• "Televised education becomes each year a more important part of our total national educational achievement." So says Dr. Lawrence E. Mc-Kune in Michigan State University's newly issued 13th "Compendium of Televised Education."

The fat, 488-page volume brings the news that more schools of every type —universities, colleges, high schools, grade schools and teacher-training schools—are using television as a means of presenting courses to their students both on and off campus.

The 39 subjects of higher education taught through TV in 1965 mounted to 45 in the year just ending; and the 318,000 college-caliber enrollments expanded to 431,000. All but 3 percent of these enrollments led to earned college credit—from 892 universities, colleges, seminaries and institutes.


Sociology was the most popular subject, followed in order by English, mathematics, science, physical education, psychology, humanities, Spanish, history and education.

In the high and grade school field, 1965's total of 1223 school systems relying upon some form of TV instruction became 1437 in 1966.

It should come as a comfort for many to learn that while such as *Daniel Boone* and *The Time Tunnel* were twisting the facts of the past, 1,060,751 enrollments in history and social studies were being simultaneously serviced by closed circuit and the television spectrum.

And those who fret about what is to become of our language at the hands of The Beverly Hillbillies, Andy Griffith, Gomer Pyle and The Monkees may find some solace in the news of 1,721,406 TV enrollments in English.

Not to speak of the 2,711,180 television enrollments in science courses, to neutralize some of the spirit of old Salem that may be steadily being engendered by *Jeannie* and *Bewitched*.



IT'S TIME

FOR A CHANGE

This Is the Week of Wholesale Program Switches.

Here's a Preview of What's New

or one network it's "The Second Season"—let's whoop it up for all these great new shows that are even greater than all those great new shows that we whooped it up for in September! For the other networks it's winter changeover time—let's face it, gang, some of those great new shows we introduced in September are clinkers, and we'd better send in the second team!

For the viewer it's a time to take a closer look at those program listings, because 17 of the season's primetime shows either are departing or are shifting to new time periods. And 12 new (or revived) series are moving into the nighttime schedule.

In short, the networks are performing the annual Rites of Wintershaking things up in hopes of improving their shows' ratings. The biggest shakers are the jittery folks at ABC, home of "The Second Season," who are dumping six shows, switching five others into new time slots and bringing on five newcomers, in an attempt to avert a third-place finish in the ratings race. (At the same time, ABC is expanding its early-evening Peter Jennings with the News strip from 15 minutes to 30.) CBS, meanwhile, is making four changes, and NBC two. Most of the shuffling takes place this week.

You might call it "The Second Season of the Hapless Heroes." Of the 12 new entries, four—*Captain Nice*, *Mr. Terrific*, *Rango* and *The Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour*—feature the sort of inept, bumbling comic figures who are today's TV darlings. The hero of a fifth, *The Invaders*, is a more ept type who blunders into all kinds of jams trying to convince people that he really saw a flying saucer land and that its occupants are out to take over the earth. (Of course, you and he know that he is telling the truth.)

Aside from the hapless heroes, the midterm replacements include a new night of movies, a series of spectacles, three daytime game shows that now will be seen in the evening, too, and two returns—*The Avengers*, the British series which enjoyed a good run last year, and that old faithful of television's early glory, *Dragnet*.

The changeover, which was dictated by ratings, is governed by economics. The networks hope that the ratings will be higher. But whether they are or not, in the Second Season, with fewer big names and more low-budget formats, the prices will obviously be lower.

All most viewers really care about, of course, is: Will programs be better? That's a question they'll have to answer themselves. But here's what they'll have to work with. THE WEEKEND: On Saturday, ABC has moved The Dating Game and The Newlywed Game into the hour vacated by Shane. Both are low-budget graduates of daytime TV, dedicated to the proposition that when it's packaged properly, love conquers Flipper and Jackie Gleason (the chief competition on the other networks). Both feature beamish emcees, some mildly doubleentendre questions and answers, and prizes which are grander to suit the new nighttime status. continued

On Sunday, The Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour, which replaces Garry Moore on CBS, bears no resemblance to last season's Smothers Brothers Show, a situation comedy which left brother Tom with an ulcer. This one is a musical-variety hour in which the brothers, inarticulate Tom and prissy Dick, work with the various acts on the bill—"in the tradition of the Jackie Gleason and Red Skelton shows," say the producers hopefully.

MONDAY: Two of the new haplesshero programs, Mr. Terrific and Captain Nice, are almost identical and, to compound the resemblance, play back to back Monday nights on CBS and NBC. Both are spoofs of "Superman." Mr. Terrific, replacing Run, Buddy, Run (another bumbler) on CBS, is the story of an innocuous young man with freckles, played by Steve Strimpell, who becomes allpowerful when he takes a certain mysterious pill. *Captain Nice*, replacing Roger Miller on NBC, is the story of an innocuous young man with glasses, played by William Daniels, who becomes all-powerful when he swallows a certain mysterious potion.

There are differences, though. Mr. Terrific wears a silvery jacket and flaps his arms when he flies. Captain Nice wears a blue cape and does not flap his arms. Captain Nice has a mother, played by Alice Ghostley. Mr. Terrific has John McGiver, the government bigwig who gives him the pills that enable him to Fight Evil. Mr. Terrific has a roommate, played by Dick Gautier (are you remembering all these names?), who is very big with the girls. Captain Nice has a nice friend, played by Ann Prentiss. He is scared to death of her.

The remaining Monday night entry is the perennial To Tell the Truth,



TUESDAY: The Invaders replaces ABC's The Rounders (canceled) and The Pruitts of Southampton (moved to Friday and renamed The Phyllis Diller Show). It stars Roy Thinnes of last season's The Long Hot Summer. He is the aforementioned young man who sees the flying saucer and is unable to convince anyone that the whole world is threatened. The program has much of the cliff-hanger quality of The Fugitive, which is not surprising, since both are produced by Quinn Martin.

WEDNESDAY: Movies are better than ever, especially on television. After the resounding triumph of "The Bridge on the River Kwai," ABC was quick to schedule another movie night, which means that one or another of the networks now has a feature picture on the air every night except Monday. There isn't another "River Kwai" on the ABC Wednesday schedule, but you will be seeing, among others, "Flaming Star" (Elvis Presley), "It's Only Money" (Jerry Lewis), "Murder, Inc." (Stuart Whitman, May Britt), "Sodom and Gomorrah" (Stewart Granger), "Take Her, She's Mine" (James Stewart, Sandra Dee), "Ulysses" (Kirk Douglas), "Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea" (Walter Pidgeon, Joan Fontaine), "Wild in the Country" (Elvis Presley) and, as a three-hour "special" Feb. 8, "Guys and Dolls" (Frank Sinatra, Marlon Brando).

THURSDAY: As previously noted, Dragnet is back, replacing The Hero on NBC—the same network and the same night of the week it reigned supreme for so many years. This time around Sgt. Joe Friday has a new sidekick—an older, tireder type named Bill Gannon, played by **continued**

Harry Morgan, who was Dennis Weaver's side-kick in the short-lived *Kentucky Jones* series, was Pete Porter in *December Bride* and *Pete* and *Gladys*, and was all sorts of people in Richard Boone's repertory series. The programs are still based on actual cases from the files of the Los Angeles Police Department. Only Jack Webb has changed—about 10 years' worth.

Also on Thursday, Jericho comes tumbling out of CBS's lineup, to be supplanted by *Coliseum*, a weekly series of musicals, ice shows, rodeos, circuses, water shows and other varieties of hurly-burly.

FRIDAY: Rango replaces the first half hour of The Milton Berle Show on ABC (Phyllis Diller's show fills the second). It stars Tim Conway, late of McHale's Navy, and details the adventures of that ever-popular TV figure, the hapless hero, in the Old West. Conway is a Texas Ranger called Rango-no one seems quite sure whether that is his first name, last name or nickname. He and a faithful redskin named Pink Cloud (Guy Marks) stumble through frontier adventures which are otherwise played perfectly straight, particularly by the Ranger Captain (Norman Alden), Conway said the new show is not as hokey as McHale's Navy, but as he was saying this, he was being covered from head to foot with flour, and a bale of hay was about to fall on him.

Bringing the Second Season's week to a close is *The Avengers*, going in for 12 O'clock High on ABC. Patrick Macnee is back again as the proper John Steed, and Diana Rigg as the ultramod Mrs. Emma Peel—only now you will be able to see her black boots and black leather coat in color.

So there's "The Second Season." The networks have not said whether there will be a third before the reruns begin in the spring.

It's a dog, It's a fish,

Whatever it is-and now it's Flipper-

Maybe you remember Tony. He was a horse owned by a gentleman named Mix. He was probably the first. The very first crackerjack-smart screen animal—so totally domesticated that if master Tom was trussed up by a band of crooked Eagle Scouts majoring in Advanced Knot-Tying III, that mighty stallion could untie him in less time than it took Alexander to unravel the Gordian knot. Whist! and Ol' Tom was back in the saddle again.

After a while beasts other than horses joined in. Cheetah bonked them nasty white hunters from half the oak trees on RKO's back lot; Rin Tin Tin (Rinty, to those who loved him) regularly used to run what seemed like a dead heat from Catasauqua, Pa., to Rimmy Jims, N.M., in order to alert the cavalry of impending doom. And then, bless her doggy soul, came Lassie. Lassie . . . the name glimmers as the tears used to in the balcony of the Aureola Theater in Okay, Ark., when she finally got back to her little master on the farm. (The boy's lousy, drunken stepfather had shot her in the head, broken all her legs, stuffed her in a harp case and shipped her to Addis Ababa, or something like that.)


Lassie, of course, is still with us, having outlived enough families to populate a Hong Kong slum. But she has competition. She's on TV now, and on TV she's not the only creature capable of dispelling monumental grief, saving lives and generally doing wondrous deeds. There's another. A fish.

Flipper, bless his finny soul, is, in his soggy way, even more redoubtable than Lassie. After all, three-quarters of the earth's area is water. And even though he can't get out and stomp around, he can talk.

(At this juncture it is necessary to acknowledge the consternation of the world's ichthyologists: Lay down your pens, gentlemen; Flipper is indeed a dolphin, and therefore not a fish—after all, who ever heard of a talking fish?)

The ability to talk, of course, gives Flipper a considerable edge over Lassie (but not Cheetah-Cheetah can talk to Tarzan). Like when they rewrite a particular old Lassie episode to fit Flipper's more briny proclivities, the shooting directions don't say: "LASSIE RUNS UP TO THE MOUNT-IE. TRYING TO TELL HIM ABOUT BUD'S GHASTLY PREDICAMENT. BARKS, POINTS, BARKS. SHE RUNS AWAY, BARKS, RUNS BACK. SPINS AROUND LIKE A DRUNKEN DERVISH, BARKS IMPLORINGLY. THE MOUNTIE FINALLY COMPRE-HENDS AND FOLLOWS." In Flipper's case, directions need only say something like: "FLIPPER BOUNDS FROM THE WATER IN FRONT OF THE DOCK AND APPRISES POR-TER OF BUD'S GHASTLY PREDIC-OBEDIENTLY AMENT. PORTER FOLLOWS." A definite advantage.

Now we all know dolphins are smart. They communicate with each other on a very high level. They save

people's lives. They beat up on sharks. They developed radar years before the British (if the British had had radar when dolphins did, William probably would have lost at Hastings).

But Flipper . . . well, he's not only smart, he's a do-gooder. A regular Albert Schweitzer. A soggy, smart Lassie, bless her doggy soul.

Take, for instance, the episode in which a diver gets the bends from surfacing too fast, climbs aboard his boat and instantly starts a fire. He naturally abandons ship after sending for help. But he's got this darling little puppy aboard. Being a resourceful chap, he sets the puppy adrift in an old tub and then goes about getting himself rescued. But everyone forgot the puppy. Except Flipper. (Flipper was, of course, instrumental in getting the fellow rescued in the first place.) The tub is leaking; the dog is getting wet; the diver-now decompressedwants his animal back. Flipper must save the puppy because no one knows where to look. Flipper tries to push the floating tub, which immediately capsizes (well, he's not all that infallible). He hoists the puppy onto a handy life preserver and gets him beached on a handy island 40,000 leagues away. And then goes to apprise Bud of the dog's ghastly predicament. Flipper, in the end, hams it up, as is his wont when he does a good deed, by flopping around, running backward on the water on his posterior member, and loudly "yakking" in a

most irritating fashion.

He saves people, too. People entrapped in a "suffocating underwater coffin" (read "disabled submarine"), people helplessly adrift, people with psychological hang-ups. He deftly averts a familial disaster by making friends with Porter's rich aunt's cat (the poor woman had a deep-seated aversion to wild animals-like she thought they hurt people sometimes). The spinoff of this little bit of phobiasmashing is that the lady will now fork over the money for Porter's two boys' future. This is implied, naturally, but the audience is somehow assured that Flipper has managed to put the lads through Groton and Exeter, Harvard and Yale Law School. Let's see Lassie do that!

Flipper dialog, of course, has a familiar ring to the true aficionado of the valiant-animal genre. "Go for help, boy (girl)." . . . "Here, Flipper (Lassie, Rinty, Cheetah), take this message to Dad (Mountie, Sarge, Jane)." . . . "Something must be wrong! There's Flipper (Lassie, Rinty, Jane) without Bud (Bud, Bud, Tarzan)." . . "I think he's (she's, it's) trying to tell us something."

And *Flipper* action is disturbingly familiar. Take the kid off the crumbling ledge and put him in a sunken sub. The element of danger is academic. Superbeast will save the day.

So it goes on. Flipper is really Lassie in a wet suit; Cheetah is Rinty in drag; and Tony is alive in Argentina. **REVIEW** by Cleveland Amory



Love on a Rooftop

It's a funny business—this business of being funny. Of all the new comedies on your TV screen this year, only two really *are* funny—Grade-A funny, that is. And neither of these, we hasten to point out, is pasteurized—in other words, they're not concerned with hicks, hillbillies or their spinoffspring. Both comedies are, in fact, not only urban but even urbane which, if nothing else, is a high relief from the suburbane.

These two shows are Occasional Wife, which we considered last week, and this one. Both were executively produced by one and the same man— Mr. Harry Ackerman, of I Love Lucy fame. Love on a Rooftop, in contrast to OW, doesn't even have much of a special idea—it's just the story of two newlyweds starting life on a rooftop. And each episode seems to start out with about the smallest thing imaginable. We recall, for example, one plot

that revolved entirely around the delivery, to the rooftop, of a chocolate hen. Early one morning a neighbor, Carol Parker (Barbara Bostock). knowing that David Willis, the young husband (Peter Deuel), likes chocolate, brings him the hen. David, in the absence of his wife Julie (Judy Carne). puts it in the icebox. During the afternoon, however, Julie gives the hen to a neighboring 6-year-old. And hence that night, when David comes home after a hard day at the office and goes to the icebox, he feelswell, henpecked. "Darling, that chocolate hen was my private property. And you had no right . . ." All of which quickly escalates from brush spat to total war. In the end Julie surrenders in the time-honored wifely way-conditionally. "Darling," she says, "I should try a little harder to understand your point of view-no matter how silly it is."

The remarkable thing about this episode was that, starting with practically nothing, it ended up with practically everything. It was a marvelous satire, complete with a fine dream sequence of the maligned husband looking back on his courtship. Along with its fine inventiveness, this show has splendid acting by its principals, Mr. Deuel and Miss Carne; as well as by its featured players, like Herb Voland, who plays Miss Carne's father; and, above all, Rich Little as neighbor Stan Parker.

Another episode revolved around Stan's love for a pigeon. Before it was over, there was everything from the loss of the pigeon to a note from Stan to David ("something that will not cause either side to lose face") to dress-tearing and even apartmentwrecking. This episode was one more good example of the show's ability to start out with something pretty thin and then manage its thickening without ever once—wonder of wonders—getting sickening.

Happy NBC Plans Few Changes

The shakeout next fall at NBC promises to be minimal. Major dropouts probably will be Laredo, The Road West and The Girl from U.N.C.L.E. A fourth hour show, Star Trek, is iffy, as are two half hours, T.H.E. Cat and Hey, Landlord! Reason for so little change in fare, of course, is that NBC is riding high as top-rated network in evening programming and doesn't want to rock the trend.

The late Walt Disney's Sunday night series will continue into 1967-68, NBCers now happily report.

Program chief Mort Werner thinks Danny Thomas's hour of musicals, comedy and drama—"in fact, anything he wants to put in it"—may well be NBC's biggest new attraction next season. "Danny will be totally involved," Werner explained. "He'll do many live-on-tape shows and many on location. His primary role will be that of a storyteller, like the fellow in the play 'Our Town'."

Among other prospective new series: Ironsides, starring Raymond Burr as a San Francisco detective captain who operates from a wheelchair: Everywhere a Chick Chick, with Jerry Van Dyke as the operator of a country playhouse and farm; Maya, the adventures of two boys (Jay North and Sajid Khan) in India: Huck Finn. cartoon-and-live-action dramatization of Mark Twain's classic; The Hardy Boys, an hour based on those yesteryear favorites; Bracken's World, an hour drama of life in Hollywood movie executive suites; and I Love a Mystery, based on the old radio series

and described by Werner as "our sleeper of the year."

Mery Griffin has been outrating Johnny Carson in Pittsburgh, but on Jan. 16 KDKA-TV will pluck Griffin's 90-minute nightly show out of late evening and install it at 4:30-6 P.M., replacing movies. Reason: The oldmovie barrel is running dry and the station, like many another around the country, is hungry for daytime programs. In fact, Griffin's banter-andvariety series, syndicated by Westinghouse, has all but vanished from the late-night arena and is flourishing instead as a daylight diversion. Only in New York, Dallas and San Francisco will Griffin be left to buck NBC's long-entrenched Tonight show. In Miami, Washington and Detroit he is a 9 A.M. attraction. In Los Angeles his show runs in prime time, where it has become a popular hunting ground for Hollywood talent scouts. In most of the rest of 65 localities where Griffin is now seen, his show runs in late afternoon. "Merv," suggested one of his associates, "is sort of a man-for-all-hours"

THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

HOW I SPENT MY SUMMER VACATION (NBC), Saturday AGENT 008¾ (ABC), Sunday THE UGLY AMERICAN (NBC), Tuesday ULYSSES (ABC), Wednesday A SUMMER PLACE (CBS), Thursday PT 109 (CBS), Friday

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

One of the few valid excuses for movie-going via television—and I mean valid in the face of the abysmal fare they're feeding us via network display—is to do a bit of star-watching in private. How else, I ask you, can you get the great big video-scorning luminaries all to yourself in your living room?

This week it's Marlon Brando and Kirk Douglas—but with a bit of a cheat involved. Marlon's all prettied up most of the time, in a mustache and cutaway coat even, and Kirk's chin dimple is lost to us behind a beard. Ah well—grin and bear it; otherwise there's Cliff Robertson making like a young John F. Kennedy —and another of those "World Premiere" manufactured - for - television goodies, again with grand old Jill St. John, this one labeled "How I Spent My Summer Vacation."

"The Ugly American," with Brando as our ambassador to a southeast Asian country, has a number of pertinent and topical, albeit elementary, things to say about cold-war politics and does so with relative maturity; but it evolves, alas, as a black-andwhite melodrama in an exotic and multicolored setting. But Brando, even in a not entirely successful role, is, as always, watchable.

For his fans, Kirk Douglas is toobut even they must have to tolerate a bit much with "Ulysses," the product of seven screenwriters, among them Ben Hecht and Irwin Shaw, and therefore not confusable with the Homeric original, despite the presence of Silvana Mangano as a real dish of a Penelope, tapestry-weaving and all. She's about all that separates Kirk from Steve Reeves and all that Hercules-epic jazz, however.

For stark realism, you can skip "PT 109," which fortunately will have to be sliced down from its original two hours and 20 minutes of tedium to suit the network schedule. Reverence and pomposity have combined to make the truth of Robert Donovan's underwritten book as banal as the comic-book versions of history for slow-reading juveniles: We're left with an adventure movie that will appeal to 10-year-old boys of all ages.

Soap-and-sex addicts can have a ball with "A Summer Place," a twohour-and-10-minute effusion that should be cut in toto for any medium. It's distinguished by muddled morals and a complete absence of subtlety or taste; the preachment is that kiddies can forgive their adulterous parents especially if the parents forgive the kiddies their sexual misdemeanors.

You may, in fact, wind up finding "Agent 00834" the week's best buy, even though it starts like a house afire, then fizzles. One of the early reluctantspy spoofs, it has Dirk Bogarde as a writer innocently entrapped in espionage; Robert Morley as a counteragent and Sylva Koscina as a treat for the girl-watchers. For movie-watchers, the week's pickings are slim.

THE EASY WAY

That's how Melodie (her real name) Johnson became an actress

So you want to be an actress.

Why don't you do it the easy way, like Melodie Johnson, whose only acting experience was a junior-high play, but who is now under contract to Universal City Studios? After one nonspeaking part in a Bob Hope Theater ("I got killed before I had a chance to say anything"), she has had nothing but co-starring roles—in Laredo, Run for Your Life, The Rounders, another Bob Hope drama, and the two-hourmovie-for-TV "Fame Is the Name of the Game."

OK, but how do you go about all this? The first thing to do is have the right name. Melodie Johnson is what one old Hollywood hand refers to as "a real starlet's name." But it just

Melodie's mother, Mrs. Fred Johnson, named her after a character called Melodie Nesbit in a 1942 Andy Hardy picture. *That* Melodie was played by a newcomer named Donna Reed, whose real name is Donna Mullenger, and 1942 was the year before Melodie Johnson was born—conveniently for her career—in Los Angeles. (Donna Mullenger had to come all the way from Iowa.)

After you have been born and named properly, you next must develop an early interest in acting ("I went to my first movie when I was 8. I knew then that I wanted to be an actress. When I got home from the movies, I'd pantomime what I had seen. My parents bought recordings of the musicals, and I would lip-sync to them"). Then, when you get to junior high, you perform in the school play ("I played a sexy movie star in my mother's mink").

Once out of junior high, you don't fool around with acting any more, and when you go to college, you major in English ("Literature opened a whole new world for me, and the professor was very sexy"). You don't stay in any one college very long—a year at Stephens ("One year in Columbia, Mo., was enough"), then to Glendale, near Los Angeles, to UCLA, and finally to the University of Southern California. You don't graduate ("One day I just walked off the SC campus and never went back").

You rent a small apartment in Hollywood and go to acting school, studying under Jeff Corey. But noth-



ing much happens until the Christmas holidays of 1964, when your fiancé, record producer "Bones" Howe, takes you to a cocktail party where you meet an agent named Hal Landers, who sees something in you ("She had —has—something in the eyes—white around the eyes. And she has humor. But the most important thing is that she has star quality"). Landers, without hearing you read or seeing you act, promptly takes you around to the studios. At MGM, you make a screen test, but Universal signs you without a test on St. Patrick's Day, 1965.

Now that you are an actress and hoping some day to be a "big star," you live in a 40-year-old house in the Los Feliz section of Hollywood with your husband "Bones" (you married him the same month Universal signed you). You have a black cat named Othello and a black-and-white cat named Adolf ("We named him after Hitler because he literally came in and took over. He is the most obnoxious cat I've ever met"). For "personal therapy" you do some writing on such subjects as "Paranoia in America" ("Paranoia and mediocrity are neck and neck for No. 1 in this country").

THEY REMEMBER BEN...

from Cusumano's Bakery to Actors Studio

Ben Gazzara, who has been running for his life on television, had better move even faster if he wants to say good-by to the old neighborhood where he was born and reared.

For things are changing rapidly at East 29th Street and Second Avenue, on Manhattan's East Side.

Most of the families he knew, the kids he grew up with, have moved from the ancient brownstone tenements. The streets where he played stickball are almost deserted.

The area has been marked for urban renewal and the demolition crews are gnawing at the edges.

But some familiar places have not yet felt the touch of doom.

Bromberg's Kosher Meat Market still does a lively trade.

Pizzuro's Salumeria (John B. Pizzuro, prop.) still exudes a heavenly aroma of sausages, olive oil, garlic, salami and cheeses; and the same undraped statuary nymph coyly greets you at the door.

Frank Christofolo still operates his fruit stand at the corner.

The Madison Square Boys' Club is alive with boys and noise.

At the Carmelite School, the nuns go quietly about the work of educating yet another generation.

Piled in crisp confusion, the beautifully browned loaves of Italian bread fill the windows of Cusumano's Bakery, where Miss Angela Cusumano smiles in amazed disbelief.

"You ask me—you ask do I remember Ben Gazzara? Well, I just guess I do. We're first cousins. His mother her maiden name was Angela Cusumano—and my father were sister and brother. They lived down the street at 316.

"His father was Antonio. Ben's older brother Anthony was named for him. Mr. Gazzara was a roofer and he died when the boys were young. Very sad.

"Baby pictures of Ben? There's no such thing. How many times my aunt Angela tried to get a baby picture of him! She'd have the photographer come up to the flat, he'd take out his camera, the baby would start bawling. Happened time after time. When the photographer left, he'd stop bawling and start laughing.

"Finally she gave up trying. Now he's a great actor, gets his picture taken all the time.

"Even when he was small, just a boy, I had an idea he'd be an actor. Over at the Boys' Club he was always in plays. And many's the time he played hooky from Carmelite to go see shows."

Imaginative publicity writers have told of Ben Gazzara's triumph in rising above his slum beginnings, from the breeding ground of delinquency that was the Lower East Side.

"Nonsense," says Anthony Gazzara, his older and only brother.

"These were never slums. The old tenements held a good many families, they weren't luxurious, but they were clean. Scrubbed. The people who lived here were good lower-middleclass folks; hard-working, religious and ambitious—mostly for their children, whom they brought up very strictly.

"There was some delinquency; there were a few kids went astray, but that happens in the most favorable environment.

"The prime goal of the parents here was education for the kids and they accomplished it by thrift, work and self-deprivation. From this area came lawyers, doctors, teachers, businessmen—well, take the theater.

"There's Ben. And Patty Duke. Sam Levene. Huntz Hall. Nick Georgiade.

"I get tired of all that 'up from the slums' publicity. Ben was like the other kids around here—played in the streets, swam in the East River, had his share of mischief.

"At the Boys' Club, when he wasn't

in the gym, he was acting in the plays they put on.

"Delinquency! The only sign of delinquency I ever detected in Ben came out as he grew older. He stole my ties, my socks, my shirts—anything that would fit him."

Slim, graying Father Mel Daly of Our Lady of the Scapular of Mt. Carmel Church, remembers Ben Gazzara the altar boy, but he is mildly annoyed at a story that has appeared in Ben's publicity.

"According to the story, Ben and his gang got into the cabinet where the sacramental wine is stored and got, well, 'stoned.'

"Now, I don't doubt that, at one time or another, Ben and the other altar boys—there was no 'gang' that I know of—indulged their curiosity by sampling the wine. Since time immemorial, that seems to be the unwritten prerogative of altar boys.


"But nobody got 'stoned' or anything of the kind. After all, Ben and most of the other boys were from Italian families. There was always wine in the house; certainly it was there on the table at meals. Wine was too familiar to be a temptation.

"Incidentally, I was so pleased when Ben brought his daughter here for baptism several years ago. Here's the baptismal register—'Elizabeth Ann— September 13, 1962. Biagio Anthony Gazzara.'" continued

Directly across East 29th Street from the tenement where the Gazzara family lived is the Madison Square Boys' Club. Its director, Larry Weill, says, "I think Ben spent more time here than he did at home.

"He was a fine boy, nice to have around. Liked to swim in our pool, play basketball in the gym. He was active in everything, but there was no doubt that he liked the Drama Club best. We put on all kinds of shows, even had a professional director, Howard Sinclair.

"The lady at the typewriter here is Mrs. Stephenson and she's about Ben's age. Were you in any productions with Ben, Jeanette?"

"Yes, I was Jeanie Bucci then. I must have been about 12 when Ben asked me to take the part of a mother with two children. I remember I stood with an old shawl draped over my shoulders, my arms around the children, and I had one line. I've never forgotten it: 'Oh, the cold—the cold the bitter cold!'

"Benny coached me. He made me say it over and over and over. Finally I got bored and I told him that it was only one little line and what was so important about saying it just so. I said, 'If you don't let me say it the way I want to, I'll tell Grandpa Sapienza about the chocolate pinks.'

"You see, my grandpa had a candy shop and there was a penny candy called chocolate pinks. Most of them had white centers, but you didn't know that until you bought one and bit into it. It was only when you got a pink center that you won a prize a nickel candy bar.

"Well, Ben—when my grandpa wasn't looking—he'd stick his fingernail into the candies to find the pink centers.

"When I told him that, he laughed and said, 'OK, Jeanie, you say the line any way you want to, just so you don't squeal to your grandpa. But you're missing your chance to become a great actress.'"

Ben was graduated from the nextdoor Carmelite Elementary School and entered Stuyvesant High School on First Avenue at 15th Street.

Stuyvesant dean Dr. William Roeder has difficulty remembering him.

"I remember Anthony Gazarra—his brother, perhaps? A fine student. Let me check the records . . . yes, here it is. Ben Gazzara. Attended two years. I have a good memory, but he escapes me. Tell you a fellow I do remember as a student here. Jimmy Cagney. Now there was an irrepressible young man. The stories I could tell! He left here to become a hoofer in vaudeville.

"But Ben-no, I don't recall him."

He started early

Although it is recorded that Ben Gazzara first won stardom in the Actors Studio production of "End as a Man," television producer Irving Harris dissents.

"I'll tell you where Ben *first* won stardom—in an amateur musical at the Boys' Club when he was 12. Come to think of it, it wasn't amateur. We charged 25 cents admission and blew the proceeds on ice-cream sodas for the company.

"I wrote the musical, which was titled 'It'll Be All Right on the Night,' and even then Ben was great. He immersed himself in the part. At rehearsals some of the other kids would start horsing around, but not him.

"From that time on, in spite of the difference in our ages, I saw a great deal of Ben. I was planning a career as a social worker and spent all my spare time at the Club, where I'd been a member since boyhood.

"Ben appeared in just about every play we put on. "The Tents of the Arabs," 'If I Were King,' 'Seventh Heaven' and, of course, 'A Christmas Carol.' Ben was the most believable Scrooge I've ever seen, before or since. "After he got too old for the Boys' Club, I'd see him, usually late at night, coming down Second Avenue from the midtown drugstore where he worked nights while he was going to CCNY. We'd stop and talk, and it was always about acting and the theater.

"Right after that he won a \$1000 scholarship to the Dramatic Workshop of the New School for Social Research. Later he went over to the Actors Studio. Next thing you know he was starred in 'End as a Man' and the critics sent up skyrockets for him. Said he was the biggest thing since Brando.

"I was looking through some old scripts from the Boys' Club one evening recently and I came across something that made me smile. It was the first line that Ben Gazzara ever spoke on any stage. The line?

"'My mother says if I become an actor, I'll starve!'"

Evening, and time to serve a hot crusty apple-and-cheese pie and cups of hearty full-flavored tea, just as they've done for so many years in England. Prepare the pie early in the day and bake it just before dinner so that it will be hot and buttery. Top wedges of pie with thin slices of sharp cheddar cheese.

ENGLISH APPLE-AND-CHEESE PIE Makes 6 to 8 servings

TO MAKE PASTRY: Sift flour and salt. Put ¹/₄ cup flour into bowl. Add vegetable shortening and water, stir until paste is formed. Add remaining flour and stir until large balls of dough are formed. Knead into one smooth ball on lightly floured board. Roll out ¹/₂ of dough into a round 11 inches in diameter. Use round to line the bottom and sides of ungreased 9inch pie pan.

FOR FILLING: Mix cheese, sugar, salt, flour, nutmeg, lemon rind. Make layers of sliced apples, $\frac{1}{2}$ of cheese mixture, apples, remaining cheese and remaining apples. Roll out remaining pastry as before. Cut a round hole in the center of pastry to allow steam to escape. Use pastry to cover apples and crimp edges together. Brush top of pie with milk, sprinkle with sugar. Bake in preheated moderate oven (375° F.) 40 to 45 minutes or until apples are easily pierced.

HOT TEA

There are three kinds of tea: black, oolong and green. Teas as we purchase them are blends of these three. To properly brew tea, use a teapot of china or heat-resistant glass. Fill a kettle with fresh cold water and heat water until it boils briskly. Put into teapot 1 teaspoon loose tea or 1 tea bag for each serving. Fill teapot with required amount of boiling water. Allow tea to stand and brew for 3 to 5 minutes. If too strong dilute it with hot water. Stir and pour into cups. Serve with granulated or lump sugar. Wedges of lemon or lime, slices of lemon studded with whole cloves or milk can be served with tea. Store tea in tightly covered container so it will not absorb odors. Once tea is brewed it may be cooled and then chilled for iced tea but it should never be reheated.
