

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

AMERICA'S GREAT SPECTATOR SPORT

It's the TV game show, and its popularity raises some fascinating questions about the networks' basic program thinking

lways a staple of network TV, game shows account, this season, for an impressive portion of daytime programming. Out of some 110 hours of weekday network television—otherwise largely devoted to reruns and soap operas—some 32 hours are turned over to games. Indeed, with a brief break for lunch, it is possible to watch 13 game shows in a row from 10 A.M. to 4:30 P.M.—two on CBS, three on ABC, and eight on NBC.

Although it might be described as a minority phenomenon—soaps being far and away the most popular daytime fare—this run of games is particularly startling when one considers that between 10 and 4:30, the Nation's youngsters and adolescents, who form such a huge part of the nighttime audience, are locked away in schools. These shows were unmistakably planned for adults and are unmistakably being watched by adults—about 45,000,000 weekly, 35,-000,000 women, 10,000,000 men.

What does this adult craving for games actually mean?

If one settles down in front of the set and watches the full sequence of game shows, one will rapidly discover that the games themselves are not stupid. In almost every case, they require some sort of specialized knowledge and highly developed mental skill. Even the much-lamented Supermarket Sweep, which has been written off by casual observers as a graceless plundering of supermarket shelves, actually requires detailed knowledge of market prices plus the ability to make arithmetical calculations, involving fractions, at high speed. Most of the game shows, in fact, are actually a series of highspeed, specialized tests of wits. One might almost describe them as little "IQ tests."

The men who create and preside over these shows confirm the fact that the basic appeal of the games is intellectual:

"To watch a TV game," says Bob Stewart, one of the creators of Password and To Tell the Truth, "is to watch the mental agility of other people. You can match your own skills with the players. People like to use their own intelligence and to see others use theirs."

"The only game shows which succeed are those which stimulate the viewer intellectually," says Ed Vane, director of daytime programming at ABC.

"TV games are popular because they test people's ability to think under stress. This has always interested people. Human beings have a survival need to keep their wits strong and alert," says Gene Rayburn, emcee of *The Match Game*.

"These shows succeed because human beings enjoy mental gymnastics. Man is a thinking animal. He enjoys solving problems," says Bill Malone, emcee of Supermarket Sweep.

"It's not accidental that Password, which is primarily dependent on deductive reasoning, is one of the most popular game shows on the air. Logical reasoning is very attractive to people," says Allen Ludden, host of Password.

Larry White, vice president in charge of daytime programming at NBC, thus sums it up: "TV games give people a chance to test themselves on general knowledge, specialized information, observation, recall, judgment, deductive abilities. They are popular because they test intellectual qualities. Mental tests, tests of wits, are always very absorbing to people."

Outside of the TV world, various authorities also support this interpretation. Detroit psychologist Roger Callahan, ex-president of the Michigan Society of School Psychologists. declares, "The appeal of the game shows is the same as the appeal of all quizzes and parlor games-they give people an opportunity to exercise their minds." Professor Herbert Hyman, head of Columbia University's graduate department of sociology, declares that several elements probably make game shows popular, suggesting the "traditional American pleasure in a contest" and the "intellectual pleasure of play," among them. Boston psychologist Barbara Klein similarly says: "The appeal of the game shows is obviously intellectual. Very often the excitement lies in highspeed deduction."

It's not greed

It is worth noting that the charge of "greed" for prizes-an interpretation of game-show popularity which has often been leveled against the public-is rejected by almost all these people. Only sociologist Hyman suggests that there may be some viewer "delight in ill-gotten gains." The others write off the public's interest in the monetary rewards as insignificant. "Greed is one of those hokey, wornout clichés about game shows," says Mark Goodson, producer of many of the games on the air. "Ask people what the prizes are on most of these shows-they can't even continued

remember." Psychologists Klein and Callahan support this, respectively calling the hypothesis of collective vicarious greed "absurd," and "rationally unfounded."

If, as is suggested, an important reason for the popularity of the game shows lies in their intellectual appeal, it seems clear that many million adult viewers of daytime TV are being seriously underestimated. This is definitely the view of the game-show men who work closely with the public.

"I've learned from my experience with the game shows, that there are millions and millions of mature, alert intelligences in this country," says

Allen Ludden.

"The game shows," says Bill Malone, "reveal that native intelligence—not necessarily educated intelligence, but native intelligence—in the viewer is far higher than it is said to be."

"If there's a receptive audience for any intelligent, challenging, thoughtprovoking game," says Stewart, "then one has every right to assume that it is intelligent—that there is popular intelligence out there."

Over and over, the game-show specialists insist that the daytime audience needs and would appreciate more intellectually demanding shows. "They're hungry for the sight of brightness on the air," says Stewart. "They're starving for intelligent programming," says Ludden. It is the conviction of these men that an adult audience which genuinely craves mental stimulation can be provided with more substantial fare by the networks.

When this conviction is presented to the network executives, however, it meets with a sharp and instantaneous rebuttal.

No, say the network programmers, more mentally demanding shows cannot be offered to the daytime audience: Says Larry White of NBC, the network responsible for the majority of game shows on the air, "Most of the daytime viewers are women. They're working during these hours—washing dishes, making the beds, answering the doorbell, taking care of the babies. They don't have the time or inclination to watch more demanding shows." ABC's Ed Vane makes identically the same point.

And both executives hasten to add that the rare experiments in "intellectual" programming in the daytime hours have not been successful. "If you put an intellectual show on the air," says Larry White, "you know what kind of ratings you'll get." And says Ed Vane, "People are not looking to television for an expansion of their intellectual range. They are not looking for an exhaustive intellectual experience."

'Intellectual' shows fail

What is the evidence for this view which contradicts the earlier observation? It lies in the relative nonsuccess of such news-and-talk shows as Calendar with Harry Reasoner, the Mike Wallace news show, and more recently, Phyllis Kirk's The Young Set-all of which appeared on TV with a great hullabaloo about upgrading daytime programming and were calmly ignored by most of the daytime audience. "It's hard enough to get an audience for intellectual shows at night," says Larry White. "Look at CBS Reports, look at East Side/West Side. If you put an intellectual show on in the daytime, you'd get zero ratings." "It's hopeless," says Ed Vane. "If it's intellectual, they just won't watch."

The game-show men, however, repudiate this reasoning. Says Ludden: "The networks simply don't understand the difference between native intelligence and public-affairs stuffiness. The viewers are not academic squares, but that doesn't mean they

have 12-year-old minds." Malone demands: "Who's deciding what's intellectual anyway? It sounds to me like demagoguery, as if a small group of people have set themselves up to decide what is and what isn't a proof of intelligence." Stewart, too, declares that TV is abnormally polarized between public-affairs shows and inane fiction: "There's very little on the air today that an intelligent but not highly educated mind can find satisfying."

Intellectual or merely dull?

Both psychologists interviewed also reject out of hand the network executives' notion of "intellectuality." Psychologist Callahan declares. often, what passes for intellectual programming on the networks isn't intellectual at all. Too often, it consists of dull, unresolved drama; dull, unresolved discussions; and dull, unresolved public-affairs shows, to which the only appropriate response is-so what? Such shows are mentally frustrating. Most viewers reject them day and night-and rightly so. To judge people as intellectually deficient because they repudiate such shows is absurd "

Psychologist Klein criticizes as "nonsense" the network view that intellectual capacity is determined by a response to any specific category of subject matter or program—and adds: "All that exists in the way of a mental classification of our populace is a bell-shaped curve, representing the full sweep of human intelligence. The networks could reflect three-quarters of this curve, from modest normal up to genius, if they chose to do so. Unfortunately, they don't so choose."

And here the debate ends, as such debates always end—in the full bloom of nonresolution. A pitched battle over the intellectual level of viewers is not a new phenomenon. There is hardly a recorded discussion of any TV programming problem, day

or night, which does not dip into the complex question of audience intelligence.

This particular debate, however, is unique in that the advocates of more intelligent programming are not basing their argument on the minority success of prestige nighttime publicaffairs shows—but on the minority success of humble daytime game shows. They are not speaking in the name of the formally educated—but in the name of the natively intelligent.

It is a curious fact that native intelligence in the mass audience is rarely mentioned in all the brouhaha about TV programming. Indeed, the issue has been totally neglected in all the broadcasters' earnest studies of the public. According to ABC's Ed Vane, the mass audience, both day and night, has been weighed and measured in almost every material respect: amount of income, number of years of formal schooling, number of children, number of cars, number of washing machines, to mention a few. But no one has yet produced a study for broadcasters on the number of brains-the number of just plain bright people in both the day and the nighttime audiences

Prevalence of good minds

It should be done. Perhaps it can be established that there are many millions of modestly schooled adults in this country who have good minds, and who would actively welcome more intelligent programming. If this is so -and the bell-shaped IQ curve suggests that it is-the networks should make it their business to acknowledge the phenomenon of popular intelligence and program for it accordingly. Indeed, the formal recognition at broadcast headquarters of the existence of multimillions of intelligent "common" men and women could have a profoundly salutary effect on U.S. television.


plane about once a week.



has flown as a passenger in their jets.

Susan Oliver, a licensed pilot, says she decided to take flying lessons after a friend "took me up at night to see the lights of Los Angeles." To her, flying is an escape from this nebulous world that we live in. "When you're flying, you are so absorbed that it gets your mind off everythina."

Fess Parker, TV's frontiersman Daniel Boone, is a vintage-aircraft pilot. He owns a 23-year-old Fairchild PT 26. Fess, an aviator for more than five years, also has a

multi-engine license.

"I fly for relaxation," he says. "There's a beauty to be seen from the air, and I enjoy just kind of sight-seeing. Long flights in antique aircraft, or even some of the better machines available now, really get to be a pain. But for short flights, to Santa Barbara, San Diego or San Francisco, that's fun.

"Flying is a kind of bug that you never get over. And these old airplanes are just fantastic. I've ridden in a 1928 Gypsy Moth that was a fantastic airplane, a great trainer."

Paul Burke, now resident colonel on 12 O'clock High, who took over from Lansing, is in the student-pilot category. "I started it just a few months ago," he says. "Because of the show, I wanted to experience what flying is all about, to get the feeling of flying. I was always so awkward in that airplane cockpit on the show that I thought I was faking it. Now I feel a lot more at home."

Two of Burke's three children— Paula, 18, and Paul, 16—also fly.

Unlike other Hollywood status symbols—swimming pools, limousines and invitations to the right cocktail parties—a flyer's wings can't be purchased with money or influence. The Government insists that even TV stars pass pilot examinations.

THE NIGHT THEY TELEVISED THE SUPERMARKET OPENING

This really happened—but we've changed the names to protect the guilty

Several years ago Joel Tator, news director of a television station in Los Angeles, was watching the grand opening of a supermarket as it was flashed to studio monitors. He contends that the event he now describes actually happened, but admits that time has added an imaginative glow.

It has been reported by sager observers than myself that Southern California is indeed "kook's haven." Therefore it would certainly seem appropriate that when a supermarket opens in a suburb of Los Angeles it should receive a black-tie, invitational, star-studded, floodlit première. The program I saw lasted 30 minutes and was televised "live" at 8:30 one forgettable evening a couple of years ago. It ran like this:

LONG SHOT OF MAIN BOULEVARD, FLOOD-LIGHTS HIT THE SKY. MUSIC PLAYS "HOORAY FOR HOLLYWOOD."

ANNOUNCER (off-screen): Live . . . and direct from the Goody Time Market in the San Fernando Valley . . . you are cordially invited to attend

the première of Goody Time's New Super De Luxe Complete Exotic Food Mart. Now, here is your host . . . well-known movie star and super-

market buff, Todd Ranger!

(At this point the camera cuts to a 1935 Mercedes as it pulls up in front of the market. Aging actor Todd Ranger alights from the car and acknowledges the applause of the crowd. His entrance is marred, however, by the fact that Todd has slammed the door on his tails. This necessitates opening the door, which unfortunately has been locked by an eager chauffeur. The car begins pulling away when someone, quite possibly Todd himself, screams that the rear portion of his outfit is pinned in the door. At this point the recording of "Hooray for Hollywood" has ceased and if one listens closely he can hear someone yelling: "The jerk's got his coat caught. Stop the car."

Shortly Todd is released from his dilemma and steps, shaken, to the microphone. The unforeseen door incident is doubly unfortunate in that Todd has never appeared on "live" television before and was in a state of nervous collapse before he even got into the Mercedes. So, as he steps to the microphone, large beads of perspiration are pouring off his forehead. The camera pushes in for an extreme close-up, which puts the lens about four inches from his trembling lips.

He looks squarely into the camera and says nothing for about 20 seconds. A long 20 seconds. It is then that someone motions to him to read the notes that he has on 4x5 cards in his pocket. The director of the program, who is seated-probably now standing-in a truck around the corner from the market, is screaming: "Cue him! Cue him!" And the stage manager, who is standing next to the camera and directly in front of Todd, starts gesturing madly. This confuses the confused Todd all the more. The director orders "Hooray for Hollywood" to start again and the cameras pan the sky until Todd is ready to begin. After a few anxious seconds, he appears ready.)

TODD: Good evening . . . and . . . what . . . a thrilling . . . occasion ... this is! (A faint smile.) Just think: the world première of a market! (There is utter silence now . . . only the heavy panting of Todd's breathing.) It's . . . it's . . . so exciting . . . I see so many . . . of my friends here. (None of Todd's friends would be caught dead here tonight.) Now . . . let's meet the manager . . . of this exciting market . . . Robert Hays.

(Mr. Havs has never appeared on television before either. However, in preparation for his appearance he has been rehearsing his lines all day with his wife. The only trouble is that Todd, in his excitement, has gotten his 4x5 cards out of order and is not giving the questions for which Mr. Hays has

rehearsed the answers.)

Topp: What . . . a wonderful . . . night this must be for you.

HAYS: About three years . . . Todd. TODD: Just wonderful . . . wonderful ... and how long has this ... market been in the planning stage?

HAYS: Fresh fruits and fish flown in

TODD: Wonderful, And thank you . . . for coming.

HAYS: I'll be glad to.

(At this point Todd looks at the camera again, as if asking for a release from this televised hell. But the program still has 27 minutes to go. The director orders more music. During this lull the stage manager whispers to Todd to introduce the various reporters stationed on the inside of the market. This bit of direction is picked up by the entire audience, since in the confusion the soundman has failed to close Todd's mike. There is one final "I can't" to be heard from Todd over the strains of "Hooray for Hollywood.")

Todd (reading from 4x5) continued card): Now . . . let's go inside this beautiful store. (The camera switches to various tuxedoed announcers—"Phil Anderson in Vegetables," "Bob Crayman in Fish"—filling screen with rutabaga, zucchini, crab and abalone.) Bob: Appetizing, isn't it? There's much more of this exciting market yet to see . . . but right now I know Todd Ranger is out in front with some of the first stars to arrive for this thrilling evening. Take it away, Todd.

(We cut to Todd, who is going over what he is going to say with Rita Leone, a rising starlet. The red camera lights catch him unawares, but being the pro that he is, he carries on.)

TODD: Are we on? We are? Oh . . . well . . . Say, look who's here . . . it's lovely Rita (consults card) Leone. . . Rita, isn't this an exciting night? RITA: Yes . . . it is.

(Todd, who is no ad-libber, is praying to whatever God he prays to that Rita will have more to say in answer

to that particular question.)

Todd: Indeed . . . you're so right about that . . . Have you ever seen

anything like this before?

RITA: No, not here . . . it's so exciting. Todd: Uh-huh (looking at his cards, which are now very wet and wrinkled). Have you seen the vegetable selection yet?

RITA: No, I'm looking forward to that.
TODD: I know you'll like Fruits too.

RITA: I know I will.

TODD: Well, we don't want to hold you up . . . there are so many stars coming Thank you, Miss Laneer. (Rita

exits, ostensibly for Vegetables.)
Todd: Oh, there are so many stars here tonight . . . I just hope we can get them all in. (This is a line given to Todd by the producer, before the producer realized that besides Rita, no one else was coming.)

TODD (Looking around and seeing no one): Well...maybe we can get Rita back here for a few more words.

(But Rita has left. Todd is still looking around and sweating a lot but he does have a card which reads "Throw to Crayman.")

Todd: Now, throw to Crayman.

(The only trouble is that this segment was supposed to come 10 minutes later in the broadcast and so. when the camera cuts to Bob Crayman, he has removed his jacket and is talking quite informally with one of the scantily-clad models who have been placed around the various aisles of the market. The red lights on the camera come to him as rather a rude shock and the floor manager's pointed finger backs up his worst fears: He is on the air "live." He reaches for the microphone which has fallen into one of the frozen food cabinets. Brushing off the shaved ice, he talks while putting on his jacket. No easy task.

(The broadcast continues along those lines for another 15 minutes, until the director signals it is time to end it. The job of succinctly wrapping up the preceding 30 minutes falls to Todd Ranger, who in those 30 minutes

has aged 15 years.)

Todd: And ... what ... an ... evening this has been. (A thought that could certainly be echoed by most who viewed the broadcast.) It's been a real pleasure . . . to be your host.

(At this point the 1935 Mercedes is sneaking into the shot in the background. The music, "Hooray for Hollywood," is beginning to play softly. The chauffeur accidentally hits the horn as he drives up behind Todd, which causes the nerve-racked host to drop his microphone. He bends over to pick it up and as he does, his remaining 4x5 cards fall to the street.) Todd: So . . . good night . . . and have . . . a goody time . . . at Goody Time.

(Todd steps into his Mercedes and it leaves the front of the market, shearing off a portion of the bleacher seats, which are now completely empty. Upstairs in his brand-new office, the manager is crying very hard.)

Startling Proposal: The television world is spinning from the impact of the Ford Foundation's startling and ingenious proposal for the establishment of a nonprofit domestic satellite system through which commercial broadcasters would, in effect, help finance educational TV. In a letter to the Federal Communications Commission, McGeorge Bundy, president of the philanthropic foundation, proposed a system of four or more satellites, positioned over the U.S. and available to all broadcasters. Its revenues from commercial broadcasters would be applied toward the support of a live nation-wide network presenting informational, cultural and instructional programs.

Needless to say, educational broadcasters are delighted with the proposal. It is aimed at solving their chronic financial problems and permitting them to expand their services vastly.

Also needless to say, COMSAT and AT&T vigorously oppose the plan. COMSAT contends that the terms of its charter give it exclusive rights to operate such systems, on a profitmaking basis, while the Ford Foundation says that the law that created COMSAT permits additional systems. AT&T stands to lose much of the considerable revenue it now receives from broadcasters, who currently must use its ground lines for crosscountry transmissions.

The three commercial networks, which would benefit from lower rates for transmissions, have expressed tentative approval of the idea, without endorsing any of the Ford Foundation's specific recommendations. The plan was devised in large measure by a network alumnus, Fred W. Friendly, who recently quit CBS and became an advisor to the foundation.

As for the FCC, its members are noncommittal at the moment, pending a study of the proposal and the receipt of alternative suggestions.

Maneuvers: The 1966-67 ratings race hasn't started yet, but the networks are jockeying for position already. NBC now has announced plans to jump the gun, but less conspicuously than ABC, which started the tactical maneuvering by moving up most of its "new-season" schedule a week ahead of the previously announced Sept. 11 starting date. NBC last week revealed that it would present "sneak previews" of three of its new fall series-Tarzan, The Hero, and Star Trekthe night of Sept. 8. CBS will, its spokesmen say, stick with its Sept. 11 launch date.—Henry Harding

THE WORLD OF LARRY STORCH

It seems a far-off place inhabited by wonder, worries and Charlie the cat

e wears the cavalry blues and large yellow kerchief of Corporal Agarn, the slightly addled comic soldier he plays in F Troop. He is 43-year-old actor-comedian Larry Storch and he sits amidst the milling traffic of actors and technicians on the Warner Brothers back-

lot, melancholy and detached, light years in his thoughts from the frantic activity surrounding him.

Big Forrest Tucker, Sergeant O'Rourke, looks over at Storch. "Larry lives in a world belonging to Larry Storch," he is saying. "When you get lucky he lets you in." continued

There's a scene to be shot and Storch, Tucker and the other F Troopers, Ken Berry and Jim Hampton, in character, watch the zany entrance into Fort Courage of guest-star Paul Lynde on a dog sled pulled by 10 Alaskan huskies. Corporal Agarn is astounded, then perplexed, then alarmed. "Cut," orders the director, and the Storch visage abruptly returns to its natural state of worry and otherworldly concern.

But, why, what's going on here? Here the man has been caroming for 30 years between the extremes of show-business success and failure—from triumphs as a boy impressionist back in New York, to moderate night-club and TV success, to a career nadir in 1960—and now, finally, he's got it made: a berth on a hit series, an \$85,000 dream house, a lovely and devoted wife. What's bugging him?

"Nothing's easy for me," he says.
"I'm always in a quandary over things." The voice trails off and the eyes blank over. Then: "I guess it's my dark Russian soul," a half smile.

He's constantly telling funny stories, but one suspects he is telling them only because you expect them. He smiles in feigned self-amusement, but the smile never gets all the way up. What he really wants to talk about, it develops, is the grim state of the world—Vietnam and underprivileged children. "When I see all the misery in the world . . . ," he shakes his head sadly, "I wonder what it all means."

He broods about ultimate meanings and truths, having explored everything from yoga to astrology. He has an almost obsessive concern for the well-being of every living creature.

"One time I saw Larry step out of a scene—after the cameras were rolling—to shoo flies away from the eyes of a horse," recalls Ken Berry with awe. "When the trainer of the huskies came on the set that morning, Larry rushed over to assure him that 'We have water for the dogs.'"

Originally Storch was up for the role won by Forrest Tucker. But the producers liked him so much they couldn't bear to let him go. So they created a new role, Corporal Agarn. "He's our gravy comedian," says executive producer Hy Averback.

His acute sensitivity is a product of a numbing Depression-years child-hood in which a cab-driver father did well to budget 65 cents a day to feed a family of four. Larry hated school and spent all the time he could holed up in all-night, all-day movie houses. Pretty soon he was entertaining pals with his impressions of the actors he saw, and to this day can do with great accuracy such character actors of the Thirties as Guy Kibbee and Charles Grapewin. At 13 he won a \$2 amateur contest and shortly was a working pro.


Fresh out of the Army after World War II he stumbled into writer Stan Davis, and presently had a regular berth on Davis's show, the "Kraft Music Hall." He could approximate the voice of star Frank Morgan so well, that he could dub for him while Morgan goofed off elsewhere.

Replaced Gleason

This interesting talent put him in the Copacabana in New York and Ciro's in Hollywood, which in turn led to a season as Jackie Gleason's summer replacement on TV (1953), and some film roles. But he wasn't advancing as well as friends thought he should; largely, they felt, because of his unaggressive nature.

"Larry's big weakness," says his friend, actor Tony Curtis, "is that he deprecates himself. He's afraid to assert himself. He doesn't want to offend anybody. But underneath he's fully aware of his talent."

By 1960 Larry's career had nearly fizzled out, though financially he was in good shape, having continued

dutifully sent most of his money home to Mother, who had invested it in apartment houses.

Enter Norma Booth, a redheaded, Katharine Hepburnesque ex-swimming champion who had been carrying the torch for Larry for 15 years.

"Larry was living in one of his own run-down apartments and thinking about giving up his career," Norma recalls today. "He was living like a slob, drinking too much. He slept on a mattress—no blanket, no sheets."

Norma proceeded to shape him up, trim his nails, get him a haircut, scrub him down. She took over the management of his career and it began to move again. They married in 1961.

She doesn't manage Larry any more, but it is agreed among Larry's friends that she remains his chief bulwark against many of life's unpleasantries.

Tony Curtis has been another major influence. They met on Guam during World War II when Storch was with an entertainment troupe and Curtis, then Seaman Bernie Schwartz, was on a sub tender. "He was a well-liked fella," recalls Curtis. "He was the only one of the entertainers who paid as much attention to enlisted men as to officers."

After the war, would-be actor Curtis looked up Storch—then riding high at the Copacabana. Curtis worked for Storch for a while, running out for sandwiches when Storch got hungry. They split up when Storch went on road tour. "If you ever need anything," Storch told Curtis, "just call."

Several years went by and then, according to Storch: "The next thing I knew, there was my friend Barney—I called him Barney—getting off a horse in a movie. A few years later I needed his help. I had done the part of a Russian in 'Who Was That Lady I Saw You With?' on Broadway and I wanted the part in the movie, which Tony was doing. 'Get your

toothbrush,' he said, 'and get out here fast. I'll take care of the rest.' And he did."

That was in 1959, and since then Storch has appeared in three more Curtis movies—not, insists Curtis, strictly on the strength of friendship. "Larry's a very terrific actor," Curtis says. "Some comedians need gags and shticks to get by, but Larry's different. I knew Larry's potential."

In 1963 an astrologer named Izzie Oblo advised Storch to go West. He also predicted "disaster" in 1969—so now Larry has a business manager to keep the damage minimal.

Meanwhile things are humming along fine for Larry and Norma. They have this elongated, ranchy sort of home which hugs the highest, most inaccessible ledge in the Santa Monica mountains and from which one can see the ocean 10 miles away. And Larry has his beloved cat, Charlie, a hunter who regularly brings his still-kicking prey into the house—mice and lizards—who, of course, are given safe conduct outside by Larry.

Invites the cabbie in

Norma merely sighs when he decides the gardeners are working too hard and goes out to help them; or, worse yet, invites the cab driver in for dinner. She hopes her husband's new success will help him to "assert himself. Give him the right to dislike people and not be afraid to have people dislike him." Not that she really wants him to change.

There he is, one recent evening, gazing dreamily out on that magnificent view, keeping one eye on Charlie. "Charlie," he croons, stroking the cat. Then he notices something wrong with the cat's eye. "Momma," he says to his wife, "Charlie has a runny eye."

Norma sighs. "What do you want, an eye cup for him?"

Larry nods absently. To him, of course, it seems only reasonable.



THE BUFFALO

ax Applebaum is a waiter at Hialeah, nimble not only in his calling of dealing plates off the arm, but in giving advice to his customers. You ask Max, for example, "How's the crab-meat salad?" and he is apt to answer, "Not on your life. You'll take the lamb goulash."

Ralph C. Wilson Jr., wealthy trucker, insurance executive and horse owner from Detroit, took a problem of vital concern to Max in 1959. Offered a franchise in the new American Football League, Wilson asked the waiter if the proposition looked good. Max was silent. Then he nodded affirmatively.

If there were any other reasons and there doubtless were—for his taking the franchise, Wilson won't admit it, saying only, "Max's nod was good enough for me."

Thus, one of the goofiest success stories in sports began.

Attempting to place his new franchise in Miami, where he owns a winter home, Wilson was rebuffed by operators of the Orange Bowl, who wouldn't lease him the stadium. He was then given his choice of Kansas City, St. Louis, Cincinnati, Louisville, or Buffalo, He picked Buffalo, a city he never had even seen. The climate there may have been cold, but at least the stadium was out of date.

The next problem was building a team. Shy a winning quarterback, he acquired one in 1962 for the sum of \$100, the waiver price he paid for Jack Kemp, released by San Diego. Kemp has led Buffalo to the league championship the last two years.

To this day, the owner finds it hard to believe his good fortune. He has parlayed a waiter's nod, a Miami rejection and a \$100 quarterback into an organization rated the financial bulwark of the American Football League. The Bills last year averaged 43,811 in home attendance, just 711 short of capacity in War Memorial Stadium. Season ticket sales this year have run upward of 26,000 and in the consolidation of the two professional leagues, Buffalo takes its place with no need for apologies.

"We lost money our first four years," admits Wilson. "I would say about \$1,400,000. But in 1964, we began to show a profit at the gate, and we have ever since."

The luck of the Buffalo owner hasn't melted. At the time of the 1966 draft last winter, he announced that he was withdrawing from the scramble for outlandishly-priced rookies. He said he would pass for a year, gambling that the war between the leagues would end and he would not be left holding paper calling for payment of hundreds of thousands of dollars. By early June, the peace he wished came for the two pro leagues.

If the American League owners today are delighted by the idea of gaining parity with members of the older National League, you can imagine the ecstasy on the part of NBC, which televises the AFL games. Stuck with the new league after having lost the NFL to CBS, NBC has had to huff and puff to promote its property, even going so far as to advance money to teams to help sign top livestock. The

selling job hasn't been easy. Last year, for instance, not a single game played by the AFL-including the one for league championship-ranked among the top 20 in the Nielsen ratings of televised sports events.

Under the new amalgamation, the Nationals and Americans won't engage in interleague play (except for exhibitions) for four years, but their scheduling of a world's championship game beginning this season will stimulate interest in NBC's heroes.

No official word has been given on the TV aspects of the interleague title game, but Pete Rozelle, commissioner of the joint forces, intimates that the two networks will alternate in televising it. He also says that "more than one network" will participate indefinitely in the handling of the regular-season games.

Of the 24 teams currently comprising the professional football household. Buffalo claims the largest retelevision network of gional Stretching to Davenport, Iowa, on the west and Paducah, Ky., on the south, the network, say the Bills, comes within the reach of 31.2 percent of the home TV sets in the United States. Regrettably, all these machines aren't tuned to the Bills each week, and never are likely to be, but the club feels that when the interleague arrangment is in swing, Buffalo is going to capture a huge TV audience.

As sole owner of the team, Wilson is in the enviable position of having received, for \$25,000, a franchise valued in the new market at \$10,000,-000. This, friends, is appreciation How a trucker parlayed

into a football success

which should only happen to those of us who need it more than Wilson.

During the last six years, the Nationals and Americans have taken each other to court, swiped each other's players, poached on each other's territories, harassed each other and squandered millions wantonlyonly to wind up where the NFL could have been anyway, had it expanded in a rational, orderly way.

Unmistakably, the merger of the leagues will accelerate interest in professional football. Attendance is bound to increase and everyone will gain except the players, who, in the twinkling of an eye, have been reduced from ruler to ruled. Indeed, the market suddenly has become bearish for those in shoulder pads, who no longer will use one league against the other as leverage in salary negotiations. Nor will the earning power of those leaving the undergraduate ranks be helped. The day of the wealthy rookie is gone. Says Wilson:

"We have passed through a period that owners will recall as a horrible nightmare-and players as a beautiful dream. For the boys, it was Rome in all its glory." Max the waiter has not

vet announced his conclusions.



Moonlighting for fun and profit

Professor McNeely teaches TV writing;

on the side, he sells scripts

"Those who can, do. Those who can't, teach"—it says here.

But Professor Jerry McNeely of the University of Wisconsin can and does market television scripts by the drawerful, and he also teaches courses on how to do it.

Hollywood's hills echo and re-echo with the clacking typewriters of yearning scribes who'd give a right finger to get their left foot in some producer's door. And, way out there in the boondocks, Professor McNeely, who looks not unlike a small-town chiropractor, has big-time television by the tail, and he feels not the slightest urge to "go Hollywood." He's cozy as a coot in Madison, Wis., and he wants only to stay right there and carry on his doing and his teaching just like always.

"Always," that is to say, since 1956. That's the year he got his doctorate and faculty appointment, and that's

the year he started moonlighting. He thought he ought to sell a script professionally so his students would have confidence in him as a teacher. On impulse, he mailed his first teleplay, "The Staring Match," to a New York literary agent named Flora Roberts, Miss Roberts sold it to Studio One.

During the intervening 10 years he was promoted to assistant professor. associate professor, and ultimately full professor, and his extracurricular moonlighting zoomed apace. In 1957 he won the Writers Guild script award for best hour-length anthology. In 1961 he won second place in Hallmark's international teleplay writing competition with "The Joke and the Valley." He's sold scripts to Studio One, Climax!, Hallmark Hall of Fame, Twilight Zone, The Eleventh Hour and Mr. Novak. He has written more Dr. Kildare scripts than any other one writer. And he recently signed a multiple script-writing contract on three series for the upcoming season: The Man from U.N.C.L.E., The Girl from U.N.C.L.E. and Jericho. If that doesn't make him the most prolific TV writer in Hollywood, he's certainly numero uno in Madison, Wis., and a radius of a thousand miles in any direction therefrom.

How does a high-minded intellectual feel about teaching and writing in our maligned TV wasteland? He says:

"I face a constant dilemma: Should I deal with television as it is, or as I believe it could be? Students preparing for careers in the medium need a practical frame of reference, but if we gave them nothing but current practice we'd be helping to perpetuate the present mediocrity.

"I know many of my colleagues are tempted to retire in frustration to an ideological cloud, but I couldn't even if I wanted to because my students are so aware of my activities in commercial television. I believe, in spite of all the complex factors involved, programming can improve.

"As a writer. I yearn for more challenging opportunities, but meanwhile I take the opportunities TV does offer and do the best work I can. If I. as a writer, declared a pox on the whole business, then I, as a teacher, couldn't very well convince my students that the situation is too important to our society to be viewed as hopeless.

"I don't have the answer now, but one of my students may be a network president 20 years from now and he

may find some answers.

"Meanwhile, I myself just might get a few things produced which have some dramatic bite and express a point of view"

Forthright expression of his point of view is the intense, youthful (age 38) professor's stock-in-trade. His scripts are notable for the way he can work in philosophy for the millions. His wise, old Dr. Gillespie thunders at Kildare tirades like this: "Do you think after building her life on certain moral values that she could turn them off by throwing a switch? It was a tug-of-war between those values and stored-up emotions that were demanding release!" His young, earnest Kildare harangues a patient: "You can't forgive the human race for what it did to you! And yet you're doing the same unforgivable thing to Larry!"

All this activity on the tube has boosted Professor McNeely to the status of Big Man on Campus at Wisconsin. He's had to clamp a ceiling on enrollment in his course in television and film writing. Limit: 15 undergraduates.

He's pretty big, too, at home with his three small kids where he's the onliest daddy on the block who, like Napoleon Solo and Illya Kuryakin, carries an authentic ID card in his wallet certifying the bearer as an agent for United Network Command for Law and Enforcement.


