## Star Trek

The mission of the "Star Ship" Enterprise is to seek out and discover new worlds—"To boldly go," as is stated each week, "where no man has gone before." In other words, Enterprise not only splits the infinite—but, horror of horrors, infinitives, too. And quite a trip this good ship has each week.

The Enterprise has plenty of fun places to go, and, make no mistake about it, it has fun people to go to those fun places. First of all, there is Captain Kirk (William Shatner). who's pretty close to the last of the clean-cutters. When he says sternly. "Affirmative" or "Negative" to some scheming girl yeoman, you just know -well, he yeomeans it. Second, there is his space mate, Mr. Spock (Leonard Nimoy), a "science officer" who not only has pointed ears but also, we are told, a "precise, logical turn of mind [which he] inherited from his father, a native of the planet Vulcanis, who married an Earth woman." (We've

warned you men before about marrying below you.) Third, there is Dr. McCoy (DeForest Kelley) who is, we are also informed, "the oldest and most experienced space traveler on the ship." (If he's too old for you, girls, look at it this way-200 years from now, what will it matter?) And fourth and fifth, there are Mr. Sulu (George Takei), "the helmsmen," and Lieutenant Uhura (Nichelle Nichols), a beautiful Negro communications officer. Altogether, they're so darn well-integrated internationally that it seems a pity to waste them on outer space. We need them right here on Earth.

Most of the trips, of course, involve shoot-'em-ups of one sort or another. Our favorite trip was to a beautiful planet where the crew saw, in short order, a large White Rabbit, a small Alice ("You follow the rabbit," Shatner barks, "and I'll backtrack the girl"), a Don Juan, a tiger, a Japanese samurai, a German strafing plane, a Black Knight (apparently a loser in the Ajax contest), as well as a rather hazy girl friend of Captain Kirk's of 15 years before (Shirley Bonne) and a man named Finnegan (Bruce Mars), an upperclassman who had actually hazed Kirk at the Space Academy. Even when it turned out that all these hallucinations were hallucinated up by the crewmen themselves, we still weren't out of the woods because one of them, the Black Knight, looked like the real McCoyor at least real enough to kill Dr. McCoy. "It's my fault!" cried yeoman Tonia Barrows (Emily Banks), who had hallucinated up both Don Juan and the Black Knight, "I'm to blame!" But Captain Kirk shook her. "I need every crewman alert," he said. "Face front. Don't talk. Don't think. Don't breathe!" It was good advice-and in our opinion the best way for an adult to watch this show. For the kids, though, let 'em breathe. Let 'em even hallucinate. They'll love it.

CBS plans a TV version of "Spoon River Anthology" for next season, to be produced by JOE CATES, who did the show on Broadway. It'll be filmed partly in Illinois . . . Peyton Place players PAT MORROW, CHRIS CONNELLY, TIM O'CONNOR and ED NELSON are all set for a USO tour of Vietnam . . . BOB NEWHART signed for a role on the lame-duck Captain Nice series, which was not renewed for next season . . . JOEY BISHOP's late-night show, starting April 17, will originate from the ABC Vine Street Theater in Los Angeles, once the home of radio shows.

JOEL GREY, of the hit Broadway musical "Cabaret," will be a guest star on BARBRA STREISAND's next CBS special, which focuses on American vaudeville at the turn of the century . . . The <u>Today</u> show plans a week of remote broadcasts from Southern California around the end of April; and in mid-July will do three shows from the Expo '67 fair in Montreal.

CBS follows up its "Final War of Olly Winter" with a REGINALD ROSE story called "Dear Friends." The drama will be produced by HERBERT BRODKIN (The Defenders, The Doctors and the Nurses, etc.) for the CBS Playhouse series . . . JOAN BLONDELL comes to a TV series next season in Mrs. Thursday on ABC. RICHARD CRENNA (Slattery's People) is executive producer.

On April 16, G-E College Bowl marks its 300th broadcast since its debut on Jan 4, 1959 . . . Next season CBS will do a 90-minute biographical drama based on the life of CHEKHOV. Called "Good Times, Bad Times," it will star Sir JOHN GIELGUD, Dame PEGGY ASHCROFT, DOROTHY TUTIN and WENDY HILLER. JONATHAN MILLER is the director.

Hollywood Palace's upcoming lineup has TONY MARTIN and CYD CHARISSE on April 8; MILTON BERLE April 15 (with guests LEO DUROCHER, WILLIE MAYS and MAURY WILLS); BING CROSBY May 13 (with FRANCES LANGFORD, DON AMECHE, BARBARA McNAIR and LOUIS NYE) . . . PATRICE WYMORE, widow of ERROL FLYNN, is on an upcoming F Troop called "Is This Fort Really Necessary?"

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## as we see it

■ The question of how much time to allot to commercials is occupying the attention of broadcasters these days.

Most of them are indignant because the Federal Communications Commission has indicated it might use the broadcasters' own Radio and TV Codes as guides in considering station license renewals. Stations that use more time for commercials than the Codes permit might be punished by having their licenses renewed for one year instead of the normal three years. Since only about half of the radio stations and about two-thirds of the television stations have volunteered to abide by the Codes, many broadcasters object to the FCC's giving them teeth.

The Television Code limits are 10 minutes and 20 seconds of commercials per hour in prime time, 16 minutes and 20 seconds per hour during the rest of the day. Few television broadcasters use all that time. A twohour network movie uses about 8 minutes and 10 seconds per hour for commercials-including local station spots. Still, many viewers would say that the Code is too lenient; that even with all the network forbearance, movies are interrupted much too often. ■ It has been suggested that viewers might be better served if the Code restrictions were based on the number of program interruptions rather than minutes of commercial time. Fewer would mean interruptions longer commercials or more commercials during each interruption. And an advertiser might object to having his commercial grouped with five or six other commercials.

On the other hand, it just might be that there is a relationship between the viewer's enjoyment of a program and the effectiveness of the commercials he sees. Fewer interruptions . . . more enjoyment . . . better sales. Think about it, gentlemen.



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
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


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

# AN EASTER ORATORIO-AL FRESCO


The Bell Telephone Hour will feature Handel's "Messiah" on Easter Sunday. Now that, you might say, is kind of unusual—"Messiah" is usually done at Christmas. But this particular "Messiah" has a few even greater oddities involved with it. The Bell people wanted a spectacular setting for the production, so they chose the awesome natural amphitheater at Red Rocks, Colo. Unique #1. Then the airline strike struck (the shooting was Aug. 12). Unique #2. Somehow they still managed to get the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, soloists Phyllis Curtin, Maureen Forrester and Richard Lewis, 58 orchestra and 58 production people to the scene. Unique #3. During rehearsal it rained. Unique (for this area) #4. The actual performance went on before a sun-drenched audience of 10,000—and will appear on TV without a soggy soprano in sight.

■ guess I am just an old middle-ofthe-roader at heart. On the one hand, I don't think I want to be an Oscar Mayer wiener, so everyone will be in love with me. On the other, or left, hand, I don't want to be a television mogul either. Oh, I know about their Countess Mara neckties and fourhour lunches with guinea hen under plastic and 75-to-1 martinis, and their Gotham hatcheries full of mini-skirted script girls and secretaries, but well, I just don't want to be one.

The reason is that, sooner or later, to every television executive comes that moment of truth when he must justify the credit cards which have provided him with the above-named luxuries. He must emerge from his mink-lined foxhole and make a public statement, usually a pretty innocuous one, to the effect that there are worse things in this world than television, such as cancer and the napalm bomb. Then, according to timehonored ritual, he is clobbered with a barrage of charges and specifications so horrifying, all-encompassing and unprovable that the late Judge Jeffreys, the Hanging Judge, would have blushed to introduce them during the Bloody Assizes.

The charges inevitably have to do

with the doleful effects of television on . . . oh, teen-age motorcycle buffs. redheaded divorcées under 35, Lithuanian numismatists in the middleincome bracket-you name it. The business of figuring out the horrid effects of TV is only one of the lesser American industries; there are few people who actually make a living at it. It is, however, a sort of addiction among intellectuals (an intellectual, in this context, is anyone who owns a typewriter and uses it for any purpose save writing personal letters). And the result is that the unfortunate TV titan, who is manifestly to blame for the medium as well as the message, is in pretty much the same position as was Mr. Sherlock Holmes at that point in his career when Col. Sebastian Moran was gunning for him with Von Herder's air rifle. All he has to do is let his shadow fall across the window blind, and zap!-he's ducking an expanding revolver bullet.

Practically speaking, for the panting and harried vice president, there is no escape. No matter what he says or does, it always turns out that he has very nearly wrecked the Republic. Consider, for instance, the matter of reporting the news.

Back in 1956, the late Columbia

sociologist C. Wright Mills wrote a book called "The Power Elite," in which he said that the mass media ("especially television") served largely to distract the voters from thinking about their common problems. When they ought by rights to have been brooding over inflation or Ho Chi Minh, they were drooling over Elizabeth Taylor's love life (hasn't she had a long one, though?) or watching a trained seal act on The Ed Sullivan Show. Well, that seemed a reasonable criticism to me, as I have always been fascinated by trained seals.

Then, in 1962, along came historian Daniel Boorstin, of the University of Chicago, with a book called "The Image," which claimed that the mass media were engaged mainly in the business of supplying people with psuedo-news about nonhappenings, and thus getting them out of touch with reality. I went right along with Boorstin, too; as an occasional viewer of Los Angeles TV newscasts, I knew exactly what he meant.

Recently, however, I did begin to think that television might just have beaten the rap with its coverage of the war in Vietnam—admittedly a dirty, painful, highly controversial affair about which the television networks have told me, frankly, a great deal more than I really wished to know.

Apparently the broadcasters felt the same way, for recently James C. Hagerty, once Mr. Eisenhower's press secretary and now an ABC mogul, drew the black spot and subsequently turned up at a panel discussion of the International Writers Guild with a few kind words about TV coverage of the Vietnamese War. The war films run by the network news services, he said, show "war as it is," and should do much to convince the fireside viewer that war is "the least sensible way of settling disputes."

Hagerty was at once set upon by no less a pundit than Dr. Fredric Wertham, in the pages of the New York Times. (Dr. Wertham, in case you don't know, is an eminent psychiatrist and an implacable foe of much pop culture—except, of course, for his own books.) In a signed article entitled "Is TV Hardening Us to the War in Vietnam?" (Dec. 4, 1966), Dr. Wertham answered, with simple eloquence, and in about 1600 words, "Yes, it is."

An old hand at tracing the effects of symbolic violence on American society. Wertham notes that we begin by providing the nursery with "kill toys" which "teach that it is fun to play killing. . . . The education progresses to sadistic bubble-gum cards, violent crime comic books, brutal movies and rough TV shows, crudely illustrated booklets like 'Sin Pain' sold under the counter to teenagers [what kind of dime stores do they have in Wertham's home town, anyway?], gorily presented murder news, etc. The audience, so conditioned from childhood, finds Vietnam fighting pictures tame stuff. ..."

The practice of relating all the ills of society, from mass murder to the seven-year itch, to whatever medium of public communication happens to be prominent at the time is by no means new. True, I haven't been able to locate any statements by eminent divines, circa 1500, on the subject "Is Movable Type Corrupting Our Youth?"-but I'm sure they were made, and may still survive, hidden somewhere in the junk-heap of history. As a matter of fact, some such statements-left atop the junk-heap of recent history-do survive; and if it's any comfort to James C. Hagerty and his colleagues in video, they have to do with one or other of the more antiquated media, such as movies. I cull the following testimony from a 1929 study-an alleged statement from a reformatory inmate on how he got there:

"Once I saw a movie, continued

me and another guy. It was about a man who robbed a house. . . . He got in dat house and stole dis big roll [money]. Me and dis guy, we said, 'Dat's easy, we kin do dat.' So we lef' de show before it was over and here was a man's auto, an open car, parked. We went thu dis car . . ."\* But enough.

At least the recent testaments to the responsibility of TV for juvenile experiments in mopery, assault and glue-sniffing, do not come couched in this sort of Happy Hooligan dialect. It's a small mercy, but a welcome one.

I do think that one of the happiest statements on the "effects" of a mass medium is also one of the earliest. Back in the days before the market crash, Herbert Hoover, then regnant in Washington, summoned to him a platoon of scholars and bade them survey recent social trends in the United States. When the survey was completed in 1932, one of the items noted was-well, guess!-"social effects of the radio." Now, in 1929, American radio broadcasting was about eight years old, and network radio hadn't quite reached its third anniversary. There were also no very good methods for establishing the effect of radio on anything. All the same, these good, gray scholars came up with a list of exactly 150 "effects," some of them quite charming. For instance, No. 7: "Illiterates find a new world opened to them"; or No. 20: "Revival of old songs, at least for a time"; No. 65: "Discouragement, it is said, of preachers of lesser abilities."\*\*

Of course, sooner or later the critic of mass-media critics has to face his own moment of truth: the question, "Suppose they're right?" My personal opinion, which is worth about \$1.35 per cubic mile on the international market, is that nobody knows for sure. I haven't looked at all of the studies of mass-media effects on everybody, but the ones I have looked at make

me somewhat dubious of the claims of the more swinging critics.

Take, for instance, the celebrated "War of the Worlds" radio program which created a panic in the Eastern United States in October Here was a classic case of cause and effect. Whodunit? Orson Welles, What did he do? A scary radio show. What resulted? Panic. Yet when a covey of social scientists headed by Hadley Cantril investigated the phenomenon, what did they find? Among other things, they found that a good many of the people who had been scared to death were deeply religious citizens. who somehow missed Welles' interplanetary fantasy altogether thought that the end of the world had come. So if we don't want panic. maybe we should eliminate religionor at least, the hard-core gospel, the sort of thing that makes people nervous? This is the sort of question that I should be glad to hand over to Dr. Wertham for investigation, if he hasn't anything else on hand.

I don't want anyone to get the impression from the foregoing that some of my best friends are TV vice presidents. Excoriate them for spending millions on entertainments less entertaining than the annual Polycarp's Pageant at Simeon T. Garfunkel High School, if you will; pepper them with rock salt for their arrogance in supposing that their audiences are a clutch of faceless sub-morons, and I am with you. But if you really wonder why people beat children, or take heroin, or bomb civilians, or pollute the air they themselves must breathe . . . well, may heaven bless you, and I hope that you find a scapegoat a little more convincing than James C. Hagerty.

SHE'S MRS. DOHENY

... and they won't let Carole Wells forget it

nce, on the set of Pistols 'n' Petticoats. as the cameras were fixed on Carole Wells, in her ingenue-ish role of Lucy Hanks, a director curled his lip and snapped: "All right, if Miss Moneybags ready, we'll roll now." Miss cheeks reddened. Her grip tightened on her parasol. She nodded, her bright green eves suddenly hard and cold.

"Tell me, Miss Moneybags," the director resumed, "how does it feel to own half of Beverly Hills?"

At once the actress took a determined step toward the director and she said, evenly: "Why don't you ask my husband? He's right behind you."



The director, his expression still lofty but turning contrite, hastily apologized, both to Carole Wells and -seeing him face to face now-her husband, a husky young man named Edward Lawrence Doheny IV. In Southern California the Doheny name is extremely special, the Los Angeles counterpart of the Rockefellers of New York, the Fords of Detroit. Next to the Dohenys, the Kennedys of Boston are nouveaux riches. The Doheny name, which has loomed prominently for four generations in the social columns of the Los Angeles press, implies old money-unassailably old oil and real-estate money. A Doheny progenitor was the first to come across the rich oil deposits in Southern California. There are a Doheny Drive, Doheny Road, Doheny Estates; once, indeed, most of Beverly Hills was Doheny family property.

With her flaxen hair, good bones and Pepsi-Generation smile, along with her poise and trimly fetching figure, Carole Maureen Wells Doheny, at 24, would seem to have it all wrapped up, being a fulfillment, as it were, of the Scott Fitzgerald-American dream of looks and money in glorious tandem. The blemishes on this picture, as seen as detachedly as possible by Miss Wells, aren't exactly king-size, but they do exist-in fact, they gnaw at her sense of fairness. "I'm not a Poor Little Rich Girl, for heaven's sake, and I don't ask for sympathy," she said one day in her dressing room at Universal studios. "But being Mrs. Doheny is not the big help people might think for an acting career. There's the other side -the resentments, the actresses with their snide remarks, the whole idea that I'm taking a job from someone who really needs it.

"People in the business have said to me. 'Don't you feel guilty working?' And I say in turn, 'Does Dina Merrill feel guilty? Does Debbie Reynolds? Does Kirk Douglas? Does Cary Grant?' They all have money. Every big star has made his pile. They could all quit, couldn't they? Nobody calls them 'Moneybags' on a set. Nobody says they take jobs away from deserving people. I don't get a part because I'm Mrs. Doheny. I work in this town because I've proved that I can do the job."

And no doubt she has. After the demise of *Pistols*, she'll play Maria in a summer-stock production of "The Sound of Music," has signed for a movie and for appearances on the *Dean Martin* and *Joey Bishop Shows*.

Carole is further irked when her acting is assumed to be less than purposeful, a rich girl's lark between the amusing Charity Ball and the fun parties and skiing at St. Moritz. "If all of this were a joy ride for glamor's sake," says Miss Wells, "why would I be getting up in the morning at 5:45 and working until 7 or 8 at night? Why should it be such a crime that I've never worked as a carhop? But just once let me be five minutes late from lunch break and it's trouble! All that people should care about is what kind of an actress I am."

Despite an easygoing exterior, Carole Wells has always sought the path of independence and self-sufficiency. The youngest daughter of a prosperous physician—she was born in Shreveport, La., and moved with her family to Los Angeles as a child—Carole insisted on paying her own way through college, comprising two years at UCLA and a year at the University of Southern California. Even now it is her own, not the Doheny, money that she shells out to pay for such career-aid pursuits as drama and singing lessons.

Her earnings as a teen-ager came from television roles, notably two years as big sister to Lori Martin in the series National Velvet. An acquaintance from that period remembers Carole as "highly determined,

with a whim of iron, a very ambitious girl who knew exactly what she wanted-stardom and status." Carole's own recollection of the National Velvet phase: "For 10 weeks they had me being mean to my little sister. I complained about that. The next week they had me be mean to the horse." She worked in several movies, including "Come Blow Your Horn." "A Thunder of Drums" and "The Lively Set." Significantly, she snared her present role on her own power, winning out over two hundred other actresses. She has blossomed since into a performer who wins praise from her producer and fellow players.

"At first," says the producer, Joe Connelly, "Carole was the girl who brought in the coffee, After a while, she was carrying a few of our stories." Douglas Fowley, an actor of long experience, seen in Pistols as Grandpa Hanks, strokes his beard solemnly and cites her "sensitized talent, her responsive eve-to-eve contact." Then the summing-up: "She has a bit of Shirley Jones, a touch of Janet Gaynor." The show's Grandma Hanks, Ruth McDevitt, a venerable theater pro who is close with a compliment, concedes: "Carole's quite young, you know, but she's really getting the hang of it all."

Carole often goes fishing and hunting with her husband at the Doheny family private island off the coast of Northern California or in the Grand Tetons in Wyoming. Married since June of 1963, the Dohenys, Carole and Larry, divide their social life between Los Angeles society nabobs such as the Nicky Hiltons and the Beverly Hills movie people, with occasional forays into the Lance Reventlow swift set.

She possesses the required number of mink and chinchilla coats, fulllength, and the antiques and the art works and the costly Steuben-glass collection and so on. After the Green Bay Packers triumphed in the Super Bowl game in Los Angeles, Doheny, a sports fan, tossed an intimate little party for the team and 350 guests, at a Sunset Strip restaurant. Like his wife, Doheny is an early riser of necessity—at 6 each morning, since the West Coast is three hours behind the East and the Wall Street business day, he is perched at a Los Angeles brokerage house, dealing in commodities such as wheat and corn. Like her husband, Carole Wells Doheny is a firm Republican and campaigned vigorously for Sen. George Murphy and Gov. Ronald Reagan.

There is about Carole Wells an air of purpose and direction, "She can cope," says an old friend, actress Lurene Tuttle. "She's a complete human being." But Carole herself, while admitting that she takes easily to such activities as sailing a boat or casting a line or playing the piano, wonders instead about her recurring dream, a disturbing phenomenon. She sees herself, in this dream, being swept up and driven off to nothingness by a prodigious tidal wave. She almost drowned twice, once as a child and again on her honeymoon, while swimming off one of the Hawaiian islands.

She cries easily, her emotions residing close to the surface. She is very myopic, with a vision of 20/500, but at work she is unable to wear contact lenses, which cause her eyes to squint. She can be deliciously impulsive. In a serious discussion of philosophers, she will blurt: "The best thing in life is to make love—and then drink champagne. Or vice versa."

She still fights the war of independence, of establishing her own individuality. Recently she strode into the Beverly Hills Hotel to pose for a fashion magazine's layout. She was fawned over and waited on by the hotel's staff—and addressed, with proper regard for station, as "Mrs. Doheny." She was slightly vexed. "I was there as Carole Wells, actress, not Mrs. Doheny," she says. "But it's so hard to get people to believe that."



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# **Crisis for the Caped Crusader**

TV's Caped Crusader was grappling for his life last week with the only adversary he ever really needed to fear: the ABC executioner. The network was trying to decide whether to jazz up Batman's adventures in the fall by pairing him with a Batgirl (played by Yvonne Adair) or to call the whole thing off. Despite the show's fairly good ratings, networkers feel it might fizzle as fast as it took off little over a year ago. At most, only one of the two weekly episodes will be retained. Surprisingly, National Periodicals, which owns the Batman rights, wouldn't be too upset if the fleshed-out version starring Adam West went off. The current series could go into rerun syndication and the publishing firm would jump in with a new cartooned edition for TV which would make the company far more money.

TV's movie watchers, already none too happy with the frequency of breaks for commercials, may be asked to swallow two more minutes of plugs per picture. NBC has notified its stations that it "reserves the right" to up the number of commercial minutes in prime-time movies from 14 to 16 "if necessary" because of spiraling costs of leasing movies for TV. The stations' reply: OK, if you let us sell the two extra minutes locally in case the network doesn't. NBC won't say when it might make the move. Probability: in September. ABC and CBS officials insist they have no similar intentions. TV viewers who feel 14 minutes of sell is plenty can be comforted that the networks haven't gone the limit under their voluntary industry code: 20 minutes and 40 seconds in two hours.

The paradox of the networks' consuming passion for attracting youngadult viewers is that the TV-ratings race continues to be paced by middleaged-to-elderly stars. Red Skelton, who was No. 1 in Nielsen's late-February popularity poll, is 54. Among other current top favorites, Lawrence Welk, Ed Sullivan and Bob Hope are past 60; Jackie Gleason, Lucille Ball, Eddie Albert, Buddy Ebsen and Lorne Greene are in their 50's. In the crop of new series next fall will be shows starring Walter Brennan, 73; Danny Thomas, 53; and Raymond Burr, 49; while the up-front role on The Hollywood Palace will be bandied among Benny, Crosby, Berle and Durante.

Briefly: CBS expects to produce about 10 movies yearly at the old Republic lot in Hollywood which it purchased recently for \$9.5 million. The films will be shown in theaters before the TV network gets them. . . Three-hour Sunday night "news laboratory" telecasts on noncommercial TV beginning in October will be produced by National Educational Television rather than Columbia University because the school's trustees fear possible consequences of involvement in political and other news coverage.

t's Easter vacation week and one would like to think the network selections are movie geared-on purpose, this time-to the kiddies in the crowd. But beyond a few performances that are worth noting, the pickings are slim for the selective of

any age.

Sunday provides the holiday specials. The excellent eight-week CBS Children's Film Festival winds up with the British "Hand in Hand," a story of two 7-year-olds, a Catholic boy and a Jewish girl, who discover each other's faiths. The film is saved from its own sentiment and contrivance by the children's excellent playing.

ABC's "special" is "The Robe," based on the Lloyd C. Douglas story of the Crucifixion, with a pre-"Cleopatra" Richard Burton very intense as the Roman tribune. The film's primary 1953 claim to fame was as the first feature filmed in CinemaScope: this is, of course, lost on the home screen, which inevitably squelches spectacle. But the movie's reverence and relative good taste remain.

The home screen will undoubtedly help "Anything Can Happen," since individual episodes and character roles are superior to the narrative as a whole in this story of a Russian immigrant and his discovery of America and an American girl. José Ferrer and Kim Hunter are delightful in the leading roles, as are Kurt Kasznar, Eugenie Leontovich, Oscar Karlweiss and others portraying other Russian émigrés. Much in the same way-be-

cause of good performances by Cliff Robertson, Dolores Dorn and Beatrice Kay, and some impressive atmospheric scenes-"Underworld, U.S.A." should improve on the small screen, where its relatively trite tale of a gangster's son avenging Daddy's gangland murder will seem less important with in-

terruptions.

Similarly, "The Victors," Carl Foreman's three-hour anthology of World War II episodes, strung together by newsreel "featurettes" to provide the chronology, may improve on the small screen, particularly if some sensible cutting is done. The several striking episodes in the film are swamped with a number of mediocre ones, and the irony of the moral-a scarcely earthshaking thesis that there are no victors, only survivors, in a war-is emphasized to a fare-thee-well. But keep an eye on Eli Wallach and George Peppard for performance—and on Jeanne Moreau, Melina Mercouri and Romy Schneider for relish.

Ten-year-old Western fans of all ages can find all the standard clichés and some muddled philosophy in "These Thousand Hills." On a performance level, Stuart Whitman manages to make the outlaw hanged for horse thievery the nicest chap in town, and we daren't suspect that that's the moral of the tale. And finally, the tailored-for-television "Ironside" offers detective-story fans Raymond Burr as a wheel-chair-bound private eye, a role he'll play in a new series. And on Burr we can rely.

### If you like to draw, you may have a God-given talent

### by Norman Rockwell

I can't think of a greater waste in the world than being blessed with a natural ability . . . and doing nothing about it. A talent for drawing, for example, is a wonderful gift. It can bring you such a rich and rewarding life that it just doesn't seem right not to give it a chance to develop and grow.

Nobody knows this better than I. I was born in a shabby tenement in New York City. I guess I always wanted to be an artist. I distinctly remember, when I was six, drawing pictures on old cardboard to amuse my friends. By the time I was fifteen, I had earned enough money from odd jobs to go to art school. Then, over my parents' objections, I decided to leave high school after my first year so that I could attend two art schools at once.

Many times I became terribly discouraged and thought about giving up art school to start earning money. But my instructors encouraged me to continue, and got me work to tide me over. One day a friend urged me to submit my work to *The Saturday Evening Post*. To my surprise, they bought the first three pictures I showed them and asked me to do three more. I

didn't know that this sale would be the start of a forty-five-year association. I only knew I was on my way toward the realization of my dream . . . making the most of the talent I was born with.

### Others struggled, too

My story is not unique...other artists overcame even greater hardships. Albert Dorne left school at thirteen to support his family. At twenty-two, he was earning \$500 a week. He went on to become one of the highest-paid commercial artists in America.

Stevan Dohanos, famous cover artist, drove a truck before turning to art. Harold Von Schmidt was orphaned at five. Robert Fawcett left school at fourteen. Austin Briggs, who once struggled to support his family in a cold-water flat, now lives in a magnificent contemporary home.

As I progressed in my career, hundreds of promising artists came to me with questions about how to get started or to advance in art. I gave them as much time as I could. But what they really needed was a convenient and effective way to master the

### 'Leningrad'

SPECIAL COLOR Producer George Vicas filmed this poetic study of one of Russia's most beautiful cities.

The city was founded (1703) as St. Petersburg by imperial decree of Peter the Great. For many reasons (including a loathing for the Kremlin), Peter made it his capital. Modeled after the European cities Peter admired, St. Petersburg became Russia's cultural heart—Dostoy-evsky, Turgenev and Tchaikovsky are only a few of the artists connected with it.

Yet it was a soulless city; its boulevards and parks were largely empty. "Peter willed it into being," says Vicas, "but it was built with stones that did not speak." After the October Revolution of 1917, Lenin moved the capital back to Moscow, an act which "stole St. Petersburg's future." Now called Leningrad, the city has industrial importance, but, says

Vicas, "it is in another sense only a museum."

# THE PTOMAINE IN SPAIN CAME MAINLY ON THE PLANE

Hassling with gendarmes on alien shores, tussling with actresses in exotic climes, higgling with extras, haggling with crews. Hit by strikes, kidnapings, natural calamities, crosscultural complexities. And strewing in their wake a trail of good humor and greenbacks that, end-to-end, stretches from Hong Kong Harbor to

the canals of Venice, Italy. That would be the *I Spy* guys, ranging over Planet Earth two seasons now, trying everywhere to dig and make themselves dug.

The guys are a pair of foot-loose undercover agents played by Robert Culp and Bill Cosby, plus a production crew commanded by continued Sheldon Leonard, the NBC series' executive producer. Leonard insists that *I Spy* stay out of Hollywood studios as much as possible and use the real world for its settings. That's what has led to all the hassling, tussling, higgling and haggling.

In Hong Kong the problem was insatiably curious people fouling up the simplest procedures. Even in a back alley at night in the pouring rain, there would always be a crowd just watching the idle equipment. Finding hiding places for the camera became an obsession. Once cameraman Fouad Said built a big box with a small hole in front for the camera lens. Worked fine except for one thing: It attracted thousands of onlookers, all trying to see what was in the hole.

They even tried paying householders for the use of a second-story window from which to film. The crew below didn't dare look up at the window or all the gawkers would follow suit.

Extraneous vahoos on the sound track were a constant headache, and no people were quite as raucous as the Italians, Sheldon Leonard was directing a scene at a sidewalk café. with extras wolfing down veal scaloppine and vino—all at the expense of his company, of course. Surrounding the café were apartment houses from whence a shrill voice kept shrieking in Italian: "Pietro, come home! Your lunch is ready!" necessitating retake after retake. Finally Leonard growled. "If I ever find that Pietro-!" Prompting his Italian first-assistant to remark: "Pietro? That's him, that extra eating there."

Extraneous Swedish yahoos were something else. At an Italian restaurant during an intimate love scene between Robert Culp and guest star Anna Karina, 90 boisterous Scandinavian tourists charged in. I Spy's director happened to be Alf Kjellin, a Swede. The tourists were so dumfounded at being told to shut up in their own language that they meekly complied.

Laryngitis silenced the guest star in Acapulco. Stacy Harris slept with the air liner's cold-air vent blasting in his face, and arrived without a voice. He was driven straight to the shooting location, where two Mexican doctors took turns administering sprays, medications and 10 or 12 shots of tequila "to clear his throat." The actor passed out only once in a full day's shooting.



Ptomaine in Spain came mainly on the plane. En route, Culp and guest star France Nuyen ate a deadly club sandwich. Next day, in the most agonizing pain and looking like ghosts, they managed to play what Culp remembers as "a delicious, mad, impetuous love scene."

The company's Japanese production manager was kidnaped. This came about when they hired a restaurant for exterior shooting and the rival restaurant across the street objected to the crowds and confusion. The competition abducted *I Spy*'s liaison man. It was useless to go to the police because that section of the country was controlled by a kind of Japanese Mafia. Thousands of yen were paid in ransom to get the man back.

In Mexico there was a piscatorial calamity. The Mexican prop man bought a sailfish needed for a scene the next day. He kept it overnight on a line in the harbor while he stood guard on the wharf. When they hoisted up the sailfish in the morning, it was nothing but skin and bones. Other fish had been feasting on it all night long.

Twice they were hit by strikes. Roughly half the *I Spy* crew was recruited locally overseas. The Italian contingent struck in sympathy with an industry-wide strike of Italian motion-picture workers. American production manager Leon Chooluck had to double as a grip, and everybody else took a try at wardrobe, hairdressing, makeup and props. Old stuff for the *I Spy* guys.

The national image was at issue in Italy. When the company arrived at a Rome housing development to shoot a scene on the handsome spiral staircase there, an ad hoc committee of irate tenants demanded to read the script, which depicted an Italian housewife chasing her husband around brandishing a corset. They didn't relish having American TV continued

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audiences laughing at them. The location had to be changed. It cost them half a day.

The I Spyers weren't always too hip in matters of Japanese protocol. Formalities like "We respectfully request permission to park our miserable truck in front of your enchanting structure" baffled them. Once, having engaged dancers for a scene, the gaffer hit the light switch and nothing happened. Seems he had unwittingly offended the extremely polite janitor's helper. The helper padlocked the switch.

Then there's the dialog that had to be dubbed in back in Hollywood, because the Chinese can't pronounce the English word "iceberg"; for inscrutable Oriental reasons it always comes out "raspberry." Co-producer David Friedkin was directing a scene on the Hong Kong ferry in which Culp was to walk into the wheelhouse and playfully yank the whistle cord several times. The Chinese actor playing the captain was supposed to say: "Oh, that's very funny. You've just signaled: 'Four icebergs in Hong Kong Harbor.'" On the 10th take he was still saying: "Ho, that berry funny. You sinna for raspberry in Hong Kong Harbor." On the 11th take they gave up.

Actresses have a way of acting actressy, be it Hollywood or Florence, Italy. The company had three minutes to evacuate their chartered railroad car in Florence before an express train was due on the same track. Everybody, from director Bob Butler on down, was frantically shoving luggage and equipment out windows and doors. Where was guest-star Joey Heatherton, who had 15 pieces of luggage, a guitar and a portable record player which even at that moment was still playing? In the ladies' room with the door locked. They just barely got her out in time.

Guest star Leslie Uggams' clothes


were far too chic for her role as a pastry cook on location in the Italian town of Frascati. The wardrobe man took to the streets, looking for a woman the same size as the actress. He bought the clothes right off the lady's back.

In Venice a singing gondolier was hired well in advance of the day of shooting, but when his scene came up, he was too embarrassed to sing. The other gondoliers had started calling him "Beeng Crosby."

The gondoliers cannily observed that whoever appeared in a shot got paid for his services. So they would stand unconcernedly aside until they heard the magic phrase, "Roll 'em." Then they'd all step in front of the camera.

Don't talk to co-star Bill Cosby about Chinese superstition. In Hong Kong the script called for him to be shot down, suddenly revive and shoot the pursuing "heavy" dead. Unhappily Cosby had to fall with his face next to a pig sty. Which made him doubly anxious to do the scene in one take. But the Chinese heavy wouldn't die a convincing death. On the first take he died with one leg sticking up in the air; on the second he kept whirling around and wouldn't fall dead; on the third he "died" in a sitting position. It took five takes for them to realize he thought cameras capture the soul. He was not about to simulate real death for fear it would come true.

Beset with the labyrinthine vicissitudes of international misadventure,
the I Spy guys sailed through it all.
And never more ingeniously than during the perplexing pickle they found
themselves in when their Japanese
crew rebelled against the 14-hour
shooting days. Executive producer
Leonard offered more money—no dice.
Free living quarters—no dice. Every
other day off—no dice. What finally
put down the mutiny was his inspired
offer of free baths with masseuses
at the end of each day's work.



The good news arrived on a Friday afternoon early in October 1965. Bert John Gervis Jr. had been cast as Robin, the Boy Wonder, in the new Batman series. He and his recent bride celebrated by splurging their last 25 cents at the supermarket on eight chicken wings. They raised the money by cashing in some empty Coke bottles.

Sixteen months later, Gervis bounced over the white wall-to-wall carpeting in his Malibu beach house. He had changed his name to Burt Ward, the latter his mother's maiden name, the former a personal affectation. He was modeling his four-button, no-lapels mod jacket, custom-tailored by a Beverly Hills haberdasher. A pair of Spanish suede boots fashioned by Peter Lawford's cobbler adorned

his diminutive feet. HOLY META-MORPHOSIS!

His wife of a year and a half had filed for divorce and taken custody of their infant daughter. A new Jaguar XK-E (loaded with \$400 worth of stereo equipment) and a 650 c.c. Japanese motorcycle served as replacements. Ward was closing a deal to buy two Arizona radio stations, dickering for a 50-percent partnership in a helicopter-manufacturing business and investing all remaining capital in oil interests located outside Flint, Mich. He smoked Vogue cigarets, which cost 90 cents a packthe equivalent of 30 empty Coke bottles-HOLY TYCOON!

"I wanna make it while I'm young," said the 21-year-old actor. "It would be worth dying to join the continued

young millionaires club at 29. I wanna be a wheeler-dealer. Right now, I have a fantastic opportunity. It's a big thing in one year to come as far as I've come. From nothing. Absolutely nothing. I've changed so much my parents don't even recognize me."

Nor do most of the customers who knew him as Gervis, a weekend realestate salesman who managed to unload only two homes—for a total commission of \$800—during all of 1965. One of the purchasers, fortunately, was Saul David, a producer at 20th Century-Fox, who introduced him to an agent. Ward's acting experience had been limited to workshop classes at UCLA and a summer's apprenticeship at the Bucks County Playhouse in New Hope, Pa. Within two weeks the pessimistic agent dispatched him on his first audition.

Batman staff interviewers discovered that the 5-foot-8-inch, 125-pound

Gervis was literally a Boy Wonder. "When I was 2 years old," he told them, "I was the youngest professional ice skater in the world. I made Riplev's 'Believe It or Not.' I won the athlete-of-the-year award for my whole elementary school," he readily admitted. "I did the 50-vard dash in six seconds flat, which was five-tenths of a second faster than the record. When I was 8, 9 and 10, I pitched five no-hitters and two perfect games in the municipal league. It was a tough league, like pro ball. In high school I was No. 1 on the varsity wrestling team. I was No. 1 on the chess team. In college I finished in the top 3 percent of the country in a math-and-science aptitude test. Someday I want to go into nuclear physics. I was captain of the soccer team and executive vice president of my entire dormitory in my freshman year." HOLY SUPERLATIVES!

Apparently these achievements, along with Ward's small yet impressive build, helped convince Batman executive producer William Dozier to hand him a script and schedule a screen test. "Hey, wait a minute," called Dozier, as Ward left his office. "You're sure you're not going to grow?" The Boy Wonder replied: "Oh no! I promise you, I won't grow."

Part of Ward's screen test required him to display evidence of his physical dexterity. Using karate chops, he casually severed an inch-thick plank and broke a brick in two with the side of his hand. Ward holds a brown belt in karate and works out each weekend in Los Angeles' Chinatown, mastering a more sophisticated Oriental pastime, gung-fu. He is also a five-handicap golfer.

Not all of Ward's talents spring from his physical prowess. Observers from the Beverly Hills Medical Society and professors at UCLA certify that he is capable of reading 30,000 words a minute with 90-percent comprehension. Once he leisurely read

"War and Peace," cover to cover in two hours. "John F. Kennedy read 1100 words a minute," says Ward. "I read 30 times that." HOLY SEMI-COLON!

His memory is so facile that Ward never bothers studying a script the night before shooting a scene. He speed-reads his lines right on the set and memorizes them instantly. "I've never been caught yet with my pants down," he observes. "I do all my stuff on the first take. There's been no criticism of my acting, so I know I'm doing OK."

Those witnessing his stage debut this May at the Pheasant Run Playhouse in St. Charles, Ill., can make a firsthand appraisal. The comedy, "Harold," flopped on Broadway when it starred a far more skillful actor, Anthony Perkins. As usual, Ward voices little apprehension. "It's something that you just have to do," he says. "It will be a great experience, like one step before Broadway." He will be paid \$2500 a week plus 25 percent of the gross, just for the experience.

Clearly, the producers intend to capitalize on Ward's marquee value. They hope they will be as successful as promoters of the Evansville (Ind.) Shrine Circus, where Ward made nine appearances last year in his Capezio tights, cape, green shoes, gloves and mask. "I broke all records," Ward brags. "One performance broke the record by 2500 people. The money was really great. Ten grand, for 15 minutes a performance."

The roar of the crowd is something that captivates Ward, as it would any neophyte actor. A reported 300,000 citizens mobbed him during a two-day stint at a Seattle department store. He reveled in being paraded around the Los Angeles Coliseum as UCLA's 1966 Homecoming King, after dropping out of that college the year before.

On occasion, Ward spends his lunch hour shopping in Beverly. Hills, dressed in full Robin regalia. "You walk around Beverly Drive continued

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in tights and you get quite a few looks," he explains. "Especially with the green boots and the green T-shirt and the trunks. You don't usually see that."

More conventional barometers of public attention are the 15,000 weekly fan letters he says he receives during peak periods. Savoring it all, he sometimes makes surprise phone calls to supporters in the boondocks. "Every couple of weeks I'll call somebody," he says, "and give 'em a thrill."

New-found wealth and fame, however, have helped cause a knock in his overdrive. "I still have the pressure of making ends meet," he complains. "The more you make, the more you spend. I made the mistake of starting to live over my head." He and his wife frequented the most expensive Hollywood restaurants. They purchased the former Shirley Temple estate in Brentwood Park, Cal., for \$80,000. "The upkeep is enormous," sighs Ward, who spent an additional \$9000 to remodel the premises. "The gardener alone is a hundred bucks a month." HOLY FER-TILIZER!

But the one-acre spread seemed like a perfect haven for their eight cats, two Afghans and a lion cub named Puff, a full brother to Clarence the Cross-Eyed Lion. The lion later died of a respiratory ailment. Ward's marriage to 20-year-old Bonney Lindsey expired shortly thereafter. She filed successful suit for divorce last November, three months following the birth of their daughter, Lisa. Dolefully Ward moped around a sparsely furnished bachelor beach house, gazing at framed photographs of the lion and one of the cats. "I spent a lot of time walking up and down the beach," he recalls. "It's like I had nowhere to go, no place to run, no place to turn. Now I just get on the motorcycle and drive and let the wind hit me in the

face and try to find myself." HOLY CATHARSIS!

Much of the acrimony between the Wards can be traced to the present Mrs. Ward-Kathy Kersh, a Hollywood blonde several years Burt's senior, who was formerly married to actor Vince Edwards. Ward has big plans for Miss Kersh. They were married (HOLY MATRIMONY!) after he recently signed her for his fledgling record company, Puff Productions, which is named for the deceased lion. "I wanna get one good song out, on my own label," he says. "I could make 44 cents a record. With that, I could set up like a complete staff. Forty or 50 people working for me. Big offices. Sit back. If things work out, I can make a lot of money."

Things failed to jell with the first recording of his own voice on another label. He recited something called "Boy Wonder, I Love You" while a rock 'n' roll chorus wailed in the background. The gimmick record did so poorly (HOLY BOMBSVILLE!) he decided to consult a voice coach.

Meanwhile, his corporation has obtained film rights to Satchel Paige's autobiography, "Maybe I'll Pitch Forever," and his agents are overturing Bill Cosby for the title role. Ward has completed outlines for two other scripts himself. The "Exploits of Mr. Voodoo," a teleplay written by Ward, may be aired on Batman next fall, if the series continues.

There is a lingering doubt that Ward will even be on hand next season. His local draft board recently reclassified him 1-A. "Vietnam, this time of year—it's not nice over there," says Ward. "I have certain cause for not being drafted. I support my exwife and child. My father had a heart attack and cannot work. To leave the show would be a hardship for the show also. I may be doing a training film for the Army. They're very understanding."

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
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
