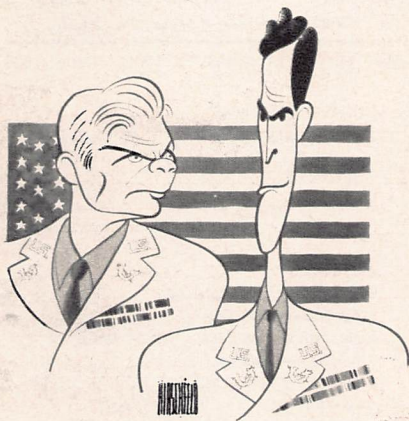

REVIEW

Court-Martial

IT&T isn't the only company which has successfully invaded ABC this year. So has IT&C, a British production firm about which our attitude so far has been to take tea and see. In any case, of all this season's new shows from Great Britain, this one at least has the virtue of not being too British—in fact, it seems to concern, primarily, American GIs in World War II. It's not all filmed in a courtroom, either. In the episodes we've seen so far, only one case, on the screen, even came to trial. They concentrate on the preparation of the case for the defense by either Maj. Frank Whittaker (Peter Graves) or Capt. David Young (Bradford Dillman).

In one episode, for example, Whittaker's job is to defend a sergeant (Lee Montague) who has disobeyed a lieutenant in battle and afterwards in

a bar assaulted him and threatened to kill him. There were mitigating circumstances, it is true, but as we remember the Army, mitigate or no mitigate, for less than that they'd have hanged the general's mother. But no matter. Whittaker finds out that the sergeant is an old Foreign Legion man, a former French undergrounder and, above all, an individualist. Furthermore, it turns out he had been ordered by a captain not to blow a bridge until 12 o'clock—which was what his buddies on the other side of the river were counting on so that they could get back—and when the captain is killed and the lieutenant orders the bridge blown at 11:45 and all the sergeant's buddies do get killed, well, we told you he was an individualist. On top of it all, when his case is still pending, he goes over the hill and takes French leave with a girl named Yvette Lefebure (Moirá Redmond). With a record like that, of course, there's only one ending possible, an unhappy one, and the British have the guts to make those endings possible on your screen.

In another episode, Captain Young undertakes the defense of a private (Neil McCallum) who, it appears, has killed his girl friend, assaulted an MP and driven an Army vehicle without permission—clearly a loss-of-license offense. Then, from there, the story turns into a jewel robbery which moves back and forth from an old farmhouse to an off-limits bar. It is all very exciting and excellently acted—in particular by a girl named Lelia Goldoni. Whittaker and Young alternate each week and, for our taste, Peter Graves, brother of James Arness, is more believable in his role than is Bradford Dillman, husband of Suzy Parker. But this is the kind of show where even the bad guys are such good actors you feel sorry for them. Those mitigating circumstances again.

as we see it

■ It is reported from Moscow that the Soviet Union has launched an illustrated broadcasting magazine to be named RT—the initials of radio and television. We welcome it to the growing list of consumer publications throughout the world that concern themselves with broadcasting.

The Soviet Union for some years has had a television-listing newspaper, and a good one, that sells like *blini* when it hits the newsstands each week. It's a four-page tabloid that, once folded and torn along perforations, becomes eight pages.

■ It isn't clear whether RT will replace the listing newspaper, but the other editorial content of the new magazine apparently will be similar to that of TV GUIDE here, TV Times in Britain, *Télé 7 Jours* in France and scores of other broadcasting publications. Said Boris Voitekhov, RT's chief editor: "Radio and television speak about everything that interests the Soviet people, and that is what we shall write about."

One feature of RT, however, will be different from anything the rest of us attempt. It will be a regular column titled, rather catchily, "Attention: Falsehoods in the Air," and it will answer "falsehoods" aired by the Voice of America, West German radio and other Western stations.

■ In the interest of cultural exchange, we'd like to carry a similar column about falsehoods beamed to the West by the Soviet propaganda radio. Unfortunately, there are two reasons why this wouldn't be practical. First, we don't cover radio. Second, even though Russians listen to American and other Western radio broadcasts, few Americans listen to Soviet radio, so there's no need to refute whatever "falsehoods" they may be broadcasting.

We'd be happy to exchange critics, though. How'd you like Cleveland Amory for a few weeks, Voitekhov?

And if he's not lucky, there's always something at least star-connected. Which was enough for one lady, who exclaimed, "Oh look, there's John Forsythe's parking place."

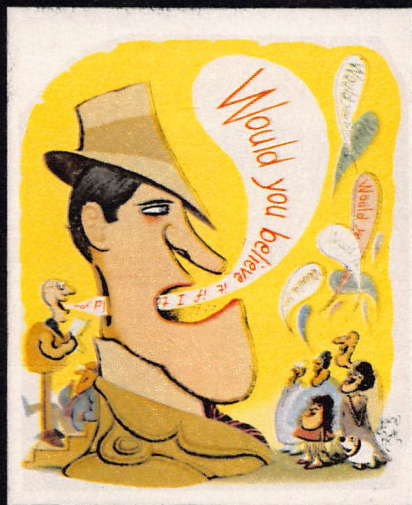

THE LAUGHS are BUILT-in



The successful TV comedy
comes equipped with
running gags
guaranteed to give
the show more mileage

There are three possible gambits in concocting a new TV comedy series that will run for years. The most difficult approach is to create an original idea and sustain it with screamingly funny scripts. The easiest expedient is to hire a star who will distract attention from the crashing banality of the show. The trickiest gimmick is to latch onto a recurring phrase, a running gag line, and, through repetition, raise it to such popularity that the entrepreneur can live in luxurious indolence forever on the residuals.

The running gag line, a standard device in vaudeville and burlesque long before the electronic tube was perfected, never has been exploited more intensively than in NBC's *Get Smart*. Most producers are ecstatic if they can come up with one humorous catch phrase for a show. In *Get Smart*, many laughs are pegged to three expressions used by Don Adams, who plays a secret agent whose ineptitude is matched only by his naïveté.

Adams' substitute for resourcefulness in a critical situation is to ask the villain, "Would you believe it if I told you . . .?" The bad guy never does. In reporting to his superior that another silly stratagem has backfired, he mumbles, "Sorry about that, chief." When he is warned he will have to endure unspeakable tortures if he is captured, he mutters, "And I'll be loving it."

A unique feature of *Get Smart* is that its running gag lines were planted in the first eight episodes before they were fully tested for the audience's reaction. This is a radical departure from the usual procedure, for trying to anticipate what will break up people is as unpredictable as the vagaries of female behavior. An amusing crack that becomes identified with a performer generally pops up spontaneously and is incorporated into his routine after it draws a big yuk.

Jack Benny's trade-mark, his in-

credulous "Well!", was an aside to trigger a laugh when a joke punctuated by his long-suffering stare fell flat. Milton Berle's "I'll kwill you a mwillion times" was an ad-lib thrown into a TV skit. To his astonishment, it brought down the house. Jack Paar's "I kid you not," a remark taken from "The Caine Mutiny," was an off-the-cuff comment to point up the introduction of an obscure guest.

When *Get Smart* was in the planning stage, Don Adams urged Buck Henry and Mel Brooks, the co-creators, to build the predicaments of its bumbling hero around a few repeated punch lines. "I was sold on the idea after I discovered what it did for me on appearances with Perry Como a few years ago," Adams confides. "I was so unknown that I was practically anonymous until I persuaded Perry to let me answer his mild insults with a set comeback, 'You sure know how to hurt a guy.' The line didn't exactly make me a sensation overnight, but it did establish me as something of a personality on the show. I knew the gag had caught on and was in the public domain when Bob Hope used it on the Academy Awards show.

"Actually, 'Would you believe it?' was given a trial run on *The Bill Dana Show*, where I played Byron Glick, a dumb house detective. I picked up the 'hurt' line and 'Sorry about that' from Joe Mikalos, who was Ernie Kovacs' right-hand man. He applied them to such incongruous situations that he convulsed old pros in the business. I figured if they were funny enough to get laughs in a hip crowd, they would strike a responsive chord with all types of audiences."

Most veteran comedians who served apprenticeships in the heyday of vaudeville and burlesque have learned the value of a running gagline. When they find one, they treasure it as highly as their joke files. Jackie Gleason's "And away we go" and "How

sweet it is" are throwbacks to his early training. Phil Silvers, who impersonated glib con men in burlesque 20 years before he hit the jackpot with Sergeant Bilko, works "Glad to see you" into his patter. The same holds true for Allen and Rossi's "Hello dere" and Jack E. Leonard's "I hope so for your sake."

The device can be such an effective identification that it becomes an integral part of a comedian's billing. Two examples that will evoke fond memories among older devotees of burlesque are Harry (Wanna Wrestle?) Lavan and Frank (Cheese 'n' Crackers) Hagan. A trouper really had it made when the audience yelled his punch line in the appropriate place. For instance, Lavan would encounter the soubrette, who had a build that made Jayne Mansfield look like a boy, sobbing bitterly. It developed that the poor, innocent creature had been lured to the big city by a cad who left her stranded when she rebuffed his vile advances. "What can I do now?" the distraught maid wailed. Whereupon Lavan leered at the audience and the customers bawled in unison, "Wanna wrestle?"

The essential element that turns catchwords into bywords is at once a mystery and a phenomenon of communications. Few expressions that are all the rage briefly are witty, even in the original context. In the early days of network radio Joe Penner built a lucrative career on "Wanna buy a duck?", the punch line of a risqué burlesque bit. Jack Pearl's "Vas you dere, Sharlie?" was repeated oftener than the pledge of allegiance to the flag. People laughed insanely when Bert (The Mad Russian) Gordon, Eddie Cantor's stooge, said "How do you do?" And *Dragnet* vaulted into first place in the ratings partly on the impetus of Jack Webb's "All we want are the facts, ma'am."

Buck Henry has an explanation for the vogue of certain say- **continued**

ings: "I think the line must be consistent with the characterization of the role and, at the same time, sound like a natural comment when it is thrown into a conversation. A running joke must be such a trite remark that it takes on an offbeat quality when used in a series of ludicrous incidents.

"To be honest, I wasn't crazy about 'Would you believe it?' until I saw how the repetition of it underscored the asininity of Maxwell Smart, the dumbest secret agent of all time. I'm glad to say that the sponsors got the point a lot faster."

Garbage-scow dialog

In the episode that sold the show, Smart is assigned to nail the maniacal Mr. Big. Smart winds up on a garbage scow in New York, captured by Mr. Big, who turns out to be a dwarf. Smart is a dead pigeon; his chief does not know where he is to rescue him.

He smirks craftily at Mr. Big. "At this moment seven Coast Guard cutters are converging on us," he says. "Would you believe it?"

"I find that pretty hard to believe," Mr. Big replies suavely.

"Hmm. Would you believe six?"

"I don't think so," Mr. Big answers.

"How about two cops in a rowboat?" Smart asks as a last resort.

Goodman Ace, generally regarded in the trade as the top comedy writer, admits his professional curiosity is intrigued by the show's heavy reliance on running gag lines. "If the preconceived catch phrases click, they will set a precedent for every writer, and I shudder to think of the mortality," Ace says. "It's nice to have some built-in laughs in every script, but the odds are all against it because there's nothing trickier than the audience's reaction to a joke."

Although the spark that starts the chain reaction of repetition still is

an enigma, it hardly is necessary to hold a graduate degree in psychology to understand why people parrot a new phrase. It is a verbal status symbol, an indication that the speaker is *au courant*, in the know, with it.

TV is not the only source of such expressions, of course; every activity and profession has contributed to them. Conversations are studded with colloquialisms from sports ("I shoulda stood in bed" . . . "Nice guys finish last" . . . "Say it ain't true, Joe"); the Space Age has spawned a vocabulary all its own; and idioms casually uttered by public officials are picked up. Some months ago President Johnson, in projecting his anti-poverty program, recalled that he had made a vow when he was a young school-teacher to fight against inequality of opportunity and declared, "I'm not about to forget that promise." The next day everybody in America, or so it seemed, was using "I'm not about to" as a synonym for "I don't intend to."

'Quick, Watson, the needle'

An interesting aspect of running gag lines is that they reflect our changing attitudes and mores. One of the first, and most frequently used, phrases was "Quick, Watson, the needle," from the Sherlock Holmes stories. It referred to Holmes' penchant for taking drugs, considered an exotic habit in the 1890's, but addiction is such a grim problem today that it is taboo as the subject for a joke. On the other hand, the restrictions on racy language have been relaxed considerably.

Twenty years ago a network censor would have thrown conniption fits if Joey Bishop had used his mild expletive, "Son of a gun." Would you believe it? What about George Gobel's "I'll be a dirty bird"? But then, would you have believed you'd ever hear on the home screen about all those murky goings-on in Peyton Place?

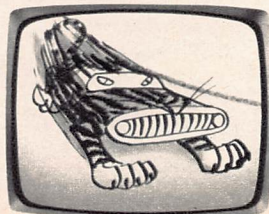

May's Specials: The merry month of May brought an unusually plentiful and varied assortment of specials to television. The most impressive one, however, could hardly be described as merry. On May 8 CBS devoted two hours to a magnificent production of "Death of a Salesman."

It won lavish praise from the critics and, according to Arbitron, it didn't do badly in the ratings either. CBS chose to schedule it against *Bonanza*. Still, it attracted an audience averaging 16,000,000 viewers (compared with *Bonanza's* 32,000,000). And during the second hour, when *Bonanza* was not on the air, "Salesman" beat its opposition.

The next night a different sort of serious program, NBC's "The Hill Country: Lyndon Johnson's Texas," was available to viewers who sought a change of pace from routine programming. They responded by giving it the highest rating in its time period.

The first two weeks of May also offered documentaries about Mississippi, Vietnam, Stravinsky, unidentified flying objects and auto safety; a tepid review of broadcasting history; and coverage of the Kentucky Derby.

And, in one way or another, the networks kept the Nation informed about the Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearings. NBC, as always, was there live for all of the testimony of Secretary Rusk and Secretary McNamara. ABC telecast Rusk's session in its entirety but finessed McNamara's. CBS, despite the storm kicked

up by the resignation of Fred Friendly, offered no live coverage of the hearings—just half-hour recaps.

What We Watch: Last fall the Politz Media Service surveyed 4020 viewers (a larger sample than Nielsen's but not necessarily a more valid one) to ascertain their viewing preferences. The most popular programs on Politz's list do not differ markedly from those named by other pollsters (though things have changed a bit since the Politz study was made).

Politz goes on, however, to break down his sample audience according to various demographic characteristics, and one grouping in particular offers a surprise. It names the programs favored by viewers who have attended college, and the surprise is that it includes a number of programs usually described as "low-brow" shows. The list: *Red Skelton*, *Bonanza*, *The Man from U.N.C.L.E.*, *Jackie Gleason*, *Gomer Pyle*, *Lawrence Welk*, *Ed Sullivan*, *The Beverly Hillbillies*, *Walt Disney* and *Hogan's Heroes*.

Is there, then, little difference between the viewing habits of persons with high and low intelligence? Another survey, conducted on a much smaller scale by Herbert Kay Research, Inc., has come up with some answers to this question, though the findings are described as "only tentative." One conclusion: "People of high intelligence tend to like the same programs that people of lower intelligence like." And, contrary to conventional assumptions, proportionately more people of high intelligence than low were found among those who habitually watch a great deal of television.—Henry Harding

Ross Martin, who has played about everybody from Adolf Hitler to a rooster, has made it in a far-out part

In 1940, when Martin Rosenblatt was graduated—with honors—from the College of the City of New York, he temporarily took the name Mickey Ross and joined a classmate named Bernie West in a vaudeville act called Ross & West. The team, which eventually became part of a Major Bowes traveling unit, specialized in topical comedy, and Ross played such contemporary celebrities as Franklin D. Roosevelt, Adolf Hitler, Ronald Colman and the RKO-Pathé rooster.

Now, 26 years later, as actor Ross Martin, he has become something of a celebrity himself. In motion pictures he has been a psychopathic killer in "Experiment in Terror" and a swashbuckling swordsman in "The Great Race," and in television he has been Andamo in *Mr. Lucky*, a regular panelist on *Stump the Stars* and is currently playing undercover agent Artemus Gordon in *The Wild, Wild West*. But possibly the biggest differ-

ence between past and present is that, where the old act was Ross & West, in TV it is West—in the person of Robert Conrad as James West—who gets top billing.

Although Ross Martin says, "I can't say I'm happy being a second banana," he has, at 46, reluctantly given up any ideas he may once have had about being a romantic leading man. His disillusionment began soon after he went to Hollywood seven years ago. His agent took him to see a producer who was choosing the cast for a new picture. Both the agent and Martin had the leading male role in mind, but the producer only glanced up and said, "He could play the Eye-trallian boy." It happened that the producer was an extremely short man. Martin got on his knees, said good-by, and walked that way out of the office, thus not even getting the part of the Eye-trallian boy.

But if anything could **continued**

make up to an actor for not being a leading man, it is the role of Artemus Gordon in *The Wild, Wild West*. As a Government secret agent during the Grant Administration, Martin has had to disguise himself as a myopic Viennese geologist, a desert-rat prospector, a hammy Shakespearean actor, a derelict Civil War veteran, an old Swedish railroad worker, a Chinese coolie, a Parisian art connoisseur and President Grant himself. As Martin says, "What a show-off's showcase!"

The real Ross Martin is almost as many people as the roles he plays. Introspective and self-analytical, he is at the same time outgoing and flamboyant. He was raised amid gang fights on New York's East Side and in the Bronx, yet his favorite occupation is playing the violin and his tastes are conspicuously artistic. He speaks freely of his lifelong resentment toward his mother—discovered during six years in analysis—but he gives her credit for any success he may have achieved. It was she who insisted that he go to college, where he studied business administration, education and, later, law. He has been a sheet-metal worker (like his late father, who emigrated from Poland when Ross was six months old), a department-store buyer, a Government economist and a public relations man, in addition to being an actor—the job he wanted all along.

A performer at 4

Ross did not speak English until he was 4 years old. He feels that being teased and ridiculed as a child first drew him to acting: "It was the need to be accepted and loved." His mother remembers that he was no more than 4 when he started performing. Mrs. Sadie Rosenblatt, who lives with Ross's younger sister May in New York, and who talks like Gertrude

Berg, recalls, "When he came into the room, everybody's face litten up—he was always entertaining." She did not encourage him. "Show business didn't mean to me so much," she says. "I tried to keep him back, but now I am happy for him." She does not recall the resentment her son's psychoanalyst unearthed: "Everything I remember was wonderful." She does admit that she was responsible for his finishing college: "Parents have to push a little." But sister May says, "Mother allowed us to think and do as we pleased. She didn't make us feel we were forced to do anything we didn't want to."

A violin and analysis

At 10, Martin was co-winner of an amateur contest with a boy who later became known as Red Buttons. By that time, too, lying about his age, he was playing violin in the symphony orchestra at Teachers College of Columbia University. He stopped playing the violin when he was 15 and did not resume until he completed his analysis, which showed him that this was part of his rebellion against his mother. By the time he was 15, also, he had received a scar between his eyes from falling into a quarry during a gang fight. Today he refers to it as a "scowl line" and says, "Take that away and I'm really a rather vacuous-looking man."

Ross Martin's vaudeville partner, Bernie West—who has moved on to comedy roles in many TV shows, movies and Broadway musicals—remembers that at CCNY "everybody would get hysterical" when Ross did impersonations of certain professors. The future team of Ross & West also performed "at every college function where they'd let us get on—all the shows, dances and rallies." They were so popular that the school paper ran an editorial about them at their graduation. Concerning his former

partner, West says, "He's a very outgoing guy—almost theatrical. People who don't know him might think it was put on, but it's sincere—he means it." And he adds, "I think he was born for the theater."

A Hunter College art student named Muriel Weiss, whom Martin married in 1941, did not agree. Partly to please her and partly at the urging of friends to "put down roots," Ross left show business at the end of an engagement at the Capitol Theater in Washington, D.C. Another man took his place in the act, as well as the name Mickey Ross, and he once again became Martin Rosenblatt. He, his wife and their daughter, Phyllis, born a year after their marriage, lived "in the country" in Maryland, while Ross worked in Washington at various jobs. In the high-flown diction he sometimes employs, Martin describes the early years of his marriage as having "a golden mist around them." Daughter Phyllis, a pretty brunette now trying for a career as a commercial artist in New York, also remembers those years pleasantly. She recalls, "We horsed around a lot. It was easy to be a kid with my father—there was no pressure to be grownup."

He was Godfrey's announcer

But the pressure to return to show business was building up within Ross Martin, and after five years he decided to try again. His wife said, "When you don't make it, you'll realize how well off you have been." But he went to WTOP, the CBS station in Washington, and was hired as an actor and announcer. In the latter capacity, he had to introduce Arthur Godfrey, who did his daily radio program from his farm outside Washington. The first day, after Ross had intoned the introduction in what he considered the proper announcerial tone, Godfrey came on saying, "Ross Martin—well, la-de-da!" The next morning,

Ross made the announcement in an exact take-off of Godfrey's voice. There was a moment of silence, after which The Great Man merely said, "Good morning," which is the way it was from then on.

At the end of two years, Martin went to New York, where he continued acting in television and on the stage in "Hazel Flagg" and "Shinbone Alley." He also was in the road company of "Guys and Dolls." His marriage, meanwhile, had been deteriorating. Finally he and his wife decided upon a divorce. By the time the decree had been granted, however, she was terminally ill with cancer, and thus the divorce never became final. She died last year.

A part in 'Peter Gunn'

Soon after Martin moved to Hollywood, he landed a small part in a *Peter Gunn* episode, directed by Blake Edwards. Six months later he received a call from Edwards offering him the role of Andamo in *Mr. Lucky*. At first, Ross thought it was some friend playing a joke, and insisted that he call Edwards back. Then followed the films and other TV shows.

Today, Ross Martin lives alone in a tastefully decorated but unostentatious home in Beverly Hills. Most of his friends are outside of show business, and a surprising number are from childhood or school days. He plays tennis occasionally with his former psychoanalyst. On the set of *The Wild, Wild West* he is on expansively friendly terms with everyone, although his attitude toward the show's hero, Robert Conrad, is somewhat guarded, as it was toward John Vivyan, who played Mr. Lucky. Martin has described himself as "a warm, somewhat talky, even-dispositioned, multi-interested, bright dilettante"—and that, although he may never be a leading man, is more than most actors can say for themselves.

I think it should have gone two more years.” (The show already has run on CBS for five years.) She’s shown in group above, with Miss Moore, Jerry Paris, who’s holding Van Dyke’s arm, Morey Amsterdam

IS THERE AN ATHLETIC GAP?

A TV documentary explores reasons why the Russians have enjoyed such astonishing success against our athletes

Moscow is the sports capital of the world. As lacerating as that statement is to the pride of American athletes, it is, unfortunately, the truth, and may continue to be so for a long time to come.

As recently as 15 years ago, Soviet athletes were practically nonentities on the international sports scene, and today they rule it. They entered the Olympic Games for the first time in 1952, and were edged narrowly in the unofficial team totals by the U.S. But in the games of 1956, '60 and '64, the Russians outdistanced all competition.

How has this phenomenal ascent in so short a time been achieved? To find out, NBC sent a crew headed by producer Stuart Schulberg and commentator Jim Simpson to Russia to study its methods. Their findings will be on view this Sunday (May 22, 6:30-7:30 P.M., ET) on a program called "The Russian Sports Revolution."

Later this summer—on July 23 and 24—we'll be seeing on ABC the results of these methods, in the eighth annual U.S.-Russian track meet from Los Angeles. (Last year, in Kiev, for the first time in that meet's history, the Russian men's team defeated our male athletes; in the past, Russian teams have won almost every time in the over-all scores because of severe drubbings administered by Russian women athletes to our female com-

petitors.) The competition will be beamed back to Russia live via Early Bird satellite.

That encounter will be a prelude to the main event—the Olympic Games of 1968, to be held in Mexico City. The big question: Can Russia win them for the fourth straight time?

"If every imaginable sports activity in the U.S.," Stuart Schulberg was saying recently, "were combined in one ruling body under Government control, that would approximate the Russian system. Imagine that every baseball, football, hockey and basketball league in America—the NCAA, the AAU, everything—was ruled by one man at the head of an all-powerful committee."

That sports czar at the moment is a man named Yuri Mashin; and his group, the All-Union Committee for Physical Culture and Sport, has tentacles reaching into every corner of the USSR. It presides over more than 188,000 physical-culture groups, which hold their own *spartakiada*, or festivals of sport, to establish regional championships. As many as 70 million people may participate in a single nation-wide *spartakiad*.

In order to assess the achievements of all these sport enthusiasts, the All-Union Committee (AUC) has established national norms for more

than 50 types of sports endeavor. The basic program is called GTO—a Russian abbreviation for “Ready for Labor and Defense.” To qualify for a GTO badge, men and women athletes must meet nation-wide norms in a broad spectrum of events including swimming, sprinting, javelin throwing, and the shot-put.

Special norms are set up for young men in the 14-15- and 16-18-year-old age groups. In addition, there is a series of categories for athletes focusing on specific events—with norms correspondingly far higher—leading to such honorifics as Master of Sport of the USSR for athletes who qualify to compete internationally; and for those who display both civic virtue and high proficiency over a period of years, the title Honored Master of Sport of the USSR.

The effect of this immense sports bureaucracy is that a promising 16-year-old high jumper in a tiny village in the Urals, let us say, may find himself invited to attend a large sport

school where expert coaching in his specialty is available.

The secret of Russian athletic pre-eminence is, then, organization on a massive scale, originating from the Central Physical Culture Research Institute in Moscow, where norms are written, and from which highly trained instructors are sent out to all the USSR.

NBC's crew encountered there the great high-jumper Valery Brumel—gold-medal winner in the 1964 Olympics and holder of the indoor and outdoor world records—engaged in study toward a Master of Arts degree in physical education. Part of his work involved dissecting frogs to examine the leg muscles which enable them to jump the way they do. (Brumel recently rebroke a half-mended ankle bone, and his future as a jumper is in some serious doubt.)

Igor Ter-Ovanesyan, the great Russian long (broad) jumper, also is at the Institute while he writes his doctoral thesis on the subject **continued**

of—that's right—long jumping. He has his own laboratory where he sifts and charts every conceivable detail relating to his specialty.

So enamored are the Russians of the marriage between science and sport that they frequently invoke the name of I.P. Pavlov, the renowned Russian physiologist, as being a kind of patron saint of Soviet sport. An article in a Russian sport magazine stated: "The coach must be acquainted with Pavlov's physiology, Soviet pedagogics and psychology. To analyze technique he must know mechanics, physics and mathematics."

One Honored Master of Sport has designed a speed graph for runners, consisting of a nylon line, attached to the man's back, which unwinds from a drum as the runner sprints down a track. A stylus draws a curve on the drum, recording fluctuations in the runner's speed, and the resultant graph allows a percipient coach to analyze the athlete's stride.

'A sports-crazy country'

"It's a sports-crazy country anyway," says Jim Simpson. "They worship anybody who's accomplished big things in international competition." And it's all a function of politics and the cold war. Every new victory, in the words of a Soviet sports-writer, supports the premise that "the triumph of our athletes . . . is proof of the superiority of the Soviet socialist culture over the rottenness of the culture of capitalist countries."

Athletes who lose may find themselves in disgrace, assailed by the press, as one single-scuil champion was for his "spoiled attitude, weak will, and lack of perseverance," after being beaten by a Yugoslav.

In this atmosphere, preparations go on for the U.S.-USSR track meet at Los Angeles and the Olympics in

Mexico City. Jim Simpson was discussing that subject one day with Mashin, the Soviet sports czar, and in a whimsical attempt at prying loose a bit of tactical intelligence, said: "I understand you've been developing high-altitude training camps, set at the same distance above sea level as Mexico City."

Mashin only grinned, and said: "We have all sorts of topography here. Wouldn't it be fortunate if one of our camps was at the same level as Mexico City?"

Our system a shambles

If the generation and selection of international competitors is a miracle of organization in the Soviet Union, in the United States it's a shambles. "We have such a hit-and-miss, shoddy athletic system here it's unbelievable," Jim Simpson says.

A major cause of our predicament is the current bitter feud between the NCAA (the coordinating body for college athletics) and the AAU (which directs all noncollege amateur events) over the rather elemental jurisdictional question of who can qualify athletes for international competition, and how.

Last fall the Senate Commerce Committee studied this subject, and so gloomy were its findings that Vice President Hubert Humphrey appointed a special sports arbitration committee to attempt to resolve the matter.

But in the best of circumstances, our system of Olympic trials—wherein an athlete has to deliver his best performance on a particular day or not make the team—is so rickety and un-serviceable by Soviet standards as to be almost comical.

The Soviet custom of state control over athletics is a notion that may be abhorrent to Americans, but the un-kind fact is that they're winning and we're losing.

It's hard to argue with success.

THE 'OOMPH GIRL' IS 51

Ann Sheridan, still the Tabasco-tongued Texan, has been thriving in soap opera and is looking forward to her own TV series

The chauffeured limousine parked outside NBC's Brooklyn studios belonged to a lady who showed up there to act in *Another World*, a soap opera. It was 3:15, a full 15 minutes before the show was to go off the air, but the driver was running the motor—getaway style. At 3:17 you found out why.

The studio door sprung open, and coming out was Ann Sheridan—51 now, yet stepping like a spunky 20-year-old. There was no mistaking her—not if you were weaned on Warner Brothers pictures—the lustrous red hair; the calf-like, heavily lashed eyes; the Cherokee cheekbones and the wide, full mouth; a little older,

sure, but undeniably Sheridan.

Ann Sheridan's a lady who takes care of first things first. So, settling deep into the limousine's quicksand cushioning, she ripped open a fresh pack of cigarets (one of the three she must go through a day). Then, while she appraised her visitor through the thick-lensed horn-rims she usually wears, the car took off. So did Sheridan—verbally.

"You're going to find that I'm honest," she said in what was probably the best-known fog voice in movies. "To a fault, people tell me. But I tell them, 'What the blazes. Life is too short to go pussyfooting around.'"

Pussyfoot? Sheridan? Never has,

and probably never will. And it's fascinating talk, full of the Sheridan spunk 'n' spice that often left her foes reaching for Band-Aids.

Here's a sampling:

On her 3:17 getaway: "I get paid to act, not socialize. So I act and go home. In comfort, too. Friends say, 'Isn't it nice of NBC to get you a limousine?' NBC, hell! I pay for this. I'm too old to have my teeth shaken out in a bus."

On doing the soap (which she left last month to start work on the new series, *Pistols 'n' Petticoats*, starting on CBS next season): "I took the job because people were saying I was lazy. 'Sheridan doesn't want to work any more,' they said. So I decided to do a soap. That's 9000 new words a day. Let them say I'm lazy now!"

On soap actors: "They've been marvelous to me. They could have said, 'Watch out for this one. She'll raise hell.' But I haven't. Not that I can't. Just ask Warners' front office."

On soap acting: "On heavy days, it's murder. What I do is visualize the script. Picture the page. When the other actors stop talking, I talk."

On Hollywood present: "Today, it's all 'Singing in the Surf' pictures. If you can't ride a surfboard, you're out of work. There're a few good parts being written for women my age. But Roz Russell gets those. The rest of us stand in line."

On Hollywood past: "People think that because a few actors out there were nuts, we all were. Nothing but wild parties. What wild parties? We all went to bed at 11. I've seen parties in New York that make Hollywood look like the A&P."

That's Sheridan, still the Tabasco-tongued Texan who started in pictures as Everyman's "Oomph Girl" and ended up as one of Warners' sturdiest stars. Sheridan, the self-taught, tough-minded pro who waged many a war against the mighty Jack Warner yet

didn't, and still doesn't, have the heart to swat a fly. And it's Sheridan, the earthy poker pal of such bygone Warner swingers as Errol Flynn and Humphrey Bogart who, nonetheless, never shook loose her strait-laced, Southern Baptist background.

Not at first, anyway. Says Sheridan: "I finally got over things like 'vanity is bad' and 'marriage is the only way for a woman.' That's when I started to fight my own battles. But I guess I started fighting as a kid. Otherwise, I'd never have gotten out of Denton."

Denton (Texas) was home, where Ann's father, a mechanic, ran a string of garages. "Secretly," Ann says, "I wanted to be a band singer. But that meant I thought I was pretty, and vanity was 'bad.'" Singing with a band wasn't such a hot idea to Ann's folks, either. So, by the time she got to college, Sheridan enrolled in a "respectable" drama and speech course, and forgot about dance bands. Good thing too, says Ann. She asks: "Ever hear me sing?"

In 1933 Sheridan landed in Hollywood, compliments of a Paramount "Search for Beauty" contest she won. "My sister submitted my picture," Ann says. "I didn't, and still don't, think I was good-looking enough. There are some pictures of me in the Paramount morgue that would scare you."

Maybe, but Warners didn't think she was bad. In 1934 she moved over to their lot, getting paid next to nothing (\$75 a week) to play nothing parts. It was no picnic. She remembers: "I'd get home from the studio at 2 or 3 in the morning and be too tired to wash off my body makeup." Others were worse off, and it started to sour Sheridan on the studios. "At Paramount," she recalls, "wardrobe mistresses were working for \$5 a week. I was getting \$50—and I was lucky. That was the Depression and at least I was eating." *continued*

At Warners, Sheridan started to learn the hard facts about life in the movie business, thanks, in large measure, to such Warner cronies as James Cagney. Cagney told TV GUIDE: "When Ann came to Warners she was just a nice kid—chumming around with the working staff, hairdressers and grips. There was nothing aggressive about her." But nonaggressive people don't usually get to the top in Hollywood. "So we, the older group," Cagney goes on, "took Ann under our wing—sort of helped out."

Sheridan acknowledges that Cagney and "the older group" (Flynn, Bogart and Pat O'Brien were in there), taught her all that she knows about the picture business. She needed teaching. "I was taught," she says, "that the 'front office' never gave you anything unless they respected you. And you had to fight for that."

Needed ego-building

She needed ego-building, too. As Robert Taplinger, the Warner publicity man who tagged her the "Oomph Girl," recalls: "Ann used to knock around the lot in blue jeans, almost as if dressing-up wouldn't help her physically. I don't know if it was her up-bringing or what, but she had so little ego. Although the 'Oomph Girl' thing [ostensibly a contest between 10 starlets] was fixed so that Ann would win, she told me: 'Fixed or not, honey, keep your fingers crossed.'"

The "Oomph-Girl" tag didn't send Sheridan into orbit. It did, however, help her to fight her own battles. "I used the attention it got me," she recalls, "as a weapon against Warners. By that time, I wanted good parts—to be considered a good actress." Warners gave her a few A pictures ("Angels with Dirty Faces" and "They Drive by Night"). But it wasn't until the studio bought "Kings

Row" that Sheridan really waged war. "I wanted the part of Randy Monaghan so badly," she says, "my teeth ached. 'Kings Row' symbolized all the hypocrisy and narrow-mindedness I had hated and fought against in Denton."

But Warners said no. "So I went on suspension," Sheridan says, "one of my *many* at Warners." She was almost dead broke. "But Jimmy Cagney came to me and said, 'You need money? Want to borrow a thousand? You can't go back for what they were paying you before. Do that, and they'll hate your guts.'"

Finally landed 'Kings Row'

Sheridan got 'Kings Row,' probably one of her best pictures. There were lots of others, too—"The Man Who Came to Dinner," "George Washington Slept Here," "I Was a Male War Bride," "Dodge City," to name a few.

"As tough as Warners could be," she says, "and as tough as we could be on Warners, the actors never fought among themselves. We worked hard and had fun." And don't give Sheridan that business about Hollywood actors not being dedicated. "Hell," she retorts in that throaty voice, "you can be dedicated and laugh *too*."

Sheridan had a few battles in her personal life too. "Because I was raised to believe that marriage was everything," she explains, "I gave it a try." Two tries, actually, to actors Edward Norris and George Brent. Each marriage lasted a year. "With both men," she says, "there was no honesty between us. And if two people living together can't be honest, then I don't want it."

Battling Annie has also found she doesn't need other things to survive. Organized religion for one. "Since I was a kid," she says, "religion—needless to say—has always scared me to death. All that hellfire and damna-

tion!" Even so, she once thought of converting to Catholicism. "Steve Hannagan [the late publicist she went with for years] was Catholic," Ann says. "So I talked to a priest. But he told me that, as a Catholic, I couldn't marry a divorced man. That did it." Reasoned Ann: "I was middle-aged. I couldn't rob cradles."

Since the TV take-over of Hollywood in the Fifties (Sheridan left Warners in '48), Ann has traveled the usual television, stage ("Odd Man In"), summer-stock route of many displaced stars. "I could have worked more," Ann says, "but everything they send you today is such junk. I've had the four-letter school of writing."

Sheridan won't find any four-letter words in her new show, *Pistols 'n' Petticoats* ("Sort of crazy," Ann says, "like 'Cat Ballou'"). She went back to Hollywood last month for the first episode. "What have they done to the place?" she cries. "I don't

know it any more. The lots are chaotic. TV has turned everything into big, ugly factories." Sheridan will be working in them, but that doesn't mean she'll like it. "I'm indignant!" she says with the kind of pride movie stars *used* to have about Hollywood.

To blazes with the TV social swing, too. "My off-time," Sheridan says, "will be *mine*." She means it, probably because of what happened to her while playing stock in Detroit not long ago. "A car manufacturer's wife," Sheridan seethes, "invited me to a party. She put me at the end of the pool and, I swear, turned *spotlights* on me. I felt like an ape in a cage!" Concludes Ann: "I fought too long—and hard—for my dignity, to be treated like a freak!" True. Only this time, Sheridan almost lost her dignity—and certainly proved that she hasn't hung up her gloves. Says she: "That broad doesn't know how close she came to being knocked cold!"

Facts about "fourwalkers"
