The grass always seems greener on the other side of the ocean—especially to critics. That was evident recently when the television reviewer for Britain's Punch had a few words to say about the BBC's presentation of *The Andy Williams Show.*

Punch's man was relatively kind to Williams and his guests, but: "One of the irritating things about these programmes is the sudden unnatural break that occurs so frequently, due . . . to the fact that the British viewer cannot be allowed to hear those few 'words from the sponsor' without which the programme could never be made."

The commercials for companies that sponsor Williams are about as easy to take as any on the air, but it still seems strange to hear someone complain because they've been cut. We'll bet that critic has never been subjected to a steady diet of American commercials—say during a late movie.

It's entirely possible that we'll be seeing more commercials, not less, at least during the hours before and after the prime evening hours. The Federal Communications Commission used to call stations to task for "overcommercialization," and was especially strict with stations that signed the broadcasters' Television Code and then ran more commercials than the Code allowed.

• Now the FCC is merely asking all licensees who find it necessary to devote more than the Code limit of 16 minutes per hour (in non-prime time) to commercials to explain why. Indications are that any reasonable excuse will be accepted.

This point of view can be supported with good legal arguments and there's no doubt that Congress approves of a liberal policy so far as the number of TV commercials is concerned, but for heaven's sake, if Congress and the FCC don't hold the line, what's a poor viewer to do? Move to England?

THE F Stands For Frustration



The problems and headaches of a regulatory agency that can't really do much regulating

First of three parts BY MARTIN MAYER

Of all the alphabet agencies spawned by Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal, the FCC-Federal Communications Commission-is the one most likely to be in the news and in the minds of people who are not lawyers or politicians or part of the business the agency regulates. Family television sets are on for six hours a day, and the FCC is the only official Government body that has anything at all to do with what appears on those screens. The air is public if anything is, and people look to the FCC, often hopefully (because everybody has his own grudge against something in television), to make clear what they expect from the broadcasters.

In fact, however, Government regulation of broadcasting started off less as a help to the consumer than as a service to the industry. What was killing broadcasting (and infuriating listeners) back in the 1920's, when regulation began, was the fact that two signals on the same (or nearly the same) frequency will instantly interfere with each other if they carry into each other's territory. There was no way for the broadcasters themselves to keep intruders out of their frequencies: Only the Government could do it. In 1927 the confusion became desperate, and Congress established a Federal Radio Commission with the power to grant broadcasters exclusive licenses to their frequencies. The Commission was to keep its hands off the question of *how* the public air was used: The responsibility was strictly to decide *who* should have the use of it.

The new Commission reported to the then Secretary of Commerce, Herbert Hoover; and among its first employees, in 1928, was a young law student named Rosel H. Hyde, who stayed with the agency after Congress had made it an independent Federal Communications Commission in 1934, and is still there—as Chairman. Considering how close to impossible the FCC in recent years has found the revocation of any broadcasting license (proceedings were started in 1965 against only two of almost 7000 radio and television stations), it is interesting to note that the Radio Commission in its first two years ordered out of business completely 150 of the 732 stations that were in operation when the agency began work.

Though the seven Commissioners don't much like to hear it (and neither does the President, who appoints them subject to confirmation by the Senate), the FCC is fundamentally a branch of Congress. Its reason for being is to write the laws (the official word is "rules") which a fastmoving business like broadcasting provokes in greater numbers than a busy legislature like Congress can provide, in detailed complexity greater than a technically ignorant body like Congress can understand. Thus, the "independent regulatory agencies," of which the FCC is one: Congress delegates certain of its powers to make law, setting down the standards within which the agencies must work.

In the case of the FCC, these standards are, as Judge Henry J. Friendly once put it, "more than usually meaningless." Empowering an administrative agency to decide whether or not railroads should be allowed to shut down a line. Congress had told the Interstate Commerce Commission to "public convenience consider and necessity." Liking the phrase, but feeling it was somehow incomplete. the men who wrote the Communications Act in 1934 told the FCC Commissioners that in awarding broadcast licenses they should be guided by "public interest, convenience and necessity." But it is one thing, not too difficult, to determine whether a given slice of the public needs rail service: something else to decide whether it needs a radio or TV station-and something else again, wildly different, to conclude that one man rather than another should be awarded a broadcasting license because this fellow more than that fellow will use his license (a gift of the Government, which may be worth millions) to serve "the public interest, convenience and necessity."

Nobody "owns" a broadcasting license in the normal sense of the word "own"-every three years a license must be renewed. At that time, the FCC can simply put any broadcaster out of business by taking away his license and giving it to somebody else. Every so often, a new Commissioner threatens to do just that to lots of broadcasters (this direct threat, rather than the publicized phrase about "a vast wasteland," was what the television industry most remembered about Newton Minow's maiden speech as Chairman in 1961). The new Commissioner makes these threats soon after he learns that if he can't revoke licenses he almost can't do anything.

The FCC does have limited authority to impose small fines, but as a practical matter its powers are restricted to life and death-keep the license or give it back-as though a judge's only choice in dealing with a burglar were to set him free or order him electrocuted. Moreover, the only grounds on which the Commission can properly deny a renewal is clear proof that the station has failed to serve public interest, convenience and necessity. "The Commission," says an officer of a network, "is trying to enforce something it can't even define. You can't make a crime out of a mystery -that's Kafka." So in the end nothing happens.

Given the existing law, the political context and prevailing judicial attitudes, not much *can* happen, officially. What most interests everyone except an engineer is the quality of the programs on the air—but the Communications Act specifically forbids the Commission to **continued**

supervise program content. Though many Congressmen cheerfully declare themselves in favor of regulation. a number of them (like the Johnson family) own at least some piece of a television station-and the rest rely on the good will of local broadcasters to carry their reports from Washington free of charge. The vagueness of the standards laid down in the Act makes courts reluctant to support the Commissioners when the losers in an FCC contest take an appeal-in one recent stretch, the Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia overruled the FCC in nine straight cases. (In fairness, as one of the Commissioners points out, no judge on that bench ever had any experience with a regulatory agency.) Finally, the FCC is still to a degree under the shadow of the bad name it acquired, deservedly, during the years when the Truman and Eisenhower Administrations threw a few bones to political grifters in the form of Commission appointments. One Commissioner from that era died while under criminal indictment, and another resigned while under Congressional fire.

Only 1500 employees

Even if the law were more flexible, the Congress and the courts more sympathetic and the past more reputable, the FCC would be in constant trouble. Budgeted at about \$17,000,000 a year, with only 1500 employees around the country, the agency is charged with licensing *all* broadcasting, including, for example, ham operators, police cars and radio-summoned taxicabs; and *all* interstate or overseas messages on wire, including long-distance telephone calls, telegrams, etc.

In addition to routine field checking of whether stations are using more power than authorized, keeping their

log books correctly and generally behaving themselves, the agency must handle 3000 formal applications of one sort or another every day. The 300odd matters on which the Commissioners actually hold a hearing make an argued case-load twice that of the Supreme Court, but account for only one-thirtieth of one percent of the applications that must be processed. The rush, always under outside pressure, means that guite important decisions are often made sloppily: The Commission was saved only by the Korean War from the consequences of a decision that would have saddled the industry with color television that could not have been received on a black-and-white set; and nothing saved television from the FCC's decision to mix VHF and UHF stations in the same markets, thereby guaranteeing at least the initial failure of the UHF band

An unfavorable report


In a report to John F. Kennedy shortly before he assumed the Presidency, James M. Landis, once dean of the Harvard Law School and head of the Civil Aeronautics Board, wrote that the FCC "seems incapable of policy planning, of disposing within a reasonable period of time the business before it, of fashioning procedures that are effective to deal with its problems." A similar investigation today would yield an only slightly more charitable result-but there is nobody to blame. It's hard for a man to keep his tie on straight, let alone sort out an infinitely long list of business and financial affairs in a neat and orderly manner, if he's forever on the run.

One result is an air of frustration and irritation with one's colleagues that hangs in the halls at the Commission's plain offices in the Post Office Department building on Pennsylvania Avenue about halfway between the Capitol and the White House. During the 32 years of its existence the FCC has had 16 Chairmen (counting Rosel Hyde twice, because he also held his current post for the first year of the Eisenhower Administration). None of them ever advanced from this job to a greater public office.

Still, the severity of the punishments the Commission theoretically can impose means that no station owner can risk ignoring it. "They're worried about their licenses daily, weekly, monthly," says a Washington lawyer who earns his living basically by feeding information out from the FCC to station owners across the country. "When the inspector walks into their offices, they want to know exactly what he'll be looking for." The Commission has never disciplined any station severely for limiting its service to claptrap, but it has threatened to do so-and there might always be a first time.

The grounds for such action would be the station's failure to live up to the promises it made (heavy local coverage, attention to public affairs, service programs, etc.) while arguing for its original license or a previous renewal. "In my time there," says the Washington lawyer Paul Porter, who served as Chairman shortly after the war, "my old friend Cliff Durr was playing left end, and when renewals came up Cliff would make this comparison between promise and performance. If there was a raving disparity, as there often was, Cliff would say we should have a hearing, and I would go along. It got so we had half the industry on temporary licenses; we didn't have enough hearing examiners to handle the business. We discovered that of 26 clear-channel [radio] stations, only one or two had farm directors; we made a lot of jobs for county agents. Then we issued a blue book-'Public Service Responsibilities of Broadcasters'-and said, Go and sin no more. It had a short-term continued salutary effect."

Urged on by James J. Wadsworth, one of the newer Commissioners ("He hasn't yet discovered," says a station lawyer irritably, "that it's his staff which tells broadcasters what they have to promise"), the FCC has been moving back toward some measurement of promise versus performance.

Starting this year, broadcasters will make their promises on new and much less detailed application forms, which require them only to pledge that certain rough percentages of broadcast time will be devoted to 1) public affairs, 2) sports, 3) entertainment and 4) everything else. "It looks much less restrictive than the old form, which had seven specific categories," says Commissioner Lee Loevinger, "but that makes it more significant." The important category will be the "everything else"; rather than trying to hold the stations to their percentages, the Commission will require a certain minimum, some of it at hours when people may actually be watching, for local or unusual programming. The requirement will probably be leaked informally to the Washington lawyers rather than issued as a rule, because a rule can be knocked down by Congress or the courts, while "regulation by lifted eyebrow" can make most station owners nervous enough to change their schedules.

Letters from viewers

Members of the viewing public can sometimes make the eyebrow lift, too. "We get letters from people," says William Ray, director of the Commission's complaint bureau, "simply saying that there's too much crime and violence, or that there shouldn't be wrestling on television. We recommend that they make their views known to the licensee, and we send the station a copy of the letter. Sometimes, when the complaint is specific —on such and such a commercial at such and such an hour the sound was too loud—we get action: The station writes back that it screened the commercial, the sound *was* too loud, and the advertising agency has been notified that this commercial will not be shown again. All complaints go into the folder to be looked over when renewal application comes in; and we call the attention of the renewal people to what the folder contains." No station wants too many letters in that folder, so viewers (and pressure groups) have a little leverage.


Not much leverage

Ultimately, though, neither the angry viewer nor the FCC itself has any great leverage, because the public as a whole is not unhappy with the television service it receives; and the Commission is supposed to serve the public. A few years back, FCC hearings were held in Chicago and Omaha to determine what people thought of their local TV stations; when it was suggested that the next stop might be Iowa, the Iowa legislature formally resolved that the FCC should stay out of its state. Though there is always a danger that such an attitude can slop over into a refusal to regulate at all, Chairman Hyde can argue convincingly that "stations are under constant community examination every hour that they're operating."

In most cities, anyway, not many people care much one way or the other about their local station, because they don't watch what the local station puts out. What they watch, what they love or hate (and what they want the FCC to do something about) is the programming that comes from the networks.

uring the current TV season NBC is planning to run a number of onehour specials dealing with the worlds of various animals. The first of these will be seen on Nov. 25, and will be "It's a Dog's World." One segment of this program will deal with tracking lost children, fugitive evil-doers and other disconnecteds. Bloodhounds, as all true lovers of "Uncle Tom's Cabin" and old Universal werewolf pictures know, are undaunted trackers. So the Wolper Productions team went off into the wilderness with the Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team, which is a volunteer group set up to ferret out folk who hide out in or wander into the mountains. The rescue squad often works with the U.S. Forestry Service and area fire departments.

The mission that was photographed was a sham—one that was held to keep the dogs in shape but made more arduous for TV purposes.

Two boys, the sons of two of the volunteers, were the "quarry." Once these boys got an adequate lead, the dogs were "fired" (given some article of the boys' clothing so as to recognize the scent) and set off at the ends of long tethers—the reason for the long leashes being that, if a dog runs itself off a cliff, its handler won't necessarily go with it. These dogs don't stop for anything once they've started, and will quit a spoor only when they find their quarry, or if they lose the scent entirely.

We're glad to say that the operation was a success. After all had been flown to an almost inaccessible area by helicopter, the whole crowd-dogs, handlers, crew and photographer (ours) had to scrabble down a sheer cliff. And they had to reshoot a scene, because at one point someone kicked a log and stirred up a nest of yellow jackets.

But everything works out fine. In really no time at all, His and Henrietta, the intrepid bloodhounds, find the boys. The stings are salved, the bruises healed. It's all on film, and Eliza is across the ice.

Over hill and dale the intrepid searchers careen. The handlers are helmeted because the dogs will charge on through any sort of near-impassable terrain.



He's Merv Griffin PERIOD



This talk-show host hates to talk—about himself BY ROBERT HIGGINS In Merv Griffin's production offices atop a toy-sized Broadway theater where *The Merv Griffin Show* (an almost Thermo-Faxed copy of *Tonight*) is taped, there's a framed

> picture of Flash Gordon. Thanks to some paste-up

surgery, Flash's face is Merv's and, underneath, a caption reads: "And so Flash *Griffin* sets off on a perilous mission—a daring young man against fearful odds."

In TV's chatterbox derby-where shows traditionally get dumped like dirty ash travs-Griffin (his show is syndicated by Westinghouse Broadcasting Company) is, in fact, something of a boy wonder. The program, now carried in 65 markets, was the fastest selling of its kind in syndicated history. Not that Griffin could go around licking sci-fi spooks the way Flash used to. But Flash probably couldn't beat Griffin's record in the show-business wars, either, He started out at 19, pulling in a fast \$1500 a week as a San Francisco radio singer. That was followed by a road job singing with Freddy Martin's band; a smash hit record ("I've Got a Lovely Bunch of Cocoanuts"); movies (for Warners); TV game-show emceeing; and his own critically successful, vet low-rated, davtime version of Tonight on NBC in 1962.

On the business side, Griffin owns six production companies—and just how much loot that's bringing in is anybody's guess. But when you figure that Griffin is reported to get \$150,000 a year for his own show alone, the guessing isn't unpleasant.

All of which adds up to an impressive list of accomplishments. So, upon meeting Griffin, one expects to find if not exactly Flash Gordon, a man justifiably proud of his credits. But one learns instead that Merv putting down Merv professionally is pretty much par for the conversational course. "On my show," Merv says in an unfailingly enthusiastic yet oddly controlled voice, "I'm a traffic cop, that's all. I don't make sparks. I promote them. I'm a catalyst. America doesn't want to know what Merv Griffin cares about, feels or thinks."

Truth is, it's almost virtually impossible to find out *what* Merv Griffin "cares about, feels or thinks." He's affable enough, but he answers most questions in two or three sentences punctuated with periods as prohibitive as boulders. No amount of prodding gets much more out of him.

Here's a little of how little you get out of Griffin:

On his childhood: "I was terribly happy and secure." PERIOD. He was also terribly fat, weighing in as a teen-ager at 250 pounds: "Being fat never affected me emotionally," adding an incredible, "All fat people are jolly and happy." PERIOD.

On Merv the man: "I don't know and I don't care what makes me tick. I'm not self-analytical. I'm emotionally secure and happy." PERIOD.

On his career (which has been a bit bumpy at times): "It's been great fun. It still is. It's the great love of my life." PERIOD.

One comes away with a sketch of a man professionally self-negating and socially noncommittal. And it's a little hard to fit that in with the picture of Griffin the successful talk-show host and budding theatrical tycoon. Julann Griffin, Merv's wife, has an answer to Merv the myth: "Merv's always been misplaced as a performer. He tightens up in the limelight. He knows how unimportant it is. Merv finds his greatest joy in producing, in running his companies. He's really a businessman at heart."

There may be some truth in this. San Mateo, Cal., was the home where Griffin, at age 4, was already playing the piano—and not just fooling around, either. By 12 he was so accomplished that he was on his way to becoming a concert pianist. "But I never loved playing," Merv declares. "It was simply an open door to other things."

One of those things was singing. At 19 he was good enough to have a radio show dumped in his lap. "Merv never thought about singing professionally," Julann says. "He merely wandered into the studio to accompany a friend and they hired him." Says Merv: "Singing was a bore to me. I hated saying someone else's words."

Be that as it may, he must have been pretty good at it, because bandleader Freddy Martin offered him a road job. Griffin sang with Martin from 1948 to 1952, during which time he recorded the "Cocoanuts" song, one of the all-time best sellers. Merv puts himself down there, too. "That thing embarrasses me," he says. "What talent did *that* take. It was all gimmicked up. Phony. Fake."

He downgrades his Hollywood success too. Griffin landed there in 1953 and stayed to make four pictures. ("So This Is Love" opposite Kathryn Grayson being a fairly good one). Only, says Griffin, "I just packed my bags one day and left town. I couldn't stand mouthing those inane words in that nowhere town." Griffin got to mouth some better words when he later did a revival of "Finian's Rainbow" in New York. "But even there," Merv says, "I didn't stand out. I had a good chorus behind me. *They* made me look good."

In 1959 Griffin, the man who had successfully launched and rejected careers in music and acting, found himself in the decidedly less-demanding (artistically, anyway) world of TV game shows, his first being *Play Your Hunch* on CBS. "At least," Merv rationalizes, "I was speaking my own words—using my *brain.*" His brain came in handy because he had more such game-show hosting **continued** chores ahead of him (Keep Talking and Word for Word).

In 1959 Griffin married Julann, an attractive ex-comedienne (they have a son, Tony, 6). Even then, says Julann, Griffin was a displaced Rotarian. Says she: "You'd go to one of his parties and be likely to meet the grocery boy. Show people have always bored Merv." They apparently still do. Says Merv. "Standing around a party saying what a nice gal Arlene Francis is, that's not for me. I need more intellectual stimulation than that."

Griffin got a taste of "intellectual stimulation" when he sat in for Jack Paar in 1962, before Carson took over Tonight. That stint led to his afternoon version of Tonight. NBC killed the show, but according to Merv, it was "one of the greatest things" that ever happened to him. "Because of the commotion the cancellation caused," Griffin says, "NBC was desperate to get me back. For a game show. I said, 'OK, I'll go back-but only if I can own the show' [which turned out to be Word for Word]. It was blackmail, sure, but let me tell vou it made me feel darn happy."

Many Griffin enterprises

Griffin has plenty of productions to take care of nowadays. His enterprises are quite impressive for a couple of years' work. In addition to his own show Griffin has the game show Jeopardy, a music-publishing business, two radio stations, a special recording deal with MGM records, and an independent movie company. He keeps 125 people on staff to man all this, along with two separate production centers (on the East and the West side of New York). And although TV game shows and pop records are a long way from classical music and an acting career. Merv maintains he doesn't

mind. "I've found what's important to me," he says. "At 41 I'm professionally and personally secure. What more can a man want?"


What more? Well . . . not everybody feels that Griffin is all that crazy about being behind an executive desk—or socially secure, either. As one perceptive acquaintance offered: "Merv is a gifted man in many artistic realms who never quite found himself in any of them. As the years have gone by, he's been locking up the more sensitive, artistic side of him for the more hardheaded, 'practical' side. I could accept his claim that he really wants to be a 'Rotarian' more readily if it weren't accompanied by such an emotional freeze."

Always a con man

As possible as that may be, there are many who feel that Griffin has really found what he wants in life. Associate producer Bob Murphy, who's known Merv since childhood, says: "Merv's always been a promoter—a con man. But not offensively so. He's just a nice, happy guy getting what he wants." Arthur Treacher, Griffin's couch-warming side-kick, agrees. Says he: "Merv's an uncomplicated man who is genuinely happy working his head off at what he loves best. Anyone who says otherwise has his own ax to grind."

Ax-grinders notwithstanding, there's still something mysterious about a genuinely talented man dogmatically diminishing his creative past—and turning himself into a noncommittal cipher. Julann Griffin describes him as "the staff of life—sort of like wholewheat toast." Griffin certainly comes across about as exciting as wholewheat toast today. That wasn't the old Merv, however. The creative Griffin, though never a major success in any one field, was nevertheless, as one old friend put it, "far more a rich chunk of chocolate cake."



SULLIVAN STEW

Or, toss in the onions-the commercial's on

he information contained herein is not likely to get this Beloved American Journalist a regular Peabody Award next year, but I do feel that the committee will recognize my contribution to television and the public by striking off some sort of honorary special medal.

I have discovered something as simple, and sensational, as that man did who taught the soft-drink company how to make billions. His secret, sold (so the legend goes) for \$50,000, was: "Bottle it."

My secret is one word longer. I am

not selling it; I am giving it away. It is a formula for making *The Ed Sullivan Show* endurable. It is as follows: "Cook during it."

On Sunday, Sept. 25, I had a fairly normal day. Up at dawn, I worked on a ridiculous novel I am trying to write, had some breakfast, shot myself a game of pool, wrote some letters, took a walk, went back to the novel, watched two football games, read the newspapers during the dull stretches of those two contests, and finally dozed off.

My lady finally awakened me. It was

about 7:45 P.M. "I'm hungry," she said.

I confess to an addiction. I, since I first bought a television set 10 years ago, cannot permit a Sunday night to go by without watching Ed Sullivan. This habit cannot be kicked by about 27,000,000 other Americans. Sunday nights we are all there at the seats in front of our sets, watching Old Smiley living and loving the way we like him, as antique movie advertisements used to say.

Sullivan is a reliable purveyor. The man from Port Chester, N.Y., invariably presents something for everyone. There have been times, it is true, when (in my opinion) he has come up with programs that have presented nothing for anyone, but generally his batting average has been very high indeed. Also, despite his performance as an emcee, which is comparable to my ability with a monkey wrench or any other tool, including a hammer, he has presented some wonderful new talent and has showcased some of the old-graciously, if perhaps a bit stumblingly. Over the years I have become increasingly fond of him.

For some reason I missed the opening of this Sunday, Sept. 25, show. The reason became apparent after five minutes. The set was not plugged in.

"I'm hungry," the call came again. It ought to be explained right here that I do the cooking on weekends, not just to give her a break from the routine, but because cooking is my hobby. When I had finally figured out what was wrong with the set and plugged it into the wall, I found myself in the middle of an act of three girls in shimmering gowns who looked like imitations of the McGuire Sisters. I rushed to the kitchen, opened a can of frozen Vichyssoise, dumped it into the blender and threw in an ounce of sherry, two dashes of Worcestershire sauce, one of Tabasco, and generous portions of salt and pepper. We eat hot stuff around here.

I dashed back to the set. The girls

were going off. There stood Ed Sullivan looking like a mimic made up to do an Ed Sullivan impersonation. He was cracking his knuckles as usual. One of the mysteries of our age is why he has not broken off all his fingers during all these years.

The set had begun to work at 8:05. It was now 8:11, and we millions were getting a word from our sponsor. I tore back to the kitchen, turned on the blender and pulled some hamburger out of the refrigerator. Putting it on a breadboard, I turned off the blender, set the blender jar in the refrigerator, grabbed the hamburgered breadboard and scrambled back to the set, where I laughed myself silly watching a group called the Uncalledfor Three.

The three young comics were on until about 8:17 (it was hard to see my watch in the dark). Ed then began to introduce ball players—old ones—in the audience, and while they were taking bows I molded the hamburger into two patties.

Salt, pepper and parsley

At 8:20 Frank Fontaine entered the screen. He was wearing his Crazy Guggenham hat and making that foolish face. "Oh, lord," I thought, and hustled the hamburgers to the kitchen, where I salted and peppered and parsleyed them, grabbed two tomatoes and an onion, and sprinted back to the set. There, to my immense delight, Fontaine had abandoned the wearisome Crazy Guggenham pose and was doing his old stand-up material.

Fontaine was not as funny as I remembered him from his night-club days, but he was funny enough, and this act was a welcome change from Crazy. During it I managed to slice the onions on the breadboard, using my pocketknife. I cut only one finger. During the commercial that followed I cut up the tomatoes and flogged them and the onions to the **continued**

kitchen, where I put them in a skillet and added one-eighth pound of butter and then turned on the broiler, under which I put the hamburger.

At about 8:31 Ethel Merman came on, cawing and bawling out a medley of Irving Berlin songs. My viewing companion, making herself heard above the din, repeated rather plaintively, "Hungry."

"Be patient," I said. I now was husking corn and watching the superb Nipsey Russell. But he was doing old night-club routines which I had seen long since and, although it was nice to see him again, this gave me the opportunity to hie myself to the kitchen to see how the onions and tomatoes were doing in the butter, and to turn over the hamburgers that were under the broiler. I also put on a large pot of water for the corn.

At 8:43 he grabs the hamburgers

At 8:43 there was another commercial, delivered in one of those insinuating voices that seem to be the style these days. I got back to the kitchen and grabbed another pot and took out the hamburgers and threw them and the onions and tomatoes into that pot and added tiny pinches of oregano and tarragon and sage and basil and turned the burner to MED.

Back at the set, still husking corn, I watched Steve Rossi singing what Sullivan described as "his latest record." I tried to watch and listen, couldn't, and went back to the kitchen like Jesse Owens and Norwood Ewell in their primes, taking the corn along and hurling it into its pot.

At 8:46 Allen Funt presented us with some views of Ed Sullivan in situations with puzzled people. Allen Funt has a single joke that was not especially funny in the first place. Back to the kitchen; I could have beaten Ewell and Owens on that trip. I opened a can of bouillon and poured that over the hamburgers and onions and tomatoes; salted and sugared the corn water, which was beginning to simmer; and then made my way up to the set with some difficulty, for I barked my shins on a chair in the dining room in the process.

Merman again. She was saying—one could hardly call it singing—that she had the sun in the morning and the moon at night. I had heard that before. I went to the kitchen and snatched two plates, two forks, two spoons and two napkins, and galloped back to set them on a small table in front of the set. "Isn't it *done*?" she asked.

An inviting mixture

The exuberance about the sun and the moon was still being trumpeted. No—blared. The kitchen called. Yes, my innocent stew was losing its innocence. It was becoming an inviting mixture, sending off aromas that could have got Ethel Merman away from ear-torturing. If she had smelled it, she would have abandoned her career and gone into cooking.

At 8:51 there was another insinuating voice delivering a commercial. "Is there nothing we can do about these voices?" I asked my consort.

"I'm so hungry I could eat a horse," she said, insinuatingly, if perhaps not originally, thereby launching me into the kitchen again.

The corn was done. The stew was done. The Vichyssoise was as cold as the Fairbanks airport's waiting room. I gave her the Vichyssoise while Sullivan announced next week's guests.

We ate up all the dinner while watching the show after Sullivan, which was Garry Moore's. "I'm still hungry," she complained. During Moore's commercials I made us a dessert, consisting of green crème de menthe over chocolate ice cream. The whole thing could not have been done, however, without Ed's help.



ALIVE AND KICKING

The editorial on pay-TV in the Oct. 29 issue of TV GUIDE provided ample evidence that the author of the column, "As We See It," is desperately in need of corrective lenses. The 7000 Hartford area families who enjoy subscription TV, over the country's only pay-TV station, must have been surprised to learn that the medium is "dead." The Federal Communications Commission is currently considering the expansion of pay-TV on a national level and has expressed the opinion that the medium "appears to be in the public interest." Your opinion, however, coincides with that of the three networks and the powerful motion picture theater groups, who shiver at the thought of losing control over what the American public can and cannot see. Your writer could not think "offhand" of any large sports events which are not on commercial TV. Offhand I can think of every heavyweight championship fight in the United States in the last five years, major league football games which are "blacked out" within 75 miles of the home team's area, and the Indianapolis 500 mile race. Lewis, Maybe; Chaplin, Not Yet

NBC has had talks in recent days with Jerry Lewis about fronting a weekly show a la Dean Martin, his onetime comedy sparring partner. Lewis's last TV outing, a two-hour Saturday night affair on ABC in 1963, was a painful, short-lived bust. NBC's idea, it seems, would be to install Jerry in a format resembling the early-day Colgate Comedy Hour.

Charles Chaplin, famed comedian and expatriate, who has shunned TV exposure of any sort, is reportedly in a mood to appear in a special. The U.S. networks, however, have been hesitant to grab what would otherwise be a tempting offer for fear the program might come off as a plug for the soon-to-be-released Chaplin-directed movie "A Countess from Hong Kong," starring Sophia Loren and Marlon Brando. A CBS executive said his network would "love to get" Chaplin when the time seems right.

Raymond Burr's two-hour movie-for-TV, "Ironside," could develop into a new weekly series for him. This time Burr plays a San Francisco cop. "Ironside" is one of three such films to be made by Universal for NBC, all of them doubling as pilots for series. Another: "I Love a Mystery," based on the old radio serial.

Did CBS crib from NBC or NBC from CBS? Both networks on the same night—Jan. 9—within half an hour of one another will introduce new comedies. NBC's replacement for Roger Miller's songfests will be one concerning a meek police chemist who turns into *Captain Nice*, a supercrimefighter, when he swallows a secret potion. CBS's substitution for *Run*, *Buddy*, *Run* will recount the exploits of a gas-station attendant who becomes *Mr*. *Terrific* upon downing a secret pill. The title roles in both cases will be played by nonstars.

An Albany, N.Y., station, WTEN, at CBS's behest, will swap the Saturday night air times of *Mission: Impossible* and *Pistols 'n' Petticoats* for one month to see whether this improves the ratings of these two new CBS series. A spokesman vowed this sort of experimental program shuffling is "nothing new." If so, it has been a well-concealed practice.

The Kremlin declined to renew a twoweek visa for CBS News reporter George Syvertsen, sent to Moscow to succeed Hughes Rudd, and CBS is currently without a correspondent in the Soviet. The freeze-out is traced in part at least to Russian displeasure over a River Volga documentary aired by CBS last year.

Briefly: Networkers say it is only coincidental that the air date of the first *CBS Playhouse* special, a 90-minute original drama about a Negro soldier fighting in Vietnam, is next Feb. 12— Lincoln's birthday... The networks have turned down a *Bob Hope Theater*-type drama anthology series with Doris Day, longtime TV holdout, as star-hostess. Her price was too high.—*Richard K. Doan*

these have been shown over theater closed-circuit TV and some of them over subscription TV. In addition, pay-TV brings home local sports events which are unfeasible for commercial TV but which serve the interest of viewers willing to pay for the privilege. The editorial was also in error with the statement that recent network film purchases "just about clears the vaults of movies that haven't been offered to free television." The recently acquired films are for future, not current, commercial TV exposure. Example: "The Music Man" introduced with great network fanfare last month, was shown on subscription TV and in theaters over four years ago. "The Bridge on the River Kwai" was released in 1958. There are hundreds of other good older and current films which will not be seen on commercial TV for years. Subscription TV, however, shows these new films today without editing and without commercial interruption. They are programmed at the same time they are being shown more expensively in theaters. Concerning the new medium, TV GUIDE asks, "Who needs it?" More to the point would be, "Who wants it?" The answer: thus far 7000 families in the Hartford area. The probability: millions of other Americans who are waiting for the opportunity of a better choice in television viewing when subscription TV is available in their communities. To borrow a phrase from a former Hartford resident of note. Mark Twain: "The reports of our death are greatly exaggerated."







THE STRANGE HISTORY OF A-5714



He is Robert Clary, who has moved from Buchenwald (in Germany) to Stalag 13 (in Hollywood)

Robert Clary's role as the French prisoner of war in *Hogan's Heroes* requires that he "intern" himself three days a week on the "Stalag 13" set. Which means that for exterior scenes—the watchtowers, the barbed-wire stockade—he reports to the back lot at Desilu's Culver City studio. For interior shots—barracks and the like—he has to make his way cross-town to Desilu's Hollywood lot 10 miles away. The setting of this make-believe stalag is wartime Germany, sometime in 1942.

During the really true 1942, Robert Clary—a Jew, a French citizen whose name at birth was Robert Max Widerman—was a seven-days-of-theweek prisoner in the German concentration camp "Ottmuth," whose watchtowers, barbed-wire stockade, searchlights, machine guns, SS men, and barracks were located on the same "lot" in Upper Silesia.

Clary survived three years in Ottmuth, Blechhamer, Gross-Rosen and Buchenwald concentration camps. His prison number was continued

tattooed on the upper part of his left forearm, and it is there today: A-5714.

Concentration camps and prisonerof-war camps are not the same dish of tea. Still and all, the parallels and the contrasts in the true-life experiences of Robert Clary are unsettling to contemplate. As "LeBeau" in Hogan's Heroes Clary is a gourmet chef, among other talents, and the scripts require him to dish up delectables like crêpes suzette flambées right under the noses of his German captors. In the concentration camps he had to get by on a diet of considerably less caloric content. He subsisted on one cup of watery soup each midday and one chunk of bread each night. He scavenged food scraps from refuse containers. "I used to sneak out to the SS pigsty to scrounge for rutabaga peelings."

Change of garb

At Desilu LeBeau wears a jaunty beret which he pulls off when snapping to attention in the office of "Colonel Klink," commandant of "Stalag 13." In Upper Silesia, Clary's head was shaved and he was clothed in the shapeless zebra-striped prisoner's get-up with a zebra-striped head covering which he was obliged to remove whenever passing within three yards of an SS man. For footwear he was issued holtzpantinen-narrow lengths of wood with a strip of cotton across the toes. He wore the yellow Star of David on the back and front of his tunic and on his pants.

Existence in the concentration camp was a matter of gun, club and whip. Prisoners were allowed to live only until their working power was used up. As Clary recollects: "We'd come back exhausted from hard labor at the war factories, and the SS guards would line us up at attention for three hours to witness the hanging of some poor wretch who maybe stole a piece of garbage."

In a *Heroes* episode aired on CBS last December the situation-comedy Germans schemed to install a synthetic fuel plant at "Stalag 13" so it would be safe from Allied bombers. By disturbing coincidence, Clary's second slave-labor factory had been a synthetic gasoline plant. He remembers its name: Obersliese Hydrier Werke. The RAF bombed the plant day after day, but it was verboten for Clary or any Jew to take shelter.

One of Clary's functions as LeBeau is to keep on friendly terms with the police dogs. LeBeau talks to the dogs and they lick his face affectionately except when Klink is around, when the dogs are supposed to pretend to be vicious.

In life, Clary has had less felicitous experiences with SS dogs who were not pretending:- "When the Russian armies were approaching, we could hear the cannons roaring, and the SS ordered us to evacuate the camp. We started out with 4000 of us-a long line of hollow spectres in rags-trudging in the mud, in the rain, in the frozen cold, from early morning until late at night, spending nights in the open in temperatures below zero. In 15 days they gave us only twice a small piece of bread and a small square of margarine. Our very small ration of bread was stolen by the stronger people. We got one cup of water a day.

"The great terror on the road was to stay on your feet. If you were too weak to go on, you were beaten to death, your skull bashed in, or half your cranium shot away by the SS guards with their fingers on the trigger and their dogs on the leashes. They were German shepherds, same as *Hogan*'s. After 15 days there were only 1200 of us still alive."

"If you liked World War II, you'll love *Hogan's Heroes*," promised the CBS promo which originally advertised the series. The critics had a field day, Jack Gould of the New York Times fussing about "the depiction of the Nazis as silly old buffoons in the silent-movie tradition, hopeless oafs having more in common with Desilu Studios than Hitler." And Lawrence Laurent of the Washington Post nagging that "something is missing; something has been left out. . . What the children are not seeing is a Nazi in any form that ever existed. . . . The Germans, conquerors of a continent, are played as lazy, doltish, cuddly, lovable and cute."

No nice Nazis

Actually, the nearest to a cuddly German on the show is "Schultz," the *dummkopf* guard whom Clary describes as "a big teddy bear." And this "German" turns out to be an Austrian Jew, actor John Banner, whose real-life family was liquidated in the Nazi extermination camps.

As for "Colonel Klink," commandant of "Stalag 13," *Hogan's* producer Ed Feldman argues: "We don't say Klink is a wonderful guy. He's a pompous ass." Scratch this "German"—Werner Klemperer—and he does turn out to have been born in Cologne, though his own family had to get out of Nazi Germany when Hitler started persecuting the Jews. Much to Klemperer's discomfiture, one of the show's writers, Arthur Julian, likes to kid him about "goose stepping all the way to the bank."

Certainly Robert Clary sees no comparison between *Hogan's Heroes* and what he went through. "Stalag 13 is not a concentration camp. It's a POW camp, and that's a world of difference. You never heard of a prisoner of war being gassed or hanged. Whereas we were not even human beings. When we got to Buchenwald, the SS shoved us into a shower room to spend the night. I had heard the rumors about the dummy shower continued

heads that were gas jets. I thought, this is it. But no, it was just a place to sleep. The first eight days there, the Germans kept us without even a crumb to eat. We were hanging on to life by pure guts, sleeping on top of each other, every morning waking up to find a new corpse next to you.

"When the American armies were coming closer, the Germans started to evacuate the camp. First, all the Jews were ordered to Dachau. A Czech named Zak saved my life by hiding me away. Then the SS gave orders to kill everybody that was left, a mass massacre. Suddenly it was very quiet: no guards, no SS, no Germans, no dogs even. At 4 o'clock in the afternoon of April 11, 1945, the GIs of the U.S. Third Army arrived at the gates of Buchenwald.

Only one to survive

"Before we left that place forever, we had a jazz concert with a small combo. They introduced me as 'Didi' that was my nickname—and I sang a song in English that I had learned phonetically: 'A Tisket, A Tasket.' Then I went home to Paris. Of the 12 people in my family who had been sent to concentration camps, including my mother and father, I was the only one to come back alive.

"Today, at that apartment house where I spent the first 16 years of my life, there is a plaque over the door which says: 'In memory of the 112 inhabitants of this house, including 40 young children, deported and dead in German camps, 1942.'

"I was the only Jew in my class at school, and at the end of 1941 the Germans made me wear a yellow Star of David on my sleeve. The first day I wore it, all my classmates walked bravely with me on the street."

When Clary was 16, on the 23rd of

September, 1942, at 9:30 P.M., the Gestapo came and took away the whole family. They were shaved bald and were herded into cattle cars, headed for Auschwitz. After three days the doors were opened. The train was surrounded by SS troops with machine guns and dogs on leashes. "They shouted, 'All men between 16 and 45, out!' I was 16. My mother's last words were, 'Do whatever they tell you to do. Don't fight it.' It wasn't until' a year later that I knew my parents had been asphyxiated in the shower rooms at Auschwitz."


He sang in Paris

After Buchenwald, Clary sang for his supper in the smoky boîtes of the Place Pigalle. Though he spoke no English, he cut a pop record for the American market, "Put Your Shoes On, Lucy," singing words chalked up for him phonetically. The record sold 250,000 copies. He came to this country and soon became a favorite in clubs. The New Yorker supper magazine typically burbled: "Robert Clary is an ideal household petsmall, fun-loving, and willing to dance and sing until all hours." Clary will probably always be identified with a song in "New Faces of 1952"—"I'm in Love with Miss Logan," about a boy with a crush on his teacher.

At 40 Clary now lives sedately near, the Hillcrest Country Club in West Los Angeles with his bride, Eddie Cantor's daughter Natalie, whom he married only last year after a close 15-year friendship. Of his shattering experiences with anti-Semitism he says: "Sometimes I dream about those days and I wake up in a sweat, terrified for fear I'm about to be sent away to a concentration camp. But I don't live in the past. I didn't suffer as much as a lot of people."

And there's no echo of Buchenwald at Desilu?

Hardly the same, shrugs Clary.

She becomes a soap-opera heroine, of course! BY EDITH EFRON

ays Zina Bethune, who looks vaguely like Melinda Plank: "I haven't watched *The Nurses* since it went on the daytime schedule. I can't really make any comparisons about the way I played Gail Lucas and the way Melinda does."

Says Melinda Plank, who looks vaguely like Zina Bethune: "I didn't watch *The Nurses* when it was on at night. I can't really make any comparisons about the way Zina played the part and the way I do."

While it's most unlikely that Richard Burton and Laurence Olivier would show this same polite disinterest in each other's Hamlet, it's possible the two interpreters of Gail Lucas, assistant heroine of The Nurses, are telling the truth. It's also possible that they are diplomatically ducking the question of who does a better Gail. Producer Doris Quinlan, who has observed both of them, however, is willing to stick her neck way out. She gives the laurels to Melinda: "Everyone loves Melinda in the role." she says. "I for one like her better than Zina. Not that I didn't like Zina. It's just that Melinda makes a marvelous Gail Lucas. There were no repercussions when the change was made. I suppose that the fact that Zina and Melinda do look a little alike made the transition easier."

The surface resemblance—serene oval faces and madonnalike hairdos is strictly a coincidence, say the producers. An even odder coincidence is the fact that both girls were ballerinas before they were "nurses."

Ohio-born Melinda, in fact, is a true professional in the world of ballet. She made her first appearance at 14 in the New York City Ballet's presentation of "The Nutcracker." The following year she danced in the Chicago Opera Ballet and was a guest artist with London's Festival Ballet in Monte Carlo. At 16, while doing "Swan Lake" in Germany with an American ballet troupe, Melinda suffered a foot injury that temporarily halted her dancing career.

It was a fruitful halt, which ultimately gave her a double career. While her foot was healing she won roles in the short-lived soap opera *Our Five Daughters* and in *The Secret Storm*. Between TV series, she went on a tour of the U.S.A. with the Zachary Solov ballet. But her interest in acting had been sparked; and when she had a chance in 1963 to play a leading role as a ballerina in a movie called "The Greenwich Village Story," she took it. The New York critics were lyrical about her performance.

So was producer Quinlan. "I was looking for the best young actress I could find to play Gail," she says. "I saw "The Greenwich Village Story' and there was Melinda. I thought, "That's the girl for me.' She was marvelous." Melinda was offered the role of Gail Lucas, and she took it.

She is pleasantly enthusiastic about portraying Gail, who might be described as a uniformed variant of the girl-next-door. "I enjoy my role," says Melinda, "I try to live it day by day, as I would in life. But what I really love doing," she adds, "is the bitchy, nasty, rotten people. I once did one of those real slovenly sleeparound girls! It was fun. And I also enjoyed doing one of those downtrodden young girls trying to 'find herself." Her nose wrinkles in sudden mockery. "You know," she continues, "one of these dreary types? They're much more interesting than playing a sweet young ingénue."

Melinda herself is neither wreck nor ingénue. She's an continued

unusually cultivated, intelligent young woman. Her primary interests in life, according to her ABC biography, are her husband, Jeffrey McKenzie, a management consultant; animals; and the arts. In person, she volunteers nothing about her husband, allows briefly as how she prefers dogs to cats, but is very vocal about her artistic tastes. "I love romantic music," she declares. "Brahms, Liszt, Chopin, Rachmaninoff. They're gorgeous! . . . I've always been an avid reader. I love Victorian and Romantic poetry. Painting interests me enormously, I love Rembrandt and El Greco."

She doesn't hide opinions

What the ABC bio does not indicate is that she's a vigorous, forthright young person who engages in "violent arguments" and takes "strong positions" at the drop of a hat. Here's a sampling of her "positions"—all emphatic, but delivered in an earnest, mellifluous voice:

• "I value intelligence, not intellectualism. Today, phony intellectuality is too often taken for intelligence. One of the most intelligent men I've ever met was a cab driver."

• "Organized religion is silly and pretentious. I don't believe that reciting formulas or playing with a string of beads means anything."

• "Nonobjective art? Negative! I have nothing in common with people who like nonobjective art. I don't believe they really like it. How could they? It's all a pretentious joke."

• "I feel the same way about certain trends in ballet. Take Balanchine. The man's trying to pull everyone's leg. He offends me. How stupid do they think people are?"

And she has these illuminating thoughts about herself: "I'm a perfectionist. I get frustrated if my artistic tastes and values are not understood by someone. I can be very impetuous. I can be very selfish. I want to be and to do too many things. Perhaps I'd like to take off next week and go to Venezuela for a vacation. But you can't always do what you want, when you're involved with other people. I do try to be responsible."

So far, her career as an actress is working out well. Producer Quinlan raves about her developing abilities: "Melinda is doing a wonderful job on the show. She has grown amazingly in the part since she started. She's brought to acting so much of the discipline of a trained dancer."

Although Melinda's primary devotion was to dancing when she actually started work on *The Nurses*, her affections have shifted, over the past year, with acting gradually taking the ascendancy. "Just being around people who've been very fine actors, I've absorbed a lot. In learning more and more, I find that there's more and more I want to learn. I feel I can convey so much more through acting than I could through dancing.

"I wouldn't have gone into a new field if it hadn't been for the accident. Since I damaged my foot, I was afraid I couldn't achieve everything I wanted to in ballet. At the time, the accident seemed a catastrophe. But in retrospect, I now see it as fortunate. I really love acting now and want it as my long-range career—although I still intend to dance, at intervals."

Maybe in the next few months an obliging writer can pick up a story line that was started, and dropped, in the days of Zina Bethune, but which Zina ultimately carried into real life. Gail Lucas could become fed up with nursing, could fling her cap out of the hospital window and take off for a joyous fling as a dancer. It might complicate the story line of *The Nurses*, and upset daytime viewers who are allergic to the sight of joy. But it might make ballerina Melinda Plank very happy.



THE RUN FOR THE GROCERIES

When handicapping 'Supermarket Sweep,' it's best to look for the entry with the swift leg, the sure hand and the eye for the olive oil

Even in the very beginning, the idea was one of those rare naturals that occasionally burst onto the television scene already graced with their own sweet smell of success. As it was bruited about the New York offices of Talent Associates last year, the concept was for a new daytime show combining all the essential ingredients into one unbeatable format—an audience-participation game show that would provide fun for the participant and excitement for the home viewer and, most important, would help to satisfy man's primordial urge to put some meat on his dinner table.

Supermarket Sweep, offering contestants a chance to carry away all of the groceries that speedy limbs and a stout heart allow, was conceived almost in a single stroke. There would have to be refinements, of **continued**

course. Details of timing had to be worked out. Format concepts had to be smoothed over. The vast network of interlocking skills required to produce a large-scale television production had to be created. But all of that was like tinkering with "My Fair Lady" during the Boston try-out. Supermarket Sweep was a winner from the start.

A pilot film was shot and taken to ABC, where network officials jumped at it. In a series of test-market theater showings, the new Supermarket Sweep ran up the most enthusiastic response ratings they had ever seen for a daytime offering. The show was put into the opening morning slot of ABC's network schedule, where worried executives had been anguishing over exposure in less than 900,000 homes. It wasn't too many weeks before Supermarket Sweep was regular morning fare on more than 2,500,000 screens.

In spite of scoring a brilliant success, Supermarket Sweep is something of a stepchild in its own home. "I have absolutely nothing to do with it," said Talent Associates' leader, David Susskind. "We have given it a home and provide necessary facilities to put it together, but that's all. These programs are produced by people who know and love them. But I couldn't get within a mile of it as a producer. I wouldn't know how.

"Quality programming is very expensive," said Susskind, whose company is television's most prolific producer of dramas. "We enjoy the profits from Supermarket Sweep because it gives us the money for other projects."

Unconcerned by the low artistic esteem in which it is held, Supermarket Sweep remains a happy parvenu on the daytime scene, with rising ratings and a hefty \$40,000-a-show budget, about \$10,000 over the usual for a daytime game show. With a smallish army of technicians Sweep rolls into a new town each week to convert a local supermarket into a stage where the company can act out its own vision of the American Dream.

On an unseasonably hot Sunday in Livingston, N.J., not so long ago, that dream shone at its brightest as an overflow crowd poured into the local Food Fair to watch the program being taped for a later showing. Outside, 36 people sweltered in the 86-degree heat and peered in through the window.

Storm over Long Island

"This is nothing," said publicity man Marvin Drager. "We had a bigger crowd than this one waiting outside of a store on Long Island in a storm that was so bad our own emcee couldn't make it."

Inside, the air was charged with the excitement of a combination *corrida* and cornhusking bee. The quiz part of the program was over. Lady contestants had guessed at the price of various store items to try to win extra seconds for the men who would do the actual sweeping. It was almost time for the run for the groceries to begin.

I went over to the check-out counter area, which serves as the paddock for sweepers, to see if I could pick



myself a winner.

"It's hard to tell exactly what makes a good sweeper," said Allan Wallace, the producer. "It isn't just speed. We've had college track stars compete and some of them didn't do well at all. They tended to race around the store too fast without picking up enough items."

Most handicappers along the rail agreed that the winning combination is a mixture of the swift leg and the sure hand. The same qualities you would look for in a top-flight eggand-spoon racer. It's always hard to judge form in something as chancy as egg-and-spooning, but a quick look around convinced me that Bob Westerman, son of the defending champion, Mrs. Dodie Westerman, would break from the post as the odds-on favorite. Mrs. Westerman was the holdover champion from the week before in Alexandria, Va., where her sons, running for her, had pulled in foodstuffs valued at \$530 in three sweeps. Bob had the cool look of a veteran ball player before a routine game. His sneakers were smudged and properly broken in. On the yellow T-shirt given him by the program was the word "Champ." He looked the part.

Bob had two challengers, Morris Pilchman and Irwin Jacobs. Mrs. Pilchman had been in top form during the quiz part of the program and had been awarded, for her husband, 70 seconds to add to the usual minute. which is 10 seconds more than the two minutes allotted to the champions. But Morris was wearing brandnew sneakers, the sure sign of the rookie. Irwin was a strong-looking entry, but he had to be rated as a distant threat. His wife, Diane, had gotten the team off to a slow start by collecting only one minute and five seconds in the lanes for her husband. That wasn't the kind of edge you could give a thoroughbred like Bob.

At the bell, the crowd of 250 sitting in bleachers shrieked, and Morris broke quickly. He showed some good early style by racing straight for the lawn-seed counter and deftly stuffing some boxes into his shopping cart.

"That's a good one," said one of the program staff. "Not too many people know about lawn seed. A good, compact, high-priced item."

But committing the sin of the rookie, Morris began to press. He dropped some boxes and lost vital seconds retrieving them.

The champ starts his sweep

Two minutes showing on the clock and Bob raced onto the floor amid the screams of the crowd. He loped for the cigaret counter, where he swept up five cartons of his own brand and then headed for the meat. Sweeping skillfully, he was back with a cart stuffed with roasts of beef and olive oil at the same time Morris rolled back with his. Bob had made up the 10second handicap on the first load. Now the pressure was on Morris. With the clock showing one minute and five seconds. Irwin dashed madly out, showing some really fine speed, egged on by the crowd that always loves a game underdog.

Heading into the stretch, class was beginning to tell. Bob never overraced or overgrabbed. He piled 101 pounds of frozen turkeys into his cart and sped down the center aisle in what future historians may call the Westerman Waltz-hands on the middle of the cart sides to keep the goodies from spilling over, and torso hunched over the top to keep them tamped down; long, loping strides propelling the cart like a good ice skater. At the turns, where there is danger of tipping, Bob would glide to the end of the aisle and make the turn by dragging a sneakered toe along the floor. The crowd cheered at each turn.

Irwin, all heart, never gave up as he sprinted to catch Bob. But Morris began to fold under the **continued**

tremendous pressure put on by the champion. Passing up the mandatory cigaret cartons, he lashed out wildly and picked up a giant bag of potato chips and a box of rice, both lowreturn items.

It was down to the wire now. The crowd began shouting the countdown for the last 10 seconds: "Ten, nine, eight, seven . . ."

Bob came loping down the right aisle with five giant bolognas and four boxes of seamless stretch stockings. The girl at his counter shrieked for joy: "We've done it again! We've done it again!"

The crowd screamed on: "... four, three, two, one!!" The sweep was over.

It took about 10 minutes for the checkers to tote up what the three men had pulled in. Morris had run up \$210.76 worth of groceries. Irwin had gathered up \$229.66 worth of foodstuffs. Bob stood in front of a pile valued at \$256.03. A good, satisfying victory for a seasoned pro.

Bob smiled quietly at the applause. A program executive shook his head and said simply, "It was a great sweep."

Mrs. Westerman put her arm through her son's and beamed, "You know, I've never really noticed how beautiful a supermarket could be."

Post-victory press conference

Bob held a small press conference after his victory. "This is a real good store with nice wide aisles," he said graciously. "The turkeys are very good for sweeping. They're about \$13 apiece. The hams may be a little small and the steaks are only fair. But the rib roasts are great. I did very well on those."

Addressing himself to potential supermarket sweepers at home who dream of making the big time some day, Bob offered an important tip. Stay away from the gourmet-food counters, which are highly prized by caviar-seeking amateurs but scorned by the meat-hunting professionals.

"Very overrated," was his quick verdict. "You get high prices for the small size. But you can only take five of any one item so there aren't enough to make them pay off. Except for the olive oil. Olive oil saved me once. But make sure to get the imported stuff."

100 pounds of bologna

As a result of winning five straight sweeps, the Westerman larder became something less than the dream of every nutritionist looking for balanced diets. The Westermans collected well over 100 pounds of uncut bologna, 14 gallons of imported olive oil and 350 pounds of frozen turkeys. According to Mrs. Westerman, "The family has been eating steak for breakfast, lunch and dinner ever since we started."

Despite the frenzy with which they go after the viands, few contestants are eager to admit that they go on the program in search of food.

"We just came here to have a good time," said Mrs. Jacobs, "and we certainly did. But I don't want the food. It's silly to let it go to waste, though. So we'll give some of it to our baby sitters and most of the rest will go to charity."

To the real champions—the Jack Dempseys, the Arnold Palmers, the Dodie Westermans—however, there is something in sport far more important than having fun. To them there is an adrenalin charge in the thrill of competition, the sweetness of victory whatever the prize, the knowledge that they are the best.

"Stick around," Mrs. Westerman said to me, her eyes shining as she slapped happily at the pile of frozen turkeys. "My boys and I are going for the world's record!"

It had to happen sooner or later. Some big boy upstairs saw a Beatles film, and he called a network meeting. "Get The Beatles," he snarled. Whereupon everybody agreed it was a terrific idea and the big boy was the greatest. "Boss," they said, "you're boss." All except one little guy. "I don't think we're going to be able to get The Beatles, Boss," he said. "They're richer than we are." This made the big boy furious, and the little guy was kicked upstairs. A year later, however, there was a new meeting. "Let's look at this Beatle thing practically, boys," the big boy said. "Beatles are Beatles. Do you get thinking?" Again everybody my thought it was a terrific idea and the boss was the greatest. All but a new little guy. He wanted to know if it would be OK not to make the new Beatles too rich. "You've got it," the big boy snarled. "The Beatles Next Door!"

And that, kiddies, was how The Monkees—net assets \$16.87, according to a network release—were born. And, if you haven't seen or heard them yet, fear not—they're not all evil. The episodes are so fast-paced that even when they're over-milking the kind of comedy you outgrew in kindergarten, by the time you get mad with them they're on to something else. As for their singing, once you've heard them sing "Last Train to Clarksville," with those beautiful lyrics—both of them—if you're a girl you'll just *have* to mother them, and if you're a boy ... well, lots of luck.

The foursome are Davy (Jones), Micky (Dolenz), Peter (Tork) and "Wool Hat" (Mike Nesmith). Peter plays just about every instrument there is except the drums, which Micky plays. Micky has very long legs and Davy very short ones, but both of them have very distinctive ways of pronouncing everything indistinctly. Meanwhile Wool Hat not only sings songs but writes them too, and sometimes seems to do both at once. At the end of each episode there is an interview deal in which all of them are given a chance to say everything that's on their minds. It lasts one minute.

As in Beatle films, there are all manner of stills, slow motion, speedups, etc., most of which are good fun. The dialog is shaggy. The boys, for example, are imprisoned in a mansion which a spiritualist tells them is "full of e-vil." So they decide to put crumbs on the window to attract carrier pigeons. Finally a pigeon comes, but there's a message already strapped on its leg. "Please don't strap a message to my leg," it says. "I'm not a carrier pigeon." Fortunately, just at this moment a genuine shaggy-a St. Bernard -walks in. So the boys decide to strap their message around its neck. "Wait a minute," shouts Wool Hat. "There already is a message strapped around its neck." "What does it say?" asks Davy. "It says," says Wool Hat, " 'There is a message for you on the pigeon."" See what we mean? Fear no e-vil.


