

■ The rush to color television is a nation-wide phenomenon, but apparently viewers in some areas are rushing faster than others.

Take Muncie, Ind., so typically American that it was the scene of the famous sociological study, "Middletown." It is a normal, pleasant city on the White River, with a population of about 69,000, a state teachers college and industries ranging from batteries and bottles to card tables and lawn furniture. Muncie, for some reason, is America's No. 1 color-television city. Latest figures (ARB, March 1966) show that 21 percent of all television homes there have color sets—the highest saturation of any city.

■ Los Angeles has more color sets than any place else—698,300—but they're in only 20 percent of the city's television homes. New York has 597,100 color homes, a mere 9 percent saturation. Roughly, there are about 6.2 million color sets in the country, with about 11.3 percent of our television homes having color sets.

Manufacturers have geared up to turn out about 5 million sets by the end of 1966, which means that we'll have something over 11 million color receivers in our homes by the end of this year. Considering the fact that it wasn't until last season that all three networks scheduled regular color shows, that is an amazing figure.

Next season all regular nighttime network programs will be in color.

Few of color television's most enthusiastic boosters, and we were among them, could have predicted so many set sales so soon, and so dramatic a shift from black-and-white to color telecasting. What has happened, and is happening, is largely attributable to one man—RCA's Gen. David Sarnoff, whose faith in color TV and whose persistence in making sets and scheduling color shows on NBC started the color boom.

Peyton Place

In the simple days of radio it was a simple case of eating peanuts, of staunch and single-minded devotion to the Helen Trents, Gal Sundays or backstage, upstage and off-stage wives of the operatic sudslands. But now the affluent society won't settle for simplicities: No plebian peanuts, please. We'll take our emotional calories in assorted nuts, by the handful.

Thus Peyton Place snail-paces along toward its third season, with a switch to color in the fall and a slowdown from three to two weekly episodes the only novelties in sight. Or is there a surprise snugly tucked up some scriptwriter's sleeve? One of my secret suspicions, I'd better confess at the outset, is that Martin Peyton is going to turn out to be his own grandpaw. And I, I must note immodestly, had Steven and Ann's sibling situation all figured out from the first, and I just knew the Allison-Rodney bit would fizzle. So keep an eye on old Martin and that 28-year-old secret he and Mrs. Cord keep keening over.

"Keening" is the wakelike word, I'm afraid, for the single-minded monotony with which Peyton people face life, hunching over the ghastly sins and secrets that have taken place offscreen and long ago, and reveling in all the sorrows and suspicions and soul searching they produce on screen and in perpetuity. (Hey-maybe the big revelation will be that somewhere in Peyton Place there's somebody whose parents were a properly married unadulterous pair, whose birth was therefore legitimate and who has his 20th reached vear without having had a nervous breakdown. committed mayhem or even murder or, hope among hopes, stumbled upon the secret of his neighbor's sins!)

Somewhere and with some legitimacy in the early days of Peyton Place the rumor started that this was "higher class" than daytime soap opera-and a few of the performers manage at odd moments to revive the Certainly the production illusion. values are first class-and who among us will deny the eternity in Mia Farrow's wide, wide eyes? But keep a keen ear about you and the nearcamp dreariness of dialog-"I wonder if it's possible. . . . It's got to be possible": "I want to know who my father is-and I have a right to know"; "It's not too late, will or no will . . ."-takes you back to East Lynne: and the all-talk-and-slowmotion-action plunks you right down in Sudsville.

So forget the keen ear and face the fact that the program is designed for sporadic viewing. It was possible to keep track of things in the early days but more and more outlanders are drifting into the precinct. Blink an eye and there are three more mysteries on hand, with half-forgotten characters to go with them. Close an eye—and you might not want to reopen it. The effort is getting a bit much—and lower-calorie diets are healthier in the long, long run.

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A British wit argues
that the impact of television
may be a great deal less profound
than one might suppose

The sixth in a series of articles assessing television's effect on our society hough born well before the Television Age (in 1903), chance, cupidity, vanity and some genuine regard for the medium pitchforked me into becoming one of its regular practitioners. It all began with interviewing Billy Graham when he was conducting a Crusade in London.

Underneath the arc lamps, Graham told me how, before delivering one of his addresses to the assembled multitude, he was accustomed to eat a large, rare steak. Without thinking, I observed that, had the same practice been followed at the Last Supper, the whole subsequent story of Christendom would have been different. No trace of a smile appeared on the evangelist's handsome visage, but I realized that something had happened to me. I had become—to use a particularly odious expression—a television personality.

In pursuance of this role I have appeared in a great variety of programmes, sometimes abysmally, and sometimes with a measure of success; but I have never, truth to tell, derived from television appearances even the trifling satisfaction that popular journalism can give one.

Television has remained for me an alien medium. The camera, as it zooms in, seems a kind of Loch Ness Monster whose ravening bloodshot eye bodes ill; the waving microphone is a metallic apple offered by a relentless Eve with television aerials for hair and ratings on her breath.

Yet I have to confess that, of all the so-called wonders of our time, television may well be the most momentous. Nothing since the invention of printing has so drastically affected the way human beings live, think, and generally react to their circumstances.

Children, as I have read, look at the screen for an average of some 25 hours a week, and their school compositions clearly indicate that what they see on it, more than anything else, governs their present hopes and future aspirations. Adults, likewise, spend a high proportion of their leisure hours in viewing, or at any rate with their sets turned on. Elections are won and lost, songsters wax and wane, commodities are bought and sold, in accordance with their television presentation.

If Nixon had been better made up, without that devastating afternoon-shadow, for his encounters with the late President Kennedy, it is perhaps he who would have gone to the White House, and perhaps been assassinated at Dallas. Even General de Gaulle, to ensure victory at the polls in the latest French Presidential Election, was forced to seek the help of a Comédie Française man to improve his elocution, and to invoke the skills of Elizabeth Arden to repair his ravaged appearance.

Harold Wilson, notoriously, will drop anything and anyone when the cameras call; Sir Alec Douglas-Home was considered by his fellow Conservatives to be incapacitated for the premiership because he wore spectacles and had been endowed by nature with a bone-structure which made it difficult to smile and irresistibly suggested a death's-head.

It is the first time in human history that the destiny of nations has hung on such trivial infirmities. The world was shaken by Helen's smile and Cleopatra's nose, but never before by a fourteenth earl's rabbit teeth.

On the one hand, one has to recognize that television disposes of these fantastic powers of persuasion, far exceeding, in their immediate application at any rate, anything hitherto achieved by the written or the spoken word. On the other, one surveys with distaste bordering on horror its actual offerings.

It may confidently be asserted, without fear of contradiction, that the Top Twenty programs, in continued

both Britain and the United States. represent, in terms of fatuity, a lower level of entertainment than any hitherto publicly provided. The old music hall, as I remember it in my childhood, was, by comparison, a feast of reason and a flow of wit. Moreover, the standard, such as it is, declines visibly year by year. If, in the whole field of human endeavor, anything has been dredged up intrinsically sillier than, say, What's My Line? (which held the absorbed attention of a large proportion of British viewers for more than a decade), it has escaped my notice.

Are we to wring our hands?

Are we, then, to wring our hands and write television off as a dead loss, along with the Beatles, Elvis Presley and other dismal manifestations of the 20th Century? At my time of life it is tempting so to do. Let it be remembered, however, that, on the same line of reasoning, the invention of printing might be as summarily dismissed. After all, far more type is dedicated to *Peyton Place* and Playboy magazine than to "Paradise Lost" or "La Recherche du Temps Perdu."

It would surprise me if, over the years, the yield of all the composing rooms in all the world showed more than .001 percent which by any stretch of the imagination could be called literature. How tragic if, because men could be debauched by "Fanny Hill" and the works of the Marquis de Sade, they had been deprived of the solace of the New Testament and Shakespeare's plays, which also come to them largely through the printed word!

Nor is it true that, before television, those who now spend their evenings viewing sat at home doing embroidery or listening to "The Mill on the Floss" read aloud. They were much more likely to be out at the pub studying tomorrow's racing lineup or swapping dirty stories. If nowadays they regale themselves with Coronation Street or The Beverly Hillbillies, the change cannot be said to be perceptibly for the worse. The offerings of television may be, as has been suggested, a cultural wasteland, but what about what they replaced? Was that a well-tended garden?

Again, we should not discount what is being done by public-service television, even though, all too often, its particular predilections and portentousness amount to bias and taboos as gross as any commercial network's.

The other evening I happened to see a BBC production by Jonathan Miller of Plato's "Symposium" which was altogether enchanting. On American television I have seen some of the best documentaries ever produced. I do not, as it happens, care much for television drama, but without any question some of it, on both sides of the Atlantic, attains a high standard of excellence. The probability is that, by and large, the proportion of worthwhile offerings on television is at least as high as from any other of the mass media. This, admittedly, is not saying much, but it should be said.

What are the potentials?

What has to be considered is whether any of these media, television included, have, or may be expected to have, any serious artistic, cultural or intellectual potentialities. Take, for instance, the cinema. Think of all the wealth, talent, skills and endeavour which have been lavished on it in the last half century—more, I should say, far more, than produced the Italian Renaissance.

What is the yield in terms of films of enduring worth and interest? Vir-

tually nil. We may enjoy, for sentimental or antiquarian reasons, looking at an old Greta Garbo film, or a Chaplin or Marx Brothers comedy, but these are not the equivalent of even a minor work or art.

The Elizabethan stage, with all its crudities and imperfections, was responsible for a good part of the best dramatic literature available in the English language today. One evening at the Globe Theatre would have been more rewarding than all Hollywood's output. I put this point to that brilliant young film director, Richard Lester, in the course of a recent television interview. He just sadly shook his head, as well he might.

Accept the limitations

Are we not, then, driven to the conclusion that mass media are, by their very nature, intrinsically inimical to art, literature, and, as I should add, thought? Does not the mere process of preparing a spectacle for millions of eyes preclude artistic excellence, intellectual subtlety, and even, in absolute terms, truth?

Suppose the preaching of the Sermon on the Mount had been film-recorded and presented on television at a peak hour. Probably it would have had no impact at all. Conceived in one sublime mind, spoken by one inspired voice to an obscure little gathering in an obscure land, it has echoed round the world and captivated mankind for 2000 years.

It would seem to me to be much more sensible to accept the limitations of television, in this sense, rather than to strain after effects which, by virtue of its very nature, cannot be achieved. We do not expect tabloid newspapers to serialize Kierkegaard, or women's magazines to run extracts from Thomas à Kempis.

Why, then, should television be expected to manifest its seriousness and


concern for culture by every now and again putting on a ham-fisted production of "King Lear," or mounting a boring lecture on the French Impressionists? When, owing to an aberration in high places, something of the kind is attempted, the result, not surprisingly, is liable to be abysmal.

Far better, I should have thought, to concentrate on improving the quality and integrity of what television can do, such as news, comedy shows, soap opera, and so on, than to moan over what it cannot. As well complain about Coney Island's lack of rural amenities as about television's cultural deficiencies.


Thus meditating, it occurs to me that television may, after all, in the end prove to have been less momentous in its impact than I and many others have supposed. Just because a lot of people look at it compulsively for hours on end, or at any rate like to have it on when they are around, does not necessarily prove that they are influenced by it other than superficially.

A blissful ignorance

People have been known to look at building sites or railway tracks for hours on end without being noticeably affected thereby. Whenever I have dark thoughts about television I always recollect one comforting circumstance connected with appearing on it. It is this. Among all the people who at different times and in different places have come up to me to tell me they have seen me on the telly, not one has ever so much as mentioned, let alone quoted, anything I have said. May not the same blissful ignorance apply to all the otherscrackpots, politicians, clerics, actresses and God knows who-who air their views on the medium? If so, how splendid!



A LATTER-DAY MERLIN WHIPS UP MAGIC



Itting in the garage of his Santa Monica, Cal., home, surrounded by lathes, drills, motors, books and file cabinets, Ken Strickfaden, 70, insists his electronics special-effects business is now a hobby. "It's a hobby I can ride instead of the hobby riding me. However, I sometimes ask myself, "Why am I doing this when the lawn needs mowing." My wife also asks that."

"Retired" since 1960, Strickfaden must admit that his business is more than a hobby. Though he is not as active as he used to be (he has been creating electronics magic in Hollywood since the days of silent movies), he still manages to throw off sparks, weird lighting effects and electronic flashes for movies and television more than occasionally.

At left he is shown working on some gaudy effects for The Munsters. The de-

scriptions are his:

At the far left, the ball-like object on top of the cone is what Strickfaden calls a "brainwasher." It controls a mind the way a "mad scientist controls a zombie." Below this is an "aurora generator cyclotron," the purpose of which is to "create images that look like the Hollywood Bowl with teeth in it."

The flashing circle is a "lightning screen." "Each flash lasts 40 millionths of a second. . . . It's used for studying the human gura, the emanation from a

human."

The object that might be the skeleton of a coffee urn, with flames inside, is a "plasmatron." "It's been used in a lot of movies as laboratory equipment that creates or gives life." And the spark-issuing "pyrogeyser" in front of Strickfaden is so hot, he says, it "vaporizes continued

auto axles. It doesn't melt 'em; it vaporizes 'em."

Though a visitor might grow a little suspicious, Strickfaden maintains a dead pan as he expounds. He goes on to say that while his inventions are put together with salvage materials—from parts of airplanes, cars, electrical gadgets—to him the end product is priceless and invaluable. "After all," he says, "this is my life's blood."

As for criticism, he brooks none. After all, who is to say him nay, no matter how erudite electronically. As he puts it, "I'm way out in the future. So nobody can question me and say something isn't authentic."

New Network: The birth of a new commercial network was announced in New York last week—the fourth for the U.S. and the first since the establishment of ABC-TV 18 years ago. Daniel H. Overmyer, president of the Overmyer Company, Inc., giant warehouse organization, is chairman of the new broadcasting setup, the Overmyer Network—to be known as ON.

Scheduled to debut on the first Monday after Labor Day 1967, the network will feed its affiliates news, sports, public-service and entertainment programs eight hours daily.

Oliver E. Treyz, former president of ABC-TV, will be president of the new network. He was quoted as saying it would offer cultural programming of a type not now being offered by the regular networks, but he tempered this with a further statement that: "Our first objective is to be competitive with other networks."

Overmyer has lined up 35 stations thus far, expects to have 100 by debut-day. The Overmyer organization also includes six UHF stations, a newspaper, a bank and other enterprises.

Jumping the Gun: ABC-TV, after vigorously exploring the possibility of starting its 1966-67 season one week earlier than the already announced Sept. 11, said that it would definitely kick off Sept. 6, the day after Labor

Day. In doing so, it will be repeating its 1963 and 1964 practice of starting its season ahead of its two rivals. Last year the debut race ended in a dead heat.

Oops! Slipped!: Two of television's more acrobatic heroes came a cropper at widely different points of the compass: Filming in Mexico City's Chapultepec Park, the newest Tarzan (Ron Ely), slipped while swinging from vine to vine, and was hospitalized for a broken collarbone and two fractured ribs. Thus far Ely has sustained multiple scratches and bruises, twisted an ankle, pulled a leg muscle and slipped a disc. Said he manfully from his hospital bed: "This could easily have happened to the real Tarzan." (the real Tarzan?) . . . and in New York, the city fathers, on behalf of creditors and for other considerations. were looking into the flop of the "Batman Concert," which, complete with Adam West and a regiment of rock 'n' rollers, had played at Shea Stadium before only 3000 people at each of its two performances. Two other shows were cancelled.

THE GREAT WOMAN HUNT

The search for a 'What's My Line?' panelist to replace Dorothy Kilgallen has reached prodigious proportions

t 10:50 P.M., Nov. 7, 1965, Dorothy Kilgallen, the newspaper columnist, appearing for her 16th consecutive year on the television panel show What's My Line?, correctly identified the occupation of one of the contestants, a woman who sold dynamite. She smiled at the cameras and continued until the conclusion of the show her spirited, district-attorney-type questioning.

At 11:15 Miss Kilgallen headed for home to write her Monday column, "The Voice of Broadway." At 3:30 A.M. she slipped the column under the door of her town house to a

waiting messenger. Then she got into bed and opened "The Honey Badger," a novel by the late Robert Ruark, and prepared to welcome sleep. She never woke up.

Miss Kilgallen's unintentional death (by alcohol-barbiturate poisoning, according to the medical examiner) at the age of 52 caused shock waves throughout the world—but nowhere were the tremors more devastatingly felt than on the 30th floor of the glassy-glossy Seagram Building in New York City. This is the aerie which houses Goodson-Todman Productions, producers of

What's My Line?, as well as such other panel shows as To Tell the Truth and I've Got a Secret.

There already was trouble with What's My Line?, flagship of the Goodson-Todman fleet of trivia galleons: After 16 years on the air, it was showing its age and developing creaks of the Nielsen in its venerable beams. Now with the sharp-witted and acerbic Dorothy Kilgallen suddenly and irrevocably gone, there was panic in the carpeted corridors of Goodson-Todman Productions.

Who next?

Early Tuesday morning executive producer Gil Fates and associate producer Bob Bach, together with Line director Franklin Heller, were summoned by Bill Todman to join him in the leather-covered and book-lined office of Mark Goodson. There a melancholy meeting got under way. The show must go on. But how? And with whom?

From that meeting there began one of the most determined woman hunts since David Selznick set out to find someone to play Scarlett O'Hara in "Gone with the Wind."

The Line executives soon found out that every lady with two arms, two legs and one agent believed herself to be The One to inherit the \$1000-a-week job. After they had sorted through dozens of biographies and photographs thoughtfully provided by the ladies' agents, it became obvious that the search would break down essentially into three basic categories.

The first category might be called The Farm System. For example, up from To Tell the Truth came Kitty Carlisle to play the first show after Kilgallen's death. It didn't work. As Tony Randall, one of Line's most regular irregulars, explained, "Arlene Francis is adorable. Kitty is adorable.

And two 'adorables' on the same show was one adorable too many."

The second category could be entitled The Valiant Veterans. These are the ladies who pop up as regularly on panel or discussion shows as Flipper the porpoise surfaces for fish. Notable among the Line candidates from this group was psychologist Dr. Joyce Brothers, who first gained fame with the TV guiz shows of the 1950's. Dr. Joyce arrived for her appearance on What's My Line? with a new hairdo, a new gown and an anthology of self-composed poesy with which she hoped to charm the powers-that-be. She began by introducing what appeared to be a horrified Arlene Francis as follows: "I'd sure like to be Arlene Francis / She's the gal who knows all the ansiss."

Dr. Joyce festooned the show with similar emissions of poetry, and at one point several Goodson-Todman executives were noted to be holding their heads in despair.

The third category of aspirants in The Great Woman Hunt might be thought of as The Everywoman Group—new and comparatively new faces, at least on TV game shows. On this vast and ever-growing list were—and are—such formidable females as film critic Judith Crist, author and magazine editor Helen Gurley Brown, Jayne Meadows, Hollywood columnist Sheilah Graham, Joanna Barnes, Joan Fontaine, Dina Merrill, Betsy Von Furstenberg, former CBS weather girl Jean Paar, Pamela Mason—and even me.

This is the most promising but always has been the most hazardous of the three groups of candidates. One highly intelligent lady from the world of politics, for example, froze completely as soon as she got on camera. The rest of the panel covered for her, but as a result they looked inept, too.

In all categories the aim seems to be the same: Find another Kilgallen. The super-lady who will replace her is almost always described as what Dorothy was. Producer Gil Fates told me, "In a way you might say Dorothy was the 'Game.' She was its native protagonist. She played with such an intensity and wild will to win that she communicated that desire to the audience." Another executive of the show says, "Let's face it. Dorothy was the hate-figure of the panel. People used to watch in hopes of seeing her fall on her face."

The Game's the thing

Bennett Cerf believes that whoever is finally turned up by The Great Woman Hunt has to care more about playing the Game than anything else she may ever do. He recalled the evening not too long before she died when Dorothy finished the show, walked off the stage and burst into tears. Cerf thought she must be sick and he rushed over and asked what was wrong. "Do you know," she bawled, "that I haven't guessed anybody for three whole weeks?" Cerf said, "After 15 years she was still fighting and driving to win."

The Great Woman Hunt is now in its second half year and it has yet to turn up a positive winner. To most What's My Line? televiewers, it would appear as if the Kilgallen chair is being filled each week with a guest—just as the show has done with the Fred Allen spot since his death in 1956. "However," says co-producer Mark Goodson, "Dorothy will be permanently replaced. We'll keep looking for women and testing them until we find the right person—even if it takes the next six years."

And so, nearly every day in the week, one hopeful or another is interviewed or tested for the vacant chair on the show. The hopeful is solemnly ushered into the executive conference room to face—usually—the gray-haired director Frank Heller, the dour Bob Bach and the tall and

crew-cut Gil Fates. Two pages of mimeographed requisite questions which should be asked in both the "product" and "service" categories of What's My Line? are slipped under her nose. These she never gets to look at until she leaves. Now she plays the Game. And plays the Game. And plays the Game. And leaves—dizzy from firing questions, guessing right once or twice or not at all.

She may be puzzled, too, as to who is minding the store on the 30th floor. Almost all day these grown men play the Game. Should she be asked to lunch with one of them, he will take her to a very nice restaurant, sit down and say, "That girl sitting at the third table to your right is, uh, salaried and deals in a product." And before a menu is proffered, Hopeful is off and playing the Game again.

Another method

There is another testing method occasionally employed. Joanna Barnes, for example, received a phone call suddenly from Mark Goodson, who invited her and her husband to a dinner party at his sumptuous New York City town house. Confused because she didn't know him very well, Joanna accepted. She expected a pleasant evening of chitchat among the celebrities Goodson likes to surround himself with. Instead Goodson said to her, "I liked you on Password. Now let's play What's My Line?"

That they did, with all the other guests, for the rest of the evening. The following week Joanna was booked for an appearance on the show itself. Editor Helen Gurley Brown, among others, also has been subjected to this technique.

So far three front-running candi-

dates seem to have emerged from this exhaustive winnowing process. Although Goodson repeatedly has stated that he does not want an actress to fill the Kilgallen spot, ac-continued

tress Phyllis Newman currently is one of those in favor. Miss Newman is bright, witty and acidic. Goodson does not consider her an actress, but rather a political expert—by reason of her participation in *That Was the Week That Was*, the current-events satire show of a couple of seasons ago.

Another front-runner is Sue Oakland (the wife of TV producer Ted Cott), whose principal fame heretofore has been as a model, gargling in mouth-wash commercials. But Miss Oakland is a startlingly unusual girl. Besides being breath-takingly beautiful and gowned, she is a near-genius, with a Master's degree in political science from Columbia University and with one lovely leg up on a Ph.D.

Miss Oakland's What's My Line? candidacy took a sharp rise up when, after her appearance on the show, in which she correctly identified a lady underwater stunt swimmer, she attended a Bennett Cerf party at which Frank Sinatra was the most distinguished guest. As she entered the room, Goodson heard Sinatra say to Cerf, "I don't know who she is but I'll marry her." At that moment Sue shot to the head of the class.

Aileen Mehle, who hides behind the King Features Syndicate pseudonym Suzy Knickerbocker, and whose snippy, irreverent society column appears in 60 newspapers in the United States, is perhaps the most serious contender of them all. Though physically she does not resemble Dorothy Kilgallen, her driving tenacity, her eagerness to be "in" with the "innest" groups, her will to win and her excellence in verbal karate, does remind one of Miss Kilgallen.

A petite, two-time divorcée, exgrade-school teacher and mother of a 22-year-old son, Suzy tested at Goodson's house and already has made three successful appearances on the show. She received the highest praise from the 30th floor for her brilliance in correctly identifying an astronaut launcher.

"We can make a panelist look good if we want to," said Bennett Cerf. "It's perfectly fair to ask for a conference among ourselves or a recapitulation of the question asked. It's a big help to a new panelist."

Suzy admits the panel did "help" her. She is a friend of the three regulars, Cerf, Arlene Francis and John Daly, and their names appear frequently in her column.

The hunt goes on

But The Great Woman Hunt goes on. The Kilgallen replacement may be found soon—from among the three leading candidates, or with an as-yet unidentified dark horse. On the other hand, the search may continue for months or years before the proper balance is restored to the panel.

Even if a permanent replacement is named, it may not represent a permanent solution. The What's My Line? group is the most clannish in the entertainment industry, and as host John Daly recently remarked, not without ominous overtones, "The search is like finding Cinderella. We have to be sure her foot fits into the glass slipper. If she doesn't fit into our family, we'll just freeze her out."

In a way, therefore, The Great Woman Hunt has taken on some of the aspects of daytime TV soap opera. In the language of that medium, one may ask: Can a girl be found who can win the hearts of a great, established family, still grieving the loss of one of its most beloved members? Can she discover true happiness for herself within the family while trying to fill the aching void left by her predecessor? Or will her struggle for acceptance bring about the destruction of the entire, proud, 16-year dynasty?

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
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DOSSIER ON STEPHIEN BROOKS

That other 'FBI' agent, only 23, has received some recognition from Jayne Mansfield and is due for a lot more from Uncle Sam

"We moved around a lot while I was little—from Columbus to Washington, where my father was stationed during the war, then to Pittsburgh and finally to Chicago when I was 7 years old. I was just 16 when my father died. That's tough to take. He's there—you say good-by in the morning when you go to school—then you get home and he's gone."

EDUCATED: New Trier Township High School, Winnetka, Ill. Outstanding swimmer and football player. Starred in high school productions of "Pygmalion" and "Plain and Fancy," latter opposite Ann-Margret Olson, now screen star Ann-Margret.

"I did my first acting in the eighth grade, playing George Gibbs in 'Our Town.' I surprised everybody because

I had always been taciturn and introverted in school-I really shocked my mother. In high school I decided once and for all that I wanted to be an actor. My folks wanted me to go to Yale, but I just goofed off my last two years of high school. I had a dogeared copy of Stanislavsky and thought I was Marlon Brando. Before that I thought I was Gene Autry or Buster Crabbe. A lot of well-known actors have gone to New Trier High-Charlton Heston, Rock Hudson, Hugh O'Brian, Ralph Bellamy and, of course, Ann-Margret. She was shy and sensible in those days."

Ann-Margret: "He had a very

interesting quality."

OCCUPATION: Actor. Attended American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York for two years. Appeared in summer stock and on various TV programs, including The Nurses (continuing role of Dr. Ned Lowry) and the Hallmark Hall of Fame production "Little Moon of Alban," starring Julie Harris; played opposite Jayne Mansfield in road company of "Bus Stop." Now at Warner Bros., co-starring with Efrem Zimbalist Jr. as Special Agent Jim Rhodes in The FBI for ABC-TV.

"My mother subsidized me while I was studying in New York, but most of the money went for beer. My mother would have sent me more, but I was embarrassed to ask. continued

I lived on spaghetti most of the time-I never want to see it again. That's why I save like crazy now. I never again want to go through what I went through in New York.

"But actually I never had to hustle-sometimes it scares me. I got my first break three months after I finished at the Academy, and I've been working ever since. I had to change my name because there was another actor named James Brooks. My family and old friends still call me Jim.

"Once when I was playing summer stock at a theater-in-the-round, I was stage manager and actor. As stage manager I had 15 seconds between scenes to run on stage, pick up a ball of yarn that was a prop and then get off while the stage was still dark, The varn unrolled all over the stage, and I was caught out there when the lights came up. In 'Little Moon of Alban' I got killed. I had balloons full of red paint around my waist that I was supposed to squeeze as I was dying. But they began to leak 10 minutes before I got shot!

"Acting is just playing cops and robbers-it's basically childish. But there is still something difficult about putting one foot in front of the other when you're on stage or before a camera. Actors who sit around talking about their craft all the time bore me. I avoided them in New York. I'd sit on the river bank reading a magazine and sunning myself-getting

ahead in my chosen field.

"I go out of my way not to be actorish-I try to avoid that syndrome. But if I'm ever a star, I want to be a star star. I don't want to fall into the TV trap and go from one series to another. Still I'd like to be an actor more than a movie star. But nowadays I seem to spend a lot of time just following Efrem through doorways or else trying to remember to keep my hands out of my pockets like a good FBI man."

Mark Landia, classmate at American Academy: "It beats walking up and down 52nd in a dirty trench coat."

Jayne Mansfield: "He was a marvelous leading man. He's virile, goodlooking, has beautiful eyes, nice teeth and a fine build, but more important than anything, he's a conscientious and dedicated actor. I never had a romance with him-he was just a cute, nice guy I liked very much. I think he has what it takes to be a big star. I'd love to play opposite him again."

Efrem Zimbalist Jr.: "He is amazingly mature. Every once in a while I have to pause and remind myself how young he really is."

Mark Landia: "At the Academy everybody had some sort of far-out quality, but Jim was always comfortable."

PRESENT WHEREABOUTS: When not working, lives in \$150-a-month, first-floor apartment of furnished duplex in a West Los Angeles canyon. Small kitchen. Bedroom. Paneled living room, musty even on sunny days, has aquarium stocked with two goldfish and bar stocked with one bottle of Scotch.


"I have no hobbies really, but I do like to draw and play the piano. It's a coincidence that both Efrem and I come from musical familieshis father was a great violinist and so was my grandfather, Peter Froehlich. My father played the piano, too. I'd like to get a piano for this place.

"I'm not a gregarious sort of person -I find it isn't too much trouble to be alone. I always wanted to be odd, but I'm not, damn it, and I've learned to live with it. 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


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In this era of emphasis upon the ethnic, an actress named Shelley Morrison has a lot going for her. In NBC's Laredo, she plays the part of a funny Indian, Linda Little Trees, a slatternly squaw with a stuffed bird on her hat, who, it has been said, "combines all the cool of Geronimo with all the resourcefulness of General Patton—and imparts it with the throbbing emotion of Buster Keaton."

Her name, Shelley Morrison, is, of course, nothing if not Anglo-Saxon. Actually, her parents came from Turkey, she was born in the Bronx, and at home the family speaks a language called Ladino, a combination of Spanish and Hebrew. Her real name is Mitrani—Rachel Mitrani—which is Italian, picked up by her forebears en route from Spain to Turkey at the time of the Inquisition.

She came by the name Shelley Morrison logically. As Rachel, she was called Rah-shell and had already become Shelley when she was graduated from high school in Los Angeles, where her parents moved when she was 9. Later on, as an actress, she decided to drop Mitrani for fear of being cast always as an Italian. Since her father's name is Maurice, pronounced Morris, she picked Morrison.

And so she became an Indian in Laredo. Because of the nature of the role she had been told not to dress glamorously for her audition interview with the program's co-producer, Howard Christie. (Not that she considers herself glamorous: character actress. When they tell me to bob my nose and fix my teeth I say, 'Are you going to pay for it?'") But she did get all gussied up for the occasion. She says, "I really didn't think I'd get the part, and I wanted to make some sort of impression." To her surprise she was signed without even being asked to read, which is almost unprecedented, Today Christie says, "It was one of those instincts you have. All she did was give me some dead-pan looks, and I started laughing."

When television viewers saw the dead-pan looks they started laughing too. Linda Little Trees was originally scheduled for only one appearance in Laredo, but she started getting so much mail that she was hastily written into later episodes and now may become a regularly featured character in the series. All of which delights Shelley Morrison, who says, "For 11 years you wait for a part, and this is the part."

Over the 11 years the parts have been in 70 different plays, including "Orpheus Descending" when she was 23 (she is now 29), and in such television shows as Dr. Kildare, The Farmer's Daughter, The Fugitive, Adventures in Paradise, My Favorite Martian and Gunsmoke. When she finished a scene which Gunsmoke's Milburn (Doc) Stone described as the best that had ever been done on the program, she began to cry. Later Stone said, "This gal is a great actress." Many of the nuances and offbeat bits of business of Linda Little Trees are her own creations.

Shelley Morrison studied acting at Los Angeles City College, where she took all the drama courses but was never graduated. Probably her major task was getting rid of her Bronx accent. She says, "When I came out here, I talked like Judy Holliday." Today, Miss Morrison lives in an apartment above a garage next door to her parents on the edge of Beverly Hills. She is engaged to an actor. Michael Pataki. She enjoys reading history and philosophy. Unlike many actresses, she has no ambitions to be a big star but is happy with what has happened to her so far.

"Sometimes," she says, "I'm so grateful, my teeth hurt."
