



### as we see it

They're taking all the fun out of elections.

Thanks to television's instantaneous communication of sight, sound and motion, and the computer's lightning-fast ability to analyze sample figures and project final results, much of the suspense and the excitement of selecting our Government leaders has disappeared.

We used to be numbers, at least. We knew that when Candidate A had 1,356,987 votes and Candidate B had 1,135,786, one of Candidate A's votes was ours, and while we might have been optimistic about our boy's winning, the outcome wasn't certain because we still had to hear from those farmers upstate.

■ Now we're not even numbers. The board on television shows 213 votes for A and 93 for B and Cronkite is saying that CBS is awarding the election to B. Then Sevareid comes on to explain that B won because all the left-handed Ruritanians in Kankakee voted for him.

Over on another network Huntley and Brinkley explain that there really are a lot more votes in than show on the board. They can give the election to Candidate B because the computer—when it doesn't goof, as it sometimes does—can digest and project the outcome before the electronic tote board in the studio shows the numbers.


All this is wonderful, we suppose, but sometimes we get so fed up with progress we'd prefer to wait until the pony express delivers the results a couple of weeks after Election Day.

Everything about elections is electronic these days. Candidates are picked in the primaries because they make good television appearances and can spend a lot of money on television spots. Issues to be stressed are learned through poll figures that are fed into computers. Trends are figured out the same way. Then more money is spent on television to capitalize on what is learned in the polls. And finally we get the results by television out of computers.

■ Before long, they tell us, we'll be able to vote by pushing a button on our television sets. And we'll get the results even faster than we do now. Whoopee.

Even if we could, nobody really wants to turn the clock back. We just wish the networks would stop viewing election returns as one more competitive commercial show. By being first with the winners' names, they can grab the highest ratings, but they're also taking a lot of the joy out of being a voter.

If they'd take the competition out of vote returns, say by having only one network carry them, on an alternating basis, perhaps we could get back to some numbers and some excitement instead of EVA and VPA and RSVP and all that other mumbo jumbo that, unfortunately, works all too well and all too soon.

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

## HOW THEY TURNED A TOWN INTO A TEST TUBE

A company with something to sell the public can drop anywhere from 25 to 50 thousand dollars these days just in the filming of a one-minute commercial for television. But that isn't the half of it, as the saying goes. If the commercial fails to sell goods, a fortune can go down the drain. More than one sales campaign has sizzled, while another fizzled because one had what famed hard-sell adman Rosser Reeves called "a Unique Selling Proposition" and the other hadn't.

But how to find out whether such a compelling message has been achieved before the fortune is spent to put the commercial on the air? That's what typically frets the advertising community and its clients. The techniques in common use for pretesting range from screening proposed commercials before studio audiences to running onair tests in what are considered typical markets. Studio previewing has built-in limitations, such as its inherent preconditioning of the viewers. On-air tests could tip competitors to a forth-coming campaign.

Little wonder, then, that some of the Nation's big manufacturers and their advertising agencies sprang to a unique testing proposition offered them a couple of years ago by a small marketing-research firm based up the Hudson River at Peekskill. It involved slipping test commercials into regular network TV programs as these shows were being piped into a near-by New York town over a community-antenna system.

The scheme offered the desired competitive secrecy—assuming everybody involved kept properly quiet about it—and it set up a whole community as a laboratory for Madison Avenue experiments to find USP—the "Unique Selling Proposition."

This remarkable undertaking—juggling the TV commercials seen in Port Jervis, N.Y.—not only was successfully launched but has gone on to this day, though perhaps no more than a dozen of the 9500-odd citizens in the Delaware River Valley town are aware that they and their neighbors have become part of one of the most remarkable marketing-research projects in American industry.

The details, now revealed for the first time, are a fascinating testimony



# The fascinating story of Port Jervis, N.Y., whose citizenry has been starring in advertising experiments

to the lengths to which major businesses now must go to find out what will trigger the public's buying.

In pursuit of this objective, some top-rank corporation executives and their ad-agency advisors have quietly visited a converted one-car garage on a hillside outside Port Jervis. The garage houses the switching equipment of the CATV system that is the town's source of satisfactory TV signals. Port Video Corp.'s nerve center is a modest installation. It does not even boast toilet facilities.

In this garage, sometimes while officials from such firms as E. I. du Pont de Nemours, General Mills and Carter Products looked on, hundreds of commercials aired by New York stations have been flicked off and other commercials substituted on the line feeds to the 2500 homes wired into Port Video's CATV system.

Local viewers could scarcely have avoided the conclusion that New York TV engineers were pretty sloppy, judging by their ragged switching and the poor picture and sound qualities of many commercials seen in Port Jervis. The truth was that there was

nothing faulty about what was coming over the air; the machinations in the hillside garage were to blame.

Nobody caught on, however, partly because vigorous security measures were taken to protect the authenticity of public response to the commercials being tested.

It was the spring of 1964. Ed Wallerstein, executive director of the Center for Research in Marketing in Peekskill, had spotted the Port Jervis CATV setup as a likely vehicle for commercials testing, and had approached Port Video's owners with his ideas.

Port Jervis is a pioneer CATV town. It is in a deep valley 65 miles inland from New York City. TV reception is very poor. When Ed Trainor, a local insurance man, and a number of partners got Port Video, with its high antennas and signal boosters, rolling in 1956, nearly everybody in town subscribed. For the enjoyment of clear pictures from Manhattan via wires from the big CATV antenna, they paid either \$129 down and \$3.50 monthly, or \$19.50 down and \$4.50 per month, depending on how continued

they wanted to amortize the cost.

To this situation came the enterprising Wallerstein with a plan of special sophistication. It involved rewiring the CATV system-a network of coaxial cables strung through town on telephone poles-so the community would be divided into halves. Thus, Side A, as one half of Port Jervis would be coded, could be exposed to one test commercial while Side B was shown either the regular one or still another test spot. The effectiveness of the test commercials would be ascertained by questioning families on Sides A and B, and by checking actual sales of the advertised products in stores on Side A and Side B.

Spelling out his idea to the Port Jervis CATV people, Wallerstein stressed the need for secrecy in marketing research, saying it was especially desirable in this case to keep the networks from finding out about it because they might not like their programs being tampered with, even though there was nothing illegal about it. In case the networks did discover the scheme, Wallerstein said, it could be explained to them that the testing never usurped a nonparticipating advertiser's commercials—those engaged in the tests would try out new sales messages only in time slots they already had bought, or on a swap basis with other advertisers participating in the experiments.

Port Video went along with Wallerstein. It had a rosy financial aura: Wallerstein's company, besides lining up the clients, would help pay for rewiring Port Jervis and buying the necessary projectors and switching equipment. Port Video would get as much as \$25 for each cut-in.

Wallerstein hired a crew of local women to do door-to-door surveys aimed at assessing the penetration of the test spots. He and William Capitman, head of the Peekskill firm, hit

Madison Avenue to spread the word quietly among prospective clients. Their pitch: Here was an electronic twist on print media's time-honored split-run method of testing ads; here was a split-cable testing device.

It was an attractive proposition. In April 1964 the first tests got under way, with such eminent sponsors as Du Pont and General Mills participating.

Wallerstein had the test film shipped to Port Video in shoe boxes, simply numbered 1, 2, 3, etc. The films inside were identified as A, B, C, etc. "Worksheets" indicated which shows the films were to be inserted into, and at what point in each program.

At the outset, especially, boo-boos abounded. It was not uncommon for a network announcer to proclaim something like, "And now here's interesting news about a new cake flour," and the next thing Port Jervis viewers saw was a man painting his bedroom with a new Du Pont mix, or a girl

examining a stretch bra. It was impossible for Wallerstein to get exact cuing information from New York stations without tipping his hand.

Port Video subscribers had beefs about more than the frequent irregularities in sight and sound traceable to makeshift equipment up on the hill-side. Sometimes a program just disappeared after one of these cut-ins. A sleepy technician at the garage, after patching a test spot into *The Late Late Show*, would lock up and go home to bed, forgetting to plug in the Channel 2 feed again. By morning the complaining calls from angry viewers would begin to reach somebody.

In the midst of these initial experiments, the New York Times published a story about a "small town somewhere in the United States" where the TV fare had "suddenly undergone some curious changes." The Times had the Peekskill center correctly tabbed as the outfit "behind these aberrations" but had not got continued

Wallerstein to disclose where the tests

were taking place.

So worried were Wallerstein and his clients that Port Jervis would awake to the role it was unwittingly playing, and thus upset the accuracy of the research, that the CATV crew were dispatched to buy up every copy in town of that issue of the Times. They did, with apparent effectiveness.

Everybody involved was delighted with the first go-round. PJTV, as the programming arm of Port Video was known, got \$660.50 from Wallerstein for cutting in 24 Du Pont spots in a two-week period, and \$437.50 for 21

General Mills commercials.

For his part, Wallerstein reported that the results had been so good he had had difficulty convincing his clients that the sales-test figures were genuine. The contrasts between sales of the products on Side A and Side B

were spectacular.

By autumn the testing was in full swing. Dozens of tryout spots had been injected into all types of shows, from evening shows like Mister Ed, Wagon Train, Du Pont Show of the Week, Arrest and Trial, The Outer Limits and 77 Sunset Strip to such daytimers as Truth or Consequences, Jeopardy, Missing Links and Father Knows Best.

Bigwigs showed up at the hillside garage, people like Malcolm A. Mc-Niven and Jim Becknell, Du Pont executives from Wilmington, Del., and top-rank admen from such agencies as McCann-Erickson and Doherty, Clif-

ford, Steers & Shenfield.

Bristol-Myers, the big drugs-andtoiletries house, became a client. In the space of several weeks, 60 cut-ins were made for Ipana tooth paste. Dow Chemical joined Wallerstein's clients. Also, Brown & Williamson Tobacco.

There were cut-ins for such items as Micrin mouthwash, Clairol hair preparations, Arrid deodorant, Kool and Viceroy cigarets, Vitalis hair oil. At times Du Pont and General Mills shared in the testing, swapping time slots. Commercials seen on the networks were blocked out all over the time schedule, at all times of day and night. If the test results for a new commercial on Side A of Port Jervis proved more effective than a new commercial tested on Side B of the town, the Side A commercials would later be used on television nationally. Similarly the effectiveness of new commercials was tested against old ones already in use on the networks.

The women doing follow-up interviews around town were not in on the secret, except for their supervisor, Mrs. Phillip Parker. As is usual in marketing research, questions relating to advertised items were carefully varied among many others asked by the interviewers, and no mention was ever made either of commercials or TV.

The testing fever reached such a pitch at one point that a Du Pont executive phoned that he wanted to fly in a commercial from Canada to get it on the air that evening. He asked whether there was a local airport. Told there was a small field across the river at Matamoras, Pa., which would take small planes, he said he might try for an air-drop and asked the PJ-TV people to stand by. The commercial, however, arrived just in time by mail, and the air-drop was called off.

The testing has continued. How much it has netted the resourceful Wallerstein and his Port Jervis partners is not known. It is known, however, that the Port Jervis CATV people alone expected to earn several thousand dollars in switching fees for one five-week "campaign" early last year.

Doubtless Port Jervis will not be the last locale to be used for tests involving CATV, with or without the knowledge of the networks. It might not, for all most people know, be the first instance. The technique, however, affords a way of testing expensive commercials with more accuracy than any other method yet developed.

# ...SO HE MOUNTED HIS SHINING PLANE AND FLEW OFF TO SHOW THEM HE WAS THE KING

Being an account of Berle's barnstorming campaign

On Oct. 25 ABC announced the cancellation of The Milton Berle Show. The fateful October Nielsen had just come out and Uncle Miltie was 84th from the top, ninth from the bottom. It all had a vaguely familiar ring to it.

Live television and Milton Berle were born in 1948 and they grew up and prospered together for eight years and they died together in 1956. In those eight years of brash and boisterous bombast, Berle became Mr. Television, The Thief of Badgags, Public Energy No. 1, the first genuine

TV Star. No comedian has ever so dominated the medium. Then, as it must to all comics, death came to Uncle Miltie. He died of overexposure, and NBC was paying him 100 G's a year to stay dead for 30 years.

After 10 years of agony Berle bought his way out. This fall he was back to prove that his death notices were premature. When the ax fell, the twice-exiled Mr. Television was left oleakly contemplating his future, in contrast to a happier day just seven weeks earlier . . .

At 3:30 in the afternoon of Wednesday, Sept. 7, 1966, a rambunctious quinquagenarian mugs and clowns for photographers in front of the nose of a five-passenger, 570-mph, \$649,000 Lear jet on the tarmac at La Guardia Butler Marine Terminal on Long Island, New York. At 58, Milton Berle is setting forth on a five-day, 10-city, cross-country tour to beat the drums for The Milton Berle Show and, incidentally, to show the world—and himself—that he is still King.

In his entourage are Bobby Rydell, a singer; Jim Bacon, a press agent; Paul Dafelmeier, a dresser; and myself, an eager if undemonstrative observer. Too undemonstrative for Berle. The first thing he says to me is: "Smile, Smiley, or get off the plane!" It's important that people laugh at Milton. It's more than important. It's life itself.

Everywhere he goes, video tape is rolling; TV cameras are panning the runway. The Lear touches down and taxis up to a big placard: "WELCOME MILTON BERLE TO WICHITA!" A thousand onlookers-including the Dignified Dames, the Japanese Women's Club, and the Braille Association of Kansas-cheer as Berle steps from the plane to shake the hand of Gov. William Avery. A drum-andbugle corps strikes up a fanfare as cornfed schoolgirl majorettes twirl military rifles. In Oklahoma City, as Berle and Rydell step to the concrete apron, gaudy Indian feather headdresses are clamped on their heads. In Detroit the motorcycle cops escorting his limousine ask Berle if he wants sirens and flashers. Natch! In Baltimore he rides in a police car, sirens screaming.

Uncle Miltie's back.

"I've never been away," Berle keeps insisting at press conferences whenever the word "comeback" comes up. A Washington reporter inquires how he feels about being against *The Man from U.N.C.L.E.* Berle quips: "I'm the real uncle!" This is vintage Berle:

spontaneously creating humor, wise-cracking, ad-libbing. This is Berle the public extrovert; any time he has an audience, he's "on." What does he think of television? "TV is like a steak. It's a medium that's rarely well done" (a joke stolen from Fred Allen). What about TV audiences? "We get to all the people and we're lucky they can't get to us!"

Berle's hotel suites swarm with TV technicians, floodlights, spotlights, cameras, mikes and cables snaking over the floor. It is sweltering. Air conditioners are off so the noise won't wreck the sound track. Draperies are drawn to screen out the glare. Fuses blow. Time is short. The pace quickens. "Let's have some makeup," Berle orders. "I don't wanna look like Ned Sparks!"

At every stop he films promotional spots, challenging viewers to watch his show on their local stations. WFIL. WJZ. WMAL. WXYZ. WBKB. KAKE. KOCO. KTRK. He throws out their scripts, improvising his own: "Watch me on ABC, the American Berlecasting Company!" Detroit interviewer Bob Hynes tells him he's to be on camera for four minutes. "Four minutes!" Berle shouts. "I bow for 20!"

Berle the perfectionist still has to fight the impulse to do everything himself, but he takes over the technical direction anyway: "We'll shoot the cameras this way! Zoom in for a two-shot! Quiet! Roll 'em!" On The Ida B. Show in Oklahoma City, Ida B. observes that up close he doesn't look as old as he does on TV. Berle quips: "I think you have an old TV set." Through all the buffoonery he doesn't miss a detail. At the end of the session he says: "Aren't we going to take some cover shots? Change your lenses! OK, roll 'em!" Always there are the phone calls to ABC President Tom Moore: "Hello, Tom? Diller got a 54 Trendex? No kidding! ... Be talking to ya, pal." And always he says: "Smile, Smiley, smile!"

In Baltimore, at the

Orioles-Yankees game, Berle the Baseball Buff gets up in the press box, grabs the mike away from Joe Garagiola and Phil Rizzuto, and describes the game on TV. He is on for a solid hour. At the U.S. Army's Walter Reed Hospital in Washington an audience of air-evacuees from Vietnam is waiting. Berle improvises a whole show, mobilizing a GI combo, a uniformed nurse on the lights, a GI on the sound amplification—and Bobby Rydell.

### He steps up the pace

As he grows wearier, he automatically steps up the momentum of the horseplay. En route to Detroit he says: "Smiley, here's a headline for your story: "THE KING RETURNS!" Early the next morning in Chicago, at curb-side while the limousines are being loaded, Berle pouts: "Why doncha like me, Smiley? Here, I've got a new title for you: 'MILTON'S BERLEWIND TOUR!"

On the way to Wichita, Dafelmeier, the dresser, explains that Berle usually makes 25 to 28 shirt and underwear changes a day. Berle contradicts: "I only used 21 shirts in Philly!" The tension builds. In Wichita Berle gets carried away. At the Lear plant he closets himself in an executive office and emerges to announce: "I just bought one!" He isn't joking.

In the Oklahoma City terminal at Will Rogers Airport he spots a tiny infant with a dour look on its face: "Watch me make this baby laugh!" The baby doesn't smile. Berle frowns.

Friday is the night of the big première. A party is being given by his old friend Maxine Mesinger, gossip columnist for the Houston Chronicle, at the Warwick Hotel. An ice sculpture of Berle melts at the buffet. A combo plays. The women guests are dressed to the teeth; some of them are wearing diamonds.

Through an archway three color TV

sets play to an empty room. The Time Tunnel's closing credits are coming on. Berle is getting anxious. "I don't wanna miss me!" He urges the crowd to join him. "I wanna hear the jokes!" People start finding seats, chattering. Berle takes a seat in the middle of the front row. "Shhh, I wanna hear my monolog!" He jumps to turn up the volume, resumes his seat, lights a cigar. He squirms, whispers to someone, "Watch the opening line!" His eyes are riveted to the set. "See, we left that fluff in!"

He whirls around to see if people are laughing. The volume is too high for clarity. He leaps to turn down the volume, and whispers to Maxine seated behind him: "Can you see?" Relights his cigar. Ladies still chatter; waiters are still serving drinks. Berle jumps up to fiddle with the bass and treble controls, lights a new cigar.

At the middle commercial the lights come up as Houston's mayor, the Hon. Louie Welch, late to the party, hurries in to give Berle the key to the city. Berle, agitated, tells him to make it fast; there's only a 90-second station break. He fidgets. "Can you hear it?" He whispers, "Do you like it?" He elbows his neighbors. "Get this punch line!" He flinches when he sees Lucille Ball hit him in the face with a custard pie. He wheels around, "I caught you smiling, Smiley!"

On Saturday morning in Houston, threatening clouds roll over the airstrip. Berle is fretting about the weather at the stadium where he is to make an appearance between halves of the Syracuse-Baylor football game. He says: "Here's an angle for you, Smiley: 'BERLE BLOWS \$5,000,000!' That's what I'm giving up by not having reruns. Doncha like me, Smiley?" His mood changes abruptly. "What do you want from me?" He sags wearily. "I'm so tired," he says.

He cancels out Dallas. "Too beat."

and make their exits. Berle poses with tots, pinches cheeks, busses babies. Suddenly the welcome collapses. The local "co-ordinator of activities" has failed to show. The party is stranded.

In a cramped motel room, the only one available due to the influx of people for the Syracuse-Baylor game, Berle says gruffly to Jim Bacon: "Get me Tom Moore." Then on the phone: "Hi, Tom . . . 51.3! Wonderful! . . . Thought the show played very well. The second show is better than the first . OK, pal, Talk to you Monday." Turning to his entourage: "He says we got 51.3 share." He whispers something in Bacon's ear, then aloud: "Don't tell Smiley!" He breaks into a grin: "Wet your lips, Smiley. I wanna kiss va!"

Berle rides into the stadium on the tonneau of a convertible, circling the arena, with leggy majorettes strutting. The crowd cheers, Berle waves, At the 50-yard line he jumps out and trots up to the mike. He's asked if he ever played football, "I used to, but I had to give it up. My family wouldn't let me touch pigskin!" Boffola yocks. In explosion of color "MILTON BERLE" is spelled out 50 feet high in the card section. Cheers roar from the capacity crowd of 50,000. An unseen 20 million viewers watch via 226 TV stations. Berle flashes his quick big grin. That's what it's all about. That's Where It's At.

That's where it was at on Sept. 10. Where it will be after Jan. 6 is Nowhere. That's the day Uncle Miltie Fades to Black. He first heard about it when he read his show's obituary on the front page of Variety. Not until two days later did ABC get around to phoning him with the news, and then it wasn't Tom Moore on the wire but one of his minions. "No hard feelings," Berle says. "No sour grapes. I'm just going to take a rest."

# The Name of the Game Is Quickies

If you ask NBC, movies made especially for TV (or non-movies, as one critic called them) may be the name of the game in the days ahead. The evidence: "Fame Is the Name of the Game," a Grade-B murder melodrama souped up with sex and brutality, and given the promotional trappings of a "world premiere" because neither moviegoers nor TV audiences had seen it before. It was dropped into NBC's Saturday night movie time Nov. 26 and pulled an overnight Arbitron of 23, representing 40 percent of the viewers. That put it in ratings company with some of the best old flicks shown lately.

"I wonder," sniffed an NBC VP, "whether they're still saying over at CBS that these 'quickies' can't make it?" He was not above gloating, too, over "Fame's" rating triumph in the face of its lambasting by the press. Most reviewers dismissed it as a run-of-the-grind hour drama stretched over 120 minutes. Its popular success did indeed throw some doubt on a widely accepted industry theory that pictures on TV have to be "pre-sold" at the theater box office.

Elated NBC officials reportedly are exploring a deal with Universal Studios, producer of "Fame," for a whopping 60 of these two-hour features (six more of which are already set for this season). The next test: whether these TV movies can outpull such formidable studio-taped dramas as "The Glass Menagerie" on CBS and "Diary of Anne Frank" on ABC.

ABC has decided to turn over its

Stage 67 hour (Thursdays at 10, ET, beginning in January) to news and public affairs for 12 weeks next summer. Tom Wolf, former Scope producer recently elevated to an ABC News vice presidency over specials, will film six originals and schedule six repeats of the season's best. As for Stage 67's future, ABC spokesmen insist it will survive in innovative concept, if not title, into 1967-68.

'Behold a Pale Horse' is a 1964 movie starring Anthony Quinn and Gregory Peck as aging Spanish Civil War veterans, one a former Franco officer, the other a Loyalist hero. CBS last week yanked its scheduled showing of the film Dec. 15, saying Columbia Pictures had asked postponement owing to threats by Spanish dictator Franco, who didn't like the picture, to ban all Columbia releases from Spain. The studio denied CBS's story. In any event, the Dec. 15 feature now is "Baby, the Rain Must Fall"—obviously not dealing with rain in Spain.

Jack Paar is warming to the idea of steady work in TV again. Meantime, he is concocting a sequel to his "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the White House" political-humor special earlier this year. This one will be ". . . on the Way to Hollywood." For NBC, of course.

Briefly: Bob Clemens, a CBS News cameraman, will accompany seven men in an over-the-ice race to the North Pole, the first in 58 years. The expedition shoves off in March.

# 'The Brave Rifles'

"Brave rifles, veterans, you have been baptized in fire and blood and come out steel."

General Patton's tribute to the GIs who fought at the Battle of the Bulge provides the theme for this documentary, which captures the feelings of the combat infantrymen who stopped Hitler's last major offensive of World War II.

On Dec. 15, 1944, Hitler issued a battle order to 30 German divisions secretly massed in Belgium: "We must gamble everything. This battle, above all, must be fought with brutality—in a wave of terror. . ." The next morning, 250,000 German troops struck six U.S. divisions in the tiny Ardennes sector.

To tell the story, writer-director Laurence E. Mascott, a Purple Heart survivor of the battle, has combined combat films with his own first-hand account of the fighting. Mascott ignored the usual documentary footage of generals and staff officers, which makes "war look like a chess game."

Arthur Kennedy narrates the film, a 1966 Academy Award nominee.

# THE GRETA GARBO of DODGE CITY

Like the publicity-shy actress, lim Arness is happiest when he's left alone

T few years ago, Amanda Blake, who plays Kitty in Gunsmoke, made a wise remark: "Everyone knows what a movie star is and how he acts, but no one quite knows yet what a television star is or how he should act. Including Jim Arness."

Jim Arness, the pre-eminent television star, has learned how a star should act. It is doubtful, however, that other actors will follow his lead. The way Jim plays a television star is simply to go his own way, doing the quiet things he likes best. If there are people who resent this, Jim does not care. He has an aversion to personal publicity that verges on the violent.

Not long ago he had a photographer ordered from the Gunsmoke set. "I was not covering Jim and he knew it," the photographer said. "I was there to shoot special effects for the burning of Dodge City.

"During the rest period I was perched on a stepladder, looming above the crowd like a mushroom. Jim sat there glowering at me, and the next thing I knew, I was ordered off the set.

"It didn't bother me. I went to the next-door set and shot the fire from a window."

Jim Arness will grant no interviews. Not to the lady from the West Overcoat (Neb.) Clarion-Call or the Asphodel (Me.) Republican. Nor to TV GUDE, which in this case means me.

Jim demands final approval of any copy which deals with him personally. And since no self-respecting editor will let a television actor edit, Jim's demand effectively ends the discussion.

It may be treason to say it, but Jim is absolutely right. At this stage of Gunsmoke (now in its 12th year), there is very little that he can dooff camera-to help the show along. If he acceded to half the demands made on him he would, literally, not have a minute to himself or for his children. He once told a CBS publicist, "I'll give you \$20,000 a year if you can guarantee I get no publicity." There is no doubt he meant it.

Jim's feelings are well-known to his associates. I called Peter Graves, Jim's brother and a star of last season's Court-Martial. "TV GUDE," he said. "Oh, boy." He enlarged: "I wouldn't talk to anybody without Jim's approval. If Jim says OK, I'll be glad to talk."

Robert Emme, Jim's business manacontinued ger and liaison man with

the world, said, "Jim won't talk to you and neither will I."

I was in the middle of an interview with Milburn Stone, Gunsmoke's Doc, when the producer called. "Jim is very upset about this interview," he said. The call upset Stone and the interview ended.

"Jim's acting more like a millionaire than an actor these days," a CBS publicity man said.

It is true that most millionaires are inaccessible, but there is more to the Jim Arness story than that.

It is also true that Jim is a shy and sensitive man. And his aversion to publicity is not a new thing; it did not grow with his bank account.

Long ago Jim told me he was very uneasy with the press. "There is this constant thing of people coming at you," he said. "Fans, publicity men, writers, photographers. They usually wind up saying the same thing over and over. I'm sick of stories about being real tall."

He has always been a loner, uncomfortable in a crowd, suspicious of flat-

His very unactorlike conduct is perhaps explained by the fact that Jim Arness is not basically an actor, although he performs for a living.

#### On-the-job training

The Hollywood consensus is that Arness lucked in. "Jim was just an extra working in Westerns when he got the call to Gunsmoke," I have heard many times, although the statement is not wholly accurate. But Jim has had the advantage of 11 years' onthe-job training and it may be admitted that today he acts.

"I spent the first two years on Gunsmoke despising Jim's lack of professionalism," says Milburn Stone. "Now I say his acting has reached classical proportions."

But acting was thrust upon Jim Arness. He was just a tall, blond, confused kid when he was inveigled into a part in a little theater. He lacks the basic temperamental and emotional structure of the true actor.

An actor is just like any other person-only more so. It is a matter of degree. Everyone is vain; actors are superbly vain. Everyone wants to please; actors yearn and strive to please. Everyone likes praise; actors need praise as much as they need food. "Actors are children," says Milburn Stone. "They have to be told they are good and needed."

#### A real human being

Hollywood's highest compliment is: "So-and-So is a real human being." Jim Arness is a real human being. Never more so than when he says, "Let me alone"

"Jim has never held court as many actors do," says Norman Macdonnell. former producer of Gunsmoke. "There never has been an admiring throng around Jim. He'd much rather go to his dressing room and lie down or talk to one of the guys. There is no exhibitionistic thing about Jim. All he wants is to do the show and get away."

As much as possible, Gunsmoke's shooting schedule is tailored to Arness. "We always tried to keep Jim out of the show Mondays and Fridays so he could go skiing or go to the islands where the big waves were breaking." Macdonnell says. "Then he'd come in and work his tail off Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Jim told me, 'If we can't schedule it this way, let's forget the whole thing. I'm going to have some time with my children. Period." (Arness and his wife, Virginia, were divorced some years ago.)

So Jim does his work and disappears. He is never seen in Hollywood. Not long ago he was seen with a young lady. "It was an event," says Macdonnell. "It was all over town the next morning that Jim had had a date."

In television's short life a regular pattern has developed for TV actors. First, they are nobody. Second, they get a series and become somebody. Third, they complain about their impossibly hard life. Fourth, they let it be known that television is a demeaning medium, that their series is beneath their talents and that they hear a higher call to play Hamlet.

#### Mastered his art

Once again, Jim Arness is not typical. He is one of the best-known men on TV. He has mastered his art. He has been around longer than almost anyone else. He does not complain about working too hard. He does not yammer that television is demeaning. He does not want to play King Lear.

"Jim's attitude is this," a friend says, "'I am an actor. I play Matt Dillon. I play Matt Dillon to the very best of my ability.' Jim always has had a meat-and-potatoes attitude toward the business and attached no great glamor to it. He has great simplicity on the screen and great simplicity as a man."

One key to Jim is what he does when he is not at work. In his free time he skin dives. He sails. He is an excellent surfer. He is a fine rifle shot. He is a good and ardent skier.

It is significant that all of these are one-man, noncompetitive sports. "It would be hard to visualize Jim playing mixed doubles in tennis," a friend says.

Jim's main memories of childhood are of days when he tramped the woods, days when he skimmed across frozen Lake Harriet in an ice boat. "I was always restless as hell," Jim once told me. "On days when the wind was blowing, I'd almost go crazy sitting in school."

In California Jim found fame and fortune. But even more important he

found the Pacific Ocean. Again and again, Jim returns to the sea.

Back in the days when he spoke to me, Jim said: "It all happened so fast—becoming an actor and all—that I was stewing in my own juices. Then I discovered the beach. The ocean fascinated me. The first time I tried to surf a big wave, I almost drowned and it frightened me. I was determined to overcome my fear of the sea.

"The year I spent on the beach was not because I wanted to be a beach bum but because it was a time for discovery.

"I still have this feeling about the ocean. The greatest spiritual cleansing I can imagine is to dive into a big surf. It is purifying: getting into the clean salt water, away from affectation, away from the mixed-up world, coming to grips with the elements—the sun and the air and the sea."

#### He loved poetry

The only part of school that reached Jim was courses in literature. "I used to love poetry," he said. "I loved Shakespeare, Keats, Shelley, Byron."

I asked him what his favorite was now, and Jim sat down and wrote out an Emily Dickinson poem for me from memory. Here is part of it:

Growth of man like growth of nature Gravitates within— Atmosphere and sun confirm it But it stirs alone . . .

Each its difficult ideal
Must achieve—itself—
Through the solitary prowess
Of a silent life . . .

There is one other thing. In his 11 and a half years with *Gunsmoke* Jim has endeared himself to the cast and crew of the show. "The test is the guys he works with," says Milburn Stone. "Jim is loved—not just liked."

Also he is real tall.

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
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
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

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# WILL THE WORLD SERIES BE PLAYED IN THE DARK?

The pro football merger, which led to a change in baseball's All-Star Game, may affect the holy of holies

On June 8 of this year the American Football League and National Football League signed an armistice, against a backdrop of sound and fury that still has not abated.

Six weeks later the NBC Sports department had a phone call from the office of the Baseball Commissioner. "We would like to start the 1967 All-Star Game in Anaheim, Cal., at 4:15 P.M.," the baseball people said. "Can you accommodate us?"

The NBC people were most accommodating, as any network would be when given the chance to replace a rerun with a first-class event.

The ensuing announcement got as little attention as the report that Zsa Zsa Gabor had a drip-dry wedding gown. Few people saw any connection between the All-Star Game being made a night game (for much of the country it would start at 7:15 P.M.) and the merger.

There was a connection. The base-ball change was the result of a reaction. It is also the forerunner of an inevitable announcement of a change in the format of the World Series.

Furthermore it is another indication that baseball people are very aware that their game can lose its standing as "America's national pastime."

For years baseball people were arrogant in their dealings with the public. The prevalent attitude was "Take it or leave it," and as the people kept taking it, the baseball parks became shabbier. The concessions followed the "shabby" motif; even the people who sat in the boxes were sold food and drink that would gag a rifle company.

A clear reflection of that attitude is seen in baseball's past evaluation of "public relations." Incredible but true is the fact that the office of the Baseball Commissioner did not have a public-relations man until 1966, when the very able Joe Reichler, a veteran sportswriter, was hired.

Since the election of Gen. William Eckert, the commissioner's staff has doubled in strength. Lee MacPhail,

one of the best baseball men currently on the scene, was extremely valuable as Eckert's administrative assistant before moving to the Yankees as general manager. Living on the West Coast but prominent in the picture is NBC's former director of sports, Tom Gallery, who is the commissioner's advisor on television.

Eckert, MacPhail and Reichler all know baseball is not a "take-it-or-

leave-it" product any more.

They also know, as do most of the owners, that the television money bag does have a bottom and that if they don't make some changes, they will be getting the second best television deal in sports. Right now baseball has a contract that calls for NBC to pay \$30,000,000 for two years of television rights to the World Series and All-Star games and three years of Games of the Week. This contract expires after the 1968 World Series. That is the year before the AFL contract with NBC expires and two years before the two football leagues expect to become as welded as the two baseball leagues now are. Already football is after new and record TV payments.

Usually the NFL championship game, which is played in a black-out area, ranks fourth, behind the week-end games of the World Series and the Rose Bowl, in the TV sports audience list. Last January's game was played in Green Bay, Wis., and so only Green Bay and nearby Wausau were blacked out. Result: The game got a smashing 30.5 rating to finish in second place.

Now the merger has made the NFL championship game a semifinal game. The Super Bowl—the game between the AFL champions and the NFL champions—will be played at the end of this season. Because there is no "precedent" here to worry about and since it likely will be on a neutral ground, with no season-ticket holders to placate, there is no reason for a blackout of the game. The Super Bowl could attract a record TV audience.

By 1970, when the continued

anticipated 28 pro football teams are playing under one commissioner, the championship game will be worth \$5,000,000. Before the championship game, there will be two play-off games between the champions of the four seven-team divisions. The rights for these will be worth at least \$2,500,000 each.

That total of \$10,000,000 for three events is almost what baseball is now paid for the World Series, All-Star Game, and 26 Games of the Week, a minimum of 31 events.

The baseball people can sit and watch this happen or they can make some changes that will at once give them the best TV deal in sports. They can do this by changing the World Series format so that the first game of the series starts on a Saturday. With a travel day on Monday and another on Friday, the chances for three weekend games would be excellent, and four are a possibility. Such a move would guarantee baseball a big raise on the TV price. The move that would leave football behind. though, would be the agreement to play a mid-week game at night.

This would be a decisive prestige move. Pro football's few excursions into prime time have not been impressive. Not so with baseball. "A World Series game at night in the middle of the week would undoubtedly attract the highest TV sports audience ever," Chester R. Simmons, NBC director of sports, says.

Talk to baseball's Lee MacPhail and he says, "We are happy with our television money. People read about the big football contracts and feel we are getting the worst of it. Actually the average baseball team receives twice the television and radio revenue of an average football team."

"Then why the change in the All-Star game? NBC says the impetus came from you," the visitor asks.

"That's true," MacPhail answers.

"The impetus for the change came from the commissioner's office. But this was no concession to television. The commissioner believes the game belongs to the public and the change we've made in the starting time gives more people a chance to see it at the park and on television."

The natural answer to MacPhail is, "Starting the World Series on a Saturday and having middle-of-the-week games at night would give more people a chance to see the games live and on TV." Then why not do it? "We don't want to do anything that interferes with playing conditions," MacPhail answers. "A game at night in October in Minneapolis or San Francisco could have a weather problem."

Ah, yes. But the players would have some extra money for their pension plan—they get 60 percent of the TV and radio purses. Have they plumped for changes? "No, the players haven't exerted any pressure in this area," Lee MacPhail says. "They already have the best pension plan anywhere."

True, but the players also have a new paid representative who learned about the squeeze play as a labor chief. In his line of work the name of the game is "More," and he'll be after it.

There is another important factor here. It is apparent to the person asking about the changes in the World Series that the network people are slavering at the prospect. The baseball people want the changes too. But both parties are cautious about being the catalyst. The network people are sick of being accused of dictating to sports people; the baseball people don't savor the thought of the inevitable charge that they "sold out to television."

None of these things will stop the changes. The baseball people have no choice. One day before the 1968 World Series, the phone in the NBC Sports department will ring and someone from General Eckert's office will say, "We would like to make some changes in the World Series. Could you accommodate us?"

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# MONIQUE JAMES,



the lady executive, WHO'S BRINGING UP CHILDREN

OK, girls, sometimes when you've seen the old man off for work and the kids off to school, do you sit down with that cup of coffee and maybe wish you were a big executive? Do you ever think that would be the life-sitting in a nice air-conditioned office all day and letting other people do the work for you?

So take a look at a gal named Monique James, who is a big executive. She's a vice president of Universal Television and a talent executive for Universal City Studios, where they make The Virginian, Run for Your Life, The Road West, Pistols 'n' Petticoats, Dragnet, Mr. Terrific, Bob Hope Theatre, and movies starring people like Cary Grant, Rock Hudson, Doris

Day and Charlton Heston.

Sounds wonderful, doesn't it? You get to the office at, say, 10 or 11 o'clock. Maybe your secretary says Cary Grant called. You talk with Cary, read your mail and the trade papers, and already it's time to wander over to the studio commissary for lunch. You greet old friends there-"Hello, Rock," "Hello, Doris," "Hello, Ben." Then back to the office for an hour or so (you don't want to stay too late so you can be home when the kids get out of school). That's all there is to it? What a life!

Well, that's not exactly the way it is, so read on about Monique James and find out how it really is. First of all, she doesn't look like an executive. If you were expecting Rosalind Russell in one of those old late movies, you'd be disappointed. In fact, Monique James might look a little like you-fortyish, give or take a year or so, and she has to watch her weight. That's probably where the resemblance ends. Where you have two, three, maybe four kids, she has 31one of her own and the other 30 all actors and actresses, which can be worse. Miss James leaves the house at 7:40 every morning, takes her 13year-old daughter to school and gets to the studio at 8:15. (She is divorced.

so she at least doesn't have to worry about getting the old man to work.) About 9 o'clock, the phone starts to ring, and it never stops all the rest of the day. "I have three extensions, and the lights are never out," she says. "There are producers, directors, agents and actors. Sometimes I dream what it would be like if the phones were disconnected."

The actors who call aren't Carv Grant and Rock Hudson. The 30 contract players whom Monique James is "personally involved with" include names like Donnelly Rhodes, Katharine Ross, Don Galloway, Michael Sarazin, Steve Carlson, James Farentino, Susan Saint James and Barbara Anderson. You may not know these names now, just as nobody knew Paul Newman when Miss James got him his first job in New York, or George Peppard when he was driving a cab, or John McGiver when she saw him in a play in a Bronx church basement. But she hopes you will be hearing more of all of them soon. Matter of fact, that is her job-to find talent and to bring it along.

To do this, she spends hours every day in projection rooms, looking at film of young hopefuls and clipping footage of her protégés from shows they have done so that producers of other shows can see them. She arranges screen tests for new talent. making the key decisions as to what they will do and what they will wear. She reads all the scripts of all the TV shows and motion pictures that Universal City Studios does, looking for roles for her 30 players. And, of course, many of the 30 turn to her for advice about everything from unhappy love affairs to hair-dos.


With an armload of scripts, Monique James finally gets home at 7:30 (her daughter comes home from school by bus). She spends the evening reading scripts and looking at television—not necessarily because she enjoys the shows, like you, but to see how her hopefuls are doing. Often she

goes to little theaters in the Los Angeles area to look for promising talent. Saturday and Sunday bring no rest. "I usually read 17 or 18 scripts over a weekend," she says.

How do you get to be a woman executive of a major motion picture and television studio? If you are Monique James, you were born in New York, daughter of the late managing editor of the New York Times, Edwin L. James. You spent the first four years of your life in London and Paris, then came back to New York with your parents. You went to Vassar, where you majored in psychology but were more interested in the college dramatic activities. After graduation in 1948, you got a job as a receptionist at CBS, where you worked for Eleanor Kilgallen (sister of the late Dorothy), who was head of the casting department. In 1950, you and Miss Kilgallen left CBS to begin your own casting-consultant firm, which was eventually bought by MCA. In 1958, you became a vice president of MCA and went on from there to your present post.

But most of all, if you want to be an executive, you have to love your work. People who work with talent often become cynical of actors and their ways, but Monique James' eyes fill up when she talks about the young people whose careers she guides. In speaking of one of them she says, "My little Katharine Ross." As for Katharine Ross, she says of Monique James, "I simply owe her my life-my acting life." Paul Newman says, "She got me my first speaking role. I can't say enough about the help and encouragement she has given me." George Peppard says, "Inside that lovely lady is the spirit of a tigress with her cubs. To say I am grateful would be understating the truth." And Lew Wasserman, president of MCA, says, "The discovery of new talent is vital to our industry. The ability to perceive talent is rare, and Monique James is one who possesses this great gift."

# THE MAN IN THE ORANGE HARRIS TWEED

who takes snuff

IS DON FRANCKS

During a publicity tour just before the launching of Jericho, a new CBS series concerned with World War II derring-do, a network press agent approached one of the show's stars. "You're doing fine," he said to Don Francks. "The interviews are great and the editors all like you. But, if you don't mind a personal suggestion, you don't have to wear that orange suit to get attention any more."

Francks shook his head. "You got it wrong," he said patiently, as he flicked imaginary lint from the lapels. "I don't wear this orange suit to get attention. I wear it because I-well,

I like it."

And off went Don Francks at a quick clip-he walks at a slow run-to a corner to inhale a bit of snuff and to jot down the foregoing in the large black notebook he carries with him always as a personal record of his life and times. The orange suit of Harris tweed is one of several he designed himself and which led an unsympathetic writer once to describe him as an "overdressed dandy."

An actor who affects orange suits, who keeps a personal journal in the manner of the Victorian authors, who takes snuff (usually Dr. Rumney's Mentholyptus), Francks might properly be assessed, by contemporary standards, as an eccentric. "An eccentric?" he repeats, amused at the thought. "People do think I am, but I've been so busy doing eccentric things I haven't had time to find out if I am or not."

Producer Dan Melnick expresses it differently. "Don's affectations are honest ones," says Melnick. "Sure, he talks a kind of personal Zen and he may make people nervous, but everybody likes him. People won't start disliking Don Francks until he becomes a big success."

Francks, now in his mid-30's, has been shooting for that big success since he started singing in jazz clubs in his native Vancouver, B.C., as a teen-age dropout. The adopted son of Edna and Wellington Copeland (an electrician), Don quit school in the 10th grade ("They taught you everything about the Battle of Hastings but nothing about the basics of life") and then, on his adopted father's advice, he learned the foundryman's trade, working with the basics of fire, water and iron. (Years later, in the spring of 1966, when CBS was momentarily undecided if he was the right actor for Jericho, Francks, then jobless, worked for a time as a journeyman in a Los Angeles foundry, conceivably the only member of the Screen Actors Guild ever to do so.)

Restless and searching and not yet 20, Francks shipped off to sea, returning home after being felled by pneumonia in port in Manchester, England. Then, still thirsting for adventure, he hustled down to Mexico aboard a motorcycle. There he subsisted by catching and selling lobsters to the tourist hotels in Guaymas. In 1951 he returned to Vancouver to pursue show business, a goal he had always

dreamed of.

"Vancouver," says Francks, "was my home and my basic training as a performer." He sang in a barber shop quartet called the Model T Four. He romped through a year as a disc jockey with an all-night show he called "Don to Dawn." He played trombone with a country-and-Western band, barnstorming through Western Canada. Mainly, he worked in little theater, community musicals, night clubs and local TV, developing a style and a reputation for versatility.

With most of Vancouver's professional heights scaled, Francks set off for New York in his revamped 1931 Packard, a distinguished-looking chariot with white striping lines on cherrywine and black. Nearing Miles City, Mont., the car abruptly blew a head gasket. Francks explained his predicament to a mechanic in town, who nodded knowingly and from the dusty rafters of his garage hauled out a Packard head gasket he had continued

been saving for 25 years. In his mystic way, Francks chose to interpret the incident as an omen and altered his course, heading instead for Toronto, the hub of Canadian television.

In Toronto, Francks spread his wings, singing in the better clubs, working with Wayne and Shuster in comedy sketches, acting on the stage and on TV, performing in revues such as the annual "Spring Thaw," whose 1957 edition included, along with Francks, a young singer named Robert Goulet. Later Francks signed on to be managed by another Canadian actor who was spreading his wings-but soon Lorne Greene decided to forgo the managerial end of the business in favor of a new series they were putting together out in Hollywood called Bonanza. Greene says today: "It was obvious that Don could move people as a performer. He's a complex original, full of dark cupboards. I said to him, 'Dammit, Don, something has to be done about you.' But then along came Bonanza and I figured something had to be done about me, too."

#### **Big in Toronto**

By the fall of 1964 Don Francks was a big name in Toronto but an unknown in New York when David Susskind chose him out of 200 applicants for the lead in his upcoming Broadway musical, "Kelly." Columnist Sheilah Graham spotted Francks at a pre-show party and exulted: "He has more sex on the hoof than any man I've seen in 10 years!" Joseph Levine, the movie mogul who had a big bundle invested

in "Kelly," proclaimed Francks then as "Bogart and Edward G. Robinson rolled into one. He's a John Garfield. He's Cagney. This boy's going to be a movie star!" "Kelly" lasted one night, achieving a quaint immortality as the costliest failure in Broadway history—only Francks himself was left unscathed in the reviews. "Joe Levine," Francks murmurs. "He promised to star me in five movies. Haven't seen or heard from him since the night 'Kelly' opened—and closed."

#### A flurry among the girls

Francks returned to Toronto and opened his night-club act with: "You didn't think I'd make it in New York? Well, you were right." Subsequent work in television on both sides of the border—including guest shots on Ben Casey, The Man from U.N.C.L.E., The Wild Wild West, The Tonight Show, The Mike Douglas Show, The Jackie Gleason Show—and the off-Broadway "Leonard Bernstein's Theatre Songs" led to Jericho.

Norman Felton, the London-born producer of Jericho, remembers his first meeting with Francks: "I'd been looking for actors in New York. Well, one day there's a big flurry among the girls in the office and in walks Don Francks in work pants and a dusty blue work shirt. He apologizes, saying he just rushed over from an off-Broadway rehearsal—but I thought, there's a style to this man. Seems a bit of an oddball at first. And then you realize it's not an act at all, it's the way he is."

The way he is, Don Trane Francks of Vancouver, B.C., is different. Who

but Don Francks would seriously be writing a children's book-for children to read to their parents? Who but Don Francks would instruct Johnny Carson the all-American boy, in the art of taking snuff-thereby leading to the loudest on-air sneeze (Carson's) in television history? Francks' personal approach to conversation is oblique and detached and often he laughs inwardly at some private joke of the universe discernible only to him. He paints in oils. He collects old phonograph machines and pump organs. He grieves that his list of talents doesn't include a mastery of the bassoon, an oversight he plans to correct soon.

He is gregarious, but he cherishes his privacy. With his wife, Nancy, and two children, Trane, 5, and Tyler Sue, 1, he lives in a comfortable aerie atop a hill in Hollywood accessible only by a tortuous drive up a dirt road. "The ad said, 'Difficult access assures privacy." says Francks, "and I knew it was the place for me." Then he adds, cryptically: "All of Hollywood is the

slums of Disneyland."

In his 34 years, Francks has owned 61 cars, most of them vintage models. Today his driving alternates between his 1957 Austin Vanden Plas Princess limousine and his Excalibur S.S, a flashy modern replica of the Mercedes-Benz SSK roadster. He owns half interest in a Hollywood garage sports-car fanciers' hang-out and whose operator, Mike Roberts, issues ultimate compliment about the Francks: "He's all car."

Francks once stayed with the Indians in Saskatchewan and the lesson of that experience, he says, remains with him. "I learned from these Indians, who have nothing, that all men are bound together by basics, such as the need for food. Two-thirds of the world goes hungry every night and we can't even communicate. What the world needs is a universal language. A wrecking crew should knock down the Tower of Babel so that all of us can say 'Good morning'-and so they can throw away the earphones at the UN. Why can't the linguists of the world give us a universal language?"

A clue to the inner Francks lies in the outsize black notebooks he has carried with him for the last eight years. "I write," Francks says, "simply to see how the world affects me." One notebook is dedicated to Charlie Chaplin, Francks' idol. Writing in a large. precise black script in letters half an inch high, Francks sets down a variety of observations, some of them sophomoric, others oddly discerning and reflective of a highly original mind.

He delights in twisting a phrase. One poem in a notebook, for example, ends: "Never give a bad habit an even break." Another poem includes the line: "Oscar is Levant garde." He observes: "If Australia were where Iceland is, you'd never have to wonder -vou'd say the land Up Over instead of the land Down Under." On the day of President Kennedy's assassination. when Francks learned that a priest had been summoned, he wrote: "Last rites for him who tried to give some their first rights."

#### Wisdom from a waiter

His notebooks also contain pictures and memorabilia and autographs-by Sammy Davis Jr., by Robert Goulet or by a waiter at the Stage Delicatessen in New York who noted after the quick demise of "Kelly": "Though the show's a bomb in spite of efforts so stout, the name of Francks will go on-if only with mustard and sauerkraut." Jazz pianist Bill Evans writes across one page: "To Don Francks. Don't get lost or, for God's sake, don't find yourself."

Recently, as he leaned against a camera at MGM, where Jericho is filmed, Francks was philosophizing again, this time on the issue of ethnic origins. "I'm an adopted kid," he said. "I don't know who or what my parents were. So when I hear words like 'wop' or 'kike' or 'hunky,' I really don't know if I should be insulted."



# The Rat Patrol

If you want fast action, plenty of plot, real he-man dialog, tough good guys and honest-to-badness bad guys -and don't care about nuances of characterization, changes of scenery, girls and other unimportant matterswell, ladies, this is your show. Not that there aren't girls in it. Once in a while there is one; and sometimes, as a special treat, one of the boys will talk about a girl. But, generally speaking, this story of World War II in the desert is as male as they come. And. we suppose, this is as it should be. After all, it's been quite a year, on TV, for the male men. In the commercials now they even talk about a man's car and a man's cigaret, and there is such a tremendous emphasis on male hair grooming that, honestly, we don't see how Bobby Kennedy has a chance.

But no matter. Week in and week out the four-man Rat Patrol team dispatches some 4081 Germans. But you know what hell war is, and every now and then they too suffer, and one of them gets wounded. On one of these occasions, we recall, the other three decided to take their wounded man right into a German field hospital.

They first captured a German nurse, then dressed as Germans themselves. After that, they went in and even had their boy operated on by a German doctor. This time they didn't shoot anybody until they were on their way out. And then they shot—well, at a time like that, who's counting?


In a more recent episode, the Patrol had to do battle not only with three Germans in the opposite patrol they regularly fight, but also about 16,000 Arabs as well. They made a truce with the Germans, then holed up in a fort, and together the seven of them killed 8001 Arabs. Actually, they only killed 8000. But the Arabs themselves killed one. He was an Arab businessman who was originally with the Germans and wore a white veil over his head. He went out of the fort waving a handkerchief as a white flag but the other Arabs killed him anyway, and we didn't blame them a bit. He was pretty unconvincing.

Among the stars of this show, Sergeant Troy (Chris George) and Pvt. Tully Pettigrew (Justin Tarr) are OK, and Pvt. Mark Hitchcock (Larry Casey) won us over completely when he taught one of the Germans how to chew bubble gum. As for the Englishman, Sgt. Jack Moffitt (Gary Raymond), he's a fine actor in an interesting role. The same is true of Captain Dietrich (Hans Gudegast), the German patrol leader; TV may be said to have come of age when it can portray, as in this show, an interesting and reasonably civilized German. All in all, the chief fault we have to find with The Rat Patrol is its brevity. Some of the plots are far more interesting than their development within the confines a half hour permits. The result is not only too much bang-bang. it's too much rush-rush.
