

Miss DAVIS will also show up in a segment of Gunsmoke next year ... "The Law and the Prophets," a special produced by NBC's Project 20, will be seen in January '67.

"Class of '67," an NBC special set for Sept. 10, will star NANCY SINATRA and DON ADAMS . . . BILLY DeWOLFE will play a theatrical agent in ABC's new That Girl . . . The third edition of "The Wonderful World of Burlesque" should be on NBC in September or October.

GEORGE VICAS, NBC News producer in Europe, is working on a special about international air safety... That "Downtown" girl, PETULA CLARK, appears on CBS's Continental Showcase June 25. The show replaces GLEASON for the summer this Saturday... "The Wonderful World of Wheels," a CBS special set for Sept. 8, will have FABIAN and JAMES DRURY in cameo appearances.

TED WILLIAMS shows what he can do with rod and reel on Sports-man's Holiday, an NBC series starting June 19 . . . Britishers ANTHONY NEWLEY and SHIRLEY BASSEY appear on ANDY WILLIAMS' show next year. NEWLEY does the season's opener and Miss BASSEY the Christmas show.

LEE MERIWETHER, the ex-Miss America who's a regular on ABC's upcoming Time Tunnel, will be Catwoman in the Dynamic Duo's new movie . . . THE SUPREMES, SID CAESAR and SHELLEY BERMAN are a few of the guests lined up for The Hollywood Palace's '66-67 season . . "The Girl Nobody Knew," a new two-hour movie made especially for TV, has JILL ST. JOHN and ANTHONY FRANCIOSA as its stars. It will be seen on NBC.

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as we see it

We are indebted to Richard K. Doan of the New York Herald Tribune for reporting exactly how serious the decline has been in prime-time network public service shows.

There was a surge in documentaries and news specials following former Chairman Newton Minow's celebrated "vast wasteland" speech in May 1961. The networks promptly tooled up, and by the season of 1962-63, nighttime public service was In. ■ That was when prime-time programs included Bell and Howell's Close-Up! most Tuesday nights and Howard K. Smith's News and Comment every Sunday night on ABC. Over at CBS there was Evewitness Friday nights and CBS Reports most Wednesday nights. On NBC there was David Brinkley's Journal on Monday nights, Chet Huntley Reporting on Tuesday nights. And, of course, other news and public affairs specials pre-empting regular programs at night.

■ This season the only regularly scheduled prime-time public service shows on the networks have been CBS Reports Tuesday nights and ABC Scope Saturday nights. (Many ABC stations show Scope at 7 P.M.—before prime time. NBC alternates news specials with Bell Telephone Hour at 6:30 Sunday nights—not quite prime

time.)

Of course all networks pre-empt programming for news specials. But Doan's figures show that through April in the 1962-63 season ABC ran 32 hours of prime-time public service compared with 30 hours this season (without Scope it would be 15 hours); CBS ran about 54 hours compared with 36½ hours this season; and NBC ran about 70 hours in 1962-63 compared with 40 hours this season (without the 6:30 Sunday specials, 25).

There's not much improvement in sight for next season.

DO YOU HAVE ESP?

Here's a chance

to find out before a documentary is telecast on this controversial subject

Last year Susan Garfield, a young and pretty writer-director at ABC, after a little research, found that no network had done a special on the controversial and intriguing matter of extrasensory perception (ESP) and convinced her boss, producer Stephen Fleischman, to go for the idea. This despite the fact that the subject has been regarded with skepticism in many lay and scientific circles.

They filmed for eight weeks in the Netherlands, England, Germany, Czechoslovakia and the United States, interviewing such psychics as Gerard Croiset of the Netherlands and Douglas Johnson of Great Britain; Dr. Gardner Murphy, psychologist and

director of research at the Menninger Foundation, Topeka, Kan.; and Dr. J.B. Rhine, parapsychologist.

The results of these travels will be on view this Thursday (June 16), in "The Baffling World of ESP," a show which avoids final conclusions about the validity of psychic phenomena but reports on many of the weirdbut-true findings in this field.

TV Guide asked Miss Garfield to list some of those findings for us (opposite page), and we're taking the opportunity to let you test your own powers of ESP. This experiment might indicate that you are one of those remarkable people whose minds transcend their customary bounds.


DIRECTIONS:

- 1. There are 20 sentences on the opposite page which contain fascinating facts about extrasensory perception.
- 2. TO TEST YOUR ESP, do the following:
 - a. Decide whether the first letter of each of the 20 sentences is an O, T, M, S or E.
 - b. This test has been devised so that the beginning letters are equally divided among the five choices; there are four sentences beginning with an O, four sentences beginning with a T, and so on.
 - c. See if you can "guess" the first letters of each sentence. After you have written down on a piece of paper what you think the order of letters to be, uncover the next page and check how many times you were correct.

TO RATE YOUR ESP, use the following guide:

Four correct letters are expected by pure chance, or simple guesswork. Scores significantly higher may show ESP ability.

- 1. Many scientists believe certain people have a capacity to "know" information without having used sight, smell, touch, taste or hearing.
- 2. Telepathy, or man-to-man communication, can operate between two minds thousands of miles apart.
- 3. Extrasensory perception, ESP, takes different forms: telepathy, clairvoyance (perceiving objects or events without the use of the five senses) and precognition (telling the future).
- 4. Scientists in Germany claim they have found a boy who can shatter china with a glance.
- 5. McGill University researchers, experimenting with a Hungarian "healer," have proof of his positive healing effect on wounded mice, resulting from his simply holding his hands over their cages.
- 6. Through some mysterious process, this "healer" can also speed up the growth of barley plants.
- 7. Top Russian scientist Leonid Vasilyev believes the discovery of that unknown energy of man that explains ESP will be equal in importance to the discovery of nuclear energy.
- 8. Occasionally dreams can somehow tap the future; one well-documented case is on file in Germany, where an actress dreamed episodes in a film she played in four years later.
- 9. Milan Ryzl, a Czechoslovakian scientist, has developed a technique using hypnosis to train subjects to have real psychic ability.
- 10. One woman, during the course of training, has shown ability to identify objects hidden in boxes.
- 11. Other Czechoslovakian scientists conduct experiments with a father and daughter who can—through sheer mind power—reverse the direction of a revolving propeller.
- 12. Sensitivity to color, called "finger reading," has been demonstrated by certain Russian women who can discern colors while blindfolded.
- 13. Each week 300 patients flock to the clinic of Gerard Croiset, the Dutchpsychic, because of their belief in his "healing" powers.
- 14. Sigmund Freud was deeply interested in ESP. He wrote at the end of his life that if he had it to live over again, he would devote himself to the study of psychic phenomena.
- 15. Oxford University biologist Sir Alister Hardy believes that telepathy plays an important role in the process of evolution.
- 16. English author and psychic Rosalind Heywood not only believes in ghosts but claims to have met a number of them.
- 17. The power of a person's belief in the reality of ESP affects his ability to show evidence of it.
- 18. Einstein and other prominent physicists have recognized the importance of studying psychic phenomena.
- 19. Medium Douglas Johnson believes that his ability to produce information unknown to him stems from the spirit world.
- 20. Scientists believe ESP may be latent in all of us.

gt. Joe Friday fixed his steely gaze on the boyish hotel clerk and held up a small photograph. "Do you recognize this man?" asked Friday in no-nonsense tones familiar to old-time Dragnet fans. The hotel clerk started to reply, stam-

mered, tried to correct himself, then lapsed into embarrassed silence.

"Cut," snapped Jack Webb, transforming himself suddenly from Joe Friday, the flinty cop, to Jack Webb. the harassed, high-pressure director. "Boy, you're too tensed up," he told the clerk. "You gotta relax. Just deliver the line natural. If you make a mistake, keep on going. Now, let's try it again."

Two members of the crew were fussing over the lights. "O.K., boys," said Webb. "We gotta move. Let's go." Straightening his gray tie, Webb took up his position again as Joe Friday. The cameras were rolling. "Do

you recognize this man? . . . "

A decade or so ago Joe Friday was a TV fixture. Then he and his creator went into limbo. Now both Webb and Friday are back on the scene again. Their new project, tentatively called "Dragnet 1966," represents not only a comeback for Joe Friday but also an interesting experiment for Universal studios, where the new show is being made. It's not exactly a TV show; yet, some will argue, not quite a motion picture either. It is, in fact, something in between-a controversial hybrid that, along with several similar ventures, could have a sharp impact on the Nation's viewing habits.

"Dragnet 1966" is a low-budget twohour feature produced expressly for the home screen. It was financed jointly by a movie studio, Universal, and a network. NBC-an alliance that would have been considered most unlikely in former years. Some optimists believe that two-hour "TV movies" like "Dragnet 1966" will soon dominate TV prime time and will vastly upgrade the level of programming. Some pessimists argue that the "TV movies" will prove a big disappointment, that they will pre-empt the time that would normally be available to "true motion pictures" and eventually could destroy the TV market for highquality, big-budget movies.

"Dragnet 1966" and similar films being made at Universal and other studios represent a bold attempt to fill a vast void on TV. The void was created by the sharply increased time allotted to movies on TV. The feature movie has suddenly emerged as perhaps the dominant entertainment genre on television. And the viewers keep asking for more.

The trouble is there aren't many more around. Nearly all of the old movies have been shown and reshown so many times that some viewers know the lines better than the actors. And Hollywood isn't turning out new movies at anywhere near a fast enough pace to keep up with the TV demand. The tremendous surplus of demand over supply has had its predictable impact: The cost of movies available to TV has soared. CBS recently paid a reported \$1,000,000 for the right to telecast Warner Brothers' "The Music Man," while ABC ponied up an almost unbelievable \$2,000,000 for TV rights to "The Bridge on the River Kwai."

The networks' solution to this problem seemed logical enough. Since the movie studios can't turn out enough pictures, why shouldn't the networks subsidize increased production? The networks could put up, say, half the cost of a low-budget picture that would be exhibited first on TV and then could be peddled to movie theaters. The networks would thereby obtain more movies at a lower cost; and the studios would gain a rich partner who would help bear some of the risks. This latter consideration is important to the studios, for a majority of their movies in the past few years reportedly have failed to recoup their costs in theatrical release.

In 1964 Universal came out with its first "TV movies" on a trial basis. The results were not impressive. A picture called "The Killers" was considered too violent for TV, and the networks turned it down. Another effort, "The Plainsman," apparently ended up costing substantially more than its backers had anticipated (an estimated \$1,200,000); and it, too, ended up in the movie theaters, not on TV. Two other "TV movies." continued

"The Hanged Man" and "See How They Run," were shown on TV as planned, but got mixed reviews.

Undaunted, Universal this year moved into production with a full slate of "TV movies," "Dragnet 1966" being the first. The studio has deals to produce at least a dozen such films for all three networks. The other major studios are signed to make a couple of dozen more. Michael Dann, a CBS vice president, believes that by next year the networks will be helping subsidize between 50 and 75 "TV movies" annually.

From the viewer's standpoint, of course, the big question is: Will they be any good? It's far too early to know the answer, but some prominent producers are skeptical. "These pictures won't be movies, they'll just be two-hour TV shows; that's quite a different cup of tea," says Ray Stark, a prolific Broadway and Hollywood producer.

One man's fear

Martin Ransohoff, the aggressive young chairman of Filmways and producer of such pictures as "The Americanization of Emily" and "The Sandpiper," notes that Hollywood has been having enough problems trying to keep up the quality of its big-budget pictures. He wonders, therefore, how the studios plan to find the writers and directors for the low-budget TV movies. "If we see a lot of Grade-B potboilers suddenly appearing as movies on TV, the audiences will drift away and the ratings will collapse," he warns. "Suddenly there won't be a TV market even for quality motion pictures."

The people at Universal, Jack Webb included, believe that it's unfair to prejudge their efforts and insist that they can turn out "class" pictures that will satisfy the movie buff. They may

prove to be right. But they will clearly have to overcome some significant handicaps, most of them imposed by their relatively low budgets. Most of the new TV movies will be made for \$600,000 or less. That is a lot of money but, by Hollywood standards, it's peanuts. In the inflation-ridden movie business, a picture that costs \$2,000,000 or \$3,000,000 is considered relatively cheap, while many pictures soar past \$10,000,000.

Budget limitations

These budget limitations will mean the following:

(1) The new TV movies will not be able to feature the "big name" stars employed in most of the features now seen on TV. Most top stars are demanding between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000 a picture—sums equivalent to the full budget of the TV movies. Hence the only star of "Dragnet 1966" is the venerable Jack Webb, while another Universal TV movie called "Doomsday Flight" stars Van Johnson, an actor who has long-since plummeted from the top echelons of stardom.

(2) The new TV movies will not have the action or the "outdoorsy" look of many big-budget features. Location shooting is expensive; feature-film directors who are shooting on location are often stalled for days by bad weather—delays that cannot be afforded by the director of a TV movie who operates on a 20-day shooting schedule. Most of the TV movies will be shot inside studio soundstages with maybe a day or so on the studio back lot.

(3) However skilled the actors and directors, the new TV movies probably will rarely succeed in capturing the sort of dramatic intensity evident in the best feature films. In a motion picture a director may rehearse a five-minute dramatic scene for a full morning and in the afternoon go through 10 takes before he finally

gets the exact impact he desires. But, while the motion picture director may be satisfied to cover one page of script a day, a director of a TV movie is geared to shoot 10 to 15 pages a day.

The contrast between the TV approach and the movie approach is vividly apparent to anyone who wanders through the big Hollywood studios. At Universal recently we spent a morning watching that meticulous craftsman. Alfred Hitchcock, laving the groundwork for a key dramatic scene for his newest thriller, "Torn Curtain," Hitchcock was trying to get a complex montage shot in which the cameras, while capturing the color and movement of the surrounding crowd, shown in fuzzy outline, focused on the emotional reaction of the heroine. Julie Andrews. Hitchcock first conferred at length over the lighting, then discussed the montage effect with his cameraman, then arranged and rearranged his actors. Finally he went ahead and shot the same scene six times from various angles.

The 'Dragnet' pace

Not much later we watched Jack Webb and his talented crew at work on "Dragnet 1966," Webb had 21 days and \$600,000 to shoot a 191-page script, and he was wasting no time. There were no Hitchcockian pauses to study lighting, color or acting technique. The actors moved briskly from scene to scene. The pace was so brisk, in fact, that the actors in many scenes had to read from prompters placed bevond camera range—apparently there was no time to study lines for each scene. Often, when an actor erred in the middle of a take, Webb would stop the cameras, advise the actor what he did wrong and then, rather than start the scene anew, pick up the action from the exact point where the actor goofed. Most feature directors would look askance at this approach.

Webb makes no apologies for the way he's shooting his picture, nor does he feel he's making excessive compromises for the sake of speed and economy. In his view, directors of TV movies can turn out a very effective product providing they pick their subject matter carefully. A project like "Dragnet 1966," he notes, is conducive to the TV-movie treatment: Its success depends on realism and understatement, not histrionics. It does not require complex outdoor location shooting. Its dramatic impact does not depend on elaborate camera work or imaginatively choreographed crowd scenes. In short, it is a "small" picture than can be shot on a "small" budget.


Should TV look to the movies?

The big obstacle facing the TV movies, perhaps, is that the Hollywood studios have never been very successful in turning out "small" pictures. Hollywood has always excelled in the handsomely mounted productions, pictures with the glamorous, expensive look. Thus there is perhaps due cause for skepticism as to whether Hollywood can change its stripes in the newly dawned era of the TV movie.

Even if Hollywood can succeed in filling the movie void, there is another more profound question that could well be asked. Is it right for TV to look to the movie business to meet its programming needs? Shouldn't television rededicate itself to the task of creating its own special material for its own special medium? A decade ago, some may remember, Playhouse 90 presented a powerful live drama called "Requiem for a Heavyweight." The original show cost about \$130,000 to stage. Ten years later the same network, CBS, paid an estimated \$300,000 to televise the movie version of the same show. Wouldn't that money have been better spent developing a new "Requiem"?

Second Thoughts

Looking back over the 1965-1966 season, and grading the shows at the time we reviewed them, we would have given grades as follows:

A—Secret Agent, The Dean Martin Show, I Spy, Get Smart and The Avengers.

B—Trials of O'Brien, The Long Hot Summer, Batman, Hogan's Heroes, F Troop, Run for Your Life, The Baron and Court-Martial.

C—The Big Valley, Lost in Space, Mr. Roberts, I Dream of Jeannie and The Loner.

D—The Sammy Davis Jr. Show, The Steve Lawrence Show, Blue Light, The Legend of Jesse James, The Smothers Brothers Show, The Wackiest Ship in the Army, The Wild, Wild West and Honey West.

E—My Mother, the Car, Please Don't Eat the Daisies, Green Acres and Mona McCluskey.

Today, re-reviewing, we would downgrade Batman. It would, we believe, wear better as an hour show each week rather than the doublebarreled half hour. We would also upgrade Run for Your Life, which wore well, and Trials of O'Brien, which in its last shows was truly magnificent. After all, with no more Defenders, For the People, etc., O'Brien was practically alone in its field—and for CBS to cancel it was as idiotic in one way as was, in another way, the cancellation of Secret Agent—easily the best, best-acted and most believable of a dozen or more programs in its field. Both departures are not only lamentable, they show network unthinking which is close to demented.

The new series divided themselves, generally, into just three categorieswhich is quite a lot of criticism right there. Anyway, these were the agent shows, with their various degrees of Bond-spoofing; the fun-war shows, with their various degrees of bombgoofing; and the situation comedies, with their various degrees of gimmickry. Among the spoofs Get Smart and The Avengers were the best. Honey West and The Wild, Wild West the worst, with I Spy in the middle as a spoof, but close to the top as a straight. Among the fun wars, Hogan's Heroes was the best, The Wackiest Ship the worst, and Mr. Roberts and F Troop in the middle—with Mr. Roberts getting more heroic as the season progressed, and F Troop wackier.

Finally, among the situation comedies, there were two relatively good gimmick shows, I Dream of Jeannie and Lost in Space, and two awful ones. The Smothers Brothers Show and My Mother, the Car. The very idea of the latter inspired such fury that it was dangerous to watch with strangers. As for the other situation comedies, Green Acres, Mona McCluskey and Please Don't Eat the Daisies, we didn't go back and look at them again. We promised we would. We tried. We walked up to the set, we even turned it on-and after that, honestly, Judge, we don't remember a thing.

Giant Step: As Frank McGee put it to breakfast-time viewers on Thursday morning: "Did you ever imagine that you would be sitting before your TV set sipping a cup of coffee, getting geared for the day, and have the diversion of looking at live television from the moon?"

Indeed, it was an experience. Throughout the morning, from 2:53 [ET], 36 minutes after it landed on the moon's Sea of Storms, until 7:25 when the earth's rotation interrupted, Surveyor 1 sent its historic telecast earthward to the Jet Propulsion Laboratory's Goldstone station in the Mojave Desert, thence the telecast was relayed to the nation's three major networks.

The Surveyor's first picture was a rather fuzzy image of one of its spidery foot-pads resting on the moon's surface. This was to give the scientists commanding the spacecraft from the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Cal., immediate knowledge of the nature of the surface and condition of the craft. The fuzziness was due to the 200-line-a-second scanning, the best that could be beamed from the lowpowered antenna being used initially. Later a more powerful antenna was cut in, capable of sending a more refined 600-line-a-second impression.

For the next five hours, by means of a mirror device (the camera pointed at a mirror, which turned to various angles at the scientists' command), the camera scanned the surface from close-up to the horizon. The

surface appeared hard and pebbly, confirming previous ranger and Luna 9 data that the crust might be suitable for landing and walking about.

Aside from its value to science at large, the information from the nation's first telecast from the moon (Russia's from Luna 9 lasted 48 hours) was of immense importance to the Apollo man-on-the-moon program. Most immediately, the pictures demonstrated that the surface of the Sea of Storms, where the Apollo astronauts plan to land two or three years hence, may be hard enough to withstand the descent of a space vehicle the size of LEM, the Apollo landing module whose weight is now estimated at 20,000 pounds. Surveyor 1, which barely disturbed the moon's crust, is 620 pounds.

Proposal: Lawrence H. Rogers II, president of the Taft Broadcasting Company, has come up with the unusual suggestion that commercial broadcasters pay a tax to support some sort of network to satisfy "minority" cultural and educational needs, and thus free themselves to cater more fully to the mass audience.

In a speech before the Alabama Association of Broadcasters, Rogers said the industry must "recognize the simple truth that providing for the cultural uplift and in-depth education of the American people is not properly the principal function of mass communication."

In return for the financial support, Mr. Rogers felt there should be some quid pro quo—perhaps a relaxing of some Federal Communications Commission regulations covering commercialism, multiple ownership and balanced programming.—Henry Harding

World War II, an ancient dimension of armed hostilities became widespread in the underdeveloped nations of the world—querrilla warfare.

To examine the nature of "unconventional warfare," producer-narrator Ted Yates visited Guatemala, where rebels have been trying to overthrow the government for more than two years. Films show a guerrilla encampment in the Sierra Minas mountains; rebel forces trying to win over villagers; and government efforts to end guerrilla activity. In an interview, rebel leader Luis Turcios tells why his men are fighting.

During Yates' visit, Guatemala held its first free election in seven years. Cameras view the campaign and the winner, moderate Julio César Méndez Montenegro, who toppled the handpicked candidate of the ruling military junta.

The program also explores the situation in two other Latin-American coun-

tries: Peru, where government forces have successfully contained the rebels, and Colombia, where the government is still trying to subdue the guerrillas.





He's still selling vacuum cleaners

Alan Hale is in business to please the customers a job he performs with extraordinary zest

BY DWIGHT WHITNEY

The whole thing is so grindingly nonsensical that it's hard to believe even on the set of Gilligan's Island. The actors, dressed to the teeth (doesn't everyone on a desert island?), sit on a prop log watching a funny fat native king, who is really the veteran comedian Stanley Adams, mumbling funny

incantations over Bob Denver. Denver, the star of the piece, sports a blond wig, clamshell necklace, bright orange skirt and flower hat. Huge fans rustle the frangipani as the greens man, stonily oblivious, waters down the fake palm trees with a hose.

Ack-shun! "Ho-hoo- continued

wappo — pooh. Ho — hoo — noonah pooh. Ho-hoo-ninney-pooh!" chants the funny king. Jim Backus, powder-blue dinner jacket, lets out a Magoolike bark of amusement. Natalie Schafer, in green ostrich boa and gold-beaded bronze dinner pajamas, and the glamorous Tina Louise, skirt cleft up to here, laugh hoarsely. The young couple, Dawn Wells and Russell Johnson, snicker. Over all booms the mighty explosive laughter of "The Skipper," Alan Hale, the well-known second-generation Hollywood actor whose enjoyment of life spills out as naturally as a fat man's stomach over his belt buckle.

"Ugh! Not makem goddesses like they used to," shouts Adams, leaning heavily on the punch line. Denver col-

lapses.

"Cut!" yells director Gary Nelson, who used to do this sort of thing on The Baileys of Balboa. "Print! Back in

one hour, everybody."

Denver giggles inanely, adjusts the blond wig. Backus, whose sensibilities are assuaged somewhat by his bankroll, retires glumly to his dressing room where he will drown his sorrows in a ham sandwich. "Well," says Natalie Schafer breathily. "I don't know why they keep saying how bad we are—even if we are."

No such thoughts cross Hale's mind.

TAKE ME TO YOUR RONSON.



IT DESERVES THE CLEANEST BURNING BUTANE GAS YOU CAN BUY. At 45, he may be the most unflappable man in television. He has every reason to be bugged-if he were the type. His father, the late Alan Hale Sr., known in his later years primarily as a heavy, dated back in movies to 1911 and the old Lubin company. By 1914 he was a leading man at Biograph. (where D.W. Griffith made his early reputation), from whence he graduated to Hollywood and a long procession of parts ranging from "A Doll's House" with Nazimova to Little John in "Robin Hood" (both silent and talking versions). His mother, Greta Ahrbin, was the Shirley Temple of Chicago in 1906, later a star of Biograph under the name of Gretchen Hartman, and still later a vamp rechristened Sonia Markova and palmed off as a sultry Russian import.

For Hale Senior, pictures were everything. For his son—all 6-feet-3 and 240 pounds of him—they are a million laughs; also a great way to make a living. He never was intimidated by his father—friend of Valentino, John Ford, William Wellman—his father's reputation, nor by the fact that he greatly resembles him. C.B. de Mille once said of him, "Buddy has a greater potential than his father"; but more often it was, "Yeah, kid, you can act, but your father—he was great." Of course, says Hale, "I never met a man who didn't like Dad."

Buddy got into pictures for an eminently sensible reason—he needed a new bicycle. His father got him a part in a Wellman picture called "Wild Boys of the Road" circa 1933 (he was 13). The "part" called for him to jump on and off freight cars, and Wellman decided that it was safer for his old friend's son to sit behind the camera. For not appearing in his first movie, Buddy received \$6.50 a day.

It was seven years before the big question—"Mother, how can I make some money fast?"—came up again. Two days later he was at work in "I Wanted Wings," again for Wellman. He came home and told his father, "Gee, Dad, I don't understand why you say you get tired all the time."

But then, life had always been a romp. The Hales moved to Hollywood in the days when boarding houses hung out signs saying NO DOGS OR ACTORS. The only thing that bothered them about that was the billing. They lived across the street from the Garden of Allah, then the home of the senior Hale's friend, Nazimova. later the exotic hostelry made famous by F. Scott Fitzgerald and his cronies. The Hale house was also directly in back of what is now Schwab's drugstore, another Hollywood landmark. but was then Madame Gordon's Elementary School for Girls.

Buddy was big, ham-handed, gregarious and outgoing, the neighborhood cutup who fell out of trees, tunneled up the backyard, pestered his two sisters, gleefully pilfered his neighbor's oranges and tested all the

cookies in the area. His mother remembers him fondly as "Hollywood's first PR man." He (and a neighborhood pal) went to Madame Gordon's, temporarily rendering that prim institution coeducational, later to a popular Hollywood military school called Black Foxe. When acting finally claimed him from the bosom of his "idyllic" childhood, he celebrated by getting homesick on location.

But the ups-and-downs of the acting game bothered him not at all. He has made countless movies, yet it is hard to recall the name of any one of them. He has starred in two previous series whose titles, *Casey Jones* and *Biff Baker U.S.A.*, even TV buffs would have difficulty remembering.

In the late Forties things got slow and he took to selling vacuum cleaners, a project he attacked with such gusto that it still takes all his selfcontrol not to try to sell you one. He and his partner would continued

descend on unwary housewives, get a friendly-but-insistent foot in the door and take over. Hale would put on an act for them, making dirt jump out of mattresses and employing every hoary old burlesque device short of hitting himself with a pig bladder. Once he knocked on a door and "sold" so effectively that the whole affair ended up as a party in his honor, complete with ice cream, cake, dinner, dancing and drinks. He sold two vacuum cleaners. He even sold one to a lady with only linoleum on her floors.

Looking for a Mutt

"It's like feeling out an audience," he says. "You gotta make 'em feel it's their machine from the moment you walk in."

At the time he tested for Gilligan's he was in St. George, Utah, laughing it up in a Western, one of a decreasing number of jobs he was getting at the time. He flew in on a Sunday, tested, and flew back. Producer Sherwood Schwartz remembers, "I was looking for a Mutt to Denver's Jeff. Bob is so sympathetic that anyone who has to yell at him all the time automatically becomes unsympathetic. I deliberately chose a scene where the Skipper really had to blast him. Everybody else I tested turned out dark and mean. But Alan was lovable."

Hale had little faith in Schwartz's effusions. "He was at my house on a Friday," recalls an old pal, actorcartoonist Renny (Dixie Dugan) Mc-Evoy. "He was giving up acting and going into real estate. 'Got a wife and kids to raise,' he said. Then boom! The phone rang. Gilligan's was on for 26 weeks."

Outside the stage door sits a cage containing three ducks in readiness for Gilligan's magician sequence. Buddy shoots them a big, warm, friendly, outgoing gregarious smile. Next to the ducks is an 8 x 8 portable dressing room built Southern-plantation style with a sign, "The Skipper's Dinghy." "I don't so much enter it," ho-ho's Hale. "I put it on."

He talks of his first wife, Bettina, his childhood sweetheart and mother of his four children from whom he was divorced: of his second wife, Naomi Ingram, once a singer, a small woman he calls "Trinket," and of their life together in a house only three blocks away from the old house back of Schwab's drugstore; of his mother, "old Public Energy Number One." in her late 60's; of his golf game (10 handicap) and how he gave up his father's membership in the Lakeside Country Club to join the Hollywood Hackers, a showbiz group that plays anywhere fancy dictates.

Then, of course, of Dad, the compleat actor and inventor, who never became a millionaire from any of his inventions—a sliding theater seat, a greaseless potato chip, a self-mowing lawn. "I think he also invented a concrete tire," says Buddy affectionately. "Of, course, it would only work on rubber roads. . . ."

A lot of horseradish?

Next to the dressing room a 1961 Cadillac, newly polished; inside, a folding bar, golf clubs, a photograph of a young girl smiling, inscribed, "Dear Dad, I hope you like my picture, Love, Lana," a pair of behemoth pale blue underdrawers, the phone number of his banjo teacher and a recipe for Boiled Beef Horseradish Sauce tacked on the wall.


Outside, there is another scene to be shot. Just a lot of horseradish? "Not really," says Buddy affably. "Just completer nonsense than in Dad's day. I mean, you're in their living room, you better please 'em or forget it."

Like selling vacuum cleaners? "The whole point!" roars Hale. "I'm still selling them!" More laughter.





BUT THE BUCK

ssuming that no promoter goes South with part of the loot, touring members of the Professional Golfers' Association will haul in some \$4,000,000 in prize money this year. It will represent an increase of more than 100 percent over what they earned five years ago. And, if you wish to date yourself by going back a decade, you will find today's figure 400 percent higher than that of 1956.

Since one can play for this sort of cabbage at little cost to himself, it is the carefully reasoned recommendation of Arnold Palmer that fathers of America raise their sons to be not

President, but pro golfers.

The boom in tour earnings is ascribed largely to two factors: (a) increased spectator interest in golf, thanks to television, and (b) the invasion of golf by industry, which is participating directly in the sponsor-

ship of events.

This weekend, June 11 and 12, over NBC, the Nation will see an example of industry's march into the game when it looks at the Buick Open, coming from the Warwick Hills Golf Club near Flint, Mich. Buick will be in its ninth year of sponsoring this event, whose kitty now has inflated to \$100,000, plus such other largess as use of a new car each year for five years for the winner, outright gift of a compact car to the winner's wife (or lady of his choice), and use of a new car for a year for each of the five runners-up.

As back-to-back winner of the

tournament, Tony Lema will be up to his hips in Buicks until at least 1975.

Nor is this the only firm to exploit golf as good-will and advertising strokes. You find such other monied events along the tour as the Carling (beer and ale) World Championship, the Lucky (Lager) International, the Thunderbird (automobile) Classic, and the American Golf Classic, a promotion of Firestone Rubber, Chrysler helps underwrite the Bob Hope Desert Classic, just as Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing backs the Bing Crosby Pro-Am. The Greensboro (N.C.) Open is a ward of Allied Chemical, and even the fruit growers of Florida have entered the act, sponsoring the annual Citrus Open.

As for hotels, whose business is renting rooms, they take the position that nothing can attract attention the way a golf tournament can, particularly one seen on TV. The Sahara in Las Vegas, for instance, posts \$111,-111 each year for the Sahara Invitational; while its neighbor, the Desert Inn, puts up \$100,000 for the Tournament of Champions. And in Miami, the Doral Hotel contributes \$70,000 for the Doral Open.

The upshot of the push into golf by commercial enterprises has been that small cities bidding for a place on the PGA tour have been brushed aside for lack of big-time cash. The Junior Chamber of Commerce, say, of Kokomo is scarcely able to compete with General Motors. And, in golf, money talks.

IS GETTING BIGGER

G. H. Rideout, vice president in charge of public relations for Buick, points out that his company sponsors a tournament chiefly for three reasons.

"First," he says, "we do it for community relations. How else could people in our area see major-league golf? We offer free parking and charge but \$1 admission a day, compared to prices ranging from \$4 to \$8 a day in other places. This makes friends for our firm with people in our surrounding territory.

"Second, by staging a tournament seen on television, we get full identification, rather than the part-identification you get by sponsoring on TV someone else's tournament. And third, the event gets the name of our product into newspapers all over the country. It also comes at a time of year when the product needs publicity. By June, the model is nine months old and the new one is almost ready to roll."

Taking note of Buick's success in golf, Shell Oil decided it wouldn't be left behind the door when the publicity was passed out. It introduced Shell's Wonderful World of Golf in 1961. Shell doesn't exactly sponsor a tournament, but could put on a whopper for the \$2,000,000 it spends annually on its weekly series. It books matches in exotic places about the world between an American golfer and one native to the particular land where the event is filmed. Also tossed in is local color, which makes the

show a sort of golf travelog.

"A survey we have taken reveals that 30 percent of our viewers are nongolfers," says Gordon Biggar, vice president in charge of public relations for Shell. "It also tells us that 99 percent of our viewers like the show—and that 4 percent of those polled asked for credit cards. We have found this the best prestige event we have ever sponsored."

Naturally, pro golfers are elated with the entrance into the game of industrial giants, and there is currently a waiting list of companies wishing PGA dates. About all available right now are spots in November and December, considered poor months for sponsorship. By that time, the good golfers have fattened themselves on the pickings and have retired for the year, resting up for the new tour beginning each January.

It is believed by many that if industry continues to take over tournament dates, two circuits eventually will be formed. One will embrace the big-money tour, attracting the top pros, and the other will comprise the Kokomo Opens, featuring the lesser players competing for smaller purses.

"A \$20,000 pot once was considered a respectable purse," says a PGA official. "Today, first prize amounts to that much in some places. Just a handful of sponsors are able to get back their money from gate receipts. Most tournaments need industry's capital if they want to put up big stakes."

ON THE NIGHT OF THE BIG SHRINK..

It will be 23-inch skiddoo

Dec. 31, 1966 will be a very special. night for television viewers. It's New Year's Eve, of course—Guy Lombardo, Times Square and all that. But more important—it's the Night of the Big Shrink.

As the clock strikes Midnight, 23-inch television sets all over the Nation will become 22-inch sets, 21-inchers will quietly wizen to 20-inches and 19-inch portables will pucker to a perfect 18. Color sets will emaciate even more emphatically. Your giantscreen 25 will wither to a 23, and the 21-inch color set will turn into a 19-inch pumpkin at the stroke of 12.

Waving the magic wand will be Uncle Sam. That lovable old gent has decided to shrink your television set for your own good. And beginning on Jan. 1, 1967 all sets offered for sale to the American public will be guaranteed pre-shrunk.

But even if you wait up till Midnight to witness this video voodoo, you won't actually see your TV screen shrivel. It will change in name only. Behind this picture-tube prestidigitation is a little-publicized ruling by the Federal Trade Commission, the Government agency responsible for protecting the public from misleading advertising and sales claims. After more than 10 years of arguments, hearings, and squabbling with television manufacturers, it has ordered them to change the way they measure screen sizes.

It all goes back to the unorthodox method used to measure television screens in the first place. Most rectangular merchandise on the market is measured in terms of width-by-length—such as "9-by-12" rugs, or "2-by-4" boards (which actually measure 15%-by-35% inches). But not rectangular TV screens. They're identified by the corner-to-corner measurement of the picture tube.

This diagonal-measurement system is rooted in TV's history. The first picture tubes had completely rounded faces, which were masked off into rectangular or pumpkin-shaped pic-

tures. These were identified by their diameter, measured in inches. When rectangular-faced picture tubes were introduced, the comparable measurement was from corner to corner. This system won world-wide acceptance.

Enter the Federal Trade Commission. In the early 1950's it suggested that this way of measuring might be deceptive or confusing to TV-set buyers, who might not realize that it was made on the bias. It urged the industry to adopt picture width or area as the standard measurement.

The TV-set manufacturers insisted that the public was accustomed to this "over-all diagonal" form of measurement, and that nobody had ever complained. Then, after several more years of investigation, the FTC came up with a remarkable discovery: The TV industry hadn't been measuring picture sizes at all, but screen size, which is something else again.

A picture tube is made of glass—thick glass. When you measure the screen surface from corner to corner, you're including not only the area occupied by the picture itself, but also the thickness of the glass walls around the edges. "Deception! Misrepresentation!" cried the FTC.

Then, this year, the Commission came out with its final order: Identify TV size any way you like—width, height-by-width, area, or diagonal—but measure the picture, not the screen. It gave the industry until next New Year's Day to mend its ways.

Television-set makers studied all of the possibilities. A set which is now called "19-inch" would become a "12-by-15" in terms of height-by-width, a "172-square-inch" in area, or an "18-inch" in diagonal picture measurement. Most of the manufacturers are expected to use the "diagonal picture measurement" because it's closest to the traditional TV size designation system.

Because fractions are rounded off

to the nearest inch, this new system shrinks the official "names" of most—but not all—black-and-white sizes by an inch. Some color sets will dwindle by two inches.

The TV industry is now occupied with the rechristening of all its old stand-bys, and not without some nervousness. Even in such a scientific business as electronics, superstitions and taboos have developed. One of the most persistent is that "an evennumbered size never made it"-and so we have 17-inch, 19-inch, 21-inch, 23inch, 25-inch and 27-inch sets, with very few even-numbered ones in between, Come Midnight Dec. 31, and lo. these take on such ill-starred names as 16-inch, 18-inch, 20-inch, 22-inch, 24-inch and 26-inch. Among TV manufacturers, electronic hex signs are now being posted prominently, and rabbit's-ears are being rubbed against evil omens.

So pronounced is the prejudice against even-numbered sizes that several millions of dollars are being earmarked to tool up for a whole new family of picture tubes whose new "names" will be the same as the familiar and comfortable old-style odd-numbered designations. But these may not be ready for a year or so.

In the meantime, television-set buyers can rejoice in the FTC's new screen-size ruling, which has the sole purpose of ending public confusion as to the *real* size of television sets.

It's all very easy now.

Just remember that a 25-inch blackand-white set is now a 24-inch, and a 25-inch color set is a 23-inch, while a 23-inch color set is a 22-inch. A 21inch round-tube color set is a 19-inch, but a 21-inch rectangular-tube color set is a 20-inch, and so is a 22-inch. On the other hand, a 12-inch blackand-white set is still a 12-inch, and so is a 13-inch.

Aren't you glad you're not confused any more?
