

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as we see it

• On the morning of Jan. 8, 1815, when the British unleashed their attack on the city of New Orleans, neither they nor the defending American forces under Gen. Andrew Jackson realized that the blood both sides were about to spill was entirely needless.

They had not yet heard in New Orleans that the war had ended two weeks earlier. One's memory is triggered toward that unnecessary battle by the recent pronunciamento of Julian Goodman, president of the National Broadcasting Company.

• Next year, promised Mr. Goodman, if NBC "can be assured of access to the satellites," it will begin a weekly news program consisting largely of *live* reports from Europe and Asia.

Thus television takes another stride in hurrying-up the news of a hurryup age. The good citizen of Des Moines, warm and dry at his own hearth, is used to going to his home-town fires, courtesy of the cathode-ray tube. The viewer in Fresno has been scrutinizing his Congressional committees across the continent in Washington, able to weigh each word as fast as it has been uttered. And now, it would seem, we Americans are to be there—live!—just as things happen, in Tokyo, Turin or Tasmania.

■ Great. But if one *must* look this gift horse from the god of progress directly in the bicuspids, there's bound to be a cavity or two. For instance, when you're at your set at 6 P.M., there isn't much really happening at 2 A.M. in Astrakhan yesterday—or is it tomorrow? This awkward time-zone matter has, of course, been a major holdback in giving us live overseas news before this, and it will continue to be a factor. But without doubt NBC's new program will prove useful and timely, once under way.

he fact is that many viewers are talking about current television in unflattering terms.

Some are saying that this is the "worst" television season on record. A few newspaper critics agree.

There are even some in TV's own upper circles who concede, privately to be sure, that this is so.

What do they mean by "worst"? What's their explanation for the plight in which so many believe television has become mired?

It's easier to start off by excluding some programming categories.

No one seems to be branding the news or public-affairs programming as "worst."

Nor are they referring generally to this season's entertainment specials.

Nor are they calling the primetime movies the "worst." Many have been excellent and their spread to five nights a week (soon to be six) speaks for itself.

They are complaining about the new regular weekly shows chiefly because so few have been hits. Critics, professional and home-style alike, have been keenly disappointed in the series unveiled so hopefully last September. There have been a few raves, much criticism and vast indifference. As a matter of fact, this may go down as the season of the hitless wonder.

Let's look at the record.

In recent years, going back, say, to 1960, it shows an average of half a dozen upper-Nielsen attractions developing each season. The critical winners have been fewer, but most years have produced at least one or two.

What are the hits of 1966-67?

The single new series anyone could cite immediately as a success of sorts is ABC's *Rat Patrol*, a half hour of desert-warfare derring-do. Farther down the Nielsen list is a gentle CBS diversion, *Family Affair*, no instant hit but frequently touted as a comer for its quality of human warmth. Almost everything else the networks brought on in September got short shrift. Viewers, after an initial gander at 34 new series, if indeed they sampled them at all, rushed back to old favorites such as *Bonanza* and *Red Skelton* and *Gomer Pyle*. Or they switched to movies, which, as we have noted, are holding down a two-hour slot on one network or another five nights every week.

A dozen of the new series will not make it beyond midseason, for want of adequate-size followings. That is not uncommon, of course. In other years, also, casualties have been heavy.

The other side

There is, in all honesty, another side of the coin, for in the midst of famine there is plenty.

TV is enjoying record prosperity and popularity despite the lack of new program vitality.

Some viewers may be complaining loudly, but they haven't reached the point of turning their sets off.

Viewing, according to Nielsen surveys, is holding up—in fact, is a little better than ever.

Television as a business has been great. Madison Avenue has continued spending vast sums on the medium, but some ad-agency executives have lately been expressing fears about where television is going, based on the poor showing of this season's fare.

In Washington, where the power is, no one is cracking the regulatory whip over broadcasting.

So there you have it.

On one side, plenty of criticism about the undeniably poor quality of new programming this season.

And on the other, equally undeniably, television is enjoying a prosperous and popular year.

Now what do the networks and rating services say about programming quality? What is their explanation?

There's a segment which places the blame on the shoulders of the most

successful programs-the movies.

The reasoning goes like this.

Privately, some of these decisionmakers concede that this has been a lean year for innovative programming. But, for the record, they proclaim that TV gets steadily better each year.

After that they take a deep breath and point out how hard it is to deyelop TV series attractive enough to outdraw movies.

These network people talk as if someone else, not themselves, were running movies in their prime time!

As one top-rank ad-agency man put it: "They've created a Frankenstein monster."

Other network executives have a slightly different point of view. Says one network vice president: "Movies are better than ever only because other TV programming is so poor!" For proof he suggested looking back a couple of years. "Movies on TV weren't doing so great then."

Movies are tough competitors

His peers wouldn't agree with him, publicly at least. "Many of these pictures cost four to six million," said CBS's voluble Mike Dann, senior programming vice president. "It's hard for TV shows to compete with them." And Hubbell Robinson, producer of the illfated Hawk as well as executive in charge of the beleaguered ABC Stage 67 experiment, commenting on the failure of that police drama, asked: "How can a TV series—shot on a \$140,-000 budget and an eight-day production schedule-compete with movies costing several million dollars and given months of preparation?" The TV programming head of one of the biggest Madison Avenue agencies said: "Movies are the underlying reason for the absence of hits this season. How can a new TV comedy compete with a Doris Day picture?"

So much for the movies.

A different reason for this season's record was advanced by Richard A. R.

Pinkham of the Ted Bates agency, once an NBC program executive.

He bluntly characterizes the season as "the least original" and adds, "I'd say the key to hitlessness lies in the fact that most shows that take off fast are comedies and there just weren't many good ones this year."

One of the more startling explanations came from CBS's Mike Dann. Said he: "There were few soft time periods this season and soft time periods make hits. Besides, it is not the function of programming to make hits." Dann was emphasizing that the time period in which the program is slotted, and how strong the competition is on the other networks, have a lot to do with whether a show makes a passing Nielsen grade, or even becomes a hit.

On the whole, TV entertainment is steadily improving, Dann contended. "It is much better than it was five or 10 years ago. It has to be. Viewers become more sophisticated and demanding all the time." He claimed critical success for one of his own new series, *Mission: Impossible*—a view not necessarily shared outside CBS—and felt that *Family Affair* is here to stay.

Like Dann, Mort Werner, NBC's top programmer, and his first lieutenant. Grant Tinker, instinctively rebelled at the "worst season" label; but they were willing to admit it was a year "of less innovation," as Werner put it. Tinker conceded, in the matter of new series, that "maybe it's a year in which everybody hit singles." But he said he preferred to think "there may be some scoring yet." He pointed out that such shows as NBC's The Man from U.N.C.L.E. and CBS's Dick Van Dyke Show did not immediately set the ratings afire.

Werner claimed that I Dream of Jeannie (one of last year's entries) is a hit now and said he believed The Monkees would be a hit if the Monday series had more station clearances. It seems many affiliated stations preempt network programs on Monday nights to run local movies. continued

Werner also thought *Star Trek* could be in for a long run.

Over at ABC they were a little more ingenious.

They tried to turn a disaster into a triumph.

One of their executives, who preferred to remain anonymous, argued with fervor that *his* network "at least is doing something" about the state of programming by overhauling its lineup next month.

He boasted: "What the audience hasn't liked, we're changing." He insisted that *That Girl* and *Love on a Rooftop* will wind up hits, and he described *The Time Tunnel* as the network's "unsung hero" for competitively holding off *Hogan's Heroes* and *The Man from U.N.C.L.E.*

He did not go into detail as to why ABC originally aired so many flops.

There was something of an industry (albeit non-ABC) consensus on Stage 67. Many felt that the highly touted undertaking was both a critical and a popular failure. They usually applauded ABC for braving it and attributed its poor showing to "failure in execution." A few expressed bitterness, saving ABC had "let the industry down" by not making the series more experimental. (There was patently some competitive bias in this opinion.) Hubbell Robinson confessed to being "very dissatisfied" with some of the early programs but said he believed the best of the 26 shows were yet to come. "On balance," he said, "I feel we've given people better entertainment than they get most of the time on television. I say most of the time."

Once more, at this juncture amid all this industry debate, it must be remembered that Nielsen estimates the prime-time audience is up 300,000 homes over the same period last year —a figure that one expert dismisses as "statistically insignificant" but does prove that people are still watching.

Meanwhile, the Home Testing In-

stitute's TVQ, which asks people to name their "favorites" (as opposed to checking what they actually watch as Nielsen does), reported that among the 10 most favored "shows" were four of the five network "movie nights."

So now we're back to the movies. How do you beat them?

Any new ideas?

Are there any new ideas that could possibly lift programming out of its present difficulties?

Some people may have some ideas but if so they're being kept as carefully guarded secrets.

For the record, a few producers candidly admitted the going is rough.

"It's getting harder and harder to find something different," Hubbell Robinson confessed. "How many different ways are there to tell stories about doctors and lawyers and cowboys and private eyes and secret agents and other stock characters?"

One of TV's best-known drama packagers, Herbert Brodkin (*The Defenders, The Nurses*, etc.), whose *Shane* is folding shortly ("and I decline to alibi it"), said, "The old way of doing television isn't working generally. Financially TV is a very healthy industry, and I think the networks would like to improve the quality of their programming, but I don't think they know what to do."

The TV programming vice president of a major agency said, "I've read 50 scripts for proposed new series. I liked about three or four. One was sensational. I'm concerned because the submissions keep coming from the same people. There's no new blood."



HAVE COME -And occupy quite a beachhead in TV

The Grinch is a legendary creature with green skin and red eyes who lives acrimoniously atop a mountain, from which his sole recorded foray is recounted in the long-time best-seller "How the Grinch Stole Christmas."

The Grinch's creator is a legendary cartoonist-writer with gray hair and twinkling brown eyes, known as Dr. Seuss. The gentle 62-year-old doctor, whose real name is Theodor Seuss

DR. SEUSS CLIMBS DOWN FROM HIS MOUNTAIN . . . TO BRING THE GRINCH TO TELEVISION

Geisel, came to Hollywood from the mountaintop where he lives to supervise a television special based upon the children's classic, which will be seen on CBS this Sunday, Dec. 18, in the time slot of another legendary creature named Lassie.

When Ted Geisel originally left Hollywood after some "unfortunate experiences," he resolved never to go back. "Hollywood is not suited for me, and I'm not suited for it," he said. despite the fact that two of his documentary films and his "Gerald Mc-Boing-Boing" had won Academy Awards. But when a production he suffered through, "The 5000 Fingers of Dr. T.," was sneak-previewed and people walked out before it was over, Geisel returned to LaJolla. Cal., where he had bought a real-estate developer's observation tower and built a house around it. "I decided that Hollywood was a mass-production area, and if you weren't a mass-production man, you might as well get out."

Thus, when offers came from television, he turned them down: "Everybody wanted to make a series—bat 'em out fast and use up my' whole life's work in a year." That life's work includes cartoons for humor magazines in the late Twenties and early Thirties; a long run of "Quick, Henry, the Flit!" advertisements; and some 30 books, aimed primarily at children. His one attempt at an "adult" book, an effort published in 1939 called "The Seven Lady Godivas," was his only unqualified literary flop. Geisel is definitely not a mass-production man. He spends a year or more on each of his deceptively simple books. "Humor a damned serious business-a is worrying business," he says. "I sweat out everything."

He decided to sweat out bringing the Grinch to television when he was approached by Chuck Jones, head of MGM's animation department. Jones and Geisel had worked together on armed-forces training films during World War II, when Geisel went from captain to lieutenant colonel and was awarded the Legion of Merit in the Information and Education Division of the Signal Corps. Jones offered to give the Grinch the same loving care that Geisel himself would, and thus Dr. Seuss returned once more to Hollywood. The result is what is reported to be the most ex- continued

pensive half-hour animated cartoon ever created for television, made up of more than 25,000 individual drawings, with narration by Boris Karloff, and three songs with lyrics by Ted Geisel. For all of this, CBS paid \$315,000 for two showings, the first this December, with the prospect of annual reruns assuring further bounty to Messrs. Geisel and Jones and to MGM for years to come. In addition, there are plans underway for another television special—"Horton Hears a Who," possibly for Thanksgiving, 1967.

In bringing the Grinch to TV, Geisel and Jones had to answer such monumental questions as "What color is a Grinch?" In the book, he is drawn in black and white with red eyes, but on television he will be the aforementioned green with the familiar red eyes. In studying the "Who's," whose village the Grinch invades on Christmas Eve, Jones discovered that "Lady Who's don't have high-heeled shoes —they have high-heeled feet," and the little girl, Cindy-Lou, "is not a regular little girl—she has antennas."

During almost a year in which "How the Grinch Stole Christmas" was being planned and in production, Geisel worked with the same boyish enthusiasm he devotes to his writing and drawing. Someone once said, "There is little doubt that Ted Geisel is himself the first small child for whom he writes"; and Geisel, when asked whether he tried to please children or grownups, replied, "Neither. I'm trying to please Helen and myself."

Helen is his wife of 39 years, whom he met during a year of study at Oxford, where he went after graduation from Dartmouth in 1925. (Dartmouth gave him an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters in 1955; thus, he is Dr. Geisel as well as Dr. Seuss.) Mrs. Geisel has herself written children's books, and she works closely with her husband on his, as well as with Beginner Books Inc., his publishing enterprise. Her serious illness a few years ago helped bring Ted out of an almost painful shyness which plagued him in the past. A friend says, "He was always scared of people, but during Helen's long illness he found how much their kindness meant."

Ironically, the Geisels have no children, and a friend says, "Kids frighten him." Once, in Cleveland, autographing his books at a department store, Ted found himself facing a hostile group of children, who finally told him that one of their number could draw better than he could. Geisel invited the boy to join him at a blackboard. "By God, he could draw better!" Geisel recalls.

Despite such an admission and his natural shyness, Geisel shows no false modesty in talking about his own work. But it is almost always in the third person, as if Dr. Seuss were indeed a separate entity. Walking through his mountaintop home, he proudly points out his drawings and paintings on the walls and the custommade furniture with his own weird and wonderful animals engraved upon it. However, it is Ted Geisel bragging about Dr. Seuss—or, as someone has said, "Ted's just as big a Dr. Seuss fan as anybody."

Whether Geisel or Seuss, he is an acknowledged genius. Rudolf Flesch. author of "Why Johnny Can't Read," has said, "I predict that Dr. Seuss will emerge as one of the great classics of this era. In 2059, children will hoot with joy when they come across Seuss books. What exactly is it that makes this stuff immortal? I don't know. There is something about it-a swing to the language, a deep understanding of the playful mind of a child, an undefinable something that makes Dr. Seuss a genius pure and simple." And Bennett Cerf, whose Random House publishes the Dr. Seuss books, once told San Diego columnist Neil Morgan. "We have some great names on our list-Faulkner, O'Hara, Capote, But Ted Geisel is the only real genius among them."

Ford Unveils Its Plan For ETV

The Ford Foundation, educational TV's chief advocate and heaviest backer (close to \$130 million in grants since 1952) is again putting its money where its mouth is. Last August the Foundation launched a determined drive, spearheaded by its new president, McGeorge Bundy, and his TV consultant, Fred W. Friendly, seeking approval of a domestic satellite system designed to link up all U.S. TV and radio, and to channel its revenues into noncommercial TV programming. This week, to get the show on the road, the Ford group divvied up \$10 million more, to be used for experimental networking of "a true" educational TV service.

"The foundation believes that if plans are pressed with energy and confidence, there can be remarkable demonstrations of the power of a national educational television service during the year 1967-68," the Bundy task force argued in a threevolume, nearly-300-page summary of legal, technical and economic findings for filing with the FCC. "We see particular promise in a proposal to pull together the full wisdom of this country, from its universities, its fourth estate, its learned professions, its science and art, to speak directly, once a week, to the great issues of the day, in every field of action. We are prepared to assist in providing funds for simultaneous network broadcasting of a program of this sort-and others that show parallel promise."

The Foundation called for immediate lofting by NASA of a test satellite that could be employed to demonstrate ETV-in-action. Inferentially—through a brief authored by taxation expert Joseph A. Pechman of the Brookings Institute the Foundation suggested that a going ETV service would need about \$200 million a year, half of which would have to come from taxes or subsidy.

Among the alternative tax possibilities the Foundation mentioned were levies on long-distance phone calls, radio and TV sets, broadcast revenues and a \$2 license fee on households with radio and TV sets.

The Ford group said it had refined its original estimates as to costs and income potentials of a satellite setup, and now believed that a system embracing Hawaii and Alaska as well as the continental U.S. could, by 1970, be as much as \$36.2 million cheaper than land lines needed for all radio-TV networking.

Somewhat surprisingly, the Foundation argued against a Comsat pitch for a so-called all-purpose satellite which would tax users (phone and telegraph services, data processors, etc., as well as TV and radio) in behalf of ETV.

What cooled Bundy to the Comsat plan, according to reliable sources, was word that Comsat's directors will nix a free satellite ride for ETV, merely offering it a 20 percent discount in use rates. Comsat's counterproposals also will be filed with the FCC before a Dec. 16 deadline. By far the most eagerly awaited document, however, is a report by the Carnegie Commission on Educational Television expected early in January. This blue-ribbon panel, set up at the *Continued on page A-18*

T is the season for taking care of last-minute holiday chores around the house, and this week the networks are cooperatively offering movies for the occasion. There are movies to wrap parcels or address cards by, movies to take a brief breather with, and even a movie to drop everything and concentrate on.

In the last category there's "A Raisin in the Sun," the late Lorraine Hansberry's film adaptation of her Broadway play about a mother's struggle to give her family stability and opportunity. It happens to be a Negro family, but the conflicts and pressures within and without the family circle are as universal as the family's ultimate discovery of its dignity and courage. Brilliant performances by Claudia McNeil, Sidney Poitier, Ruby Dee and Diana Sands save the story from the taint of soap opera.

Because it stays close to the play, with the action semiconsciously divided into scenes and acts, "Raisin" should suffer relatively little from the chopping-up process to which television movies are subjected.

Chopping up won't hurt "White Christmas," or "Gay Purr-ee" one bit. These musicals, marked by top-notch sound and occasional sight to match, are in the take-a-breather-with category. "White Christmas," an all-time box-office smash, has a soppy plot about a couple of ex-GIs trying to give their lonely old general a Merry Christmas; and it's low on laughter despite the presence of Bing Crosby and Danny Kaye, and Rosemary Clooney and Vera-Ellen as a sister act. There are 15 musical numbers involving old and new Irving Berlin songs. Something for everyone.

"Gay Purr-ee" is an 86-minute cartoon about a country cat who goes to Paris, meets up with villainy and winds up happily. It isn't quite slick enough for grown-ups; it's too sophisticated for the kiddies; and it's a bit overblown for all of us. But the pretty backgrounds are worth an occasional glance, and Judy Garland and Robert Goulet singing the Harold Arlen songs are worth a constant ear.

But keep right on wrapping those Christmas presents, addressing cards or going to bed early with "Francis of Assisi" and "Omar Khayyam" on screen. "Francis" is the kind of film that gives saintly biographicals a bad name, with pretty pictures and ghastly performances demeaning the story and the spirit. "Omar" does the same for poets, with Cornel Wilde plodding along the lush Persian backgrounds consoling his broken heart by inventig a calendar, studying the stars and dashing off bits of the "Rubyaiyat."

Last week's second "World Premiere" tailored-to-television movie, Rod Serling's "Doomsday Flight," padded out the standard suspense clichés surrounding a madman's planting a bomb aboard a jet airliner. The whole tired tale exploded from overstuffing with stale characters, silly lines, movie boners and cheap-jack production devices. SPORTS AND SPECIALS



behest of the White House, is expeced to recommend establishment of a national noncommercial "second service" to supplement commercial TV, but by what means—excise taxes, satellite revenues or direct subsidy is not yet known.

Informed industry sources say the Carnegie group has rejected a draft report scorching commercial TV for its cultural shortcomings and will adopt only a mildly unflattering tone toward the advertiser-supported medium. Apparent reason: the panel includes a couple of representatives of the commercial TV community.

One of the initial demonstrations of what Bundy and Friendly have in mind for ETV will be unveiled next month. Through Ford-financed National Educational Television, chief program supplier for ETV, 75 stations will air a live two-and-a-half-hour telecast of President Johnson's state of the union address, and comment upon it.

Danny Kaye's job long ago on the borscht circuit was as a "tumler," a clown who kept guests from checking out on rainy days by creating a *tumult*—disrupting the dining room with pranks, wearing bizarre costumes, leaping into the swimming pool fully clothed. He was successful at it.

On television he wasn't. The guests left by the millions. After four disappointing seasons a recent rating list had his show 77th of 100. Kaye had evidently kept too well his 1963 promise: "With a weekly show . . . I can take chances. I can afford to be lousy."

CBS permitted it to appear that the star had jumped rather than been pushed. There was an announcement that Kaye's agent had informed CBS that Mr. Kaye would not return to television next season.

'HARVEST OF MFRCY

SPECIAL COLOR This year, U.S. wheat sent to India saved millions from starvation. Correspondents Charles Kuralt and Winston Burdett report on this harvest of mercy.

The harvest begins in the most abundant farm lands in the world: the rich, red-brown soil of Kansas and Oklahoma, and the black earth of the Dakotas, where wheat is grown by advanced scientific methods. Films show the giant combines that automatically cut, thresh and load a total of 30 acres of wheat every hour.



After prices are quoted and agreements are reached in New York and Washington the wheat is loaded and shipped to India.

Films also show Bombay, where the wheat is unloaded and distributed, using hand labor, trucks and bullock carts; a Ford Foundation model farm, designed to teach modern agricultural methods to the Indians: the continuing famine conditions; and the primitive farming practices that are expected to produce another inadequate harvest next year.







HE PLAYS A HOT SECOND BASE FOR THE DAISIES

That's on Sundays, but for the rest of the week Michael Callan still insists on being where things happen BY MICHAEL FESSIER JR.

Michael Callan had a serious discussion with his dresser that morning and finally selected the gray herringbone suit, the black-and-red tie and the blue shirt with the conventional collar, fearlessly ignoring the buttondown dictum from the men upstairs. He cuts so trim and sophisticated a figure that he could actually be Peter Christopher, the impeccably groomed, slightly ambition-crazed but likable rat he plays on Occasional Wife. Then the second assistant director has to go and clobber the image with a word. "Hey, *MICKEY*," he yells, "we're ready."

Mickey??? The guy's 31 years old. His hair is thinning at the temples, for gosh sakes. He's got a wife, two little girls, a house up one of the Hollywood canyons. He's spent two years in psychotherapy. He's a veteran of night clubs, Broadway; has made 13 movies and now has his very own series. Yet *everybody*—wife, friends, directors calls him Mickey, or *continued*

Mick; kids' names. And Callan hates being called Mickey.

He runs through a scene with Pat Harty, his pretty blonde butterfly of a co-star, and as usual he's dashing across a room, diving through a window and scrambling up a fire escape—a real *Mickey* kind of scene. The show, in fact, is a Mickey kind of show—all furious, breathless action, the sort of thing you'd expect from this bouncy guy who can make a cigaret do a double-flip into his mouth any time he feels like it. Whether he likes it or not, he is a big success playing the guy he doesn't want to be.

He plays himself

"Mickey plays *himself*," insists associate producer Paul Witt. "He projects Mickey Callan, which is a very appealing character."

So where does this leave Michael?

Michael, it seems is the next rung up for Mickey, who believes in forward momentum. "If you stop going forward you're going backward," he insists, "You can never stay on one level."

Meanwhile Mickey is at work. You find him in his dressing room, becalmed between shots. He's on the phone to his fireball manager, Jerry Levy. "Yeah, got home early, about 11:30," he is saying. "Met Car [his wife, Carlyn] at the Daisy. She was nice to me so I bought her a drink...." Soon the talk veers to money and deals, where Callan really lives. "Sell, SELL," he says on his end, and then there's talk of thousands here and thousands there. Under discussion, it develops, is his Columbia Pictures stock, which is up and which he is going to dump for a fat, fat profit. Also he's buying a \$215,000 office building for \$30,000 down.

When he's not working or making deals, he's usually out looking for the action. Every Sunday around 1 he arrives in his Mercedes at the Barrington playground in Brentwood, parks among the Cads and Jags for an afternoon of softball with his Daisy Club teammates—guys like Ryan O'Neal and Mark Goddard. Here he's *Mick*, and no argument. "Hey, Mick," Ryan O'Neal yells, "do something." And Callan in his white Levi's and black-and-yellow check shirt swings at the ball like a samurai swordsman, sending it over third for a double.

Callan's new house, the first he and Carlyn have ever owned, is a comfortable place set snug against an ivy-clad hill. He's there this Sunday in time to catch himself in "Gidget Goes Hawaiian" on TV. "Daddy's picture's on," he tells his 6-year-old daughter, Dawn Rachel.

Carlyn, in a strawberry velveteen housecoat, arranges herself prettily on the couch, and Callan settles into his black leather swivel chair behind his desk. The room is silent now except for the "Gidget" dialog. For 20 minutes Callan doesn't say a word, lost in the 1961 edition of himself—a cocky dancer out to steal Deborah Walley from Jimmy Darren. Finally the trance breaks. "It's not so hot," he says, smiling, and then, "We do better in three days, now."

It wasn't easy, after all, for a \$50,000-a-picture actor, for years teetering on the edge of being the new Jack Lemmon, or somebody, to settle on the idea of *television*. When Screen



Gems' high poobah, Jackie Cooper, called him in, Callan was disdainful. He sniffed, "What do I need TV for?"

Cooper spoke like a father. "This year we're asking you to do the series. In three years you may be asking us. Who knows?" Mike signed.

While the pilot was making the rounds, Callan was in Las Vegas applying, in moderation, the tenets of his blackjack system when Screen Gems' Steve Blauner happened by and told him Occasional Wife had been sold. Callan, suddenly feeling financially invulnerable, immediately started flinging C-notes across the tables. By the time Blauner returned to tell him it was a false alarm, Callan had nicked the place for \$1600. When the show really did sell, Callan's reaction was a good deal less frivolous.

"For the first time I feel solidly in show business," he says. "All those years under contract to Columbia [seven] I thought studio heads were godlike. I did what they told me to do. Now I'm in a simple show about two people—no special effects, no gimmicks. It will pretty much succeed or fail on what's inside of us."

Back in the old days the inner Callan was pretty basic stuff—a sizable talent with ambition to match. At 18 he cracked Broadway, understudying four roles in "The Boy Friend." He got on 24 times in seven months, often through the expedient of bribing actors to be "sick." Once an actor named Buddy Schwab missed his cue by a few seconds and by the time he got to the stage Callan was on for him.

For a while he had a dance act with a girl named Grace Gentile. She remembers, "He was very sure of himself, very likable and very boyish." Callan spent a year promoting the role of Riff in "West Side Story" and once he had promoted it, spent every spare moment looking for the best way out to Hollywood.

Fred Ansell, then his manager, on the basis of the role sold him to Columbia as "the new Tony Curtis." Callan arrived in Hollywood with a seven-year contract.

His first picture was "They Came to Cordura," with Rita Hayworth and Gary Cooper. In Las Vegas, where the "Cordura" company headquartered for some location shooting, Callan got a bead on the Sinatra style and he knew who he wanted to be. He met Carlyn, a showgirl, there, subsequently married her and built a reputation along the Sunset Strip-Vegas axis as one of the great new swingers. He had a Sinatra-like coterie of hangers-on, and regularly made the columns.

Three weeks in two years

Yet the career never did keep pace with the style of living. In the two years between "The Interns"—one of his best films—and its sequel "The NEW Interns," he worked exactly three weeks.

His marriage cracked up. It was salvaged when he and Carlyn went together to a psychotherapist. Carlyn dropped out and Mike stayed on for two years. He feels it has changed him.

And he has changed. He can kid himself where the old Callan never could. Recently he came back from a New York public appearance and announced it was a success. "My image is improving," he said. At first they had him playing right field, but in two weeks he had promoted his way up to second basewhere the action is and where he still very much likes to be, even through everybody still calls him Mick.

The Girl from U.N.C.L.E.

Menace, anyone? Honestly, in one season how many spoofs can you take? If a spoof is going to be effective, it must surely have, to begin with, something serious to spoof off from. Or, failing that, it must at least be funny enough so that you don't care whether you believe it or not. Unfortunately, this show has neither one nor the other. It's about as believable as women's wrestling. And it has about as much wit as a roller derby. We recall particularly "The Mother Muffin Affair"-an episode which was full of wax figures in a chamber of horrors. In a show where even the actors are pretty waxy, this is perilous stuff indeed. Another was "The Danish Blue Affair"-which started with people eating cheese impregnated with microdots containing secret information and went on from there to a chase through an underground maze to a sealed chamber which began filling up with water. But much too slowly.

Still another episode was called "The Atlantis Affair," and in this one, April Dancer (Stefanie Powers) and Mark Slate (Noel Harrison) run afoul not only of THRUSH, which is looking for valuable destructive crvstals, but also of a Professor Antrum (Sidney Blackmer), who is looking for the Lost Continent of Atlantis, as well as a Monsieur Honoré Le Gallows (Claude Woolman), who is looking for the 17th-century way of life. Professor Antrum is always getting separated from the others, for which we don't blame him, but it means we not only have to see each scene, we also have to hear about it all over again while he's explaining it to whoever wasn't in it. The only character who seemed to have any senseor make any-was a man named Vic Ryan (Denny Miller), from whom April and Mark commandeer a truck. "I've lost my truck," he says in one place. "I'm locked in a shack and people want to kill me. For what? Involvement, that's what. Lousy involvement." In the last act he is rescued by April from drowning, And then, sure enough, even he goes soft. "You know you saved my life. Nobody," he says, "ever did anything like that for me before." It was terribleand the one guy we liked, too.

To fault all the actors equally in this show isn't fair-when everybody's that bad, the director deserves first blame. But after him, in order, should come U.N.C.L.E. trainee Randy Kovacs (Randy Kirby); he has a terrible part and plays it accordingly. As for Noel Harrison, he seems to conceive his role as a combination of court jester and village idiot. When it comes to April, she runs charmingly around in leotards, shorts and bathing suits. and she bowls over all her enemies with just one whiff of her secret weapon. In other words, she's a gasser. But as an actress-well, put it this way. Even Napoleon Solo and Illya Kuryakin look bad on their occasional appearances here. All in all, the acting in The Girl from U.N.C.L.E. is enough to make you cry aunt.

If you will picture the boys mixing cement, encasing their victim in it and dropping the package into the river, attaching an anchor for good measure, you will get a rough idea of what happened to boxing. The fact that it is with us today, showing a pulse, is a clear tribute to its indestructibility, and it is doubtful that Houdini in his best form ever pulled off such a nifty escape.

Boxing not only is breathing, it is beginning to display symptoms of health, proof of which is that more than 31,000,000 were willing to sit before television last spring to watch, via Telstar, Cassius Clay, known on the rug as Muhammad Ali, fight an Englishman named Henry Cooper.

Enormous audiences also looked at Clay against subsequent opponents, Brian London and Karl Mildenberger, and fighting in general has returned to TV, once described as the sport's slayer. Championship bouts are carried frequently across the country and sports spectaculars also have featured boxing on tape. New York's Madison Square Garden is offering roughly one show every couple of months on TV, and the Olympic Auditorium in Los Angeles, the Nation's largest center for fights, claims a remarkable rejuvenation of the pastime, thanks to a weekly television program.

Nationally, boxing first came to TV on a weekly basis in 1944 when NBC initiated a show. CBS and ABC somewhat later followed suit, and cauliflower soon bloomed in living rooms throughout America.

The subsequent decline of boxing, beginning in the late Fifties, has been ascribed by some critics to oversaturation on TV, but one needn't accept this explanation as the gospel. More likely than not, boxing was damaged by two other factors.

To start with, the sport for years suffered the grave misfortune of appealing to hoodlums. When these venerable citizens were exposed as the

people behind the scenes in boxing, scandals flared and investigations followed. The game was defaced and treated like something contagious. Guardians of public welfare suggested that boxing be abolished, and accidental deaths in the ring were overdramatized, as if participants never were killed in auto racing, football, mountain climbing and scores of other sports. The upshot was that respectable people felt they required a disguise when attending a fight.

Underworld characters haven't been driven entirely from boxing, but athletic commissions about the country have made a genuine effort to screen them out, restoring a measure of public confidence.

A second reason for boxing's decline was the sick state of the heavyweight division, which always has served as the flag-bearer of the sport. The retirement of Rocky Marciano in 1956 left the title up for grabs and it landed, eventually, in the hands of Floyd Patterson, an appealing young man who did everything a champion After having been flattened, the sport is on its feet again

should do except defend his title against deserving opponents.

From Patterson the title went to that model of comportment, Charles (Sonny) Liston, who, seated in his corner, gave up the championship to Clay, who promptly revealed that he was embracing the Black Muslims. The aroma of Clay's first title defense—Liston fainted in the first round from a punch yet to be seen—did little to strengthen the state of boxing. And, of course, Cassius soon burgeoned as an American idol, at least to those partial to young, healthy, wealthy draft resistors.

So, for some 10 years, the heavyweights have done little to retain public interest in boxing, although it must be said in Clay's behalf today that he ducks no opponents and comports himself as a fighting champion.

"Boxing could have been helped greatly," says Harry Markson, managing director of boxing at Madison Square Garden, "if Clay hadn't moved in the wrong direction after he won the title. But even so, the sport has made a fine comeback the last year. It is going well not only in America but all over the world. Prize fighting never has been bigger in Tokyo, Mexico City, Manila, London, Bangkok and in other large cities."


Whereas the Garden, according to Markson, is now booking roughly 18 fights a year, the Olympic in Los Angeles has returned to major shows every week. Operated by Aileen Eaton, the only woman boxing promoter in the country, the Olympic has used television to emerge from the red for the first time since 1961.

"Boxing fell apart from '61 through '64," says Mrs. Eaton. "We lost on the average of \$1000 a show. If it hadn't been for wrestling, a steady profit-maker, we could have gone busted. But near the end of 1965 we made a weekly television deal by which we were able to use TV to rebuild a boxing following."

Starting at 8 P.M. each Thursday, the Olympic shows two hours of live boxing, stopping just short of the main event. The idea, of course, is to whet the viewer's appetite with this *antipasto* without giving away the whole meal. Announcers Dick Enberg and Mickey Davies also have formed a club among their TV viewers, who are invited to write for a free membership card which will get them a discount in the purchase of tickets. The Olympic not only receives \$1250 a week from television but is prospering at the gate as well.

Roone Arledge, vice president in charge of sports for ABC, which has carried all of Clay's title fights—three live via Telstar—doesn't see any return to weekly network boxing shows but says an effort will be made to cover all the important bouts.

"The ratings we have pulled indicate that interest in boxing is there," says Arledge. "We will cover the big fights for the same reason the papers will cover them—they are newsworthy events."



There are some old sayings, such as "The apple doesn't fall far from the trees" (cliché No. 1), or "Sons follow in their fathers' footsteps" (cliché No. 2). If they are true, then no one should be surprised that David Carradine, oldest son of John Carradine, star of stage and screen, plays the title role in Shane for an hour every Saturday night on the ABC network.

As the son of an actor with the deepest kind of voice, it would seem young David had no other choice. Actually it took him some time to bow to the inevitable, but once the decision was made, there was no doubt. A friend of David's says without emphasis:

"He is interested in being the best actor in the world, he has prepared to be a star and he'll take any direction to get there."

Carradine gave up the co-starring role in "The Royal Hunt of the Sun" on Broadway to take the *Shane* part, a role which has intrigued him since he first saw the 1953 movie.

He made the move despite the fact that in "Sun" he was doing a job that was acclaimed by Broadway critics. "David Carradine is a tower of strength as Atahualpa, the Inca chief," said the New Yorker. Newsday said:

"David Carradine is all fire and litheness, exotic and feral as the Inca god . . ." The Daily News: "David Carradine plays the Inca ruler with great dignity and fire."

The Shane role turned him on, Carradine said, despite early trepidations about the job "because doing a TV series usually means a hack thing.

"But after a couple of weeks, I suddenly realized these people had hired me to do Shane my own way—whatever I could do was what they wanted. 'You've got to tell us,' they said. 'No one knows anything near as much about Shane as you do.'"

Few actors get such leeway—but Shane's characterization has been no problem to Carradine. "Shane is the first folk-rock cowboy," he said, then added, "That's not true but it comes close. I'm very close to the cat and he is close to me. I feel like Shane, someone who's alienated—the whole theme is alienation—and trying to relate.

"Just by being a member of my generation I find this same thing," Carradine continued. "I am unable to relate to the whole society and I'm trying to. Most of my life there has always been an unbending establishment. If you want to do things you think right, it is always a matter of bucking very bad odds."

The odds did prove too tough for Shane. It has been canceled as of Jan. 7. "What is there to say?" Carradine asked. "All you can say is that not enough people liked it—you can't even complain about the 1100 Nielsen people who say what makes the world go round.

"But it has not been a bad experience," he continued. "It was more and more of a fight as time went on—too many decisions were taken out of the hands of the people

directly involved. But the fights helped make it a good experience."

So much for *Shane*. But what about David Carradine? "He's a hybrid," said Jeff Cooper, a talented young actor friend. "He's a combination of John Barrymore and Mick Jagger of The Rolling Stones, and the best of both comes out in David.

"David's the New Wave and he's the first American actor to make it a kind of classical hip. He and I have the idea that the revolution in music and dress and painting hasn't happened yet in serious acting," Cooper continued. "Things are accelerating. In five years this will be a different world and David is the first serious actor to know it. He typifies what the audience digs.

"Other actors are not happy when David comes into a room," Cooper said. "They get up tight—they're not comfortable around that talent."

Carradine himself brushes away predictions of stardom and goes considerably further. "I have a personal vision about everything I do," he said. "This is not just a matter of what I do but what the whole show does. The main thing I want in my career is to arrive at a point where my vision is seen—is triumphant. I'd like to be Orson Welles."

Later he amplified: "I think of myself as 'the man,'" he said, "and my whole professional thing operates on that supposition. I feel I'm the guy who should be doing something or that I am the man for a certain part. There's nothing competitive about it."

Press releases say Carradine was born in 1940, but he is actually 30. His age does not bother him. "As an actor I have a feeling nobody gets to be a star under 30," he said.

His father suspected his acting abil-

ity long ago. "I was playing in 'A Bill of Divorcement,' "John Carradine recalled, "and we had a long drive to make to Beverly, Massachusetts. David —his real name is John, of course was about 10 and he was curled up in the well of the convertible. It made kind of a bunk for him.

Started early

"Somewhere along the line, I turned the radio off and we heard all of the dialog of 'A Bill of Divorcement' coming from David with all the proper inflections of the actors' voices. I turned to my wife. 'What do you think?' I said. 'I think we've got an actor on our hands,' she said.

"Actually Jack wasn't really bitten by the theater," he said. "He toyed with the idea of being a sculptor. Then he studied dance—he was Ray Bolger and Fred Astaire rolled into one and he studied piano for a year and got to be very good."

David Carradine also appeared in repertory theaters in San Francisco and Akron, Ohio. When he was in the Army his chore was illustrating training manuals, but he also organized a theater company. "That was extra," he says. "I just added that to keep myself up until 3 every morning."

David does not dwell on his early career. "I played in 'Othello' when I was 20," he said "It was awful—but I did it." Now he is trying to place himself in his proper place in the world.

"An awful lot of people don't have any opinions and feel they should," he said. "So they try to get opinions by becoming absorbed in the thing around them—they dress in a certain way or play a guitar and say to themselves, "This is a picture of me." continued

"I wanted to be regarded as a classical actor," he said. "So I dressed up in fancy clothes, quoted Shakespeare at people and I did that kind of part. I learned to play Mozart because that is something a classical actor does.

Changes direction

"That was the picture I created and it had very little to do with me. What would a classical actor mean in my world—the world I really live in? I threw it all away.

"When I arrived in California this time I said, 'For the first time in my life, I'm not going to impress anyone. I won't wear a fancy suit and I'll leave my silver-filigree cigaret case at home.'"

I first saw David Carradine on location in the San Fernando Valley on a day when the sun was proving all over again that Southern California is not fit for human habitation.

"Peace," he said with a sweeping motion of his right hand that looked very much as though he were putting thumb to nose at me and anyone else within range. He denies that is his intent.

"I've been saying 'Peace' instead of 'Hello' and 'Good-by' since I played the role of the priest in 'The Deputy' in New York," he said. "I was always blessing someone. The gesture comes from that and from another gesture I made with two hands when I played the Inca chief in the 'Sun.'"

"You've been saying 'Peace' ever since Vietnam," said Jeanine Beneteau, his constant companion on and off the set. "He's not very political he just doesn't believe in Vietnam." Jeanine, who checks in at 4 feet 10 inches, and Carradine, 6 feet 2 inches, make what is sometimes called a "striking couple."

(Carradine is estranged from his wife, Donna Lee Becht, a dancer; they have one child.)

When Jeff Cooper first heard about Shane, he advised Carradine to get over to Central Park and learn to ride a horse. "Never mind," Carradine replied. "I'll just go out to the Coast and act the hell out of them."

But when he was learning to draw a gun, it was different. "He'd practice pulling that gun hour after hour," Cooper recalled. "Ten o'clock—slap, slap, slap; Midnight—slap, slap; 3 A.M.—slap, slap. He was possessed.

"David's bizarre," Cooper added, "but he is not self-conscious about it—maybe he doesn't know. Actors are always very contrived and conscious of their appearance but David never is.

"David's not alive except when he is acting. It is as though he is always conscious that he is going to be called on to expend tremendous energy when he acts—and he conserves his strength."

Carradine plays Shane, a hired gunman, with quiet intensity, an underlying threat of violence and power leavened by a quality of innocence. "I have a poet friend who coined the phrase 'heroic naïveté,'" Carradine said. "He says it is the essential quality for a poet. I think it might be essential for an actor, too."






