

When it rains it pours

as we see it

The idea was to improve programming. Not directly, of course, because the Federal Communications Commission has always avoided any action that might be interpreted as program control. So the FCC proposed a 50-50 rule forbidding the networks to provide more than half of the prime-time programs they broadcast.
 There were exceptions in the case of news and documentaries and some other details, but generally half of the shows the networks put on the air would have to come from some source other than the networks. This rule, the FCC said, would lead to more diversity in programming. Those who agreed thought it might even lead to better programming, perhaps even some shows for minority audiences.

 It was not a very good idea because, if the networks don't provide the shows, the advertisers will, and the networks and advertisers have the same aims. The proposed rule wouldn't have changed programs; it would just have confused matters, for no matter who provides the programs, the networks have to make final decisions. They must always be responsible for what they broadcast.
 The FCC didn't find many supporters for its 50-50 rule proposal. The networks were against it. The stations were against it. Recently, in one week, the National Football League, the leading members of the American Association of Advertising Agencies, the Association of National Advertisers and the National Council of Churches opposed it. If it isn't dead by now, it will be soon.

■ III-conceived though the 50-50 proposition might have been, it shows that the FCC is concerned about the lack of diversity in programming and about the tremendous financial interest the networks have in nearly everything they broadcast.

Should there be more diversity, some regularly scheduled programs at night for the small part of the audience that does not want pure escape entertainment all the time?

■ We have the networks' answer. It is "No." With two exceptions, the prime-time schedule this fall will be light, escape fare.

• We have the advertisers' answer. They could change network programming because they control the purse strings. But they haven't used their power. Their answer is "No" too.

• We have the viewers' answer. The majority of viewers continue to watch the network shows. Surveys show the audience is getting younger, but it is still large and the networks and advertisers are not concerned. So the viewers' answer must be "No" too.

■ The people who count, then, seem to be satisfied with television as it is. This is what makes the medium so frustrating for the few network executives, advertisers, viewers and critics who want television to grow up. **REVIEW** by Cleveland Amory



To Tell the Truth

To Tell the Truth-which the guest impostors don't, of course, or otherwise there wouldn't be any show-is the only panel show which is on the air every day in the daytime and once a week at night. So if you want to avoid it, our best advice is to shut your eyes, keep moving and don't talk to strangers. Seriously, however, it is a generally agreeable half hour, and its 10-year record of durability is more deserved than that of What's Mu Line? Indeed, What's My Line?, which may be said to have stepfathered this show, is in our opinion, along with smog, exhaust and general noxiousness, one of the leading causes of air pollution.

We will not presume to tell the idea of *To Tell the Truth*, in the firm and certain belief that if you don't know by now you don't want to. Suffice it to say that the central character is usually a person whose occupation is offbeat enough to afford a wide latitude of on-beat humor. Control of this rests in the hands of Bud Collyer, who, if he's a bit slick for our taste, is at least professional without being professorial.

To tell the McCov from the covwhich is not easy since the McCov often is coy-is left to the tender mercies of panelists Kitty Carlisle. Tom Poston, Peggy Cass and Orson Bean, Miss Carlisle fires her questions rapidly with her chin up and no end of confidence. Tom Poston exudes modesty and deference but is no mean hand with a joke. Peggy Cass muddles through with a delightful accent that can best be described by not being described. Finally, Orson Bean is inclined to act out not only his questions but also the answers he receives. Sometimes they all carry the same joke to its illogical conclusion-as, for example, when they were trying to guess an art dealer and Miss Carlisle asked a question which concerned a recent altercation over a painting. When Mr. Poston's turn came, he declared, "I think if you had an imbroglio it would be over a Modigliani." Next came Peggy Cass. "Say," she asked, "in that rhubarb, who won?" And finally Mr. Bean wrapped it up with, "I have an original imbroglio at home."

On another show, when they were trying to guess the national champion woman duck-caller, Miss Carlisle suddenly asked one of the contestants, "What is a smew?" (later we learned it was a crossword-puzzle bird), but that time no one picked it up. At the end the woman did a mating call and. of course, Mr. Bean jumped up and ran toward her. Another time the task of the panelists was to guess which of three husky-looking specimens was an avalanche stopper. Turned out to be quite a show stopper too. Now if we only could have had that bird 10 years ago on What's My Line? Well, we can dream, can't we? So what else is smew?

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

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

Buddy Ebsen may play a hillbilly, but he'd rather find himself at sea


In television he's a man of the mountains, but in private life he much prefers the sea. He's Buddy Ebsen, alias Jed Clampett of *The Beverly Hillbillies*, shown here participating in his favorite sport. DR. SPOCK PRESCRIBES FOR TELEVISION

The world-famous pediatrician recommends a new diet for the medium to guarantee you and your children more rewarding lives

This is the fourth article in TV GUIDE's series examining television's effect on our society. Its author needs no introduction to the 19,000,000 parents who have bought his "The Pocket Book of Baby and Child Care," the largest-selling paperback book of all time. Dr. Spock is professor of child development at Western Reserve University and author of other books.

have to depend a lot on other people for my answer to the question: What is the effect of television on our civilization?

There's no TV set near me in the clinic where I consult with parents and teach medical students. Five nights a week I'm writing and erasing and stalling at my desk, and the other two are for going out to see friends and movies and concerts.

The only program I see regularly is the daytime serial *The Doctors* ("dedicated to the brotherhood of healing"). That's because I sneak out to an ice rink twice a week in the middle of the day, and there's a TV set in the snack bar where I eat my sandwich.

The doctors in the show used to be wrapped up in their cases, all of which had mysterious or tragic psychosomatic angles. When other people in the snack bar asked me why I was glued to the set, I told them I was getting pointers.

But nowadays the doctors in the show have become totally absorbed in their own personal problems (none of them seems to be married to the right person), and the hospital is merely a backdrop. I must say that when the actors occasionally mention a patient, their talk is authentic medicalese.

In any event, much of what I know about television's impact on its audience comes from what mothers tell me. Most of the mothers I know well (in the teaching clinic) in the lower half of the economic and educational scale say that their children are as fascinated by television as they themselves are. They don't worry about what their children watch. In fact, though they love their children very much and would sacrifice a lot for them, they simply don't think in terms of what might be detrimental or beneficial to them in their emotional development, as college-level parents do. (They don't read books on child care and they don't know that I wrote one.) When the children are naughty, they scold them or slap them, but this is not part of a long-term plan to mold their characters; it's just to stop them from being a nuisance.

Then there is a larger middle-ofthe-road group of mothers who disapprove of a few programs that scare some of their young children and are uneasy at times about the fact that the children spend so much time in front of the set instead of playing outdoors. But they exert only a small amount of control over the viewing.

Finally there's the group of mothers who are most particular about what their children watch. I'm especially interested in what they think about TV today. It's not that their judgments are necessarily the most correct. But they know a lot about how their children are developing, and they are bringing up a large share of the children who eventually will go furthest in the professions and the arts.

A decade or two ago, most of these mothers were very critical of the TV fare available at children's viewing times. They felt that it was mostly brutality or terror or junk. Those who were strong-minded censored their children's viewing drastically. The others usually didn't have the nerve or the persistence to keep control, but they felt guilty that they didn't.

In the last few years most of the very particular parents I know have told me that there are several programs for young and middle-aged children which they (the parents) consider fairly wholesome and educational and which are obviously stimulating to their offspring. They are surprised at how much incidental knowledge their spongelike children sop up even from what they consider to be trashy programs. Many of these parents exercise firm control of the viewing of at least their preschool children, particularly in regard to brutality.

I've also talked to many schoolteachers and principals, getting their opinions about the effect of television on children's learning. Practically all of them-including those who most deplore the scarcity of truly educational programs-say that television viewing has been intellectually stimulating to children even when most of the programs have been trashy. Children talk with animation in class about what they've seen; they ask questions; they sometimes go to the library for further reading. This is impressive testimony coming from professional people who have a prejudice in favor of solid learning.

This evidence that television in its present state is intellectually stimulating to children as well as endlessly delightful to most adults is all to the good. But to my mind this is not nearly good enough, if we think about what television is not doing, and consider the state of the rest of the world and see the implications for America.

For one thing, there is the question of TV violence. I myself have strong opinions about bloody Westerns and brutal crime stories, opinions that have changed a lot in recent years. I used to tell mothers who worried about these programs that as long as their children were not frightened by them, they provided a harmless, make-believe outlet for vicarious aggression and would never turn a good child into a delinquent or a militarist.

Several things changed my mind.

After *The Three Stooges* became a popular program, a very experienced nursery-school teacher told me that her pupils took to bopping **continued**

each other frequently without provocation, a thing which they had rarely done before. When she would reprove a child for this, he would answer righteously, "But that's what the Three Stooges do!"

In other words, though watching brutality (or mock brutality) will not turn a good child into a delinquent one, it is certainly capable of lowering his standards.

Since then, deliberate experiments with adults have shown that after they have watched scenes of violence in movies, they are somewhat brutalized in their reaction to actual situations.

Shocked by Kennedy death

I was also shocked by the assassination of President Kennedy, the report of cheering by school children (obviously from families in which there was violent anti-Kennedy talk), and the subsequent assassination of Oswald. I suddenly faced the fact that our country is only half-civilized in its self-control compared with the Scandinavian countries, for instance, or Britain. We are still glorifying our lawless frontier days. Our adults have watched the brutality of crime stories and Westerns for years without ever becoming satiated.

We have treated badly the Indians, the Negroes and wave after wave of immigrants. We are now bombing North Vietnam as well as Viet Cong installations in South Vietnam, and burning, however unintentionally, women and children along with enemy soldiers. We feel justified because we believe our security is threatened there. But a reading of the foreign press shows that there are those who compare our ruthlessness with that of the Soviet Union in suppressing the Hungarian revolt.

I don't think we can safely go on

with this tolerance for violence, from whatever source. In an age when nuclear weapons are steadily being piled higher and disseminated to more countries, and when annihilation could come at any hour, through brinkmanship or mistake or madness, I believe that we must build into our children a horror of violence, a devotion to civilized ways of settling disputes, a real consideration for the feelings of other people.

Television could be the most powerful instrument for bringing about these kinds of change. Yet only recently, when the issues in the perilous war in Vietnam were receiving their first real hearing in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, a major TV network replaced the hearing with comedy reruns.

Television is letting us down in other ways too. Our country and the world need more and more people with higher and higher education. Television is a powerful stimulator of the intellect and a dramatic teacher. It not only can bring the classroom right into the home, it can bring the whole world—scenery, people, ways of living—into the classroom or into the home.

Could teach us more

It could make the world around us more fascinating by teaching all of us who are interested more history, anthropology, geology, astronomy with the best teachers in the world.

It could satisfy our curiosity about ourselves through information about biology and psychology.

It could enrich our living by showing us great architecture, interior design and decoration, art, landscape gardening—and not only from our own country.

It could bring us music, drama and dance from other lands so that we wouldn't be so self-centered and therefore so irritating to their peoples. To a limited extent television has done all these things. There is no doubt that it has exposed us to new experiences, shown us and our children corners of the globe and customs and living conditions of their inhabitants which were unfamiliar to us before the advent of the medium. But so much more can be done.

Today there are more hungry and miserable people on the earth than there have ever been before. The death rate has been lowered by new health measures, but the birth rate has so far stayed the same. Agricultural methods are pathetically inefficient in the underdeveloped parts of the world. There is a craving for the products of industrialization in the underdeveloped regions, but there is almost no industry, no capital with which to develop it, not nearly enough raw materials to export to pay for the finished products that are needed.

America and Europe must provide, for years, the agricultural and industrial equipment and the capital funds. Television would be by far the best medium for making America aware of the primitive living conditions and desperate needs of the peoples of the underdeveloped world. It could make Americans proud of what we did and what we are doing to help.

This kind of reporting certainly needn't be dull. It can be fascinating. After all, those who can afford it spend large sums to visit such remote parts of the world. And philanthropists glow with satisfaction when they view their benefactions. All Americans could enjoy these sweet prerogatives of the rich.

Some will say they'd much prefer to go on with the quiz shows and family comedies and daredevil adventures that constitute so much of television at present. This would always be possible, for there are, after all, enough channels for all kinds of programs, appealing to all sorts of tastes. But of those others who would be interested in learning more about the state of the world, many might still deny that it is necessary for America to make sacrifices to save the desperate areas.

It must always be very difficult for people in a rich, powerful land to imagine any change. But every one of the great empires of the past has eventually collapsed because, in one way or another, it failed to see its real danger, its real weakness.

We have a priceless advantage those empires did not have—a medium that can bring us face to face with the realities of our world. We can see, as those who came before us could not, that deprivation elsewhere can undermine our civilization as effectively as guns.

And we can teach our childrenmore forcefully than earlier generations were taught—to abhor violence, to respect other people's feelings, to settle disputes peacefully.

These should be television's primary ethical goals.



"... and so good night. That wraps it up for now."

This short-order cook is now frying soap-opera scriptswith relish



ntil one day last August, fry-cook Carolyn Weston had never seen a television script, let alone written one, nor had she ever watched a daytime soap opera. Suddenly last summer, there were some changes made in the hours, wages and fringe benefits of the Hickoryburger Lady of Malibu.

This year, tied to a seven-year contract as head writer of NBC's soap opera *Morning Star*, the same Carolyn Weston routinely turns out a script a day, five days a week, the pages flowing out of her typewriter, without rewrites, straight to mimeo, thence to the actors in Studio 2 at Burbank, Cal., and she is making pots of money. "Pots," in her case, is defined as something in the neighborhood of \$2000 a week.

The strategic factor in this dramatic switch in her workday is the fact that she has been a lifelong secret writer who has been stacking up unpublished manuscripts by the closetful ever since her first full-length novel written at the age of 11. She always used to hide everything she wrote. Eventually the bulk of it was lost or thrown out. "I wrote millions and millions of words," she says today. "Sometimes it horrifies me to think of the waterfall of language that has poured out of my typewriter."

Of this torrent of outpourings, only two of her works, possibly as a consequence of her secretiveness, survived. They sort of accidentally got printed, though causing scarcely a ripple in the publishing pond. Just splash enough, however, for NBC to enter the scene.

Soap operas have traditionally "emanated," as they say, from the East. But Morning Star, even though it's all about a fashion designer in mid-Manhattan, was unaccountably scheduled to emanate from the West Coast. And it seems that NBC, in its executive wisdom, decided that Hollywood-type writers were not ideally suited to soapsuds, that a novelist's emotional makeup was more appropriate, and that a 40-year-old West Coast lady novelist would be just the ticket. That's when they got wind of the Hickoryburger Lady of Malibu who went home to write novels at night after she turned off the grill.

In recent years Miss Weston had become even more diffident about the writing that she did after work. That's because, though she had always written with serious intent, the publishers marketed her first novel with a lurid dust jacket and equally lurid slogans. One blurb ran: "The beast within found voice as it vented its savage rage of desire." The reader was promised "surging passion," "savage pleasure" and "a triangle of the flesh."

"I was mortified," says the authoress. "And you can't imagine my shock when I saw those naked orgies on the cover." She became more of an attic typist than ever.

She recalls her childhood in Hollywood: "I was unbelievably, fantastically shy. I didn't talk to anybody. I had no friends. Books were my friends. All I ever did was daydream and read novels. Before I ever went to high school, I had decided that I was going to be a lady novelist someday.

"At 11 I wrote my first full-length novel, a romantic saga about a girl named Carlotta (coincidentally also age 11), who inherits a great rancho in Spanish California. Everything I wrote I hid. One day I came home and there was my older brother reading my manuscript out loud to two boys in the neighborhood, making fun of it. 'Har-de-har-har' and all that. I went in the bathroom and cried."

For several years recently Carolyn Weston supported her secret writing habit by working, for \$1.60 an hour, at a roadside stand called the Malibu Frostie Freeze, down the Pacific Coast Highway from Malibu Colony, where the movie stars live. Among her customers were Louis Jourdan, David Niven, Ann Sothern, Burt Lancaster and Doris Day. "For years the major part of my conversation was limited to a few phrases such as 'with or without' [onions]."

The best-selling item on the menu was the "hickoryburger" (seven patties to a pound of meat; eight on holidays), whose flavor, an amber-colored fluid called "liquid smoke," was squirted on from plastic bottles. "A customer might order 'one well-done, one medium-rare and two mediums' but they all came out the same. What can you do with a piece of meat a quarter of an inch thick?"

Too, of course, there was the Frostie freeze itself, a whipped ice-milk concoction produced from a machine looking not unlike an iron lung. "I called it 'Gertrude, the Money-Making Fool.'" A number of her regular customers were dogs. "An astonishing number of people buy Frosties for their pooches. Always Frosties, never hickoryburgers. Any number of poodles preferred vanilla Frosties. A pair of Chinese pugs ate any flavor."

Today, Carolyn Weston never watches other people's soap operas, though she follows *Morning Star* with interest. Each day's episode is one she wrote four weeks earlier. How are soapers different from novels? "Well, the dialog is more conventional. I guess pedestrian is the word. Also, I've learned that an interrupted speech like 'John (pause), you see (pause), I'm (pause) dying,' works beautifully."

(pause) dying,' works beautifully." The serial's "promo" shows a big eye with a teardrop and a narrator saying: "Into each life some rain must fall. Cry yourself a bucketful. Watch Morning Star, 11 o'clock weekdays."

Test Postponed: Among peripheral things the Gemini 9 mission would have tested was CBS's newly announced policy of limiting its spacemission coverage to highlights rather than staving with the astronauts for hours on end as in the past. When the flight was scrubbed, none of the networks had to linger long at Cape Kennedy. As is its custom, NBC offered the most comprehensive view of the abortive mission, beginning at 7 A.M. (ET) with reports on The Today Show, CBS and ABC carried regular programs, then switched to the Cape at about 11 A.M., in time to catch the unsuccessful Agena flight and the announcement of the Gemini postponement.

Gleason Without Meadows: When Jackie Gleason reversed his field and decided to return to the air next fall, he hoped to persuade Audrey Meadows to do at least 10 "Honeymooners" sketches on shows with him and Art Carney, who has agreed to make a number of appearances on the program. After rather prolonged negotiations it developed that the Gleason office was unable to come to terms with Miss Meadows. Sheila MacRae may get the job instead.

Caesar with Coca: Another comedy couple from TV's early days, Sid Caesar and Imogene Coca, may get together for a special next season. CBS is considering the show, which has a working title of "Show of Shows

Northern California Edition

Revisited" (harking back to the old Caesar-Coca series, which was a Saturday-night staple for years) and would use material written by Carl Reiner, Mel Brooks, Allan Sherman and Mel Tolkin.

Live from Moscow: The first live colorcast from Moscow is on NBC's agenda for Sunday afternoon, June 26. It will be a one-hour pickup of the Tchaikovsky International Music Competition, relayed to this continent by the Early Bird satellite. There are 19 American musicians entered in the competition, which is held every four years and was won by Van Cliburn in 1958.

Superprogram: Those shows that last three hours or more and consume an entire evening on a network-you could call them superprograms-seem to be here to stay. ABC has announced plans to telecast one next spring. It will be a portrait of Africa, created by the combined forces of ABC's news. entertainment and sports departments. The show, which will run three and a-half hours, has a \$2,000,000 budget. It is, according to network spokesmen, the first of a series of annual superprograms "designed to convey a comprehensive view of the lives, activities and heritage of the peoples of various regions of the world"; future editions might focus on South America and Asia. The superprogram concept originated with NBC, which has used it twice (for programs about civil rights and U.S. foreign policy) and next fall will devote an evening to a study of organized crime in America.

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
GEMINI SPACE FLIGHT



A grand prix auto race, surfing and the Indianapolis '500' time trials are today's events.

The Grand Prix of Monaco, held May 22, was the first of nine grand prix races counting toward the world driving championship. The race calls for 100 laps on a challenging—and often dangerous—1.95-mile circuit that winds, in part, through the narrow streets of the tiny principality.


This was the first test of the larger and more powerful Formula 1 racers, which take advantage of the expansion of engine-size from 1.5 to 3 liters.





With an exploding population, many of whom have migrated from other parts of the country, and little patronage to dispense, California has established no political machines or strong party organizations. Although the state's problems are myriad, the major issue for the Republicans is the administration of incumbent Gov. Edmund G. "Pat" Brown, a Democrat who defeated William Knowland (in 1958) and Richard Nixon (1962) in previous gubernatorial contests.

There are these two THINGS about Sally Field, who plays Gidget on ABC. She's ACTUALLY a lot like Gidget—she's LITTLE and FUNNY and makes these FACES. But she is AWFULLY old. She'll be 20 in NO-VEMBER!

THAT'S not as old as the MOVIE Gidgets—Sandra Dee, Deborah Walley and Cindy Carol. They're in their 20's ALREADY—and MARRIED even! Of course, they WEREN'T that old when they MADE the movies.

Sally Field saw the FIRST Gidget movie six TIMES. Maybe THAT'S why she is like Gidget—preadolescent INFLUENCE or something. Because she certainly is. She even SAYS so— "I feel I am Gidget, and Gidget is me." Even BROOKE BUNDY, one of the 300 OR SO actresses that tried out for the PART thinks so. She says, "I can't imagine anyone else in the role," meaning SALLY.

It was funny how SALLY got the part. She was going to this ACTING class at Columbia Studios in Hollywood last summer. She had always WANTED to be an actress, but her folks told her they didn't want her to be a CHILD actress, so she went to HIGH SCHOOL. (Her folks are both in SHOW BUSINESS. Her MOTHER, Margaret Field, is an actress, and her stepfather, Jock Mahoney, used to be RANGE RIDER and YANCY DER-RINGER and TARZAN even!)

ANYWAY, she was going to this ACTING class after she was graduated from high school in the San Fernando Valley. (She was BORN in Pasadena, and she says, "I lived there a long time—until I was 5 or so.") ANY-WAY, one day Eddie Foy III, who is in the CASTING department at Columbia Studios, came over after class and said to the teacher, "If you run across a petite, bite-size bundle of joy for Gidget, let me know." The teacher told him about SALLY. When he went outside again, he saw this little girl standing in the DARK, all BUNDLED UP. He said, "Are you Sally Field?" And she WAS, and he told her to come and SEE him about this part.

Later she said, "I didn't know what he wanted me for. It could have been 'Dr. Zhivago.'" But Eddie Foy III ran over to the casting department and burst in YELLING, "We've got Gidget!"

But they were still testing GIRLS. and when SALLY showed up for her test, there were all these OTHER girls waiting. Sally says, "They were all gorgeous and had portfolios of pictures of themselves in things they'd done. I'd never done anything. All I had was a wallet full of pictures of my girl friends." ACTUALLY, she done some acting in HIGH had SCHOOL plays. She was Helen Kel-MOTHER in "The Miracle ler's Worker" and played the BETTE DAVIS part in "The Man Who Came to Dinner." But she had never been in front of a MOVIE camera. Anyway, she got the PART, which is what COUNTS.

Everybody liked Sally

When Gidget went on last fall, it was one of the 10 programs the CRITICS liked least. They may have panned the SHOW, but almost everybody seemed to like SALLY. They called her things like "a sparkling personality," "remarkably fresh," "a brisk fledgling," "a pert new personality," "wholesome as a peach," "unaffected and refreshingly honest," "a cute youngster," "neither coy nor cloying," "natural and unspoiled," and "the most talented new comedienne, the most expressive actress and the best actor in television."

But one of the FAN magazines probably said it BEST. They called her "a gear, absolutely fab Gidget."

The people who have been working WITH her on *Gidget* seem to feel the same way. Her CO-star, Don Porter (he plays her FATHER), says, "She's a more disciplined professional than many older and more experienced actresses I've worked with." And the PRODUCERS talk about her "great sense of mimicry," her "natural talent" and how "she has remained so modest despite her quick stardom."

Even her MOTHER speaks highly of her. SHE says, "Sally has grown up a lot in the past year. She knows where she's going. But she has to learn that everybody's not a hero—she's been hurt a few times because she thought that everybody loved her."

Jock Mahoney's opinion

Her STEPfather, Jock Mahoney, says, "Her head is screwed on pretty good. Her feet are about an inch off the ground right now, but it's nothing to worry about."

Sally (she was christened SARAH) lives with her family in Encino, Cal., up on this HILL. She has a younger sister, PRINCESS, who is only 13. She calls Princess her LITTLE sister, but Princess is 5 feet 8 and Sally is just 5 feet 2.

Every Thursday night, the whole family sits down together in the LIVING ROOM to watch *Gidget*. Sally says, "I still haven't gotten over my nervousness watching the show. Some nights I'm not sure I'll even be well enough to stay in the living room."

There is also an OLDER BROTHER —RICK. He goes to the UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA at BERKELEY. "He's neat," says Sally. He is one of the best gymnasts in the UNITED STATES, he's going to be a physicist, and he gets STRAIGHT A's.

You may have read that SALLY got straight A's in school, but she didn't. You may ALSO have seen her picture with PAUL PETERSEN of *The Donna Reed Show* at the Deb Star Ball (SALLY was a Deb Star), but that was just PUBLICITY. She STILL goes with the same boy she has gone with for four or five YEARS. His name is Steve Craig, and he's studying PRE-MED at the University of Southern California. When they date, they go to a SHOW or to DIN-NER or to a FRATERNITY party— "The same thing everybody does," she says. "Nothing goofy."

Otherwise, her friends lately have been the people at the STUDIO. She hasn't seen much of the girls whose pictures she had in her WALLET any more. She says most of them are away at COLLEGE, and BESIDES, when you work from 7 in the morning until 7 at night you don't get much chance to see OTHER people. But, of course, you're a STAR and have a green SPORTS CAR and your own personal BANK account.

Of course, she doesn't ACT like a star and probably doesn't even REAL-IZE she is one. For instance, when she saw Jack Paar in a RESTAU-RANT, she said, "Oh, there's Jack Paar!" He didn't even NOTICE her. Now that Gidget has been canceled, she is doing theater-in-the-ROUND this summer, and in the FALL she will probably do MOVIES.

In OTHER words, whether she ACTS like a star or not, that's what she wants to BE. In fact, she says, "That's what I want more than anything in the world, outside of getting MARRIED and having a FAMILY."

JOHN F. KENNEDY: THE EARLY YEARS

The producers of a TV documentary unearth some rare photographs

A few historians have speculated that the late President John F. Kennedy was the most photographed man in human history. The difficulty facing television documentarists, nonetheless, is to unearth photographs and films that the public hasn't already

seen a hundred times.

NBC confronted the problem eight months ago when it started work on a two-part White Paper called "The Age of Kennedy" (to be telecast this Sunday, May 29, and next Sunday, June 5). Writer-producer- continued

director Al Wasserman sent associate producer Gabriel Bayz to Boston, where Bayz set up headquarters at an old Kennedy family apartment (122 Bowdoin St., near Beacon Hill) and began the arduous task of panning for photographic gold in the well-prospected streams of John F. Kennedy's early manhood.

He placed advertisements in Boston newspapers, a gesture which loosed an incredible flow of telephone calls from housewives, students and politicians offering everything from Brownie stills to old campaign posters—but very little movie film. Bayz's first major frustration occurred when he learned that a commercial film company, hired by Boston Democrats to cover the 1952 Kennedy-Lodge Senate campaign, had destroyed its whole film inventory of that period for lack of storage space.

Bayz and his researchers then started asking questions around Harvard, and were led to a boyhood friend of the late President's who reportedly owned some "home movies" he had taken at the Kennedy home in Palm Beach during the summers of 1937 and 1939. Under NBC's urging, the man rooted about in his attic and finally turned up the film, which Bayz describes as "of superb quality to have been done by an amateur."


When the sources of film footage began to dry up, the researchers turned their energies to digging out old still pictures. They learned the name of a former staff photographer on the old Boston Post, who had served as official photographer for Kennedy's 1946 Congressional campaign—his debut in politics. The photographer recalled having some old picture files in the basement of his home, but said they had suffered severe water damage during a flood several years earlier.

He produced the water-ravaged files, consisting of thousands of negatives. NBC hired a photo restoring expert who labored over them for months, and finally salvaged 400 usable negatives—a cache which Bayz calls "one of the most remarkable collections on Kennedy of that period."


One of those pictures (opposite page) is something of a historical curiosity. It shows Kennedy delivering a Fourth of July (1946) oration at Faneuil Hall in Boston, in the presence of two of that city's most colorful old politicos: John F. Fitzgerald (Kennedy's grandfather, better known as "Honey Fitz"); and James Michael Curley, flamboyant model-hero of the novel "The Last Hurrah." The photo —among the worst damaged—was restored in pieces, and reassembled.

Bayz and his researchers heard about another 1946 photo of Kennedy leading a goat about on a string as part of his initiation into the Knights of Columbus. After many appeals at various Knights of Columbus meetings around Boston, the photo finally was found in a member's home. The animal, it turned out, was the winner in a search for a goat "of exceptional breeding," as befitted the initiation of an Ambassador's son. Kennedy admitted he thought this particular goat was a "superb choice."

NBC ended up with four wardrobesized file cabinets crammed with 20,-000 still pictures. Thus, "The Age of Kennedy" special—as a result of all these painstaking research efforts hopes to construct a view of the late President, on the 49th anniversary of his birth, which might have been lost forever were it not for this enterprising exercise in television journalism.

Is this man an impostor?

The agreeable, mild-mannered Red Buttons who is starring as Henry Phyfe bears little resemblance to the Red of old

t's a sunny Saturday afternoon in that expensive dormitory they call Bel Air. Red Buttons, the aging *enfant terrible* of comedians, paces restlessly through his newly acquired domicile, from kitchen to nursery and back again. His wife, Alicia, has just two days before presented him his first offspring, a daughter, and he picks up the phone every half hour to reassure himself that family and hospital are still at the other end of the line.

At 47 Buttons is surprisingly boyish. There's bounce in his step as he demonstrates the "ho-ho" shuffle he made famous. His graying hair is now redder than ever, but that's show biz. "It was much more frantic in those days," he says of the long-gone *Red Buttons Show*. "Then, I was in complete artistic control. Now, in *The Double Life of Henry Phyfe*, I haven't exercised any authority at all. I'm happy to just go in and do my work."

"Those days," one gathers, must have been Something Else.

"They're still bum-rapping him," complains his friend and agent, Marty Baum. "He got saddled with one of those apocryphal show-biz legends."

The Buttons Legend, essentially, is that "success went to his head." That he temperamentally hired and fired writers by droves. That as a comedian he was in constant communication with what amounted to a house psychiatrist. That he was pushed and pulled from all sides by hangers-on advising him what to do. That he fawned on the opinions of the Incrowd at Lindy's.

People were forever complaining. A CBS executive was quoted as saying: "He wants to be head writer, producer, director, music director, choreographer and everything else." A television writer charged: "He has a Napoleonic complex." A producer sounded off: "His insecurity is absolutely screaming. It's only when he's in the limelight that he feels any real confidence."

Looking back on it, does the old legend hold water? One of Buttons' former producers still finds it painful to dwell upon what he calls "the unpleasant corpse of our relationship." Ben Brady, who more recently produced *The Wild*, *Wild West* and *Rawhide*, recalls: "I knew him at a time when he was a wholesale neurotic. Like most stand-up comics, he had to get a laugh every time he opened his mouth. He was suffering from the insecurity syndrome. It got so bad that he customarily arrived at the studio with his psychiatrist."

One of Buttons' many writers from those days recalls: "We'd hand him a sketch and Red would say: 'Babies, I love it! This is one of the funniest sketches I've ever seen!' The next morning he'd breeze in, all decked out in his camel's-hair polo coat, and yell at us: 'This thing stinks; here are the changes. Let's pitch, babies!' Now, I ask you, how could we be so great at night and stink in the morning? I didn't learn the answer until a year later: Red took our scripts to his psychiatrist at night for consultation!"

Buttons' headshrinker turns out to have been psychologist Andrew Salter, who writes books knocking Freudianism while pitching "conditioned reflex therapy," which views human frustration as Pavlov viewed canine salivation. Salter denies hovering offstage during Buttons' broadcasts but he does admit: "There was a modicum of truth to the charge about the scripts. Red would come to me and say: 'Here's a great sketch. We open at Campbell's Undertaking Parlor with me stealing a corpse.' I'd have to say, 'You must be kidding!' In other words, I'd evaluate a plot nucleus, but no line-for-line checks."

In the 11-year breather between the demise of *The Red Buttons Show* and the debut of *Henry Phyfe*, the fearsome Mr. Hyde evidently **continued**

transmuted himself into lovable Dr. Jekyll, to judge by current testimony from *Phyfe*'s creative echelon.

Producer Nat Perrin: "I find Buttons to be reasonable, agreeable, competent, hard-working, mature."

Creator-supervisor Luther Davis: "I was afraid he might see his role just as background for comedy sketches, but no, he saw it as an actor."

Three *Phyfe* directors approached their new assignment with something this side of optimism. Les Martinson: "I was apprehensive." Charles Rondeau: "I was expecting a lot of trouble." Ted Flicker: "I came to this show in fear." They found this:

A smiling acrophobiac

An acrophobia sufferer who climbed to a ledge 30 feet over the stage floor, bright lights in his face, teetering and tottering, sweating and turning green under his makeup, smiling through it all.

A celebrated clotheshorse, who used to spend five G's at a throw on his wardrobe, now mentioning that his suit doesn't fit but, when nothing is done about it, mildly accepting his lot.

A man who once maintained that "A good comic never lived who wasn't boss of his own operation" now deferring humbly to his directors, possibly offering a suggestion of his own, though never failing to add: "Gee, was I overly positive? Did I press my point too strongly?"

Buttons gives the impression he would like to forget about the old days, but, judging by the way he talks, he finds them hard to erase. He recalls how, with no hoopla and no sponsor, his then unpromising halfhour comedy-variety show first went on the air at 8:30 Tuesday night, Oct. 14, 1952. He opened with an autobiographical monolog: "I grew up on the Lower East Side. It was a pretty tough block. You either grew up to be a judge or you went to the chair." By 9 o'clock the CBS switchboard operators were trying to cope with one of the biggest responses to a single show they'd ever had.

The Red Buttons Show skyrocketed dizzily. Buttons' "ho-ho" theme became a national fad. His catch phrase, "Strange things are happening," was being chanted by half the population. He grinned cockily from covers of magazines. Recalls Buttons: "I was mobbed. I had to wear dark glasses to get across Grand Central Station. I was the Batman of my time.

"My first season I never looked at the ratings. You know when you're hot. You're on fire! You walk in a room and say 'Hello' and people fall on the floor laughing. But when my rating dropped, things started to rough up. I frantically began hunting for writers. If I got half the initiation dues of guys I sent to the Writers Guild, I'd be a rich man." One week he holed himself up in his apartment and ran off kinescopes of every TV show he'd ever done, desperately looking for the clue to salvation. He revamped the format any number of times, but all was futile.

His career turned cold

Then, without hoopla or sponsor, after a three-year run, and just as phenomenally as it all began, Red Buttons found himself a fallen idol, a has-been on Washed-up Alley. "My career turned so cold I had to wear an overcoat in July."

Buttons, native of New York City ("I was born there, lived there all my life, and died there a couple of times"), looks Irish but isn't. He was born Aaron Chwatt, son of a Polish immigrant hat blocker. When asked why he went into show business, he once replied: "I had a need to be loved and applauded and I guess as a kid I was a show-off." He played all the resorts on the Borscht Circuit in the Catskills. He played Minsky's as third, second, and ultimately top banana. ("Do you know what it's like to face a hostile audience with nothing but a turkey bladder and a seltzer bottle?")

In the interim between his two big TV outings, Buttons played some heavy dramatics in movies, most notably as Marlon Brando's tragic buddy in "Sayonara," for which he won an Oscar. "I was Joe Kelly. He was fighting for his life and I know what that means," And there was the memorable sequence in "The Longest Day," with Buttons hanging from the Normandy church steeple in his parachute harness. But his career as a comedian has mostly been a thing of smash hits and turkeys, nadirs and comebacks. As far as Buttons is concerned, "Every comedian should have a medal just for showing up."

So today the question nags: What became of that feisty hellion, the writers' and producers' nemesis of old? Did he change, mellow, mature, get tranquilized, whip himself up a new image, wear himself out, or what?

Buttons' answer is: "I don't run scared any more." And how is he making out with his writers these days? "Writers? I don't even know who they are."

There are other hypotheses. Producer Brady, exponent of the devil theory, contends: "He can be the charmer of all times, but I personally think he's still the same guy."

Buttons' admirers have proposed a gamut of possibilities:

Flicker: "Before, the system beat Red. Now, Red beats the system."

Salter: "It isn't that Red has mellowed. Television has mellowed."

Martinson: "I don't believe this, but some people say, 'Just wait till *Phyfe*'s a hit and you'll see the same Red of old.'"

Now we'll never know. Phyfe's getting axed. DISMAL

SHELLEY WINTERS has been signed for a Flipper role. She'll play somebody's Aunt Martha . . "It's a Dog's World" kicks off NBC's new hour-long group of specials, The Incredible World of Animals, this fall. Other shows star sea creatures, cats, horses and -one for the birds.

TEN YEARS AGO THIS WEEK: Playhouse of Stars put on a rerun of JAMES DEAN in "The Unlighted Road"... Producers' Showcase did a 90-minute version of "Bloomer Girl," the Broadway musical hit. 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


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
