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# as we see it

• Officially, the 1966-67 Television Season doesn't really begin until next week. But ABC, believing that the early bird gets the Nielsen, will be sneaking us previews of most of its new shows this week. And NBC will uncork a few new series early. Staunch old CBS, however, has clung firmly to schedule and will begin the new season next week, as will TV GUIDE, with its big Fall Preview issue.

Perhaps it's all for the best to string out the debuts this way. The critics get more time to digest the new offerings, and although their verdicts are seldom fatal to TV shows, they may review more favorably if they don't have to absorb the fresh flood of creativity in such heavy doses.

Although it's a truism that television is affected less by critics than by ratings, the medium, in another sense, is nevertheless facing a critical year. Critical because so-called "good drama," moribund these many seasons on our home screens, will enjoy something of a renaissance in the coming months. For all three networks-particularly ABC with its impressive ABC Stage 67-have made strong moves toward re-establishing a respectable theater of television, nurtured by good playwrights, first-rate directors, the best actors and big budgets.

You get the feeling that the network executives, who have been forced to dodge so many critical ripe tomatoes during their routine journeys to the bank, are now saying to their detractors: "OK. We'll give the public those 'good' dramas you've been screaming for. But they'll probably treat them as apathetically as before, and you'll probably murder us as you did before. We're giving it another try, but it may well be the last."

So viewers, please look in.

And critics—including our own—refrain, please, from the easy wisecrack. Give the lads an even break.

# **PRO FOOTBALL'S**

## Who cocked the gun that brought

ports promoters are given to thumping their chests and braying that TV hucksters can't tell them how to run their business, but the tough talk was exposed as utter drivel by the recent merger of the pro-football leagues. The shotgun marriage of the rivals who had been belaboring each other with blunt instruments was triggered by a power play CBS and the NFL had cooked up, which could have had the effect of sabotaging AFL games on NBC. All parties involved are observing an uneasy truce now, but if it erupts in another brawl, it is a predictable cinch that TV will be the bone of contention.

#### Great for the fan

In the meantime, the jockeying behind the scenes by the two networks is the greatest boon to football addicts since the invention of sponsors. This season armchair quarterbacks within a 75-mile radius of games blacked out on TV will not be confronted with the ghastly problem of surviving Sundays without some action on the tube. Both leagues will telecast another game in metropolitan areas when local teams are playing at home.

CBS, which forced NBC to follow its lead in lifting the blackouts, also will show double-headers the last eight weeks of the schedule. In another development, CBS will carry three games in prime time, as well as a second Thanksgiving Day game.

Since the owners of football franchises are not in the habit of making magnanimous gestures, the NFL must have had an ulterior motive in permitting telecasts that figure to reduce traffic at the box office. It did indeed —until the sudden merger scotched the scheme. The gambit was originally designed to pull the rug from under the AFL. The new league has been sustained largely by the \$7,200,-000 it receives annually from NBC for its TV rights; and the NFL was going all out, with the enthusiastic cooperation of CBS, to punch the opposition's meal ticket full of holes.

The official party line on both sides is to soft-pedal their former cutthroat competition. But before the merger was announced on June 8, AFL people bitterly denounced the lifting of the blackouts as a weapon to destroy them.

#### **Protest from Davis**

"There's no question the NFL is trying to put the squeeze on us," Al Davis, the new AFL commissioner. declared on April 27, the first day he moved into the league's New York headquarters. "They've juggled their schedule and kickoff times to put their top attraction opposite us on the air. Four of their teams are in serious financial trouble and will be hurt at the gate by the end of the blackouts, but the NFL is sacrificing them to force us to the wall." Davis resigned a few weeks after the merger was announced in an apparent protest over its terms.

It is assumed in some quarters that the NFL merged with the AFL, which it had contemptuously dismissed as a bush-league outfit for six years, to

## the two warring leagues to the altar?

avert a player raid in retaliation for the Pete Gogolak incident. (The New York Giants of the NFL had induced Buffalo's Gogolak, the top field-goal specialist in the AFL, to sign with them. Outraged by the sneak play, the AFL threatened to go after NFL stars.) Another compelling factor in the NFL's decision was the desire to end the ruinous bidding war which had pushed bonuses for college players to exorbitant levels.

All this is true, but one pertinent question remains unanswered: Why did the AFL agree to pay an "indemnity" of \$18,000,000 spread over 20 years for the privilege of joining the NFL lodge? In addition, it consented to fork over \$15,000,000 more from the future sale of two new franchises. That's an awfully stiff price to pay for the recognition the AFL coveted. but something more than prestige was at stake. The AFL feared that unrestricted NFL telecasts would clobber their own ratings and depreciate the value of the games so badly that the league eventually would fold.

The NFL's radical change of TV policy is underscored by its earlier battles in court for the right to impose blackouts. The owners' most cherished principle—after their fondness for profits—was enunciated by the late Bert Bell, the league's commissioner in the 1950's. "The home gate must be protected or this game will die," Bell insisted. "You can't sell what you give away free."

Bell fought, and defeated, the Justice Department on the blackout issue in 1953. Judge Allan K. Grim of the U.S. District Court ruled that "reasonable protection of home-game attendance is essential to the very existence of the individual clubs" in dismissing a suit by the Government charging that restrictions of telecasts violated antitrust laws. In 1962 another Federal judge upheld the legality of blackouts in denying an injunction brought by three fans, who argued that the New York-Green Bay championship game was a complete sellout and attendance would not be affected by TV.

#### Good news at the gate

Bell's Law has beefed up the gate so effectively that the 14 NFL teams played to 83 percent of the over-all seating capacity last year. Six clubs (New York, Chicago, Cleveland, Baltimore, Green Bay and Washington) had standing-room-only crowds for every home game; Philadelphia had virtual sellouts. TV has been exploited so shrewdly by Pete Rozelle, Bell's successor, that each team's share of the loot from CBS has increased from \$325,000 to \$1,200,000 in four short years. In 1961 a franchise cost \$600,000. Atlanta recently paid a fee of \$8,500,000 to join the lodge.

The ostensible reason given by the NFL for revamping such an enormously profitable arrangement was a new contract with CBS for \$18,800,000 a year, an increase of \$4,700,000, which was offered on condition that the blackouts were dropped. The deal was worked out by Rozelle before the annual league meeting in February, then presented as a *fait accompli*. According to the announcement, all members approved the contract, **continued**

but Bill MacPhail, head of CBS Sports, inadvertently revealed there was strenuous opposition to it by four teams.

"Los Angeles, Pittsburgh, St. Louis and Dallas were afraid their attendance would suffer if they had to buck other games on TV," MacPhail told me. "We had been trying for two years to get rid of the blackouts because it was getting awfully tough to sell pro football under the old system.

"There are only 18 minutes for commercials in a game. Our production costs—the NFL's fee, stiff wire charges, announcers and technicians—add up to \$1,250,000 for each telecast date. Figure it out for yourself. To break even, we must charge sponsors \$70,000 a minute, the highest price for any attraction on the air. They were unwilling to spend that kind of money with New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and other top TV markets blacked out for half the season. Rozelle understood our problem and he did a whale of a selling job on his owners."

#### No designs, says Rozelle

Rozelle blandly denies the NFL ever had murky designs to scuttle the AFL. "We're just trying to accommodate the public and CBS with our new policy," he says. "People who can't get tickets to games always have criticized us for keeping them off the air, posing a sticky public-relations problem. By lifting the blackouts, we're keeping the good will of the fans and, at the same time, making valid concessions to CBS in consideration of the high price they're paying us."

The alleged concessions have backfired badly on CBS. It is an open secret in the trade that the network is fuming over the merger, which left it holding a large, deflated bag. CBS paid \$18,800,000 with the undoubted hope of murdering NBC in the ratings, but the rival's AFL games have been greatly upgraded in audience appeal and very likely will narrow the almost 2-to-1 edge in viewers the NFL had last season.

"We were having trouble getting sponsors until the merger was announced," Carl Lindemann, vice president of NBC Sports, confides. "The news of it gave our sales a tremendous boost."

In sharp contrast, sponsors who signed with CBS before the merger are squawking loudly because they are paying about double the price NBC is charging. Bill MacPhail inferentially admitted CBS has been hit by such complaints when he was asked about them. "It's not my nature to be evasive," he said curtly, "but I can't comment on the situation."

#### Did MacPhail expect it?

Just one question: Did he have any inkling of the merger?

"No, it came as a complete surprise," he said grimly.

One big headache plaguing Rozelle is this season's telecast of the new championship game in January between the league winners. Previously each circuit had its own championship. and the NFL battle drew the largest TV audience of any sporting event. Under the new contract, CBS is paying \$2,000,000 for the game compared with the \$600,000 the AFL play-off costs NBC. This is another very sore point with CBS. Its prize plum now is just an elimination contest for the big climax, whereas the AFL play-off will have increased appeal for fans eager to see how the champion stacks up against the NFL titlist. Rozelle has agreed to make an "adjustment" with CBS on the price for the NFL playoff. Like one million dollars.

The most practical solution to the problem of assigning TV rights to the championship game would seem to be joint coverage by CBS and NBC, but Carl Lindemann raises a tricky point. "Suppose an antitrust gimmick forces Rozelle to put it up for bidding? ABC could pull a helluva coup by making the top offer. In that case CBS and we would be in the silly position of premoting pro football for four months with ABC taking all the bows in the big finale."

This intriguing idea has occurred to ABC, of course. "Sure, we're very interested in getting the game," Roone Arledge says. "We're waiting for further details on how Rozelle intends to handle it."

#### Not until 1970

Virtually all the complications posed by the merger relate to TV, which is holding up the amalgamation until NBC's contract with the AFL expires in 1970. A sweeping realignment of the teams in both leagues will have to be made to elicit high bids from two networks, for it is agreed unanimously that one chain cannot handle the projected lineup of 28 teams. The NFL currently has franchises in all but one (Boston) of the top 10 TV markets, but the AFL is in only three—New York, Boston and San Francisco-Oakland.

"The present Eastern and Western divisions will be overhauled to make all the games equally attractive to sponsors," Rozelle reveals. "We may even have four sections to balance the competition. Satisfying everyone is going to be awfully ticklish."

No matter how the ball bounces, Rozelle has left himself wide open to second-guessing by scrapping the blackouts. After mid-November the weather in northern cities usually is so bleak that it is a toss-up whether a customer who pays \$6 to sit on a stone slab will wind up under one. If it comes up freezing for a meaningless game and TV is carrying a contest that may decide a divisional title, a fan will have to be daffy beyond the call of loyalty to the local heroes to leave the comfort of his home and traipse out to the ball park.

"Lifting the blackouts was a horrible mistake," Sonny Werblin, owner of the AFL's New York Jets, says. Werblin, ex-president of the TV division of MCA, the huge production agency, knows as much about audience reaction as any man in America. "It's going to kill us at the gate and detract from the appeal of telecasts. Home viewers seeing stretches of empty seats won't have the same feeling of excitement, and the players will be affected too. Larry Grantham, our captain, bawled like a baby when he saw the Jets' first sellout crowd last year. 'I never thought I'd play before so many people again,' he said.

"Too much of a good thing always is disastrous. Overexposure killed boxing, the best drawing card on TV 15 years ago, and it's taken much of the shine off baseball. I'm afraid the same thing will happen to us."

#### **Farewell to blackouts**

Regardless of developments, local blackouts of pro football never will be imposed again. Both leagues say this season is an experiment, but, having repudiated the argument that blackouts are vital to their financial stability, they hardly can offer the same defense in the future. A more formidable obstacle is the attitude of the fans. They will tear down broadcasting stations if the games are withheld from them.

"I guess the decision on the blackouts is irrevocable," Bill MacPhail admits. "We'll be crucified if we try to bring them back. I'm keeping my fingers crossed that there will be no slump in attendance. Have you ever tried to placate an owner, with a convoy of 260-pound tackles, who's convinced you've sold him down the river?"

Not all of the beautiful women in Hollywood are on television or in the movies. The five pictured on the preceding two pages, for example, are denizens of the West Coast entertainment colony whose primary connection with TV is marital—they are the wives of Gary Conway (Burke's Law), Mark Miller (Please Don't Eat the Daisies), John Gavin (Convoy), Dick York (Bewitched) and David Janssen (The Fugitive).

What sort of women do actors marry? We can't say that this is exactly a scientific survey; but, for whatever conclusions you may wish to draw, these five particular wives of five particular actors turn out to be ...

A former Miss America: Mrs. Gary Conway was Miss South Carolina, Marian McKnight, when she won the title of Miss America 1957. After her year in the limelight, she enrolled at UCLA, and that's where she met her husband—Conway was appearing in a student production, and she designed his costume. They were married at the end of 1958 and now have a daughter, Kathleen, 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>.

How does Mrs. Conway feel about all those glamorous women Gary works with? "As long as he gets home by 8, I don't worry too much."

A fashion expert: Bea Miller, who has been married to Mark Miller for six years, works in the fashion field for Life magazine. She met Miller while she was living in New York—at a spaghetti dinner party her roommate gave. They spent their honeymoon touring the country in a bus while Mark was in the national company of "The Dark at the Top of the Stairs."

About the "other women" in her husband's professional life, she says: "I appreciate beautiful men and Mark appreciates beautiful women. I'm happy he works." A shopkeeper: Cicely Gavin met her husband when both of them were students at Stanford. After nine years of marriage they have two little girls —Christina, 5, and Maria, 3. Before her marriage Mrs. Gavin worked as a teacher, as a secretary and as a representative of clothing firms. She now owns a women's clothing store of her own (it's called Act III) in New York City and divides her time between the East and West Coasts.

A sometime actress: Joan York has the longest marriage (15 years) and the largest family (five children, ranging in age from 13 to 5) of our quintet. Dick and Joan are both Midwesterners. They met when they were performing on radio shows in Chicago. In addition to raising their large family, Mrs. York takes acting lessons with Jeff Corey and works as an actress occasionally. She used to do some modeling as well.

"After 15 years of marriage," she says, "I wouldn't want to sound as though I take Dick for granted, but we do have a good relationship based on trust. But all of those beauties he works with keep me on my toes."

A housewife: Ellie Janssen went to Los Angeles from New York 10 years ago and married David Janssen two years later. She had been a fashion model in New York, and now she devotes quite a bit of time to sculpture.

The Janssens keep show business pretty well separated from their social life. "My husband works with a lot of people," says Mrs. Janssen, "but generally we don't get to know them very well. He works with many beautiful women, but if you've ever noticed the number of people that are around on a television set, you know it makes things pretty impersonal. I guess," she adds after a bit of thought, "I wouldn't like it so much if he worked with the same woman for eight months, though."



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# '<u>I'M</u> INTERVIEWING YOU'

The prestigious new series ABC Stage 67 has its debut next week (Sept. 14) with a play called "The Love Song of Barney Kempinski." Its author is Murray Schisgal, who wrote the hit Broadway comedy "Luv"; its star is Alan Arkin, the young comic actor who has won acclaim for his performances in "Luv" and the movie "The Russians Are Coming, the Russians Are Coming."

Just after they finished filming "Kempinski," Schisgal and Arkin sat down with a tape recorder, and the playwright interviewed the actor. That, at least, is what they were supposed to be doing, at TV Gume's request. The result—less an interview than an off-center conversation between two comedy specialists:

SCHISGAL: I've heard you say, Alan, that you prefer working in films to the theater. Why is that?

ARKIN: At the moment I do because I've done a lot of work in the theater and haven't done too much in films. I have nothing more to say.

SCHISGAL: Do you draw a line between films for the movie houses and films for television?

ARKIN: Do I draw a line? Yes, because films for television are seen on a very, very small screen and your head is tiny on it, and in a movie house your head is gigantic.

SCHISGAL: Now you're putting me on. Do you feel that in doing this TV thing we're doing now, that you are more inhibited than you were in "The Russians Are Coming"?

ARKIN: Well, the only way that I feel inhibited is that you watch everything and you wrote it. Whereas in "The Russians Are Coming" the author was in the Isle of Jersey.

SCHISGAL: How long have you been acting?'

ARKIN: Since I was about 5. I got my first professional job when I was about 16.

SCHISGAL: Doing what?

ARKIN: It was in "The Cradle Will Rock." It ran for two days.

SCHISGAL: What followed that?

ARKIN: After that? My next professional job was about three years later at the Circle Theatre in a play called "Once upon a Tailor."

SCHISGAL: Have you ever gone to dramatic school or studied acting?

ARKIN: Yes, I studied a long time. SCHISGAL: Where?

ARKIN: Interesting you never asked me any of this before . . . in all the years we've known each other . . .

SCHISGAL: I'm paid by the word. ARKIN: I studied many many places.

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SCHISGAL: Do you think dramatic schools are valuable?

ARKIN: I think they can be. It's such a personal thing. . . . I think you have to find a teacher whose vision corresponds to your own, your vision of what you want to be.

SCHISGAL: But if you get the wrong teacher?

ARKIN: Then you're in trouble.

SCHISGAL: What are you going to do after you finish this?

ARKIN: I'm going to throw up. No, what I'm going to do next is open. I'm reading scripts. I'm going to smoke my new pipe.

SCHISGAL: OK, Alan. I think we should take a breather.

ARKIN: Should I ask you some questions?

SCHISGAL: No, no.

ARKIN: How old are you? Really. SCHISGAL: I'm interviewing you. Those are the rules. Why do you object to being called a comic?

ARKIN: I object because it makes it my obligation to create laughter and I don't want my obligation to be limited to that. I feel that there are other emotions to conjure up in people and I think that as an actor in general I can be freer.

SCHISGAL: I know that you are very obsessive about your work. That is, unless you're working you seem to be under the weather. Don't you relax or isn't there a way you can relax and get away from your work?

ARKIN: Yes, I like to bowl as long as I'm not with somebody who beats me, like you. I once enjoyed playing badminton, but you cured me of that.

SCHISGAL: But really, how long a time do you think you can go without working and yet not feel unhappy?

ARKIN: I don't know. I think it would depend on if I have anything in the future. Like right now I don't have anything ahead of me, which makes me a little bit nervous.

SCHISGAL: But I understand that you

have two movies lined up.

ARKIN: Yeah, but one starts a year from now and the other is a yearand-a-half from now.

SCHISGAL: No wonder you're never at home. We all know that you're being inundated with film scripts. You probably read, I would guess, nine out of every film scripts written ...

ARKIN: Nine out of every film scripts written?

SCHISGAL: Nine out of every 10! ARKIN: I read more than nine out of every film scripts written . . .

SCHISCAL: Listen, I'm nervous. Ladies and gentlemen, you must forgive me, I'm losing my . . . What is your reaction, Mr. Arkin, to this new sensation of having all this material sent to you and the opportunity . . .

ARKIN: I bought a pair of glasses. That's my immediate reaction.

SCHISGAL: Do you read everything that's sent to you?

ARKIN: So far, yes.

SCHISGAL: Do they look better with the glasses?

ARKIN: Yes. I used to think it was the material giving me a headache. It turns out to be me that was giving the material a headache.

SCHISGAL: What is the most interesting thing that has happened to you during the filming of "The Love Song of Barney Kempinski"?

ARKIN: This interview.

SCHISGAL: Has doing this thing been over-all pleasant for you?

ARKIN: Yes, it's been marvelous. I'm very happy that I had a chance to work with you again . . .

SCHISGAL: Ya hear that, Ma?

ARKIN: I think that . . .

SCHISGAL: Do you feel a bit apprehensive about the results of this thing? We've just seen the rushes.

ARKIN: No.

SCHISGAL: We're in trouble then. I remember when we did "Luv" . . . you were very apprehensive.

ARKIN: I wasn't apprehensive about the production. I was continued

apprehensive about the reaction.

SCHISGAL: You thought we'd run a couple of weeks. This you're not apprehensive about . . .

ARKIN: One performance and we've had it.

SCHISGAL: I do want to say how much I have enjoyed doing it and the only reason I did get involved in this project was to have the opportunity to work with you again. And should we never meet I want you to know it has been a joy.

ARKIN: And the \$25 I owe you ... SCHISGAL: Oh, that's right. Where is the \$25?

ARKIN: You'll get it very soon.

SCHISGAL: How did you enjoy working with Stanley Prager? He directed this thing . . .

ARKIN: I loved it. It was wonderful working with him because he introduced me to cold fresh salmon.

SCHISGAL: And how about the crew? Joe Coffey, the cameraman. He introduced me to Akvavit. That's a rather evil Norwegian drink. The point of the matter is . . .

ARKIN: How did you like your first experience in films?

SCHISGAL: A bit frightening because I'm ignorant of so much that's happening. I don't know why the crew people take naps from 2 to 4 every afternoon and why it is necessary for them to have tea at 5.

ARKIN: How old are you really? SCHISGAL:  $I^{*}m$  interviewing you. Those are the rules.

ARKIN: Is it true you became a playwright because you couldn't make it as a teacher and a lawyer and a jazz musician?

SCHISGAL: Yes.... This is the only profession that I know of where if you're not working, people think you have tax problems.

ARKIN: Where'd the idea of this TV show come up?

SCHISGAL: Of Barney Kempinski?

Marc Merson, the producer, suggested a comic tour of New York, and immediately a host of characters came to mind. The most important was Barney Kempinski, a fellow whom I feel very familiar with. . . . Come to think of it, Alan, there isn't much we have to talk about any more. We've seen each other daily for three weeks and . . . How many musical instruments do you play?

ARKIN: Play well?

SCHISGAL: No. Play.

ARKIN: It's infinite if you ask me how many. Well? None!

SCHISGAL: How many years did you sing professionally?

ARKIN: I sang professionally on and off... no... consistently for about three years. But that's over a long period of time.

SCHISGAL: What was the group?

SCHISGAL: Yes, I have those. What did come to mind is . . . there's something very unusual about you as an actor. . . That is, you're capable of using your body. How did that come about?

ARKIN: I haven't the vaguest idea. Schisgal: It's interesting because ...

ARKIN: My early influences were Chaplin and Danny Kaye.

SCHISGAL: Oh, but Danny Kaye didn't do much . . .

ARKIN: Oh yes he did. He uses his body a lot. He moves a great deal. I was never aware I was learning from them . . . but I guess I did.

SCHISGAL: All right . . . Now take your body out of here because this gig is up.

ARKIN: You have just heard the last conversation between Murray Schisgal and Alan Arkin. Later they came to blows over money.

SCHISGAL: \$25.

ARKIN: You'll get it very soon.

# When a 'CHEEC HONGARIAN' found herself in a barnyard

Another improbable chapter in the saga of Eva Gabor

The sister act was wearing a little thin. And a great act it had been for 25 years. Eva. Zsa Zsa. Magda. Three indefatigably ambitious, ravishingly beautiful little girls from Budapest. Little girls no more. And their mother, Jolie, the bejeweled and beminked grande dame who did not hesitate to share her child-rearing secret with anyone, especially if he had a large readership. "Reech hosbands," Mama Gabor was fond of saying, "make zee bast hosbands. Dot's vat I'm taalink my girls, dolling."

The Gabors did not so much arrive, they landed. Collectively, they captured more newspaper space, lit up more posh night clubs, ran through more husbands (15 at the latest count), committed more charming indiscretions, and dropped more zquotable zquotes than there were Z's in the type fonts to **continued**

set them up with. Their hair was just a little blonder, their diamonds a little flashier, their perfume a little headier ("A voman has to announce herself, dolling!"), their accents a little more arch, their responses a little more unpredictable. They became, as it were, legends before their time.

#### Actresses who seldom acted

They were renowned "actresses" who seldom actually acted. At least the critics didn't think so. Their best performances were given off the screen. It was hard to find anyone who could clearly remember a specific role any one of them had played. As Eva was later to complain, "Zose creetics, dolling, I zometimes zink zey review zee closse instett of zee performance!" Zsa Zsa, who is a movie star of sorts, generally got better reviews in the Congressional Record than she could ever manage in Variety. During the 1958 Congressional probe of alleged gifts from Dominican Republic dictator Rafael Trujillo's playboy son Ramfis, Rep. Wayne Hays (D., Ohio) called her the "most expensive courtesan since Madame de Pompadour," an ungallant thing to say. (To which Zsa Zsa replied. "I don't take geefts from perfect strangers-bott zen, no vun ees perfect.") They were Becky Sharp, Lorelei Lee and Lolita all tied up in one incandescent package, yet not a single Gabor could point to a single lasting show-business success.

Then all at once it happened. Eva, the youngest and the first to come to America (in 1939), crossed up everybody! She scored a success that wasn't just charming conversation. She was a smash on television, prime time, and no keeding! Put her down next to Eddie Albert in *Green Acres*, a simple-minded tale of mink-bearing city folk with a pash for the country, and what have you got? The zippiest zhing zince zcornflakes.

Eva (pronounced Ava) was "all shook op" over her own success. Up until now Zsa Zsa (pronounced Zhah-Zhah) had consistently managed to upstage her. In the Forties Eva had been a flop in Hollywood, moving on to New York, where she scored a small success in the Rodgers and Hammerstein 1950 comedy "The Happy Time." Life photographed her and so did almost everybody else, but it did not last. Dorothy Parker complained that the Gabors were obviously "mythological." Philip Barry Jr., the playwright's son, gave Eva a job in an East Hampton, Long Island, summer theater at a time (1951) when "no one else would take a chance on her." This was the period during which Eva bought a 10-unit Fifth Avenue apartment house overlooking Central Park. When it turned out it would cost \$100,000 just to redecorate it, Mama Jolie advised her to go to Brooklyn, explaining, "Zats vere zee money ees I zink."

#### She 'eenvented ze road'

But always Eva worked. Hard. She tried disc-jockeying. The road and summer stock came to know her intimately. "I eenvented ze road, dolling." She did TV when asked. And an occasional movie. She even did the Las Vegas bit with Zsa Zsa and Magda (1955). Still, like all Gabors, and her ex-husbands notwithstanding, her scale of living seemed curiously inconsistent with her fixed income. The rumors were revived about how Mama and the girls' father, Col. Vilmos (Willie) Gabor, a stout, excitable gentleman with a white toothbrush mustache, had smuggled the family jewels out of Hungary during World War II. One printed report had Eva worth \$1,000,000 in stocks, bonds, jewelry and real estate. The more imaginative drew mental

pictures of rich lovers (after all, Zsa Zsa had corralled Porfirio Rubirosa) stampeding in her foyer like commuters through a subway turnstile.

Naturally Eva wrote a book, with the help of a ghost, possibly the dullest (considering the subject) set of memoirs ever set to paper. It was called "Orchids and Salami" and moved Dorothy Kilgallen to remark that it was based solely on the contents of the icebox. And naturally she kept talking (asked what separated American from European men, she replied, "Zee Atlantic Ocean"), to the accompaniment of ever-diminishing press enthusiasm. By the time Green Acres appeared on the horizon, she had collected three husbands and was married to a fourth. Richard Brown, a personable, good-looking textile magnate turned stockbroker: and was telling everybody, "I'm really a Hausfrau," which, coming from a Gabor, was charming. In fact, if it hadn't been that Eva had to give up a \$25,000 diamond ring to a gang of bandits in a much-publicized Miami Racquet Club robbery in 1964 ("Vun uf those nasty boys heet me right in ze mouth viss his feest, dolling!"), she might have followed Magda's lead and abdicated the publicity field in favor of Zsa Zsa.

#### 'Green Acres' changed all

Green Acres changed everything. Told that Filmways wanted her to test, she replied, "Vat's a cheec Hongarian doing een zee barnyard, anyvay? Eet's ridiculous, dolling. I'm allergic to sun." She explains, "Bott dip down eenside I knew I hed to do it. So manny years ven I couldn't efen get arrested, dolling. You can't vight Vate."

"Vate" was very kind to *Green Acres.* And it made a new woman of Eva. An honest woman? "I vas hurt because pepple vere surprised I vas a good actress. After all zese years soddenly I am beink discovered." Her co-workers discovered something else. Contrary to the legend, Eva was every inch the professional, never late, always up on her lines. Eddie Albert, amused and moved by the human being who lurks beneath all those layers of froufrou, says, "Eva is about as capricious as a Mack truck."

When it became evident that Green Acres was here to stay, Eva bought herself a Regency house in swank Trousdale Estates in Beverly Hills. and loaded everything (including the garage) with the Louis XV furniture so dear to her luxury-loving little heart. Her fourth husband, like all Gabor men fighting an uphill battle of recognition, closed out his Wall Street brokerage and went to work for Filmways (Green Acres, The Beverly Hillbillies, Petticoat Junction, "The Loved One," etc.) as a vice president in charge of diversifying Filmways' many TV and movie interests. It amuses Brown to say, "She works for me now." She says, "I'm so halpless, I nefer so moch as buy a drass without Reechard's approval."

The house is pure Gabor. The fireplaces are Italian marble, the fire irons 18th-century French, the floors parquet, the chandeliers crystal, the livestock frilly—two Yorkshire terriers named Baby Brown and Miss Magoo. Over the front hall is Eva's "pink surprise," a rose-colored **continued**

floodlight designed to enhance the entrance of the female guests. Over the mantelpiece is a 10-year-old portrait of Eva. It was done "een my trageec peeriod, dolling." (A result of some romantic trouble.) It is one of many in the house along with the Brown collection of contemporary (and largely Italian) art.

#### Acres of closets

Except for Richard's study, the upstairs has been converted into one huge boudoir. What isn't boudoir is acres of closets housing Eva's beigeand-white wardrobe—gowns by Jean Louis, Balenciaga, Norell, Balmain, Sarmi and Dior; minks, sables, leopards, beaver, lamb in all lengths and sizes; buckets of her favorite (her only) perfume, Bandit ("I spreenkle dot pretty good, dolling"); shoes dyed to the color of her hose ("I learned dot treeck from Marlene"); handbags; lingerie—ah, the lingerie ("Zum zings are sacred, dolling!").

Since there is a good deal of sisterly rivalry over their respective jewel collections, not to mention a robbery threat, details are sparse. The important pieces reside in a bank vault. Eva "visits" them. Doors and windows are wired to protect what's left-the big necklace with the diamond drips, the emerald set ("Fabulous, dolling!"), the matched pearls ("from Mama's Madison Avenue shop"), the bracelets, the earrings, the handbags set with diamonds. The bathtub is white marble with steps. On the dressing table are two tiny (onepound) baby-blue bar bells which Eva uses to exercise (you should excuse the expression) her muscles while lying leotarded on a mink rug.

If, as Eddie Albert claims, the Gabors are their own best invention ("Bogart . . . Cooper . . . Grant . . . they invented themselves," insists Al-

bert. "They've got flair, dammit! Style! Imagination! And it's fun to watch them operate!"), then at least one Gabor is home free. Generous to a fare-thee-well, giving of herself, saying exactly what she thinks, Eva is a hard woman to dislike. When she met President Johnson at the White House two years ago, she addressed the Chief Executive as "Mr. President, dolling." The President seemed delighted.

What does Eva "dip down eenside" really think? "Vell, dolling, ve Gabors are zupposed to do nozzing but take bubble baths and dreep weeth jewels. But I've vorked like a dog. I deedn't heff time to seet een ze bubbles. I've leeved een blue jins sahmtimes bott I don't heff ze figure for blue jins. Beeg problems I can cope weeth. Leetle vons drive me op ze vall.

#### She's Aquarius

"I'm Aquarius. I luff life. I adore pepple. I hate phonies. I don't believe you can be evil all wick and get cleared on Sunday. Leeve decently and ze Lord weel forgiff you for not going to Mass. But I'm easily hurt. A look can ruin me. Eef I am not luffed I shreevel up to nozzing, wheech ees ridiculous een thees beesiness. Jewels? Zey are pretty zings, bott fun ees seeting down and talking to sahmvon. Zo vou zee I'm a very courageous character, dolling. I'm also a vatalist. Vhenefer I heff a beeg deceesion to meke I seet down for an hour and leesten to my hunches. I heff learned to let zings hoppen . . ."

Eva seems far away. In the vault, perhaps, visiting her jewels? *Leesten*ing to a hunch? Or just dreaming Hungarian-style? It hardly matters. The woman is emerging from the legend.

And what about that legend? "Eet doesn't really matter, does eet, dolling, as long as you have one."

And he's been in such demand among TV hosts for the past several seasons that few viewers can fail to have bumped into him at least once. He has appeared on the Bell Telephone Hour, Hullabaloo, The Hollywood Palace, Tonight, and on the Ed Sullivan, Judy Garland, Jerry Lewis, Jimmy Dean, Jack Paar, Jack Benny, Bob Hope, Joey Bishop, Dean Martin and Red Skelton Shows-and turned up in an ABC special of his own last April. In addition, this fall he'll visit Andy Williams and Roger Miller and return to a number of variety shows.

#### Why the uproar?

Why all the uproar about a fellow called Jack Jones? Largely because the blandly handsome young man has a clear baritone voice, sings romantic ballads in an easy crooning manner, blasts his finales with engaging energy and remains totally intelligible throughout. Although the first five people polled by this reporter on their reactions to Jack Jones' voice said such things as "anonymous," "uninteresting," "insipid," specialists give him rave reviews. Maurice Chevalier describes his voice as "beautiful." Songwriter Sammy Cahn describes it as "sexy." And Frank Sinatra, who has been predicting for several years that Jack would be "our next major singing star of show business," is now crowing: "Just like I predicted."

As success stories go, the one starring Jack Jones is unusual. He was not a poor boy who made good on his own—he was the child of established celebrities, who made good with, and despite, their help. His father is movie and operetta singer Allan Jones; his mother is actress Irene Hervey, who played Aunt Meg on the Honey West show last season. Says Jack: "A couple of times I've been described as a smart-aleck kid, a spoiled brat who got everything because his parents were well-known. It makes me mad. One of the things people don't realize is that it can also be an obstacle to be a well-known singer's son. The agent says, 'Allan Jones' kid? Oh yeah,' and yawns, bored. He figures you've got no talent, that you're trying to trade on your father's name."

#### Guided by father

Initially, Jack's career was launched under his father's wing. When he was graduated from high school, he joined a night-club act with his father (who is perhaps best-known for singing "Donkey Serenade" to Jeanette Mac-"The Firefly"). They Donald in worked together about a year. Jack says, "We had a well-received act with a lot of references to Mom and home. But when my folks were divorced that knocked the wind out of the whole thing. The divorce forced me into the position of being on my own. It shoved me out of the nest. After the divorce I lost all financial ties with my father. I didn't get anything the easy way after that."

Off stage and screen, Jack Jones does not always create an uproar. He is somewhat chameleonlike. Depending on whom he is with, he can shift into high and low gear. In low gear, he's inclined to be colorless. Says a young TV personality, "If you put him up against a beige wall, you'd lose sight of him." A prominent photographer describes him as "Old Stone Face." His mother somewhat confirms this reaction, when she comments: "I've heard many people mention that Jack is shy. He just doesn't come on strong. He doesn't come on like a big swinger until he's onstage. Offstage he's quiet, unassuming. He's self-effacing; not egotistical."

But, according to loyal friends, when the people and the mood are right, Jack Jones is as colorful as a peacock. Comedian Bob King is an intimate friend of Jack's—and he reports: "He's a very bright guy—one of the most imaginative minds I've met anywhere. Every time I think of him, the word 'creative' comes to mind. Also, he's fantastically funny. He's funnier than many comics in the business." And, says Inez Karma, Bob's wife, who is a TV writer and journalist: "Jack has a finer mind and a more stimulating mind than many scholars."

Jack was married to Lee Laurence, a former San Francisco model, in 1960, and they had a child. After a year or so, a series of little Jones quotes began to show up in the papers indicating that a professional entertainer's career didn't leave much time for family life. The Joneses are now divorced.

And today, Jack is still in a quandary about the marriage-versus-career problem. "I look at my life," he says, "it's all career, career, career. I can't see the solution exactly. If you give up what could be a beautiful relationship between two people just to further your own success and build your own ego and make a fortune, you're cheating yourself. But, on the other hand, I don't think you should just live for someone else. That's sick, too!"

He's inclined to blame women for his troubles. "Most women, today, are pretty concerned with asserting themselves," he says. "They're concerned with their own egos, with accomplishing something other than being a wife. So many women are concerned with: "Why do you have to work? Why can't you be with me?' They feel left out. They don't accept the facts of their husband's business life. "It's a cliché about performers. You have to travel, you have to be on the road. You have to give up certain things. You may have to give up marriage. I don't like it. But maybe that's the way it has to be. What I do know is that I won't give up my career and just go sit someplace and be a husband."

Meantime, while he's looking for a young lady who's willing just to sit someplace and be a wife, the money is rolling in. He's expected to make about \$450,000 this year. It doesn't elate him, at least not visibly. "I make a lot of money," he says, "but my main concern is to keep my money in case something happens to make me stop working tomorrow." He is now moving into other businesses—music publishing and corporations handling TV shows. "I'm just beginning," he says.

#### Seeks acting roles

As "beginnings" go, it's a very auspicious one. He's building up a reputation as a romantic figure in show business. He's even being touted by loyal followers as a "second Cary Grant" (although this inspired one Grant fan to snap: "He's as much like Cary Grant as a filet of sole!").

"I'm moving in the direction of being a romantic actor," he says. "I want to play romantic leads." He's open to any invitation to play a lead in a TV series starring a romantic singing hero. He's also interested in doing comedy in the wake of his appearance on the Skelton show last spring.

He's in hot pursuit of an acting career for the same reason many other actors give—as an escape from the less-than-thrilling experience of being himself. "I enjoy portraying a character," says the fellow with the strangely obliterating name of Jack Jones. "You can make the character more interesting than yourself. You don't have to cop out and say, 'I'm me'."

#### SEPTEMBER CHICKEN 'N' DUMPLINGS / continued

Apples give tang and good flavor to each of these dishes crusty roasted chicken stuffed with apples and prunes, and apple dumplings made even tastier with the addition of bourbon or pineapple juice.

#### APPLE-STUFFED ROAST CHICKEN

Makes 6 to 8 servings

1 roasting chicken, about 6 to 6½ pounds Salt and paprika 8 red cooking apples 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter or margarine, melted
12 small white onions, peeled
1/2 cup water or chicken broth

2 cups large prunes

Wash chicken and pat dry. Sprinkle chicken inside and out with salt and paprika. Cut 2 apples into 6 wedges each, core and put into chicken. Put 8 prunes into chicken, sew or skewer opening. Put chicken on a rack in a shallow pan. Brush with melted butter. Roast in a preheated moderate oven  $(350^{\circ} \text{ F.})$  for 1½ to 2 hours or until a leg can be moved easily. Brush with melted butter every 30 minutes. Cover remaining prunes and onions with water and cook until almost tender. Drain. About 30 minutes before chicken is done, remove from oven. Put remaining apples, cut into ½-inch crosswise slices, prunes and onions into the pan under the rack holding the chicken. Add ½-cup water or chicken broth. Roast for another 30 minutes until chicken and fruits are tender. Serve chicken garnished with apple rings, prunes and onions.

#### ZESTY APPLE DUMPLINGS

#### Makes 6 servings

- 3 cups biscuit mix Grated rind of I lemon
- 3 tbsp. sugar
- 1 cup milk or light cream
- 6 medium cooking apples,
  - peeled, cored and left whole
- 3/4 cup firmly packed dark-brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1/3 cup bourboa or pineapple juice
- 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter or margarine, melted

Combine biscuit mix, lemon rind, sugar and milk. Stir until a soft dough is formed. Knead until smooth on a lightly floured board, roll out to an oblong 8 x 12 inches. Cut into 6 4-inch squares. Put whole apple in center of each square. Mix brown sugar and cinnamon, spoon mixture into center of each apple. Brush outer edge of squares with water. Bring corners over apple, pinching to seal. Turn back corners, exposing center of apple. Put dumplings on a well-greased, shallow baking pan. Spoon bourbon or juice and butter over apples. Bake in preheated moderate oven (375° F.) 40 to 45 minutes, until apples are easily pierced. Serve warm, with whipped or sour cream if desired. —Helen Feingold, Food Consultant; photo by Midori

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

# A View

or a long time, when I was driving my children to and from school, I was puzzled by a tune which they sang, rather incompetently, and which they punctuated by clicking their fingers. Eventually I discovered, by the simple process of watching television with them early one evening, that it was the signature tune of The Addams Family, a program to which they had become addicted. I haven't become an addict-the joke wears thin with repetition-but I am impressed, as so often with U.S. programs, by the sheer professionalism with which the jokes are worked out and the actors perform.

What strikes most British television critics is the hard-working attitude which American directors have toward their job. In the past 10 years we have sat through innumerable Westerns— Wagon Train, Gunsmoke, Cheyenne, Bonanza and others—and the infinite care and skill which have gone into making them puts them fairly and squarely into the category of a minor art form. Westerns, of course, are a peculiarly American art form, but what impresses is that as the demand for them at home and abroad has gone up, the standard—or at least the standard of the ones shown in this country—has never become careless, slapdash or perfunctory.

And occasionally a marvelous thing happens, and the honest, old-fashioned Western suddenly blossoms into something lyrical, reconstructing some of the poetry of the American frontier. I would guess that the British have learned more about the roots of American life, with its neighborliness, its idealism and its guts, from watching The Virginian than from any number of self-conscious cultural exchanges. The Virginian is shown on BBC 2, a channel which sets out to offer more intelligent, even high-brow, fare than the other two (BBC 1 and ITV, the commercial channel), and it is a favorite topic of conversation among those of us who think intellectually well of ourselves.

In a direct line from the poetry and the conflict of the West is a series like The Defenders. The Prestons, père et fils, have some of the same ability to face facts, to see problems in terms of a developing community. They have some of the same, slightly cloying, righteousness; and in their cases, as in the Westerns, the baddies usually come to a sticky end, a state of affairs which, as we know, does not always obtain in life. But no matter. The Defenders have a basic honestythey debate things like drug addiction, mob law, violence, with a passionate sincerity. I see them as a kind of American superego.

My particular hates among the American programs shown here are of two kinds. One hate is the *Perry Mason* series, which rolls on interminably, Perry and Della linked as

platonically as ever, the courtroom scenes as mechanical, the criminal situations as improbable and tedious. Many months ago I remember an episode in which poor Hamilton, Mason's patsy, appeared with one of his feet encased in plaster. It seemed typical of the kind of contempt this series has for the viewer that the script never explained this eccentricity by so much as a skiing accident. The ritual went on as usual, like some unvarying religious ceremony. Keen amateur detective and drawingroom lawyer that I am, I remained convinced up to the last moment that the whole plot must turn upon this broken ankle. I could scarcely take my eyes off it, and missed whole acres of dialog wondering by what clever twist they would introduce it. But, as the rhyming slang has it, not a dickey-bird. Now I shall never know, unless Hamilton happens to read this and drops me a line.

My other hate is a more serious one. It is the cult of the Poor Hero, a sad fellow on whom we are invited to expend pity week after week. Shenandoah is one of these, and its makers seem not at all deterred by the fact that hysterical amnesia does not work in just that way. Obviously they saw the old Ronald Colman film of "Random Harvest" too many times, and have it firmly lodged in their minds that losing one's memory is a high road to romance. But as so often with serials, the theme song, with its emphasis on loneliness and isolation. gives the game away. I have an uneasy feeling that what I am being invited to feel is not "Poor Him," but "Poor (unloved) Me." Thanks very much, but I'm choosy whom I identify with.

The other Poor Hero we see regularly over here is *The Fugitive*. The middle-aged, middle-class ladies want to mother him, the younger ones want to love him, and I suspect that the men would probably quite like to hunt him. I prefer the attitude of a couple of teen-age boys I know, who watch the program strictly for the laughs. The truth is that one gets tired of him being such an old misery, and finds it difficult to believe that he is instantly spotted whenever he takes a job, or settles down somewhere.

I prefer dewy Kildare, who is much loved here by the mums and the pretty foreign girls imported as mothers' helpers. I envy him that drama-filled hospital, in which rich human emotions blossom on every side, and in which action never falters. I would gladly swap my boring old newspaper office in which nothing ever seems to happen more exciting than the bringing out of the first edition.

The Dick Van Dyke Show is widely, and deservedly, admired in Britain, where we have never yet managed to produce a native television family of undisputed charm. Mary Tyler Moore exercises a persistent fascination; British men want to get married to her.

To speak generally about American programs, they have a reliability as entertainment which is appreciated by British viewers. The viewers know pretty well what they are going to get when they switch on, and they are not cheated. If there is a fault, it is perhaps that sometimes, as in *Perry Mason*, or *The FBI*, a series which has only just reached us, the ideas have become processed to the point where the human flavor has disappeared. At best, however, I believe the American influence has fertilized and enriched British television.

But I have left the best till last, and the best is the marvelous procession of Hanna-Barbera cartoons which I have no hesitation in saying are the best productions, from any source, which we see on our television screens. The wit, the grace, the charm, of Yogi Bear, Augie Doggie, Snagglepuss and all the rest have helped me to go on through many a gray day, convinced that life, after all, is good. Can one ask for more?


