

CBS will film the Moscow State Circus for a segment of <u>Coliseum</u> . . . "The State of Space" is the title of NBC's study of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration scheduled for April . . . An original musical adaptation of GEORGE BERNARD SHAW's "Androcles and the Lion" is planned by NBC as a 90-minute special for '67-68. RICHARD RODGERS is writing the music . . . "The Tenement" is the title of a CBS News special for Feb. 28, produced by JAY McMULLEN.

Architect CONSTANTINOS DOXIADIS will appear from Athens on ABC's forthcoming special "Cosmopolis: The World City," a scrutiny by producer JOHN SECONDARI of urbanization problems around the world. Shooting has been completed in Tokyo, Helsinki, Rome, London, Los Angeles and San Francisco . . . ROBERT HORTON, and PHIL FORD and MIMI HINES, are on ED SULLIVAN'S March 5 show . . . DAVID WOLPER is doing a program for NBC called "The World of Horses."

DIANA RIGG (The Avengers) will play Helena in the Royal Shakespeare Company's production of "A Midsummer Night's Dream," which goes on CBS as a two-hour special next season. (It's the first of three such programs, the others being "King Lear" and "Macbeth.") . . . JOHNNY MANN is now the choice as musical director for JOEY BISHOP's late-night entry starting April 17 on ABC. NEAL HEFTI originally was rumored for the job.

Broadway star JULIE HARRIS, of all people, is set to headline an upcoming two-parter on NBC's <u>Tarzan</u>... ABC film crews will soon be off to Austria to shoot backgrounds for the special "Silent Night," being written for TV by CHRISTOPHER ISHERWOOD ... NBC is taking a hard look at the first situation-comedy series to feature a 10-year-old Negro youngster and his Caucasian playmate. The Universal entry--titled <u>Me and Benjy</u>--features KEVIN HERRON and TONY FRASER in the lead roles ... BETTE DAVIS is on an upcoming SMOTHERS BROTHERS program ... JONATHAN WIN-TERS is host for the second edition of ABC's "Holiday on Ice," to be filmed in Frankfurt, Germany. No air date has been set.

### as we see it

■ Parents, and indeed all adults who are concerned with the future of the United States in the hands of the oncoming generation, may find themselves distressed by our article in this issue about the domination of Saturday's juvenile TV programs by cartoons.

For, as the Foundation for Character Education states in its new study, "Television for Children": "We know . . . enough of the effects of television on children to say that facts are learned, attitudes acquired, and behavior patterns adopted."

■ Instead of merely bemoaning the current condition, the Foundation's 81-page study is offering the producers and entrepreneurs of television a constructive collection of program ideas designed not only to build characters but to attract them.

There, of course, is the rub. For, like their parents, the children tend to give their largest Nielsen support to the lighter, fluffier stuff.

Says the Foundation: "A diversity of programs is needed. This is not to say that the program schedule of a community for every day should carry a preschool program, a sports program, a stamp-collecting program, and so on, designed for all ages. But a review of the combined program schedules presented by all stations in a single week to the children of a community should show just that." Amen.

■ The study doesn't let it go at that. It comes up with examples—shows in such categories as storytelling, exploring, doing—and we commend them to the attention of all who produce shows for children.

And while we're commending, ask your child to look in on ABC's Discovery, CBS's Captain Kangaroo and Children's Film Festival, NBC's Animal Secrets and The Smithsonian, and NET's What's New.



### Mr. Terrific

"What," asks a CBS release, "has the strength of 100 elephants, a nose for scent equal to the sniffers of 500 bloodhounds, and the jumping power of 1000 kangaroos?" "Stumped?" the release goes on. "Then look to the air waves."

Well, you can look if you wantthat's your privilege-but do me a favor, will you? Don't expect, along the waves, any raves. For the fact is, Mr. Terrific, like its Siamese twin, Captain Nice, is not only not terrific, it's pretty terrible. And, to tell the truth, we don't even believe that release about it. All right, so the guy's on the pill-and, occasionally, we see him smash in the hood of a car or go through a brick wall. We'd take one elephant, let alone 100 of them, over him anytime. As for the jumping power of 1000 kangaroos, from the episodes we've seen so far, it would take all those kangaroos, starting at once, to get this show off the ground. Finally, on the matter of the nose for scent, the only thing we'd have confidence in Mr. Terrific tracking down is a well-worn laugh track.

The one appealing thing about the

character of Mr. Terrific (Stephen Strimpell) is that he's not all those things—even when he's no longer Stanley Beamish, your friendly filling-station attendant, but has pilled himself up to become the daredevil agent for the Bureau of Secret Projects. For he still remains basically the same stumblebum he always was. The trouble is, so does the show.

Two episodes will suffice to show you what's wrong with the show. The first was one in which Mr. Terrific has to track down a Mr. Big of a crime syndicate, only to find out that (A) Mr. Big is a girl (Kathie Browne) and (B) he's left his booster pills in his other jacket. (In case you haven't seen the show, he has two of these boosters, each of which gives him 10 minutes more of being Mr. Terrific-which we can assure you is enough.) Not only was the character of Mr. Big a big miss-she was just not funny-the whole thing ended with two super-sneezes, the chief virtue of which was to arouse the viewer from what was, by that time, an almost certain super-snooze. The second episode found Stanley being pressed into service to fix, in flight, a faulty nose wheel on the plane of the President of the United States. Here there was a very funny scene when Stanley was being examined by a psychiatrist (David Opatoshu) and there was, as usual, a peerless performance by the Bureau Chief (John McGiver). But otherwise the individual shortcomings of the script, the acting and the directing were matched only by the innate tastelessness of the whole idea. As for the Bureau Chief's pal, Harley (Paul Smith), he is not McGiver-after all, there is only one of him-but he does have his moments. "Stanley," he says, in one of these, "is accident prone. Even when he does something right, it's an accident." The same might be said, at almost any moment, of this show.

Do it the pop-up way. Think of them as an English muffin or maybe a bagel, and toast 'em. Food for thought, eh?

There have been guns, knives, guillotines, steam baths and garrotes. Everyone knows the beloved room with the sliding, crushing walls; and how many times has the trap door over the bottomless pit been used?

We mean it's been done all sorts of ways, but it took the nice people down at THRUSH to think of a gigantic pop-up toaster as a means to an end on this week's show.

The evil and wicked villainess, one Mother Magda (Ann Sothern), of borscht and chicken-noodle fame, drops poor A. Dancer (Stefanie Powers) and Innocent-Bystander-Who-Knows-Too-Much (Stan Freberg) in this giant toaster to be cooked to crumbs. Doom.

But then along comes another innocent bystander, of cloddish mien, who knows nothing of the nefarious goings-on. This chap is in the gymnasium a flight above the toaster and, whilst ogling a young thing, puts into motion a medicine ball which bounces downstairs and triggers the toaster's popping gadget.

So off they fly (with aid of harness and pulley gadget), once again foiling THRUSH's unquenchable lust for the blood of the good and true.



# WHERE DID ALL THE PEOPLE GO?

Saturday morning's world is populated by curious creatures direct from the inkwell BY RICHARD K. DOAN

Y ou can look at network television on Saturday mornings for hours these days and scarcely see a living soul except in the commercials. Which are plentiful, to be sure. As for the programs, they're a carnival of super ants, lovable hippos, singing dogs, space ghosts, secret squirrels, cat-andmouse chasers . . . all straight off the drawing boards.

The networks, you see, have happily and at long last discovered something the moviemakers and local TV kiddyshow hosts have known for years: that moppets—and some adults, too —just love animated cartoons.

The full-blown outgrowth of this belated discovery is a \$50 million weekend daytime rash of cartoon series on the three TV chains. On Saturday mornings alone, when most of these animated concoctions are unreeled, about 30 million Americans from two years of age up are hanging around their TV sets watching a pick of 12 hours of this stuff. Indeed, there's practically nothing else to watch on the networks!

Even so, almost everybody seems happy about it. Parents for the most part evidently regard these solid blocks of cartoons as an acceptable way to keep the family tykes occupied



while weekend chores get done. The networks are in a pitched and apparently profitable battle for Saturday morning ratings, because sponsors are flocking to the bait. "It's turned into a battle just like prime time," one executive happily reports. Another contends, "We're in the most ferocious warfare in all TV." And cartoonists in Hollywood and the world over are experiencing a work boom of unprecedented proportions.

It's partly a case of the Sunday funnies, an American institution, undergoing electronic translation and coming alive as small-screen fare, and partly a case of TV finally capitalizing in full on the long-standing popularity of cartooned movie short-subjects such as Bugs Bunny and Tom & Jerry.

The surprising part is that the immense pulling power of cartoons dawned so slowly on the networks, which usually can sniff a trend a mile away. There have been animated shows around for quite a while. *Mighty Mouse*, network TV's longestrunning cartoon hero, made his debut in 1955. The Flintstones, The Jetsons and Top Cat have had prime-time plays. Bullwinkle has had a long run.

But the networks were long of the belief that weekend mornings should



be devoted to a variety of types of children's entertainment, among them live shows like Shari Lewis's, filmed series like Lassie, Fury and Flicka, and comedy reruns like Dennis the Menace.

Edwin Vane, director of ABC daytime programming, says the networks finally realized nothing pulled like cartoons, and decided to go all the way with them. "We've all tried other forms of programming and wound up second or third," he explained. Then, moved by a picturesque thought, he added earnestly: "The TV cemetery is pock-marked with gravestones of other kinds of shows."

Across the street, CBS's daytime programmer, Fred Silverman, at 29 the youngest vice president in the business, recalled that when he came to CBS nearly four years ago the network had only two Saturday cartoons. Alvin and Mighty Mouse. "Then Kellogg and General Mills came along," he relates, "and wanted us to put on some more, so we went to a two-hour block of cartoons. NBC and ABC took a look at what we were up to and began moving in the same direction. ABC brought on The Beatles-cartooned, that is-and they went over like crazy. NBC also brought in strong

new shows (Atom Ant and Secret Squirrel). We got clobbered."

Silverman didn't take it lying down. Going to his bosses, he wangled an \$8-million kitty from which to buy new shows. In a wholesale shake-up of his Saturday morning lineup, seven out of nine features were canceled. including "a lot of tired old shows," leaving only Mighty Mouse and Tom & Jerry. Silverman swiped NBC's Underdog, a series which had finished close to The Beatles' ratings last season, and he signed up six brand-new series. The overhauled CBS lineup hit the air last September with a ratings bang, jumping CBS into first place. Its boy-wonder programmer was such an overnight hero around CBS that Variety chronicled his exploit with the headline "Hi-Yo Silverman!"

CBS also leads the network pack in number of Saturday cartoons, running nine half-hours back-to-back to ABC's eight and NBC's seven. ABC, however, also plays four half-hours on Sunday mornings.

Surveys indicate the audience for all this is mostly kids—around 14 million at, say, 11 A.M. Saturdays but there are usually several million households where an adult is known to be peeking in, too. **continued**

"There used to be a shibboleth that kids like reruns," says Vane. "But the kids are responsive to something new; four new series were brought on last season and they decimated their opposition." Silverman agrees. "The kids used to watch anything that moved. Not any more!"

He adds that the three networks among them may bring in 12 new cartoon series next fall to sweeten the Saturday programming pot.

The programmers don't claim to know exactly what makes one cartoon more popular than another. Newness alone is a factor. But they are pretty well agreed on why cartoons in general win out. "Our philosophy," says NBC's Bud Donald Grant, assistant daytime chief, "is best exemplified by what we have onshows played for humor and the chase." *Fantasy* is the key word, it's agreed.

Plots of the current crop of cartoon shows cluster around a handful of formulas: the adventures of supermen and superanimals (Superman, Atom Ant, Mighty Mouse, Underdog), the adventures of supersleuths (Cool Secret Squirrel, Super McCool. Bwoing), the adventures of lovable monsters (King Kong, Magilla Gorilla, Frankenstein Jr., Milton the Monster), the adventures of lovable other animals (Porky Pig, Bullwinkle, Hoppity Hooper the frog, Cecil the seasick sea serpent), the adventures of rock 'n' rollers (The Beatles, The Beagles, The Impossibles), the adventures of space-agers (The Jetsons, Space Kidettes, Space Ghost), and, of course the adventures of the chasers (Bugs Bunny, Sylvester and Tweety, Tom & Jerry, The Road Runner). Three series, the Stone Age Flintstones. Casper the frolicsome ghost and The Lone Ranger, seem in categories by themselves.

For the uninitiated, it might be noted that most shows have serieswithin-series. Thus, Magilla the Gorilla stars in a capsuled adventure leading off his half-hour. A second sequence features Breezly and Sneezly, a polar bear and a seal; and a third episode stars Mushmouse, a hillbilly rodent who feuds and fights with Punkin Puss the cat.

The networks, having convinced themselves that it's all right to abandon other forms of children's programming, save for an ABC Discovery here, a CBS Captain Kangaroo and an NBC Smithsonian there, and hearing no objections to it, are enjoying a heyday commercially.

Cartoons are the sort of "candy shows" that reap Nielsen numbers, and that's what the packagers of cereals and makers of toys want. The networks have hung price tags of up to \$8500 per commercial minute on the more popular cartoons. The total take this season from advertisers in what NBC calls "the child-rich" Saturday programming is expected to reach close to \$50 million.

And of course the cartooneries are prospering. According to one report, as recently as two years ago about 60 percent of the members of Hollywood Local 839, Screen Cartoonists Union, were jobless. Now 85 percent of its 900 members are employed; 100 were added in a six-month period last year. Another group, the Screen Cartoonists Guild, was reported to have 200 members fully employed. One shop alone—Hanna-Barbera, biggest animation factory of all—recently had about 400 cartoonists at work.

A remarkable aspect of the television cartoons is that many of them originate from outside the United States. *King Kong*, for instance, is done in Japan. *The Beatles* series was assembled in cartooneries in Australia and in London. Foreign production in general is cheaper than the cartoon production in this country.

Not cheap in any case, cartoon series are costing the networks up to \$50,000 per half-hour. To get their money back—or rather to achieve the profits they want—the networks have to get five or six runs out of each episode. This has begun to pose a competitive problem. While a network is working off repeats, the fickle small fry are as apt as not to twist the dial to another channel.

The weekend cartoon rage seems to have touched off surprisingly little complaint from parental and educational quarters. "The principal objection," Vane vows, "comes from the kids themselves-they don't like the repeats." NBC officials said late in the fall they had received letters since September chiefly about two Saturday shows, Top Cat (since dropped) and Atom Ant. with "approvals," as the fan-mail classifies favorable comments, considerably outnumbering "criticals." CBS reported "about 20" letters received from parents during the same period, mostly objecting to violence in some cartoons. This was considered a negligible protest.

Groups representing the viewing audience have paid little attention to the Saturday morning fare. The American Council for Better Broadcasts, in its look-listen opinion poll for 1965-66, found The Beatles, Bugs Bunny and The Jetsons "good." Mighty Mouse was ranked fair to poor ("always violence, same plot"). Superman and Tom & Jerry were labeled poor owing to depicted violence or crime.

Of Saturday cartoons in general, the Council reported that "though some parents are glad the children are entertained, others find the action violent; wish it were constructive."

The concern obviously isn't anywhere near the boiling point. Perhaps because live baby sitters are scarce and expensive these days.

## How does one get rid of AN ANCHOR?

Adam West enjoys Batman's rewards, but sometimes he would love to free himself from the weight of that silly suit

dam West, the well-known social satirist, man of the world, scion of a noted Pacific Northwest wheat-farming family, onetime Honolulu disc jockey, ex-husband of a genuine Polynesian princess and father of her children, stood in the modest house trailer which serves him as a dressing room while on location. He doffed his Ron Postal suit (part of a \$3000 wardrobe he recently purchased) and wiggled into the familiar gray jersey tights and midnight-blue satin cape of Batmanhe calls it "the funny money suit."

The trailer-a modest substitute for the stereo-equipped, walnut-paneled palace he occupies at the studiobulges with the wanters, well-wishers and members of the entourage who gravitate to a "hot" star like flies to a side of bacon: his agent, whose fame and fortune West has assured; his press agent, whose only problem now is to fend off the press; his dresser, his dialog director, his major-domoand-errand-boy whose only orders are to "keep Adam happy"; assorted friends (everyone is his "friend" now), admirers and autograph buffs. Outside, behind a police cordon, mill hundreds of squealing children, straining at a rope that separates them from the sprayed-green grass (yellow grass does not photograph well in color) of the photography area.

"It's hero time," says Adam West lightly, tugging the top of the tights up over the flat of his stomach and starting on the skintight tunic. "In a moment I will step from this humble dwelling and, to the plaudits of the crowd, plummet from a platform fully three and a half feet high."

The chant, "We want Batman!" rises in shrill crescendo. "Ah, the adulation!" he continues, undulating like a Girl Scout in a tight girdle. "Oh, I love it, basking in the sincere warm smiles of the little children. What! You say Chief O'Hara isn't working today? Oh, I miss the Chief. The family's disintegrating—Røbin off to college, Aunt Harriet drafted and being shipped to Vietnam. Oh, the heartbreak of it all. Here, give me that."

His dresser hands him the tiny gray skullcap worn beneath the Batman helmet. West places it with exaggerated care. "I wonder if I should go out and bless the crowd? No, perhaps not." He jams the fiberglas-and-nylon helmet down over his ears. "Marvelous bit of haberdashery," he mumbles. "It's hot. The sound bounces. Can't hear. My nose pinches and gives me a cleft palate. Can't see. And I owe it all to that peerless Prince of Trivia, our producer Bill-'Bull'-Dozier, who refuses to supply me with a seeing-eye dog. Now off to give another Academy Award-winning performance."

West, who is really stage-struck William West Anderson of Walla Walla, Wash., adjusts the cape, and, with a Barrymore-like flourish, thrusts himself out into the warm sunshine of Rancho Park golf course. The children stamp and yell and wave scraps of paper and ball-point pens. "Sign my autograph, Batman, please!"

"Later, kids," says the Caped Crusader coolly. "Got to rescue Alfred from the clutches of that infernal scoundrel, The Archer."

"Aw, Batman, you couldn't hurt a flea!" says one.

"Yeah," replies Adam West amiably. "Disillusioning, isn't it?"

Adam West! Superstar! Before the funny money suit, he might have stood on his head in the middle of Hollywood Boulevard and hardly drawn a murmur. Today he is primarily concerned with what time to arrive at Steve McQueen's party, what beautiful girl to take to the première of "The Bible," whether to drive the yellow Excalibur with the 1932 La-Salle-style head lamps or the 500 c.c. Triumph cycle, how to clear the time for personal appearances (at \$15,000 a crack), and how the plans are coming for his cantilevered, double- continued

A-frame house with the leaded windows he wants to build in Aspen or Jackson Hole.

"Adam hasn't asked for a thing a star wouldn't normally ask for," explains Howie Horwitz, line producer of *Batman*. "Just a Rolls-Royce, an air-conditioned portable dressing room with stereo, beautiful girls and a \$5000-a-week raise."

While he loves the fame, the gaudy comic-book package in which it comes wrapped irritates him. He can make amusing jokes about the funny money suit, but the truth is, it bugs him.

He has become so sensitive to what he calls "Batman bad mouth" that he can hardly go to a party or pick up a column without reading into it some veiled reference to the fact that he is not exactly Marcello Mastroianni, whom he strives to emulate. He is a surprisingly earnest young man, bothered by the fact that there are a great many people who do not see Batman as he sees it-as a sophisticated theatrical prank which ranks somewhere north of Noel Coward and south of Mrs. Miller as the performance put-on of the century. And the more he talks about the nuances of the playing-"social satire," he says-the more convinced he is that some people are deliberately not getting the message.

"Tm tough inside," says the putupon version of Adam West. "Tve learned how to cope with the jungle, the animosity of the have-nots, the superficiality of the knockers. I get very impatient with people who don't trust me, who try to change me. 'Play it safe, be banal,' they say. I want to rise or fall on my own tastes, feelings and intelligence."

Scratch a little deeper and you find yet another Adam West, a compulsive seeker after cosmic meanings, the romanticist whose life, he says, has been one constant pursuit of that indefinable "something out there."

"I can't describe it," he says. "But it is a constant abrasive, a battle between the traditions of family and small town, the wheat fields, the desire for taproots, children, a wife, and well, that dream that is so pervasive. I want to know life, touch, smell, feel everything. I want all that and family, too. But my intelligence tells me it's impossible."

One might suspect that this, too, was a put-on-with a plot reminiscent of Eugene O'Neill. The principal actors in the drama of family conflict are a Swedish father, allied to the soil and the conventions of the ranching establishment; a sensitive, musically gifted mother, who at 17 tried out for the Metropolitan Opera but had her ambitions thwarted by a hard-core Baptist upbringing that made anything theatrical "the work of the devil," and by her marriage; a younger brother, John, who identified with the father and with the establishment; and Bill himself, who always felt that he had cost his mother the big chance she wanted.

The parents were divorced, the father remarried to a woman more compatible with wheat farming, the younger brother John installed as the heir apparent to 4500 acres of wheat, while Bill—Adam—went off "out there" looking for that "something" that Mother had missed. "Mother made her try," he says. "But she never made it. The ranch and the children—me—prevented it."

He was the moody but charming nonconformist, getting his way with his younger brother who adored him. Once he suggested that John ride his tricycle down the cellar stairs. John did. He broke his arm. During the summer Bill worked the ranch. On Saturdays he went to the local movie and "drowned myself in fantasy," coming home to find the living room loaded with such theatrical celebrities as—Yehudi Menuhin, Artur Rubinstein, Nelson Eddy, Duke Ellington, Robert Donat—presided over by his mother, "the Auntie Mame of Walla Walla." Then one day, in the middle of an alfalfa field, he decided to be an actor.

In 1950 he married Billie Lou Yeager when she was a local 17-year-old belle and he was a 21-year-old English Lit major at Whitman College. (They were divorced six years later in Honolulu.) In 1952 he went into the Army, discovered television while at an Army camp at San Luis Obispo, Cal., teamed with an Army buddy named Carl Hebenstreit and together they became funny, ad-libbing disc jockeys. "We thought we were Bob and Ray," West remembers. "We nearly got fired —for sitting and giggling on the air."

It wasn't much, but it was enough. Out of the Army in 1954, he irrevocably turned his back on Walla Walla in favor of "out there," and went to Honolulu to join his old giggle-pal, Hebenstreit, where the two of them were to become island celebrities with a conversation-and-variety program called *The Kini Popo Show*.

He married a Polynesian princess. She was the youngest of the three famous dancing Frisbie sisters—Ngarua, daughter of James Michener's friend, the late novelist Robert Dean Frisbie, and Princess Ngatokaruaimatauaia—which even he had to admit was about as far from dirt farming as a man could get. But when an agent came along waving the Hollywood carrot, he chucked it all. The easy life, the local celebrity, the steady income. In the end he chucked his marriage to Ngarua.

He exchanged it for seven years of nonentity—bit parts in movies, television series that never jelled, an apartment on Fountain Avenue, a loan at 6 percent from his father, a juvenile lead in a Three Stooges comedy, and just before Dozier cast him in Batman, a career—sort of—in Italian Westerns. So now, hero time!! "Eradicate Evil -Elect Batman," says the bumper sticker. The whole world loving you and tearing at you. Everyone wanting something. Criticizing. Carping. Not understanding that it is hard to be a Caped Crusader and wear a funny money suit and make an idiot of yourself when you are really Marcello Mastroianni or maybe Steve McQueen in disguise, no matter how many times you tell yourself it's fun-time.

"Aw, Batman, you couldn't hurt a flea!" You want to be married. You don't want to be married. You want to be a full-time father to your two children, Jonelle, 9, and Hunter, 8. You are unsettled by Ngarua's estimate of you: "A good father, a poor husband." You go in your walnut-paneled, stereo-equipped dressing room. You switch on the hi-fi, and turn Johnny Keating's big sound up loud.

The more you think about it, the feistier you get. "I know how to walk this tightwire. I won't allow Batman to be tampered with. Sometimes I think an orangutan could direct this show. There are times when I could kick in the side of a building . . ."

This building?

"This building. An actor needs identification. Batman has given me that. He will make it possible for me to do what I want to do the way I want to do it."

Like what?

Like be a big fat star maybe?

"Like be a big fat star," he says.

### **Viewers, Critics Cheer CBS Play**

CBS took justifiable bows last week. For its attempts to enliven TV's prime-time doldrums with occasional drama of substance, lightning had struck twice. Into the same tough Sunday night spot (against Bonanza and ABC movies) where "Death of a Salesman" successfully triggered a general revival of interest in quality TV drama last May 8, the network on Jan. 29 unveiled its first CBS Playhouse offering. "The Final War of Olly Winter," a moving story of a Negro GI in Vietnam, reaped both impressive tune-in (30 million viewers) and critical raves. "Olly," in fact, slightly outrated "Salesman." Both dramas were pronounced exceptions to the bromide that TV's watchers want only "happy shows for happy people." ("Salesman," incidentally, will be repeated April 2.) Many a grindweary critic began to feel that a second TV Golden Age might indeed be dawning.

CBSers themselves felt "Olly" had achieved for original drama what "Salesman" had for classic revivals.

All that tempered CBS's elation was an acute awareness that Madison Avenue, for all its recent wailing over the boredom of current TV, was not particularly interested in doing anything about it. The network in vain shopped for a sponsor for "Olly," finally, to get back some of its halfmillion-dollar investment, selling random spots in the drama at cut rates. Net loss: \$300,000.

But early this week CBS disclosed that "Olly's" ratings and raves had paid off. General Telephone & Electronics, lately a generous underwriter of CBS News efforts, will fully sponsor at least four—maybe even six—of these CBS playhouse specials in 1967-68. The number depends on how many good scripts turn up.

Meanwhile, movies, especially those ersatz quickies cranked out for TV, continue the surprising phenomenon of the season. The Sunday night that CBS present "Olly," ABC ran one of these two-hour films, a routinesagebrush saga called "Return of the Gunfighter," and picked off a few more viewers than the CBS drama got. The success of this and NBC's similar "World Premiere" offerings has been matched only by the stunning tune-in for some old movies like "Five Branded Women." which played on CBS last month to a bigger crowd than any picture on TV since ABC's record-busting "River Kwai." Puzzled networks cannot account for it. "All we can dope out," mused on CBSer, "is that the TV audience goes for baldheaded women!"

Briefly: NBC's Chrysler Theater is washed up as of season's end, but the sponsor will ask Bob Hope to do a half-dozen or so specials next season . . . An NBC spokesman said there is a "good possibility" the network will allocate a regular Friday night hour (10-11, ET) to alternating *Telephone Hour* and public affairs reports beginning in the fall.



## THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

By Judith Crist

DARK CITY (NBC), Saturday THE SHEEPMAN (ABC), Sunday WINGS OF FIRE (NBC), Tuesday MURDER, INC. (ABC), Wednesday ONE-EYED JACKS (CBS), Thursday PEPE (CBS), Friday

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

A top-notch Western adventure film and an easygoing gentle spoof on Westerns—who could ask for more in the course of a networkmovie week?

Without asking, of course, we'll get a couple of routine crime items. "Murder, Inc.," a run-of-the-gangstermill movie, tries to claim fame by using real names and places in its story of Brooklyn's killings-for-cash mob of the Thirties but is noteworthy only for Peter Falk's making his major-role debut with a fine portrait of Abe Reles, the murderer-turnedinformant who was hurled to his death from Coney Island's Half Moon Hotel. "Dark City" is all about vice and retribution, with three gamblers being stalked by an unknown killer to avenge his brother's suicide, and the suspense getting bogged down in moralizing. A good supporting cast-Viveca Lindfors, Jack Webb, Ed Begley and Dean Jagger-helps unbend Charlton Heston, a bit stiff in his pre-Ben Hur days, as a dealer who didn't know the game was loaded.

Also unrequested, we'll get "Pepe," a dreary guest-star-studded tale of a Mexican ranch-hand who goes to Hollywood; it's a disastrous attempt to showcase Cantinflas, the great Mexican clown who had made his mark in "Around the World in 80 Days." And we'll get another of those unknown quantities, a tailored-fortelevision "World Premiere" film, "Wings of Fire," this one about daredevil fliers. Jill St. John is not on hand, but Suzanne Pleshette is.

But, as noted, there are a couple of known quantities well worth viewing. "One-Eved Jacks" marked Marlon Brando's debut as director as well as star, and the result is one of the most beautifully photographed and more purely fascinating Westerns around. Brando himself and Karl Malden are the prime antagonists in this tale of bank-robbing partners who fall out, with betrayal and vengeance culminating in the showdown at gunpoint. Brando proves as tantalizing a director as he is an actor: There's a muted ferocity, an intensity, a visual excitement to so much of the film that its lapses into lushness and romanticism are forgivable, and the offbeat aspects triumph.

In the smaller-pleasure department, there's "The Sheepman," a buoyant and funny easygoing look at the sheepman-versus-cattleman rivalry of the Old West, with Glenn Ford just fine as the ultimate sheepman-hero; and Shirley MacLaine delightful as the girl he wins. And make special note of Mickey Shaughnessy, the lardiest-bellied gunslinger in town.

And incidentally, if you're not joining the kiddies on Sunday afternoon to watch the CBS festival of foreign films for children, you're doing yourself dirt. Last week's Japanese "Skinny and Fatty" was sheer delight; this week's Russian "The Blind Bird" has charm and imagination, and there are more to come.

# HE DIDN'T COME OUT OF A COOKIE CUTTER

From a brash young actor to an introverted pro, Steven Hill always has been his own man

When he went to Chicago 20 years ago—a brash young actor with practically no professional experience —he said to the first producer he met, "T'll tell you one thing—I'm giving Chicago two weeks!"

An old friend from later acting days in New York remembers, "He used to let himself go—blow up." Once Variety reported that a complaint was filed against him with the Screen Actors Guild because he used "excessive profanity" on a movie set. But his present producer describes him as "a quiet, thoughtful, introspective man," and the old friend says, "He is repressed. He lives in the dark caves of his own mind."

He has always played serious roles, but his brother says, "He really should be a comedian—everyone he grew up with remembers him that way." Says director Ted Post, who has known him many years: "He's a sensitive, imaginative actor, but he could be one of the great farceurs if he would let himself be."

Concerning his acting technique, he once said, "I get so completely under that other guy's skin that I'm somebody else. It's the creative process." Now he says, "In this business I have found the form far more important than the content. You're always doing the same old thing but dressing it up to look fresh and new."

In 1965, according to the Los Angeles Times, he "left Hollywood to avoid the usual movie-star buildup." Today he says, "I'd be lying if I said I didn't want to be a big star—that's why all of us are in this business."

When he formed his own production company two years ago, he announced, "In the event my venture as a producer clicks, I'm perfectly willing to give up acting altogether. I'm making the plunge as a producer with both feet. I'm not even thinking of failure, because I'm determined to establish myself as a successful producer if it takes years and every dime I've got." Now he is once more acting, as one of the stars of CBS's Mission: Impossible.

His name is Steven Hill, and if you think that he is a complicated, contradictory sort of guy, you are absolutely right. A friend from Actors Studio days, Michael Strong, says, "He's an individual—he didn't come out of a cookie cutter." Another old New York friend, actor Simon Oakland, says, "He never followed a conventional path—from the time Josh Logan told him to cross the stage in 'Mister Roberts,' and he said, 'Why should I cross the stage?'"

In the Broadway production of "Mister Roberts," Hill played the part of Stefanowski, a name reminiscent of his own before he changed it from Solomon Krakovsky. Born 45 years ago in Seattle, he is the son of Russian immigrants. "He was always acting," says his younger brother, Charles



Hill, who is in the furniture business in Seattle—the same business their father was in before he retired. Charles says that Steve and his older sister, Ruth, an actress before she married, take after their mother, who was "theatrically inclined." Steve, however, attributes his interest in acting to extensive movie-going as a boy: "By the time I was 6, I was an avid movie fan. I was fascinated."

By 1948, when he appeared in "Mister Roberts," Hill had been graduated from the University of Washington (A.B., '43), had done a tour of duty with the U.S. Marines, had spent eight successful months in Chicago, principally in radio, and had "starved for two years" in New York before getting his first role in Ben Hecht's "A Flag Is Born," with his Actors Studio classmate, Marlon Brando.

Hill once caused a "revolution" at the Actors Studio, where he was in the first class, along with such later luminaries as Brando, Montgomery Clift, Julie Harris and Kim Stanley. The teaching procedure there was for a student to do a scene and then explain to the class what he had tried to accomplish. After that the members of the class would criticize his performance and tell him whether they thought he had indeed done what he had set out to do. "I thought that was unfair," says Hill. "You don't measure an actor's success by what he tries to do but by the effect he has on the audience." Thus, after doing a scene from "Hamlet" one day, he refused to explain what he had tried to accomplish and demanded that the members of the class give their interpretation first. "It blew the lid off," he recalls.

It was in an acting class that Steven Hill met his wife, a dancer named Selma Stern, who had acting ambitions but "never got to first base." They were married in 1951. She and their four children **continued**

#### live in Pomona, N.Y.

Explaining his belligerence in the early days of his career, Hill says, "I felt I had to be brash to make my mark. In this business you don't make out application forms—you have to make an instant impression. I had to do it over and over again before I was finally recognized."

Unfortunately that recognition has been limited principally to his peers in the theater. Despite top roles on Broadway ("A Far Country"), in movies ("The Goddess," "A Child Is Waiting," "The Slender Thread") and in such major television productions as "For Whom the Bell Tolls," "The Sacco-Vanzetti Story" and "Man on a Mountain Top" (for which he received a Sylvania Award), Steven Hill has made little impression upon the mass audience.

He says, "I never cared whether I was recognized. My big kick was trying to create the character." Although he has hidden behind the beard of Sigmund Freud in "A Far Country" and the walrus mustache of Bartolomeo Vanzetti, the lack of recognition may be more fundamental than that. As one knowledgeable Hollywood woman puts it, "He's so intelligent and so talented, but he just doesn't put out vibrations." Ironically, the Mission: Impossible episode Hill enjoyed most was one in which he wore the white painted face of a clown. "That's the basis of it all," he says.

His role in *Mission: Impossible* might have been the one to bring him the sort of recognition he has missed, but it has been overshadowed by the flashier part and more flamboyant acting style of Martin Landau, who was originally to have been only an occasional guest star but who has been in almost every episode of the series.

There have been reports in Holly-

wood that this did not come about accidentally. Steven Hill is a deeply committed Orthodox Jew, whose contract provides that he be released from the set in time to get home before sundown on Friday and that he not work on Jewish holidays. This, it has been said, made it so difficult to film a one-hour TV program every week that an attempt was being made to ease Hill out.

Bruce Geller, creator and executive producer of *Mission: Impossible*, admits that Hill's schedule has been "occasionally inconvenient," and he says, "Occasionally I'm sorry, but it was a ground rule." Three episodes that featured Landau almost to the complete exclusion of Hill were shot, Geller says, during the Jewish High Holy Days. It is Landau rather than Hill who goes on CBS weekend publicity junkets.

Meanwhile, Hill continues to bring his kosher lunch to the studio from his apartment 10 minutes away and to observe all the other strict tenets of his ancient faith. As his brother says, "Whatever he goes into, he goes into 100 percent."

Perhaps it is this concentration in his faith that accounts for some of the apparent contradictions in Steven Hill. Acting, which once made him brash, aggressive and profane, no longer seems as important to him as it once did. He used to feel that there was something "special" or "precious" about it, but now he says, "I feel I'm no different from a carpenter or any other tradesman. You are called in to do a job because of your skill, and you do it. It's that simple."

His principal commitment is now elsewhere, and when his career interferes with that other commitment, the choice is a simple and obvious one for him. Not many actors—or many other people, for that matter—can say the same.



### **STRIKING A NEW POSE** A \$60-an-hour model becomes just another TV rookie





# TELEVISION ON THE WING

O STATE

Two C-121 Navy Superconstellations await the next flight to bring TV to our troops.

It was twilight at the Tan Son Nhut airport a few miles outside Saigon. A Superconstellation's four engines coughed to life, and soon the great, dolphin-shaped plane was rolling toward the head of a runway, and moments later it was sprinting faster and then faster on the tiptoes of its wheeled tripod, and then it lurched upon the wind and curved upward into the melancholy gray of a South Vietnam dusk.

In the cockpit, Lt. Cdr. Donald Ferris, USN, held the controls lightly in his gloved hands and eased the airplane into a slow, climbing turn toward the southeast. Below was the Mekong Delta, South Vietnam's fertile rice basket, a vast, muddy crazyquilt of rice fields under a shimmering patina of water that reflected both the aircraft and the thunderhead clouds above it.

The plane's destination was not far off—nor was it even on the ground. After traveling only 15 miles, it banked again and began flying a lazy circle, 10 miles in diameter and 10,-000 feet over the Delta mud. Commander Ferris scanned the control panel, then switched on the autopilot; he leaned back in his seat and accepted a container of coffee from a crew member.

A few feet behind the cockpit, in a microcosmic television studio measuring 5 feet wide and 10 feet long, an "announcer"—actually an Air Forces sergeant attached to the Armed Forces Radio and Television Service—was daubing his face with theatrical makeup. All through the plane, technicians in orange flight suits were bending over consoles, sharpening test patterns on rows of TV monitors, and giving final checks to an array of electronic gear.

Soon floodlights brightened the tiny studio, illuminating the announcer's face. A small vidicon TV camera in front of him came on, and he smiled broadly and said: "Good evening. I'm Master Sergeant Shelly Blunt. Welcome to another evening of viewing on Armed Forces Television, Vietnam."

On the ground, thousands of GIsand many Vietnamese-settled back to The Blue Eagles circle Vietnamese skies carrying nothing more lethal than TV programs BY NEIL HICKEY

watch programs aimed at them by one of the most ingenious broadcast setups any place in the world: a flying television station capable of beaming a full evening's schedule of TV shows directly to the men engaged in the prosecution of a war.

That's how TV first was broadcast in Vietnam a little over a year ago (Feb. 7, 1966), and until a fancy new ground transmitter in downtown Saigon went on the air last Oct. 25. Right now, American television shows are visible not only in Saigon, but in the upcountry environs of Qui Nhon and Da Nang. Pleiku is next. Those outlying transmitters (each is five kilowatts) are set up next to ingenious, mobile vans; but the one in Saigon is a full-fledged, 25-kilowatt transmitter in a modern, permanent installation.

By July 1 the Armed Forces Radio and Television Service in Vietnam will have a total of eight TV stations reaching 90 percent of all U.S. forces in that war-riven land. The moraleboosting effect of such a network is expected to be enormous, creating for the troops the impression that—in spite of the mud, the booby traps and disease—they're really not too far from home.

At the outset the Saigon area received three hours of television per day, seven days a week. Now that the ground transmitters are working, the schedule both in Saigon and in the central and northern provinces lasts from 6:30 to 11 P.M. on weekdays, and from 1:30 P.M. to Midnight on Saturdays and Sundays.

Practically all of the programming comes to Vietnam in cans from the Los Angeles headquarters of the AFRTS, which in turn procures it from the national networks in the U.S. But the new studios in downtown Saigon also are capable of transmitting live news broadcasts and special programs.

Thus Americans in Vietnam are tuning in such stateside TV shows as 12 O'clock High, Bewitched, I've Got a Secret, The Tonight Show, My Favorite Martian, Candid Camera, Hollywood Palace, The Ed Sullivan Show, The Danny Kaye Show, continued

Batman, The Beverly Hillbillies, Gunsmoke, Meet the Press, sports events, documentaries, and many others.

When American authorities first discussed bringing television to Vietnam, they decided not to postpone its inauguration during the period required for construction of the ground transmitter. So two Navy Superconstellation C-121's—called the Blue Eagles—were outfitted with transmitting gear in the U.S. and dispatched hurriedly to the battle zone.

On an evening last summer, as one



of the Blue Eagles orbited lazily south of Saigon, its pilot surveyed his instrument panel, sipped coffee, and chatted with TV GUDE's man, who was installed importantly in the copilot's seat. "It's been a fantastic success in spite of the obstacles," said Commander Ferris. "Sometimes the turbulence up here is tremendous. After dark we frequently see the muzzle blasts from gunfights going on down there in the Delta. And of course the Saigon airport is usually surrounded by Vietcong in small numbers."

At times, said Ferris, air strikes were called for on the terrain directly below the C-121's orbiting pattern. "That's when the announcer back there goes on camera," Ferris added with a grin, "and tells the audience, 'Due to atmospheric conditions, we are shifting our flight pattern five miles to the west.' Then viewers get up and swivel their antennas a bit."

But those rigors belong to the past—at least as far as the Englishspeaking audience in Vietnam is concerned. The Blue Eagles still fly out of Saigon every evening, but now they wing southwestward 90 miles and orbit over the town of Can Tho in the Mekong Delta, transmitting Vietnamese-language programming to that populous area. (South Vietnam is busy establishing—with American help—its own TV network, as described in TV GUIDE, Dec. 3, 1966.)

Last April 13 the Vietcong conducted a mortar attack on the Saigon airport and damaged the two C-121's each containing \$3,000,000 worth of electronic gear—which fly on alternate evenings. One of them took 50 shrapnel holes in its fuselage, but was patched up with such alacrity and expertise that it went aloft that same day. The other was out of action for a month, during which time the TV schedule went to five nights a week. In a second Vietcong attack early in December a Blue Eagle plane once again was damaged, but not enough to curtail its operations.

Last Christmas Eve a small band of Vietcong raiders attacked the AFRTS transmitter in downtown Saigon but were driven off after an exchange of gunfire. The studio-transmitter compound is well fortified with concrete bunkers, but officials expect that the Vietcong will make other attempts to knock the station off the air.

In the countryside the 11-ton mobile vans (each costing around \$200,000) also require defenses. The one near Qui Nhon, for example, is perched near the top of an 1800-foot mountain, (hauled there by bulldozers), and the 12 men assigned to the station live up there in armed bunkers. Part of their job is to protect the 132-foot transmitter tower.

When Gen. William C. Westmoreland, commander of U.S. forces in Vietnam, cut the ribbon opening the Qui Nhon station last September, he used the sword of a Montagnard mountain tribesman, and said the proposed network would be "of great value" in bringing needed entertainment and news to troops in the actual combat zones.

The Armed Forces Radio and Television Service network in Vietnam is, actually, the first attempt ever made to bring a full diet of home TV entertainment to soldiers engaged in the day-to-day prosecution of a war.

Since any Vietnamese who happens to own, or have access to, a television set can tune in the American programs, all the shows are "screened for local sensitivities" to be sure they contain no offense to Asian dignity. Roughly 80 percent of Vietnamese are Buddhists and have strong feelings about such things as disrespect for the dead and intrafamily violence. Many resent the sight of indignities inflicted upon animals. Danny Kaye once did a Thanksgiving comedy sketch in which he dressed up as a turkey and wobbled crazily about the stage. That part of the show was not seen in Vietnam.

Enthusiasm is high among the military men for this electronic breath of home, which fosters the feeling among them that as long as those acrobats keep showing up with Ed Sullivan, the stateside scene hasn't changed very much during their year-long duty tour in Vietnam.

It is an odd fact that the Vietcong -just as easily as the Americanscan tune in My Favorite Martian or The Beverly Hillbillies, using TV sets they've either pilfered or purchased on the black market. One cannot escape the vision of a Vietcong guerrilla, crouched in his jungle foxhole, frowning at the flickering TV set before him, and trying to puzzle out the cosmological significance of Zsa Zsa Gabor bantering with Johnny Carson on The Tonight Show.

As of last Dec. 31, PX's in Vietnam had sold 46,000 TV sets to authorized military men and civilians, and new sets are arriving in the country at the rate of 10,000 per month. Long lines form every time a new shipment goes on sale, since each batch sells out.

TV GUDE's man conducted a small, private poll as to which program is most popular among Americans in Vietnam. The answer most often received? You guessed it—Combat!





# That Fellow In The Star-Spangled Underwear

... is a serious actor who still isn't guite convinced he's actually in 'Captain Nice'

It is difficult to imagine two entertainments farther apart than "The Zoo Story," Edward Albee's grim little two-character play, and *Captain Nice*, the broad "Superman" spoof which recently began a run on NBC. But there is a connection, and it may well offer a commentary on what has been happening to actors, to the American theater and to television.

In 1960, an actor named William Daniels got his first big break playing the part of Peter, the prissy little man who ends up a murderer in "The Zoo Story." His performance not only won awards for Daniels, but it impelled playwright Herb Gardner to help him get the part of the prissy social worker in "A Thousand Clowns"—a part Daniels played on Broadway and in motion pictures.

When Buck Henry, creator of Captain Nice, set about finding someone to play his nonhero, he recalled having seen an actor perfect for the part but could not recall where or in what he had seen him. Then one day he happened to pass a movie theater which was showing "A Thousand Clowns." In one of the stills displayed out front he saw the man he had been trying to find.

Thus did William Daniels go from an award-winning role in a distinguished play to the star-spangled long underwear and bedraggled blue cape of Captain Nice.

The final step in this hegira was not an easy one for the 39-year-old actor. When he arrived in Los Angeles from his native New York to make the Captain Nice pilot film, he told his parents, who had moved West several years before. "I don't know why I am here-I don't want to do this," but they encouraged him, as they had from the time they started him performing as a small child. His father said, "If you're the actor you think you are, you should be able to do anything, including be a clown." But when Daniels left for New York after completing the pilot, he "forgot" to sign his contract for the series.

After Captain Nice was sold, however, he closed up his Riverside Drive cooperative apartment and moved his wife and two small sons to California. His reasons were principally economic. As has been aptly put by an Actors Studio veteran now in Hollywood doing TV guest shots, "You don't get an Edward Albee or Arthur Miller play every week." And William Daniels had the memory of many weeks "at liberty" behind him-those first years after graduation from Northwestern University's drama school, when he got a job every three or four months while his wife made their living performing in soap operas.

It wasn't that way in earlier days. "Things always came to us as kids," Daniels says. By the time he was 6 years old, he and his sister Jackie were a song-and-dance team appearing around New York. Later, joined by their younger sister Carol, they became known as "The Daniels Family" and were doing three radio shows a week, with such future celebrities as Ralph Edwards and the late Paul Douglas as announcers.

Recollection of those early days brings a nostalgic smile to the face of the actor's mother, and his father says. "When I look back, I'd like to do it all over again." For William Daniels-although he credits show business with getting his family out of a tough Brooklyn environmentthe memories are not so warm: "It was not a normal childhood." His mother took him for tap-dancing lessons when he was barely past 3 years old. As the years and the lessons went on, he taught the routines to his sister because the family could afford only one set of lessons a week on his father's Depression wages as a bricklayer and construction worker.

Daniels' real traumatic experience, though, was the audition for Nick Kenny, a New York newspaper columnist who put on a radio show. When Mrs. Daniels first brought Bill and his sister to the studio, she discovered that the program was not interested in dancers. "Can't they sing?" she was asked. She took the children home and taught them to sing "I'll Take You Home Again, Kathleen" in unison. Back at the studio again, she found that they would have to sing harmony-so home again for lessons in harmony. Finally the big moment came. Before a small studio audience, the children began to sing. "I was off-key right from the start," Bill recalls. "My mother got up from her seat in the audience, walked down the aisle and stood beside me singing until I got on key." Years later, as assistant director of "Gypsy," Daniels saw Ethel Merman come striding out of the audience to re-enact an almost identical situation. "It was a strange sensation, seeing it all happen again," he says.

Daniels went to Northwestern in 1947 after getting out of continued

the Army. He met his wife, Bonnie, a fellow drama student, there. He chose to go to college on the advice of Howard Lindsay, co-author and star of "Life with Father," in which he appeared before being drafted in 1945. As a son in "Life with Father" (he eventually played two of them, John and Clarence), the teen-aged Daniels had his hair dyed a bright red. When he was not on stage, he wore a cap pulled down over his ears.

Back in New York after five years —two in the Army, principally in Italy, and three at Northwestern, where he got a B.S. in speech in 1950 —Daniels lived through what he calls "the toughest part of my life." He began to lose confidence in himself, eventually did not even like to go to the theater. When he learned that he was being considered for the Ben Gazzara role in the road company of

But Williams personally chose him for it, and play it he did.

"The When Zoo Story" came along, he thought he was trying out for the part of Jerry, which went to George Maharis, but it was as Peter that he won the Clarence Derwent and Obie awards, "A Thousand Clowns" followed, then "Dear Me, the Sky Is Falling," "One Flew over the Cuckoo's Nest" and "On a Clear Day," in which he sang professionally for the first time since childhood. Before Captain Nice, he also made a movie, "Two for the Road," with Audrey Hepburn.

It is as the little guy with glasses (which he really does not wear) that Daniels sees himself, although offstage he can be moody and unpredictable. He identifies *Captain Nice* with his more prestigious forebear in "The Zoo Story" and says, fatalistically, "If the public doesn't buy it, we'll just pack up and go home. I insist upon treating this as a temporary situation."

He, Bonnie, and the two children, Michael, 3, and Robert, 1, live in a furnished San Fernando Valley home rented from Gordon and Sheila Mac-Rae, Bonnie, who did not even know how to drive before moving to California, says she still feels disoriented. Daniels himself likes the movie-business hours ("You feel as if you're driving to the office in the morning"), but he misses the time he used to be able to spend with his family ("As a Broadway actor, you're home most of the day and leave about the time the kids are going to bed. Now when I get home, it's their bedtime").

Three-year-old Michael is precocious. Upon leaving a room, for instance, he will say, "Exit—stage left." When something like this happens, his mother says, "Where did he learn that?" and his father says, "Oh, my God!" As for Grandma—who started training young Bill when he was Michael's age—her eyes light up.

# A Little Depressed Fracture of the Zygomatic Arch Never Hurt Anyone...

The family doctor had finished convincing me I had a nonfatal virus and he paused there in the bedroom to watch the television set. *Iron Horse* had chugged out of the opening commercial and Ben Calhoun was fighting with an Indian named War Cloud, who belted him with half a log.

"Fractured skull," said the doctor.

"Funny," I said, "he looks better than I do."

"I once saw Ben Casey perform a frontal lobotomy," said the doctor. "That was funnier."

Ben Calhoun proved his head was all right with a roundhouse right that landed on War Cloud's cheekbone.

"If that didn't cause a depressed fracture of his zygomatic arch, I'll eat his feathers." War Cloud, obviously unaware that he had a depressed fracture of his zygomatic arch, grunted and slammed an uppercut to Ben Calhoun's jaw.

"Fractured maxillary antrum if I ever saw one," said the doctor. "Immobility for three months if they get him to a hospital fast."

A tight-lipped smile, possibly caused by his fractured maxillary antrum, played across Ben Calhoun's face. He stepped forward and drove an overhand right to War Cloud's mouth.

"That should successfully remove his middle and lateral incisors, upper and lower. Extensive orthodontic work might save his bite."

War Cloud countered with a vicious shot to Ben Calhoun's mouth.

"I hope they have the same dentist,"

said the doctor, dropping two used tongue depressors into the waste basket.

Ben Calhoun wasn't smiling any more, so it was difficult to determine what shape his incisors were in. He was mad. He yanked War Cloud's shoulders down and quickly rammed his knee into the Indian's face.

"A fractured mandible, at least, especially if his mouth was open. Certainly a fractured maxilla, with bone fragments from a shattered frontal process possibly entering the major vessels of the brain. X rays would determine the extent of the surgery."

Whatever else it did, the knee in the face straightened up War Cloud and Ben Calhoun belted him with a roundhouse right, followed closely by a roundhouse left.

"The Indian is obviously dead," said the doctor, accepting my check for a house call. "The other fellow has certainly dislocated every metacarpal bone in both hands. All things considered, he should be in a wheelchair for a month or so."

The doctor had War Cloud figured right; the Indian collapsed in a heap. But he missed out on Ben Calhoun. Ben Calhoun was in fine shape. He stood there relocating his metacarpals and ordered a flunky to tie up War Cloud. He obviously didn't know the Indian was dead.

War Cloud didn't know he was dead either. He was snarling through his intact incisors almost before he was securely tied. War Cloud appeared almost as healthy as Ben Calhoun, who never looked healthier.

A minute later, Stephen McNally or some other heavy cut War Cloud loose and hid him in a barn, but Ben Calhoun got wind of it and checked out the barn.

War Cloud immediately attacked him with a hoe. The first shot was a two-wood to the back of Ben Calhoun's neck.

"At least a dislocation of the cer-

vical vertebrae," said the doctor, pulling on his topcoat. "That would result in a transection of the spinal cord and total paralysis of all four extremities. If the upper cervical area is involved, it would paralyze the diaphragm and thoracic muscles, resulting in cessation of breathing."

Ben Calhoun shook off his dislocated vertebrae and charged War Cloud, butting the stalwart Indian to the ground. After some rolling and tumbling and a few smashes to the face, head and shoulders, Calhoun had the hoe, which he proceeded to ram into War Cloud's stomach.

"The force of that blow will temporarily inundate his autonomic nerves enough to result in pooling of blood in his gastrointestinal vessels, which should lower his blood pressure sufficiently to produce a loss of consciousness. There should also be interrupted action of the diaphragm nerves, causing a loss of breath. A ruptured spleen is not to be discounted."

Low blood pressure and all, War Cloud was on his feet. Without a thought for his spleen, he charged. This time he caught the hoe handle across the bridge of his nose.

"That would drive his frontal bones into his sinus and brain and more than likely shatter his supraorbital ridge," said the doctor, buttoning his coat and grabbing for his bag. "He might live if he finds a good surgeon."

War Cloud was still snarling, but he gave up. He obviously didn't need a doctor. There was a trickle of blood at one corner of his mouth; otherwise he was in great shape.

The doctor left, shaking his head.

Had he waited a minute, he could have marveled at Ben Calhoun. He didn't even have a trickle of blood in one corner of his mouth. He looked great. Not a mark on him. His hair was still combed and he was smiling. His middle and lateral incisors, upper and lower, never were whiter.


