• We have in our hands a rating report that contains the most heartening news since this strikingly hitless season opened last September amid extraordinary publicity hoopla and unprecedented program failure.

It was hardly news, of course, that not one of the networks' carefully planned, lavishly financed, lovingly produced new shows was to be found in the Nielsen list of Top 20 shows. But it definitely was news that not one of the five network 'movie series had made the Top 20.

All through September and October the ratings put at least four of the movie series among the Top 20. Often there were several among the Top 10. Not so in the first November report. Movies were not to be found in the list of television elite.

Now this was just one rating period, and it's a certainty that movies will be back up there on the popularity chart again. But it's pleasant to think that, at least temporarily, many viewers felt over-movied and were finding more fun and fewer jarring commercials in a fair television show than in a bad movie.

■ Two or three network movies a week might be fine, but there are five now and there will be six starting next week. And since movies are so profitable for networks and so well adapted —with their appeal to young married viewers—to advertisers' needs, it's only a matter of time before we'll have seven a week. Or more.

Where will they come from? From Hollywood. And they'll be made specially for television—cheaply and quickly. That makes them two-hour television shows, doesn't it?

• And that brings us right back to where we started, with television shows—television shows that differ only in length from old TV shows.

This, in some circles, is known as progress.





Following up the success of its 90-minute "Brigadoon" special (which it intends to repeat in March), ABC plans similar versions of two other old Broadway musicals, "Carousel" and "Kismet" . . . BERYL FOX, a woman TV producer formerly with the CBC in Canada, is in Vietnam preparing a special for CBS on the social and economic impact of the U.S. presence in Saigon. March 7 is the tentative air date; DON HEWITT is executive producer.

NBC has asked BILL DOZIER (<u>Batman</u>, <u>The Green Hornet</u>) to make an hour pilot based on the classic whodunit "Laura," by VERA CAS-PARY. It was a 1944 film starring GENE TIERNEY and DANA ANDREWS . . . A pair of shows for the <u>Coliseum</u> series (soon to replace <u>Jericho</u> on CBS) are under way: One stars ESTHER WILLIAMS and FERNANDO LAMAS in an aquacade format; the other will have DALE EVANS and ROY ROGERS in a rodeo-type show.

The Miss Teen International Pageant is set for March 25, and the International Beauty Congress Pageant for April 29. Both are on ABC and both will have contestants from many lands . . . JOHNNY MATHIS and the husband-and-wife comedy team of STILLER and MEARA will be on ED SULLIVAN'S Jan. 22 program . . . Producer GEORGE SCHLATTER expects to have BILL COSBY, SHELLEY BERMAN, and ROWAN and MARTIN on his NBC special "How to Make Yourself Miserable," based on the book by DAN GREENBERG and MARCIA JACOBS.

A drama by LORING MANDEL is the likely choice for the second <u>CBS Playhouse</u> production in late spring . . . NBC is planning <u>live global-casts</u>, via satellite, for two <u>Meet the Press</u> specials . . . Veteran actor REX INGRAM, who recently completed a role in the OTTO PREMINGER movie "Hurry Sundown," will be a guest on a Daktari segment.

On the road to par--BING CROSBY and BOB HOPE are getting ready for their separate golf tourneys: BING's Pro-Amateur test will be on ABC Jan. 21 and 22. And BOB's Desert Classic is scheduled for NBC Feb. 4 and 5 . . . JUDY CANOVA, the singing comedienne, will be a guest on an upcoming Pistols 'n' Petticoats segment.

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Occasional Wife

If you haven't seen this show yet, you've been missing something. It's a fine, fast, funny situation comedyand, for once, the situation is comic. Indeed, it's such a classic comic switch on the old chestnut of the boy and the girl having to pretend that nothing's going on (when in reality, of course, plenty is) that it bids fair to become a new classic-the boy and the girl not only having to pretend that plenty's going on (when it isn't) but that they're actually married. Peter Christopher (Michael Callan), a bachelor, is faced with the problem of a boss (Jack Collins), who believes in married executives ("I'm sorry, Peter-no marriage, no promotion"), and so he decides, with Greta (Patricia Harty), to set up marriage-keeping. Greta, in return for being, on demand, "Mrs. Christopher," receives rent, art lessons and contact lenses.

All of the episodes we've seen take full advantage not only of this premise but also of the premises. Greta lives on the ninth floor, Peter on the seventh floor, and they commute via fire escape-much to the consternation of the gentleman in the apartment in between (Bryan O'Byrne). Our favorite episode so far was the one in which Peter's mother (Sara Seegar), not invited to the first "wedding." demands a new church wedding. The dialog, as so often in this show, is wonderful. "Mom," shouts Peter, desperate, "there'll be no wedding." "All right, Peter," says his mother, "that's final. We'll talk about it later." Peter sets up a fake ceremony and hires an out-of-work actor to impersonate the minister. The actor (John Astin) gets such stage fright that he remembers only his lines from a previous job in a Disney show ("Oh, my friends of the forest, the lovely antelope and the hungry bear, will you stand on your hind legs and join paws?").

Another episode starts with Peter waiting for Cookie Carruthers (Leigh Chapman) and Greta upstairs cooking her heart out for her boy friend when who should arrive but Peter's boss. And with him is Amanda. (Eileen Baral), a precocious 8-yearold. The latter has an overnight bagand so Peter will spend the evening not with Cookie but with Amanda. and Greta, as usual, will go from the fire escape to the firing line. Indeed. Amanda is no girl for an explanation that Mrs. Christopher has a headache. "Is it." she asks, "psychosomatic? Well, that's the hallmark of our times." And, of course, at the end, Cookie is no girl for Peter's explanation of Greta. "And what," she asks. "is that?" "That," he says, "is a trained nurse." "Trained," says Cookie, "to do what?"

Everyone connected with this series —particularly Michael Callan and Jack Collins—deserves credit. But special mention should be made of the peerless tones of the narrator. In case you haven't recognized them yet, they belong to none other than the best of all baseball announcers, the "Voice of the Dodgers"—Vince Scully.

More than a million letters a year are sent to television people and what's more important, they are read BY EDITH FERON

Barbara Walters, *Today* reporter, sits and giggles over a letter. It says: "How dare you show that painting of a naked woman on the air?"

Burton Benjamin, executive producer of *The 21st Century*, sighs over a letter. It says: "Can you supply me with a bibliography on learning theory?"

Don Adams, star of *Get Smart*, chuckles over a letter. It says: "I've just written a song called 'Get Smart.'"

Mark Goodson, game-and-panel-show producer, grins over a letter. It says: "What does Orson Bean *mean* when he says, 'I went to Philadelphia and it was closed'?"

Allen Funt, producer and host of *Candid Camera*, groans over a whole pile of letters. One says: "Your suits are too tight." Another says: "Your suits are too loose." A third says: "Your tie sticks out from under your vest." A fourth says: "You slump."

Chet Huntley, NBC newsman, scowls darkly over a letter. It says: "I love you, I love you."

The day has begun in the television world. The mail has arrived. It falls upon the TV folk like a terrifying white deluge. No one knows the exact count—but it's at least a million, every year; and it comes from every city, every town, every hamlet in the United States.

The letters applaud: "Enjoyable, please continue . . . pleasing and informative . . exciting and excellent reporting . . . funny show, very relaxing . . . clever . . . wholesome and patriotic . . . true family entertainment with nice clean fun . . ."

And they hiss: "Horrid . . . people are not morons or

idiots . . . trite . . . abominable programming . . . social outrage . . . inconvenient hour . . . ridicule of a fine American tradition . . . an insult to adult intelligence . . . full of temptation and trash . . ."

What happens to the applause and hisses? Do the TV people really pay attention to them? The answer is: You bet your life they do.

Series stars, who get the most mail, the great bulk of which is picture requests, have systems set up for handling it. Don Adams, for instance, gets between two and three thousand letters a week. His mail is screened by two people. He pores over 100 or 150 a week himself.

Independent producers like Mark Goodson and Allen Funt have secretaries to screen their mail for them. "Knotty or critical mail is given to me. I'm curious to see it," says Goodson.

"I get the critical mail, special mail from universities, and VIP mail. I read it avidly," says Funt.

Sponsors too, or rather their top advertising executives, read their mail avidly. At Burlington Industries, sponsor of *The Ed Sullivan Show* and *ABC Stage* 67, advertising director Jack Hanson gets all viewer mail. "I read every word of it personally." At American Telephone & Telegraph, which sponsors the *Bell Telephone Hour*, advertising manager Jack Howland gets all the letters. "We read them, every one."

As for the masses of letters addressed directly to the networks—including tens of thousands a year forwarded by TV GUDD's Viewer Service —they are processed with dispatch. People specially hired to read and answer "standard" viewer mail (i.e., generalized "I like," "I don't like" letters) cull out all specialized questions, gripes and VIP letters for assorted on-screen luminaries, producers and executives to answer.

What proportion of viewer letters is actually answered is impossible to say. NBC has files indicating that more than 177,000 viewer "communications" to the network itself were answered last year. The individuals interviewed, with only one exception, say they answer all mail. The exception was Allen Funt. "We started to acknowledge all letters," he explains, "but we don't do it any more. It's too time-consuming and too expensive. Now we only single out unusual letters." It is probable that Mr. Funt is by no means unique in this matter.

Those who don't get answers, to tell the truth, aren't missing much, except the thrill of seeing an envelope with a famous name in the upper left-hand corner. The vast majority of answers are courtesy formulas, mass-produced by secretaries.

Whether answered or not, however, the mail is taken seriously. At CBS, a breakdown of the contents of the letters is made and circulated among executives.

At ABC, Ellen McKinnon, head of the viewer mail office, keeps executives and producers informed of "trends" in the mail. "Right now," she says, "I am keeping Leonard Goldberg [vice president in charge of programming] informed of responses to the shows."

And at NBC, the study of the mail almost constitutes a small industry. At this network the viewer mail office, run by Kathryn Cole with a staff of seven, prepares detailed analytical charts of mail responses-approval, criticism and inquiry. These charts are broken down into a series of classifications, subclassifications, and subsubclassifications. "At the end of every month," says Mrs. Cole, "a detailed report on this total breakdown goes to the chairman of the board, to the vice presidents, and to all producers who request it. It reflects the audience reaction for the month."

Does anything come of all this letter-reading and letter-analysis? Yes—a lot comes of it:

mendous when Robert Lansing was dropped from 12 O'clock High. It was certainly a factor in casting him as a lead in The Man Who Never Was." Mark Goodson says: "If we get an absolute deluge of positive mail on a performer, we'll call him again. The same is true for a replacement emcee."

People are fired because of the mail. This is difficult to prove because no TV executive would publicly admit it. But a well-established NBC star says, off the record, "I know positively of one case of a female celebrity on a show who was fired because the mail was so negative. The people simply couldn't stand her."

On-screen personalities change their personal habits because of the mail. Allen Funt says: "They're mindful of my clothing. I'll always hear if they don't approve of my suits. And God help me if there's a wrinkle." He tries hard to look elegant. Barbara Walters reports: "I got three hundred letters in one week about my long hair. People didn't like it. They said I looked phony and glamorous. It wasn't a morning image. I cut my hair really because of the letters."

Dramatic content is changed because of the mail. Although taped series, made long in advance, are unresponsive to immediate mail, the daytime dramas, which are live, quiver sensitively to immediate viewer response. Says NBC's Kathryn Cole: "The producers of daytime drama are very anxious about the mail. The Doctors, for example—if they're going to make a drastic change, or inject something unexpected, or introduce a controversial subject, they're eager to know audience reactions. They act on the mail. They take suggestions."

Production details can be changed because of the mail. Says Allen Funt: "Occasionally a letter gives me insight into what we're doing that's wrong. One viewer pointed out that all the time we were describing the spots we were all alone on stage, without props, and that it wasn't interesting. I realized he was right. The next day, I started using props." He adds: "I'm very responsive to the mail. If the cleaning lady criticized the show two minutes before we went on the air. I'd be tempted to change it. It's my mishugass."* And the ABC vice president says: "We got a lot of letters complaining about the loudness of the music of Peyton Place. We've lowered the volume."

Shows can be put on the air because of the mail. Sing Along with Mitch was originally planned as a one-shot program. It got so much favorable mail, says NBC's Kathryn Cole, that "the sales promotion people were thrilled," and a series was produced.

Shows may return to the air because of the mail. "There's been a lot of spontaneous mail on *The Avengers*. About a thousand letters, and not one unfavorable one," says ABC's Ellen McKinnon. "We're putting it back on the air because of that."

Program timetables may be changed because of the mail. The ABC vice president, again, says: "If enough people say, 'We want our children to see a certain show; put it on earlier,' we listen. It's happened. We've changed schedules for that reason."

Summer reruns are scheduled by the mail. "When they're rescheduling movies," says Kathryn Cole, "they'll call me to find out what the mail was like, the first time around. They'll shy away from movies getting a little more criticism. Also, in rescheduling a series, they'll be guided by past mail responses."

And sponsors make pro and con decisions because of the mail. "The letters are a sales tool," says one advertising man. "If a batch of good letters comes in, they're in the hands of the sales-promotion boys the next morning. And within a few hours they're waving them under a sponsor's nose." Speaking for one sponsor, Jack Howland of AT&T says: "Mail is one of our research tools. It does guide our judgments. Years of mail, along with other factors, for instance, gave us a feeling the old format of Bell Telephone Hour had run its course."

The mail is obviously not the only, or even the dominant, factor in television decisions. As Mark Goodson says, "The mail is just a minuscule sampling. In the last analysis the real voice of the people is ratings." But, as an ABC vice president also says: "It definitely affects us. If people from different parts of the country say something, if there's a trend—and I don't mean thousands, I mean 10, 20, 30 —we do pay attention."

Viewer letters—more than a million of them a year—are having their effect on the medium. And it's not surprising at that. The potentates of this industry are entertaining and informing an invisible audience—with only a string of Nielsen figures to guide them . . . and their own canned laugh tracks to listen to.

And that is why, if you walk into any television office early in the morning, you will see them all—from the chairmen of the board and the presidents down to lowliest girl Friday sitting and poring over letters, chortling over them, scowling over them, stewing over them, losing sleep over them. In the last analysis, however, the silent ratings, not the mail, are the decisive factor in TV decisions. But this is show business. And, ratings or no ratings, the show folk are starving for real live applause and hisses.

At first she hesitated, "I'd read only the play," Miss Fontanne explains. "I wanted to see what television made of it. When I saw it was rich, interesting to do -a part written by a dramatist who writes for the human tongue to speak-I took it."

And how did the nearly 80-year-old actress feel about her first lone performance in 38 years? She smiles. "When I act with Mr. Lunt, he is a fine actor that I am privileged to be working with. This time, I had a beautiful actress in Julie Harris."



DID MOTHER REALLY KNOW BEST?

Mary Martin Sent Her Son, Larry Hagman, Packing,

with Results That Must Be Gratifying to Both

The entourage is an accepted part of the Hollywood scene. Such stars as Bob Hope and Jerry Lewis rarely go anywhere without an accompanying band of retainers, who can be counted upon to laugh at the jokes, protect the person, clear the path, run the errands and sustain the ego of their leader.

Thus, when an old friend of Larry

Hagman, who plays Tony the astronaut in NBC's I Dream of Jeannie, says, "He's a man with an entourage," it is not particularly surprising, even if the 35-year-old actor has not reached the stellar magnitude of Hope or Lewis, or of his mother, Mary Martin. What is surprising is the nature of the Hagman entourage—his Swedish wife, Maj (pronounced "My"), and their two children, 8-year-old Heidi and 4-year-old Preston.

Larry says, "I take my family everywhere. I jerk the kids out of school if I go on location for three weeks." He will interrupt a press interviewwhich usually includes his wife-to take the children to ride the merrygo-round at Santa Monica pier, insisting, "It's really selfish. I enjoy taking them to the carousel. They'd rather be home watching cartoons." For luncheon interviews while he is working, Maj brings in Chinese food and candles, so that she, Larry and the reporter may dine à trois in his dressing room. When publicity pictures are being shot at home, the children are constantly underfoot, and Larry will not hear of their being asked to leave the room. On days when neither Maj nor the children are with him, he calls home three or four times from the set.

Even a Hollywood personality without an entourage rarely has his family in tow the way Hagman does, and the fact that he does can probably be traced back to his own peripatetic childhood. The son of Mary Martin and the late Ben Hagman, a Texas attorney. Larry spent a total of only four years of his life with his parents -two years with each. Miss Martin was just 16 when he was born in Weatherford, Texas. (She always said she was 17 and only recently admitted the truth. Most actresses would be delighted to knock a year off their age, but Miss Martin says, "It sounds so hillbillyish.") While his mother was finding her first success, Larry was raised by his grandmother. After her death he was shunted about from school to school, camp to camp, parent to parent.

Miss Martin is now inclined to dismiss some of the incidents of his early years as "the phases that all teen-agers go through," but they included burning down the 200-year-old dormitory at a prep school he attended and passing out cold after drinking a whole bottle of gin in his mother's hotel suite while she was doing a matinee. After this happened, she said, "If you want to drink, you've got to work." She packed his bag, gave him \$50 and sent him on his way.

In the past, when he and his mother had difficulties, Larry had hitchhiked to Texas to be with his father. Once, determined to be a cowboy, he spent a couple of his high school years in Weatherford, which he remembers warmly as "a lovely little town with trees and flowers." Despite the fact that his father gave him first a motor scooter and then a Jeep to drive around town, he eventually gave up the idea of being a cowboy. "There's just so much baling of hay," he says. "No matter how proficient you become, there's just so far you can go." When he was graduated from high school in 1948, his mother gave him his choice of a new car or a trip to Europe. He took the trip to Europe and then returned to New York.

By the time of the gin-drinking episode, he had decided to be an actor. He had had a year of bad grades at Bard College at Annandale-on-Hudson, N.Y., and then worked with Margo Jones in theater-in-the-round in Dallas ("Mother pulled strings"). Following that, he had spent a season with Eva Le Gallienne and Margaret Webster at Woodstock, N.Y., where, he says, "I walked onstage, got a laugh, and that was it!" When his mother sent him packing (but continued to send him \$50 a week), he lived with friends for a time, finally landed a job as assistant stage manager with St. John Terrell's Music Circus in Florida and then went north with the director to his tent theater-in-the-round, in Lambertville, N.J. He says, "That's where I got my experience. For my \$28.50 a week I was prop man, assistant stage manager, actor, singer and dancer. I finally rose to stage manager." One night his mother came around to see continued

him and asked if he would like to go to London and be in "South Pacific" with her. It sounded like a good idea.

He spent five years in England—a year as "the guy who bought the grass skirt" in "South Pacific" and doing a late-night act at another theater ("I sang songs and told dirty jokes"), and four years in the U.S. Air Force, where he produced shows in Europe. He also met Maj Axelsson, a Swedish dress designer, who was going with his roommate. They were married at Christmas time, 1954.

When he returned to New York, Larry went into a succession of Broadway and off-Broadway plays, including "Career," "The Nervous Set," "The Beauty Part," "Once Around the Block" and "God and Kate Murphy." Actor Mike Kellin of The Wackiest Ship in the Army, who played his brother in "God and Kate Murphy," remembers him as "a fun-loving sort," who "never spoke of Mary Martin as if she were his mother, but always as a great star." Hagman also did more than 600 television shows in New York -everything from the prestigious Hallmark Hall of Fame, Play of the Week and Studio One to a three-year hitch in the soap opera Edge of Night. He played a variety of roles, from light comedy leads to heavies.

For nine years in New York he made "between \$20,000 and \$40,000 a yearnot bad for a guy nobody's ever heard of." But then for nine months he could find no work at all. "From \$2000 a week to zero!" he says. "Have you ever been out of work for nine months?" Finally he moved to Hollywood, "where the action was," with \$50 in his pocket. But there was no action for him. As soon as he returned to New York, however, he got a chance to do an Alfred Hitchcock Hour, so back to Hollywood he went. That particular Hitchcock show was never done, but Larry was paid and decided to stay on. This time Maj joined him. Soon he was offered parts in five television pilots, of which *I Dream of Jeannie* turned out to be the winner.

Since moving to Hollywood, Larry has appeared in a number of motion pictures—"Fail Safe," "Ensign Pulver," "The Cavern," "In Harm's Way" and "The Group," where his portrayal of an unsympathetic role was characterized by the Saturday Review as "absolutely first-rate."

Today the Hagman entourage is ensconced in a modest home in Santa Monica Canyon. The furniture is heavy and solid, because Larry recalls, "When I was a kid, I couldn't kick any furniture." Any misunderstandings he may have had with his mother have long since been resolved. His attitude toward her is one of pride and affection, and she says, "I'm so excited about his success. I may be prejudiced, but I think he's very talented." Others agree.

Larry Hagman can be difficult. On at least two occasions he has called up Maj from the set and said, "Start packing-we're leaving." Some members of the program's crew have threatened to quit after disagreements with him. He admits, "I'm kind of a troublemaker on the set"; and someone close to the show says, "Only an actress as easygoing as Barbara Eden would put up with him." But Miss Eden says, "Whenever Larry feels strongly about something, it's for the good of the show. He's never out to hurt anyone." According to Mary Martin, "Whatever he does, he goes at it like a steam roller." A friend adds, "He races his motor like mad." Sidney Sheldon, the show's creatorproducer, says, "He can be difficult. but it stems from his being such a strong perfectionist. He wants to own the world and own it this afternoon."

In the meantime, though, he is happy with his own special little entourage around him, especially his wife, of whom he says, "She's the closest person I've ever had."

Carnegie Report Fears Voiced

Top-level noncommercial TV circles are becoming fearful that the hotly anticipated report by the Carnegie **Commission on Educational Television** will be both tardy and watered down. The blue-ribboned panel headed by Dr. James R. Killian Jr. of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, had been expected to submit its tightly guarded recommendations before year's end, but talk was circulating last week that a more probable release date is late January or even mid-February. At the same time, a letdown of ETV hopes is rumored in the making, with the Commission ducking forceful proposals in favor of a let-Congress-decide kind of beg-off to noncommercial TV's financing needs.

Possible upshots: President Johnson could give the subject only a perfunctory nod in his forthcoming State of the Union message; the FCC may have to push up its Feb. 1 deadline for a third round of comments on the Ford Foundation's and other ETV-via-satellite proposals; Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D., Wash.) may have to put off formal hearings on the whole subject until too late for the next Congress to implement any plan.


With live transoceanic TV until lately limited to spanning the Atlantic via Early Bird, CBS's prestigious if infrequent Town Meetings of the World have been something less than worldwide in scope. Now that transpacific TV is here, the network faces a dif-

ferent problem: finding Asians who speak articulately (in English, at that) and responsibly for their part of the world. "Our focus these days is more on Asia than on Europe," CBS News' Bill Leonard pointed out, "but most of us just don't know who to call up in Asia." Ex-newsman Leonard, now a News VP, is just back from a monthlong swing through Asia looking for the Far East cast for a first transpacific Town Meeting. "It may also be transatlantic," he reported, and may come off before the end of the current TV season. The cast isn't picked, though. The inevitable topic: Vietnam

Some U.S. community of 50,000 or more that gets its TV largely through community-antenna system may a soon be an unwitting participant in an "advertising laboratory" to test commercials. The advertising research foundation, an industry group supported by major corporations, is soliciting "seed money" from consumergoods makers to finance rewiring of a selected town's CATV so its householders can be subjected to tryout sales pitches slipped into regular telecasts. ARF noted that it would be vital to success of the undertaking to keep the guinea-pig community oblivious to it all.

Earlier this month TV GUDE disclosed that such a TV "laboratory" has been in operation surreptitiously since early 1964 in Port Jervis, N.Y., a small Delaware River Valley town.—Richard K. Doan

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

A nybody here looking for signs and portents? In the network movieschedule department we can, at best, note that things do improve after the first of the year. For a couple of days, anyway.

It's portentous, perhaps, that we see the old year out with the remnants of a long-ago hit musical and the New Year in with the musical stuff of the Sixties. "Anything Goes," the New Year's Eve offering, retains the title and the Cole Porter songs of the 1934 Broadway show, but comes up with a substitute story that Bing Crosby and Donald O'Connor can't lick between them and whose creaks drown out the music. And the New Year's Day goody, "It Happened at the World's Fair," offers Elvis Presley doing 10 numbers for the sake of the devoutest among his devout fans; anyone less than a super-devotee will find that even the six or seven that are palatable are not quite enough to keep the viewer's mind entirely off the plot that involves Elvis nursemaiding a cutesey Chinese tot in between being the surface wolf and the at-heart good guy. If you're a New Year's celebrant who needs music, settle for "Auld Lang Syne" with the neighbors.

Things do pick up a bit with "A Touch of Larceny," a pleasant-enough British farce that makes up in drollery and bright dialog what it lacks in guffaws. James Mason's the man with a get-rich-quick scheme that's offbeat and funny; Vera Miles is lovely as the lady he's in a hurry to get rich for; and George Sanders does one of his better stuffed-shirt routines, all to a very gay progressivejazz score by Philip Green.

For sheer performance, however, the pick of the week is Geraldine Page in "Summer and Smoke," Tennessee Williams' tale of repression and frustration in a small Mississippi town circa World War I. Miss Page's poignant and appealing portrait of Alma Winemiller, the minister's daughter who loves the rake next door, almost compensates for the overblown East Lynne-ish production that puts a bit of corn to the plot. She should not be missed-and special note should be taken, too, of Pamela Tiffin, making her screen debut in a minor role and leaving one breathless with her dazzling, youthful beauty.

Dazzlement's hardly the effect wrought by "Five Branded Women." a dull and shoddy ersatz war movie whose distinction is that its five beautiful heroines walk around all uglied up with crew cuts doled out as punishment by their fellow Yugoslavs for their having consorted with Nazis. This international mishmash about Yugoslav Partisans, with American, French and Italian actresses as heroines; British and American actors as heroes; an Italian producer; an American director; a story by Italians; Italian and Austrian scenery and lots of dubbing, goes thud in any language.

'The Tammy Grimes Show' disappeared from the air

after four weeks, and with it \$1,000,000

Gentlemen:

With regard to your inquiry about The Tammy Grimes Show, which departed ABC on Sept. 29 after only four episodes were broadcast: It continued



That's right, a million dollars.

was indeed one of the fastest and most ignominious nose dives in TV history, unless you want to count the 100 *Grand* quiz show which ABC junked in 1963 after a three-week run.

A lot of ruffled feelings accompanied Tammy's TV demise, and a lot of impressive reputations have been handed a sock on the nose: Bill Dozier, the executive producer, had come off a hot streak which included Batman and The Green Hornet: George Axelrod, who wrote the pilot, was author of such Broadway smashes as "The Seven Year Itch" and "Will Success Spoil Rock Hunter?"; Tammy's own career "The included Unsinkable Molly Brown," which ran two years on Broadway; and in the supporting cast were a trio of well-seasoned mimes named Dick Sargent, Hiram Sherman and Maudie Prickett.

But despite all, the venture came to be called (by various members of the company) "Grimes' Fairy Tale" and "How to Lose a Million Without Even Trying." That's right, a million bucks. Ten whole segments were filmed; six of those will languish in some dank place at 20th Century-Fox until doomsday.

One of the accomplices offers this breakdown:

That's over a million right there, and you have to add on an unestimated cost for the settlement of contracts.

So there's little wonder that not too many people connected with this show, either in New York or Hollywood, are willing to be quoted for the record about what went wrong. Trying to get at this story is an exercise in intrigue that maybe needs Napoleon Solo instead of a couple of Irish reporters who are mere mortals and thus easily kidded.

But now most of the pieces in this little jigsaw puzzle appear to be in place, so we're shooting off this memo for your edification and guidance.

Actually, there were two men interested in making Tammy Grimes a TV star: Dozier had been her friend for a long time and once had tried to persuade her to take the proffered lead in *Bewitched*. But Tammy couldn't see herself as a witch and didn't think the show would play well. (*Bewitched* is in its third season, but nobody is right all the time.) Dozier kept thinking about a vehicle for Tammy during the period he was involved with getting *Batman* and *Green Hornet* off the ground.

At the same time, Charles "Bud" Barry, who is senior vice president of TV and radio for the giant Young & Rubicam advertising agency, was having similar notions about her. He thought Tammy was "magic" in "The Unsinkable Molly Brown," and he figured some of that magic could be put to work selling products on TV for General Foods, one of the clients Y & R represents.

Tammy was under contract to Screen Gems, but they hadn't been able to find the right TV format for her. Barry bought out her contract and then, knowing Dozier's interest in her, commissioned him to develop a property for the actress. Dozier asked George Axelrod to figure out some series format.

Axelrod came up with the idea of making her a "madcap heiress" named Tamantha Ward and supplying her with a twin brother (who is her temperamental opposite), a skinflint uncle who administers her trust, and a frumpy housekeeper who is in cahoots with the uncle.

The idea of playing a nutty, freewheeling heiress appealed to Tammy, and the series was set in motion. Dozier hired Richard Whorf and Alex Gottlieb to co-produce it, and pretty soon the whole company assembled at 20th Century-Fox to make the pilot from Axelrod's script.

The first hint of trouble came when everybody glommed that pilot. It was terrible! We mean it had flopperoo written all over

it. General Foods asked to be dealt out.

Another Y & R client, though, Bristol-Myers, saw some possibilities in the pilot. They said that if more life and fun and believability could be pumped into segments, subsequent they would be willing to gamble Tammy's on demonstrated and impressive talents to pull the thing through; and also on the really outstanding track records of people like Dozier, Gottlieb. Axelrod, Whorf and

So Bristol-Myers told ABC they wanted to sponsor the series in that Thursday at 8:30 spot, right after F*Troop* and before *Bewitched*. The way we get it, Tom Moore, the president of ABC-TV, had this terrible sinking spell when he got a look at that pilot, and resisted rather strenuously the opinion that it ought to adorn his schedule.

But let's face it, when a sponsor as big as Bristol-Myers starts pushing blue chips into the middle of the table, a network has got to study its own cards very carefully to decide how to play the hand. ABC decided, at length —but not without internal rumblings to cover the bet.

Dozier and his legions went back to their drawing boards and devised four more segments of the series—four new madcap situations in which Tammy could be this madcap heiress and all.

Then one day, all the heavy artillery assembled in a Hollywood screening room to unveil the results: guys from 20th Century-Fox, Bristol-Myers, Y & R, ABC. They rolled all four of the segments, and when the lights came on again, there was like this long silence in the room

before somebody finally spoke up. "Fellas, we're sunk," was the opening shot. Talk about gloomy. These guys were already figuring how to get the best tax break on their losses. "It wasn't like we just had a bad show," one of them said later. "This was an unfixable show. There was nothing to fix. The whole premise was cockeyed. There was no natural nor well-reasoned flow of events in the stories. The main character wasn't related properly to the basic premise." continued

Disaster loomed, so to speak. ABC had this monstrosity penciled in on Thursday nights and it was too late to get out of it. The schedules were announced, the promotion hoopla was written—one line of which promised that Tamantha would get into "extraordinarily funny situations which are excruciatingly painful to her sobersided twin brother, Terence." Old Terence wasn't the only one in pain.

So what did the network do? They brazened it out. There was always the chance that the court of public opinion would prove them wrong and *The Tammy Grimes Show* would be a big, unexpected smash.

But, alas. The real outcome only reminds one of the old parody on Irving Berlin's rousing show-stopper: "Yesterday they told you you would not go far. Tonight you opened and they were right." And there *Tammy* was, on the night of Sept. 8 last, appearing on TV screens, while viewers everywhere looked at each other, bewildered.

The public took a couple of glances and then turned—and tuned—away. The rating service reports were dis-

couraging, to say the least.

ABC had Batman starting off the evening at 7:30 with a whopping share of the audience. Then came F Troop, with only a few percentage points less audience than Batman. Then, at 8:30 came Tammy, and the ratings plummeted. That meant that viewers were switching off ABC to My Three Sons on CBS, or Star Trek on NBC, or maybe to some local baseball game. Bewitched was having the devil's own time luring them back at 9 o'clock.

But is wasn't only the public that scorned *Tammy*. Sponsors have a way of communicating their displeasure about such matters and Chevrolet, one of the sponsors of *Bewitched*, made it painfully clear that *Tammy* wasn't their idea of a strong lead-in. But ABC was way ahead of them. The network already was beckoning to the bull pen for a little number called *The Dating Game*.

And so *The Tammy Grimes Show* died after four weeks—the quickest casualty of any comedy or drama series in TV history. What happened?

Bill Dozier said this to us: "One thing I want to make clear. If I was running ABC and was faced with all the facts as they existed, I would have made the same decision. I might have made it earlier. We all kept telling ourselves we had to be wildly bizarre with Tammy. I would say it was an organized disaster."

Depending on whom you talk to, the blame falls in one of two directions: on the "creative team" which failed to find a workable premise for the show; and on Tammy herself.

One member of the company complains that Dozier was too tied up with *Batman* and *The Green Hornet* to give *The Tammy Show* the proper attention. Another regrets that George Axelrod couldn't find more time to help the series in its early stages. "It was not Tammy's failure," says a third. "It was the failure of the show's creators to capture her special qualities for television." Dozier himself admits it was "a combination of the wrong role, wrong person and wrong time. It may be that TV is not the best medium for Tammy, just as movies weren't Mary Martin's best medium. Tammy is great onstage."

Co-producer Gottlieb says: "There was no rapport between Tammy and the audience. It was the combination of the format and her way of delivery. She has a brittle quality which just doesn't work on TV. You've got to be warm on that cold tube."

Gottlieb, who has worked with Donna Reed, Gale Storm, and Debbie Reynolds, added: "I've had a lot of success with women stars. But I found it impossible to get through to Tammy. You couldn't say, 'Will the real Tammy Grimes please stand up,' because nobody knows who the real Tammy Grimes is. If she were onetenth as warm and likable on film as Dick Sargent was, the show would have been a hit."

'Who said she was unsinkable?'

When the series was canceled, Gottlieb sent Dozier three bottles of champagne and a card saying, "Who said she was unsinkable?"

Another member of the company told us: "Tammy showed very early that she was going to be difficult to work with. She had trouble adjusting to the demands of a TV series. And there were things about her which bothered many of us: her speech patterns, which are part New England, part British, part some private notion of what diction should be."

Dick Sargent, on the other hand, calls her "the greatest performer I've ever worked with. She knows what she wants, and that looks like stubbornness sometimes. I think she's perfect for TV."

Co-producer Richard Whorf left the show with bleeding ulcers; he has practically nothing to say about the experience. It wouldn't be "gentle-

manly," he says, to go into the subject. "She's always been a friend of mine and always will be," says Whorf. "Everybody has to share the blame."

Tammy herself doesn't do much talking. She does disagree, however, with the opinion that TV may not be her medium. "Tve done TV," she told us. "You just don't knock out one medium. I'm an actress and TV is where actresses work. An audience accepts an actress on TV the same as it does on movies or stage. An actress's acceptance is based on her material and her talent."

She also points out that, although the new show was named *The Tammy Grimes Show*, it wasn't really "a series about Tammy Grimes. It was a different character, a part for me to play. I assume I was asked to do this series because of my personality. You cannot blame anyone for this. Please don't blame anybody."

That's the story, gentlemen. Looking into it was an enlightening experience, we met a lot of interesting people, and got out into the fresh air. What do you want us to do next?

THE TRUE-LIFE ADVENTURES OF STEFANIA ZOFJA FEDERKIEVICZ, ALIAS TAFFY PAUL, ALIAS STEFANIE POWERS, ALIAS THE GIRL FROM U.N.C.L.E.

he arrival of a reigning movie queen at the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer commissary, years ago, inspired conversations to become muffled and silverware to stop clinking. Onlookers openly envied the star's precise makeup and impeccable grooming. An unsung bit player singled out for a greeting could not be happier had he been touched by Midas. The star seemed a combination of Queen Elizabeth inspecting the troops and Princess Margaret visiting an orphanage. She symbolized an opulent but now-vanished era.

Hollywood customs have changed drastically since the emergence of assembly-line television shows. It was difficult to visualize the gilded past as actress Stefanie Powers recently paraded unnoticed through the same commissary. Few would have recognized her even without the oversized, tortoise-shell sunglasses, long an attention-getting device in Southern California. She wore faded blue denims, a man's broadcloth shirt and a wrinkled, eight-year-old ski jacket.


Her hangdog look was accentuated by the tinted auburn hair hanging across her freckled face, which lacked any lipstick or makeup. Miss Powers warranted a reserved table in the executive wing and clearly enjoyed being honored on the day's menu by the *Girl from U.N.C.L.E.* salad, testimony to the television series in which she was starring.

"I'm a slob," she admitted. "It's disgusting, I know, but I like bare feet and sloppy clothes. If I ever lost my old ski jacket, I'd lose my mind. It's been everywhere I've been, from the back seat of a Rolls-Royce to a sloop sailing to Catalina Island. Sometimes I look like the wrath of the world."

The commissary appearance occurred scant weeks before her wedding last August. Miss Powers, once Stefania Zofja Federkievicz, once a high school cheerleader known as Taffy Paul, was up to her long hair in work. The lucky bridegroom was Gary John Yurosek, alias Gary Lockwood, in palmier days star of *The Lieutenant* TV series.

The amalgamation of these two actors meant more than the obvious publicity benefits. "Do you know I have three television sets now?" the giggling Stefanie asked. "Wait a minute. Six television sets! Gary has two. We have two houses, four automobiles, a motorcycle and a three-room Victorian flat in Hampstead [London], England. It's absolutely ridiculous. We are people of extremes."

A confirmed Anglophile, who once considered studying at the Old Vic and now consoles herself with a subscription to Punch, Miss Powers developed her affected quasi-British accent at Hollywood High **continued**

School, from which she nearly missed being graduated five years ago. In the aftermath of an uninhibited sorority party she and four accomplices sawed down a tree that had stood on school grounds for 20 years. Stefanie was fingerprinted and booked at Juvenile Hall, charged with malicious mischief. Her \$320 fine was payable in full before she could collect her diploma.

"We didn't realize what we had done," she recalls. "We had been drinking stout malt liquor."

Now a maturing 24, Stefanie's tastes have changed in the intervening years. She stocks her wine cabinet with Chateau Mouton Rothschild, cabinetaged Schloss Johannisberg, Valpolicella, and several imported Rieslings. The Lockwoods shared a rare bottle of 1932 Chateau Lafite-Rothschild the night *The Girl from U.N.C.L.E.* premiered.

Champagne celebration

To celebrate the first day of shooting *Girl*, Miss Powers ordered 40 bottles of California champagne and clinked hollow-stemmed glasses with stagehands, extras and executives on the set. "Nothing but the best for me boys, I always say," she whined, trying to impersonate Eliza Doolittle. Someone mentioned the plethora of television spy series fallen by the wayside. "There never has been a girl of my age bracket as the star in an hourlong series," she declared. "That in itself is unique."

Actually, she was fortunate to be on the premises in the first place. Mary Ann Mobley, the 1959 Miss America, had been selected from 100 candidates to play the leading role in the series pilot—an hour-long spinoff beamed on *The Man from U.N.C.L.E.* However, network brass, for some reason, decided against Miss Mobley for the role and summoned Miss Powers, never a Miss Anything. Her credits encompassed a dozen films in which she played such notable roles as Troy Donahue's girl friend and a schoolgirl in "Tammy Tell Me True," and a stint in "Love Has Many Faces" with Lana Turner in what she describes as "a loathsome, hateful picture that never should have been made."

Ordinarily, Miss Powers prefers to research her roles before stepping in front of the cameras. She spent two weeks as a nurse's aid before filming "The Interns". For *The Girl from U.N.C.L.E.* her sole research consisted of watching *The Man from U.N.C.L.E.* On the new series, only the faces and storylines have been changed.

Each episode includes those coy little meetings in U.N.C.L.E. headquarters presided over by Inspector Waverly, who gravely swivels a conference table as he unveils some remarkable bit of chicanery—like a wheel of booby-trapped Danish blue cheese. The trap, of course, is the handiwork of THRUSH, a menacing but apparently hapless adversary that has failed for two years to nail Napoleon Solo or Illya Kuryakin.

Solo himself appeared in one of the early *Girl* adventures, not so much to aid in the fight against THRUSH as to help hypo the ratings for his sister show. He and Miss Powers, playing the part of April Dancer, barely escape becoming permanent residents of a waxworks. In later segments Stefanie hangs by her knees on a trapeze



high above a pond filled with piranha fish, jumps from a helicopter rope ladder to a moving train and clings to a bell buoy in the middle of manmade waters located on the MGM backlot. All of this may seem reminiscent of *The Perils of Pauline*, but that is *another* series which may be on the air next season.

Unlike her fellow U.N.C.L.E. agents, the ladylike April is not required to kill the bad guys. Her feminine charms serve as the bait, while her partner Noel Harrison provides the fireworks. She does carry, however, a perfume atomizer that sprays gas, earrings and charm bracelets that explode, among other interesting gadgets.

In her private life, Stefanie is seldom satisfied with half measures. She faced her first bull, a 700-pounder, four years ago on a ranch near Tijuana, Mexico, and has fought 16 cows in mock bullfights since. "I've never fought an animal and killed it," she explains. "But I've killed in a slaughterhouse with the boys. You take a sword and with one swift stroke sever the spinal cord. It's instantaneous death."

Matadors' little sister

The "boys" are Mexicans partnered with her in an enterprise that owns a bull ring in Texcoco and breeds fighting bulls that bring nearly \$1000 apiece. Admiring matadors, who regard Stefanie as a little sister, last year named her the first honorary member of the Mexican bullfighters union. Matador Jaime Bravo taught her the sport, first building up stamina by running her over the hills of Los Angeles' Griffith Park for three hours at a clip, starting at 7 in the morning.

In one *Girl* hour, the script called for Stefanie to demonstrate bullfighting. She wore her own *traje* corto ensemble, the traditional Andalusian black suit and hat. A month later, shoeless and suffering from a blistered foot, she darted around the parquet floors of a Beverly Hills fencing studio, resolutely learning to handle the saber for a five-minute sequence on an upcoming show. The flamboyant movements of the saber suited her well. "Bravissimo!" shouted instructor Joseph Vince at the conclusion of her first lesson. "With those thrusts you could kill a baby lion." Miss Powers had other ideas. "Maybe I can take out future hostilities on my husband with a saber," she replied, demurely blinking her false eyelashes.

If nothing else, constant physical activity has kept Stefanie in fine physical trim. Her current 117-pound frame is kept supple with 11 minutes of Royal Canadian Air Force exercises every morning. The show's producers have taken advantage of her attractive figure by allocating roughly \$1000 an episode for stretch vinyl jackets and skirts, a bare-midriff harem-dancer outfit, miniskirts and the latest mod fashions from London's Carnaby Street.

It took an unusual amount of endurance for Stefanie to finish the 12hour days typical of the first 10 weeks of filming. "I'm in every bloody shot," she plaintively wailed. It will be worth it if she achieves the success of the movies' leading female spy, "Modesty Blaise." To suffer the fate of television's *Honey West*, on the other hand, would be distressing.

"If our show is good [So far it has not been a sensation.-ED.] I don't think one necessarily must emphasize the fact that it's a spy story," says Stefanie. "Spy stories have been done millions of times before. Look how many Westerns have been made. If Girl from U.N.C.L.E. is at all valid, it will be appreciated for what it is. In certain respects we go quite avantgarde with some of our comedy. When one conceives of using Boris Karloff in drag as a diabolical woman called Mother Muffin, it could be considered to be high camp. I don't want to seem that I'm terribly secure in my optimism, but there is a power in positive thinking."

BOWLS BY DAY and BY NIGHT

The Rose Bowl may still be the largest, but let's consider Miami's night-blooming marvel BY MELVIN DURSLAG

Considering that it offers no ocean view, no bagels, nor even a parimutuel window, the Orange Bowl football game in Miami has come a long way.

In 1933, the year it started, you could have got a price against its lasting without the foregoing assets. The first game's crowd of 3500, in fact, was rated surprisingly large.

What has happened since is unaccountable. Today, all of the 72,647 seats are sold, and one is considered lucky if he is able to purchase one of them. I mean, there isn't even a headwaiter you can grease.

Most football scientists appraise the Rose, Orange, Sugar and Cotton Bowls as the major collegiate postseason games. Floridians toss in a fifth—the Gator Bowl, played in Jacksonville. But in 49 states, this one still lacks the credentials of the other four.

The Orange isn't the biggest of the bowl games, nor is it the oldest. But it is unique in that it has become the only one usually played New Year's night. (This season the game will be played on Monday, Jan. 2.)

There are several reasons for staging the Orange Bowl game in the evening. First is television. The other reasons don't matter. When NBC bought the rights to the game for three years, beginning in 1965, it occurred to one of its genii that a match played in the afternoon not only conflicted with the Cotton Bowl and Sugar Bowl games, but also failed to cash in on the full audience potential. By New Year's evening, the brains of many viewers have cleared from the previous night's rigors and they are ready to watch a game for which they may not be prepared in early afternoon, or, on the West Coast, in the morning.

Thus, the decision was made to follow NBC's Rose Bowl telecast, usually ending at about 7:45 P.M. (ET), with the Orange Bowl. The network had little trouble persuading Miami to cooperate. To start with, NBC enriched the scene with \$300,000 per year, and secondly, the enlarged national exposure had more than a little appeal to a place where a major industry is the removal of dollars from the pants of tourists.

Not unexpectedly, the number of Orange Bowl TV viewers has increased, and the Orange Bowl Committee has made it clear that with the expiration of its contract with NBC at the end of the 1967 game, competitive bids will be invited from all the networks. Unmistakably, the price will go up.

The Orange Bowl has risen to its present affluence from little more than a cluster of coconuts. The first game, part of a meager show called the Palm Festival, was put together during the depths of the depression in a place called Moore Park, whose seats were set up by WPA workers.

The present stadium wasn't built until 1937, a year in which Mississippi State and Duquesne drew a select crowd of 9210. It was found, in the early days in Miami, that football on New Year's afternoon was a poor match for swimming, boating and sunbathing, not to mention the horses. (In shifting to a night game, the Orange Bowl now opposes only the dogs and the jai-alai players.)

Attendance picked up gradually, and the 1948 game between Georgia Tech and Kansas is generally considered the turning point in Orange Bowl history. It attracted 59,578, compared to the previous high of 36,152, and the show has flourished since, though not in the class of Pasadena's Rose Bowl, where crowds go upward of 100,000 and the annual fee from television is now \$750,000.

Unlike the Rose Bowl, whose teams are provided each year by the Big Ten Conference and the Pacific Eight, the Orange Bowl free-lances, which is to say it chooses its schools at random. Ordinarily, it picks as one of its principals the champion of the Big Eight Conference, with which it was allied for many years, but it isn't bound to any group in particular.

There are advantages and shortcomings to the free-lance method. A bowl with no obligations is able to put together a top game if (a) enough independents have finished the season with outstanding records, and (b) if it is able to outbid its free-lancing competitors.

The Sugar Bowl usually nails as one of its teams the champion of the Southeastern Conference, but is tied legally to no league. And the Cotton Bowl, which has a contract with the Southwest Conference, enters into the bidding for a second team every year. The competition among the Orange, Sugar and Cotton Bowls is rough, and it occasionally leads to one or more winding up with a dog game.

The Rose Bowl, which needn't shop for teams, would probably have the best arrangement if it weren't for the "no repeat" rule maintained by the Big Ten. This prohibits a champion from succeeding itself in the Pasadena game. It is possible, in other words, for the Big Ten to send only its second-best team to the Bowl, thus reducing the game in stature and offering more than 33,000,000 viewers a product that isn't entirely first-rate.

Many have besieged the Rose Bowl to revert to its old policy of letting the West Coast champion play a team picked at random, but the counterarguments have been twofold. First, it is pointed out that the Big Ten plays possibly the best football over the long haul, and its departure from the Bowl would be a major loss. And second, it isn't often that a Big Ten champion repeats, although Michigan State won again this year and certainly, with Notre Dame, leads the college pack.

Like all the other bowl groups, the Orange Bowl Committee is a nonprofit organization which pumps its gains back into the promotion, designed to encourage tourism in southern Florida during the holiday period, formerly considered a slack season. The football game, the main event of the Orange Bowl Festival, which runs 23 days, has been supplemented by such other tidbits as a tennis tournament, regatta, parade, fashion show, fireworks pageant, even a stellar event at Tropical Park race course called the Orange Bowl Handicap. This year the Committee proudly proclaims it will have the "Most Elaborate Orange Bowl Festival in History."

You might size this up as a lot of revelry. Why, shucks, Pasadena peters out after a measly two-hour parade and a little old football game.
