■ A few years ago CBS increased advertising time in two-hour movies from 12 to 14 minutes. The other networks followed suit—reluctantly.

Now NBC proposes to increase the present 14 minutes of advertising in two-hour movies to 16 minutes. Sooner or later the other networks are bound

to follow suit-regretfully.

■ Why the increase? Costs have gone up. The networks are paying more and more for old—and new—movies. It is reported that the latest batch of 94 films NBC bought from United Artists cost \$115,000,000. That's for two network plays per film. In a few cases, it's for three plays.

NBC told its affiliates that prices are so high now that the network's net return on 16 minutes of commercials per movie would actually be less than it used to be with 14 minutes.

■ It's unfortunate that networks don't meet rising costs the way other businesses do—by merely raising their selling prices. But they can get additional money from advertisers by piling on *more* commercials as well as charging a little more for *each* commercial. This system is tough on the viewer, but then he's only a viewer.

Two more minutes of commercials on NBC movies would mean one more interruption on Saturday nights, so that films would be dished up in seven chunks instead of six. Because of the way the advertising is spotted in the NBC Tuesday movies, most are in seven chunks already.

■ During a recent NBC Saturday Night at the Movies there were 18 minutes and five seconds of nonprogram time—advertising, promotion material, technical credits and station breaks. The TV Code limit is 20 minutes and 40 seconds for the two hours.

With two more minutes of network advertising in the offing, NBC will be close to the Code limit. Gonna have to raise that limit.

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
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# The not-quite-human thinking machine may be starting a new trend in sex appeal

A revolution of incalculable importance may be sweeping America, thanks to television. And thanks particularly to *Star Trek*, which, in its noble and successful effort to present good science fiction to the American public, has also presented everyone with an astonishing revelation.

I was put onto the matter by my blonde, blue-eyed and beautiful daughter, who is just turning 12 and who, in all the practical matters that count, is more clear-sighted than I.

It happened one evening when we were watching Star Trek together and holding our breath while Captain Kirk and Mr. Spock faced a menace of overwhelming proportions.

Captain Kirk (for those, if any, who are not Star Trek fans), is a capable hero and a full-blooded human. Mr.

Spock is half-alien and is a creature of pure reason and no emotion. Naturally Captain Kirk responded to every danger with an appropriate twist of his handsome and expressive face. Spock, however, kept his long, serene face unmoved. Not for an instant did he allow emotion to dim the thoughtful gleam of his eye; not for a split second did he allow that long face to grow shorter.

And my daughter said, "I think Mr. Spock is dreamy!"

I started! If my daughter said Mr. Spock was dreamy, then he was dreamy to the entire feminine population of the world, for my daughter is plugged into that vague something called "femininity" and her responses are infallible.

But how could that be? continued

Mr. Spock dreamy? He had a strong face, of course, but it was so solemn and serious, so cool; his eyebrows were drawn so outward and upward, and his large ears came to such a long, sharp upper point.

How could he compare with fullblooded Earthlings with normal ears and eyebrows, who were suave, sophisticated and devilishly handsome to boot? Like me, for instance, just to pick an example at random.

"Why is he dreamy?" I asked my

daughter.

"Because," she said, "he's so smart!"
There's no doubt about it. I have asked other girls and they agree.
Through the agency of Mr. Spock, Star Trek has been capitalizing upon a fact not generally known among the male half of the population.

Women think being smart is sexy! Do you know what this means to me? Can you imagine what a load of guilt it has taken off my back? Can you imagine what a much greater load of vain regret it has put on my back?

But, heaven help me, it wasn't my fault. I was misled. When I was young I read books about children; books for which "Tom Sawyer" was the prototype. Anyone else old enough to remember those books?

Remember the kid hero? Wasn't he a delightful little chap? Wasn't he manly? He played hookey all the time and went swimming at the old swimming hole. Remember? He never knew his lessons; he swiped apples; he used bad grammar and threw rocks at cats. You remember.

And do you remember that little sneaky kid we all hated so? He was an unbearable wretch who wore clean clothes, and did his lessons, and got high marks, and spoke like a dude. All the kids hated him, and so did all the readers. Rotten little smart kid!

As I read such stories, I realized that because I had known no better I had unwittingly been committing the terrible sin of doing well at school. Oh, I did my best to change and follow the paths of rectitude and virtue, and dip girls' pigtails in inkwells and draw nasty pictures of the teacher on my slate, and steal a pumpkin—but girls didn't have pigtails and I didn't have a slate and nobody I knew across the length and breadth of Brooklyn's slums had any idea of what a pumpkin was.

And when the teacher would ask a question, I would, quite automatically and without thinking, give the right answer—and there I would be. Sunk in vice again! Talk about a monkey on your back!

There was no way out. By the time I was in high school I realized I was rotten clean through and all I could do was hope the FBI never saw my report card.

Then, somewhere late in high school, I became aware of an even more seri-

ous difficulty!

I had been noticing for a while that girls didn't look quite as awful as I had earlier thought. I was even speculating that there might be some purpose in wasting some time in speaking to one or two of them, if I could figure out how one went about it.

I decided the place to learn was the movies, since these often concerned themselves with this very problem.

Remember those movie heroes? Strong, solemn, and with a vocabulary of 10 easy words and 15 grunts? And remember the key sentence in every one of those pictures?

You don't? Well, I'll tell you. Some girl is interested in the movie hero. She sees something in him she does not see in any other character in the film, and I was keenly intent on finding what that something might be.

To be sure, the hero was taller and stronger and handsomer and better dressed than any other male in the picture, but surely this was purely superficial. No female would be in the least attracted to such mere surface characteristics. There had to be some-

thing deep and hidden, and I recognized what this might be in that key sentence I mentioned.

The woman says to her girl friend, "I love that big lug!" Or sometimes she says to the hero himself, "I love

you, you big lug!"

That was it! Hollywood was of the definite opinion that for a man to be attractive to women he had to be a big lug. I ran to Webster's (second edition) to look up the word and found no less than eight definitions. Definition number 8 was: "A heavy or clumsy lout; a blockhead."

It was school all over again. I could manage being clumsy but I could never keep up that blockhead business long. I'd be doing fine for a while, glazing my eyes, and remembering to say "Duh" when spoken to. But, sooner or later, at some unguarded moment, I would say something rational, and bitter shame would overcome me. It was no use; I could never attain that glorious lughood that would have put me at ease with women.

I got married at last, somehow. My theory is that the young lady who married me must have seen that under my suave man-of-the-world exterior, there was a lout and a blockhead striving for expression. So she married me for inner beauty.

Then came television. Remember the husbands in the situation comedies? Stupid, right? Have you ever seen one who could tie his shoes without help? Have you ever seen one smart enough to put anything over on his wife? Or on his 5-year-old niece for that matter?

That was one thing all situation comedies had in common—the stupidity of the husband. The other things were the smartness of the wife and the depth of her love for her husband.

These points can't be unconnected, can they? Anyone can see that the only deduction to draw from this is that wives, being smart, love their husbands because they are stupid.

All I can say is that for years and years I have done my best to be a stupid husband. My wife, loyal creature that she is, has assured me over and over again that I have succeeded beyond my wildest dreams and that I am the stupidest husband who ever lived. She seems so sincere when she says it, and yet I have always had to ask: Is it merely her kind heart speaking? Can she be just flattering me?

And then, then, came this blinding revelation. Here I had been watching Star Trek since its inception because I like it, because it is well-done, because it is exciting, because it says things (subtly and neatly) that are difficult to say in "straight" drama, and because science fiction, properly presented, is the type of literature most appropriate to our generation.

But it hadn't occurred to me that Mr. Spock was sexy. I had never realized that such a thing was possible; that girls palpitate over the way one eyebrow goes up a fraction; that they squeal with passion when a little smile quirks his lip. And all because he's smart!

If I had only known! If I had only known!

But I am spreading the word now. It may be far too late for me (well, almost), but there is a new generation to consider!


Men! Men everywhere! Don't list to the lies! I have learned the secret at last. It is sexy to be smart!

Do you hear me, men? Relax and be your natural selves! Stop aiming at lughood. It's sexy to be smart!

Just one thing bothers me. Can it be Mr. Spock's ears? Webster's (second edition) gives that blockhead definition as its eighth. Its definition number 2 for that same word is "ear."

Could it be that when a girl says, "I love you, you big lug," she means the man's ears are as big as Mr. Spock's?

Well, just in case, while I'm being smart, I'll also let my ears grow.

# They spare the rod

A couple of experts employ psychology to train animals—with amazing results



Slowly but surely, the whole world is being engulfed by television. Only a few countries on this planet remain without TV for their people: Laos in Southeast Asia, plus a dwindling number of African nations such as Libya, Tanzania, Guinea, Mali, Mozambique and South Africa.

At this moment, four more nations are in the process of joining the world TV community with the help of American networks: NBC is at work in Saudi Arabia, Nigeria and South

Vietnam; and CBS is assisting Israel toward its television capability.

In a mystical, symbolic fashion. the TV age Planet Earth will surely have arrived when a scheduled television transmitter is constructed next year on the Biblically historic Mount Carmel, the spot where the prophet Elijah publicly challenged and overthrew the priests of Baal. Other transmitters will be built in Jerusalem and Beersheba.

But the Holy Land has, in fact, been slow to ride the world TV tide, partly because former premier David Ben-Gurion didn't happen to like TV, and partly because the young nation didn't yet feel prosperous enough to afford the monetary outlay. But last September the Israeli cabinet approved an agreement by which CBS would give all the necessary advice in helping to create a network, and the expectation now is that a station in Jerusalem will be on the air by late 1968

Actually, there are already 35,000

television sets in Israel owned by viewers who tune in broadcasts from Egypt and Lebanon. When Israeli TV goes on the air, they'll first have two-and-a-half hours of programming a day—two hours in Hebrew and a half hour in Arabic.

But just across the border from Israel in oil-wealthy Saudi Arabia there has existed for the last two years a TV capability which is bringing that ancient and emergent land into some real contact with the 20th

Century for the first Right now. time. there are only two stations in Saudi Arabia-in Riyadh and Jidda-but construction of American-style TV network is proceedwith NBC ing. providing the management, programming, and engineering advice.

It's an extraordinary experiment, since Saudi Arabia has been a closed society for so many hundreds of years (it still does not allow tourism), and its people—more than half of whom

are nomads—have been utterly devoted to the life of the family, the tribe, and the village for as long as their history records. In all of Saudi Arabia there is no movie house, night club, legitimate theater, nor concert hall, since the Islamic religion proscribes such entertainments.

Ever since King Faisal replaced his half-brother King Saud in 1964, however, a gentle urging in the direction of modernity has been felt by Saudi Arabia's eight million people—most of whom live pretty much as their forebears did in the 12th Century.

# WHERE TV IS LIFTING THE VEIL

When Faisal and his advisors were considering means of throwing open a few windows of their closed society and letting in a few shafts of light from the outside world, they concluded that a government-owned television network would offer them the highest degree of control in selecting entertainments which would be consistent with the rather stringent orthodoxies of the Moslem faith.

And so Saudi Arabia (through the U.S. Corps of Engineers, which already was at work on various projects in the country) hired NBC International to show them how to build a TV network. The stations in Jidda and Riyadh went on the air two years ago and construction is underway on others in Taif, Mecca, Medina, and Buraydah.

As little as 10 years ago, it was almost inconceivable that Saudi Arabians ever would be sitting around watching Bonanza, Ben Casey, The Fugitive, Forest Ranger, Fury, Meet Mr. Wizard and Mighty Mouse. But all of those programs are popular there in the seven hours per day of programming which emits from Riyadh and Jidda.

This small revolution has not been accomplished without trauma. TV Gude asked Ambassador Anas Youssef Yassin, Saudi Arabia's delegate to the United Nations, about the progress and prospects of TV in his country. "There has been opposition from various groups," he said, "and many debates about the rectitude of such a step. Even after two years, it is still considered to be on a test basis. The King is in favor of it but he doesn't wish to embitter the opposition.

"Television performs a valuable function in our country," Yassin added. "Ours is a family-oriented nation, and a family with television doesn't have to go out walking or visiting in the evening. Ben Casey is quite popular because it deals with

aspects of human nature. Westerns are well-received because Saudi Arabians are emotional—they enjoy stories that involve courage and fighting."

But when it comes to any kind of public display of affection between men and women—that's where the Saudi Arabians draw the line. Kisses and embraces are edited out of foreign-made series as being offensive to local customs and sensitivities. "We consider it a sacred thing," said Ambassador Yassin.

The stiffest religious proscription that needed to be overcome before TV could be a reality was the one held by certain Moslem puritans against any form of human image—paintings, photographs, and sculpture. Not long ago, a photo shop in Jidda was wrecked by a group of such puritans.

As a result of such sentiment, Saudi Arabian TV came into being accompanied by extraordinary caution and tentativeness. It started out broadcasting 15 minutes a day of slides showing nature scenes, just to break the ice. Then it went to an hour: mostly religious programs and voice-over news; then to three hours, and finally to seven.

NBC International's 21-man team is learning to cope with temperatures up to 120 degrees, and with the effects of such extremes on electronic gear. Another small obstacle they face is that no non-Moslem is allowed to enter the holy cities of Mecca and Medina. That means that in order to build and maintain TV equipment in either of those places, the Americans must instruct Moslem workers carefully, send them in, and hope for the best.

Frank Warren, former NBC International project manager in Saudi Arabia, told TV Gude: "It's basically a nonmechanical country, but the technicians and creative people we have in training are learning the television ropes quite rapidly."

# It all adds up to ZERO

hall I do my imitation of a coffee percolator?" asked Zero Mostel anxiously. "I've never done it on television before." That's the hazard of taking a comedian to lunch when he has his first special on his mind. You find yourself a sounding board for the material he hopes will fascinate a nation-wide audience on that night (in this case, ABC-TV, May 1).

When I telephoned Zero to ask if he could meet me at London's Les Am-

bassadeurs, he said:

"Wait. Let me think a minute."

Then, solicitously:

"Does it hurt you when I think?"

He talks like that—off-center, often witty tags on perfectly ordinary sentences, treating language at times the way Picasso (his idol) treats portraits.

A few minutes later there he was, pear-shaped in blue, a cap over what he laughingly refers to as his hair, shambling the bulky body that can move, when he wants it to, with the grace of the ballet-dancing elephants in Disney's "Fantasia." He took off the cap as he entered the restaurant, and the receptionist goggled.

Zero's hair-do gets that reaction. He combs a few long hairs forward from the far back of his head. Since there are fewer strands left than in a side dish of spaghetti, they cover very little skin, and yet, curiously, the

bizarre style suits him well.

Zero enjoyed his lunch, especially when he discovered one of the classics of Jewish cuisine, chicken-in-the-pot, lurking behind an Italian name on the menu. A lover of food, he generates more emotion reading a menu than Sir Laurence Olivier squeezes out of an evening of "Othello."

"How's the picture going?" I asked. Zero is starring in England with Peter O'Toole and Jeanne Moreau in "Great Catherine," a George Bernard Shaw farce about the lustful Empress of Russia and an English dragoon.

"I play a fat slob of a diplomat

called Potemkin," he said, cautiously. He has been wary of predictions since "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum," in which he starred on stage and screen. That picture (made by Beatles director Dick Lester) is a moneymaker, but the finished product isn't what Zero expected. "It's these modern directors," he explained. "You think they're shooting your toes and they're catching your left nostril. Still, it's a funny idea and a good script, so 'Great Catherine' ought to be all right."

Pausing only to wheedle a portion of carpe farcie—better known in his native New York as gefilte fish—from the waiter for dessert, Zero launched into a serious discussion of his special, inevitably called "Zero Hour."

"I've always written my own stuff, but now they've given me some writers. Sharp guys, too. Say, what do you think of a bit where writers sit around working up gags for a television show like mine?"

Zero, a well-known painter in his own right—he rates about \$1500 a canvas—had slipped over to Paris to see the great Picasso exhibition. "Maybe I ought to do a family of Picasso types," he said, shifting his glasses so his left eye glared out of the right lens and the mobile mouth somehow twisted around to the other side of his face. "Picasso!" he shrieked. "You haven't caught the essential me."

The attention of other diners was riveted on our table, which is why it is sometimes impossible to describe a Mostel gag to the reader. The pay-off is often only a look, but such a look: an orchestra of emotions playing above the quivering chins.

He is the most visual comic in the business. He won one of his three Broadway Tonys for his portrayal of the Rhinoceros in Ionesco's play.

Zero began to roll a cigaret.

"I smoke less this way. Now, let me see: Shall I do some of my Harry Ruby songs, like "There's a Girl in the Heart of Wheeling, West Virginia, Who Has a Watch That Belongs to Me'? How about an old man in a Beatles wig whose troubles are not teen-agers but heartburn?"

Ideas exploded and fizzled, but Zero said he hoped to bring as many as possible to the writers' conferences. As for guest stars, O'Toole wanted to appear and Zero was working on a sketch for him.

"Shakespeare comes in to try to sell a play to a producer named Meryck," he said. "That's the bare idea."

Zero's previous television exposure has been limited. He starred in a Carol Burnett show, did "Waiting for Godot" and also a Festival of Performing Arts special, reciting Browning as one of his bits. The agency that arranged his special, alarmed that he might repeat this chilling dose of culture, warned him not to do anything serious and definitely no Shakespeare.

Until recently Zero had not seen much television.

"When you're doing a Broadway show you're a prisoner," he said. "I did several years straight, including 'Fiddler on the Roof.' You might say prime time was taken up. But that could be an asset. I won't be too influenced by other shows. Nowadays I love color TV and sometimes when there's nothing on it I watch the chart. The distortion pleases me, being an artist. I like a yellow Cronkite or violet with dots. Fantastic."

He has watched enough to convince himself that commercial and educational TV ought to be complementary and not competitive. He explained this at length, suddenly smiled and said: "Now, run that through the pontification machine!"

Zero, born Samuel Joel, gives various origins for his boyhood nickname, which he shrewdly retained to gain publicity early in his career. I was one of the few Broadway continued

reporters at his debut in 1942 and I made the trip to Cafe Society Downtown in New York only because I was curious about his name.

His first ambition was to be a painter and he still describes himself as an artist who acts for a living. When he was 12, his mother saw him at work. "Look at our Sam," she said. "A child and he draws like a man." When he was 20 she saw one of his abstract paintings. "Look at Sam," she said. "A man and he draws like a child."

During the Depression of the 1930's Zero's one aim was to hold his \$23.86 a week job with the WPA, a Government agency which kept many writers, painters and actors off the bread line. He was always getting fired in economy waves and began to give talks to raise enough money to make placards demanding: "Keep the WPA!" The word that a mountainous mugger was making everybody laugh got around and led to a night-club audition.

"Jack Gilford had quit the club," he said, "because he wanted something terrible, like money, so they got me. The owner said, 'I'm going to make you the biggest star.' He gave me \$40 a week! My idea was to work long enough to accumulate \$100 and buy some paints, but I had to eat there three times a day, so I didn't have very much left."

Zero's first out-of-town booking was Detroit, where he arrived to find himself billed as: "Vera Mostel, the famed Negro Entertainer." He had the first of a series of meetings there with a Professor Hoffman who insisted on all occasions that he ought to dedicate himself to playing Napoleon.

"But Napoleon was a little guy," Zero said, "and I'm 6 feet tall."

"Ah," said the Professor, "you'll just have to stoop a little."

Zero said he never consciously thought of becoming an actor, but he liked ensemble playing and other night club performers began to refer to him as a snob whose ambition was to play Molière. Molière he did play at the Brattle Theatre in Cambridge, and then Duke Ellington's "Beggar's Holiday." Then came movies and, after them, Broadway, his three Tonys for "Rhinoceros," "Forum" and "Fiddler," and an international reputation.

Peter Hall of the Royal Shakespeare Theatre summoned him to England to discuss the role of Falstaff. "Can you play it as an English gentleman?" Hall asked. Said Zero: "If you want an English gentleman to play Falstaff, you don't want me."

"Don't put too many facts in this," Zero interjected during our interview. "I don't want my character to suffer from an attack of rationality."

Zero's ambitions are to be rich—he denies he is—do a few television specials and make fewer professional mistakes. He turned down the role of the Peddler in "Oklahoma!" despite Oscar Hammerstein's pleas, and argued himself out of "Jacobowsky and the Colonel" because he didn't agree with director Elia Kazan's ideas.

He has written and will appear in a film, "M'sieu Lecoq," based on a great French detective who started life as a master criminal.

An actor of intellect and integrity usually has his share of critics, but Zero seems to be an exception. Everyone on "Great Catherine," from producer Jules Buck to O'Toole, applauded his professionalism. In the studio canteen he chatted with Tommy Steele, who is making the film version of his Broadway hit "Half a Sixpence."

"He's like Chaplin," Tommy said.
"A genius. Watch him skipping around the studio. Do you know his leg had to be built up in seven operations after a bus accident [in 1960]? It's not the sort of thing he talks about."

As he left, Zero kissed Tommy's hand. "I hope it doesn't leave a scab," he said.

Exeunt all, laughing.

## **Nonfiction Shows Cop Awards**

Television is a two-faced thing, preoccupying itself most of the time with make-believe and only occasionally awakening to the world around it. It is clearly a lot more in favor, though, when it faces reality.

Item: When the Peabody's, easily TV's most envied accolades, were passed out last week, the medium's fictional fare was all but ignored. Even ABC Stage 67's sensitive translation of Truman Capote's "A Christmas Memory," saluted as "one of the very finest TV hours of 1966," drew an embarrassing rap for "it's unfortunate interruptions of jarring commercials at all the wrong moments." The only other make-believe the Peabody judges thought well of was NBC's "The World of Stuart Little," based on an E. B. White fantasy. Otherwise the plaudits were reserved entirely for such nonfiction as CBS's National Geographic specials; NBC'S White Paper on U.S. crime and its "Day in Irkutsk," Siberia; The Telephone Hour; ABC's Wide World of Sports, and a CBS Reports on "The Poisoned Air." Two newsmen were singled out: CBS's Harry Reasoner for his "skillful and responsible" reporting and NBC's Ed Newman for "wit and depth of understanding." National Educational Television also got a "richly deserved" nod for "swimming valiantly against the current which seems to be sweeping TV toward mediocrity."

Item: The Television Information Office, an agency supported by the industry, has come out with a dis-

concertingly forthright admission. A new Roper poll underwritten by TIO found that while TV is still gaining in favor over newspapers and other media as a source of news, the public agrees more with Newton Minow's depiction of TV as a "vast wasteland" today than it did when he coined it in 1961.

This growing disenchantment with TV entertainment reflects a "rising clamor that broadcasting has failed to meet its obligations," TIO director Roy Danish warned TV's proprietors. People feel, he said, that broadcasters "are trapped in a quagmire of profits."

The Roper findings also carried an implicit warning to the networks with respect to their talk about stuffing more commercials into prime-time movies. Eighty percent of those questioned in the poll said there already are "too many" commercials on TV.

Some TV insiders profess to see a late-evening lineup by next spring of Johnny Carson from New York, Joey Bishop from Hollywood, Bill Dana (on the new United Network) from Las Vegas—and Jackie Gleason of CBS from Miami. The Great One is depicted as so anxious for this role that he would add it to his Saturday night show chores.

Briefly: NBC officials are breathing easier. Early post-AFTRA strike ratings showed no trace of public disaffection with *The Huntley-Brink-ley Report* in the wake of Chet Huntley's refusal to join the walkout.



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# THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

One truism about movie reruns deserves repetition at any point: Good movies get better, mediocre ones get more so and bad movies get worse. And this week's roster of network reruns does little but prove the point.

"The Hustler," of course, is at the top of the scale, because the hallmark of this Robert Rossen film is its performances and it's probably performance that best survives the commercial-spattered hiccupping presentation of movies on television. The umpteenth time around you can still find new facets in Paul Newman's portrait of a loser, Jackie Gleason's Minnesota Fats, George C. Scott's delineation of the soul of evil, Piper Laurie's pathetic alcoholic. At the same time, I must confess, repetition serves to underline the slickness of the story's resolution which seems more and more to indicate that there's nothing like the loss of a loved one to improve your pool game-but it's the players who bear endless scrutiny on a screen of any size.

Repetition of "Donovan's Reef" lets you get another look at the marvelous Quirt-and-Flagg antics of John Wayne and Lee Marvin, particularly since you might have neglected Marvin in his pre-"Cat Ballou" days. John Ford made this one tongue-in-cheek and talent-in-left-field, but the sheer physical finesse of the old pros manages to make this continuous barroom brawl set in a Pacific paradise not only a delight for the kiddies but also

tolerable for grown-ups. And for one of the most beautiful young girls ever to have come to the screen, keep an eye out for Jacqueline Malouf, as Lelani, a teen-age child of paradise.

For mediocrity underlined by repetition, there's "Bachelor in Paradise." a lackluster contrivance laboring to be an adult sex-tinged comedy. One can always, of course, settle for Bob Hope, who seems to be carrying his load of gags uphill all the way and if you want to play talent-spotter, watch young pros like Paula Prentiss and Jim Hutton at work. But repetition will get you and "Baby the Rain Must Fall" absolutely nowhere except into futile speculation on what a couple of nice kids (let alone fine actors) like Lee Remick and Steve McQueen are doing in an artsied-up melodramatic mishmash like this one.

The most depressing aspect of the week, however, is that we're apparently doomed to get the tailored-fortelevision movies rerun as well. This week we're off and crawling with "Fame Is the Name of the Game," that seemingly overblown pilot for a television series starring Tony Franciosa's teeth, chin and chest. This is the sex-and-slaughter story that so set us off the "World Premiere" series that we were near stultified by the time a later one, "The Borgia Stick," came along to surprise us with its quality. Let's at least hope that that one-a dilly of a melodrama with top performances-gets a replay.

A stern critic of U.S. policy in Vietnam, Toynbee calls "unrealistic" the attitude of the Administration and the American public toward the Southeast Asian conflict. He supports the idea of withdrawing American troops.

In recent interviews, Toynbee has described the ideal Vietnam regime as being independent, neutral and united—under the leadership of North Vietnam's President Ho Chi Minh. He has also questioned the validity of the "domino theory" of losing free nations to Communism, claiming that the idea of world-wide Communist aggression is an "imaginary dragon."

Toynbee has been called this century's foremost historical scholar, but he is not without his critics. His pro-



digious 27-year work, "A Study of History," was hailed as "overwhelming by one colleague, and attacked as "slipshod" by another.



# They Remember Lawrence Welk

when he was leader of the Hotsy Totsy Boys

It sounds improbable but there are those who stoutly aver that the gerontologists, those physicians specializing in the health problems of the senior citizen, start the day by bowing in the direction of Strasburg, N. D.

For it was in Strasburg, on March 11, 1903, that Lawrence Welk was born, the man credited with rocketing the elderly from their rocking chairs onto the dance floor.

Strasburg is a modest huddle of houses off North Dakota State Route 83, and while no one has been sufficiently alert to identify it as the birth-place of Lawrence Welk, other evidences abound.

There is a sign—"WELK DAM." This directs the motorist to a WPA-sponsored project for water conservation, subsequently named to honor the originator of Champagne Music.

On the main street is the Lawrence Welk Swimming Pool and Picnic Park, both brought into being by a handsome donation from the bandleader, and dedicated to his neighbors.

In the Strasburg Post Office the bulletin board boasts photographs of President Lyndon B. Johnson—and Lawrence Welk.

Postmaster Mike Voller said, "We're all very proud of Lawrence. He gets back often, was here two continued

weeks last September. He's just as he always was, very nice, very modest.

"My predecessor here was Postmaster John Klein. His son Johnny plays the drums in the Welk band."

Rev. Father Mark Renner, pastor of Sts. Peter and Paul Church, is a warm and intimate friend of Lawrence Welk.

"I don't remember him as a boy," he apologized. "Our friendship is much more recent. But he has told me many things about his boyhood on his visits here, and on my visits to him in California.

"Although he is in fine health, Lawrence has had to combat all these years the enervating effects of a ruptured appendix in his youth. In that day—it was 1913, 1914—a ruptured appendix was usually fatal.

"In small Strasburg, then as now, there was no hospital. The nearest was in Bismarck, almost 80 miles away. And that's where he was taken, swathed in blankets, lying on the hard wooden floor of a horse-drawn wagon. It must have been a painful journey.

"But by the grace of God he was alive when they reached Bismarck, and he survived, although for more than a year he was a bedridden boy.

"To this day his diet is a restricted one—bland foods, pureed foods—for this childhood illness left scarified abdominal adhesions and intestinal weaknesses. Yet I am sure no one has ever heard him complain, nor has he allowed it to limit his activities."

Mrs. Anna Mary Mattern, one of his sisters, widowed now and living in Strasburg, remembers that Lawrence, about to become a professional musician, was ashamed of his accordion.

Then, studying a mail-order catalog, he was entranced by the illustration of a rhinestone-studded piano keyboard instrument.

"He told Pa if he would buy it, he— Lawrence—would repay the purchase price of \$200 over a four-year period, out of his earnings. My father agreed, Lawrence got the accordion, and he paid it back in two years!"

At the Pin Palace, Strasburg's bowling-alley snack bar, proprietor Al Krammer was proud to report that Lawrence stops in when he's home.

"Had lunch here twice when he was in, last September. You'd never guess he's a national star in television. He's a regular person."

Al's wife, Katherine, said, "If you want to know about Lawrence when he was growing up, we're too young for that. You see Uncle Pius."

Uncle Pius?

"Everybody calls him that. He's everybody's uncle. Pius Kraft runs the store down the street, Kraft & Keller. He's been in business here since the Year One. He'll talk a leg off you but he'll tell you lots about Lawrence Welk as a boy.

"Oh—you like penny candy?"

In moderation.

"When you leave Uncle Pius, you'll have a pocketful!"

Kraft & Keller, on Strasburg's main street, is a grocery supermarket, drugstore, clothing, soft goods, shoe, hardware and confectionery store—in short, an establishment almost vanished from the rural American scene, best described as "the general store."

Merchandise is displayed—"spilled" would be the more exact word—in profusion in glass-fronted cases,



on the floor, on shelves, appended to the walls, hanging from the ceiling in a splendid chaos.

In spite of the seeming confusion, when you specify your need it is met with speed and precision.

To find Uncle Pius, you ask Mrs. Agatha Kraft, who calls, "Pius! Someone to see you!"

From somewhere comes a jovial, hearty voice, "I'm here."

"Here" is a remote corner of the store, reached by a labyrinthine course, where Uncle Pius has his rolltop desk, heavily burdened with letters, and old papers, a triumph of order within disorder.

Uncle Pius—does he remember the boy Lawrence Welk? There is a snort of incredulity at the question.

"I've been in business in Strasburg since 19-ought-six. Ask me about any baby born here, I can tell you.

"Before we get to Lawrence—one thing. In the magazines, they always say his parents, Ludwig and Christina Welk—came here from Alsace-Lorraine. Not so.

"His grandfather and grandmother maybe, originally. But his parents came from Odessa in the Ukraine. But they were German, all of them first from Alsace-Lorraine.

"And Lawrence's mother—the magazines said her name was Schwalm. Wrong. It was Schwahn. Here, I'll write it down. Spell it right for once.

"How did Lawrence get started on the accordion? Aha, you should have heard his father, Ludwig. Now he could play the accordion. When they came over here they had the clothes they wore, no more. Except for the accordion. It had been in the Welk family three, maybe four generations.

"Farming was hard then. Up with the sun, to bed with the sun. But when there was a wedding! In those days any respectable wedding took three days—they were real weddings! And there was Ludwig Welk with the family accordion, playing as long as there was anyone left to dance!

"Lawrence plays the accordion very good. But then, Ludwig taught him. You know how Lawrence got his own accordion? It cost \$15 and he didn't have \$15. That was a lot of money then, and he was just a boy. So he got the money by trapping. Muskrat, beaver, badger. He skinned them, sold the pelts, paid for the accordion.

"I tell you, Lawrence has gone a long way, for a boy who had little education. He never finished fourth grade. Went to the boarding school over there; the Ursuline nuns used to teach there. Then he got sick, for a long time, never got back to school.

"I did hear that Lawrence took a correspondence course with a music academy in Minneapolis. He got a diploma in piano tuning. It's a good thing for a man to have a trade to fall back on, but I don't suppose he's ever had to tune pianos for a living."


Did Uncle Pius know why Lawrence changed the name of his band in the early days from the "Hotsy Totsy Boys" to the "Lawrence Welk Honolulu Fruit Gum Orchestra."?


"Oh, that. After he had been playing for weddings and parties and social affairs for quite a while, he got a program on WNAX, the radio station over in Yankton [S. D.]. His sponsor was Honolulu Fruit Gum. He kept his pockets full of it and everybody he met, he gave them a stick of Honolulu Fruit Gum.


"So that's about Lawrence Welk, a fine boy from Strasburg. When he was about this high, he'd come in, with a list of things they needed at the farm. When he was leaving, he'd pause near the door, like where you are.

"He knew that Uncle Pius would reach into this barrel of penny candy here—grab a handful and stuff it into his pocket.

"Like this. Munch it on the way home and come back soon."







### REVIEW

A year ago, when this British adventure story first crossed the TV see, we told you we liked it. But we kidded it for some of the plotsparticularly the one where, in a simulated jungle in the wilds of England, a group of dispossessed rubber plantation owners decided to let loose, on the local population, 1000 tsetse Compared to this Avengers plots, however, last year's tsetse flies were nothing. In recent weeks we've had: (1) the story of a pretty girl named Venus who believes there is life on Venus but, just to make sure, causes an awful lot of death on earth, (2) the story of a "see-through man" who not only invented a formula for invisibility but goes around disputing, via murder, the fact that seeing is believing, (3) the story of a Captain Crusoe who flies valuable missile documents out of the country by virtue of the fact that he is a parrot, and also runs afoul of the International Exhibition of Caged Birds whose organizer isnow get this—Edgar Twitter, and (4) the story of a professor who not only makes "duplicate" people but even the kind of people who can't be killed. One of them is run over and killed by a salesman, then escapes and is run over again—whereupon the salesman shouts, "I've killed him! I've killed him again!"

The producers, it may be said, have done the same with their show. All this plot nonsense has been at the expense of what was once, despite its satiric overtones, a genuinely engrossing adventure story. And for this show to be killed not once but twice is doubly sad because its two principals, Patrick Macnee (Steed) and Diana Rigg (Mrs. Peel) deserved better, Originally, in a previous British TV show, Macnee, as John Steed, was only the second lead—an urbane and witty henchman for the main character. When British audiences began clamoring for more of the henchman and less of the hench, however, Macnee and Steed were given a series of their own, The Avengers, and, with bowler and brolly, were soon on their merry way. As for Diana Rigg, she too rose from the ranks-succeeding the first feminine star of the series. Honor Blackman. And she is now easily not only the most beautiful but probably the best actress on the TV screen on either side of the Atlantic.

This season, though, according to an official release, the producers decided to make Emma more "ladylike"—always, in our opinion, a mistake. In any case, she no longer employed karate but changed to gung-fu. She still, however, has her marvelous touches. Starting to aim a pistol or jump a wall or whatever, she starts, then quickly fluffs her hair, then reaims or rejumps.

Ah, the pity of it, a fine actor, a great actress, a good, adult, sophisticated show—all gung-fu.

### SOCCER COMES

It is a matter of history that people started kicking inflated bladders in this country during colonial days when the game soccer football, or something approximating it, was introduced by the British, Exposed to this pastime for so many years, Americans, curiously, never have cottoned to it in a serious way. Apart from being played, somewhat obscurely, in American colleges, soccer has been mostly an ethnic proposition here, attracting, both as players and spectators, Englishmen, Germans. Italians, Yugoslavs and others educated in the game in the old country.

Unvisited by big-time soccer for all these years, Americans suddenly find themselves up to their shorts in the game, having been invaded not by one major league, but by two. On one side is the National Professional Soccer League, which has signed a contract with CBS for a televised game every Sunday afternoon until Sept. 3. The rival group is called the United Soccer Association (originally the North American Soccer League), which couldn't agree on terms with CBS, and, at the time of this writing, was searching for another outlet.

Consisting of 10 teams—it will expand next year—the National League is divided into two divisions of five each. The Eastern comprises New York, Atlanta, Pittsburgh, Baltimore and Philadelphia; and the Western includes St. Louis, Chicago, Los Angeles, San Francisco-Oakland (known as California) and Toronto.

The United Soccer Association has 12 locations. Its Eastern division includes New York, Boston, Washington, Toronto, Detroit and Cleveland; and the Western group consists of Chicago, Dallas, Houston, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Vancouver.

You will note duplication in five cities, which means that whereas most teams figure to lose substantially in the new venture, the overlapping five could be disasters.

Originally scheduled to begin play in 1968, the United Soccer Association adjusted its plans hurriedly to meet the competition of its opponent, which booked a full schedule of 32 games per team for 1967. The Uniteds arranged six exhibition games, each in a different city, and a league schedule of 16 games per team from May 26 to July 16.

Since few American athletes understand the refinements of major league soccer, the teams in both leagues consist mostly of foreign players. The Uniteds, in fact, collected 12 teams in their entirety abroad, assigning one to each of the league cities. The NPSL is operating piecemeal, having signed performers individually.

Those in Europe and South America who know their soccer point out that the United Soccer Association is fielding better personnel. Says Brian Glanville, soccer writer for the London Sunday Times: "Some of the players I have seen signed by the National League are third and fourthgrade stuff. In America, you would call them bush leaguers."

In view of this disparity, why did CBS, which had its choice, make a deal with the National League, instead of the stronger United? The answer appears to be that a disagreement developed between network negotiators and Jack Kent Cooke, owner of the NPSL team in Los Angeles.

who represented his league in the television transaction. CBS is said to have told Cooke to shop elsewhere and made a deal with the other group

for one year plus options.

Cooke admits he was rejected by CBS. "The network was fearful of investing too much money in an unknown item," he says. "I wanted more than CBS offered and I also wanted a contract guaranteed for a minimum of three years. So I lost the argument. But what CBS has come up with is a league that has signed dribs and drabs whose lack of skill will be so clear, even to the most uninformed viewer, that the network will hang its head in shame."

Most critics here doubt that this will be necessary. They point out, plausibly, that few in the American audience know the difference, any more than viewers, in say, Romania could tell the difference between the Green Bay Packers and South Dakota State.

The principal question is whether Americans are ready to accept soccer in any form. Will they get vibrations when they hear the TV man talk about Emmett Kapengwe of Zambia, and Wolfgang Glock of West Germany, and Milo Grbic of Yugoslavia? Soccer people say yes.

CBS isn't expecting wonders but is searching mainly for something live to fill the gap between professional football seasons. "We are prepared to lose on soccer for two years," says a network official. "And after that, we are hoping it catches on. It is, after all, the national sport of some 150 countries."

Regrettably for those bankrolling the new franchises, America isn't one of the 150.

# How to watch it

Clasgow Celtic, one of Scotland's two greatest teams, were playing Glasgow Rangers, the other great team, in a vital soccer match. Every ticket in the stadium was sold, as they are every time Rangers meet Celtic.

And one fanatical follower of Rangers had to stay home and watch the game on the television in his sixth-floor apartment. He locked himself in the room, told his wife and children, "If Rangers lose I'm going to throw myself out of the window" and settled in for two hours of tension.

Rangers lost. He threw himself out of the window, smashed most of the bones in his body and was lucky to live. But, to this day, what hurt him most was that Rangers lost.

This story is on record in Glasgow, Scotland, so I don't want anyone doubting my word.

I also don't want anyone to get quite so enthralled with soccer that he wants to start throwing himself out continued of a window. Not yet. Not until there are as many soccer fans in this country to pack our stadiums as there are in most other nations in the world. Right now I don't want anyone to miss the first chapter of one of the world's greatest sporting adventures.

I'm prejudiced, I know. But from the tip of Tierra del Fuego to the snows of Norway's North Cape and girdling the globe from Peru to Panmunion there are millions of people who agree with me: Soccer is a great game to watch.

It is also a simple game to watch. A game of action and strength, of perpetual motion and power, finesse and fighting spirit. Sit right down to your first soccer game and you can enjoy it-as much as the expert will enjoy it, although for different reasons.

The expert understands the chesslike thought which goes into the complex tactics of soccer. The newcomer just sees the action, plenty of it. And designed for one solitary purpose: to get that ball (leather, 27-inches around) into that goal (wood and net. 8-vards wide. 8-feet high), without its touching one's hands or arms.

You have 11 players on each team (plus three substitutes, but no resubstitution) and 90 minutes' play (broken up into two 45-minute

halves) to get the most goals.

The players cover a field of play approximately 110 yards by 80 yards. It's a big, punishing area to cover and only one man in a soccer team is reasonably static. That's the goalkeeper, the one man who can use his hands.

The other 10 players are divided basically into defense, supply and offense. Call them backs, linkmen and strikers-or, for simplicity, fullbacks, and forwards-although halfbacks there will be plenty of new terms to learn as time goes by.

There are many variations on how

to use your players, but the system most used is called 4-2-4. This means that, in front of your goalkeeper, you have a line of four backs. Then two linkmen. Then four strikers spread out in the forward line.

This way you can easily get men to drop back to help the defense if you get in trouble. And if you're attacking hard, it is just as simple to summon up extra men to join in the

They may all have set jobs to do. but the way soccer players have to ad-lib their way through 90 minutes, acting on the dictates of the instant, a back can easily be up scoring a goal, and a striker can easily be back in defense, kicking the ball clear of his own goal.

You must have this great movement on the soccer field because the basic idea of the game is to have possession of the ball-by controlling it and moving it (with any part of the body except the hands and arms) or by interpassing-until you're close enough to the goal to shoot it in.

And players can move it or pass it anywhere and any way they like, within the confines of the field of play. The most important rule of the game is the offside. You're offside if, when the ball is passed to you, there are not two defenders nearer their own goal than you are.


Other than that the laws of the game are mostly for safety reasons rather than technicalities. A player mustn't kick, punch, butt or otherwise harm an opponent, although there is so much physical contact that plenty

of players are harmed.

The point about it is that physical contact is not allowed unless the players are playing the ball, or attempting to play the ball. Then, as you'll see, mayhem may happen.

If a player is offside or he handles the ball or the referee spots too much mayhem, he will whistle for a free kick. Play stops and the innocent team gets a free continued

kick at the ball on the spot where the foul took place.

But there is another kind of free kick called the penalty kick, and that really is something. Because it means an almost certain goal.

There's an area called a penalty area (18 yards by 44 yards) around each goal. If a foul is committed inside that area by the defending team, the referee whistles for a penalty. And then the ball is placed on a white spot 12 yards out from the goal and no one but the goalkeeper is allowed to try to stop the shot. No soccer player should miss a penalty kick. But when they do, just listen to that crowd!

Watch for those penalty kicks. They can be dramatic moments.

Watch for the physical contact and the hard, tiring, end-to-end play.

Watch for the way players control

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the ball with their feet as if the ball were tied to them by a piece of string. Watch for the way they butt the ball with their heads and send it accurately 30 or 40 yards.

Watch a pass go 60 yards like a guided missile on its target. Or see the way six tiny, stabbing, yard-long passes are made in as many seconds, to split open a tightly packed bunch of defenders.

There are plenty of players proficient at all the arts and crafts of soccer in this first season of the NPSL. I shouldn't mention it first (but I'm going to) that at Baltimore we have more than a few players who will give you pleasure. Take a look at Art Welch, our 21-year-old outside right from Jamaica. And at Fernando Azevedo, our 6-foot Brazilian who can juggle that soccer ball in the air for half an hour.

Pittsburgh has Co Prins, a Dutchman who just weeks ago was scoring four goals for Ajax of Amsterdam against the English champion, Liverpool. And no one can remember the last time anybody scored four goals against Liverpool. A whole crop of Yugoslav stars are dropping into the two West Coast clubs. For instance. L.A. has hot-shot Mihalj Mesaros and San Francisco has Ilija Mitic. At Chicago there's an impish Irishman called Joe Haverty, who has been making like a leprechaun against some of Europe's best defenses for 10 vears now.

Are there any bad players coming to the U.S.A.? Sure there are. It is impossible to put together a league of this magnitude in the few months we have had without making mistakes.

Is there such a thing as a bad soccer game? Certainly there is, just like anything else.


But for the last 10 years or so I have watched more than 100 soccer games a year. And all I'm doing now is counting the days until I can see my next one.


