NET Playhouse

In case you haven't looked at your educational channel lately—in which case you should stop right here and go over and turn it on—you have been missing many happy happenings. And not the least of these is a truly extraordinary series called NET Playhouse. This ambitious project, which was launched a year ago, offers a weekly schedule of major plays and films, including those by new writers. It has come up this season with the two best-produced classics yet seen anywhere on TV.

They were Chekhov's "Uncle Vanya" and Ibsen's "An Enemy of the People." In "Vanya" you had one of the world's great plays, the incredibly sensitive drama of people thwarted and finally broken by the perception of their own unrealized potentials, as well as one of the world's best casts -Sir Michael Redgrave, Sir Laurence Olivier, Rosemary Harris, Joan Plowright, and Dame Sybil Thorndike. To say they were great is an understatement. "An Enemy of the People," the drama of a Norwegian family all alone against a town which, even when faced with the truth, decides to side with its "practical" interests, was equally magnificent. The cast may not have been as name powerful as in "Vanya," but James Daly, Kate Reid, Philip Bosco, Barbara Dana, William Prince and George Voskovec acquitted themselves nobly, and the late Jack Landau's production of the Arthur Miller adaptation took fire from the very first scene: "The public doesn't need new ideas. The public is much better off with old ideas."

Two comedy classics on NET Playhouse. Shaw's "Misalliance" Wilde's "The Importance of Being Earnest," were something else again. Both were overtalky and overacted. Of the films we have seen on Playhouse, by far the most memorable was the superb documentary on the battle of Culloden. This was the work of the man who is probably the world's leading documentarian, British producer Peter Watkins. In any case, here he broke new ground even for him. First he took a film unit to the very moor where, in 1746, the battle was fought. Then, using no actors at all, but instead local people-many of them actual descendants of those who took part in the fray-and applying modern newsreel techniques, including on-the-spot interviews, he managed to produce on the one hand an indelible portrait of the stupidity of the Scots. and on the other such a savage indictment of the brutality of the English that it was almost unbearable. If you were one who learned about "Bonnie" Prince Charles from singing, as a child, "Speed, Bonnie Boat," you owe it to your adult years to have a look at this film the next time it comes around. The only thing bonnie about Charlie was his name. Finally, if you still get infuriated just thinking about the British brutality after the battle -well, think of it this way. A Britisher made the film and it was a production of BBC-TV. Can you imagine NBC or CBS or ABC making a similar film about anything American?

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

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Because there are so many demands for communications systems, serious problems are arising. 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THE GREAT TELEVISION MATERIAL TELEVISION MATER

...is that no one watches the documentaries; but here's the truth

or many years, there has been a notion that the documentary has been the neglected stepchild of television, that "nobody" watches documentaries . . that when the "escapist" mass audience does consent to watch them, it does so only when the subject is "movie stars" . . . and that the serious cream of the documentary production—cultural, historical and sociological shows—is given short shrift by most everyone except "intellectuals."

Lies, all lies.

Fact 1: Recent research sampling by ABC-TV on documentaries that appeared on all three networks during the years 1963 through 1966 reveals that reality films are watched intensively by the mass audience. Indeed, documentaries get ratings that are fully comparable to those of many entertainment shows: The "hits" win an audience share that ranges from more than 50 percent of the sets in use at that time down to 30 percent; the "successful" documentaries win an audience share ranging from below 30 percent down to 19; while the modest successes and the "flops" win a share of 18 percent down to about 8.

Fact 2: The most comprehensive study of nation-wide viewing habits ever made revealed, in 1963, that there was little difference between the TV tastes of the college educated and those who are not college educated. Graduates, given a choice between information and entertainment shows,

chose entertainment four times out of five. The public affairs shows' audience varies some but not greatly in its makeup of college and noncollege viewers. The study was: "The People Look at Television: A Study of Audience Attitudes," by Dr. Gary A. Steiner. It seriously undercuts the idea that the audience for documentaries consists mostly of "high-brows."

The time has come to take a fresh look at the subject. What does the American public watch in the docu-

mentary realm and why?

TV Guide asked seven of the foremost practitioners of this form of television to answer the question: Reuven Frank, executive vice president of NBC News, who has 11 years of experience as a documentary producer; Thomas Wolf, vice president and director of TV documentary programs at ABC, who has had 30 years of experience in the news and documentary field; Ted Yates, youthful producer and director at NBC, who has done almost 90 network documentaries; Burton Benjamin of CBS, with over 20 years of experience in the documentary field: Donald Hyatt, producer-director of Project 20 and director of special projects for NBC, with 17 years of experience; Jay McMullen, producer and investigative reporter for CBS, with 20 years of news and film experience; Bob Drew, president of Bob Drew Associates, Inc., an independent documentary company, with 14 years of experience.

Here, according to these specialists, is what packs the house in the docu-

mentary area:

HYATT: "Documentaries, to be successful, must be dramatic. They must have hero figures, value conflicts."

WOLF: "The most successful documentaries have dramatic qualities—heroic protagonists, conflicts, a triumph of good over evil."

FRANK: "Drama. You cannot interest people unless you tell stories. Usually in a good story there's a protagonist, a conflict, and a resolution."

Benjamin: "Plot values give you the highest ratings."

YATES: "The most successful documentaries are dramatic—with abrasive action, clashing elements, valid plot construction."

Drew: "Nothing can compete with dramatic logic. Reality films must have similar ingredients to those in fiction—a protagonist, a dramatic conflict."

McMullen: "You can expect the largest audience when the documentary has dramatic conflict and moral blacks and whites"

The obvious conclusion: The American public responds strongly to reality films to the degree that they resemble the dramatic art.

If one analyzes the ABC listing of the last three years of documentary films on all three networks, one discovers that these same elements appear to dominate the subject matter of the top-rated documentaries, those attracting a 30-50 percent share of the audience:

One can reach several conclusions from this chart. Hero worship, including the heroic view of America. dominates the picture—the heroes emerging from a great variety of realms: movies, politics, history, sports, exploration, the military, Dramatic clashes such as wars and adventurous exploits, along with ample coverage of enemies and villains, constitute another important ingredient. Even the science shows take the viewer on dramatic adventures into remote, unknown and mysterious aspects of existence—the ocean, interplanetary space, the barely known origins of man. And finally, the "miscellaneous" category, too, is characterized by an obvious element of dramatic conflict: The testing shows put viewers on their mettle.

According to Don Hyatt, who produced "The Tall American" and "The Real West," "The successful documentary must, above all, have hero

figures, figures that represent human ideals; it must have an empathetic projection of a certain idealism, a certain poetic, romantic view of this country, of life and of man."

Ted Yates also reports that he hit his peak rating with an idealistic show, "The Journals of Lewis and Clark": "It was a pure heroic adventure story, taken from American history. It was a plot story, and very beautiful."

When one leaves the top "hits" and moves down the statistical curve to the "successful" documentaries, ranging between a 19 and 30 share of audience, one discovers that, although the subject matter expands, the same romantic-dramatic elements are present.

Here, again, the same conclusions can be drawn from the chart below. The viewer is responding to admired figures of precisely the same type: political, show business, military—with the addition of major religious, artistic and literary figures.

relish adventures and battles, ancient and modern; explorations of the remote and mysterious aspects of space, earth, sea and man; and visits to every part of an idealistically portrayed America, as well as some dramatic sites in foreign lands.

And finally, he watches documentaries on social problems—all of the ones gaining this share of audience characteristically featuring clear-cut dramatic conflicts: law enforcement agencies versus criminals; racial battles between whites and blacks; conflicts between groups over water supply.

So again, in the 19-30 range, the public-affairs men report that their most successful shows are those with intensely dramatic construction.

Wolf says of ABC's "To Save a Soldier," the highest rated show on the Vietnam war: "It showed a heroic struggle to save a soldier's life."

McMullen reports that his most successful show—a CBS Reports documentary, "Biography of a Bookie Joint"—was "a dramatic confrontation and exposé. The bad guys were all over here, the good guys over there."

It should not be supposed-and no public-affairs man would dream of suggesting-that there is a 1-to-1 relationship between the dramatic subject or structure of any particular documentary and the actual audience it draws. There are far too many variables in the ratings picture to permit anyone to know precisely why any given show gets the audience it does; advance promotion, competition in the same time slot, what precedes or follows a given show are just a few of the factors. The picture is further clouded because the statistics used by ABC cannot be considered to be absolute measurements.

The real value of ABC's research, and of the producers' analyses of their own experiences, lies in the fact that certain romantic-dramatic elements are present on all high ratings levels, by any system of measurement.

As the audience begins to drop

away, and the documentaries gradually sag from a reasonably substantial 18 percent share of audience down to the "flops" with such sorrowful shares as 11, 10 or 9 percent, there is a gradual alteration of the subject matter. Some of the categories are identical, but some are different-and the contents acquire a distinctly drier flavor:

The shows on this list (page 11) include examples of the lowest-rated documentaries. Generally, they are more sedate than the higher-rated subjects. Under "heroes" we find such figures as Winthrop Rockefeller, Senator Dirksen and former FCC Chairman E. William Henry. "Battles" mainly consist of documentaries about a frustrating war. Finally, also, there is a heavy pedagogical emphasis.

On the basis of just such lowrated shows, it has been said that the nation-wide audience is "anti-intel-

lectual" and "escapist."

This is a canard.

The nation-wide audience, in large numbers, does watch cultural and artistic shows, but it prefers shows Michelangelo. Leonardo. Louvre and Stonehenge to shows on Stravinsky, Sandburg, and the making of an Italian movie.

The nation-wide audience does watch historical shows. It merely prefers shows on the heroic aspects of American history-on the Pilgrims, on Lewis and Clark, on "The Real West"-to "sagas" of Western man and to "legacies" of ancient civilizations.

The nation-wide audience does watch foreign-affairs documentaries; but it has preferred documentaries on the Cuban crisis, the Korean War (and even the defeat of the Armada!) to most shows about Vietnam.

What the public seems least likely to watch is the "social problem" documentaries-shows discussing inflation, water and air pollution, disease, poverty, racial oppression and dope addiction. Some of these shows are popular but most are not.

Why is this? According to most of the interviewees, the answer is: lack of drama. They analyze the antidramatic elements as follows:

The "problem" shows ignore the individual. Says Drew: "They say a problem is burning, but they don't show you anyone who's burning. If it's really a burning problem, somebody, somewhere is burning."

They focus on misery and evil. Says Wolf: "People just don't want to look at these things after dinner. Who wants more problems?" Says Drew: "It's the ash-can school of muddling and misery, a mental-hospital approach to life."

They substitute talk for action. Says Yates: "They hand you a lecture and statistics. They give you a montage of talking heads, experts with names written across their chests. It's deadly dull." Says Frank: preach."

The ideas are stereotyped. Says Mc-Mullen: "The problem shows are in molds. They mouth things that other people have already heard before. Problems that have been dealt with 25 times before can't be exciting."

There is no dramatic structure. Says Burton Benjamin: "The chief flaw is bad writing. No unity-no beginning, no middle, no end, no sense of logic." Says McMullen: "Very often, we put on shows with so many gradations of thought, the viewer doesn't know what to think. With 30 different opinions, there is no direct dramatic line."

There is no resolution. Says Wolf: "The public knows damn well nothing is going to happen. The shows often deal with problems for which there is no solution. The viewer knows how it will all turn out beforehand. That is, it won't turn out any way."

Not all the men interviewed agree with this over-all indictment. Says Burton Benjamin: "It's certainly true that some of the problem shows have

been dull and boring, but others have been intensely interesting. I don't know what anybody can do about the atmosphere of depression and futility; many of these problems just don't have solutions. But many of these shows that are considered dull and boring might also be considered profound and significant. These shows must be done, if the news departments are to fulfill their responsibility. Millions of people will see them, and it's worth it." And Wolf makes the same point.

There is only a seeming disagreement. Actually all the interviewees agree that important social problems should be covered by the networks. But they split on the issue of putting on shows which are likely to interest only a small share of the potential audience. Says Reuven Frank: "It is never unimportant to interest your audience. I find this Holy Grail approach snobbish to the point of being antidemocratic."

He and the other men interviewed see drama as the solution to the problem. "If you don't tell people a story, present them with a dramatic conflict, they won't listen," says Frank. "Social problems have a great dramatic potential. Since the time of the Greeks, they've been common currency in drama. But you must have structure, logic, drama. A conflict must be shown."

Why should producers in the "reality" realm be so concerned with

drama? Because, says Yates: "There is in fact, in reality, a dramatic composition to life. Good and bad, happiness and disaster—this is what makes the world go round. If you flatten it out, demolish the dramatic content of life, turn it into an illustrated lecture on statistics, you get dull life—and a dull documentary."

Whatever the relationship between drama and reality, or between art and life, one thing emerges clearly.

The American audience's rejection of low-rated "problem" shows does not, as some critics have charged, indicate intellectual and spiritual inadequacy. High ratings don't constitute proof of excellence—but neither do low ratings. The viewers' collective tastes are not unreasonable and they are resisting no specific type of subject matter. What they seem to be holding out for is drama, meaning, an approach to reality that is idealistic and exciting. They want documentaries on problems, but they want better documentaries or they won't watch.

As Reuven Frank put it: "People are much smarter than they are generally given credit for. The common wisdom exists." These are generous words—and it is high time that somebody said them. Clearly, the time has come to stop judging the Nation by the standard of a handful of documentaries—and to recognize that it is the documentaries that are being judged by the Nation.



ACHTUNG!...please

John Banner plays the most huggable Nazi on TV

U.S. TV's first lovable, huggable German since World War II—Schultzy, der dummkopf turnkey of Hogan's Heroes—is played by actor John Banner, 57, an Austrian Jew who at 28 was driven out of Europe when Hitler's Anschluss took over Austria, and whose entire family was

wiped out in the Nazis' "Final Solution to the Jewish Question."

When the series premièred last season the role of POW camp guard Sergeant Schultz provoked more criticism than any other. Critics protested that the role of Schultz depicts Hitler's "Master Race" as harmless—a breed of silly old buffoons, hopeless oafs, easygoing simps. Banner's answer for that: "You think Schultz is stupid? Notice that he survives."

The critics carped about his "amorality"—Schultz will go either way, with the German captors or with the Allied prisoners. (Scared of being sent to the Russian front, his most characteristic line is, "I know nothing, nothing!") Producer Ed Feldman readily admits that "Schultz is in the category of those who don't take sides. But," he adds, "that also means he's not to be considered one of the Heroes."

Critics went on to complain that Schultz is nothing less than a "cuddly Nazi." Banner's reply: "There is no such thing as a cuddly Nazi. Maybe Goering was cuddly to his wife; he wasn't cuddly to the city of Rotterdam. I would refuse to play a sympathetic Nazi. Schultz is not a Nazi. I see Schultz as the representative of some kind of goodness in any generation."

That's apparently the way the viewers feel about him as well. To them he's a Hero like any other. Banner gets a deluge of fan mail, especially from youngsters, mostly pre-teeners, who vote him their favorite on the show. "How did you get fat or is it pillows?" they write. "Please send me a picture of your great self." "What is your favorite food, music, clothes, reading, dream, color, hobby, song, meat, sport, and flower?"

Says Banner: "It amazes me, the response from kids. Beautiful blondes don't write me. It's always kids. I go over big with them. I'm not a father figure. I'm more the good uncle. It's so touching."

Says Heroes star Bob Crane: "To my kids he's Santy Claus."

Banner has no offspring of his own but he adores children, reads every letter addressed to him and answers each one himself.

There is comradely fraternization

among the *Heroes* on and off the set. "We joke a lot about the way John steals scenes from us," says co-star Robert Clary.

"They can't upstage me. It's a physical impossibility!" chides Banner with

reference to his great girth.

According to co-star Werner Klemperer: "Every Friday night, after the show on TV, our phones are busy. Robert calls John. John calls me. Everybody says everybody else is great. We all do it to each other."

Banner's wife, Christine, is French and a gourmet cook and when not dining on veal kidneys flambé or the like at home in Sherman Oaks, Cal., Banner is apt to be found at one of his five favorite restaurants: Scandia, La Rue, Chasen's, Perino's, or La Chaumiere—quite possibly the five best in the Los Angeles Basin. It might be noted that Banner weighs in at 280 pounds.

He was 100 pounds lighter in 1938 when, finishing an acting engagement in Zurich, Switzerland, he found he couldn't go home: Hitler's army had marched into Austria. So he came to the United States as a refugee. Though he spoke not a word of English he was immediately cast as master of ceremonies of a musical revue, "From Vienna," at the Music Box Theater in New York City, and he had to memorize every word of his patter phonetically.

In his subsequent long Hollywood career as character actor, Banner has had occasion to play a great number of Nazis. "Who can play Nazis better than us Jews?" But certainly never a "cuddly Nazi," and nothing riles him more today than the suggestion that "Sergeant Schultz," or "Schultzy," as he is called by the *Heroes*, is an instrument of Hitlerism. Imagine his dismay when he recently received a fan letter from a pre-teen admirer who, in ignorance of world politics of the Thirties and Forties, naively ended his letter with a friendly "Heil Hitler!"

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

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

There's a high and a low for movie watchers to revel in the course of this week's schedule of network repeats. In between, you have a choice of Westerns and an opportunity to decide if Lewis plus Martin constituted

your cup of mystique.

The high is "The Country Girl," the 1954 movie version of Clifford Odets' drama about an aging actor trying for a comeback. This is the film that won Grace Kelly her Oscar for her portrait of a beautiful young woman made haggard by bitterness and humiliation, but it's the movie in which Bing Crosby gives the dramatic performance of his career as the quaking victim of self-contempt trapped in a vise of alcohol and fear and lies. William Holden is fine as the brash, egotistical young director and among them the three stars make this a first-rate screen drama.

The low, of course, is "Love Has Many Faces"—and how we've managed without the delights of this perfectly awful movie since its December television debut I can't guess. This is the one, you'll recall, about the male prostitute with heart of gold, Cliff Robertson, an Acapulco beach boy bought by that poor little rich lady, Lana Turner, who has about as many problems as she has wardrobe changes but solves them all by getting nonfatally gored by a bull. Bull is the key word—but the awfulness is indeed perfect.

If you like your Westerns-or, more

accurately, Northwesterns - frankly silly and close to parody, "North to Alaska" fills the bill for old-fashioned Stewart Granger, John hokiness. Wayne and Fabian are stalwart enough prospectors who hit it rich; Capucine is the girl they'd all like to marry; and Ernie Kovacs is the villain of the piece. Hokey enough? On the other hand, if you like 'em tinged with Freud, dead serious and full of supreme sacrifices, "The Last Sunset" should fill the bill, albeit slowly and with pretentious posturing. Rock Hudson's the superrighteous trail boss, Kirk Douglas is the charming but ruthless outlaw and Dorothy Malone's the love of their latter days. The brightest spot is provided by Joseph Cotten, in a dandy role as Miss Malone's whisky-saturated spouse.

The Martin-and-Lewis talent for making a shambles out of sound satirical material is on display in "Living It Up," a sort of reverse version of "Nothing Sacred" by way of "Hazel Flagg." Its resemblance to the latter is remote enough, though Lewis turns up as the man (instead of girl) who is supposedly dying of radiation poisoning (from atom-bomb manufacture instead of radium-painting watch faces), and Janet Leigh (instead of a man) is the reporter involved in his exploitation of the gullible sympathies of push-over New Yorkers. Some of the sight gags are funny, a couple of lines are clever, and Sheree North jitterbugs like mad.

New Show No Picnic for Bishop

Quicker than you could say Joey Bishop, the wiseacres were predicting ABC's new attempt to win the insomniacs away from Johnny Carson and late movies was not long for this TV world. Sure enough, Joev's neryous imitation of the long-intrenched Tonight show gave no early sign of catching on. The critics were kind but mostly unenthusiastic. As for the ratings, even with old-pro Jack Paar for an attraction on the first round against Carson, Bishop was a poor also-ran. In a New York Nielsen, the only poll readily available, even the late show outdrew him.

Stiff-upper-lipped ABC brass insisted they had "no expectation that Joey was going to come on like gang busters," as top-man Leonard Goldenson put it, and they were prepared to give him plenty of time to build.

In fact, they noted, Joey has a 39week contract and sponsors committed to stay with him all the way. ABC will wait and see what the audience count is like when the late-evening war has settled into more of a siege.

The summer-vacation bags will hardly be unpacked when the TV networks unleash their barrage of fall premieres. The word filtering out of the executive suites is that the networks will not get together on any one premiere week—each will go its own way, with some shows opening right after Labor Day.

The big TV-radio networks publicly parted ways with their leading in-

dustry organization last week on the subject of public television. To a man the networks' presidents said they were all for pending legislation to create a national noncommercial radio and TV system in this country. "A pressing public need," said CBS's Dr. Frank Stanton, "A wise and constructive course," NBC's Julian Goodman agreed. Let's get it hooked up "sooner than later," urged ABC's Goldenson. Goodman added that we could "quarrel with the accuracy" of the name Public Television on the grounds that it was designed to serve minority needs, whereas it is commercial TV that caters to mass interests. Stanton and Goldenson didn't bring up the name; they just avoided using it.

But the National Association of Broadcasters' Vincent T. Wasilewski was not for a national PTV network by any name. He said that the NAB (which largely reflects the views of radio and TV station managements) thought the only way to preclude "political tampering" with the proposed Federally financed TV and radio would be to channel funds through states to local stations which, in turn, could, if they wished, return some of this money to a national program service. Sen. John O. Pastore (D., R.I.). before whose commerce subcommittee the officials testified, obviously was having none of this argument and dismissed Wasilewski after forcing him to admit NAB opposed the pending bill as written. It was the first opposition that has turned up.

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Bring on the Chocolate Mousse



After a year of stumbling through 'The Monroes,'
Barbara Hershey is ready to try something new

a mountain, 80 miles from hase headquarters at Jackson. Wyo.. when snowstorm started. By the time the gear was packed and the caravan rolling, the tortuous road back was almost impassable, and during the slow descent, everyone, cast and crew alike, had to get out and help push the car through the drifting snow. As they were pushing, the young actress with the long hair began singing "There's No Business Like Show Business."

I he film company was

working high up on

The girl with the long hair was Barbara Hershey, and the company was making *The Monroes*, in which she played Kathy, the older sister in the pioneer family. Off-screen, Barbara looks like anything but a pioneer woman—short skirt, white patterned stockings, British sports car. But, for her, there has been no business like show business since she was a child.

"We used to call her Sarah Bernhardt," says a childhood friend, and her mother says, "She was always temperamental-always the actress." Barbara was an ardent movie fan as a little girl and would act out the roles she had seen when she got home. At Hollywood High School, she appeared as Lady Macbeth and as Martha in "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" Her reason for playing such roles was a practical one: "I chose the nuttiest parts because I knew I'd be an ingénue for a long time." Hollywood High-which she went through in two-and-a-half years in an accelerated course-taught her something else of a practical nature: "It conditioned me. You met the sort of people there that you meet in this business, and the competition is just as intense as it is in the professional world."

Those weeks in Wyoming making The Monroes were the most exciting part of a professional career which. until then, had included three Gidgets. two Farmer's Daughters and a Bob Hope Theater. It was the first time Barbara had ever been out of California: it was the first time she had ever lived in a small town ("Jackson has fewer people than my high school"); and it was, as she puts it, "the first time I had ever heard silence." She enjoyed the scenery ("It drove you nuts"), and she enjoyed living in a motel with her stand-in. a high school friend, where they cooked their own meals and rested up after a six-day-a-week shooting schedule ("It was kind of tiring"). The weather could be rugged and unpredictable ("One day it was 85 degrees, and it snowed"), but the only time Barbara caught cold was when she came back to Hollywood for a visit.

At 19, Barbara Hershey has a little girl's excitement, coupled with an actress's self-assurance and drive. Her mother says, "She was always a combination of shy and wanting to be the center of attention." She can talk about herself by the hour, but the talk is not boastful or egotistical. In fact, it can be self-deprecating. "I'm a clod," she will say. "I'm always tripping and falling down. Once I sat on a cake right in front of a producer. In Wyoming, I bumped into the camera boom one day and when I went to the side lines to tell about it, I bit my tongue. Up there, whenever anybody tripped, they would say they'd pulled a Hershey. My cat is the same way-she's always falling into the bathtub or the toilet."

Because of her clumsiness, the pioneer woman's costume she wore in *The Monroes* was a problem ("I was forever tripping over the long skirt"). This was especially true **continued**

when the pilot film was made in November, a cold month in Wyoming. Barbara recalls, "I wore two pairs of tights, thermo-socks, high button shoes, galoshes, two skirts, a knit underblouse, a regular blouse, a fleecelined army coat, a shawl and mittens. When I had to go into the water, I also wore a life preserver and a wet-suit. I was just supposed to get my feet wet, but guess who tripped?"

When she entered a contest in the rodeo in Wyoming, however, she won.

"She's a tremendous competitor," says someone who knows her. When she first started out to be an actress, while still in high school, she went from casting office to casting office doing a scene from "The Rainmaker." She says, "I did that same scene over 50 times." It finally got her the part in Gidget. When she went to test for the role in The Monroes, all she knew was that it was a Western. Three weeks later, she was in Wyoming. She made one stipulation, though. She told the studio, "I won't pose for any of those pictures for Playboy."

Barbara Hershey started out as Barbara Herzstein, the daughter of a nontheatrical family. Her father, after many years as a handicapper with the Racing Form in Hollywood, now operates a children's store in Fullerton, Cal., a suburb of Los Angeles. Barbara's older brother is an aeronautical engineer and her older sister a computer programmer. Although, unlike many actresses, Barbara is not an only child, her brother and sister are so much older that it was, she says, "like having two sets of parents." The family was close-knit, however. When distance forced Barbara to move to Hollywood from her parents' home in Anaheim, Cal., she rented an apartment at first, but soon afterward she moved in with old family friends. She says, "I'm still young enough to need a family."

She is also young enough to drive 100 miles across Wyoming to see the first episode of *The Monroes*, which did not get into Jackson, and to enjoy the company of her high school boy friend, Michael Chain, who is a member of a rock-'n'-roll group called The Knack.

But most of all she is still young enough to look forward with excitement to the future. No sophisticated, world-weary Hollywood starlet, she says: "There are so many thing I've never tried. I've never had chocolate mousse or lobster."



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
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

Menu from the MIDDLE EAST /continued

Two main dishes, Middle Eastern in flavor, each wonderful for family or company in its own way. One benefits from long, slow cooking and the other can be cooked at the last minute.

TURKISH SHASLIK

(Serves 4)

2 pounds boneless leg of lamb

8 small white onions, peeled

2 tomatoes, quartered

2 green peppers, quartered

8 button mushrooms, stems trimmed

1 cup olive oil

1 small onion, grated

1 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. paprika

Juice of 1 lemon

Cut meat into 1-inch cubes, removing excess fat. Thread meat on 4 skewers. Cover onions with water and boil for 10 minutes. Drain. Thread onions, tomatoes, green peppers and mushrooms on 4 skewers. Meat and vegetables are cooked separately since they require different cooking times. Combine remaining ingredients and brush over meat and vegetables. Let stand for 1 hour. Broil meat 8 minutes on each side or until slightly pink in the center. Broil vegetables about 10 minutes on each side or until easily pierced. Brush kabobs with olive-oil mixture several times during cooking.

Serve with 1 cup rice cooked with 1/4 teaspoon powdered saffron and, when cooked, mixed with 1/4 cup butter or margarine and 2 tablespoons finely chopped scallions.

ARABIAN CASSOULET

(Serves 8)

1 pound dried marrow beans

2 tbsp. firmly packed dark brown sugar

1/2 tsp. ground cloves

1 tsp. poultry seasoning

1 tsp. celery seed

1 tsp. paprika

1/4 tsp. pepper

3 cloves garlic, chopped

1 cup tomato sauce (8 oz. can)

1 cup chopped onions

½ pound bacon in one piece, diced into 1-inch cubes

2 cups smoked ham,

cut into 1-inch cubes

8 country sausages

Cover beans with water. Bring to boil, boil for 2 minutes and let stand until cold. Drain. Add remaining ingredients except ham and sausages. Add water to cover and simmer, stirring occasionally, until beans are almost tender, adding more water to prevent sticking. Pour half of the beans into a 3-quart casserole. Top with ham cubes, remaining beans and sausages. Bake uncovered in a preheated moderate oven (350° F.) for 1 hour or until sausages are brown and beans bubbly. Stir to blend and serve with a crisp green salad.

Right in the middle there's this big, mean, onyxblack building called "The Tower,"

or "sir" and exchange looks of exasperation. Even when Webb wasn't in the picture you could hear his voice. "Turn to your left," you could hear him telling Harry in this one shot. "Now to the right. Now look into the camera. Good!"

I asked Harry if having this fellow Webb looking down your throat all the time couldn't sort of bother. Harry pushed his glasses down that long ski nose of his. "It could," he admitted. "But not at this stage of the game. Matter of fact, I don't think it ever really did," as if he had some great Norwegian secret for not being bothered. When Ben Alexander, who played Webb's partner back in the good old days of just plain Dragnet (you remember that one), went and signed up with a rival force, The Felony Squad, on another network, Webb sent for Harry. Who but Harry would put up with it?

When we went for lunch, this nice lady came with us. She is what they call a press agent and she is there to make sure Harry doesn't say anything he shouldn't. We ate in the studio commissary, which was packed with a lot of spiffy people-smiling men with haircuts like somebody printed them on and pretty women with faces as smooth as plastic dolls.

A guy went by our table and Harry flagged him down. "Hey," said Harry in that rain-barrel voice of his like three platoons of the Soviet Army Chorus. "Did you hear that Kelly's finally sold?" Kelly's Kingdom is a proposed TV show he'd worked on with this fellow.

"You gotta be kidding," the guy said, getting excited.

"Yeah," said Harry, "right down the river." And then he worked his lip down his teeth a couple of times like he does when he gets off a good one.

When he's like that he reminds you

of that nutty Pete Porter guy he played for so many years in December Bride, that next-door neighbor who was always cracking jokes out the side of his mouth. "It was very pleasant," Harry said. "Five years went by like one." Though he doesn't mind telling how after four years he marched in, all 5-feet-81/2 of him, demanding a raise. "I said, 'If I don't get it, I'm leaving.' They said, 'You'll never work again.' I said, 'I don't give a damn. I'll go back to Michigan where I was born and be a toolmaker like my old man.' And I would have." He got the raise

He talked about Pete and Gladys, that show that followed December Bride, in which Harry continued as Pete Porter and that temperamental redheaded actress Cara Williams came in as Gladys. "Let's say I wasn't sorry to see it end," he said, raising one eyebrow, at which he is an expert. As I get it, Tovis, Miss Williams sort of liked to take charge and Harry had a lot of deep breathing to do for the two years. Also he talked about the redoubtable Richard Boone, the man who tried unsuccessfully to restore serious drama to television. It was tough on actors. But Harry said he didn't mind. "All part of the racket."

Later on I went out to visit with Eileen-that's Harry's wife. I took a couple of turns off Mandeville Canyon (a very posh neighborhood) and came to this iron grille gate beyond which I could see this great estate. Don't worry; Harry doesn't live there. Instead you turn off through some trees and weeds on a bumpy dirt road which gets you to a big white barn. Eileen, an attractive and sensitive woman, and I talked in the living room, which really is the loft, and I was struck by the fact that you could actually hear leaves skittering across the roof. Most people in Hollywood listen to their air continued

conditioners; Harry prefers his leaves. I was impressed.

I guess you don't know that Eileen was an actress and met Harry when they both had small parts in "Golden Boy" on Broadway and that they came out in 1941 and have been slugging it out ever since. "We had four boys in four years," she said. "It wasn't always easy."

I got to admiring Harry's few paintings, which look like they were bought because somebody liked them, and the bulging shelves of battered, readlooking books. What with the crickets and the sound of the Morgans' 9year-old, toothless, asthmatic dachshund, Brenda, wheezing in the now darkened room, it was an oasis of peace and sanity. Eileen talked about how they see quite a few movies (foreign, mainly) and still go to a few parties, though not as many as they used to. But Harry can be completely happy with a book and a reel of Sibelius on his 12-year-old tape hi-fi. "Harry can go a week without saying anything," she said.

Then Harry came home in his new Cadillac-Cadillacs are very stylish over here-which sort of embarrasses him because he used to be a Volkswagen man. We sat in their tiny kitchen (to get to it you have to go outside). Harry and I had a Scotch and Eileen had a coffee, which she shared with Brenda, to Harry's undisguised annovance.

"Well, she was thirsty," Eileen said. I tell you it was pretty cozy there in the kitchen, Tovis, with Harry, Eileen,

me and old Brenda the dachshund. Harry got a little mellow and started talking about how maybe he could have done better if he were a different kind of guy. "Maybe if I had more push. . . ." Then he got to wondering whether he should have left New York at all. He gave his head a couple of nods like he does: "People accomplish more back there," he said.

He was probably thinking of some of the heavyweight types he started with back in the Group Theatre days, guys like Elia Kazan-remember he directed "A Streetcar Named Desire," Tovis. But everyone can't be Elia Kazan and even Harry admits things haven't been half bad when he starts talking about friends of his, good actors, who are selling shoes at the department store or pumping gas.

Here's your nephew, barely 52, with enough real-estate investments, it turns out, that he really doesn't have to work at all. And if he wants to get away he can go up to his 15acre spread in Northern California and play gentleman rancher.

And the clincher, Tovis, is that people, all of them, speak well of your nephew. I was talking to one fellow, Devery Freeman, who produced that Pete and Gladys show and admired Harry for how he stood up to a very difficult situation. "He's a very well-rounded citizen," he said of Harry, "He's droll, pleasant, philosophical. A fine example of a man."

My feeling is that whatever the executives in that black tower think up, Harry will take care of it.

Harry sends his best. And so do I. Mike Fessier Jr.



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OLD BANANA NOSE

n the mature opinion of Edward Arcaro, television commentator, insurance executive and former horseback rider who appeared in 21 Kentucky Derbys under the nom de course Banana Nose, it requires experience to be scared.

"I rode in my first Derby at 19," he testifies. "The trainer had to wake me the morning of the race to get me out to the track. He was mad. He said, 'Nothing impresses you, does it, kid!' I answered, 'What the hell, it's just

another horse race, isn't it?'

"Well, to give you the straight picture, I rode in the Derby 20 years later [astride Nashua] and I was so tense before the race that I was sick. I was honestly nervous, because I knew by this time the real impact of the race."

What Eddie seems to be saying is that we can look only for the very young, or the totally foolish, to be riding cool in the 93rd running Saturday of the most significant thing to hit Kentucky since sour mash. Beginning at 5 P.M. (ET), CBS will telecast the race, as it has for the last 19 years.

Winner of five Derbys, Arcaro confesses that he snatched his first—aboard Lawrin in 1938—violating the instructions of his trainer, the late Ben Jones.

"The day before the race," recalls Eddie, "Jones walked me the full mile and a quarter over the course, pointing out holes in the track and spots to avoid. His final order was to stay away from the rail at all costs. So I proceeded to get on the rail—and I

never got out. Luckily, I won there.

"At a press conference afterward, Jones had a few drinks. He glanced at me coldly, then said to the reporters, "There is one thing that makes Arcaro the greatest. You tell him to do something and he does it.'"

Eddie subsequently won Derbys on Whirlaway (1941), Hoop Jr. (1945), Citation (1948) and Hill Gail (1952). But he makes it plain that misjudgment, resulting mostly from tenseness.

also cost him Derbys.

"I had the favorite, Phalanx, in 1947," he says. "He was the best horse, but I was overly cautious and afraid to take any chances moving between horses. Instead, I decided to loop the field, hoping I had enough animal to make it. We pulled up a head short of Jet Pilot."

Nor does Arcaro feel he did his best work with Hill Prince in 1950 when he tried to win on the rail, as he had done with Lawrin. Blocked through much of the race, Arcaro finished second in what he felt was his most disappointing Derby ride.

Eddie was asked, "With all the rich races about the country today, why is the Derby more important to a jockey than any of the other big stakes?"

"Because winning the Derby will get the jock the ride in many of the other races," he answered. "The Derby is still the prestige race of America. You win it, and owners will fight just for the honor of putting their silks on the back of a Derby winner."

A claim of foul never has been allowed in this event, leading many to observe that the Derby is the world's roughest race. Did Arcaro find it so?

"Some I have ridden in have been rough suckers," he says. "But jocks today shouldn't try to stretch their luck, as we did years ago. They've got you cold on video tape today. If the pictures turn up a foul, the guilty rider can forget about the stewards' not taking down the number just because it happens to be the Derby."

"Why has the race been so rough?"

Eddie was asked.

"For two reasons," he answered. "First, this is the one the jocks want to win; to illustrate how badly, I once got shut off by my own stablemate, even though we were splitting the fees. I was on Devil's Diver in 1942. Wayne Wright was on Shut Out, the other half of our entry. When I tried to move from the pack at the far turn, Wayne closed the switch on me and went on to win.

"The other reason the Derby is rough is because maybe 75 percent of the horses [most authorities would rate the figure lower] are green and of unknown quality, and they clutter up the field."

"Has television, with its millions of viewers, increased the pressure on the

riders?"

"It's possible," said Eddie, "but I doubt it. As far back as I remember—long before TV—jocks got butterflies before the race. And the same thing happens today to any man who has enough brains to be scared."

Retired from racing for five years, Arcaro resides in New York today, serving as president of an insurance company which underwrites, among other things, horses' lives. His side job is doing TV commentary on the major races, usually drawing the assignment of interviewing the winning jockey. Arcaro will join the CBS team for all three races of the Triple Crown; this week's Derby, the Preakness (May 20) and at the Belmont (June 3).

Always glib, if not downright garrulous, Arcaro enjoys working before a microphone, but feels that televising a horse race is not the easiest job. "CBS is on the air for an hour from Churchill Downs," he says. "Of that time, only two minutes or so are taken up by the race. A lot of careful preparation is needed to fill the rest of the program."

The effort on the part of the network to offer interesting sidelights resulted in a harrowing experience last year. The day before the race, a camera crew was dispatched to the barns to film a segment with Kauai King (the eventual winner) and its owner, Michael Ford.

Late that afternoon, as CBS sports vice president Bill MacPhail sipped a julep at Churchill Downs, a distressing report reached him. He heard—and later got documentation—that Kauai King's trainer, afraid to upset the animal with cameras and the like, had used a stand-in horse, taking the logical position that viewers couldn't tell one from the other anyway.

A frantic MacPhail rounded up the announcer and ordered the commentary changed, making it clear that Mike Ford was seen in front of the barn, but not with Kauai King.

To the best of everyone's knowledge, the man posing with the stand-in horse actually was Ford.




