

The Guild had no record of any such American series. Nor could it find anything made in England, Spain or South America even remotely sounding like it. Finally the tracer came across a listing in El Universal Television Guide, a Mexico City publication, which described the show as being "from a sensational novel that was banned . . . of life in a small town." She might have guessed. What else could The Devil's Caldron be but Peyton Place?

The FBI could use them

The Writers Guild of America (SAG's counterpart on the writing side) has an operation under a whiz of a woman named Patricia Karlan, who herself either speaks or can read five languages and who, in fact, set up SAG's foreign-tracer operation before moving over to WGA last year. The WGA residuals department (which operates in conjunction with the Directors Guild of America? has added a new wrinkle-Univac. Thus Mrs. Karlan can tell you at a glance exactly when, where and how many times every show has run, both foreign and domestic.

Some of the girls on her staff have developed into memory experts. There is Adeline Luttrell, for example, who walks around with 600 series titles in her head and whose knack for recalling individual episode titles (foreign countries often bill by episode title only) has enabled her to come up with instant solutions to potential mysteries.

This is hard. Who else could remember such moss-encrusted oldies as Judge Roy Bean (big in Germany), The Unexpected (killing 'em in Thailand) or even the more modern Wiere Brothers in Oh, Those Bells! (a bomb here but a smash in Germany), let alone their episode titles?

The tracers also become experts on who likes what around the world. Westerns are the biggest thing in the foreign market, but particularly in Japan. Australia is TV-happy; it will buy anything, but the diggers particularly dig Donna Reed and Hazel. The Big Valley and The Rogues are very big in England; the doctor shows, in Europe and Scandinavia. Germany goes for Mutter Ist Alles Beste (The Donna Reed Show) and Bonanza, while South America likes Los Locos Addams and Peyton Place.

Here is what, according to SAG and WGA data, is currently popular in Singapore: McHale's Navy, Burke's Law, Jack Benny, Ben Casey (which comes right after the news in Chinese), Arrest and Trial, The Munsters, Liberace, Popeye, Laurel and Hardy, The Little Rascals, Yogi Bear and Bing Crosby. The SAG spokesman adds an interesting footnote—that, of all the shows and all the stars, it is Laurel and Hardy, two comics who never got a lick of a residual in their lives, who run the most consistently all over the world.

While the actors themselves are SAG's greatest tipsters—if they suddenly begin getting fan mail from Malaysia without any corresponding residuals, the Guild is first to know—they are also at times the most annoying. Once SAG got a call from one of its members, a lady snake charmer. The lady had a problem. She had just received a residual check for \$28 for one day's services for herself and snake.

So what was her problem? Well, on the day of shooting, her snake had been ill. She had been forced to borrow a friend's snake. Her question was: Out of the \$28, how much went to the substitute snake?

Stunned, the Guild spokesman said he would call her right back. The question was deliberated at length by SAG officialdom, which wisely decided that enough was enough. The spokesman informed the lady in sober tones that "reptiles are not covered by the Guild contract."

As we said before, routine for the Guild's "residual detectives."



Without Azusa and Cucamonga...

Azusa and Cucamonga haven't been heard from lately, but Anaheim, the third city of the famous triumvirate of the old Jack Benny shows, is opening the gates proudly this season to its sparkling \$24 - million stadium, new encampment of the California (né Los Angeles) Angels.

Anaheim is doing this in the face of no obstacles other than the fact that its obligation calls for 35 years of stiff payments and it has no other regular tenants for the stadium. Lean on cash, the town makes up for it with lack of population—roughly 150,000—making it the smallest major league city in baseball.

But it's modern to be in hock, and Anaheim is rolling the dice with heavy sugar on the line, proud to display its showpiece to the Nation during the NBC baseball telecasts this season.

Nor is it the only new structure from which TV games are emanating. St. Louis and Atlanta, too, are popping open multimillion-dollar stadia. In the last several years new sports stadia have bloomed in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Washington, D.C., Houston and New York. A \$25-million number will be finished by fall in Oakland, Cal., and citizens of San Diego have voted \$27 million in bonds for the construction of a super plant to be completed in 1967. You can realize the gambles that have been taken by Oakland and San Diego when noting that both have only American Football League franchises which play but

seven home games a year.

Cincinnati will build a \$32-million stadium, and plans are afoot for elaborate outdoor arenas in Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Detroit and Boston.

Throughout America, vast fortunes have been poured lately into new athletic plants. And some authorities on stadium finance contend that the new structures will never pay themselves off.

But the situation in Anaheim, home of Disneyland, is unique in that a town of Mickey Mouse proportions brazenly is stealing a big league franchise from giant Smogville, where the Angels had been given shelter by Walter O'Malley, proprietor of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

As landlord and tenant, O'Malley and Angel owner Gene Autry got along like cowboys and Indians. For instance, the Autry group refused to recognize the park as Dodger Stadium, but referred to it in all promotion and advertising merely as "Chavez Ravine." Then disagreements developed over rental, maintenance costs, even the height of the infield grass which the Angels claimed favored the landlord's attack more than it did the tenant's.

And, to compound the problem, the Angels were outdrawn by the National League team, which steadily hit over 2,000,000 a season while the American Leaguers the last two years couldn't even make 800,000.

For Autry, the whole project might have been a bust, were he not in the

radio and television business, with outlets in Los Angeles. Big league baseball can be a colossal asset to TV and radio stations, and, not surprisingly, Angel games were carried over those belonging to Autry.

In his new location, in Orange County, Autry is able to retain the TV and radio rights for his stations. But from the standpoint of attendance, he pretty much cuts himself off from the heavy population centers of Los Angeles. He is gambling that the new area, which is growing rapidly, will take the team to its bosom and become a sort of

Green Bay of the West.

Rental for the Angels is lower than it was in O'Malley's treasure house. Whereas they paid \$200,000 a year or 7½ percent, whichever was greater, at Dodger Stadium and got only half the concessions revenue and no parking, they are paying but \$160,000 a year or 7½ percent at Anaheim and get two-thirds of the concessions

and half the parking.

Clearly, the risk is Anaheim's, as it is other municipalities' that are bankrolling expensive stadia about the country. Since O'Malley is the only big league baseball owner since 1923 to build a park with his own cash, he doesn't take the most charitable view of colleagues who are able to get the taxpayers to finger the tabs. "When these so-called sportsmen let Joe Public pay for their stadiums," O'Malley told the writer, "it shocks my personal philosophy. If they had guts, they

would finance their own."

We inquired, "Isn't a stadium a bum investment?"

"It depends upon how you pay it off," he answered. "The life of a stadium is roughly 50 years. At least, the Government will let you depreciate it for that long. But, after 25 years, the average stadium is obsolete. So if you require 35 years' financing, as they do in Anaheim, you must modernize the park even before you pay it off. So you can never get out."

Although television revenues are rising sharply in sports, the money in most cases goes directly into the satchels of the promoters, with the stadia not sharing it. From the new contract between major league baseball and NBC, each team will harvest roughly \$300,000 a year from TV, apart from earnings from the sale of local radio and television rights.

It has been pointed out in Anaheim, as it has in other places putting up the cash for costly stadia, that even if the park goes slightly in the red, the town will have benefited from the presence of a big league franchise, which stimulates considerable business

within a community.

And Anaheim is not discouraged by the fact it's getting a team that finished seventh in the American League last year. Said one local official, "The Angels will put our town on the map."

Somehow, Azusa and Cucamonga feel that this happened to them long

ago, without spending a dime.

It's Pat Morrow, Peyton Place High's dropout, who has a rather whimsical view of herself

The girl in the wide-knit sweater, a mere slip of a girl, eased into the front seat of the vintage red Ford coupe. Then, with proper Peyton Place ardor, she nuzzled and smooched and exchanged breathy whispers with her male companion—thereby undoubtedly steaming the camera lens as it recorded the foregoing. In the romantic complex of Peyton Place, a television series whose swampy involvements are best unraveled by a student of Pirandello, a new entry was making her mark-Patricia Morrow, all eyes and a smile, in the role of Rita Jacks (a tough granite-chip of a name!), sexy girl-dropout of Peyton Place High.

"Cut and print!" the director ordered. Unraveling herself from embrace, Miss Morrow bounded out of the car and began chomping Tom Jones-fashion on a fried chicken leg. Then she flounced her 101 pounds on a near-by couch and emitted a sigh.

"Yee-ow!" she said to a visitor. "I get so-o-o-o hungry. Some love scene. My stomach was growling like a meat grinder. I use up so much energy I have to eat eight times a day. And some teen-age sexpot I am! Look at me! Built like a stick. And

I'm odd looking. I look in the mirror—only when I absolutely have to—and I see these cheek bones and the freckles and the dinky little mouth and all these teeth. [Toothy grimace.] As a kid, I was even funnier looking. When I was 14 I put up a mental picket fence. I still have that fence around me—but every day that I do good work I haul down another picket. The more I'm accepted by people, the more I seem to accept myself."

Thus Patricia Anne Morrow, 22 years old, 5-feet-4, brown-haired, blue-green-eyed and all actresswhose portrayal of Rita has obviously touched a nerve of viewer response. Two months after her series debut, Miss Morrow ranked first in fan mail among the 23 members of the Peyton Place troupe. "You're me," a teen-age girl in Detroit wrote to TV's most prominent fictional dropout. From a girl in Louisiana: "You're so homely you're plumb pretty." Patricia herself is most intrigued by a missive from a 10-year-old girl who wrote: "I watch Peyton Place and I understand everything in it."

As befits any newcomer whose features bear even wispily recognizable echoes of others, Pat has been called a "young Julie Harris," a "young Doris Day," a "young Katharine Hepburn," a "young Leslie Caron." Ryan O'Neal, another Peyton Place regular, sees her as "a Dresden doll with a dash of Bardot." As viewed through the camera's eye by cinematographer Richard Kline, Pat has "good hollows, an all-American face." Pat shrugs off these flights of comparative fancy. "All I know," she says, "is that all the little old ladies I meet tell me I look exactly as they did when they were young."

Pat Morrow still retains a touch of the tomboy. She tosses a football around the set. She plays a slashing game of ping-pong. She walks fences, slides down banisters and she is the self-proclaimed female tree-climbing champion of North America. She can turn on the whimsy: "I think of myself as being colored orange and red and yellow with tiny little blue feet." She can also press the button of ingenious practicality. "When they were testing for Rita Jacks, I saw all these starlets dressed to the nines," she says. "I wore my flats and dull rags and no makeup. I mean I tried to look like Rita Jacks, which is probably why they picked me."

Executive producer Paul Monash smiles indulgently at such reasoning. "We wouldn't be swayed by anything so superficial," he says. "We picked this girl first for her talent and the intangible bond of affection she creates with the viewer, something she was born with, something just a little bit

different."

Director Ted Post says, "She's not Miss Everystarlet; she stands out." A former Peyton Place director, John Newland, calls Pat "a good-looking harlequin with an emotionally plastic face." One dissenting voice is heard, belonging to a long-time Hollywood observer: "Pat Morrow presses and strains. Until she learns restraint and subtlety, she won't grow."

Despite the swirl of attention, Pat Morrow remains essentially herself—an intelligent, poised, extremely sensitive young woman who exudes a kind of hyperenthusiasm toward everyone. She is abundantly open with her emotions, which remain close to the surface and range from wild exuberance when she is amused to an onflow of tears when she is moved or hurt. "I cry when I know I'm not good enough," she says. "But since I've had to cry on the show, I cry a little less in real life."

Real life, to Pat Morrow, is far removed from her portrayal of Rita Harrington, nee Jacks, whose mother operates the *Peyton Place* gin mill. The daughter of a prosperous attorney, who is chief counsel for an insurance company, Pat lives with continued

her parents and younger brother, Robert Jr., in the fashionable Toluca Lake section of Los Angeles. (Bob Hope lives four blocks down the street.) She hopes to return to a few classes at San Fernando Valley State College in the fall. "The kids at school can't get used to the idea that I'm suddenly fairly successful, an actress in a hit show," Pat says glumly. "It sets me aside somehow. The kids treat me warily, as though I were a second lieutenant in the Viet Cong." One of her fellow students sums up the issue: "It's just that Pat's friends at school feel that she doesn't need them now." Another suggests: "That free-and-easy feeling we all had with Pat, it's lost. The boys especially are hesitant to approach her. They figure now she'll only go out with some big-shot actor." Actually, in the last few months Pat has zeroed in romantically on young Chris Connelly, who plays her husband Norman Harrington in Peyton Place. As tangible evidence of their togetherness, they drive identical sports cars, the 1966 Hollywood version of being "pinned," campus style.

An actress at 14 weeks

Pat Morrow started her acting career at the age of 14 weeks, when she posed as Lana Turner's infant daughter in an MGM movie. She has since notched up credits in 12 pictures, a hundred television and radio shows. including 20 episodes as Richard Carlson's daughter in I Led Three Lives. For 17 weeks she played Mary Martin's sister in "Annie, Get Your Gun," on the West Coast tour and in the TV special. Inevitably, Pat's career has stirred as-yet unresolved ripples in the definitely un-Hollywood-tinged Morrow household. For a time, in her mid-teens, her parents withdrew Pat from acting. "We took the girl out of

show business but we didn't take show business out of the girl," says her mother, Mrs. Robert Morrow. "Today we have a rule—no show-business talk at the dinner table. If it does crop up, either her father or I have to say, 'Look, this is not Peyton Place. This is the Morrow home.' All else is secondary to her father's job. We've tried to bring up Pat sensibly and I think we've succeeded, but we're still holding our breath that she'll keep both feet on the ground."

Problems of growing up

Pat's eyes turn slightly misty as she discusses such problems, which are, she points out, "typical of any young girl growing up with her parents and necessarily growing apart. My mother will start a sentence with, 'Well, Pat, now that you're grown-up—' and then two minutes later it's, 'Pat, we're all going on a trip this weekend'—and

I'm a child again."

Last year, after a temper flare-up. Pat left home to share an apartment with a girl friend, Terry Garr, an actress then on ABC's The Young Marrieds series. "In two months I never saw Pat angry or depressed." Miss Garr recalls. "She's nice-maybe too nice. She gives so much of herself in friendship that it bugs you because you can't possibly give that much in return." About that period, Pat herself says, "I found out my weaknesses. I couldn't cook, I couldn't clean house. I didn't like paying bills. And I missed my family. After two months of it, one night Daddy came over with a bunch of red roses and a box of candy and back home I trooped, rather chastened. Today Daddy will occasionally give me a faraway look and he'll say to me, 'Remember that little girl with the pigtails who used to live here? What ever happened to her?' He says it jokingly. But beneath the smile, he isn't joking. I don't know what happened to her, either."


