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

■ Last fall an advertising agency ran the new season's television programs through its computer to predict how they would do in the Nielsen ratings and which of them would be best suited to carry advertising for the agency's clients. Recently the predictions were compared with actual rating figures. The computer had batted about .750. Its predictions were within three rating points for 75 percent of all shows.

It's not too difficult a job. You merely make a judgment as to how much appeal a program has for each age group and feed that into the computer along with figures on how many sets are usually tuned in at that hour, how many viewers from each age group usually watch competing shows, how much carry-over there will probably be from the previous network

program, how many stations are carrying the program, and things like that. If you think being right 75 percent of the time is pretty good computer work, the agency feels it can improve on it.

Not that it wants to. It's just that shows are so much alike these days it's easy to compute how well they'll

do. Or how poorly.

There's more news on the computer front. An outfit called Computer Talent Inventory has mailed questionnaires, each containing about 800 questions, to actors and actresses. Once the answers are filed into a computer. casting for movies and television will be a cinch. All the director has to do is tell the computer people he wants, say, a male actor about 34 years old, about 6-2, with wavy black hair, an English accent and about five years of experience. Feed question to computer and bingo-out come 25 names. Progress can be pretty darned revolting.

Then, during a pause, his music echoes through the stands, and he leaves to find a child has captured the sound.

The musical content of the program will, of course, come entirely from the TJB repertoire, and will be both a reprise of their earlier hits and the introduction of some new material.

Just like real mariachis—strolling musicians, for those who don't know—Herb and his friends have conducted here a little musical travelog of the area that formed their sounds.



'It hasn't turned out as I expected'

Dr. Vladimir Zworykin, 'the father of television,' discusses the past, present and future of the medium

The man who is called "the father of television" listened politely to a question he probably had been asked many times before. Then, with a broad grin which crinkled his face, he turned to me and replied thoughtfully: "No, it really hasn't turned out at all as I expected."

Dr. Vladimir Kosma Zworykin had just returned from a White House ceremony at which President Johnson presented to him the Nation's highest scientific award, the National Medal of Science. Dr. Zworykin's inventions—the first TV camera tube (the iconoscope) and the picture tube (the kinescope)—made electronic television possible. His place in TV has been compared to that of Marconi in radio.

Although a familiar figure at technical meetings, Dr. Zworykin—except by name and legend—is relatively unknown to the general public. He recalled an incident which occurred about a year ago at a luncheon meeting. As the guests were being seated, there were the usual introductions by tablemates. When Dr. Zworykin introduced himself, his next-plate neighbor—after a quick double take—asked: "Are you the son of television's Zworykin?"

Dr. Zworykin gave this explanation of the incident: "The new generation accepts television as we took the tele-

phone—something that's always been there. This shows how old television is beginning to look." Those who have met him, however, place a somewhat different interpretation on the anecdote: Can this vigorous, active man be the legendary scientist who gave the world electronic television?

Dr. Zworykin now enjoys the title of Honorary Vice President of the Radio Corporation of America. On my recent visit to him at the huge David Sarnoff Research Center in the pleasant countryside near Princeton, N.J., I found he wears another title which seems to fit him better—Technical Consultant to RCA Laboratories.

Seated behind his desk in what is obviously a "working" office-not an "honorary" one-Dr. Zworykin at first reminds you of a kindly family doctor. down to the knowing humorous twinkle that comes from behind the eyes. As the conversation proceeds, the family-doctor image fades to an impression of old-world courtliness and Continental charm, which seems emphasized by his unwillingness to part with his accent, although he left his native Russia in 1912. But. strangely, the dominant impression eventually becomes one of the youngman-in-a-hurry carried away with enthusiasm for his current work-one who would rather look to the future

than back to the past.

At ease in a checked sports jacket, but sitting erect behind his desk in a room whose walls are covered with plaques, awards and honors, 77-year-old Dr. Zworykin confided that he goes to the office every day because, like many of us, he finds "it's a much better place to work than home."

He first became interested in the possibilities of television in 1910 as an undergraduate at the Institute of Technology in St. Petersburg (now Leningrad), where he was inspired by Prof. Boris Rosing, who had conceived the idea of using electronic means to create a television image, in place

of the mechanical scanning discs used in experiments at that time.

After a period in France, young Zworykin came to the United States in 1918 and eventually found the opportunity to resume his experimentation in television at the Westinghouse Electric Corporation. In 1923, he developed the first working television system without moving parts. When a demonstration of this breakthrough was conducted for the company's general manag-

er, Dr. Zworykin recalled, "the big boss was not impressed at all. He asked me a few questions—mostly how much time I spent building the installation." Shortly thereafter, Zworykin's immediate superior was quietly requested to "put this guy to work on

something more useful."

But somebody was impressed. It was David Sarnoff of RCA, who in 1915 had visualized the "radio music box" that gave birth to the broadcasting industry. He saw in Zworykin's contraption an even greater future, and in 1929 the doctor and his entire team of engineers transferred from West-

inghouse to RCA. Ten years later, at the first New York World's Fair, Sarnoff formally launched America's first regular television broadcasting service.

Exactly what did Zworykin foresee for his invention? "Certainly not Amos 'n' Andy," he replied—referring to the first TV program he had witnessed. "I essentially visualized an extension of human sight, to let us see what we couldn't see with our own eyes—whatever was too small, too big, too dangerous or too far." Only now—44 years after Dr. Zworykin's successful demonstration—are these sight-extending uses of television reaching

significant proportions. In the second edition (1954) of "Television," a book he co-authored, he forecast that the TV camera would be "the pioneer observer in interplanetary travel."

But the phenomenal impact of television as a home entertainment medium rapidly eclipsed its revolutionary potential in science, industry and education. "You work with something," said Dr. Zworykin, "and it blossoms, and turns out to be something quite different from

what you visualized." He now takes satisfaction in the fact that his vision of television as an essential tool is finally being realized. "It probably is true," he said, "that television's popularity brought money which stimulated the development of these byproducts."

The man who invented electronic television doesn't watch much of it. "My wife watches," he explained, "and she sometimes calls me when a good program is on." What does he like best on TV? An occasional opera when one is presented, and now and then a musical show—

"something which gives pleasure or is instructive."

Disclaiming any credentials as a TV critic, he nonetheless let himself be persuaded to give his view of programming in general: "In my opinion, the programs can make more use of the Nation's skills and talents than they do now. Too often they try to suit the taste of the majority, and there are many people who don't agree with the majority. I think you can have a good program without killing half a dozen people in half an hour."

He doesn't have much time for viewing, at any rate, because "there's too much going on in electronics. It would be a shame to receive all these technical journals if I didn't read them," he said with a sweep of his arm toward a table piled high with publications. His hobbies? Aside from relaxing with an occasional historical novel—"the same as my work."

His work is now in a field completely dedicated to a new science called medical engineering. His work in this area was recognized in the Presidential science award, which cited his "major contributions to the instruments of science, engineering and television, [and] his stimulation of the application of engineering to medicine."

The goal of saving and prolonging life through electronics is the second career of the father of television. "Right after World War II, I began to shift more and more to nondestructive research. Scientists and engineers are beginning to realize that it is not the fulfillment of their life's dream to use all of their energy for destruction. Many wartime developments, with slight modifications, have now been harnessed for medical use."

In his long career, Dr. Zworykin is credited with many contributions to medicine, including spearheading development of the electron microscope into a general-purpose research tool in the late 1930's. He headed a team which, a little less than a decade ago, developed the radio endosonde, or "radio pill," a tiny transmitter which aids in the diagnosis of digestive ailments when swallowed.

"After defense, health is the most important need of any country," said Zworykin. Then he ticked off some of the major areas in which electronics already is indispensable in medicine: the electronic heart pacer, the X-ray image intensifier, closed-circuit TV training for doctors, to name a few. He foresees the electronic computer saving countless lives. "We must seek to classify diseases and symptoms in such a fashion that the computer can provide the physician with a reliable diagnostic aid, putting the accumulated knowledge at his immediate disposal."

In addition to better health and a greater life expectancy, what can Dr. Zworykin's 14 grandchildren anticipate from electronics? "One of the biggest changes in everyday life," he said. assuming that kindly family-doctor look once again, "will be what I call 'domestic control by television.' The housewife today is surrounded by mechanical gadgets, all of which need supervision, requiring her to chase from room to room. Some day she'll be able to watch all of them on a screen, controlling them from a central point. Of course, she'll be able to keep an eye on the children that way, too."

Clearly, Dr. Zworykin still sees television's greatest potential in what it can do for science, industry and—most of all—humanity. "It has been my privilege to live long enough to see television grow and have my dreams of the past materialize," he said. Then, switching abruptly from the philosophical family doctor to the youngman-in-a-hurry, he added: "My only complaint is that it was far slower than we thought it would be."

The Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour

On several levels this is a better show than the Brothers' old situation comedy. You remember-the one where Tom was an angel but the rest of the show rarely got off the ground. In the first place, this whole hour gives them more room for their brotherly chit-spats: "You're a regular golden-tongued wonder, aren't you?" "You'd better watch your forked tongue," etc. In the second place, Tom has more opportunity for his wonderful new language-his "Smothersese." which involves not only involved sentences but also a kind of doublejoke double talk. In the third place, the rather loose guest format of the show allows the boys ample time for performing their folk satires. Although no one has yet figured out whether the Brothers are folk-singing comedians or comedy folksingers, it doesn't really matter. They play and sing well enough to get by until the jokes start flying, and they joke well enough to keep everything going until the next song.

Right at the start of each show you know you're going to have something different. Tom gets things going immediately-usually with the aid of an outrageous gimmick. In the Easter show he came out with something that looked like a dowsing rod but turned out to be, he told us, an Easteregg finder. He marched into the audience, and eventually his device clamped down on a girl's leg. "That's a leg," protested Dick, "not an egg," "That's close enough for me," leered Tom. In another show, the gimmick was a singing mosquito-one which, after its number, was promptly clapped to death, by mistake, by Dick. "You've killed him," shouted Tom. "You're a murderer!" "Everybody kills mosquitoes," protested Dick. "I know everybody kills mosquitoes," wailed Tom. "That's why so few of them make it in show business."

Even the introductions of guests are different in this show. We liked particularly the introduction of "two of the brightest, freshest faces in show business today." And who should come out but Jack Benny and George Burns. The latter promptly figured out that they had been in show business for 80 years, the Smothers Brothers for six. "Us working for these kids," the old-timers agreed, "is like General Eisenhower working for Gomer Pyle." In any case, great as Benny and Burns have been, you had only to see the Smothers Brothers working with them to see how good the Brothers are now

One area in which this show could be improved is in the matter of taste. When Paul Revere and the Raiders, for example, made fun, with the Brothers, of Revolutionary heroes, it was on the edge of tastelessness. And when, in a recent show with Tony Randall, the Brothers made fun of the Lindbergh flight to Paris, it was definitely over the edge. The line between poking fun and insulting heroes is a thin one—but it is a line.

Senator Predicts Public TV OK

"The poverty of the present educational television service [in the U.S.] is extremely damaging," Dr. James R. Killian Jr., chairman of the Corporation of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, said in Washington last week. Head of a blue-ribbon Carnegie Commission which has recommended public rescue of the destitute noncommercial medium, Killian surprisingly pointed to Asia for an example of what can be done: "By all measurements," he said, "Japan has the outstanding educational television system in the world today." It has, he added, had "an important role in the impressive progress of Japan in recent years."

But U.S. ETV's poor-mouth days clearly are numbered. Companion bills in the Senate and House creating a nonprofit Corporation for Public Television (CPTV) as the first step in a long-range plan to pump hundreds of millions of dollars into nonsponsored TV will pass this session of Congress "in a breeze," Sen. John O. Pastore (D., R.I.), confidently predicted. As chairman of an influential Commerce Subcommittee on Communications. Pastore was driving hard for this "daring and imaginative" goal. Among other things, he thought that setting Public TV up to do more and better programming ought to have "a salutary effect" on commercial fare, too.

What worried Pastore and other friends of PTV at a Capitol Hill hearing was not so much where the money would come from—they could let President Johnson sweat that one out in the year ahead, as he said he

would. What bothered everybody was how, as one senator put it, "to insulate the scratch." In plainer terms, how to keep the financing, from whatever source, free from political strings. Fred Friendly, TV advisor to the Ford Foundation and former CBS News president, said he was so apprehensive about safeguarding freedom of news and public affairs on PTV that he felt such programming had to be underwritten exclusively by nonpublic revenues such as a Fordproposed domestic satellite system might generate.

"Insulating the scratch," however, was a detail expected to be resolved in time. Right now Pastore, a man who knows what he wants from television (and it isn't Gilligan's Island), was for "getting the show on the road" by seeding the proposed CPTV with \$9 million for openers.

The AFTRA strike was over, but the Johnny Carson-NBC trouble lingered on. The \$15,000-a-week star, still absent from The Tonight Show, was talking tough. ("My contract is terminated.") NBC was talking softly. ("We still hope Johnny will return.") Gossip said Carson's lawver was talking with CBS, which would like to launch a late-evening show of its own. Meanwhile, Jimmy Dean did the Tonight hitch, and Bob Newhart, with a fresh NBC contract in hand, waited in the wings in case the network decided to switch instead of fight the Carson battle.

Reread the Encyclopaedia Britannica lately? For sheer thrills, spills and basic enlightenment you might as well get started now during network-movie time. We're still hipdeep in reruns and marveling that, with a whole backlog of mediocre movies to pick from for repeats, the networks seem to be concentrating on the bombs.

There is one first-run offering, but it, too, is in the bomb category, "Toys in the Attic," the 1963 adaptation of Lillian Hellman's unpleasant but fascinating play, has Geraldine Page and Wendy Hiller wasting their talents on what proves on film to be just another Grand Guignol of crazy mixed-up folk in the deep South, complete with a strictly-from-Hollywood happy ending. Casting Dean Martin as the two ladies' ne'er-do-well brother, and lovely, intelligent Yvette Mimieux as the imbecilic wife he was bribed to marry, is strictly from fantasyland and leads straight to disastersville.

Fantasyland that leads nowhere is on display in a couple of reruns. "The Comancheros" is a biff-bang muscular Western with Texas Ranger John Wayne getting the best of about 700 lowlifes who are running guns to the Comanches, and doing it all by himself, with Stuart Whitman standing by to show us by comparison how big Big John is and how good Big John can act. It's all so silly it's almost fun, particularly when Lee Marvin shows up in a much too short villain's role. And Angela Lansbury serves a similar

"bright spot" function in another bit of fantasyland fluff, "Blue Hawaii," which, as we noted last time around, is for fans of Presley, palm trees and pretty girls—or those too lazy to shuffle post cards for themselves.

The rerunning of remakes is rubbing it in a bit, consciously or otherwise. "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse" will serve once again to emphasize that Glenn Ford is no Rudolph Valentino, let alone an Argentinean playboy type. "The Buccaneer" will serve to remind us that this 1959 remake of Cecil B. DeMille's swashbuckling 1938 film about Jean Lafitte is a deadly and stolid affair under the direction of DeMille's then son-in-law, Anthony Quinn, who proves his forte is acting. Of course, you might want to catch it just to see Yul Brynner, as Lafitte, sporting a head of hair, or to hear Charles Boyer, as his aide, snarl, "death! ha! when eet come, speet een eets eye!" or watch Charlton Heston portray Old Hickory as to the wooden manner born.

And then you can revisit contemporary stereotypesville with "Advise and Consent," catching all those villains against authentic Washington backgrounds in a mechanically contrived tale that promises much and delivers a bland morality tale. Charles Laughton, as always, is worth watching; Henry Fonda and Walter Pidgeon are yeomen of old, and George Grizzard is brilliant and almost worth the strain of it all. But the Encyclopaedia, let me remind you, is edifying.

SIGNIFICANCE

In Mr. Spangler's letter in the April 1 issue of TV GUIDE, he concluded from a statement in Mr. Doan's recent articles on ratings, that I considered 1.800,000 homes insignificant. Since this is in error, I hope I may be permitted a few comments. I do not consider 1,800,000 homes (Mr. Spangler actually meant homes, rather than viewers) insignificant, and in fact I did not say that when I said that a 3 percent co-operation bias in the Nielsen ratings is insignificant. Mr. Spangler has confused "3 percent" with "3 percentage points." A 3 percent bias for a typical nighttime program converts to approximately 330,000 families - not 1,800,000. Since this bias is fairly consistent across all programs, the effect is insignificant for the uses to which these data are put. Further, since the 3 percent co-operation bias is the only one that has been found in the national Nielsen data, it is insignificant when compared with the known flaws contained in some of the other studies to which Mr. Doan referred in his articles. Of course, there may be other biases affecting Nielsen National Television Ratings, but, thus far, none have been found despite vigorous search.

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

THE GREAT FAFFLER

Sebastian Cabot, all 260 bearded pounds of him, sat faffling in his favorite Victoria, B.C., steak house. In front of him a 15-ounce top sirloin steak, charred on the outside, rare on the inside. Across the table his devoted wife of 27 years, Kay. At his elbow an attentive headwaiter, and beyond him a roomful of diners whose sidelong glances only barely betrayed their awareness that Vancouver Island's favorite and most frequent visitor from Hollywood was here.

Cabot smoothed the napkin billow-

ing downward from his size-18½ collar, out over the joyous expanse of his midriff, with elaborate precision, called for the wine list, stroked the beard thoughtfully, nodded, scowled, harrumphed, fiddled with his wedding ring (which, in deference to his role of French, the bachelor butler in Family Affair, he wears dangling from his wrist-watch band), cussed out the British Columbia wine board for its incomplete selection of French wines ("Canadian is unpalatably sweet!"), and grudgingly settled on the Pontet

Canet 1961. Simultaneously he kept up a running monolog on such subjects as eager-beaver TV executives who put him in long-running TV series ("They faffled me into it!" he grumbled), commission-happy actors' agents who want to make him into "the new, fat Arthur Treacher," and reporters who ask idiotic questions.

Faffling, he explained, is a term invented by the late Charles Laughton. Sabby met Laughton only two years before the actor's death. After their first rehearsal together, Laughton told him, "Cabot, you're a great faffler. You drive script girls crazy. When you blow a line, you don't stop; you keep on going. You harrumph and snuffle and pull your beard and inspect your fingernails and drift on until you find your way back, zero in on the original speech, and away you go. I like that."

Cabot is Laughton's kind of actor. The Great Faffler, on the stage or off it! It is the thing that makes everyone want to paw him, cuddle him, wrap him up, take him home like some kindly but irascible uncle, and it is the quality that makes him moneyin-the-bank for anybody's TV series.

It is the kind of acting that is all ear and instinct. Everything Sabby knows about it he taught himself. The son of a sometime London photographer and lecturer who died broke, he began his career at 14 as an apprentice chef, ate his way through several jobs, and at 19 became chauffeur to a marvelous old Falstaff-playing actor named Frank Pettingell. When he wrecked the limousine, Pettingell fired him.

But Sabby had been infected. He loved the smell of ham and found that the one conversation in the world that didn't bore him was the one that began, "Now I remember my performance in . ." Moreover, he developed an unerring sense of what suited him. A character man from the day he was

born (in 1918), he weighed 228 pounds at 16, 280 at 18. The fat-man mannerisms fit like a second skin. A gifted mimic, he acquired so many dialects that the only way he can explain them is to tell you the ones he can't do. "I can't do Texas and I can't do Oklahoma and I'm not so hot in Lebanese. But that's only because I haven't listened to them very much." During his salad days as a repertory actor in the provinces, as a stage and radio actor in London, and later as a character man in English and Italian films, he was unconsciously looking for the ne plus ultra in ploys, the thing that would really set him apart. In 1950-he was 32-he found it. The beard.

Sabby chortles as he recalls it now. "I was offered a part in a play, a French beachcomber who lay back and spouted yards of wisdom and poetry. I must be unshaven. I thought, migawd, every day I'll have to come in and stick that damned chopped hair on. So I just didn't shave. First thing you know I had a beard, I intended to shave it off when the play closed, of course, but meantime I got a movie offer. The producer wanted me to play a French cab-driver-without the hay. I persuaded him the muff was perfect with the beret and cigar stub. It made the part.

"I've been persuading people ever since. My wife hated it at first but threatened to leave me later if I shaved. Orson Welles insisted that I play the bartender in 'Mr. Arkadin' shaven. Orson himself was wearing the beard. 'But, Orson, you know I've always had the muff.' 'Shave it off, Buster, or else.' We wrangled several days. Finally I said, 'That's tough, here's the bill, and good-by.' Walt Disney really did trick me out of it—temporarily. He thought the only people who wore beards were Hessians and chaps like that."

Sabby pauses, samples continued

the Pontet Canet, smiles, pats his stomach, and stabs another ounce of top sirloin. "After Disney, I was naked for about two years. Then one day I got a call from Gunsmoke. When I walked on the set, the director, Bill Russell, didn't even recognize me. "Who the hell's this guy?" he yelled. 'I thought we had Sabby Cabot for the part.' I grew it back."

The beard has gone through several mutations. For the urbane Dr. Hyatt in *Checkmate*, his earlier series, he wore it somewhat fuller than he does now. "After all, in *Family Affair* I play

an English gentleman."

The conversation turns to the indescribable joys of the country. Sabby first was exposed to Vancouver Island five years ago on a trip to the Seattle Fair. He immediately fell in love with this place where "everything falls away, even the vast importance of the Advertisement

script." He and Kay bought themselves a house—Kay for the garden, with its plum, three kinds of apple trees, jonquils popping up at random on the lawn, and a fire-red Japanese maple; Sabby for the fishing, the boating, the lush vegetation, the relaxed country atmosphere with its colorful and undemanding local characters, and the opportunity to live as he pleases with plenty of faffling.

As time wore on, it became more and more difficult to pry him away. Today, when he strikes a hiatus in his TV activities, he leaves his daughter, Yvonne, 9, in the charge of her paternal grandmother in his West Los Angeles home, and he and Kay take off. He has become a commuter. He is able to leave Sidney Airport, two miles from the house, at 9:15 any morning and be faffling in Los Angeles by 3 o'clock that afternoon.

Sabby does everything. He used to do Stump the Stars, a now-defunct TV charade game; and commercials for carbonated wines, sugars, refrigerators. "Mr. Betty Furness, they used to call me." He has recorded Bob Dylan's poetry. In between times he collects and restores classic cars: a 1937 SS-100 Jaguar, a 1956 Bentley, and the gem of his collection, a 1937 Lagonda V-12 de Ville town car, very elegant.

Meantime, some fun-killer—namely, producer Don Fedderson—cast him in Family Affair. Sabby really didn't want it. "I fought for three years to lose the image of Dr. Hyatt," he says. And yet, being a realistic sort of faffler, he did want it. A successful series means money, and money means freedom. Also instant recognition. And Sabby has never been averse to that. He doesn't even mind the distressing fact that Family is loaded with what Laughton used to call "larceny artists"—children. Everyone knows children steal scenes.

But even this The Beard finds himself able to be philosophical about.

People give him knowing looks and tell him he'd better pull some tricks out of his bag with all those kids hanging about. "Sure I have a bag," he says. "These are things you must do. But I don't think about it. I automatically sense something's up, and I cover it.

"Now those kids, bless 'em, they don't use any tricks. But they grin that big empty-toothed grin and you're in trouble! But I still combat with honesty. No tricks, I am not swept off the screen and I come off pretty well."

If Sabby at times seems overly self-assured, this too is part of the act. He is a secret worrier. Last November he collapsed at home and was packed off to the hospital with bleeding ulcers. Not even Sabby could be cavalier about that. After six weeks (and nine shows in which actor John Williams sat in for him) he recovered, but there was still a lingering doubt

about whether or not the condition was malignant. This necessitated an operation in March after shooting was over for the season. He emerged with a triumphantly clean bill of health and immediately began thinking about Vancouver again.

So it now looks as if both Sabby and Family Affair will be around for some years to come, by which time Sabby will be tolerably rich, richer perhaps than he ever dreamed when MGM first brought him over to play the Wazir in "Kismet" back in 1955. When that happens viewers may not see very much of The Great Faffler on TV. Pictures, maybe. Plays, no. "I'm tired of the theater," says Sabby. The plays he will leave to his son, Christopher, 23, now a promising drama student in London; and his older daughter, Annette, 25, a Los Angeles housewife who is also an actress. He'll take care of the faffle, the fishing and the just plain living.

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You might say that this is where I came in. Well, almost.

You see, my first story for this magazine was about an obscure young actress named Brenda Scott. Now, four years later, I find myself writing about Miss Scott again.

There have been quite a few changes in those four years.

That first meeting with Brenda was at Wil Wright's ice-cream parlor on the Sunset Strip, in a day when teen-agers ate ice cream instead of fomenting riot that on thoroughfare. Bright-eyed, prim, pretty and 19, the actress chatted about the parts she had played (nowforgotten roles in The Law and Mr. Jones, Ben Casey and Target: The Corruptors), her goals ("I want to be a star"), her dates (with such fuzzycheeked juveniles as Fabian, Frankie Avalon and Tony Dow), and her great-aunt, the "versatile vamp" of silent pictures, Mae Busch.

Today one interviews the 24-year-old Miss Scott—who rushes from the set in costume—in the commissary at Universal City Studios, where she has been under contract for the past three years and is now co-starring as 18-year-old Midge Pride in NBC's The Road West. She doesn't look more than 18. It has been said of Brenda that "her features and other tangible assets are so arranged that her age range can vary from even less than 18 to perhaps 24." And she herself says, "I think I stopped at 18."

Perhaps. But, as noted, there have been changes.

Some are superficial, like the shank of brownish-reddish hair that has replaced the brunette bob of four years ago. Others go deeper. Four years ago, the wide, innocent blue eyes reflected a quiet confidence in the future as Brenda Scott said, "I want to be a star—it is the only way to attain personal integrity and quality." Today some of the confidence and the innocence are gone, to be replaced by a chain-smoking intensity.

The wardrobe department has sewed a special pocket, just big enough for a pack of cigarets, in the petticoat of Brenda's frontier-woman costume. It is somewhat disconcerting to see her on the set of The Road West waiting to begin a scene, one moment pacing up and down, nervously dragging on a cigaret, and then the next moment in the scene, crying real tears as she immerses herself in some fictional crisis of a hundred years ago. "I have to believe it," she says, and her costar, Andrew Prine, says, "She can act-that's the difference between her and the trashy broads in this town."

Andrew Prine is another of the changes that has taken place in the past four years. He and Brenda met and became engaged while they were making the pilot film of The Road West. They were married late in 1965. At the time Prine said, "I want to lead the quiet life. I'll stay home with my wife and watch TV." They were divorced a month after they were married. Then Prine said, "It was perfectly amicable. We both agreed that our marriage was a mistake and that there was no use compounding it. So we flew to Juarez and got a divorce. I guess it's just me. I seem to be so afraid that I can't make a go of marriage. It's certainly not Brenda's fault. She is one of the sweetest people in the world. We still date only each other." They are indeed inseparable and have been referred to in fan magazines as "The Odd Couple." When asked why they were divorced or why they do continued



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not remarry, Brenda says, "We don't talk about that." What does she talk about? Her goals, for one thing. These have changed since the day four years ago when all she wanted was to be a star. Now she shrugs and says, "I think it would be nice to be a big star. But other things are more important—being successful as a woman and as a person, having children."

She can even be philosophical about *Tammy*, for which she made the pilot film, only to be replaced by Debbie Watson when the show went on the air: "I didn't think I was right for it from the start. I've a waif-like image

—I don't have a bouncy face."

She tells about her first trip to New York a few months ago: "We were mobbed coming out of the theater. I've never been mobbed in my life. They even knew my name!" (Her real name, by the way, is Brenda Smith. She was born in Cincinnati and moved to California as a child. She and her parents are now estranged because of the Prine contretemps.)

She also talks about a recent case of measles, during which Prine started calling her "Spot." Afterward the doctor gave her a prescription for tranquilizers. "They didn't do a thing

for me," she says.

When the day's work is over, she goes to her dressing room, which is decorated with travel posters and a giant picture of Marlon Brando in "The Wild Ones." There she changes from her frontier-woman's dress into "mod" outfit-a black-and-white checked suit with double-breasted jacket and long pants, and black glasses with heavy white frames. Then she gets into her new white Mustang and drives home to an old house in Laurel Canyon, where, she says, "I cook a lot-I love to give dinner parties. I sew and make floral arrangements. I like to clean house. I'm very domestic." Thus Brenda Scott, four years later.

SEE HERE, MR. FRANK!

A television executive defends the medium's influence on sports

hose of us who happen to be employed in the television industry, and who are also sports fans to any degree, are getting used to seeing television raked over the coals for its coverage of sports-good, bad indifferent. This handled, naturally enough, by newspaper sports columnists who watch televised sports events all weekend and then complain all week in their columns about what TV is doing to sports. Since television enables them to see more events than they could ever cover before, this should add interest and authority to their columns. Sometimes it does, but too often they use up the space knocking announcers, camera angles and commercials.

But for a sports buff who might never in his lifetime have an opportunity to see a World Series game, a Rose Bowl game, a heavyweight championship fight, an Olympic dash, a Masters Golf Tournament, a Wimbledon tennis championship, a Stanley Cup play-off game or a Notre Dame football game, television has opened a wonderful world of pleasure.

Whatever the technical or aesthetic shortcomings of TV, many true fans consider it a privilege to have seen some of the great athletes of our time in action: Roger Bannister's mile, a Stan Musial double, a Willie Mays catch, an Elgin Baylor basket,

a Valery Brumel high jump, a Joe Louis or Ray Robinson knockout punch, a Bobby Hull goal

Then there is your "veteran sports expert," Stanley Frank, who says that TV debases, corrupts and exploits sports [TV Gume, Feb. 4].

If there is any exploiting being done, Mr. Frank is doing it. He's using TV as a scapegoat for every change that has taken place in sports in the last 15 years that he thinks is bad.

Mr. Frank begins by mentioning the bafflement of fans watching the Notre Dame-Michigan State football game when, after 13 interruptions in the action, the announcer mentioned that each team had four time-outs left. He says it baffled 33 million viewers. Thirty-three million! Whatever their state of bewilderment—and it wasn't really that baffling—what of it? Was it bad?

There were about 80,000 people in the stands that day. Is it a bad thing that 33 million got to see the game? Maybe Mr. Frank was there-in the stands. I wanted to see the game too. but I couldn't make it. Neither could 33 million others. So we watched on TV and we didn't complain about the 13 interruptions (which, in addition to "contrived" ones, included those of TD's, extra points, injuries, quarters. two-minute warnings and half time). But Stanley Frank complains, Why? Because, he says, it was all done "strictly for the convenience of TV hucksters." Nonsense!

Let me tell you, old veteran sports expert Frank, why it was really done.

It was done so that 33 million people could have the privilege of seeing the game instead of 80,000. That's the only way the networks can afford to do it, and if the commercials that pay the freight are too much to bear, there's a button on most TV sets that turns them off.

Football, like baseball and boxing—your prime examples of TV-corrupted, debased and exploited sports—are spectator sports, which means that people are *supposed* to watch them, the more the better. The inconveniences and changes wrought as a result of TV coverage are minor compared to the benefits. If they weren't, the public would soon let the television industry know about it.

These changes aren't made to suit the TV "hucksters." They're made to suit the public, and the public is well suited. Unfortunately, many sports experts deplore changes because it's tough to keep up with them; they destroy ancient traditions and outdate the clichés which make up 90 percent of sportswriting. But that doesn't make all the changes bad, nor does it debase sports.

Baseball night games are mentioned as "being more profitable" (than day games). Of course they are, More people can see them that way. Isn't that the whole idea?

And having a day off in the World Series does not "destroy the basic concept" of that series. Nor is it planned that way "to insure a big Sunday audience for sponsors who pay \$3,500,000 for the TV rights." It's done so that 50,000,000 people (many of whom work Saturdays) will get to see at least one game in case of a four-game sweep.

There's another sports myth that bugs us apologists, and that's the favorite daily-sports-page-space-filler of all: TV killed boxing. There's no doubt that TV helped—more power to it. But only one thing killed box-

ing. Boxing killed boxing. In fact it's still kicking the corpse.

Sure, there was Chico Vejar, Bob Murphy and Chuck Davey—all pretty bad. But there was also Joe Louis, Rocky Marciano, Ray Robinson, Carmen Basilio, Joe Walcott and some others who knew their trade.

Television has been pretty much out of it for several years and now what do we have? Would you believe Brian London? Bleeding Henry Cooper? George Chuvalo? Sonny Liston's fights would have killed TV forever if they had been shown—and TV would have been blamed.

However you weigh population growth, enrollments, income and the other factors Mr. Frank mentions to show that attendance is lagging "behind normal economic indexes," one fact is still true. Attendance is up in all major sports and sports were never healthier!

But the big thing is the one that critics insist on ignoring: Viewership is up! Millions of people are seeing games, contests, matches, bouts, competitions—everything. Some are good, some are bad, but little by little we learn and we become more selective. Soon the good ones come to the top and the bad ones drop out.

Spectator sports are not played for sports purists or sports experts—they are played for sports fans! They encourage youngsters to participate; they excite and entertain those whose participation has ended.

If television can show Don Larsen's perfect World Series game to millions when only a few thousand could be in the stadium to see it, then TV has performed a service far beyond its ability to corrupt, debase or exploit the sport of baseball.

Sure, television makes mistakes and will make more; but even if it wanted to, it couldn't corrupt, debase or exploit the sports it covers. Fifty million fans won't let it!
