### as we see it

- Is network television giving more and more time to commercials or does it just seem that way?
- It just seems that way.
- For one thing, advertisers who used to make one-minute commercials for each of their products now use the piggyback technique, which permits them to plug two products in that one minute. So there has been an increase in the number of commercials in most network shows, but not an increase in time spent on commercials.

The increase in network feature movies and the way commercials are stuck into the movies also give the impression of *more* commercials.

■ It is the jarring nature of the movie interruptions that bothers viewers more than anything else. These movies were not originally made for television. They start relatively slowly, building character and plot at a leisurely, motion-picture-theater pace. If a broadcaster were to interrupt for commercials in the first 10 minutes, viewers would switch to another channel because the movie had not yet caught their full interest.

This is why the technique is to wait until the viewer is really involved before interrupting for commercials. This may mean as long as 20 or 25 minutes before the first break. A fixed number of minutes of commercial time must be used during the movie; so, in order to fit all of them in after the long delay at the beginning, it is necessary to interrupt more often during the climactic scenes. And that's just when interruptions irritate us the most.

■ Since viewers are annoyed, and resent what they believe to be overcommercialization, it would behoove the industry to find a solution. One solution might be an entirely different approach to handling commercials in feature movies.



### 'What do you hear, baby?'

An insider's fascinating revelations
of Sammy Davis Jr. and how he met disaster
First of two parts by ALAN EBERT

In addition to my duties as an employee of NBC-TV Press Department, I have written a number of free-lance articles for various national magazines. Thus, when I learned I was to meet Sammy Davis Jr., I began keeping a diary for possible future use. At that time, I did not know that I shortly was going to be NBC's publicity representative for The Sammy Davis Jr. Show. Now my association with Davis is ended, and I am free to publish the sum and substance of the diary.

#### IT ALL BEGAN:

Aug. 11. Backstage dressing room, Majestic Theatre, following a matinee of "Golden Boy." A swinging party was in progress when I entered Sammy Davis's dressing room. The party was obviously one of many in which only the guests changed. The group that afternoon consisted of agents, actors and some blonde dame who kept talking about how bombed she had been the night before and how she couldn't recall how she had gotten home. Her 18-year-old daughter was laughing along with the other merrymakers.

I was an intrusion. I was trying to tape an interview with Davis for NBC Radio's "Monitor." The situation looked hopeless. Davis was being "Charlie Charming" for the mob. When his tankard ran dry, his man Friday, Murphy Bennett, would fill it with bourbon and soda.

Eventually I had to insist we get to the tape. Davis broke away from the blonde, who was still making news with her big drunk of the night before. Before the interview began I asked Davis if he wanted me to repeat my name so he might use it during the interview to keep it sounding informal. He replied: "Forget it. Let's keep them guessing. Your ol' lady will recognize your voice anyway."

The tape finally rolled. Davis rolled with it, switching from the boisterous

swinger to the Davis who had a tendency to get veddy British in speech. His answers were intelligent. However, I could not have been less impressed with the man.

Sept. 2. NBC Studios, Brooklyn. The set of Hullabaloo. Davis is host. Davis arrived with an army of aides. I recognized Murphy Bennett, who continued to pour the booze all day. Bennett recognized me and chatted briefly. He seems like an all-right guy. Davis, on the other hand, looked through and beyond me.

Davis and his group held court all day. That laugh of his drives me nuts, particularly when he's stomping his foot for emphasis. In fact I find everything about the man offensive. The only time I can tolerate him is when he's performing.

Oct. 27. NBC offices. 3:30 P.M. Am I shook! There's going to be a weekly Sammy Davis Jr. show on the network and they've assigned me to handle publicity.

Nov. 1. Immediately after an "informal" meeting with Davis and his everincreasing staff. There are going to be problems. My job is to service pictures, items and features about my star and his show. I'm also a buffer between my star and the menacing outside world. I'm also a hand-holder, there to comfort the star when someone has taken a poke at him in print. After this informal meeting today, I can see that none of this will be easy. In fact, it may not even be possible.

Nov. 10. After a long, very long "formal" meeting at Davis's offices on East 56th Street. I'm bugged. Naturally, when any big star gets a show of his own, the first thing he does is hold a meeting for the people concerned. But today's meeting was ridiculous. There were enough people there to start a protest group. Agents, press continued

agents, aides, producers, production assistants, "advisors," the works. All had varying, and largely preposterous ideas on press and public relations for Sammy Davis. All seemed perfectly confident of their ability to advise NBC on how to handle the job. Most offensive was a sharp-looking girl named Carol Kritz, who had been in the business a year or so. Davis has made her an associate producer on the show.

Nov. 18. NBC offices. 4 P.M. I've spent the better part of the week attempting to get Davis into our photo studio for pictures and for an interview with yours truly so that I can write some "in depth" features on the man for the press. The main problem is trying to co-ordinate Davis's schedule with Carol Kritz and with Shirley Rhodes, who seems to be Davis's secretary.

Nov. 24. NBC offices. Still no Davis. He's making a movie ["A Man Called Adam"], working in "Golden Boy," attending benefits. He's everywhere but in our photo studio. If he doesn't make it within a week, we can't service any color art on his first show.

Dec. 1. NBC offices. 5:30 P.M. An amazing afternoon and a revealing one. Davis finally got to the photo studio. With him came Murphy Bennett and Shirley Rhodes, who seemed to do little more than laugh at Davis's jokes and serve as a partner for her boss when he broke into an impromptu frug or monkey. The trio really swings. They've got something going for them called "Charlie Bits." This finds Davis doing things like talking like Maxwell Smart or singing from "La Bohème" as Ray Charles might. But giving Davis his due, once he stepped in front of the camera he was quite a bit more than what the photographer or I had hoped for.

With the pictures completed, Davis,

Bennett and Mrs. Rhodes retired to the dressing room. This was supposedly my time to interview "my" star. Within minutes the scene resembled a Marx Brothers movie. Sheer insanity. I lost my patience and, risking the wrath of Mrs. Rhodes' and Bennett's god, asked "Chico" and "Harpo" to leave. They looked to Sammy. He waved them out.

Davis looked at me quizzically but without hostility. Obviously the same wasn't true of me.

"What's bugging you, baby?" he asked.

I told him, explaining that if I was to be a help to him and his show, he better cut the clowning. I said I wasn't about to play audience for him and his side-kicks.

A look of "Is this guy for real?" crossed Davis's face. Then, "Let's get on with it," he said.

I questioned Davis about his "Charlie Bits." His explanation is a good one, I think. Said the man, "I do them because they're me. I'm 'on' because being 'on' is being me. I enjoy being Sammy Davis. I love my life. I dig being the Sammy Davis cab drivers yell 'hi' to. I've worked from the age of 3 to get where I am today and I'm enjoying every minute of it. There aren't too many others who can say that. Many people wear their success like a chain around their necks. Not me. I love mine."

Davis leveled on a few other things and I suddenly found that an antagonistic force, me, was turning into an agnostic one, also me. I found after an hour with this little man, watching him when he wasn't performing, when he was "off" rather than "on," that I wanted to believe.

Dec. 5. NBC offices. 5 P.M. I called Davis yesterday and suggested he return to NBC to meet the rest of the publicity crew that would be servicing him. He arrived today. Let me tell you, like Grant took Richmond, Davis

took this office. And that ain't easy. We're a bunch of cynics here. Perched atop a desk in the press department, Sammy wasn't "Charlie Charming" but "Irving Interested." He was like any other guy listening and reacting to others like a person and not like his image—that of the swinger. By the time he left, had a vote been taken, he easily could have replaced the NBC peacock as the network's image.

Dec. 6. Back at NBC offices after a meeting at Sammy's offices. Somewhere during the last two weeks Sammy has decided that I am "for real." After today's meeting he took me aside and said, "Listen, baby. Few people around me ever tell me the truth. I have a feeling you will. So if you ever see me doing something you think is wrong, tell me. I may get mad. I may even holler. I might even ignore you. But baby, you better believe I'll be thinking about what you said, and if you're right, I'll know it and I'll tell you."

This time it was my turn to look and wonder . . . "Is he for real?"

Dec. 19. NBC Studios, Burbank, Cal. The taping of the premier show with the Richard Burtons. The show is a bomb. Everyone other than Nancy Wilson is lousy. Sammy does little in the show but play "Charlie Charm" to the Burtons. It's amazing that no one here realizes what a disaster this show is. Sammy's thrilled with it. One thing emerges from the taping. His friendship with Richard and Elizabeth is real. Sam's performance is suffering because of his concern for Mrs. Burton. She's so nervous she's practically hysterical. Sam's patience with her is akin to saintliness. But it pays off. For better or worse, she gets through the performance and is a doll to everyone.

Dec. 28, NBC offices. Relations between our offices and Davis's have gone into a steady decline. We can't spring Sam for any of the interviews we've set up to publicize the première. We're told he's "unavailable." Frankly, I'm up to here with the whole thing. I'm sick of having his West Coast press agent telling me how to run the show. I'm sick of trying to wade through 37 aides and at least that many advisors to get through to Sam. Due to his inaccessibility and his staff's interference, Sammy and his show are now in danger of becoming one of the best-kept secrets in television.

Dec. 29. At the Majestic Theatre, following an evening performance. I stood at the dressing-room door, tempted to run for it. Then I recalled . . . "If you ever see me doing something wrong, tell me."

Once again the party is in full swing. Murphy Bennett is still playing bartender, but by now I know Murphy dislikes many of the people who visit backstage because "so few of these guys really care about Sam. They just booze off him." Bennett really does care about Davis. To him, Davis isn't just a star or an employer, he's a human being and a friend.

Murphy, aware I wanted Sam's ear solo, manages to get the last boozer out the door by 1 A.M. Sam is now trying to reach Sinatra in Vegas when I interrupt. "Sam, I have to talk to you." I must have sounded serious 'cause Sam dropped the phone and said, "What do you hear, baby?"

I took dead aim and fired. I explained how too many cooks were spoiling what could be one helluva broth. I cautioned him about not dealing directly with NBC and informed him of the situation that now existed between our offices and his. When I added that he was fast earning the reputation of being difficult, a prima donna, he winced.

I waited for the explosion. None came. Nothing at all for several minutes. Then Davis barked, "Murphy, give this guy my phone continued

number and yours where we can be reached day or night. And get his." Turning to me, he said, "From now on, baby, you're it. You handle the entire magilla. If you need me for anything, call me. If you can't reach me, call Murphy. He knows where I can be reached at all times. If you call with something you think I should do, I'll do it. One last thing—tell those guys at NBC I ain't difficult."

Dec. 29. Same evening. Now 2:30 A.M. at my home. The former agnostic, me, is now a believer. From now on, I don't doubt this guy. An honest man is hard to find.

Jan. 8. Saturday morning at home. Shortly after 10 A.M. The reviews on the premier show last evening are scathing. The Burtons get the worst of them, but Sam doesn't come off any too great either. The phone rings before I've finished the last review. It's Sam, "What do you hear, baby?" he asks. I know from the tone of his voice that he has read the reviews. I'm right. He's read every last one of them. "Well, Sam, there's one bright note," I say cheerfully. "The rating was fantastic." What I don't say is, who knows how many tuned in to see Sammy and how many to ogle Mrs. Burton?

Jan. 9. NBC Brooklyn Studio. Sam was calm today. Where others on his staff tried to rap the reviewers, he didn't. Instead of placing the blame elsewhere or screaming "What do they know?" he's already working on a new format for the show. The reviews complained about his lack of participation in the show. He decides then and there, without consultation, that he'll revert to the old Sammy Davis and be "on" constantly.

One thing about the reviews really bugs Sam. He complains bitterly about the way reviewers took off after Elizabeth Taylor. "I don't understand," he says over and over. "Sure she was overweight. She was supposed to be, for 'Virginia Woolf.' Everybody knows that. Why did they harp on it? Elizabeth didn't need this show. She did it as a favor to me to help me get a good rating. Why didn't they mention her kindness rather than her obesity?"

Sam isn't in the show being taped today because of some crazy contract hassle with ABC. But he's all over the place, directing and producing. Sam may be an honest man but he's also a bit of an egomaniac. Since this ABC deal is going to keep Sam off his show for four weeks, I ask Sam to work with us in telling the public through reporters that his return show will be vastly different from his first.

We've got to wash out the foul taste of that first show. Sam agrees. "Set 'em up, baby, and I'll do them."

Jan. 13. NBC offices. As fast as we can set them up, Sam is doing interviews. He's even doing "phoners," which he hates because he feels he needs the personal contact to come off best.

Jan. 21. NBC offices. Just realized Sam did a total of 19 interviews last week. He's doing six more this week. He was to do 12 but he pooped out. He resents having to do them at all. Way down deep, Sam feels he's such a big star that his name in a TV listing should draw millions of viewers without his having to get out and "road-show."

Incidentally, since my scene with Sam in his dressing room, relations between his offices and ours couldn't be better. He must have read them out but good! Even his West Coast press agent apologized for interfering. It turns out that Shirley Rhodes is not just a "swinger" but the epitome of a personal secretary. She's privy to all private and personal information and is obviously one of the few people Sam trusts implicitly. Although he

obviously is nuts about this gal-in a platonic way, incidentally—there are times when he treats her like a robot. He does the same with Murphy, I wonder whether Sam's aware of it. What the hell, he does pay their salaries. I guess he feels he's entitled to act any way he damn pleases. But back to Shirley. She's a big-boned girl of great and good humor. Her main function in life seems to be to protect Sam from the outside world that threatens to consume him. And Carol Kritz, despite the fact that she has a tendency to come on as though she is Sammy Davis Enterprises, is just overzealous about her work. She, too, like Murphy and Shirley, is totally dedicated to Sam.

Jan. 22. Saturday at my apartment. Sam called bright and early this A.M. "What do you hear, baby?" he asks. He means what was the overnight rating on the show with the substitute host. The ratings were disasterville and I tell him. I can actually hear him crumble on the other end. The one or two reviews on the show were almost as bad as the rating. They were deserved. Sammy realizes it and so does his production staff.

Jan. 23. Also my apartment. I keep wondering how Sammy's next show (Feb. 11) will be received. He taped it last Sunday, and after each number he kept running over to me and asking, "What do you think?" I kept answering, "Great!" No, I haven't joined the yes-man parade. The show is truly one of the best variety shows I've ever seen. Sammy kills himself in it. He even made Trini Lopez look better than he ever has before. If the show looks as good on tape as it did from the audience, we're a cinch to get great reviews.



## FORMER CHOIRBOY WHO SINGS A DIFFERENT TUNE THESE DAYS

hree and a half years ago an obscure singer and down-on-his-luck scuba diver named John Gary left New Orleans, after persuading a friend to co-sign a \$250 note at Household Finance. Arriving in New York, he rented one of the less expensive rooms at the YMCA and for the next few months lived mostly on hors d'oeuvres picked up singing at parties, plus occasional dollar bills enclosed in letters from his mother.

Today John Gary averages between \$250,000 and \$300,000 a year as a night-club headliner, recording artist and TV guest. He heads four corporations. And this summer he is star of The John Gary Show, which is filling

in for Danny Kaye on CBS.

Kaye is the latest in a long line of "discoverers" of John Gary, including such diversified types as his mother, the pastor of his church, the late Hedda Hopper, Ken Murray, the Coca-Cola bottler in Binghamton, N.Y., the manager of a New Orleans television station, Don McNeill of radio's "Breakfast Club," and a show-business attorney.

Gary's mother, a former concert violinist, started it all by putting him and his sister in amateur contests around Watertown, N.Y., where he was born John Gary Strader on Nov. 29, 1932. His father was a jack-of-alltrades who, divorced from his mother when John was 10, now runs a fish hatchery at Altmar, N.Y. At first Mrs. Strader entered young John and his sister ("The Shirley Temple Northern New York") in contests separately, but eventually she teamed them, because, he says, "I was always the loser." When John was 9, the pastor of the Episcopal church the family attended was instrumental in getting him a three-year scholarship to the choir of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City.

Hedda Hopper discovered him next.

After leaving the Cathedral, he went on USO and concert tours, where the late columnist heard him. She remembered him when, back in Hollywood, she heard that a boy was being sought for a role in the motion picture of William Saroyan's "The Time of Your Life." She ran a line in her column saying, "John Gary, where are you?" John's mother took him to Hollywood, and he got the part. Afterward, Miss Hopper introduced him to Ken Murray, who put him in his long-running "Blackouts."

He stayed in the "Blackouts" a year and a half. Ken Murray remembers his final performance: "He was a boy soprano. Then one night, right in the middle of 'When Irish Eyes Are Smiling,' his voice changed—suddenly

he was a bass!"

The voice may have sounded like a bass to the horrified Murray, but to this day John Gary still sings high. "It's probably because I learned to my mother's violin accompaniment," he says. "But I'm not a tenor—I'm a high baritone. And anybody who says I sing falsetto just doesn't know anything about singing."

Gary's recollections of the years immediately after his leaving the "Blackouts" are not particularly pleasant. He finished high school at North Hollywood High. "While I was in the 'Blackouts,' I went to the Hollywood Professional School," he says. "Every day I'd get all dressed up in a jacket and shirt and tie. When I went to North Hollywood High dressed like that, I got beat up."

From high school he went into the Marine Corps, where his older brother was a career man. "I begged to go to Korea, where my brother was," he says. "Instead I spent a year and a half at Camp Pendleton, near San Diego, in special services, as a chaplain's assistant singing in church and as an continued

M.P. It was very dull."

Out of the Marines, he returned to Los Angeles, where he made demonstration records for songwriters at \$5 or \$10 each—"depending on how prosperous the particular songwriter was," he says. Since Gary has become a successful recording artist, these "demos" have been bought up and issued in bootleg albums, for which he receives nothing. John is currently suing the compilers of nine such albums for \$250,000 each. Recently he and one of these entrepreneurs met at an attorney's office to give depositions. Afterward the entrepreneur, a songplugger by trade, said, "John! Have I got a song for you!"

In the years which followed, John Gary took a course in sculpture at the Otis Art Institute in Los Angeles, went to England for a brief tour, sang with a band at an amusement park in Colorado and attended the University of Colorado for a year. Then a Binghamton, N.Y., soft-drink bottler put him on WNBF-TV.

#### **Next stop New Orleans**

His next stop was WDSU-TV in New Orleans. There he became interested in scuba diving and eventually quit television to go into the diving business full-time. The business failed in six months. Married by this time, he flipped a coin to decide whether he and his wife would go to Miami or Los Angeles. Miami won, and John mowed lawns, sold cars and sang nights and weekends there until a recording company put him under contract and sent him on a tour of the Midwest. The tour ended when he was signed to sing on Don McNeill's "Breakfast Club."

But after a season on the "Breakfast Club" he returned to New Orleans with prospects slimmer than ever. It was then that he decided to go to New York, resolving to give himself six months to make it big, or quit. He had been there five months when an attorney who heard him singing for his supper at a party, told him he would like to talk to him and recommended him to RCA-Victor. Later, after he had signed a contract and made an album, RCA-Victor booked him into the Crescendo, a Sunset Strip night club, where he was heard by the executive producer of The Danny Kaye Show, Herb Bonis.

"He received more fan mail than any guest we've ever had on the show," says Bonis. "There are singers who can come out and kill an audience in a couple of numbers but don't wear well. John isn't like that. He has legs—he grows on you."

#### Today, at 33

Today, at 33, John Gary lives with his second wife, Lois, and her three children by a former marriage, in a handsome West Hollywood home, formerly owned, according to legend, by Dorothy Lamour. (His first wife and John Jr., 9, live in New York.) He has two music-publishing firms, an agency for developing new talent, and a company to manufacture the Aqua-Peller, an underwater swimming device he has invented.

Despite all this, the rigors of the saloon circuit, and the ups and downs en route to his present affluence, Gary still comes over like the choirboy he once was. Diffident and soft-spoken, he is usually described as "clean-cut" (Herb Bonis) or "an awful nice boy" (Ken Murray). But beneath the diffidence and the bland exterior is the drive which has kept him pushing through the backwaters of the big time for almost all the years of his life—the confidence which enables him to say, "When you walk onto that stage, you've got to own it!"

### FOR THE RECORD



"A Healthy Thing . . ." Reaction has been mixed, as they say, to CBS's announcement that it will present the very best in "meaningful, original" drama on its new CBS Playhouse. Generally, the writers think it's fine. The money is good: Some \$500,000 has been allotted to developing the writing, with up to \$25,000 per script.

Said Paddy Chayefsky, perhaps television's most distinguished writing graduate ("Marty"), "I couldn't be more delighted.... I've got about nine ideas and I'd like to try them if I can avoid all the nonsense of ratings and pressures by networks, sponsors and packagers."

J. P. Miller, he too once a toiler in the television vineyards ("Days of Wine and Roses"), now writing for movies, was also pleased. But he also had reservations about the pressures. "I think the idea is supersensationalmagnificent . . ." he said, "but if the script has to be shaped to fit a format, forget it. Money is not everything. Writers want to reflect their own strike zone. What counts, too, is to have a television producer with guts who will stand up against the fellow in the checked suit from the sponsor who says you can't offend some little old lady."

A TV executive involved in producing dramas also had his doubts. For one thing, he didn't think the money would necessarily draw top-flight material. "Major playwrights have no trouble getting on Broadway," he said,

"and I don't think they'll be interested in television even at \$25,000 a script. However," he added, "it's a healthy thing CBS is doing."

Satellite Transmission: A sobering and authoritative - voice has cut through all the pie-in-the-sky prophecy about the relay of television signals direct from space satellites to home sets. Dr. Joseph V. Charyk, president of the Communications Satellite Corp. (COMSAT) told a National Space Club luncheon in Washington that such by-passing of broadcast facilities is "not likely" in the immediate future. The present re-transmission scheme is still the "more natural, logical, and economical" method, he said, permitting better and wiser use of broadcast frequencies.

Way to a Man's Heart: To TV Gude's editors, it sounded like fun. Why not have personable, young (33) Hollywood writer and bon vivant, Richard Warren Lewis, appear on The Dating Game as a contestant, then write up his experience in a magazine piece? In the game the contestant, by interrogation, picks a likely date from three girl contestants he can't see.

One of the questions Lewis asked was whether any of the girls could cook. Joan Patrick, 27-year-old actress from Canada, said she could. In fact, she said, "I have a special recipe for Rock Cornish game hen stuffed with wild rice and cooked in white wine."

Naturally, she won the date with Lewis, and eventually, she got around to cooking the hen. They will be married on Aug. 27. The article is a week overdue.




# FROM THE MYSTERIOUS GEOMETRY OF NATURE . . .

# Dear Mr. Kelly, I think you are the greatest fish since tuna'

What bugs Brian Kelly, however, is the large shadow of another finny creature

### BY TED CRAIL

They were eating at a Miami Beach hotel when the hotel's bright young public-relations girl sat down with them and handed Brian Kelly a note she had just scribbled.

"Dear Mr. Kelly," it read, "I think you are the greatest fish since tuna."

Being second to tuna isn't what's worrying Mr. Kelly these days. He is annoyed because he has been playing second fiddle to a porpoise and is getting plenty tired of it.

So tired, in fact, that—and his TV bosses might not be aware of this—he's mulling over the possibility of dropping out of the *Flipper* series after this coming season.

"It's my last year," he confided.
"Most people tell me I'm crazy. 'Stay
with it four or five years,' they say,
'and you can retire.' I want to go on. I
want to direct films, and— continued

oh, I don't say I want to do the great

American tragedy, but-"

Handsome, with a face that looks as if it had come from a cutter's wheel designed to turn out hero-types, Kelly on the surface seems a bland fellow who wants little more than to be friends with everybody. This creates a rather unusual problem, the reverse of those generally encountered with more temperamental actors, according to Stanley Colbert, production chief at the Ivan Tors Studios in Miami, where Flipper is made.

#### Just the friendly sort

Said Colbert: "If Brian would allow himself to antagonize people and throw temper tantrums, that's when we might see a star on the horizon."

Though Colbert probably did not want Kelly in his office kicking his heels on the floor, he was serious about his need to stir up more trouble and emotion, if only within himself.

"There's a place where predictability works for you," said Colbert, "but there's a place where volatility works, too. Brian's got size. He's got 'The Look.' The Look is a dark glint that every man, and every panther, feels he ought to have on a Saturday night. Everything's at work to make him a real leading man. But today a leading man is an actor like Steve McQueen, who couldn't care less what people think. Who knows what you might have in a Brian Kelly if he weren't so in control of himself?"

Brian Kelly has far more to be self-controlled about than most actors in TV. His father, Harry Kelly, was governor of Michigan for two terms and serves now as a justice of the Michigan Supreme Court. Kelly can remember New York's Governor Dewey and others coming to his home. After studying political science at Notre Dame, he went into law but

dropped it. His father said, "You'll like the drama of the law. The histrionics."

He liked drama, indeed.

Colbert calls Kelly a better actor than he has been given a chance to demonstrate. Kelly agrees. Where he and some of the other Tors executives might split is on how much emphasis should be given to Kelly the director as distinct from Kelly the actor.

"I suspect any actor who doesn't want to be a director," said Colbert.

Ed Haldeman, executive vice president of the studio, said, a mite vaguely, "I think he definitely should do shows that he is not heavy in. I would like to see every actor able to direct at least one show so he can see what happens on the other side of the fence."

Watching Kelly on the set, you get the idea he's much more of a force out there than the actor usually is, which is no small trick with Ivan Tors Studios. It's no place for the weak-inheart. Kelly commands respect not so much as an actor but as a power, a man. Even talking about his divorce proceedings (wife Laura Devon is herself a rising actress), he does so manfully, assessing no blame.

### Bring on Bikini girls

He says bluntly, "I've never been directed," then laughs at a remark of Flipper director Ricou Browning (an ex-stuntman who was once "The Creature from the Black Lagoon"). Browning told Kelly he'd be glad to see him direct "because you might see some of the problems I have with you."

But Browning confided, away from Kelly, "I think he can cut it."

"I'm going to bring a couple of Bikini girls on," Kelly said—not in an overly controlled tone at that. "I want some groovy-lookin' girls because a lot of fathers, who see the show, say, 'Where are the chicks?'"

Under questioning, he further explained why he thought he had to try directing ("because a director is the real honcho out there"); why he thinks the Flipper break should be made without going on to the big residuals ("maybe I'm young enough to do it"); how far he thinks he's come ("I hope this doesn't sound like ego, but I think I've survived—I think I've more than survived").

If Kelly does ever abandon the series, his departure will probably have no bearing on the life of the show. Kelly is the first to point out that it's the porpoise who is pivotal to the plot. "Flipper's the raft it all

floats on," he says.

"I always said if I got a hit television show, I would never, never knock it," said Brian. "And I don't. But I know the limiting quality of the show. What I think's gonna happen, the family will go to Yellowstone National Park or Siberia or someplace and Flipper will continue swimming with new pals."

Just prior to starting the newest series of *Flipper* episodes, Kelly was selected to judge the Miss U.S.A. Pageant in Miami. He got to pondering how much nerve pressure the girls were under and concluded that he endured considerable himself as an actor. The first year of the TV series he had been on "anti-acidity pills and milk." Now he says the pressure's off. It would be wrong, though, to dismiss the pressure that was his for a good part of his life.

Governor's son though he was, he started out behind in life; more literally than most. He has a twin brother, born first. The brother, Harry Jr., was named for his father. Brian was named for his mother, Anne O'Brien. His twin is a lawyer for General Motors' missile division. And here is Brian with *Flipper*. They all have many comparisons to draw, first of all with their father.

It takes no psychoanalyst to recognize that Kelly's consistent fight for a "strong father" on *Flipper* has much to do with how he views his own father.

"I think my father is one of the great men of our country," he said. "He could have been a leader in the Senate, like Everett Dirksen. Now he's fighting a lonely fight to keep the courts from creating, making the law. My father's right leg was shot off in the First World War. He's a real tough old tree."

#### Hunting in a mined field

When he was an intelligence officer in Korea, Brian decided to go pheasant hunting one day in a mined field, probing in front of him. "People were claiming they'd seen saber-toothed tigers there, which are supposed to be extinct. Less than 45 minutes after we came back, an Army colonel got both legs blown off by a mine—he went up the same trail that we had."

So if he seems to have a lot of control, he came from the places where control is built in. His confidence is high—at the Miss U.S.A. Pageant, he dated Miss Apasra Hongsakula, no less, Miss Universe of 1965. And as the pageant itself was coming to an end, an aide looked across a runway teeming with color cameras to the upper-level jury box where Kelly and other judges sat. Kelly was indeed self-controlled. "Look at Brian, look how bored he is," the aide said.

It isn't that he has a disposition for boredom. It's just that it takes quite a bit to truly excite a Governor's son who has walked safely in a mined field which the natives think is peopled by saber-toothed tigers; who comes home to face the unusual problems of maintaining his identity against the powerimage of a porpoise; who dates the Queen of the World; and who has a chance not only to stay an actor but to become the man who runs the set.

## The Exceptional Miss Cramer



The German actress may be Hollywood's most unusual girl

ou can usually put it down that all actresses want to be Big Stars some day. But maybe, just maybe, the exception is one named Susanne Cramer, a 26-year-old veteran of more than 20 movies in her native Germany and, since coming to the United States four years ago, such television programs as Bonanza, The Man from U.N.C.L.E., The Rogues, Kraft Suspense Theatre, Burke's Law, The Farmer's Daughter, Hogan's Heroes and Blue Light.

Miss Cramer says, "I never wanted to be famous. The only thing I wanted to prove was that I was good." And she says it in such a way that, if she isn't telling the truth, she is good.

The need to prove something began when she returned to bombedout Frankfurt at the end of World War II, after spending the war in a safe area near the Swiss border: "I only found out then that my father had been killed two years before in a bombing raid. I had never been to school, and my two sisters were far ahead of me. That's when my complexes started." Today, the complexes seem to be under control, but sometimes when they take hold, Susanne becomes a compulsive eater whose weight once went to 140 pounds from 115. When she becomes depressed, she also turns to her 6-year-old daughter. Konstanza: "She takes me in her arms and comforts me."


Konstanza is the issue of a marriage to Austrian actor Helmuth Lohner, whom Miss Cramer met when they made a movie together. Susanne got into the movies when she was 16, after a photographer, who saw her on a Frankfurt street, made some shots. She soon became a European cover girl and eventually appeared in 23 motion pictures. After completing the first one, she went to Majorca for three months, where, she says, "I fished all day and rode motor bikes with the waiters at night."

She and Lohner were married in 1957 and separated after a month ("He was a better actor, but I made more money"). They were divorced, remarried two months later and finally divorced for good after the birth of Konstanza in 1959. Miss Cramer has since been married to and divorced from director Allan Buckhantz.

It was after the failure of her second marriage that she again decided to prove herself. In the United States now, with few contacts and rudimentary English (she still speaks with a heavy accent), she got walk-ons in a number of television series. She also got a bit part in the movie "Bedtime Story," with Marlon Brando. When she reported for work, she was so nervous that Brando said, "I don't think you can speak," and he took her aside and talked to her for an hour until she calmed down. Eventually her television roles became more important. She had the lead in a Perry Mason and in "The Last Clear Chance" on Kraft Suspense Theatre -roles in which she became so emotionally involved that she was "shattered" for days afterward.

A modest apartment in Beverly Hills for herself and Konstanza has come with her small success, but she says, "You can be successful and still be lonely." Books, most of them in German, line the walls, and a hi-fi plays classical records all day ("In music, that is where I find God-in Bach and Mozart"). Her ambition is to do Cocteau's "La Voix Humaine"-a dream role for an actress, since she is alone on the stage for the entire action of the play. Susanne has even done something Cocteau never thought of: She has written lines for the unseen man in the drama who talks to the woman on the phone. But she has no great desire to do the play in a theater: "I would do it in my own living room. If you can just move one person-if only you can touch one person . . ."

# HELP!

### I'M A PRISONER IN A LAFF BOX!

Like a cackling lady from Pasadena, the television industry has become a captive of the device

ay you're glomming a Bob Hope GI Junket Special and right in the middle of all those servicemen's guffaws you notice a peculiar ladylike cackle-crow you swear you've heard before. That same cackle-crow you heard in the audience of *The Lucy Show* Monday night. The identical

cackle-crow you heard Saturday on The Hollywood Palace.

From Saigon airstrip to Desilu Studios to the corner of Hollywood & Vine—gracious! For a cackling little old Pasadena lady, does she get around!

And around and around and around.

On an endless loop of quarter-inch

magnetic tape.

The awful truth is—the lady's been imprisoned in Charley Douglas's nefarious "Laff Box" many long years now, ever since that day she turned up in the studio audience of the Burns and Allen radio show before television even happened.

So who would ever notice a recurrent laugh on TV? Or give a hoot? The Beverly Hillbillies co-writer Mark Tuttle, that's who: "For a long time Charley had in his box a dingbat shriek I called 'the jungle lady' that used to bug me out of my gourd. I complained so much he finally yanked it."

Caustic TV critic Hal Humphrey, for another: "I'm of the opinion that laugh styles change over the years, and that a big belly laugh lifted from an old Martin & Lewis show has a spurious tone when one hears it used today in, say, an episode of My Mother, the Car."

To get around those spurious tones of Charley's box, CBS sound engineers at Television City knocked together a fancier contraption they call "The MacKenzie Machine" (named for an engineer who developed the mechanism) which "augments" The Red Skelton Hour with prerecorded titters taped right in Skelton's studio, No. 33, and which "sweetens" The Danny Kaye Show with canned cackles recorded in Kaye's studio, No. 31. No outdated Martin & Lewis yocks for Red or Danny! Just the freshly canned kind.

All this in an effort to manufacture laughs that sound real and natural and true. Audiences composed of living, breathing, sentient beings, it seems, don't sound too good.

"The fact is," says Arthur Julian, a writer on F Troop, "real audiences sound phonier than the laugh track. Sometimes they freeze up and act unnatural." Producer Don McGuire, creator of the late Mona McGuire,

Cluskey, and author of the forthcoming Doubleday novel "The Day Television Died," concurs: "Live audiences in from the street are tense and nervous and you don't get their true reactions." Adds Addams Family associate producer Herbert W. Browar: "At times, the live audiences yock it up too much. Maybe someone off camera is waving his hands wildly for audience reaction." Sighs Bob Banner, whose company produces Candid Camera: "Audiences just never laugh or respond on cue. They do the strangest things."

Live audiences aren't all they're cracked up to be because they can hardly see the performers through the swarm of cameras, announcers, lights, sound men, props, musicians, microphone booms, dancers, cameramen, stagehands, and assorted production assistants. They have to crane their necks up to the monitors overhead to catch what's going on. At that, they can't hear much. The studio publicaddress system has been cranked way down to prevent sound from leaking back into the mikes and producing that screeching howl called "feedback." Audiences who can't see or hear can't be counted on to laugh at jokes.

The industry's solution—TV's best-known and least-talked-about secret—the Laff Box—is by now endemic, ubiquitous, and here to stay. Pronounces NBC's vice president in charge of TV programs, Grant Tinker: "It's something that's with us every day and night. It's largely a necessary thing."

It wasn't always so. Back in the earlier days of radio there were programs like "Stoopnagle & Budd," "Amos 'n' Andy" and "Easy Aces" that tootled along without any hoots and hollers at all. Then it all broke loose. As the late Fred Allen put it: "The worst thing that ever happened to radio was the studio audience. Somebody like Eddie Cantor continued

brought these hordes of cackling geese in because he couldn't work without imbeciles laughing at his jokes."

Enter video, and one of the pioneers of filmed TV comedy, Harry Ackerman, developer of the original I Love Lucy, recalls: "I learned that Lucy was 'dead' on a bare soundstage, so I insisted that we film in front of an audience. It was for the performers' benefit at first, though of course we recorded the audience reaction and learned to 'sweeten' it when necessary." The Lucy Show as well as Hey, Landlord!, an upcoming series this fall, are the last survivors utilizing the three-camera technique of filming before a live audience. "Why, we have to take out more laughs than we put in!" exclaims Landlord's production executive Lee Rich. ("Desweetening," it's called in the laugh game.) "But it got to be a bore having the audience around," Artie Julian continues. "Even on live or taped shows like The Hollywood Palace the engineers started dialing the audience out and using canned reaction."

Certainly no comedy producer is about to show up in a Madison Avenue projection room with his can of pilot film minus built-in laughs. The prospective buyer might not know it's funny; he might not buy. For according to Jay Sommers, creator-producer of *Green Acres*, "People are so conditioned to the laugh track that if they don't hear it they don't know it's a comedy show."

There have been exceedingly few instances of comedy shows sans laughs and those instances aren't likely to fire up a spirit of reform. For its first and second seasons, Hennesey had a "titter track." Its third season, the titters were dropped. At the end of the third season Hennesey was dropped. A series called Harrigan & Son starring Pat O'Brien survived just one season without a laugh track.

And season before last, producer Buzz Kulik publicly proclaimed that Kentucky Jones would have 'em rolling in the aisles with no laughs, canned or live. Five yockless episodes later, after a grim look at the Nielsens, NBC put through an urgent call to Charley Douglas's garage in Northridge: Send over the box.

Stung to action by the quiz scandals of 1959, CBS president Dr. Frank Stanton hired a sort-of house detective known around town as "Mister Clean," whose job it was to tack title cards like "audience reaction technically augmented" onto the tail end of shows with laugh tracks. That reform lasted half a season or so. Today, you can't glimpse a fast-crawl end-credit for Charley Douglas on any of the dozens of shows yocked up by his outfit, Northridge Electronics.

### Producers feel guilty

"We put in sound effects, too, but nobody complains about that," says a puzzled Herb Browar, "Sure, what about creaking doors or spooky music?" asks Artie Julian. "There's no guilt about that, yet everybody has this great guilt about putting in laughs." Sheldon Leonard, whose company makes The Andy Griffith Show and Gomer Pyle, USMC, among others, concedes: "There's an air of shame and self-consciousness about laugh tracks that's not necessary." Then how did these guilts get going? Don Mc-Guire's theory is this: "There are some producers, including myself, who feel guilty about using laugh tracks because it demonstrates a lack of talent. It's an admission on our part that we don't know how to make our shows funny enough."

Funny or not, comedy shows will never lack laughs as long as writers write, directors direct, actors act, and editors edit—all with the Laff Box to fall back on. "Writers are continually aware of the box," Rod Amateau says.

"After every gag line the next one has to be neutral so the laugh can cover it." "Directors leave pauses for audience reaction, space for laughs to be laid in," says Artie Julian. "Actors who have worked before live audiences always allow room for laughs." says Get Smart's executive producer Leonard Stern. One has only to recall Jack Benny's hurt stare, George Burns' gaze at the tip of his cigar, or Bob Hope's pretense of sailing right into the next sentence. And film editors splice in extra footage after every gag so the Laff Boy will have room for his product.

If some shows seem to yock it up more than others, there's a high-falutin' theory to account for that too: "It is an axiom of the TV-comedy business," Steve Allen explains in his book "The Funny Men," "that the less realistic you are, the bigger your jokes have to be. If you're not being at least a little true to life, your script has to blast a laugh out of the audience every few seconds because their emotions are not much involved."

The way Sheldon Leonard explains it: "A show with a high degree of reality, as The Andy Griffith Show, requires a modified laugh track, whereas The Beverly Hillbillies track can be more intrusive."

So why are laugh tracks so all-fired necessary? Theories are multitudinous. "To get the guy in slippers and robe with the can of beer to look up from his newspaper to see what's going on," says producer George Schlatter. "To assuage your embarrassment at laughing at such corny items as Granny's hawg jowls," says producer Rod Amateau. And that's just for starters.

Yet perhaps it's child-star-turned-TV-tycoon Jackie Cooper who gets to the real nitty-gritty of the laugh-track question when he says: "We're manufacturing a reaction to our own creation, yet we'll never know if the people out there are really laughing. It's the put-on of all time."



### BASEBALL'S REVOLVING DOOR

For major-league owners,

### the national pastime is Fire the Manager

As the long hot summer unfolds and you watch the national pastime from the coolness of your parlor, you will notice six new managers romping about the major leagues this year. That's assuming, of course, that further changes don't take place between the time this is composed and the time it is printed.

Baseball, as you know, is a nervous sport in which people sign contracts by the year, but actually work by the day, if not by the hour. Three years ago, a gentleman of great learning compiled statistics which showed that between 1940 and 1963, managers in the National League lasted an average of only 2.8 years on each job.

For continuous employment, this put the managers in roughly the class of migrant fruit pickers. Airline stewardesses don't last that long on the average, but they have an excuse. They get married. We know one who went to work, instead, as a waitress in Las Vegas where the pay, with tips, came to \$300 a week.

Do you realize that over a lifetime that girl will earn more than just about any manager in baseball! That's provided, of course, she doesn't lose her head and marry a pit boss.

The new contract linking NBC with the big leagues this year has inspired a spot of diligent research on the part of your correspondent. He found, to begin with, that Chicago, Houston and Cincinnati in the National League and Chicago and Kansas City in the American League signed new managers to start the season, with the Yankees making a change later.

In business but five years, Houston already has employed three field leaders. In the last 10 years, Cincinnati has hired six; Atlanta (formerly Milwaukee) and St. Louis each five; and the Chicago Cubs four, plus 12 coaches alternating as manager. At one stage, Mr. Wrigley's coaches were responsible to an athletic director, who, presumably, was responsible to Tommy and Joy, who do the Doublemint commercial.

In the American League, work is even less steady than in the National. Over the last 10 years, Kansas City has hired nine managers. They come and go in that town faster than Harry Truman moved neckties. Cleveland and Detroit have used seven managers each in the last decade, and Baltimore, Boston and New York four apiece.

It is the least bit ironic that the senior manager in the American League today should be one employed by an expansion team, the California Angels, for whom Bill Rigney is skipper. If the owner lets him, Bill will complete his sixth year.

The whole concept of hiring and firing managers in baseball is considered a colossal joke by most scientists, who point to the fact that the principals, for the most part, are playing musical chairs, anyway. The Athletics fire Hank Bauer, the Orioles hire him. The Giants fire Alvin Dark, the Athletics hire him. The Braves fire Charlie Dressen, the Tigers hire him.

In 1960, Cleveland and Detroit actually swapped managers. The Tigers sent Jimmy Dykes to the Indians for Joe Gordon. Unlike the ideal trade—the one that benefits both teams—this one helped neither. By the end of the year, Gordon had departed. Dykes lasted only a season longer.

As the Computer Age ripens, it is hoped that machines will be introduced to do a more satisfactory job of appraising managerial talent than humans have over the last 50 or so years. Repeatedly, judgments have been illogical and slipshod and often inspired by whims.

Fred Haney, for instance, has been the only manager in recent years to win back-to-back pennants in the National League. He did it at Milwaukee in 1957 and '58. By the end of the '59 season—he lost that year in a play-off—he was out of work. After having won two straight, had he lost his touch because he finished only second?

At the start of the 1965 season, Sam Mele was clinging to his professional life at Minnesota. The report was that his job would go to his coach, Billy Martin. In the better restaurants, Sam was getting tables next to the kitchen.

Today, he is the conquering hero there, a man with a fat two-year contract. And what did Sam do? He won the pennant last year, making him resident genius. But did he actually change in a period of one season?

By midsummer of 1964, Johnny Keane was deceased as manager of St. Louis. The club had resolved to fire him at the end of the season—only John wound up winning the world's championship. Now fawning over him, the owner offered him a raise if he would stay, but Keane had pride. He fled to the Yankees, where he took a long-time winner and finished sixth.

In all probability, he managed as well in New York as he did in St. Louis, but the fickle nature of the game prevents a man's winning the pennant every year. This season, Keane was canned after 20 games. Ralph Houk, general manager, resumed his old post as field manager.

In the absence of a more scientific way to evaluate a manager's skills, Walter O'Malley of Los Angeles has permitted his field leader to remain. Walter Alston is now in his 13th year as Dodger manager, during which he has won five pennants and finished out of the first division only twice.

It is O'Malley's theory that managing baseball is reasonably standardized these days. Thus, one solid man left to his devices for 13 years figures to do as well as 13 solid men working a year apiece.

Changing personnel is a costly pastime. Having once paid three managers simultaneously—one for managing and two for not—the Dodgers have since operated on one-year contracts only. But in Houston, the club is paying Paul Richards, former general manager, for eight years remaining on a 10-year agreement.

Gate receipts alone won't enable the clubs to indulge such whims. They rely heavily on revenue from TV and radio; this year, about \$27.5 million. Unlike income from local packages, which the teams do not share, the national television profits from NBC are divided equally, each club getting \$315,000.

Figuring, say, two managers a year at \$50,000 apiece, the clubs can be kept in skippers as long as three seasons from the NBC swag alone.




