The last episode filmed of Perry Mason is called "The Case of the Final Fade-out," and everybody helps solve it. Author ERLE STANLEY GARDNER plays a judge, executive producer GAIL PATRICK JACKSON has a bit part, and even the stagehands are filmed in a crowd scene. Air date is May 22 . . . BOB HOPE introduces NBC's May 16 salute to Grammy-award-winning singers, "The Best on Record."

As an Armed Forces Day tribute, NBC News presents "The Anatomy of Defense." a report on the Nation's military strength. The show, which features various military commands and operational theaters, will be telecast May 20 . . . NBC has three new cartoon shows for the sandbox set. Making their debut this fall will be Super Bwoing, a guitar-riding supersleuth; Cool McCool, a secret agent: and the Space Kidettes, a group of space travelers.

ABC's cameras film a young American couple when they go South of the Border for a "Honeymoon, Mexican Style," It'll be on the network later this year . . . TIM CONWAY, the bumbling lieutenant in McHale's Navy, not scheduled for renewal, has made a pilot for a prospective spy-spoof series called Captain Nice.

BING CROSBY and JOHNNY MERCER team up for a "Mercer Medley" of the composer's songs on the May 21 Hollywood Palace. CROSBY may emcee eight more Palace shows during 1966-67 . . . STEVE ALLEN is in the "Warning Shot" movie, playing a TV commentator.

Scientists are certain they can and will perfect communications satellites that will make sky-to-home broadcasting possible. Signals from the program source would be sent to a satellite, which then would transmit them directly to antennas (estimated to cost \$75) on our roof tops. This could happen by 1970. Satellites now being planned could cover all of the United States with a television signal. half the earth with an FM radio signal.

This development would threaten the existence of local stations, for their transmitters could become obsolete. along with the elaborate microwave relay systems now necessary for network television.

Former Chairman E. William Henry of the Federal Communications Commission recently reminded local broadcasters of the threat from sky-to-home satellites. Speaking at the National Association of Broadcasters convention, he praised many of them who were doing an excellent job of serving their communities with local programs. But he also attacked some financially successful stations for devoting less than 15 percent of their time during the day to locally originated programs and none at all during prime time. He labeled this sort of programming an "abysmal performance."

"The threat thus posed is clear," he said. "The direct-broadcast satellite could eliminate overnight the need for all the broadcast stations-radio and television-represented in this room today. When and if that possibility becomes a probability, your only justification for continued existence will be the manner in which you serve local needs, and act as an outlet for local expression."

If the stations don't provide local service, they can be replaced by communications satellites. If they do provide it and it's dull, they can lose their audience. That's show business.

HOME ON THE PEDERNALES

The President takes the Nation on a tour

of the land he loves

Lyndon Baines Johnson is President of all the United States, but there is one small section of one large state which has special meaning for him. The hill country of Central Texas is where he was born, where he grew up, where he has lived most of his life. And it is where he goes, whenever he can, to unwind from the pressures of the Presidency.

During one of these Texas sojourns recently, President Johnson had some company—NBC News' Ray Scherer and a film crew. He took them on a tour of the LBJ ranch and the surrounding countryside along the Pedernales, and they came away with an intimate portrait of the President and his Texas home. Their hour-long color documentary is scheduled this Monday night (May 9).

To a large extent the story of "Lyndon Johnson's Texas," as the show is called, is told through Mr. Johnson's own words. Some of those words accompany the pictures on these pages. President Johnson's family plot, near the LBJ ranch house: 'This is my great-grandmother over here, with the little lamb on top. She was born in 1821.... My great-great-grandmother had a son in the War of 1812 who was a major general, one who was governor of Kentucky and one who was a congressman of Tennessee, all at the same time.'





Inside the house where the **President** was born: 'I was born before the doctor could get dehere. I was livered by my grandmother. That was fairly common in those days." continued



Camera crews film Mr. Johnson as he drives through the ranch country, reminiscing: 'I remember seeing the goats eating the leaves off the small shrubs and trees. I remember seeing the deer run through the oak trees and jump the fences. I remember seeing the sheep with their little lambs feeding off the countryside. I remember seeing the beautiful white-faced cattle graze in the lowlands and the prairies.'





Standing next to his ranch house, President Johnson is equipped with a microphone: 'I would get up in the morning and milk, and feed the horses, get my lunch in a lunch bucket, walk four miles to school. Sometimes my father would wake me up and sometimes the sun would come up and he would say, "Get up, Lyndon. Every boy in town has already gotten a head start on you and you never will catch up."



The LBJ ranch house, as it looks today: 'I rode from the main ranch house to Austin many times in a wagon. I remember my father would offer the child who would see the capitol first a nickel. And we watched for 60 long miles for that capitol. When we got within 10 or 15 miles of Austin, high on a hill, we would see the capitol and all of us would holler at the same time. Everyone got a nickel.'

Crossing the Pedernales: You can guard against [disaster] by preserving and conserving your waters in ponds and dams when floods come, and using it when droughts appear, but there is no guarantee against it. You must endure it.'



The President shells a pecan: 'In '52 we had a flood here and I wasn't here. Lady Bird was here and Luci was just a baby, and she was carrying another baby, and she lost that baby as a result of the flood. And I came in here and landed in a single-motor airplane, and when we got ready to take off, the plane crashed and tore off a wing. So we came back and put Lady Bird in the car and went out the back way on the back road.'

Sunset on the Pedernales: 'Those are beautiful trees . . . so peaceful and quiet. I think that the water there in the river, the grass that is here on the bank, the implements that are there on the fence line, all working together, have meant sustenance for me and mine for more than a century along the banks of this river.'

WHY GLEASON GOT

It was Feb. 13, 1966. War was raging in Vietnam. A bloody uprising had broken out in Santo Domingo. The perils of Candy Mossler were playing to turn-away throngs in the Miami courtroom. But the six-column headline across the top of page one of the Miami Herald dealt with none of these events. It read: "Gleason Reconsiders; Will Stay."

A Northern newspaperman, a stranger to Miami's folkways, did a doubletake. It was true. The Herald, a paper not given to whimsy in its treatment of the news, had decided that the biggest news of the day was Jackie Gleason's decision to change his mind about giving up his weekly television show, which emanates from Miami Beach.

Why? A phone call to one of the Herald's editors produced the answer. "How would you play a story in your home-town paper," he replied, "if one of the top industries announced that it was pulling out, then decided to remain?"

For Miami Beach and environs, Jackie Gleason is far more than a first-magnitude star, a beloved comedian-in-residence. He is an industry —one of the area's top five, according to Hank Meyer, a publicist whose accounts include both Miami Beach and Jackie Gleason. He is also an indispensable ingredient in South Florida's ambitious TV plans.

"Let's face it," said Meyer. "We have tremendous plans for attracting major network shows here. If Gleason had departed, even for one season, our projection of Miami Beach as a leading TV base would have been set back many years. Even now we're negotiating to bring four other big network shows down here. Now that City Council has okayed color facilities for the auditorium, we'll make it. Of all the network shows, only two percent now originate in Miami Beach; soon we'll have 10 percent."

At his momentous (for Miami Beach) "reconsideration" press conference on Feb. 13. Gleason said that Miami Beach has the best television studio in the Nation. It is possible, of course, that he may be faintly prejudiced on this score; after all, the ornate Municipal Auditorium, which (naturally) fronts on Jackie Gleason Drive, was virtually tailored to his needs. To date, the conversion has cost the municipality some \$268,000, with another \$200,000 estimated for color lighting. Mayor Elliott Roosevelt feels the added lighting will attract all three major networks, and Miami Beach is jumping with rumors that Ed Sullivan and Perry Como may film future shows here.

"Have you any idea of the economic impact the Gleason show has had on this community?" asked Meyer, gazing from his 14th-floor Lincoln Road aerie onto a scene that hardly qualifies as a pocket of poverty. "Directly and indirectly, there must be a thousand people down here making a good dollar on the deal. After all, we are talking about \$190,000 a week!"

Meyer ticked off the direct beneficiaries of the Gleason largess. "First. he brought down from New York 40 staffers-writers, technicians, lighting experts, some stagehands, dancers, musicians, choreographer, secretaries, executives. Then he picked up another 80 people locally, mostly stagehands and dancers. Then he buys about \$5000 worth of scenery here every week, plus all the costumes. Then there are the ones who truck the stuff to the studio. And how about those who commute-the ad-agency executives and sponsors and network officials, all spending money down here?"

Other sundry economic items: Every girl in the Gleason troupe each week receives a dozen roses from the star . . the studio cameras are rented from Miami's CBS affiliate, WTVJ . . . swarms of devout Gleason *aficionados* drive hundreds of miles in an effort to collar coveted ducats every Friday night (when the show is filmed) in the 2000-seat auditorium, then stay for a spree in one of the world's most spreeable towns.

With a personal entourage of almost 200, plus another 800 contributing toward the production over a 30week span, Gleason (or, more exactly, his Peekskill Enterprises, quartered near the auditorium) ranks with such gilt-edged local endeavors as the First National Bank of Miami Beach, the Miami Beach Federal Savings & Loan Assn., a couple of top hotels, Burdine's Department Stores, among the Gold Coast's prime employers. Even more important, the seasonal run of the Gleason extravaganza rates as a dazzling tourist lure. Said an editorial in the Feb. 15 edition of the Miami Beach Daily Sun about the Gleason reversal: "We think it's the finest Valentine's present the city could receive. The Gleason show is a multimillion-dollar publicity bonanza. We should only have more of them. Gleason has become Florida's number one tourist attraction."

Billboards on major arteries from Georgia to Key Biscayne depict Gleason in full golfing regalia, happily pointing the way: "And Away We Go—Miami Beach—Just 6 Hours Away!" And he never stops thumping the tom-tom for his adopted land. "I love it here," he says. "I feel good here, pal, real good, and this is where I want to work and play."

Meyer notes that there are two major concerns in Miami Beach: "How's the weather?" and "How's the season?" Gleason has no control over the weather, but he does affect the season. "Just picture this," says Meyer, closing his eyes. "Up North it's freezing. Snow is everywhere. You're flying over the snow and all you can see of each house is the television antenna. It's bringing in a picture of Jackie Gleason, sun tanned and smiling, telling how he just finished a great round of golf in 80-degree weather. For 38 weeks (that's including eight repeats) these frozen, shivering people hear this warm refrain as they huddle closer to the fireside. Well, how would that affect you?"

Since Gleason became the world's most celebrated migrant "snowbird," Miami Beach has enjoyed its two biggest seasons. From Mayor Roosevelt to conch-shell hawkers there wells forth an enormous affection and appreciation for The Great One. "He's an institution, that's what he is," burbles a boniface at one of the beach's glossier institutions. "I love 'im. We all love 'im."



An odd thing is happening



... where students supposedly are learning to write for television

"It's like getting a free ticket for a date with Elizabeth Taylor, and then discovering she's just left town forever." Laughter broke out in the smallish classroom in the Yale University Drama School at New Haven, Conn. A group of graduate students were sitting around a U-shaped table, chatting about writing serious drama for television, and their own ambiguous circumstances as beneficiaries of \$5000 grants to learn the knack of it.

"If we didn't have some tiny hope that there was a place for serious plays on television, we wouldn't be here," one student said. "Still, I'm not really counting on it."

A visitor from New York inquired if any of the students might use their new-found knowledge of TV techniques to compose scripts for such series as Peyton Place, Beverly Hillbillies, or My Mother, the Car.

"I don't want to," said one. "But it might depend on how hungry I was."

"No matter how hungry I was, I wouldn't write that stuff," said a student at the rear.

Another voice: "I feel grateful,

mind you, to the American Broadcasting Company for this fellowship, and for the chance to learn how these television practices apply to playwrighting. I have no financial worries for nine months. It's not bad to be handed \$5000 this way."

Does television drama as it's now constituted hold anything of interest or promise for you, the visitor asked? There was a slow shaking of heads. "No," said one. "I think the consensus here is that it's all pretty bad, that television right now has no place for the kinds of things most of us are interested in."

Then why a \$76,000 program of fellowships sponsored by a major TV network at one of the Nation's most revered drama schools? A student grinned and said: "Maybe it's a dividend on Yale's investment in ABC— \$4,000,000 worth of stock, isn't that the figure?"

A tall, white-haired man entered the room and sat at the head of the U-shaped table: David Davidson, the novelist and playwright chosen by ABC and Yale to conduct this course; a veteran of the so-called Golden Age of television.

He told the visitor: "We'll hear a play today. When this course started last September, one of the requirements was that each student write a full-length television play, using all the techniques we discuss in class. This is one student's effort." He looked away toward a slim, darkcomplexioned student at the rear, and said, "How about it?"

The young man, wearing sweater and tennis shoes—Ralph Arzoomanian, 28, a cousin of William Saroyan came forward and sat down facing his colleagues. "The play is called 'Gum," he said, "and consists of a teaser and four acts." Then he commenced, reading all the parts himself, indicating décor, camera angles and transitions.

He read the story of a young, firstgeneration Armenian who returns to his home after three years' wandering, to claim a sweetheart who has married in the interval and to regenerate in his immigrant mother a passion for living and an involvement with life and love, which he imagines she has lost since the death of his father.

The play was vigorous and uncompromising, written out of a rich understanding of its characters. The other students listened, engrossed, for a half hour, and at the end of it murmured their approval.

Davidson praised the play for its "sense of sin and authority," and added with a grin that "it conflicts with everything Desilu, Four Star, and Universal are looking for." The students agreed, and passed a lively quarter-hour in dissecting the play's characters and their motivations.

At 5 P.M. the session ended. Arzoomanian, a native of Cranston, R.I., and the father of four children, departed with his colleagues.

The visitor reflected for a moment that there was something bizarre, antique and valiant about a handful of young men—protected and sequestered in the placental warmth of a university atmosphere—learning how to be the world's best crossbow archers in an age of overkill.

Later, David Davidson sat in the coach car of a train heading toward New York and talked about Yale, ABC and his students: "After this fellowship was announced last spring by Leonard Goldenson, the president of ABC, we got 80 applications, and it was my job to pick the seven winners on the basis of stage plays they submitted. The students range in age from 24 to 36.

"I hate to moan about the old days of television; it won't do any good. But once there were 14 anthology shows a week originating in New York alone. Now there are none. Even then there were pressures on drama —not so aggravated as they are today—but they were there. **continued**

So there's nothing new about that. What is new is a total lack of outlets for writers' originality, and the total imposition of the formula show—a formula as ritualized as Kabuki drama."

An hour later, in the vast, echoing concourse of Grand Central Station, Davidson bade his visitor good-by. The reporter watched him go, and reflected on the curious union of the arts and mammon which the retreating figure somehow symbolized.

He thought also about the need that giant networks have, to show a profit and thus keep investors soothed; about the anomalous fact that, in recent years, the more television has pleased its investors (including great colleges and universities), the less it has pleased the intelligentsia and discerning critics.

Yale University, attentive to its own financial well-being, put up \$2,000,000 a few years earlier for 70,-000 shares of ABC stock, the value of which has more than doubled. At shareholders' meetings, Yale regularly voted with the ABC management against any "raiders," real or imagined, who might have coveted seats on the board and thus have had a voice in its affairs. (Such intrusion is now rendered practically impossible by ABC's merger with International Telephone and Telegraph.)



A few observers speculated that ABC's academic marriage to Yale was somehow related to the University's investment in ABC.

"That's a complete and utter fallacy," James C. Hagerty declared, leaning back in his chair at ABC's New York headquarters. Hagerty, once press secretary to President Eisenhower and now a vice president of the ABC network's parent company, added: "We picked what we thought was the best school. Yale owns only 70,000 shares of stock out of 4.6 million outstanding. That hasn't been enough to make a difference in the voting during recent stockholders' meetings. It is true that Yale has always voted with ABC."

Does the network plan to produce any of the plays written by the Yale Fellows? "We have first refusal on the scripts," Hagerty answered, "and if we get one that's real good, we may put it on. All I can say is *may*."

Then what was the idea in the first place of endowing a playwriting school and hiring an instructor? "Mr. Goldenson considers it seed money. I remember his remarking a few years ago that we had to attract younger people into the industry. So we started off with a program at the University of Pennsylvania aimed at training newsmen. Then we gave a \$50,000-a-year grant, plus 16 scholarships, to the American Academy of Dramatic Arts. That left playwrights unaccounted for, so we devised the Yale Fellowships."

The reporter thanked Hagerty and left ABC's headquarters, reflecting on what a curious animal American television is: a creature with two heads —the Muse and the Marketplace—each biting the other's neck. He heard the city noises close by and somewhere distant, workshop sounds as seven young men crafted fine crossbows and learned to fire them with accuracy —a service quaint and endearing, but more than a little beside the point.





Accompanied on the tour by his friend A. W. Moursand and NBC's Ray Scherer, the President recalls his early life and the history of the Johnson family, who settled in Texas in the 1850's. Cameras record a visit to the old fort and first log cabin at Johnson City, the oneroom school he first attended, and his birthplace. Among those interviewed are his first teacher, Mrs. Kate Deadrich Loney; Mrs. Jessie Hunter, hostess at the President's boyhood home (now a museum); Dan Garcia, once a student of the President; and Mrs. Kittie Clyde Ross Leonard, whom the President dated in high school.

Later, Mrs. Johnson joins the President and Scherer for a drive in the countryside to talk about the native wildlife and point out some of her favorite wild flowers.

bland! Be a cipher! Joe Nothing! How's that grab ya?"

Bland Berry indeed! Makes a body want to expose him for the scintillating swinger he really is.

Maybe the one to help do it is some associate from his pre-bland past. Like composer-impresario Billy Barnes, who staged his various Billy Barnes revues over the years in the days when Berry starred as hoofer-comedian. "Tm equally mystified," says Barnes. "I also thought there must be something more there. But he'd say, 'Oh, no, I'm just Old Ken. There's nothing more there.'"

Come off it, now, Berry. You can level with us, You *are* a bit of a tiger underneath, aren't you?

"No, I was always shy and reticent. As a child I used to worry that people might hate me. A girl in junior high accused me of being conceited. She said, 'Well, you finally spoke to me, Stuck-Up!' Maybe I never get close because I don't want people to get too bored and start hating me."

This may be quite true, but his wry and earthy sense of humor, which he seems to gloss over, creates quite a different image among friends.

Berry's big professional hang-up has always been the way he bombs out in first meetings with producers. His telephone personality is nowhere. One producer testified: "Berry was so dull on the phone that I told him the part was filled. I didn't even want to meet him." If Berry gets past the Great Phone Barrier, he gets wiped out in the producer's office. "If they've never seen my work, I haven't got the part." Producers regularly find him "too vanilla."

How self-effacing can a fella get? After the Billy Barnes show one night the cast had all trooped over to producer George Eckstein's house for a surprise birthday party. A cake was brought out. Ken innocently joined in singing "Happy Birthday," assuming it must be somebody else's. He knew it was his own birthday, but it never occurred to him that anybody would throw a shindig for Old Ken—not till they got to the "Happy birthday, dear *Kenny*" part, when he had to break off in embarrassment.

If Berry's image-makers advised him to keep his mouth shut, they forgot to tell him to keep his hands to himself. According to a buddy: "He's always poking you in the ribs with a hard finger or hauling off and bashing you one on the arm, saying, 'How's that feel?' It's Kenny's way of saying he likes you." According to his wife, actress Jackie Joseph: "He's always hugging girls." Says Berry: "I get frustrated if I can't touch people. I'm a toucher. I admit it."

If there's one quality Berry's friends agree he's got, it's his basic—let's say primitive—sense of humor. He adores a good pratfall. Says Mrs. Eckstein actress Ann Morgan Guilbert, nextdoor neighbor on *The Dick Van Dyke Show*: "Once when I hit my shin on a stool and fell down, Ken got hysterical." Says Billy Barnes: "A friend of ours stumbled down some steps and hurt his knee. Ken just about died laughing."

Berry's sense of humor is a throwback to Laurel-and-Hardy-type pratfalls. In fact, as F Troop's physically inept Captain Parmenter, he is now playing the humor that he privately thinks is so funny. If he's cleaning a gun, he manages to catch his finger painfully in the lock. He falls down a lot. With it all, he's a graceful klutz. According to co-star Forrest Tucker: "If Kenny falls over a rail, he makes it look like ballet."

It's said that acting is one thing, reacting another. Berry's technique goes even a step further. "Ken has the ability to react to himself," according to F Troop producer Hy Averback. "He's his own straight man. I haven't seen anything like it continued

since Ronald Colman."

It is probably an accurate statement that Ken, Jackie and their two small adopted children live in the only house in North Hollywood with a turn-of-the-century barber pole in the living room and a turn-of-thecentury dentist's chair in the dining room. The Berrys like to collect things, and Ken especially favors things with wheels: a monocycle, a bicycle built for two, an Iso Rivolta Italian sedan, a wheel chair. Whenever their house fills to overflowing, the excess artifacts are carted off to augment the inventory of their near-by gift shop, which bears a shingle out front: "It's the Berry's."

An artifact more precious than their dentist's chair is Fred Astaire's rehearsal stool. Jackie "borrowed" it from Metro, having spotted it there on the stage while playing a nurse in *Dr. Kildare.* She just popped the stool in her car and took it home.

Ken Berry was no doubt the only kid in Moline, Ill., who wanted to be Fred Astaire when he grew up. His boyhood pal Tom Knutson recalls: "Kenny never missed an Astaire musical. Afterwards he'd go home and try to duplicate the routines in the garage." When Ken was 15, Horace Heidt held auditions for his radio program in Moline and carried him off on a 15-month tour. Things for Berry were never to be quite the same again.

Some years later, in Hollywood, Berry's hit act with the Billy Barnes revues was his Astaire imitation, complete with black-and-white tap shoes, hat and cane.

Buddy Tom happened to be along the day Berry finally met Astaire: "It was at a pool-game exhibition in Van Nuys. Astaire is a pool buff, constantly plays pool at home. You might know, Kenny has a pool table at his house too. I'll never forget the look on his face that day. Like, 'Oh, my God, I'm meeting Fred Astaire!' All he managed to say was, 'I'm your biggest fan.' Astaire was worse than that. All he said was, 'I've heard about you, too.' The two of them were just standing there, scraping their toes on the floor."

Like Astaire, Berry's dancing style is acrobatic, old-fashioned, and-by à-go-go standards-corny. That's the way he wants it, even to the flashy spectator pumps and the succession of redundant props. He likes to work with a hat because "That's the way Astaire did it." His dancing is characterized by little self-depreciating gestures. He likes to trip, recover and make a joke of it. Or he'll do a split and act as though he just killed himself ("pain takes," they're called in the trade). But Berry doesn't get much of a chance to seque into the old soft-shoe routine these days.

In his song-and-dance days the press reviews regularly called Ken "a young Gene Kelly," "another Fred Astaire," a Donald O'Connor. He's been measured to the talent of José Greco. He's said to be "reminiscent of Ray Bolger" and Jack Donahue. Co-star Tucker has attributed to him the innocent dignity of Chaplin, Langdon and Lloyd. Warner Brothers television executive Jim Barnett sees Stan Laurel in him. F Troop writer Arthur Julian spots Keaton. Others have pointed to the quiet gentility he shares with Henry Fonda, Fred Mac-Murray, James Stewart. He's been compared to Peter Sellers and Art Carney, even to the aforesaid Ronald Colman. He's been labeled everything from "a well-bred Mickey Rooney" to "a better Dick Van Dyke."

Yet there's one performer he's never been likened to—till now. Seems out at Warners they're casting a new pilot and they're searching for a series lead. Know what they're looking for? A wholly new type of performer. The Ken Berry Type.

In this case she was Julie Sommars, whose single appearance on 'U.N.C.L.E.' caused three producers to reach for their phones "Ingénues today are still trying to be sexpots, and who cares?" shrugs producer Ross ("Pillow Talk") Hunter. "The day of the slattern is over."

So now what's going to be the rage? "Ladies," says he. "The Julie Sommars type."

Ladies, he says? Well, that's show biz.

The Universal producer discovered his new leading *lady* on the tube. "I caught her on an *U.N.C.L.E.* show. She didn't strike me as a beautiful girl,



but she had a cuddly quality. I hate to use 'sweet,' but that's the word."

Simultaneously sampling The Man from U.N.C.L.E. that evening was producer Leonard (Get Smart) Stern. He was at home window-shopping for a lead for a new series he had in mind, based on the old Irene Dunne movie "My Favorite Wife." "Julie's talent leaped out. I called my wife into the room to see her. Julie was ladylike, yet sensuous."

On the basis of Julie's U.N.C.L.E.

one-shot, three producers called— Stern, Disney and Hunter—all with leading roles to offer. Julie was one of 1250 interviewed and 24 screentested (at \$9000 per test) for the part of Doreen, a not-too-bright stenographer, in Hunter's new film, "The Pad (and How to Use It)."

Julie, dressed in a mustard suede coat by Bonnie Cashin and high white boots, appears every inch a lady (àgo-go variety). She complains, "I thought with Ross Hunter I'd have beautiful clothes like Doris Day, so what did I come up with? A cheesy suit and cheap dress."

Earlier, Hunter had remarked: "On screen Julie was more elegant than I had expected. Everything we put on her looked chic, even the tacky things. I didn't sleep at all one night worrying about it. I had to keep telling her: 'Remember, you're not supposed to be the nicest girl in the world.'"

Julie hails from Sioux City, Iowa, and a dozen other towns in the Corn Belt as well. Her father was a grain inspector for the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the family had to keep moving. After high school she went to Hollywood and understudied the role of Emily in a local stage production of "Our Town." "The legendary story of an understudy going on for the lead on opening night happened to me." Within six weeks she had favorable reviews and began "doing television." By now she's been in one-shots in several shows such as The Fugitive and Death Valley Days.

Julie lives in Hollywood with her husband, talent agent Bob Trent, whom she met at an actors' workshop. Turned out he lived right across the street from Julie. "He had a dining-room set, so I knew he wasn't an actor." After the legal formalities Julie moved in across the street. "I took my portable steam bath, my mechanical exerciser and my toaster. That was my total contribution to our new household." REVIEW

My Three Sons

This show, which since 1960 had been a fixture on ABC, was bought by CBS in 1965. As you probably know by now, the story involves a widower with three sons—and when the older son got too big and got married to boot, well, they just booted him right out and adopted a new young 'un from next door. At this rate My Three Sons could go on forever. We wish we could bring you better news—but the best we can offer is that NBC, so far, has no plans to carry it.

The trouble is that if there is anything the boys upstairs dearly love to put on your screens, it's shows about men without women—and if you want some examples, we give you Bonanza, Kentucky Jones, O.K. Crackerby! and 418 war shows. The idea is, of course, to show how impossibly difficult, heart-rendingly sad—and at the same time, of course, screamingly funny it is for all the poor little just plain men to try to get along without the comfort and guidance of TV's great big all-wise, all-wonderful women. And, we gather, these same network boys visualize a whole networkful of us alternately crying our eyes out and laughing until our sides split—which would be all very well if they put these shows on in the morning, for just women. Which, come to think of it, would also make a pretty good show, women without men—a show about Amazons, say, all women and war, too.

Anyway, Fred MacMurray plays Steve Douglas (the father), and if you recall Mr. MacMurray's movie with Barbara Stanwyck called "Double Indemnity," well, forget it. It's just too sad that a man who could do that has to do this. As for the brothers in the show, they are Robbie (Don Grady), Chip (Stanley Livingston) and Ernie (Barry Livingston). With them is Uncle Charley (William Demarest)who replaced Bub (the late William Frawley). This character-the everpresent side-kick, chief cook and bottle washer, father confessor and den mother-is regarded as the one essential ingredient in these shows (after all, something has to be essential), but he has so many ridiculous lines that he must long for the days of the silent pictures. At that time, incidentally, Demarest was quoted as saying he didn't believe in talkies. How right he was.

Finally, as if the show itself weren't enough, afterwards all of them together—MacMurray, Demarest, Grady and the Livingstons—occasionally join together in doing the commercial. We have very little respect for a network, a show, a producer or for that matter an actor doing commercials during a show. And when the whole cast does them all together, and with canned laughter too, well, maybe this show *does* need a woman's touch. The way we see it, it isn't all-wise or allwonderful, but it sure deserves to be left all alone.

LADY BALTIMORE CAKE

(Makes 9-inch, 4-layer cake)

2	pkgs.	(1	lb.,	3 oz.)) white-cake	e mix

- 3 pkqs. (51/4 oz.) fluffy white frosting mix
- 1 cup mixed candied fruit, finely chopped
- 1 cup raisins, finely chopped 1 cup walnuts, finely chopped

Prepare cake mix according to package directions. Pour batter into 4 greased and floured 9-inch layer-cake pans. Bake as directed. Cool layers in pans 5 minutes, then unmold and cool on a rack. Prepare frosting mix. Mix 1/3 with the fruits and nuts. Using serrated knife, trim cake layers to make them even. Put 1 layer on a serving platter. Spread with filling. Repeat with the other layers. Spread remaining frosting on sides and top. Sprinkle additional fruit and nuts around the top edge. Garnish bottom edge with dried raisin clusters. Cut this cake carefully, using a sawing motion with a serrated knife to keep it from crushing or breaking during slicing.

PEACH COCONUT-CUSTARD PIE (Makes one 9-inch pie)

1 pkg, pie-crust mix

- 1 pkg. (41/8 oz.) egg-custard mix 3 cups milk
- 1 pkg. (12 oz.) frozen sliced peaches, thawed Grated nutmeg 1 pkg. (2 oz.) whipped topping mix

1 cup flaked coconut

Prepare pie crust according to package directions. Roll out dough, line 9-inch pie pan, fluting a high edge. Prick sides and bottom with fork. Bake in preheated hot oven (400° F.) for 12 to 15 minutes, or until golden brown. Cool on rack. Prepare custard. following package directions. Cover custard, cool for 1 hour. Sprinkle 2/3 cup of coconut into bottom of pie shell. Drain peaches, reserving a few slices; put the rest on top of coconut and pour cooled custard over. Sprinkle with nutmeg, chill until firm. Prepare topping mix and spoon it around edge of pie. Garnish with reserved peaches and remaining coconut.

When a show is canceled, the networks prefer to keep the cause of its demise shrouded in mystery, hoping nobody will even notice it is gone. With a little imagination, however, they could provide natural causes for the death of any show. In fact, they could kill off two at a time, just by inserting one lethal bit of dialog into either. For example:

"I'm sorry that I have to go away and leave you like this, old girl, but I'm sure you'll be real happy with your new owner. Lassie, I want you to meet Allison Mackenzie."

"Yeah, I bumped him off-just as sure as my name is O'Brien-and when I get through conductin' my own defense, I'll have that jury presentin' me with a medal. I'll prove beyond any reasonable doubt that creeps like Perry Mason deserve to die for givin' us legit lawyers a bad name."

SPEECH NO. 4:

"In all my years as coroner I never saw anything like it—death due to simultaneous judo chops. According to the papers found on the bodies, *he* was Napoleon Solo, some sort of secret agent, and *she* was Honey West, some sort of female snoop."

SPEECH NO. 5:

"Hi, my name's Dean Martin, and I just thought I'd drop by—and I do mean *drop*—and pay a surprise visit to Ozzie and Harriet."

SPEECH NO. 6:

"Und now-uh, laties and chentlemen, we haf a vunderful vunderful treat for you-uh. The vunderful vunderful dansers from *Hullabaloo* haf agreet to choin our 50th Anniffersary couples for our next walzz-uh."

SPEECH NO. 7:

"Well, Sheriff, now that my two sons, Hoss and Little Joe, have gone into hidin' for killin' that nosy Marshal Dillon from up Dodge City way, there doesn't seem to be much sense in my hangin' around here. Reckon I'll ride into town and pay me a visit to Belle Lawson's saloon."

HOWEVER, if the above method proves too slow, I offer an alternate plan that enables us to kill off *several* shows with one big speech. Like this:

Reason I say 'his' is that this second dame now calls herself himself I mean—Uncle Martin.

"Well, this Uncle Martin character then proceeds to whip out this tiny gun and scream, "This is my new sweetness injector, designed to make everyone love his neighbor.' He then aims the gun at this dame on the broomstick, but she ducks, and he hits this nice-lookin' lady who is drivin' by in this car. Soon as she is hit, this nice-lookin' lady just swells right up and bursts all over the street, leavin' the whole area covered with gallons of sirup.

"Well, then Uncle Martin explains


that this nice -lookin' lady, who we later identify as a Mrs. Donna Stone. was already SO sweet that she iust could not take the

Mannie Ycaza rides to winsometimes right over his competition

I n all the history of the Triple Crown, which dates back to the Administration of Ulysses S. Grant, only seven jockeys have won the three races. A number of jockeys have won two. And then there is Carlos Manuel Mario de Ycaza II.

He has taken only one. But does this disturb Ycaza? Naa. The way he figures, he is lengths in front—if those who control racing will merely permit him to get astride a horse, let alone steer one home in the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont Stakes, the events of which the Triple Crown consists.

Beginning with the Derby this Saturday, May 7, CBS will be bringing the three to the Nation. The Preakness will follow May 21 and the Belmont June 4. One of the world's most skillful riders, Ycaza never has connected in the Derby or Preakness, but bravely faced the TV camera from the winner's circle at Aqueduct in 1964 after winning the Belmont on a colt named Quadrangle. The victory for Mannie was of far less significance than the loss by Bill Hartack, who, with a Canadian racer named Northern Dancer, had won the first two legs of the Triple Crown, only to be foiled on the third.

Now engaged in his 13th year of professional riding, Ycaza reflects that the first 12 have been anything but relaxing. Immigrating to this country in 1954 from his home in Vista Hermosa, Panama, Mannie immediately showed promise as a jockey. He also showed an uncommon knack for gravitating to trouble. Socially, he was a paragon of correctness. He offered his chair to ladies. His speech was impeccably polite. As a house guest, he never lammed it with any linen.

It was only when Mannie got atop a horse that his problems developed. When holes failed to open in a race, he made his own. He sloughed other horses at every stage. One time he was disqualified for slamming a rival the first jump out of the gate. From the outside, his mounts bore in. From the inside, they bore out. And from the middle, they could be counted on to go either way.

In 1957 he established an enviable

record on the American turf. He accumulated a total of 130 days in suspensions. He was nailed for everything short of spitting on the floor.

It wasn't long before fellow jockeys found trouble developing a fondness for Mannie. Some tried to slug him in the dressing room. Others fired carbonated words at him. Willie Shoemaker observed of him grimly one day: "Ycaza is the first to scream for a break when he's searching for racing room—and the last to yield it to a jock in trouble."

The attitude of his colleagues offended the Latin sensitivities of Mannie, who explained humbly that all he was trying to do was win. "That's right," agreed Eddie Arcaro, who was active at the time. "All he's trying to do is win—and he's gonna kill every damned one of us while he's at it."

The embroilments that Ycaza had with other riders were still dwarfed by the public-relations problem he encountered with racing's lawmakers.

On occasion Mannie has been suspended merely for claiming foul. One memorable instance was the Preakness of 1962, when, on national television, he was beaten by a nose aboard a favorite named Ridan. He lodged an objection against the winner, Greek Money. The stewards responded by fining Ycaza \$200 for what they termed a "frivolous" claim. Quietly, he mumbled that it may have been frivolous to them, but not to him, considering that the winner's end of the purse came to \$135,800.

Later, viewing the film, the Maryland commissioners decided that Mannie had used an elbow in the stretch to try to restrain John Rotz, the rider of Greek Money, and they gave Ycaza a gratuitous 10 days, even though Rotz testified under oath that Mannie did not bother him.

That same year, in a \$357,000 race at Arlington Park, Ycaza, who finished second, again claimed foul. The stewards described the objection as "unwarranted" and unloaded 60 days on the rider. Even the Jockey Guild, which never previously expressed affection for Mannie, couldn't tolerate this. It went to bat for him, and the suspension was ultimately marked down to 10 days, as a sort of summer clearance.

Many have ascribed the storminess of Ycaza's career in this country to racing habits in his native Panama, where riding is noticeably rougher and policing less stringent. Others, not so charitable, maintain that he was simply a hothead, driven by a strange compulsion to prove himself at any cost, including the health of fellow jockeys. But whatever the explanation, Ycaza over the years never lost popularity with the players, who have been impressed by his desire to try with every mount, favorite or otherwise.

Now 28, Mannie insists that he is now decompressed as a rider and encounters little trouble at the races. Married to a former beauty queen from Utah, and the father of two children, Ycaza occupies an English Tudor home at Kings Point, Long Island, takes exciting ski trips with his wife and generally lives in a style that should only happen to those who bet on horses.

"Today," he says, in English slowly improving, "I am friends with everyone [the feeling isn't mutual in all cases]. I ride the horse better. I have the more experience. I want all the jockey to make lots of money and enjoy life."

As he spoke, we recalled the time in Florida one of his mounts was disqualified from first in the Flamingo Stakes when Mannie engaged in a bumping match through the stretch with Bill Hartack. Asked afterward what happened, Ycaza shrugged.

"He poosh, I poosh," he answered.

As it happened, the stewards pooshed, too. Mannie got 15 days.


