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#### as we see it

■ It came as no surprise at all when Britain's House of Commons voted against permitting its sessions to be televised. The members were merely taking advice from their West German counterparts in the Bundestag, who had warned: "Watch Out!"

For some time now important proceedings in the Bundestag have been covered either live by German television or taped for evening news shows.

■ This is fine for viewers, who are given an insight into their Government that is denied viewers in, say, the United States. But Bundestag members are not at all enthusiastic about the big eye that watches them.

The London Times reported that members of the Bundestag found party managers arranging the list of speakers "so that only the most photogenic and effective members spoke during the televised periods. Other backbenchers were shut out."

Public reaction to Bundestag telecasts, said the Times, came in the form of questions. ". . . The public asked why salaries should be paid to M.P.s when the camera showed so many deserted seats, M.P.s reading books or newspapers during the debate, M.P.s apparently asleep ('they are not') and M.P.s having private group discussions, ignoring the speech in progress."

"It is doubtful," one German M.P. was quoted as saying, "whether the advantages of television to an M.P. outweigh the disadvantages."

■ The same doubt would apply to the televising of our Congress—whether the advantages to congressmen would outweigh the disadvantages.

But we're really not concerned with what's good for congressmen or senators. We think the advantages to the public of televising important Congressional proceedings would outweigh the disadvantages.

#### WHO WOULD HAVE BELIEVED IT OF THE OLD GIRL?

Emmy at 62 may have a few stiff joints, but read about the day she ran 55 miles

When you're 62 years old and haven't kept up with the times, it's an unexpected pleasure to be cheered by a million people. It did happen, though, to Emmy, and this is the story of that day.

Emmy is a 1904 Reo automobile, a two-seater with a pop-up mother-in-law seat in back, yellow in color, with a one-cylinder, 7½ horsepower engine under the floorboards. The normal rhythm is pop-pop-pop-bang, pop-pop-pop-bang.

On the occasion of the 70th Anniversary of the Emancipation of the Automobile, Emmy was brought out of retirement to enter the famous London-Brighton run, that wonderfully, perfectly British affair in which 250 veteran cars attempt to make it from the Serpentine Lake in Hyde Park to the waterfront in Brighton 55 miles away by 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

A veteran car, by definition, cannot have been manufactured any later than 1904, making Emmy one of the real late-model jobs. And the Emancipation of the Automobile? That was the day in 1896 when it was no longer the law in England for a car to be preceded by a man carrying a red flag.

To drive Emmy, the American Broadcasting Company engaged the former world Grand Prix motor-racing champion, Phil Hill, only American to win that honor. The writer [ABC sports commentator] was to be navigator.

The entire run was filmed for presentation on the network's Wide World of Sports program next month.

The team manager, riding in a tender car, was Jim Leake, a wealthy Oklahoma television station owner and collector of veteran and vintage cars. He owns 18 Rolls-Royces. He also owns Emmy.

Chief engineer was Cdr. E. D. Woolley, G.M. D.L.C., a dead ringer for his namesake, the late actor Monty Woolley. Commander Woolley prepared the car for the run and also rode in the tender to care for emergencies. "But

it's really all up to the driver now," he said.

There was also Leonard Potter. An Englishman, Leonard is distinguished by a small mustache, extremely thick glasses, thinning hair and the chainsmoking of tiny, thin cigars, which he keeps lighted until they are about one-sixteenth of an inch long. For the day of the run, he wore a World War I leather flying helmet.

Mr. Potter had tended to all of the prerace arrangements. Now most of his work was done. As he put it, "Well, there's nothing else I can do. I'm going on ahead to arrange for the

drinks."

This was Scuderia ABC, the racing team.

The morning of the race dawned clear—a good omen, since Emmy has no roof and no windshield. Our start-

ing position was No. 235 at 8:50 A.M.

Fifty-thousand people were gathered at the Serpentine in Hyde Park, examining the cars and their drivers. It was quite a sight. There were Benzes and Daimlers, Cadillacs and Fords, Mercedes and Darracqs and Stars. There were Wolseleys and Quadrants, a Milwaukee Steamer, a Pick and a basket fore-car; De Dietrichs, De Dions, Decauvilles. Stanley Steamers were there. So was a Royal Enfield Quadricycle, a Beeston Tricycle, a Century Tandem. And a yellow Reo.

To understand what happened that day, you must also understand a little about Phil Hill. He is an intensely, visibly emotional man, quick to anger, slow to smile. When laughter comes, it is explosive, throwing-the-head-back laughter. He is a loner, a bachelor in his late 30's who

lives in the solitude of his Santa Monica, Cal., home with a butler and his collections of vintage cars, player

pianos and music boxes.

On the Sunday before the London-Brighton run he had been driving at Riverside, Cal., in the ultramodern Chaparral, an automatic-transmission racing car with a strange wing mounted above the back for stability. It

goes over 200 mph.

The speed of the Reo is a top of about 20. But I knew how Phil would be. He was as intense, as edgy, as irritable just before we fired up Emmy as he had been at Riverside. He was a race driver eager to get going; a race driver, to be sure, in period costume—Inverness cape-coat and all—climbing into an untested 1904 Reo; but a race driver with one object in mind, to get to Brighton before 4 o'clock.

At 8:45 Jim Leake swung the crank. She started. The first major obstacle had been conquered.

We moved up into position, officials waving us toward the start line, spectators shouting encouragement. "The engine sounds very strange," Phil said. "Very, very strange."

#### And they're off

Then the starter waved the Union Jack and there was no turning back.

Off we went, making about 10 miles an hour and immediately I realized that without a windshield in front of you, even 10 feels very fast. The car felt fine to me, as we putted out of Hyde Park, headed for Westminster Bridge. "It's going to stop," Phil said, waving one arm in the air. "Can't you feel it, for heaven's sake? It sounds all wrong."

Never argue with a race driver. A hundred yards short of Westminster Bridge the Reo stopped without warning. She couldn't have stopped in a more embarrassing place. She had

shown her fragility in a setting of utter, awesome stability. A few hundred feet to the right stood the mass of Westminster Abbey. One felt that inside, the shade of George III was smiling under his marble slab. He knew that colony would never make it alone.

Just ahead, Big Ben in his tower loomed over the helpless Americans and their American automobile.

Something had happened to our tender car: Jim Leake and Commander Woolley were nowhere in sight. But this time the British came to our help.

Several people ran out from the

curb, volunteering to push.

Our camera helicopter hovered overhead recording the scene, and at that moment, Big Ben struck 9.

As the bell tolled the fifth time, the engine caught. We were running.

Down the other side of the bridge we went, leaving the Thames behind, on into Lambeth. In a half mile, we stopped again. A continuous stream of words came from Phil Hill, cursing the car and the engine, ordering me out so he could pull up the seat and the floorboards and see what was wrong. "She's flooding but I don't know why," he shouted.

"Reach under the floorboards and put your finger on the spark plug," Phil said. I did. "Well, that's it, then, the spark plug isn't working."

"What," I asked, "would have happened to my finger if it was working?"

"You would have gotten a shock," he said.

As we stopped, I pulled out the tool box, looking for a spare spark plug. It contained a jumble of ancient hammers and screwdrivers and odd-looking tools. Sure enough, though, there was a brand-new spark plug.

We unscrewed the old one. The new one didn't fit. All seemed lost.

TV producer Lou Volpicelli was there. "Phil," he said, "we must get to Brighton. It's been almost an hour and we've only gone two continued

miles. We have 53 to go. Will you let us tow you for a few miles with the camera car?"

Hill exploded.

"No, I will not let you tow us. I came here to drive from London to Brighton and that's what I'm going to do or die in the attempt!"

Lou retreated.

A cameraman appeared with a piece of sandpaper, which Hill used to clean off the old, sooty, spark plug. It worked. In a mile or so, when the carburetor started to flood again, Phil told me to reach under the floorboards and turn off the gas supply by means of a one-inch-long lever. When I did, the engine improved right away, but only until the cylinder began to starve for fuel. "Turn it back on!"

For the rest of the day, I was to sit in a hunched-forward position turning that little lever on or off every half mile or so.

About then, real disaster struck. As Phil tried to shift from low to high—there are only two gears on the car—something snapped.

"We've had it," he said. "That damn weld has given way." He referred to a part in the high-gear mechanism that had been repaired the night before.

We found he was right when we lifted up the seat this time. There was no solution except another welding job.

Suddenly, in the moment of greatest need, our tender car appeared. Jim Leake and Commander Woolley ran up, explaining that they had been caught in a bad traffic jam.

Woolley had a possible solution. He knew a garage a few miles ahead that might undertake the welding job. He would drive with the part and we should try to catch up in first gear.

A half-hour later, shaking and coughing along in low, the little yellow Reo was flagged down by Mrs. Woolley, standing in the middle of the road, waving us into a gas station. "It's

almost fixed," she shouted happily. "Everything's going to be lovely."

The next several miles were sheer pleasure. After some balkiness at first, the gear selector began to slide smoothly into high each time. I was getting to be an expert, albeit a weary one, at turning that little fuel control thing on and off. Phil was enjoying himself now.

"Feel that wind," he said. "We must be doing almost 25."

The race driver in him began to surface again. He looked forward at our camera car, which was running in front of us, recording our progress from a camera braced on the tailgate.

"They're going too slow," he said.

"Let's pass them."

"Pass them?" I said. "Phil, we can't pass our camera car. That's what we're here for!"

"Not me," he said. "I'm here to drive to Brighton, Let's go!"

He squeezed the bulb of the old horn. It sounded like a duck call, but the camera car got the message when I waved at them frantically. They speeded up.

Now it was time for our scheduled stop at the Chequers Tavern for rest and refreshment. From here on, there was just one major hazard more, the infamous Pyecombe Hill, just five miles from the finish.

At the tavern, everything was as merry as a Charles Dickens Christmas party. The mugs of bitter were drained, and the odyssey resumed.

#### Merrily they rolled along

Merrily we rolled along, Phil and Emmy and I, on a turnpike now, or dual carriageway as the British call it. The engine was in fine shape as long as we continued the on-off business with the fuel control. We breezed alongside Gatwick Airport, which is the London version of New York's La Guardia field. Just as we were about to go underneath the modern terminal building (it's built on pilings across

the turnpike), the top of one of our lanterns flew off. Parts for 1904 Reos are not easy to come by, so we stopped and I ran back about a quarter of a mile to retrieve it.

Pyecombe Hill, the bugaboo of many of the cars in the race, was no match for our valiant little Emmy. She took most of it in high, then conquered the summit with a powerful few growls in low. No sooner were we over the hill, though, than something popped and our water supply started cascading over the roadway. Again, it was Commander Woolley and Jim Leake to the rescue. The commander quickly saw that the ancient water hose had simply come off. He put it back together with a string, securing it with a double bow.

#### Brighton only five miles away

With that fixed, it figured to be a breeze, all downhill into Brighton, only five miles away.

But the road to Brighton suddenly became one huge traffic jam, bumper to bumper and stopped, as far ahead as the eye could see. Phil Hill pulled the car out onto the right-hand side of the road, smack in the path of oncoming traffic. The old cars were allowed to do that, but the traffic coming at us was particularly heavy and fast right now. I began to wave them over, but he stopped me. "I'll handle this," he said, and began to make Emmy stagger down the road, as if out of control. "That'll get them over," he said. It sure did.

Three-thirty now and no time to spare, as we entered the town of Brighton. The traffic got heavier and heavier, and finally stopped us completely at a complex intersection with a traffic light. The light seemed endless as the minutes fled by; 20 to 4—and 4 o'clock, remember, was the deadline. Arrive after 4 and you have lost the day.

The traffic moved, ever so slowly, but we had just two blocks to go.

One block now, and then, ahead, there was the sea!

Two hundred yards to the finish line, and what a crowd. One-hundred thousand Englishmen stood along the beach and the waterfront, others craned their necks from the high road that overlooks the sea.

Ten minutes to 4, and we had it made.

Then the car stopped.

It just stopped, without a warning, without a groan or a complaint, without any apparent rhyme or reason. Floorboards and seat were thrown out again. Hill and the Commander tried everything. The crowd cheered and shouted encouragement.

"It's no use, she just won't go!"
"We're going to get this thing across
the line," I said. I was beginning to
sound like Phil Hill.


The former champion of the world leaped back into the driver's seat as I began to push. The car moved, ever so slowly at first, then more smoothly. If my wind lasted, I saw we could make it.

On either side of the car, the huge crowd formed solid walls, swaying and shouting. "Come on Yanks, you can do it." "Good on ya, lads!"


And behind the recognizable words, a roar that obliterated the sound of the sea breaking on the beach, a friendly roar that surrounded us like a coat, a roar that grew and grew as each laborious yard of pavement fell behind us.

At four minutes to 4, we rolled under the finish-line banner. We made the London-Brighton run at an average speed of 7.86 miles per hour.

And there sat little Emmy, smoking a bit, with the right front fender dangling from a piece of wire, but with mother-in-law seat sitting erect, yellow paint unscratched and the tiny pennant they gave us at the finish waving proudly from her hood. "London to Brighton, 1966," it read. "Seventieth Anniversary of the Emancipation of the Automobile."



#### CANTANKEROUS CHARLIE BICKFORD



or against everyone and everything in Hollywood

Feisty, fire-eating old Charlie ("Get yourself another boy!") Bickford! Ancient foe of sham and sycophantry, self-avowed enemy of the movie establishment, dog lover, Democrat hater, businessman, author, actor, man of mystery, and now at 76 the newly installed star of the immensely popular Virginian! Stubborn, they called him. Obstinate! Arrogant! Bombastic! Cantankerous! Egotistical! IM-possible!

Charlie was all of those and more. And he gloried in it. Having once made his bed of nails, he lay in it. Honest to the core, that was Charlie! But he always blew the main chance.

Charlie blew some lulus. In 1930 the late Louis B. Mayer, who ruled supreme in the town, had him pen-

ciled in as the next big star of MGM. Just a year or so earlier Charlie, a movie tyro, had been cast opposite Garbo in "Anna Christie." Now he was the hottest new leading man in town. That wasn't good enough for Charlie. He had objected when Garbo, a tremendous star, got the choice footage. He objected to "the garbage" he had since been forced to play in. When summoned into Mayer's office and told to behave, he called the most powerful man in movies a "posturing ignoramus" and a "venomous little junk peddler."

So Clark Gable became the "next big star" of MGM and Charlie did not work for almost two years. When he did, it was for a forbearing C. B. De Mille. It was De Mille who had originally persuaded Charlie to give up the Broadway stage to appear in the first De Mille talkie, "Dynamite." The tenor of their relationship was set at the first script meeting, where Charlie found himself forced, out of "honesty," to tell the great C. B. that his dialog "stunk." The famed director was so surprised that anyone should dare cross him that the two men became what for Charlie must pass for fast friends.

Charlie had no use for Hollywood and was not the type to hide his contempt under a bushel. He liked those fast automobiles, and drove them like a madman; but he hated those "silly" Hollywood parties, the press people who tried to pry into his private life ("They're a breed," Charlie would say loftily), the senseless hoopla, and especially what he considered the delusions of his fellow actors. In 1930 he described them for an interviewer: "Surrounded by sycophants, yessed to death, invited everywhere, besieged by autograph hounds, getting thousands of letters-no wonder they think they're big shots. If I ever get that way, I hope somebody shoots me."

Soon the word began to spread—word which was to plague him for years to come. Charlie was mulish. Charlie was temperamental. Worst of all, Charlie spoke the truth. De Mille may have forgiven him, but no one else did. Charlie languished for 10 long years on the movie's Poverty Row. "The No Man" had become the "King of the B-Killers" in pictures that must have grated on his irascible soul. Still he was too stubborn to go back to Broadway.

Ever since he fought his first fight in the schoolyard of his native Cambridge, Mass., when some punk kid took a look at those long golden-red curls on which Mother insisted and figured him for a mamma's boy. Pow! Ever since the days when they couldn't keep him in school. "I'd see an open window and I'd be gone." They

couldn't keep him in MIT either, where he started out not once but twice to study engineering. He rousted about, lumberjacking, hoboing, shipping on as a common seaman, hustling freight docks, selling phony real estate, harvesting wheat and sopping up the redeye with the same zest that led him years later in Chicago to spar with heavyweight champion James J. Corbett.

In San Francisco in 1911 he landed in burlesque after confiding to his prospective employer that he had always considered actors "kind of precious." But Charlie had had a fatal sniff of ham and he ended up a few years later in the John Craig stock company in Boston.

#### A dim view

The theater, let alone burlesque, was something of which Charlie's Yankee Puritan forebears—and hence Charlie—took a dim view. When he battled his father, a coffee importer capable of towering rages, over the propriety of "going on the stage," he was also battling himself. Along the way he battled most everyone else.

He tangled gratuitously with Broadway figures who had the power to make him a star. As an unknown he did not hesitate to tell Al Woods, the cigar-smoking producer who called everybody "Sweetheart," what he could do with the play Woods wanted him to star in.

When in 1925 his big break finally did come—Oklahoma Red in Maxwell Anderson's "Outside Looking In"—Charlie almost blew that too. Oklahoma Red was a composite of all the tough yeggmen that Jim Tully, the author of the original book, had ever known, and Charlie wanted realism. When the director did not agree, Charlie concocted an elaborately perverse plot to come on opening night playing it his way. Luckily for him, he and "his way" were a smash. continued

Charlie's charm was that he always said-and still says-that if he had it all to do over again, he wouldn't change a word. Charlie wrote a book of memoirs in 1965. In the book. "Bulls, Balls, Bicycles & Actors," he gives himself the worst of it-with De Mille, Mayer, newspaper publisher William Randolph Hearst-all under the guise of seeking his own special truth. He dedicates it to his "best friends"-four Pulaski poodles and a springer spaniel, explaining, "I like dogs better than people." People who love him (but do not know him, because no one really knows Charlie) suspect this is an elaborate put-on. The fascination is that no one can be entirely sure.

He has deliciously perverse opinions about everything. He is for a strong Civil Rights movement but thinks Martin Luther King is "a phony." He admires the Beatles for their business acumen, but by his rigid personal code "they are insane." Of Jim Drury, his co-star, he says, "We have the same political ideas, which helps." Of Lana Turner, Rita Hayworth and Marilyn Monroe, "Hayworth was the least distasteful." Liz Taylor, the reigning queen, he finds "adequate."

Charlie always said he put women on a pedestal, even "common" women. But there is precious little mention of them in his book. None at all of his wife, Beatrice Loring, the Philadelphia girl whom he married in Boston in 1919; nor of his daughter Doris, born in 1920, who married an Air Force colonel; nor of his son Rex, born in 1925. In looking back through 35 years of clips, there is not a single instance of Charlie directly acknowledging that he had a family at all.

The very mention of them still causes the now-white frizz to bristle, the cheek to flush, a thunderous silence to descend over the conversation. Charlie will admit.

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however, that his life has been "touched with tragedy." Ordinarily knowledgeable oldtimers, fellow actors, business acquaintances either don't know or aren't telling. When the subject of home comes up, Charlie says wistfully, "Can't you just say I don't have a home?"

Home is a comfortable Spanish-style house near the beach in Playa del Rev. where he has lived for 36 years. Visitors find a scowlingly convivial Charlie playing host as intensely as he does everything else. They also find five dogs, three Cadillacs (Charlie buys three new ones every year), a living room full of Bickford landscapes (Charlie took up painting in 1948), and a pleasant woman named Mike whom Charlie has known well for more than 20 years. There are no memorabilia, personal or professional, because, says Charlie, "It makes me ill." But his food and his liquor are the best, and the company the same, as long as it doesn't take liberties. "You go so far with Charlie," explains one regular visitor, "no farther." Another says: "He's tough. He's a fighter. He's in a class by himself."

How does such a man reconcile himself to what once he most certainly would not have hesitated to call "garbage": series TV? Well, sir, Charlie has developed a marvelous rationale about that. He resisted TV for

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years, shucking off series offers like dirty shirts. One of the offers he shucked: to play Ben Cartwright in Bonanza. (He didn't like the script.) Then he decided that, unlike the movies or stage, TV was not an art form at all but a business, and if there's anything Charlie admires it's business. It removes the terrible compulsion to satisfy the soul.

"Besides, TV plays my way or I don't play," says Charlie. "I don't do anything I don't want to do. It gives me what I want or I forget TV. I've got what I want in *The Virginian*. But it wouldn't hurt my feelings if TV sank into the ocean tomorrow."

Charlie could afford it. No matter how bad things were in the old days, he pumped his money into ranch and beach property, while gradually acquiring businesses—a garage, a delivery service, an appliance store, a gold-mining process, a hay-and-grain operation, etc.—until he was able to say, "I doubt if as an engineer I could have put together a couple of million. I've done all right."

#### Mellowed? Who says?

Old Charlie now gets along so nicely that some people say he has mellowed. "Mellowed, hell!" roars Charlie. "I still tell everybody to go to hell on the slightest provocation." His executive producer, Frank Price, describes him as "an absolute delight" while adding modestly that "a lot of it has to do with handling." Jim Drury, a stormy type himself, gets along amazingly well with the Granddaddy of Them All. "Us fire-eaters," says Drury, "understand each other."

Charlie likes to recall what his friend De Mille—the same one whose dialog "stunk"—used to say about him. "When they carry you to the grave, Charlie, you'll be kicking, yelling and screaming, "The Theater's better!" And he will, too. That's how Charlie wants to take his leave, yelling his head off and very much himself.

#### **First Global Telecast Planned**

European broadcasters, spearheaded by a British Broadcasting Corporation programmer named Aubrey Singer, are doggedly pursuing an ambitious idea: to bring off the world's first globe-circling telecast next June 25. The Russians, never before two-way participants in an international TV exchange, have promised to contribute their own satellite as a link between Vladivostok and Moscow. The hitch at the moment is that the three U.S. commercial networks, piqued that somebody else is running the show, are playing hard to get. Singer came at them, CBS News president Richard S. Salant beefed, with "grandiose" talk but few details, and a price tag on U.S. participation of \$750,000.

Singer, seeing his dream child in jeopardy, has now pitched the U.S. role to National Educational Television. John F. White, NET president, is eager for the plum but short on funds. He has suggested to Singer that if Canadian broadcasters can handle the satellite pickups, NET might manage a linkup of its 110-odd noncommercial stations, as well as originate up to half a dozen live U.S. pickups.

The telecast, which Singer and the European broadcasting unioners hope will reach in and out of very continent on the globe, is booked for the Sunday closest to the year's longest day to provide maximum daylight for far-flung live pickups. One hoped for stunt: a split-screen picture of the sun rising in one part of the world, setting in another.

The TV networks one day soon may

be able to give foundering shows an even faster heave-ho than Tammy Grimes got. Long dreamed of by the industry, an "instantaneous" continuous monitoring of a cross section of U.S. TV homes is being readied by the A. C. Nielsen Co., whose ratings are gospel. "Overnight" national Nielsens, derived by wiring 1200-or-so sample households into a central panel in Chicago and computerizing the findings, will be a reality by the fall of next year if Nielsen's clients—networks, agencies, advertisers—kick in more money.

The chances seem likely they will. It's not just that waiting several weeks for those ratings is agony; millions of dollars are at stake. "Our clients," A. C. Nielsen Jr. points out, "with this service could find out quicker which programs are not going over with the public and, by replacing them, could build bigger audiences." For TV's nervous programmers, that's a hard pitch to resist.

TV audiences in cities with educational stations will begin next October getting a prime-time preview on Sunday nights of what the Ford Foundation has in mind as an effective "second service" to commercial TV's diversions. A live, Nation-wide newsmagazine-of-the-air, at least two hours in length, is being shaped up, with Columbia's famed school of journalism in New York as editorial hub and 19 other universities also contributing brainpower. The kitty for it all: a \$10 million Ford grant.

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

It's another star-watcher's week with the network movies offering someone and something for everyone, including a couple of pure pleasures and mild startlements.

We start off with pure pleasure, unadulterated delight for those of us whose fairy-tale princess of the Fifties was Audrey Hepburn and who'd more than settle for William Holden and/or Humphrey Bogart as the Prince Charming of any decade. The three stars are aglow in "Sabrina," a slick, charming, utterly frivolous rags-to-riches romance with Miss Hepburn as the lowly chauffeur's daughter and Messrs. Holden and Bogart as the fraternal lords of the manor. Billy Wilder has directed and co-authored this Cinderella story with sparkle and wit and given us one of those strawberry-shortcake delights.

The prime delight of "The V.I.P.'s" is, of course, Margaret Rutherford, the grand old lady of British comedy who won her Oscar for her role as one of a number of stranded travelers in a standard Grand Hotel situation in London's fogged-up airport. Its second pleasure is Maggie Smith, playing a super-devoted secretary and managing even to steal a scene from Richard Burton. He, Elizabeth Taylor, F.ca Taylor and others are for looking at. particularly by the ladies wno like glamorous reassurances that the rich and the beautiful have just-folks problems and that soap suds subside in happy endings.

After the delights come the startlements. "Flaming Star" is Elvis Presley playing it straight as a discriminated-against half-breed and proving that he can be as dead-pan as the next full-blooded Indian in an unpretentious tale of bloody strife between settlers and redskins in Texas in the 1880's. "The Delicate Delinquent" is Jerry Lewis taking a turn for the serious as a timorous oaf mistaken for a no-good punk and reformed by a do-gooding cop, all to the tune of sub-standard (i.e., Jerry-Lewis-standard) gags and mawkish storyline.

The storyline is the nemesis of "The Lion," which at most offers some beautiful wildlife and scenic shots of Kenya and the idea of a little girl living on the great game preserve as a pal to the beasts, chief among them a huge and slightly soporific lion. When the grown-ups get into the action, however, nonsense runs rampant and no-body can blame Trevor Howard for taking to the woods at finale time.

The temptation to follow suit comes early in "My Geisha," the kind of labored film farce that movie critics like to put down as being strictly on 'elevision situation-comedy level. Mavoe via television, complete with snappy commercials and half-a-mind's attention, this tepid tale of American actress Shirley MacLaine masquerading as a geisha to snag the lead in husband Yves Montand's film won't seem quite so turgid. But keep in mind the "maybe."

# Goes on a Second Honeymoon

And to Followers of 'The Jackie Gleason Show,'

It's Even More Successful Than the First

It is not the usual case of comedian's melancholy that Art Carney suffers from. It's worse—probably it is much worse. Comedians go into melancholy because somebody thinks that Chaplin's walk, Skelton's giggle, Berle's leers or Gleason's "pows" are infinitely to be preferred to their own. Carney has never worried about such

stuff. He couldn't. He never expected to be king of the mountain or reigning first comic of the world.

Carney emits no higher praise of himself than a somewhat tepid, "I'm not a stooge any more. I used to be."

He feels affection for Jackie Gleason because Gleason lifted him out of stoogedom. And he's unusually grateful to Gleason in this particular year because together they have performed a resurrection, almost as rare on television as it is in a graveyard. They brought "The Honeymooners" out of the boneyard and, in a season of alling comedies, prompted some reviewers to greet them as the greatest comedy team of their time.

How could Carney be unhappy in a year like that with reviews like that?

Show business, for those who are to be happiest in it, requires a certain blood lust. It takes a fighter. Jane Kean, who plays Carney's wife, Mrs. Ed Norton—Trixie—on The Jackie Gleason Show, says, "If he has to fight, Art won't do it. He will never, never fight."

A lonely man having a lonely year, Carney describes the past year and a half as the blackest period of his life—the worst since he left Mount Vernon, N.Y., at the age of 18 to become a stand-up comic and impersonator with bandleader Horace Heidt. Carney, a hard drinker and a night rambler when he gets dejected enough, glows under the praise that has been coming his way. But he doesn't entirely trust it. He suffers with the aches of the past. He looks forward distrustfully to the future.

"I'd like this show to last another year," he says. "I have my doubts."

His distaste for acting as a man of combat may have had something to do with the fit of blackness that threw him into the hospital at Hartford, Conn.

Carney went into the hospital— "in rotten mental and physical shape," as he describes it—straight from the stage of a great Broadway hit, "The Odd Couple." Against his own instincts, he was in a state of near-combat with masterful character actor Walter Matthau, the other half of "the odd couple" and an actor so gifted he has just pulled off the coup of stealing a movie, "The Fortune Cookie," from Jack Lemmon.

Carney found Matthau so irritating he will talk about him only off the record. Others say stage business and lines kept changing during the long run of the play and Carney found himself in the position of duel or die. Whatever Matthau meant to it all, Carney crashed into the Hartford hospital for three-and-a-half months and later went back for another month because, he said, he needed it.

There was more than just backstage wrangling; there was the loss of his wife. Jean Carney obtained a Mexican divorce a few months back after a marriage that had lasted for 26 years.

"I don't like the word 'breakdown,'"
Carney says. "It could be called exhaustion. I just had to get out of
the show and get some rest."

In 30 years—Carney's 48 now—a man, especially a comedian, has time for a lot of black periods. On the evidence, Carney stacks up as a rather placid man through most of the standard kinds of personal dilemma. He took a shrapnel wound in the leg during World War II and was nine months in bed but managed to be placid even about that. "Being in bed so many months, it's amazing how you get used to it and settle down."

Probably he was quite correct in his own estimate that he "lacked that terrific drive to get to the top," but whirled upward through acting gifts—acting gifts that provide him with a thousand faces and the ability to seem goofy or brilliant as the occasion demands. He has been mistaken for dumb off-stage. He has been mistaken for lackluster.

"If you're an introvert," he says, "I think you suffer for it."

And the word "intro- continued

vert," as a case description of Art Carney, drops from his own lips and others' with a steady thud-thudthud. Approaching his 50's and not trying to hide it (his hair is deeply gray at the temples), he comes closer to handsome than his television audience supposes. A woman, watching him putter at a piano during a rehearsal break, thinks he looks "amiable but ordinary." It's only in the secret centers of the night that Art Carney, a more delicate sensibility than his rugged frame implies, becomes that other Carney, the man who "might raise hell" till morning.

When he was a young boy in Mount Vernon, N.Y., youngest of six brothers, his father, a former newspaperman and fairly unprosperous practitioner of public relations, would mix into civic affairs. "We called him

Her hint to gain a peaches-and-cream loveliness is to damp a cloth with cold water from your refrigerator and press it over your face for a few minutes once or twice a day. Then to hold the good of the complexion beautifying cold water smooth on a little tropical oil of Olay. This oil is rather scarce and expensive but your drug store should be able to get you a small supply.

Art's oldest brother Jack, dead now but producer and director of Arthur Godfrey's Talent Scouts while alive, started Art toward fame by taking him to the audition with Heidt. The 18-year-old Carney's only official credentials: He had been named "wittiest boy in class." Carney's impersonations impressed Heidt ("It was a pretty poor act but Horace liked it").

After four years with Heidt, Carney became a radio actor, achieved his first real fame with Jackie Gleason in the early Fifties, coming out of stoogedom with the part of Ed Norton in The Honeymooners. The part has shown such wearability that he is now the musical Ed Norton, singing sewer worker and world traveler. His own Art Carney Show was shortlived compared to the Gleason Show.

"Gleason is the natural," he says. "Gleason has"—Carney searches about for the phrase he wants—"inborn leadership qualities that I lack."

It may be noted that he is specifically citing Gleason's superiority to himself as businessman, as ramrod. In the pecking-order vocabulary of show business, two comedians on a show inevitably invite classification into "second banana" and "top banana." This has largely dropped away where Gleason and Carney are concerned. Partly because Gleason, who says he has "never had a cross word with Carney," uses the ramrod's prerogative to praise to the skies his most valuable employee. Competitive with Carney? "Gleason doesn't think that way," says producer Ronnie Wavne.

The defensiveness crops out elsewhere. Gleason director Frank Bunetta challenged a suggestion that Carney seems to be getting an absolutely even shake with Gleason in the "Honeymooner" scripts. "There's no such thing as 'even,'" said Bunetta. "'Even' is much more than lines, and Jackie is not even. Just one look from Jackie is 82 pages from some-

body else." Yet Bunetta, too, feels the two spur each other. "I don't know who's positive and who's negative," he said, "but they're electricity."

In the hospital at Hartford, while recuperating, Carney says his main thought was, "When I get out of here, what's gonna happen? After this, then what? You're afraid of the lulls."

# On leave from the hospital

A needless worry. While still in the hospital—just taking "a little leave"—Carney went to Miami Beach and joined Gleason in what was supposed to be a one-shot musical revival of "The Honeymooners." It became the one-shot heard round the networks. Gleason signed Art for 20 appearances.

Sitting in his handsome office, a deeply tanned Jackie Gleason dismisses as nonsense the notion that Carney has interrupted a serious career as an actor to repeat a triumph he's already had. "If you've got something," says Gleason, "don't go run-

ning off to find it."

They tried to fix it up for Carney to live like Gleason when he returned to the show this fall. He was given a set of golf clubs, settled into an apartment on the Miami golf course where Gleason has his home and headquarters. All very splendid, but Carney couldn't stand it. He fled to an oceanfront apartment amid the lights and noise of Miami Beach.


"I was going stir crazy," he said.
"It was just too lonesome at night."

Carney nosed the big Cadillac the company had lent to him (he later bought it) around Gleason's \$28,000 Mercedes-Benz.

"When you're solo, you know—" he mused. Carney let the sentence hang there, unfinished.





# HAPPY TO BE MISERABLE

A young man named Dom De Luse, who is being billed as one of "the new comedians," is going to star in a special of his own this week, "The Barrump-Bump Show," on NBC. TV critics who are wise in these matters call him a "creative comedian," and some go so far as to predict that he will gradually evolve into a "great comedian."

He well may.

Dom is a balding, shapeless fellow, with sad, imploring little eyes and a formless pudding face. A Midwestern reporter says: "You'd take him for a philosophical bus driver, or an overage seminarian." A New York observer says: "He looks like a sorrowful mat-

zoh ball in human shape."

He is a member in good standing of that Secret Society of Human Misery to which all comics belong. He's only 32, but he already looks slightly crumpled, like a middle-aged infant. One TV critic says, "He has a grieved expression on his face, as if Mom is coming in with the hairbrush." Clearly he feels somebody is coming in with the hairbrush. "I'm always expecting to be hurt," he says. "I'm so nervous, I need a lot of reassurance."

Naturally, he had a miserable childhood. He was born in Brooklyn, to an Italian immigrant family. His father was the family tyrant. "You've heard of the Man in the Iron Mask? That's what he was like. Now—he's 83—he's like a pussycat. But he was dictatorial when I was little. He'd slam doors in anger. But I wasn't allowed to be angry. I'd get attention by imitating him. The most approval I got was when I became a clown. I've blocked it out of my mind. My analyst says I shouldn't think about it too much!"

Naturally, he had a miserable adolescence: "I went to the School of Performing Arts. I knew I wanted to be an actor. I got out of school and I wasn't hired. I sold orange drinks. I sold one to Milton Berle once. It was a high point. Then I got a few jobs in show business. But I quit. It was a period of despair. I couldn't deal with the despair. I decided to sell cars. And I went to college for two years."

Naturally, he continued to be miserable: "I found I didn't lose my despair when I left show business and started cleaning cars. So I decided to be in despair doing what I liked. In the arts, you have to adjust to despair.

I'm great at despair."

Naturally, after he started to be successful, he was even more miserable: "My career built up. I was in a revival on Broadway. The critics noticed me. Most of the critics said very nice things about me. But Walter Kerrsaid: 'Dom De Luise didn't have enough faith in his lines and made goo-goo-eyes.' I was so hurt, so depressed. I was angry at Walter Kerr, but I couldn't express the anger. But it was vast. So I went into analysis. I learned I was repressing my anger. I learned to let the hurt and anger out. It changed my whole life."

Naturally, after his whole life was changed, he was still miserable. Only his misery started making money: "My comedy approach is all based on human fears. And guilts. I often deal with hostility. People's hostility to me. And mine to other people. And I do a big phony. Dominick the Great. A complete authority on nothing. It's a takeoff on my father." Much of the money of late has come from TV appearances (The Entertainers, Dean Martin's summer show, The Tonight Show, The Garry Moore Show, The

Girl from U.N.C.L.E.).

With money came marriage, to actress Carol Arthur, and fatherhood—and all this unaccustomed joy has made him really miserable: "I don't want to be the kind of father to my child that my father was to me. I have a lot of ideas about how to love him and make him secure. I'll try to be firm, but gentle. I want him to be able to express his anger at me. It's very important for a child to express anger. I want to be able to take the responsibility of a child without fear."

And with the first suggestion of big success—the special on NBC—he's ecstatically miserable: "This NBC special," he says, "is the high point of my career. It's a great responsibility. The whole show is on my shoulders. I don't want to be tense or anxious."

It's perfectly safe to say he'll be both. In fact, this week he'll probably beat all prior records for misery. But it won't make any difference to his skills as a comedian. It never has—not since he began imitating his scary father as a kid in Brooklyn. And as for the way he feels inside—well, he's used to being miserable. He likes being miserable. He's talented at being miserable. At 32, he's almost as miserable as Jackie Gleason. He's got the makings of a very great comedian.





May We Have a Word with You? About Commercials.

BY RICHARD K. DOAN

Are you no longer swept off your feet by the white tornado? Is that badbreath routine about to drive you batty?

In short, do you pine for fast, fast relief from those deadly familiar commercials? And does it seem to you that advertisers ought to know it when they're rubbing your fur the wrong way time after time, day after day, night after night, week after week—yes, even year after year?

Relax. They know what they're doing. And—honest!—they don't mind irritating you. Not, at least, as long as they're getting through to you. Not as long as you remember their brand, and buy it.

You say you wouldn't buy that brand if you were starving to death and it would save your life? It matters not. You must be in a minority. The experts say it doesn't work that way. Most people will buy a highly competitive product if they think it best even if its TV advertising rubs them raw. Take Madison Avenue's

word for it. The boys there aren't laboring to make you love them. All they want to do is sell you.

They have no rules about how long a TV commercial or selling theme shall run. Sometimes a spot's longevity is determined simply by how much the sponsor has, or wants, to spend. Sometimes, as with cold remedies, it's a seasonal pitch. Sometimes, as with the unveiling of new-model cars, it's a passing event.

More often the determining factor is how well a commercial sells. As one Madison Avenue expert put it: "Especially in the drug field, an advertiser may get what he considers a satisfactory commercial and spend against it almost to the end of time."

The Aerowax people, for instance, liked the gimmick of machine-gun bullets spattering off "jet-age plastic" so well that they kept this theme going for four years.

"One reason you'll see a commercial repeated over and over," explained John Bergin of the Batten, continued

Barton, Durstine & Osborn ad agency, who created the successful Dodge Rebellion campaign and who's also involved in selling Pepsi-Cola, "is that the cost of producing commercials has skyrocketed in recent years. It's running up to \$50,000 [and sometimes even more] to film a single minute. If Hollywood spent proportionately as much for movies, every one of them would be a 'Cleopatra!'"

But how does an advertiser know when his spot has run its course? Judging by what the agency oracles say, nobody has anything resembling a pat answer.

Suggested Paul Gerhold of the J. Walter Thompson Co.: "When people stop talking about your commercial, it's time to pull it off."

# Sponsors check on spots

Huge sums are regularly spent by the sponsors and their agencies trying to find out whether people are "talking about" their TV spots. This is done by so-called follow-up interviewing of householders, usually by phone or by door-to-door canvassing.

It may come as a shock to many viewers, but these surveys seldom bother to elicit feelings of irritation engendered by a sales pitch. That just isn't considered important.

"Some of the most irritating commercials have been the most successful," says Richard A. R. Pinkham, whose Ted Bates agency has been noted for some of the hardest sells in TV (for Anacin, Carter's Pills, among others). He assured an inquirer that if he and this agency had any such selling job to do over again, "we'd do it just the same way."

Frank Kemp at the Compton agency, who oversees campaigns for such products as Tide, Gleem and Ivory soap, sided with Pinkham's viewpoint. "Nearly everybody supposedly hates

those commercials," he remarked regarding a well-known headache remedy's spots, "but they sell. The point is, we're not trying to make people love us; we're only trying to sell."

Pinkham, incidentally, claimed it is more often the sponsor himself rather than the TV audience "who gets bored first with a commercial." "We sometimes have a problem keeping him, not the audience, from getting irritated by it," he reported. He declined to identify any of his clients who have begged for relief from their own ads.

Perhaps the most surprising part of all, however, is the fact that the billion-dollar advertising business has no clear picture yet of the impacts of repetitious selling.

The Schwerin Research Corporation, an outfit that has spent years probing the subject, confessed recently in a report on "The Economics of Wear-Out": "The life cycle of a television commercial is a difficult phenomenon

to chart or even to comprehend."

Studies suggest, the firm said, that "the incessant drip" of repeated commercials "evidently splashes off more than it soaks in," possibly because consumer resistance hardens as the pitch gets more familiar or because the commercial has done all the convincing it's going to.

But nobody really knows what massive doses of advertising are doing to TV watchers, according to Schwerin.

"What happens," the researcher wondered, "when the consumer is exposed to a thousand advertising impressions a day—when he may be exposed to the same piece of advertising several times a day—when he is liable to see it again and again for months or even years—and when he is simultaneously exposed to more or less the same competitive claims in the product field?"

Viewers may not have a scientific answer to that one, but they might give Mr. Schwerin some choice opinions.



# Pistols 'n' Petticoats

This show is not so much wild 'n' woolly as it is stuff 'n' nonsense. In the first place it is billed as a "comedy Western"—which, in our book means you can be pretty certain it's going to work at it too hard. In the second place, it is set in a town called Wretched—about which it is so easy to make a joke that we are going to leave a small space here for you to make your own.

We couldn't agree with you more. Anyway, in the third place, the show stars, as Henrietta Hanks, Miss Ann Sheridan. Miss Sheridan made her name as The Oomph Girl. In this show, however, we are afraid she isn't given much to oomph with or to oomph about. Finally, there is the problem of Henrietta's daughter, Lucy

(Carole Wells), who is supposed to be a girl who went to finishing school in Philadelphia. It's our theory that somewhere along the way her education was rudely interrupted. In any case, she came back to Wretched, and she is now going with a very shy sheriff (apparently for life) named Harold Sikes (Gary Vinson). Sheriff Sikes carries two guns and two jokes. Both of the latter are about the former. He either (a) forgets his guns or (b) trips over them. So far both of these jokes have been in every episode we've seen, and we promise you they never fail to give the laugh track a tremendous bang.

There are only two redeeming features to all this. One is Grandma. Henrietta's mother (Ruth McDevitt), and the other is Grandpa, Henrietta's father (Douglas Fowley). Both are in as ridiculous situations as the rest of the cast and both have equally ridiculous lines; but they somehow manage, if not actually to rise above them, at least to shoot their way out. We're thinking particularly of one of the many times they're overwhelmed by Indians, and Grandma is asked if she understands what one of the Indians is saying. "Of course," she replies, "but he has a dreadful accent." Grandpa, too, has his moments—as when he is passed a finger bowl. "What in blazes is a finger bowl?" he wants to know. "I ain't plannin' to eat no fingers."

Not that you won't get tired of Grandma and Grandpa—you will. But remember, we're speaking relatively. In a show like this, if all you do is get tired, you're way ahead. The big trouble is it evidently started out to be a satire of other Westerns and then ended up a satire—well, of itself. Satire, they say, is something that closes on Saturday night. As for satire of satire—well, our only suggestion is to send it to finishing school.


