"Seldom has there been so wretched a collection of titles as appears today."

Television critic speaking? No, Lewis Nichols, book commentator of The New York Times Book Review, after taking a long, hard look at that newspaper's latest list of best-selling books.

• Over here in Televisionland, of course, Mr. Nichols' denunciation had a familiar ring—like the sort of thing critics have been saying regularly every autumn as each new TV season has unveiled its offerings.

That got us thinking about the other media—radio, for instance, bogged down in a mass of rock 'n' roll; brainless, mooncalf mating songs; commercials; and mispronouncing news announcers.

And movies, with their newspaper advertising devoted with single-minded, unimaginative, unceasing, monotonous dedication to Topic A—whether it be through all-but pornographic illustrations or silly-sexy titles such as "The Ghost in the Invisible Bikini."

It all led naturally enough to the question: Why do critics seem to single out television for the charge of mediocrity and lack of excellence when the most popular fare in the other mass media is just as mediocre? • And, since all of these media are thriving, could it be that the producers of television, of radio, of movies, of books are not entirely as resource-less as their best-selling products might indicate, but that all are simply devoting most of their effort to meeting the demands of their most remunerative markets?

• Apparently we have yet to solve the riddle: Who *really* sets the taste standards? Who *really* decides the nature of the creative product?

The media?

Or the audience?

THE VATICAN IN THE TELEVISION AGE

Pope Paul and his advisors are wise in the ways of the medium

**Cue the Pope!" ordered the director, watching a bank of TV monitors in a London control room.

His words were heard in Brussels, relayed to Rome, and into a Vatican palace where an American network technician wearing earphones tipped his finger at Pope Paul VI.

The Pope began reading a message to the American people carried live on the Early Bird satellite. He glanced up regularly from his text to look into the cameras. He shifted his gaze easily from one camera to the other as a red light indicated which camera was transmitting his image at that moment. He finished reading his message in precisely two minutes, right on schedule, even though there had been no rehearsal.

It was a polished performance by a Pope who has made greater use of television than either of the previous occupants of the throne of St. Peter during the era of television.

When the late Pope John appeared for his first television performance garbed in his customary pristine white zucchetto (skull cap), floor-length cassock, and satin slippers, an Italian cameraman could not repress the protest, "In bianco spara, Santo Padre!" ("Holy Father, you glare in white!")

Everyone in the room—members of the Pope's retinue and the television group—stiffened at the cameraman's audacity. Pope John smiled and offered to put on his red cape. Wise to the requirements of television, Pope Paul always wears his ermine-fringed red cape in front of the cameras.

The Vatican often resists innovation, but in the case of television, it has done everything but set up its own television station. As an independent state, the Vatican has long had its own radio transmitters which beam Vatican news and preachments around the world every day in 30 languages.

For television, however, the Vatican uses RAI—Radiotelevisione Italiana—the national Italian radio and television network, whose facilities are always at the disposal of the Vatican.

Permanent outlets for television cameras are present in St. Peter's Square and Basilica and in various parts of the Pope's palaces where ceremonial events take place. All RAI has to do on a moment's notice is move in crews, fit the cameras to the waiting sockets, and the Vatican is joined to the Italian network. By means of RAI's links with Eurovision, the European part-time network, papal events can be transmitted live to the rest of Europe, and, by means of satellite, to North America.

Television has imposed a new requirement on Vatican monsignors whose seminary training in theology and Latin did not anticipate the need for a knowledge of the new electronic medium. They have learned quickly. This was apparent when I accompanied a New York-based NBC News executive to the Vatican's Secretariat of State. He wanted to plead our case that the Pope deliver a message on the occasion of the Today show's use of the newly operating Early Bird satellite. The two-hour program would be live from five West European cities, including Rome. The monsignor listened attentively.

We had been received in a small sitting room adjacent to the Raphael Loggia decorated with paintings by that Renaissance artist. We sat on chairs of gilt wood and red satin. It seemed an anachronism to be talking of television in this setting and to this serene-faced prelate in his black cassock. That illusion was quickly shattered when the monsignor spoke. "Is the program going to be commercial?" he asked. "And if the Holy Father does agree to appear, what part of the program will he be on? What will be the leeway for commercials before and after his appearance?" The monsignor was obviously as wellversed in the field as if his milieu were Madison Avenue instead of the hushed corridors of the Vatican.

Finally, after many days of consideration, word came from the monsignor that it was all right, but with two stipulations—that the Pope must deliver his message at the very outset of the program, because that seemed to the Vatican to be the most important part, and that there be no commercials for at least five minutes before or after the Pope's appearance.

On another occasion an American network made a request to the Pope to deliver a peace message on a program dealing with truce efforts in Vietnam. The American producer apologetically explained that the Pontiff's live appearance would be at 1:30 A.M., Rome time, and he realized this might make it impossible.

"Not for Pope Paul," said the monsignor who dealt with that request. "The hour wouldn't stop him. He's usually still up at that time anyway."

The familiarity of papal advisors with the intricacies of television sometimes seems greater than American television's familiarity with the Vatican. This seemed to be the case when the Cardinals were locked in conclave, isolated deep inside the walls of the Vatican, trying **continued**

to elect a successor to Pope John. According to centuries-old ritual, no contact between the Cardinals and the outside world was permitted. The Church was without a Pope and it was the duty of the Cardinals to elect one as quickly as possible and to announce his name to the waiting faithful as well as to a curious world.

At that point a message was received by an American network correspondent from New York headquarters. Could the correspondent please contact the appropriate Cardinals to see whether the announcement from the balcony of St. Peter's Basilica of the election of the new Pope, when it occurred, could be held up until the Telstar satellite came into position to enable live coverage of the event in the United States?

The Vatican is constantly beleaguered by requests of television companies from all over the world for permission to do programs on the Vatican and for special messages from the Pope. No Pope has yet granted an interview, but the late Pope John did agree on several occasions to deliver special messages, and Pope Paul has followed this practice. Once, when a company was turned down, efforts were made to find out why. Finally a network representative was told informally that it was felt that the Pope has been doing too much television and his "image might suffer from overexposure."

Requests for permission to film Vatican events for television must be made in a formal letter to an office bearing the august title "Pontifical Commission for Social Communications." It is headed by an American, a native of Scranton, Pa., Archbishop Martin J. O'Connor, but his American background has not overcome the Vatican habit of moving without haste. When permission is granted, the cameraman must be accompanied by a plain-clothes agent of the Vatican gendarmerie who abides rigidly by his mandate.

On one occasion an American television cameraman had permission to film Pope John's tomb in St. Peter's Basilica, and did so with the inevitable gendarme present. To convey the setting, the cameraman turned to photograph several of the adjacent tombs of other popes. The gendarme intervened, saying that another letter must be written and permission awaited before any other tombs could be filmed. Flexibility is not a Vatican virtue. (It must be added in fairness, however, that sometimes the Vatican can be surprising in its flexibility. On the night when word reached Rome that President Kennedy had been assassinated, an enterprising bureau chief sent his camera crew to the Vatican, ignoring the usual red tape, and a short while later they were admitted to film Pope Paul expressing his grief.)

Live television came to the Vatican on June 6, 1954, only a short time after RAI television had begun operations in Italy. The program was a onehour tour of the Vatican palaces, grounds and museums, and it was carried live to Eurovision, the then newly founded European part-time network. The program included Pope Pius XII, who thus became the first pontiff ever to appear on television.

The first Vatican event carried live to the United States was the opening of the Ecumenical Council on Oct. 11, 1962. The Pope is seen on television a great deal more often in Italy than in the United States or in other European countries. Because of the close connection between the Catholic Italian state, which controls the country's only television network, and the Vatican, rarely is a papal event omitted from the thrice-daily RAI television news programs. The Pope is seen visiting small parish churches, receiving leaders of obscure African countries, and celebrating Mass. Relatively few of these events are considered sufficiently newsworthy to be video taped or filmed by American networks for jet shipment to New York.

To cover Pope Paul's journey to Amman, Jerusalem, Nazareth and Bethlehem, RAI had to move an expeditionary force. Neither Jordan nor Israel, the two lands visited by the Pontiff, had television facilities and, with less than a month's forenotice, RAI constructed not one but two complete television systems because the enmity between the Arabs and Jews precluded a unified single setup.

Italy's Ministry of Defense provided jet fighter planes to transport video tape to Athens, where, in order not to waste time refueling, other planes waited to shuttle the material to Rome. From there it was placed on Eurovision lines to other parts of Europe and beamed to the United States by satellite.

The Pope and his associates have become increasingly aware of the value of television coverage to the Church in propagating the Pontiff's work and policies. On Pope Paul's trips to Bombay and New York, more than 50 seats were reserved in the Pope's plane for journalists, with priority given to major television organizations. On at least one occasion on each flight the Pope has walked into the journalists' section of the plane, stopping for a few words with each person, and allowing the television cameramen ample opportunity to film him.

An Italian named Luca di Schiena is to the Pope what the late Richard Dimbleby was to the British royal family. As head of RAI's Vatican section, Di Schiena narrates all Vatican events and maintains regular liaison with the Pope's retinue. Often he receives a telephone call from one of the Pope's aides, who suggests in the oblique vocabulary favored at the Vatican that a forthcoming ceremony is considered important and TV coverage would be in order. RAI always complies.

Caught napping

After the death of Pope John and before the conclave convened to elect Giovanni Battista Montini, there was an unending series of televised ceremonies. Di Schiena noticed that the television cameras were frequently catching glimpses of aged Cardinals napping in church. As a devout Catholic, Di Schiena was worried about this. Just before the Mass of the Holy Spirit, the final televised ceremony prior to the conclave, Di Schiena finally spoke to a Vatican monsignor who somehow managed diplomatically to caution the Cardinals. Di Schiena was relieved to discover during his narration that on TV screens that evening not a single nodding Cardinal was seen.

Television people who work at the Vatican get used to problems like that. They even have to be conscious of their dress. The Vatican requires that dark suits be worn at all times. RAI provides for this. The company has its own tailor and everyone connected with televising Vatican events has a free suit tailor-made—black, of course. REVIEW **By Judith Crist**



The Fugitive

With an Emmy tucked under its belt as the "outstanding dramatic series of 1965," The Fugitive is preparing to sprint into its fourth season and its first in color this fall. Meanwhile its summer warm-up (or cooldown) of repeats might provide a clue or two to the series' distinction and durability.

The durability is, actually, part of its distinction. The framework presented to us weekly-offering up Dr. Richard Kimble as an unjustly convicted wife-killer on the run to evade the death house and find the real murderer-is enough to trv the patience of the most gullible among us (and let's have no real-life analogies with the Dr. Sam Sheppard case, please, now in its 12th year). For even though we're willing to presume that the various arms of the law Kimble almost inevitably encounters in each episode are going to be too stupid to recognize him or, if he is recognized, too inept or kindhearted to capture him in the midst of the

good deeds he is almost inevitably involved in, we still want to have the empathic thrill of skirting danger and facing doom along with our hero. And logically, the least logical among us must realize, Kimble cannot be captured until the series is slated to go off the air or have its title changed.

There's no logic either in Kimble's being the nattiest, best-heeled fugitive on record, never lacking for the price of a drink or the neatly pressed suit the occasion calls for despite his usually hot-footing it out of town empty-handed and with his last oddjob pay check uncollected. So what, then, is the hook?

First, there's David Janssen, whose Kimble emerges as one of the least monotonous of the secret-sorrow, dogooding, compassionate humanists to have come our way; he's remarkably durable on the eyes, interesting in the performance. And second, there's the freshness of scene, plot and characters that the hero's rootlessness, an able assortment of scriptwriters and directors, and an astute producer provide. Last week (July 12) Kimble served as custodian of a private boys' club run by guest star William Shatner; this week (July 19) he's working for Mickey Rooney in a self-service laundry; next week (July 26) he's having a double load of trouble, courtesy of Melvyn Douglas, as a neuropsychiatrist, and his perennial nemesis, Lieutenant Gerard (Barry Morse).

There are lapses-super-coincidence. irrelevant plot-padding and over-complexities show up from time to timebut they are rare enough to justify the series' status. The secret of full enjoyment lies in letting the illogic of the format go by and riding with its presumptions. I suspect it's a secret most of us have stumbled on.

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TORPEDOED by SUCCESS?

David Hedison's submarine role may have sunk a long-time dream

ot long ago David Hedison, who co-stars with Richard Basehart in ABC's Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea, was having some remodeling done at his bachelor home in Beverly Hills. The man who came to do the work turned out to be a fan of Voyage, and complimented Hedison upon his acting in the series. Later in the day, when David called his house from the studio, the workman answered the phone. "Richard Heddington's residence," he said.

Another time, a man and boy approached Hedison on the street. The man stopped him, told him how much he enjoyed watching him and then, turning to the boy, said, "Son, shake hands with John Derek."

"It really puts you in your place," says Hedison. "I am one of the nameless heroes of television." To an acquaintance he has said, "I wish I had an *image*."

The image is crystal clear to producer Irwin Allen of Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea. He says, "Hedison looks like the type of modern, thinking-fighting man that we have come to recognize through the brilliance of the image created by the astronauts."

But it isn't that simple to Hedison. On the one hand he defends his efforts in the never-never land at the bottom of the sea—"If you can make this believable, you have really accomplished something"—and quotes Richard Basehart to back him up: "'Richard III' was easier than this because the *lines* were there." He adds that the Emmy Awards should go not to the Lunts and Fontannes and Julie Harrises but "to the actors who take nothing and make something of it."


But a co-worker says, "He doesn't take himself seriously. He knows it's just a comic strip." And certainly Hedison's reactions to his role are sometimes superficial. "I'm so damned sick of this uniform," he has said. "I envy Robert



Vaughn. As the Man from U.N.C.L.E. he can go so many places and be with women and wear a tuxedo."

For David Hedison the search for identity has involved a change of name and nose, defiance of his father, selling brushes (Fuller) and blood (his own) to pay for acting lessons under distinguished mentors, some small success on the New York stage and in motion pictures; and finally—financially comfortable as one of TV's nameless heroes—the elaborate, almost compulsive remodeling of his lonely house, perched high on a hill at the end of a canyon.

Although he denies it, this remodeling, which has cost upward of \$25,-



000, may be a protest against his New England upbringing; the house, originally filigreed Cape Cod, is now chaste Monterey Spanish.

Hedison is anything but a typical New Englander. Born in Providence, R.I., on May 20, 1928, he is the only child of Armenian parents. His name was originally Ara Heditsian, but later he became Albert David Hedison Jr. On the stage and in his early movies he was Al Hedison.

His father, successful in the jewelry enameling business, expected his only son to join him. But young Al had seen Tyrone Power in "Blood and Sand" and decided to be an actor. In high school he appeared in a Philip Barry play. Later at Brown University he was more interested in dramatics than in his studieş.

Between high school and college Hedison served six months in the Navy. When he was discharged, as a Seaman Second Class, he heard that John Ford was to make a movie in Mexico, and he wrote to the famed director offering his services in any capacity. He enclosed a snapshot of himself with his Navy cap cocked on the back of his head. Ford, a Navy captain in World War II, said in his answer that the movie was not to be made after all, closing with the admonition, "And next time you send your picture to an ex-Navy continued

four-striper, square your hat, sailor!"

Hedison spent three years at Brown and then left, determined to become an actor. For the next six months he worked 10 hours a day as a Fuller Brush man in Providence and earned \$1000. With that he set out for New York. He enrolled in the Neighborhood Playhouse, where he was taught acting by Sanford Meisner and modern dance by Martha Graham. As a student, he was chosen by Fredric March from among 200 promising newcomers to play summer stock in Virginia's Baxter Theatre. He also played in North Carolina, and worked part-time as a radio announcer in Asheville.

He was graduated from the Neighborhood Playhouse in 1953. As no acting jobs seemed to be available he went to work as a "candle boy" at the Empire Room of the Waldorf-Astoria, where he lit candles and filled candy dishes before finally landing a summer-stock engagement in Pittsburgh.

Back in New York again in the fall he sold jewelry for a friend of his father's, and got a few small parts in television shows and commercials. He began studying acting again, now under Uta Hagen. He lived in a \$5a-week room and, when things got really tough, sold his blood at \$5 a pint. "I could have written to my father for money," he says, "but I knew that he disapproved." Uta Hagen remembers him at this time as "a firecracker." She says, "He had a wild temperament, a tremendous eagerness to make good in the theater. He had great promise." He also by now had a remodeled nose.

What Hedison considers his big break came in the spring of 1956, when he appeared with Miss Hagen in the off-Broadway production "A Month in the Country." For his performance, he received a Theatre World Award—the only one of 14 recipients from off-Broadway. He was also seen by 20th Century-Fox talent scouts and sent to Hollywood for a featured role in "The Enemy Below," a movie involving submarines a harbinger of things to come.


His Hollywood career since then has been undistinguished—starring roles in "The Fly," "The Son of Robin Hood," "The Lost World" and "Marines, Let's Go!", and as the Apostle Philip in "The Greatest Story Ever Told." He also co-starred in the shortlived TV series Five Fingers.

Apprehensive about the show

Sitting in his remodeled aerie overlooking the canyon above Beverly Hills he says, "When Voyage first started I was apprehensive and didn't like to talk about it. But then I watched the other shows on television, and I decided ours was nothing to be ashamed of." In his spare time he reads Book-of-the-Month Club selections, takes pictures, visits antique shops and plays tennis ("Tennis gets your mind off the submarine").

Back in Providence, the Sunday Journal carried a story about him headlined, "Hedison Has Arrived— Rhode Islander Makes It Big." But his old mentor, Uta Hagen, who has never seen him in movies or on TV, says, "I was sorry when he decided to go to Hollywood. Young people see a chance to make some money; and then, without even realizing it, they get trapped. The last time I saw him, when he was visiting New York, he seemed sad. The fire had gone."

As for David Hedison, he spent part of Voyage's between-seasons hiatus in London, seeing the sort of serious plays he says he would still like to do. After that he did "The Teahouse of the August Moon" near Los Angeles. It's the sort of commercial thing "they" now insist that he do, and today the Hedison image is definitely commercial.

Lowe Blow?: Carol Channing's husband, producer and manager are all the same man—Charles F. Lowe. Last week A. C. Nielsen Co. charged him with having paid \$4000 to rater-baiter Rex Sparger.

Sparger is the man who asserted in March that he had rigged television ratings on four separate occasions, and who is consequently now being sued by the Nielsen firm for \$1,500,000. Nielsen charged that Sparger mailed questionnaires and \$3 to each of 58 Nielsen families, asking them to watch the Feb. 18 Channing show and comment on the commercials, for which comments they would be paid \$5.

Miss Channing's h., p. and m. admitted that he had paid Sparger the \$4000 (\$1000 fee, \$3000 expenses), not for "such a reprehensible deal," but to evaluate, as a research consultant, the commercial effectiveness of Carol's show.

Although records released by the U.S. District Court in Oklahoma City indicated that Sparger on April 13 had denied in a deposition that he received money from Lowe, last week he admitted that he had in fact received a \$4000 check from him.

Nielsen's suit against Sparger is based on its contention that he has been attempting to destroy the validity of its ratings, and, to do so, he has used confidential Government material to which he obtained access while serving as an investigator for the House of Representatives subcommittee that was scrutinizing the country's TV-rating services in 1963.

Northern California Edition

Controversial Show: John Wayne liked it. Walt Disney admired it. At least one metropolitan critic thought it had "ebullient young people singing with electric vibrancy." But CBS would have no part of it.

The show was a one-hour musical special called "Up with People," featuring Pat Boone, a youthful chorus of 130 and the original music of the Colwell brothers. But CBS would not allow it on its five "O & O's" (network-owned-and-operated stations, as distinguished from those merely affiliated with it).

Reason, according to Craig Lawrence of the network's stations division: "Apparently it did promote an editorial point of view. It was the Moral Re-Armament ideology, which in itself is perfectly all right but violated our policy."

The policy: not to accept sponsored commercial entertainment that includes an ideological or editorial point of view, unless it is a frankly political program in an election campaign.

So CBS stations did not carry the show. But it was seen widely nevertheless. In New York City alone, for instance, sponsor Schick Safety Razor placed "Up with People" on independent stations every night of the week, and elsewhere has thus far bought time in more than 30 cities.

Patrick J. Frawley Jr., 43, chairman of Schick's parent company, Eversharp, Inc., criticized the "defective judgment" of CBS officials in refusing to air his show on their stations. He said they were not distinguishing accurately between "what is ideological and what is patriotic."

The Astronauts: Navy commander John W. Young (command pilot) and Air Force major Michael Collins (pilot).

The Mission: To attempt rendezvous and docking with an Agena target vehicle; perform a one-hour spacewalk and standup extra-vehicular activity (EVA); rendezvous with the Agena target vehicle used in the aborted mission of Gemini VIII; and complete 16 scientific experiments.

Coverage: Live network coverage will originate from Pad 19, NASA's Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston, the USS Guadalcanal (recovery vessel) and other sites. The networks plan voice coverage of the maneuvers and will use technical devices to illustrate the movements of the spacecraft. Anchor men: Jules Bergman (ABC); Walter Cronkite (CBS); and Chet Huntley, David Brinkley and Frank McGee (NBC).

'Siberia: A Day in Irkutsk'

SPECIAL COLOR "What I think we have achieved," says producer George A. Vicas of this documentary portrait of a Siberian city, "is to humanize a people and a strange country—to bring a part of Siberia alive."

Irkutsk, a city of 480,000, lies deep in the Siberian interior. Camera crews traveled there to visit its homes, schools, theaters and places of amusement.

Films show the famous Trans-Siberian Railroad, a research ship of the Soviet Academy of Sciences on near-by Lake Baikal and a hunting expedition for squirrel and sable in the taiga, the dense forest that covers three-quarters of Siberia.







LITTLE WILLIE DEMAREST-65 YEARS LATER

He remembers when he was singing 'I Am the Bosom Friend of Albert, Prince of Wales' on street corners

rom a New Jersey newspaper, 1899:

Three Lilliputian Musicians, Rubinstein, George and Willie Demarest, appeared last month before the Indian Industrial School at Carlisle, Pa., creating quite a sensation. They were dressed in velvet suits, the two youngest looking much like the Princes in the Tower. They were all wonders at their instruments. continued

... Willie, the 'Celloist, is 9 years of age. To see him strike his 'cello, draw out his notes, and make the music swell from under his fingers, is truly a wonderful expression of his talent.

And 65 years later

Today, 65 years later, William Demarest, who plays Uncle Charley in CBS's My Three Sons, tells how the act got started: "Before my oldest brother was born, this lady lived next door to us that was crazy about Rubinstein, the pianist. That's Anton Rubinstein, not Artur. All the time she kept talking about Rubinstein, Rubinstein, Rubinstein and what a great pianist the baby was going to be. So, when he was born, my mother named him Rubinstein. By the time he was 5 years old he was playing concerts. Then my brother George came along, and he learned to play the violin, and I learned the cello. I was so little that my feet wouldn't even touch the floor when I played. My mother made our velvet suits. We wore our hair in bobs. The Beatles copped those haircuts from us!"

Demarest was born in St. Paul, Minn., on Feb. 27, 1892, but the family soon moved back to New Jersey, where its roots had first been put down by Huguenot ancestors in 1663. His parents were separated when Willie was 9 years old. Soon afterward the three boys were working to help support their mother. They not only performed at the Carlisle Indian School and at church socials, but played and sang on street corners and in front of hotels for pennies. Their songs included "It Takes the Irish to Beat the Dutch," "Dear Sing Sing," "I Am the Bosom Friend of Albert, Prince of Wales," and, appropriately, "We Need the Money." William Demarest can still sing the last of these without missing a note.

From a theatrical handbill, 1908:

Three Demarestio Bros. The Only Musical Act of Its Kind. High Class & Novelty Trick Music on Violin, Violoncello & Piano. Novelty & Eccentric Soft & Wooden Shoe Dancing. High Art & Comedy Intermingled.

"We called ourselves 'European Entertainers'—that's why we used the name of Demarestio Brothers," says William Demarest. "We didn't go in for much serious music any more. Rube would play the piano standing on his head, and George and I did wooden-shoe dances while we played violins. And we told jokes. Of course, back in those days, people would laugh at most anything."

Pickings often were slim

But sometimes they didn't laugh or even show up at the box office. Once, according to a journal he used to keep, Demarest was stranded in Ames, Iowa, and hopped a freight train for home. En route a heavy summer shower soaked him to the skin. He says, "When the rain stopped, I jumped off the train and laid down in a field to dry off. It wasn't until later that I found out I'd been lying in poison ivy!"

As the years went by, the act sometimes included just George and Willie, sometimes all three boys; and once, with the addition of a soubrette, it became the Demarest Road Show Company. They played street fairs, carnivals and small-town theaters. Once, in Sacramento, they were stranded for three weeks by floods and—harking back to their boyhood —sang and passed the hat in hotels.

After the act finally broke up in Los Angeles, Bill worked as a dancer and comedian in cabarets, had a shortlived boxing career as "Battling McGovern," and eventually walked from San Francisco to Stockton to join the Alcazar Theater Stock Company, where he played two seasons. When the United States entered World War I he went into the Army. He was a sergeant when the war ended.

Vaudeville and the movies

From Billboard magazine, 1927:

At the Palace (N.Y.), William Demarest is a cyclone of mirth.

A caption in Motion Picture magazine, 1927:

Warner's New Comedy Find-William Demarest.

By the mid-Twenties William Demarest was, to all intents and purposes, doing a "single" in vaudeville, although he worked with a number of feminine foils. He still used the cello in his act, but now when he made "the music swell from under his fingers," the audience reaction was laughter, because the emphasis was entirely on jokes and pratfalls. "I've done more pratfalls than any man on two feet," says Demarest. "Once a doctor told me I couldn't live till I was 50 if I kept on doing 'em."

But he kept on doing them with more and more success, until he was a headliner on the Keith and Orpheum circuits, at the fabled Palace in New York, and in the Earl Carroll "Vanities" and "Sketch Book" shows. He was a major vaudeville and musical comedy star when he went to Hollywood in 1927. His first picture, a silent. in which he played a gangster, was "Finger Prints," starring Louise Fazenda. He made 24 movies in the next two vears and then returned to vaudeville. In 1930 he headlined a bill featuring an orchestra called the California Collegians, whose saxophone player was a fellow named Fred MacMurray.

William Demarest went back to Hollywood in 1933 and has been there ever since. He quit vaudeville when, in St. Louis that year, he was asked to cut his one-hour stage revue to 11 minutes—just time to clear the house between showings of Mae West in "She Done Him Wrong." Demarest says, "I figured then and there that if that's what movies were doing to vaudeville, I was nuts to stay."

For a time he was a talent agent, but his appearances in two Preston Sturges screen classics, "The Great McGinty" and "The Miracle of Morgan's Creek," brought him to the prominence he has enjoyed since.

Demarest says he can't remember how many movies he has been in, but he says that the 100th was "Pardon My Past," with that same Fred Mac-Murray. He also likes to tell about the funny golf suit he wore in another picture with MacMurray, "Hands Across the Table," made more than 30 years ago. He says, "Last year I had to wear a funny golf suit in MyThree Sons, and it was the same suit from Western Costume that I wore in that picture 30 years ago!" Or perhaps this is one of the stories that MacMurray has in mind when he says, "Bill tells these stories and puts himself and me in them. Then he comes and tells me about them."

A postcard to CBS-TV, 1965:

Gentlemen:—I like the new guy better than the old guy.

Demarest's appearance as Uncle Charley in the long-running series "has given the show a new vitality," according to the director, James V. Kern. As for Demarest himself, although he admits that the work isn't as easy as it used to be, at 74 he still has no immediate intention of retiring. Recently he bought a home on the 12th fairway at Canyon Country Club in Palm Springs, where he plans to retire with his wife Lucille "in 10 years or so, when My Three Sons goes off." Meanwhile, he says, "My ambition is to score my age at golf." And since he shoots in the 80's, he will probably make it.



"What do you hear, baby?" PLENTY-and LITTLE of it GOOD

This unusually candid account of the rise and fall of The Sammy Davis Jr. Show consists of excerpts from a diary kept by the NBC publicist assigned to the series. In Part 1, published last week, the first show of the series proved to be a disaster. But Davis was determined to make his second show a triumphant one. Everyone who was present at the taping was convinced that it was a winner....

Jan. 24. After a visit to Sammy's offices. The show taped last week for Feb. 11 was so great that I began thinking why not treat it as though it were the premier show. Let's have a cocktail party for the press, show the tape and then let Sammy loose among them.

I presented Sammy with the idea and he went for it immediately. We set a date, Feb. 7. I now have only one problem: to make sure Sammy shows up.

Feb. 7. Immediately following the cocktail party and screening. Move over, Perle Mesta, you've got competition. The screening and party were

a smash. Sammy was "Harold Host" all the way. He greeted the guests saying, "The tape you are about to see is the result of reading your criticisms and then following your advice. So if you don't like what we got now . . . blame yourselves." Since he said it in a Jerry Lewis tone of voice, it broke up the crowd. At the party that followed, Sam was everywhere at once. He has a fantastic ability not only to mingle but to make people like him. His secret? He doesn't come on strong when under fire.

One revealing note: Sam kept sidling up to me, saying, "What do you hear, baby? Do you think they liked it?" They did, I assured him.

Feb. 12. Saturday morning at home. 10 A.M. If I had written the reviews myself, they couldn't have been better. Sam is jubilant on the phone. He's read all the reviews and now wants the national rating. It was bad . . . real bad. I gave him the news.

"What do you think, baby?" he asked.

"I don't know, Sam. I just don't

know," I replied. But I did know: We were in trouble.

Feb. 13. Sunday. Brooklyn Studio. Everyone was congratulating one another on the reviews. No one talked about the rating. It was a fairly easy taping day. Even Sam was relaxed.

It was a far cry from last week's taping, when Milton Berle had everybody climbing walls with his "ideas." Several times Sam looked as though he wanted to belt Berle, but he treated him as though Berle were an ancient Chinese uncle. He's obviously grateful to Berle for things Berle has done for him in the past. Everyone was sounding off about Berle—everyone but Sam, that is. The tape ran two hours late because of Berle's shenanigans.

Today was a different story entirely. Everybody kept his cool. Incidentally, I now find I'm doing exactly what I had found so distasteful in Sam and his group—those imitations he calls "Charlie Bits." I can't help myself. The magnetism of the man draws you to him. He's as boundless in warmth as he is in energy.

Feb. 19. Saturday. My apartment. Sam called. "What do you hear, baby?" The rating has settled into a groove—or should I say rut?—worse than anyone could have predicted. Now Sam's worried whether he'll be renewed for the fall.

Feb. 20. NBC Brooklyn Studios. Sunday. Considering the guests (long on names but short on talent), the show works well. Sam's having trouble getting really big names for the show. I don't understand that. Nor do I understand why Sam books people and acts that have no right to be on the show. Yes, I realize that these people are friends of his and that he either feels grateful to them or responsible for them, but he's risking his own neck. Where are Sam's socalled big friends? Why hasn't Sinatra, Dean Martin or Joey Bishop made an appearance?

Watching Sam on the set today made me wonder what people who don't know the score would think of the guy. He often appears tyrannical. He'll get away with all he can take, and since there is no one strong enough to oppose him, he takes plenty. Sam proves conclusively that you may be a great performer and still not necessarily know what is best for yourself or others. In short, Sam is not always the paragon of good taste. What still drives me nuts is the fact that none of the people paid to create the show or advise him will tell Sam.

Giving Sam his credit, I should mention something truly amazing. We've now done nine shows, and not once has he thrown a tantrum or read out a stagehand, musician, guest or whomever in front of people. And Sam does get angry. He has a boiling point, reached when he finds people don't always bring the same dedication to their work as he brings to his. When angry. Sam gets a hostile, sullen look on his face and simply turns his back on the proceedings and walks away. We've all come to know this look (if not necessarily love it). And once Sam acts this way, everybody hustles to correct what's wrong.

Feb. 23. NBC offices. NBC's first preliminary schedule for the fall has been released. Sam isn't on it. When he calls with the now usual question, for the first time in our relationship I tell an outright lie. Although I've been informed that Sam's return in the fall borders on the impossible, I tell him, "There's still a chance." So now I'm a liar. I can't help it. I've gotten too emotionally involved with the guy. I can't be the one to hurt him.

And this probable cancellation really hurts Sam. It amazes me. Here's a guy who has won countless awards, is a world-wide star, **continued**

and he's panicville because his show may be canceled. He can't accept defeat. He also can't accept, I fear, the knowledge that the whole world doesn't rush to tune in his show.

Feb. 27. NBC Brooklyn Studio. Sunday. Judy Garland is the guest today. More of that scene in a minute.

As he does every Sunday, Sam joins his fan club in the bleachers. When I first saw him doing it, I was shook. Stars, generally, don't mingle with their public. Sam's fan club comes every Sunday at the crack of dawn. They sit in the studio for hours. They don't gush or scream. They seem to know him well. Sam sits among them, listening to their problems or just chit-chatting with them. To the girls, he's father, brother and pal, depending on their need. Incidentally, it's an integrated group. Sam knows each girl by name.

Miss Garland looked so awful that when she walked right by me I didn't recognize her. She looks 20 years older than her age. She was suffering with extreme laryngitis and a severe case of nerves. Everyone in the studio was buzzing about her. Not Sam. He treated her as though she were Elizabeth the Queen. I have never seen such respect given by one performer to another. In front of others, he always addressed her as Miss Garland. If he was perturbed by her lack of voice, he made no mention of it. He personally guided her through her number and their 10-minute duet. Garland responds to him beautifully, but the voice simply isn't there.

At the end of dress rehearsal, just prior to the tape, everyone is not just concerned but terrified. Some suggest that Sam cut his medley with Garland and "wing it" for 10 minutes. Sam won't hear of it. "I won't hurt her," he says. He does, however, go to her dressing room for a talk. He returns saying, "She'll be great!"

Sam is either a magician or a hypnotist. Garland wasn't just great, she was all the things that have made her a legend in her time. And she looked marvelous. It was spooky as hell. I had the feeling two different women, bearing the same name but that's about all, had been in the studio.

Feb. 28. Immediately after a return from Sammy's offices. Had a talk with Sam today. I finally understand why he decided to enter TV at midseason —something few performers would attempt. He admits being advised against it by everyone, but says, "I'd have walked over their dead bodies to do it. It was a great opportunity for my people. I'm the first Negro to have an hour-long show in prime time. I couldn't turn that down."

Talking with Sam reminded me of something he said at our first knockdown, drag-out interview. I had asked him then what his show would be like. He answered: "This show is going to be *me*. I'm not going to just sing a song or two, introduce the guests and then run with the check to the nearest bank. If the show fails, I want the public and the critics to look to one person-me."

I advised him then not to go on record with this stance. His reply: "Why not? It's the truth, isn't it."

March 1. NBC offices. 5 P.M. Rumors are flying about Garland's laryngitis. Sam's furious. He's already booked her for an immediate return on next week's show to counteract the rumors.

March 4. Fraternal Club House. First full cast rehearsal. Sammy arrived wearing a neck brace. He looked like hell, but at least he arrived. Garland didn't, and neither did Sarah Vaughan. Garland's got the flu, and Vaughan? Well, she's reported to have a virus. Sam's steaming. Rightfully so. In recent months, she's been booked rarely on TV shows. Sam did because she's a friend of his. Now this. Terri Thornton is being pressed into service.

March 6. Brooklyn Studio. A disaster area. Garland is really ill. Despite giving it her all, she just doesn't make it. There wasn't time to write a duet between Sam and Terri Thornton to replace the one between him and Vaughan, so he and Frank Gorshin improvise. You could have seen better on Ted Mack's Amateur Hour.

Sam's planning a getaway to Hawaii for a week's vacation. It's apparent that he doesn't want to do another interview. Now that word is out that he's washed up on weekly TV, he doesn't want to be questioned about it. I've talked to him and is the wound ever raw!

Sam did pull one funny on the set today. After Murphy Bennett [Davis's aide] poured him some booze, Davis cracked, "Dean's the one who gets rapped for it but I'm the one who drinks." True enough. But I for one have never seen him so much as slightly bombed.

March 14. Sammy's offices. Sam's back from Hawaii, relaxed and, I was told, in good spirits. Oh yeah? I went up to the offices to discuss a possible magazine layout with him. He greeted me with a sloppy hug and kiss. This is normal with Sam and the people close to him.

Sammy wasn't himself today. Maybe that's wrong. Maybe he was himself but not the Sammy Davis we all think of. Midway in the talk between us, he picked up a trumpet and started blowing notes—not a tune, but notes. He was as far away as one can be without buying a train ticket. He then retired to his private office. When I went in to say good-by to him, I found him sitting behind his pool table, head in one hand, trumpet in the other and tears rolling down his cheeks. No, I don't know why. It made me think of what one of his guests, a gal who has worked with him on several occasions, said: "He's one of the loneliest men in the world."

March 16. NBC offices. Sam called and wanted to know if the fall schedule was now firm. I finally managed the truth. "Sam, we're through," I said. I felt like Brutus.

March 18. NBC offices. I persuaded Sam to sit for an interview with a reporter who was going to do a great piece about him—how he doesn't know what it means to quit, how he is still giving his all despite the fact the show's been canceled. One hour before the luncheon interview, Sam canceled. I doubt whether he'll do anything else I ask. He seems to feel I've let him down. I think he thought all the publicity would bring in an audience. How can I tell him it doesn't work that way?

March 20. Brooklyn Studio. Vince Edwards and Diahann Carroll are the guests today. It's a good show. Sam works as though it were the premier show and not the dregs. He's even enthusiastic about his last show coming up—a one-man affair. I can't think of another performer whose show had been canceled who would bother to do a one-man show. Most of them would just "phone in" their participation.

I'm stunned. It's like "The Three Faces of Eve." A third Sammy Davis appeared today. Guess it was always there, but I never noticed it before. First we have Sammy the swinger, the one who's "on" for strangers and groups. Then there's the Sammy who is real and honest. Finally there's the Sammy who puts on for people like Vince Edwards, Mel Tormé, Peter Lawford—people he considers hip. With them, he knocks himself out to show what a swinging, devil-maycare, funny, hip character continued

he is. It's vastly different from Sammy the swinger. This one is trying to impress people like Edwards, Tormé and Lawford. It's crazy. They should be trying to impress *him*.

March 22. At my home. On the basis of talks I've had with Shirley Rhodes [Davis's secretary], Murphy and Carol Kritz [associate producer of the show] and on the basis of my own experiences with Sam, it is now apparent to me that he requires a great deal of love and approval—much more than he would need if he could just see himself as he really is. Sam has more friends than any other performer I can think of. People love this guy. But he carries on as though he's an orphan.

I'm sure in Sammy's mind he still thinks of himself as the kid in the Army, the one who got stomped on, spat upon and beaten. One of Sam's friends told me, "Sam was called 'dirty nigger' so often that I think no matter what happens or who loves him, he still hears people calling him that." I think this is true largely because Sam knocks himself out in a vain attempt to make the whole world love him and to erase from his own mind those early years. But they can't be erased. They're written in indelible ink in Sammy's mind. So. Sam is out to win over every bigot in the world. For every nine he wins over, it's the one who got away that bugs him.

Sam has told me that he has no bitterness about the past. "Would I be enjoying the banquet today had there always been a feast?" he asked. He also said, "Bitterness makes for ugliness in a person and I can't afford that, as I'm none too pretty to begin with." Then he added. "I can't afford ugliness 'cause when I'm alone I have to look at myself. I have to like the man I see. If he isn't pretty, the awards, the applause, the money, they don't mean a damn thing."

April 3. Sunday. Brooklyn Studio. My last show with Sammy. I'm leaving for L.A. on company business.

Sam and I guarreled bitterly today. I was urging him to intercede with the NAACP and ask them to call off their plans to picket NBC for canceling his show. I pointed out that the NAACP didn't have a leg to stand on-that the ratings (we were at the bottom of the Nielsen pile) justified the network's cancellation of the show. I also pointed out that if Sam ever hoped to have a weekly series of his own again, an NAACP picket could scotch that dream forever. What advertisers would take the risk of hiring Sam if they knew they might incur the wrath of the Negro populace should they have to drop the show? I begged Sam, who actually was not and never was a part of the NAACP's plan, to ask them to call off the pickets. I felt Sam was being used for a cause, and whether or not that cause was just didn't concern me. My only concern was Sam.

Sam was furious, shouting I didn't understand and could never understand because I wasn't colored. "They're my people," he yelled, "and if they want to further the Negro cause by doing something through me, I'm not going to interfere."

We parted mutually unhappy with one another. I sulked all afternoon. Sam avoided me. Late in the day, he approached me.

"Listen, baby," he said, "can you do me a favor? Grab a date and represent me at the SNCC [Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee] dinner tonight. I've taken a table, but I can't make it 'cause the tape is running late. Someone *close to me* should attend. Will you go?"

I looked at him and with considerable difficulty managed to say, "Sam, you're something else!"


