

With Sen. George Murphy and Gov. Ronald Reagan firmly settled in public life, and Sen. Everett Dirksen just as solidly ensconced as a recording and television personality, we obviously can look forward to more of the same. You know politics-one year it's businessmen, the next year it's lawyers. And you know television-one year it's Westerns, the next year it's situation comedies. Now it's politicians. Not that they're anything new to home screens. They're all over the place already, on Today, Face the Nation, Meet the Press, and even David Susskind's forays into understanding. They're also turning up on the Johnny Carson and Merv Griffin shows

It all started a long, long time ago. Greek crowds were first entertained, then angered, by Socrates. Nero of Rome often appeared before the populace playing the lyre, which, if you'll forgive us a small joke, is what some politicians have been doing ever since. Then there was William Jennings Bryan, who, between Presidential campaigns, toured the country making his "Cross of Gold" speech, an oration so moving—at the time—that it was often classified as prime entertainment.

They say that Chuck Connors, with three television series, some movies and some baseball seasons in his background, is a natural for politics. John Wayne's name has been mentioned, as has Robert Vaughn's though not in the same breath, for their politics differ greatly.

• As for the politics-to-show-business move, many of the new governors are handsome—sure-fire TV-star material.

At this point the trend couldn't do any harm to either American politics or American television.

I knew him a few years later when he loosened up a little and was able to talk about things like

Vince Baby Plays It Cool

Eduardo Zoino, the Italian bricklaver's son: and how he used to hang around backstage at "A Streetcar Named Desire" with old buddy Nick Dennis, the Greek actor, hoping that some of Marlon Brando might rub off on him, and how it didn't for a long and how time frustrating it was. I saw the nervous looks on his producers' faces when he discovered what his real power was.

I was around, too, when Vince got the itch to be a movie star.

When he got it, he didn't fool. He wanted to be Paul Newman, Little matter that other celebrated graduates of TV's Instant Success school languished by the wayside in droves, and that those who did make it - Mc-Queen, Garner, Van Dyke, Marvin-were not exactly Cary Grant. Superstar he would be. Hadn't somebody seen fit to invest upwards of \$40,000,000 in

him for five years of *Casey*? Weren't sponsors willing to pay \$41,000 a commercial minute for the pleasure of his company? Hadn't the whole experience enriched him personally to the tune of \$3,000,000, give or take a few dollars? Why couldn't he do it in pictures?

Shortly before he finished his chores in *Casey* early last year, he signed a contract with Columbia. For a TV star it was otherworldly. It was a nonexclusive two-picture, twoyear, play-or-pay arrangement which included such hard-to-come-by concessions as script and director approval, star billing above the title, and a minimum budget of \$1,750,000.

Then-nothing. It appeared that Vince Baby had priced himself out of the market. As time wore on, less and less was heard from Columbia. Not that he didn't have plenty of offers. He did. But they were "schlock pictures," he said. TV he automatically turned down, unless someone asked him to sing. He turned down some of the most lucrative series offers ever made a TV-spawned star. He turned down The Monk, in which he was to play a Bogart-like detective, with a pilot by Blake ("The Great Race") Edwards, produced by Danny Thomas and Aaron (Burke's Law) Spelling. So sure was ABC of the irresistibility of this combination that the network was offering a firm twoyear commitment (unheard of) and enough money to finance Vince Baby into the hereafter. He "loved" the character so much he cried, and for a while was answering his telephone as "Mr. Monk," but he turned it down anyway.

"You gotta have the right attitude," he insisted. "Don't appear too eager. Vamp a while Do night clubs. If you're a singer—and I am—sing. Look busy. Think big. Change your image. Back yourself with as much insurance as possible. Make deals while you're hot. Then hold out for the Big League stuff."

So Vince did all these things. He

played The Hollywood Palace, The Roger Miller Show, The Andy Williams and The Dean Martin Shows. The Copacabana in New York, the Shoreham in Washington, Harrah's in Reno. He took a full-page ad in the New York Daily News and a whole billboard on the Sunset Strip. "VIN-CENT EDWARDS AT THE COPA." it announced over his profile. He signed with Kama-Sutra Records and cut a single, "To Be with You." He made a deal for his company, Vincent Edwards Productions, with Screen Gems for five pilots, no one of which has yet seen daylight. Always he searched for movie properties-"something that knocks me out," he said.

He slicked up the Image. He began getting cost estimates for a new \$350,-000 house in Bel-Air, next door to Red Skelton. He got himself a new mod tailor, a new Jay Sebring haircut, a new press agent-the type who lives in a penthouse off the Sunset Stripand a new girl, Linda Foster, English. (He was divorced from his wife, actress Kathy Kersh, about 16 months ago.) He began to swing. The old coffee hustling entourage-Benny Goldberg, the ex-pug; Ray Joyer, his stand-in and weight-lifting buddy; George Frazier, the ex-lion tamergave way to something much spiffier. He now palled around with Harold ("The Carpetbaggers") Robbins and the fun-loving, 5-foot-1 Aaron Spelling, who calls Vincent his "itty-bitty buddy" and leads the cheering at the Daisy discothèque.

He showed up at the chic parties by agent Freddie Fields and wife Polly Bergen, by singer Eddie Fisher, by modiste Jack Hanson. He gave *intime* little dinner parties, complete with wine list, in the private room at Scandia, made the scene at the Daisy, became a regular at the new In restaurants like Matteo's and Martoni's, and began to live it up in the new Vince Edwards manner. continued

He even changed his management. Abby Greshler, his old partner and the man who made him, found himself replaced by a four-man board of experts consisting of Fields, business manager Bill Hayes—the man who put together the Koufax-Drysdale baseball coup last spring—Sy Taub, a hot-shot Los Angeles lawyer, and press agent Gene Schwam—described by Edwards as "the class of the flackers." Vince Baby, chairman of the board!!

I am just mulling all this over in my head and the press agent is telling me how Vince is cooling it at the horse track these days, when Vince comes in. He is dressed in a navyblue, custom-tailored Joe Klapperman jacket with brass buttons, and a fire-engine red shirt open at the neck. Gone is the familiar Ben Casey pompadour. In its place a limp lock of hair traversing the forehead in the typical Sebring manner. It gives him a softer, less ferocious look.

He sits down, apologizes for being late, waves to "my old flacker," press agent Milton Weiss, across the room, orders scrambled eggs and coffee with a shot of anisette, and begins to talk. For a millionaire, he talks well. He gives-right away that's different. He's full of his new house with its steam bath and its private gym and its elevator and its closed-circuit TV and its nine bathrooms. He's full of his baby daughter, Devera, whom he sees twice a week. Of the new beige and black Cadillac Eldorado he has ordered. Of his new career-not so much a career, really, as an assault on the citadels of vested interest. And he wears his anger well, now that he has cooled it.

"I'm at bat," he says, jamming the anisette into the coffee and waving a forkful of egg at me. "Everything depends on hitting that long ball. I'm waiting for the fat pitch.

"When *Casey* finally ended, it was like the end of a five-year run on Broadway. Oh, it wasn't really a drag. The first two years were exciting, the third less so, the fourth and fifth just hard work, and anybody who says different is a damn liar. But it gave me a shot at directing—10 shows and that ain't bad—and I'm not knocking it, but you want to get out and do other things, and it makes a man a little touchy.

"In the early years I was a little hostile, but you grow out of that and realize that everybody's got a job to do.

"I told myself I'm going to take my time and not going to go for the first sucker pitch offered. I wouldn't make a thing like "The American Dream' if you paid me! It has to be right. Sometimes it's a little film. 'Darling.' 'Room at the Top.' But when it's not there you vamp till ready."

Vinnie is suddenly his old fierce, scowling self. "What TV actors have really broken through? Not very many, Know why? It's pure snobbery. The men who run this town are sitting on a bonanza and they don't know it! They're fools. Otherwise they'd be breaking the doors down trying to get TV stars. But, oh, no, they'd rather import something with an accent that covers a multitude of bad acting. Put Johnny Carson in the right movie and I know where my money would be. On Carson. Dean Martin? Hell, man, TV-not movies-made him a household word, and Dick Van Dyke had a helluva lot more for 'Mary Poppins' than Julie Andrews ever did."

The nervous look begins to creep back into the press agent's face. Vince Baby glares at him. "When I give an interview, I give an interview," he says. It turns out that he has been up for quite a number of movies

that went to Richard Harris. And quite a lot he wasn't up for, but would like to have been, also went to Harris. "I just want the same shot they give Harris," Vince Baby grumbles. "And I'd get it if American producers weren't the biggest snobs in the world. I was up for 'King Rat' —it went to George Segal. George Segal!!? I was up for 'The Chase.' Robert Redford got the part. They want Newman, Brando, McQueen, Harris, Sinatra, Hudson. I'm just the guy who had 30, 40 million viewers every week, that's all."

So the fact that a year has gone by and Columbia has done nothing about that "dream" contract produces some below-the-surface bitterness in Vince Baby.\* He would like to do "Funny Girl" and wanted to do "In Cold Blood." ["In Cold Blood" has been cast recently but apparently Vince has not gotten a role—Ed.] They are "right." But so far nobody has broken down any doors asking him.

"I won't settle for second best," he says suddenly. "Oh, you tell the columns you'll go with your own production in March. But even that's a trap. If it doesn't pan out, after a while nobody believes anything.

"You need a little mozel [luck]. You pray a little. You build excitement with activity. Night clubs! Records! Publicity! Keep yourself hot. Go. Go. Go. And wait for your best shot . . ."

So Vince Baby go-go-goes. It is later that same week. There are cocktails at 7:30 in Schwam's penthouse. A young director and his wife are present. The young director happens to be casting a picture in which there is a possible role for Vince. Linda is there. Her eyes are on Vince Baby. Vince Baby's eyes are on the director. And the director's eyes are roving, as if he were canvassing for a new edition of "Who's Who."

At 9:30 there are steamed clams at

the Oyster House—it is not an In restaurant but Vinnie thinks maybe he'll make it In. A game is played. It's called Mention Old-Time Movie Stars. You get three points for a Rochelle Hudson and five for a Toby Wing. Vince Baby loves the game and he is very good at it.

Then on to the Daisy for fun-funfun! But, of course, it is not all funfun-fun because it never is at the Daisy. There is a lot of striving for fun, and a lot of looking around to see who else is having fun, and how they look having fun, and a lot of feeling that you must be having fun. Vince knows the name of the game. He moves from table to table to billiard room-where he borrows Mickey Callan's cue and takes on his press agent. He huddles with the director. He talks to Linda. He even gets up and frugs.


And he is having fun because, if you are Vincent Edwards, acceptance is fun, and the novelty has not yet had time to wear off. Besides, this is the place where business is conducted -his kind of business. This is where it's happening. This is where it's at. And this is where Vince Baby wants to be.

So a smile replaces the Casey frown. He is still smiling at 1:30 A.M. when the parking boy brings up the old Continental. (The new Cadillac hasn't arrived yet.) At the same moment an actor in a sand-beige Rolls with matching camel's-hair coat is just arriving.

"Hey, Vince!" the actor yells. "You can't leave now. The fun's just beginning, baby! We'll make it begin."

Vinnie leans out, waves, smiles at the recognition, and shoves the big black car in gear. "See yuh later. Gotta go, baby, gotta go!"

## C'est La Vie!

Diahann Carrol! (above) went to Paris and made a TV special with Maurice Chevalier. It's called "C'est la Vie," and you'll see it on ABC Stage 67 Feb. 23. It's noteworthy for a number of reasons, one being that it is one of Monsieur Chevalier's rare TV appearances; and another being that the sets employed by producerdirector Jean-Christophe Averty, are certainly among the most imaginative ever used.

Borrowing from Op, Pop and psychedelic art, the sets create an illusionary—almost surrealistic—environment for what should be a remarkable TV experience.

And now that we have been, we think it's only fair to tell you what these people are like. In the first place they're "just like us"which is bad news to begin with. In the second place, since their own planet "in a distant galaxy" is apparently doomed, they are studying us with the idea of making our planet theirs. You know the type-they think they own the earth. Finally, with their uncanny sense of timing, they have landed, it seems, just in time for the "Second Season"-not realizing, obviously, that it's been a tough TV year down here too.


The only one who stands between us and Them is architect David Vincent (Roy Thinnes), who was "lost one night on a lonely country road, looking for a shortcut he never found . . ." Does that remind you of anything? Well, you guessed it-The Invaders is executively produced by Mr. Quinn Martin, who gave us The Fugitive. Anyway, Vincent not only has to contend with Them, he also has to contend with our people who are in the power of Them as well as our people who actually are Them. Furthermore, you can't tell whether one of Them is one of Them or just in the power of Them unless they get headaches and take pills and things; and, even after you do get it all straight, our guess is you're not even going to trust the commercials.

In our favorite Invaders episode so far, literally everything happened to Vincent. First, he was hit over the head by a couple of Mexicans. Then he met a strip teaser named Vikki (Suzanne Pleshette), who had actually seen Them. "All of a sudden," she said, "I saw the Thing. Lights flashing, like 20,000 jet engines, it was some kind of frantic!" Well, a girl like that, as you can imagine, is some kind of helpful! Anyway, it turns out she actually is one of Them. "You wanted to help me," he says. "Why? Why?" "You're living," she says. "Why don't you let it go at that? Just trust me." "I can't trust you," he says, "you're one of Them!" "All right," she says, "I'm an alien. But I am to Them too. Ever since I was little I had this difference. My father had it too."

Well, it's differences like that, we always say, that prove the need for better communication. But don't worry, there is hope. The Invaders can be shot. The only trouble is, once you shoot Them, they just disintegrate and leave no trace. So. afterwards, there is no evidence for poor Vincent that they were ever there in the first place. All in all, a great show for the kids, but for the rest of you, our advice is to join New Jersey and take to the hills.

## **TV Turns to Broadway Musicals**

A network president shook his head dolefully the other day when asked about the prospects for something refreshing in his prime-time lineup for next fall. "How many ways," he grumbled, "are there of doing a situation comedy?" His unanswerable question was symptomatic of the deadly chore it has become to drum up weekly series. Nevertheless these are anything but humdrum days in TV's programming suites. There are trends in the wind, and sensitive plotters of TV fare are sniffing them excitedly. It began with "Death of a Salesman" touching off a rebirth of dramatic classics. Then "Bridge on the River Kwai" triggered an all-out frenzy to grab big movies. Most recently, the first CBS Playhouse, "The Final War of Olly Winter," spurred hopes for more original drama on TV.

Least noticed as a developing enthusiasm is the networks' quiet search for Broadway properties, inspired by the delighted response last fall to ABC's "Brigadoon." A surprising start has been made. ABC has booked "Carousel" for this spring, "Kismet" for next season. NBC is bringing on "Annie Get Your Gun" on March 19 and "Damn Yankees" on April 8. Richard Rodgers is composing a musical edition of Shaw's "Androcles and the Lion" for NBC, and CBS will tape a current two-man Broadway show, "At the Drop of Another Hat," for 1967-68 showing.

Why hasn't TV tapped the vast Broadway musical mine before? "M-O-N-E-Y," a network VP spelled out. "We weren't spending that kind of dough in the past." Skyrocketing prices for old movies drove TV spending to a height where Broadway's showmen became interested in putting up stage properties.

Networkers are cagey about what shows, past or current, they're after. "We don't want to drive the rights prices still higher," an official explained. Will many of the musical comedies have to be cleaned up a bit to be fit for home audiences? "Not much," an NBC executive thought. "The movies for one thing, have made TV audiences a lot more sophisticated than they used to be." For "Damn Yankees" only one song, he guessed, would have to be either edited or deleted.

CBSers long resigned to futile Bonanza-busting, could hardly believe their eyes. In recent years the network has hurled in vain everything from Judy Garland to a gorgeous robot (My Living Doll) at the highriding Cartwrights. There was hardly a glimmer of hope that the Smothers Brothers, fresh from a flop situation comedy, would fare any better. But when the overnight Arbitrons arrived, there was the all-but-unbelievable: CBS's new variety hour, unveiled Feb. 5 with Ed Sullivan, Jim Nabors and Jill St. John as guests, ran neck-andneck with top-rated Bonanza. "Ours not to reason why," sighed a happy CBS press agent.-Richard K. Doan

## THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

LONELY ARE THE BRAVE (NBC), Saturday THE SCORPIO LETTERS (ABC), Sunday THE WAR OF THE WORLDS (NBC), Tuesday TAKE HER, SHE'S MINE (ABC), Wednesday TWO FOR THE SEESAW (CBS), Thursday BREAKFAST AT TIFFANY'S (CBS), Friday

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

High-brow or low, young in heart or years, you'll be hard-pressed not to find something of value in this week's mixed network-movie bag. The tailored-for-television offering, "The Scorpio Letters," follows the current spy route, but variety's the keynote in the Hollywood oldies and two French classics at hand.

Officially for children, but so far a special treat, too, for adults, the CBS Sunday afternoon film festival tops the week's entries with a double feature. Its two Oscar-winning offerings are "The Red Balloon," a lovely lyrical soaked-in-Parisian-atmosphere tale of a lonely little boy who finds an immense balloon with a mind of its own; and "The Golden Fish," a charming live-action Parisian idyll about a boy, a fish, a canary and a cat. Both are in beautiful color and they epitomize just the kind of offbeat movie gem which is ideal for television.

On the officially adult level, comedy predominates. Top choice is "Breakfast at Tiffany's," with Audrey Hepburn so enchanting as Truman Capote's amoral and pixy-ish Holly Golightly that the brief bog-downs and conventional ending are easily forgiven. Holly, you'll recall, couldn't make it as heroine of a Broadway musical this season, but two Broadway hits, "Take Her, She's Mine" and "Two for the Seesaw," made the reverse transition. "Take Her," better than the play, would nevertheless be just another Daddy-is-a-doting-dope situation comedy were it not for James Stewart's utterly beguiling endurance as the all-American father of an all-American "dish," with fine bits by Audrey Meadows and Robert Morley for lagniappe.

"Two for the Seesaw," a poignant two-character comedy about an abortive romance between a lawyer from Omaha and a girl from the Bronx, suffers in transition, primarily because Robert Mitchum and Shirley MacLaine aren't the characters created by Henry Fonda and Anne Bancroft. But William Gibson's bright and touching dialog is worth hearing and will evoke a little laughter and even, girls, a tear or two.

On the serious side and that of quality as well, there's "Lonely Are the Brave," a more-than-Western in its story of a present-day cowboy who is an anachronism in our civilization and in its thesis that there's little room for the nonconformist in our neonand-motel civilization. Kirk Douglas gives a beautiful and moving portrait of the nonconformist cowboy on the run, and Walter Matthau a 'nigh perfect one of the sheriff whose sympathies are with his quarry.

And just for watching, there's "The War of the Worlds," roughly based on the H. G. Wells novel. It's the old invasion-of-the-earth routine by strange creatures from outer space, but I think you'll agree that producer George Pal more than deserved the Oscar he won for creating the special effects, let alone the creatures.







SPECIAL COLOR Producer Ted Yates concludes his three-part "Battle for Asia" series with a report on Indonesia, where Communism took one of its biggest gambles—and lost.

The program examines the abortive coup of Oct. 1, 1966 when Communist terror squads tried to seize control of the government in a single night. The plot backfired, resulting in the arrest of nearly half a million Indonesian Communists. The bloodshed and property damage, Yates says, has left the country in "utter, complete ruin."

Cameras focus on the long and costly process of rebuilding Indonesia: attempts to relieve food shortages; the construction of desperately needed housing facilities; and the reforms begun by General Suharto's New Order.



'It's 2 o'clock, and nobody's opened the peanut butter yet'

A day with Dean Martin BY LESLIE RADDATZ

It is 11 o'clock of a sunny California Sunday morning as the gray Ghia roars up to the loading platform adjoining the prop shop behind NBC's Burbank studios. Out jumps that celebrated tippler, Dean Martin. He hurries across the loading platform, through the prop shop and into Studio 4, where, in the next 12 hours of the one day a week he devotes to television, he will rehearse and tape another edition of *The Dean Martin Show*. He has been up since 6 o'clock. He breakfasted before 7, and by 7:45 had embarked upon nine holes of golf at the Bel-Air Country Club. He left there just in time to get to NBC by 11.

("Don't they know I don't want to do this show?" he has said. But somehow you don't believe it, and you doubt that he believes it himself. Like another apparently relaxed, don'tgive-a-damn performer named Crosby, Dean Martin seems to need work and to thrive on it. In addition to 30 television shows, each year he does four feature pictures and a couple of engagements in Las Vegas.)

It is almost 1 o'clock. Dean Martin is in his dressing room, watching the run-through of his show on a color monitor. He has been rehearsing the musical numbers with Les Brown's orchestra, but now stand-ins do his routines with Allen & Rossi and Eddie Foy Jr. This keeps continued

the jokes from becoming stale for Martin. "He works best when he's spontaneous," says his agent and longtime friend Mort Viner, who is in the dressing room with him. Also there are two aides-de-camp, Jay Gerard and Mack Grev. The latter is something of a Hollywood legend. When he worked for George Raft years ago, he was known as "Killer" Grey and was thought to be an exhoodlum bodyguard for the star. Eventually it was discovered that he had originally been called "Killah," the Yiddish word for hernia, an affliction from which he suffered. Mack is listed as "Music Co-ordinator" in the credits for The Dean Martin Show. Dean calls to Jay Gerard for a Scotch and water, but Jay has stepped out, so Mack Grey gets it.

(Probably the questions most frequently asked about Dean Martin are,



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"How much does he really drink?" and, "Is he really drunk when he does the show?" The answer to the first is guite a bit—he nips pretty steadily throughout the day, and there's a man standing by with a refreshing draft between numbers while he is rehearsing and doing the show. As for the second, the answer is of course not. As someone close to the show asks, "How could a drunk get up at 6 o'clock in the morning, play nine holes of golf and then spend the rest of the day working on a show he's never even seen before, with music cues, tricky arrangements and all the rest of it?" Mort Viner, who has been with him since early in his career, says, "I've never seen Dean drunk when he had a show to do.")

In the dressing room, someone looks at the peanut butter and crackers on the table and says, "It's 2 o'clock. and nobody's opened the peanut butter yet." Dean has been on-stage, rehearsing a song with Leslie Uggams and the "Music Room" segment with his accompanist, Ken Lane. He took his Scotch with him. Now. back in the dressing room once more. he waits for a doctor to arrive and give him a shot. He has not entirely recovered from a cold and laryngitis of a few weeks before. When the doctor comes, he is wearing a tennis sweater. He makes a joke about the portion of Dean's anatomy where he will administer the shot. Because of that illness of Dean's, Ella Fitzgerald, Phil Harris and Sally Ann Howes, who were on earlier shows, have been called in today to do "pickups" after the regular hour show is taped-the reason that today's rehearsal and taping will run longer than usual. While Dean is in another room getting his shot, the program's director, Greg Garrison, says, "The old man's going to be beat by the time this is over." When Dean comes back, he complains about having had to get to work so early: "I could have been sleeping. Jeannie dragged me to a party last night."

(According to an old friend, "Dean is an early-to-bed, early-to-rise guy. He's always up at 6 o'clock. And he hates parties. He probably doesn't go to more than three or four a year. This party he mentioned, he doubleparked and left his motor running that shows how long he planned to stay." Once, when some of his children were having a party with a rock 'n' roll group providing the music, Dean couldn't sleep. Finally he called the police and said, "I'm a neighbor of the Martins, and they're making too much noise over there.")

Three of the seven Martin children are in the dressing room while Dean and his entourage eat crackers with peanut butter from the now-opened jar, and watch a closed-circuit telecast of the show he taped the week before-a Sunday afternoon ritual. Craig Martin-a handsome young man who looks like his father but is shy and quiet-is production co-ordinator of The Dean Martin Show. Two daughters, Claudia and Deana, have just dropped in, and one sits on each side of her father as everyone watches the color monitor. After one of Dean's songs Deana applauds. Dean himself laughs at all the jokes. Some performers, like the aforementioned George Raft, refuse to see themselves on the screen. Others, like Shelley Winters, study their performances carefully with a view to improving their acting techniques. Still others just sit back and enjoy themselves. Dean Martin belongs to this group. and his children seem to enjoy him as much as he does.

(Dean's family, like his drinking and his relaxed attitude, have become part of the Martin mystique. The warmth that is apparent between Dean and his children in the dressing room is an extension of the atmosphere at home. "He never lectures them or sets himself above them," says a friend. Because of the children and their friends' being constantly about, however, the Martins had difficulty keeping help. They finally hired a short-order cook to prepare hamburgers at any time of day.)

It is 8 o'clock in the evening before the taping of the show begins, and the jar of peanut butter is really empty. Dean has taken off the black turtleneck sweater, beige slacks and bedroom slippers he has worn all day, and is now dressed in a tuxedo.

He wanders on-stage, glass in hand, and announces, "This isn't *The Andy Williams Show* with the cookies and milk." Indeed it isn't. Dean's casual humor during the warmup and breaks in the show ranges from the corny to the mildly scatological.

While the other acts are on, he returns to his dressing room and watches on the monitor there. But he never lets the show die. Between acts, while technical adjustments are being made or scenes changed, he keeps talking. Once, when a makeup man comes on-stage to wipe the perspiration from his face, he says, "That's the Coke comin' out," and the audience roars. The jokes in the show, which are written on cards, take on a new dimension now. An associate says, "In the rehearsal, he iust reads the jokes-he doesn't do them." Some of them, which he read perfectly at rehearsal, he now pretends he can't make out and squints at the cards. The audience roars.

By the time the show is done, it is 11 o'clock. Dean is wringing wet, but he does not change clothes or even remove his makeup. He and Mort Viner leave the studio together for the Villa Nova, an Italian restaurant.

Usually after dinner he and Viner go home and play a little pool on the table in Dean's house. "He's usually all keyed up after a show," says Viner. But not tonight. It is after Midnight, and it has been a long day.

## A NEW LIGHT FOR

It is 5:30 of an African evening. The lions are eating something or someone and the cobras are dreaming of record spits. You are sitting in your living room in the suburbs of Nairobi, the mile-high capital of the Republic of Kenya. You've checked the schedule (that's pronounced shed-yule here) in the newspaper, The Daily Nation, and now wait anxiously for the first serving.

A test pattern pops onto the tube of your 19-inch set, manufactured by the friendly Murphy Co. Ltd. folk of England. The test pattern shakes as if held by a nervous human hand. It is neld by such a hand. For background music, there is an eerie chant. You wonder if the rite involved is of the fertility or war type. Anyway, you take comfort that it is all on tape and not on the lips of new neighbors or unexpected visitors.

Then it happens and you are there: African TV.

"Jambo," says the pert, sepia-skinned beauty in a gay, printed dress. "Hii sauti ya Kenya TV." If you don't speak Swahili, no worry. She will soon explain, in English, that this means "Hello, this is the voice of Kenya."

Next comes the playing of "Wimbo Wa Taifa." That means "Song of the Nation," the national anthem. Then it is off to 5½ hours of TV in doses of sometimes spotty English, rhythmic Swahili and, unless you're an Asian, confounding Hindustani.

The night's range of programming is from *The Fugitive* and *Harbari* (news) to a filmed soccer match featuring West Ham versus Munich and an African comedy called *Jamaa Ya Mzee Pembe*, the lively local answer to *The Jack Benny Program*, which also appears.

If the weather has been good and if no one's thrown the wrong switch or gone snoring, at 11 P.M. it all ends with *Maombi*, night prayers offered up daily by the robed curators of the various cathedrals and mosques of the East African community.

The whole evening is brought to you courtesy of such leading merchants as Damji Devji jewelers, the House of Nanji sweets, and Vivatone dry cleaning—with an assortment of toilet flush, *posho*, and ready-made *saree* peddlers tossed in.

Today across the once dark continent the light that is TV comes on nightly to 18 nations out of 40 possibles. Though there are at best one million sets for the nearly 300 million people of Africa, to these newly independent countries a TV station is as

much a status symbol as that first vote in the United Nations. Despite revolutions, coups, elephants who take transmitter towers for back scratchers. and silly giraffes who keep garroting themselves on feeder wires, not one of the African TV stations has gone out of business permanently. That, incidentally, is a better record than some of the governments have. Most African leaders insist "our TV is for educational purposes," yet somehow it often provides more laughs than lessons. An electrical storm can bring three days of silence. So can a bad cold for the chief (and only) engineer.

Out in what is called the bush, where there is community TV viewing, there is also the occasional glassshattering moment of truth. That comes when a watching warrior in the often gamy audience suddenly tosses his spear at the unsuspecting heavy while shouting, "Angalia, angalia" or "Beware, beware." It takes weeks to replace the parts.

Still, since the Western Region of the Republic of Nigeria kicked off the African TV craze in 1959, newly independent nations have been studious in their endeavor to bring TV to the people in the bush. Rural electrification is way down on the government priority lists, but self-contained power

generators are being moved into isolated areas to push this community viewing. The locals are loyal fans. Some have to walk 10 miles through animal kingdoms to be on hand for the latest happening to Lassie.

Being people who enjoy a good joke, the Africans are very big TV commercial watchers. With planning and hard work, the commercials can appear upside down, backwards or not at all. Viewers have grown accustomed to hearing the announcer pitch "the best for lubrication" of an oil company when the camera is on a bottle of Tusker beer. One of the biggest promotions these days is Esso's attempt to put an Indian tiger in the African tank. The biggest result it has thus far had is to put a deep chuckle in African throats.

The Chinese and Russians have attempted to flood this important market with their canned films, which are often a form of political commercial. There is something about a steady diet of Peking juggling teams and Moscow State Circus acts, however, that bores the African. He'd much rather fall off a rock watching the dizzy doings of *The Lucy Show* or bang the shaft of his spear at the latest plight of the boys from *Bonanza*. This does not **continued**  mean the Africans are necessarily pro-Western, just pro-action and variety.

Some African nations that are nonaligned have found that, politics be damned, Yankee know-how is the best way to successful and economical TV. The steamy little banana republic of Uganda is a good example. There the station was built by Harry Engel, Yankee. A Runyonesque character in sight and sound, the 47-year-old New Yorker arrived in Uganda in 1962. His soft sell to the president was instant and cut-rate TV. In eight months he built a complete TV operation for \$168,000. The big surprise was that it even sometimes worked. Result is that Harry is now known as "Bwana TV" around the studio. For good reason. Uganda TV boasts the continent's biggest studio because Harry big-talked the government out of the old hospital building. At 500 feet, its TV mast is Africa's tallest, thanks to a surplus of masts on the Japanese second-hand market.

Engel is a real doer. When Uganda's president, Apollo Milton Obote, reminded Engel that his station was also to provide educational programs, Harry, who is a self-confessed highschool dropout, started morning TV. It is most unusual in Africa because that's the time when goats, chickens, maize, and backyard stills for making

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pombe have to be tended to. From 10 A.M. to Noon, however, people in and around the city of Kampala on the shore of Lake Victoria can take biology, lessons in mathematics. Shakespeare, even French, Harry has also recently put on a Saturday morning special for youngsters. It is a three-hour fun fare of Robin Hood, Huckleberry Hound and The Adventures of Twizzle. The youngsters have a time getting anywhere within viewing distance; the sets are usually surrounded and under giggly siege by their wide-eyed parents and tribal elders.

Engel is not the big *bwana* to all men, however. British TV-set manufacturers, and their Uganda agents, who once reckoned the former colony as a shoo-in for their equipment, puff up purple at the mention of his name.

It seems that when Harry was hired to set up the station, he received the title of "official advisor to the President on TV matters." One day when the station was half up, President Obote called Harry to his office. He needed official advice from his official advisor; to wit, which sets to buy.

Engel gave the question some thought—about 30 seconds' worth. He recommended a firm he had heard nice things about called Intercontinental Services, Ltd. Sign them up, said the president. Now it just so happened that Harry owned this firm. Harry ended up with an exclusive to supply the nation's set needs and the British have been crying "foul" from under their bowlers ever since.

Kenya's three-year-old governmentrun operation is quite indicative of what is going on in African TV. The 5000-watt station, called VOK (for Voice of Kenya) cost \$3 million to build and house. Technical assistance came from a consortium that included NBC and 20th Century-Fox. The station was nationalized in 1964 and Africanized (Africans replacing Europeans in jobs) in 1965. Now in 1967


it is capable of bringing a stimulating selection of programs to 12,000 set owners and renters (very big at \$12.50 per month for a 23-inch screen) and 100.-000 African, Asian and European viewers (out of a 10 million population). African housewives learn how to cook from TV, men learn trades. There are films about the government, speeches by the politicians, lectures for the workers on topics of everyday value such as legal hints for the layman and the divorce laws of tribe and country. There are the series like Man from U.N.C.L.E. and Sky King. Mr. Merryweather's Gardening Hints is aimed at the rose fanciers of the nation, who include the president, Jomo Kenvatta. Waandishi Wauliza is Kenya's version of Meet the Press, and the panel of African journalists suffers no shyness when it comes to putting the politician on the carpet with questions about income, leanings and wives.

Morris Mwendar, Kenya's Americantrained controller of programming, explained the station's philosophy: "The people watch not only what is seen but also what is said. So our shows must be nonaligned because Kenya is nonaligned. We must always consider what the government policy is at the time and follow it." Kenyans are certainly safe from any ideology-pitching in the movie area. Most of the American films shown on VOK are from an era that predates the East-West conflict.

Cowboy series with excessive brutality don't make it past Mwendar either. "Too much bang-ing, bang-ing is no good for our people," he says. "They too can get wrong ideas from violence." Indeed, as much as the government and parents fight it in Kenya—and in other African countries—the heroes of the teen-agers are usually not the presiding president, or even the late Patrice Lumumba, but rather the latest gunslinger seen on TV. Tribal elders wonder where it will all lead, and that sounds familiar.




