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as we see it

■ TV manufacturers are facing up to the shortage of qualified servicemen. They've appropriated money to investigate methods of coping with the problem and one corporation has announced it is greatly expanding its pilot program of training centers.

According to the authoritative trade paper Television Digest, there is a present shortage of 50,000 to 75,000 technically trained people, which could increase to a shortage of 300,000 to 400,000 within 10 years if action is not taken now.

■ The consumer electronics manufacturers have authorized their trade organization—the Electronic Industries Association—to hire administrators who will "pull together all elements under the control of manufacturers, to identify all areas of interest and develop a broad program."

Anyone who has tried, unsuccessfully, to have a television set fixed in a hurry, anyone who has been victimized by a fly-by-night service company or overcharged by an independent thief calling himself a "serviceman," will join us in urging the EIA to move quickly to recruit and train thousands of qualified repairmen.

This magazine has frequently urged readers to be careful in selecting men to repair their sets and has pointed out many of the tricks employed by service racketeers. Our advice has been to buy a set from a reputable dealer who will stand behind it with his own service organization or one he recommends. If it is necessary to call a strange service company, check first with your local Better Business Bureau.

By far the majority of servicemen are honest citizens, but there are enough thieves among them to warrant extreme caution on the part of the set owner. Until the shortage is solved, then, all of us ought to take heed of the ancient Roman warning: "Let the buyer beware!"

The MAMAS and the PAPAS (June 4) and ALAN KING (June 11) are set for visits with ED SULLIVAN . . . Singer LANA CANTRELL will be making four appearances with SULLIVAN next season . . . CBS is thinking about doing a musical version of DICKENS! "A Christmas Carol" for children next season . . . Golf champ BERT YANCEY defends his title in the Memphis Open, which ABC will televise from the Colonial Country Club on June 3 and 4 . . . ABC's Wide World of Sports will cover the National AAU Women's Indoor Diving Championships from Arlington, Texas, on June 3.

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

Vaudeville, specials, repeats and sports will be features of summer television

Watching summer reruns-or avoiding them-has become as much a part of summer living as backyard barbecues, air conditioning and fly swatting. When asked to explain why so much of the summer air is filled with reincarnations of fall and winter shows, TV's programmers have been known to suggest, rather fancifully, that they are actually doing many viewers a favor. Their reasoning goes something like this: Even the most popular programs are seen by only, say, 30 million people the first time around; that leaves about 160 million others who might jump at a second chance to see these shows.

It's a nice thought, particularly when enhanced by the added suggestion that those 30 million or so who saw the programs first time around might even enjoy seeing many of them over again.

All of this really is a whopping pipe dream, of course, the facts being that there is less TV viewing in summer and the sponsors consequently pay less. But there are other reasons, too, for all the warmed-over programming: It's tough creatively to come up with even 25 or 30 weekly episodes for most series, let alone a whole 52. Also, production costs are forever on the rise, and networkers are prone to argue that they just can't make ends meet unless they get a second run out of a series.

But the summer TV outlook isn't totally bleak. Take the replacement shows, for instance. Six hours a week of fresh comedy-variety. It'll practically bring back vaudeville!

CBS alone will haul up four of these shows. On Wednesday nights Steve Allen will be fronting one of them, aided and abetted by the Mrs. (Jayne Meadows) and Louis Nye. On Sundays the vehicle will be a Smothers Brothers replacement regularly featuring the comedy team of Jack Burns and Avery Schreiber, plus

the Doodletown Pipers. On Saturday nights Jackie Gleason's hour will be taken over by a song-dance-gags show headlining comedian George Carlin, singer Buddy Greco and bandleader Buddy Rich. And on Tuesday nights Red Skelton's time will be filled by a taped music-hall type of entertainment out of London, with a different cast each week.

ABC likewise will reach over to London for a summer hour, replacing Hollywood Palace Saturday nights with a Piccadilly Palace featuring British swingers and American guests. NBC will do a summer Dean Martin show with Vic Damone standing in.

Fresh fare in other forms of weekly programming will be typically sparse. CBS at least will satisfy the curiosity of many people in and near the business by finally running the long-shelved 13 episodes of an original dramatic series titled *Coronet Blue*. Produced by Herbert Brodkin, and starring Frank Converse as a youth in search of his identity, it was one of the last series bought by Jim Aubrey before his eclipse as CBS-TV czar.

NBC is pulling a stand-by off the shelf in scheduling a run of *The Saint* adventure dramas for Sunday nights, replacing Andy Williams, beginning this weekend.

At ABC, *Peyton Place* will go on through the summer, cranking out fresh hand wringers.

Specials will abound this summer. Among them are both promising originals and some of the past season's best.

For the public-affairs minded, ABC will have a *Summer Focus* series of 16 hour documentaries—eight originals and eight repeats of ABC News specials—running in the *Stage* 67 time period Thursday nights.

One of the new productions, "Cortez and the Legend," will be seen this week (May 26). Subsequent documentaries will delve into the growing problem of "Young Drug continued

Users," the "crisis" in the medical profession, the situation facing southern Negroes migrating to northern ghettos, the menace of air pollution, the questions facing the Democrats and the Republicans. In addition, there will be reshowings of "War in the Skies," "The Adventures of Mark Twain," "We Are Not Alone," "The Legacy of Rome," "The Songmakers," "I, Leonardo da Vinci," "Anatomy of Pop: The Music Explosion," "1776," "I Am a Soldier" and "Everybody's Got a System."

CBS will repeat some of its best Tuesday night news hour documentaries of the past season, as well as dropping in a few new ones (i.e., a June 6 study of the artist Gauguin's life in Tahiti). In the coming week (May 23) the third annual "National Drivers Test" is scheduled. On Aug. 22 newsman Harry Reasoner will preside over the first of 14 freewheeling CBS News specials titled "Who, What, When, Where, Why."

NBC has a blend of news and entertainment specials in the works, including a two-hour "Tanglewood Gala" from the Berkshire Music Festival the evening of Aug. 17. Another notable summer project: a 12-week rerun of the award-winning Animal Secrets and The Smithsonian children's series at a time-Sundays at 6:30 (ET), beginning June 18intended to give the two programs general family exposure. Otherwise the NBC summer agenda lists such one-shots as this week's "The American Image" as seen through its artists' eyes, a visit to Canada's Expo 67, an examination of "The Learning Process," a look at "Whatever Happened to Civil Rights?" and an assessment of the Republican Party's prospects. In the repeats lineup are such real-life hours as "Siberia: A Day in Irkutsk" and "The Aviation Revolution."

The girl watchers can look forward to live coverage of the Miss U.S.A. Pageant this Saturday (May 20), the National College Queen Pageant on June 16, the Miss Universe Pageant July 15 and the Miss America do on Sept. 9.

Summer on TV is always a sports festival. Just about everything an armchair sports buff could wish for is on tap. A summary by networks:

ABC—Golf tournaments ranging from the Colonial this weekend to the U.S. Open on June 17 and 18, the U.S. Women's Open on July 2, the British Open (via satellite) on July 14-15, the PGA on July 22-23, and wrapping up with the U.S. Men's Amateur on Sept. 2. Saturdays when no tournament conflicts, Sam Snead's series will be on tap. The Coaches All-America football game at Atlanta July 8 and the College All-Star football game Aug. 4 at Chicago. The Le Mans auto races from France on June 10-11, and tentatively, the U.S. Tennis Championships from Forest Hills.

CBS—The network has already kicked off its trail-blazing soccer schedule, which will occupy Sunday afternoons into early September. Five NFL preseason football games are booked, four for evenings in August and early September, the final one for Sunday afternoon, Sept. 10. In addition, CBS has the Preakness this weekend, the All-Star Bowling tournament next weekend (May 28), the Belmont Stakes June 3, Canadian Open golf July 1-2 and the Carling World golf matches Sept. 3-4.

NBC — Twenty-five major-league baseball games are ticketed for Saturday afternoons. There also will be three prime-time games, on the Monday nights of June 5, July 3 and Sept. 4, and the All-Star Game July 11, beginning at 7:15 P.M. (ET). The Buick Open golf tournament will be televised June 10-11 and the World Series of Golf on Sept. 9-10.



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'GO TO THE HEART OF DANGER' 'Rat Patrol's Chris George
has some very definite
ideas about heroism—
on TV and in life

"Go to the heart of danger . . . for there you'll find safety."

The hero of Rat Patrol, a man with a lean, bony face and intent blue eyes, who is habitually described as "stalwart," smiles. "It's a saying," he continues. "My brother and I have used it ever since we were kids. It means: Face what you're afraid of. You've got to aim as high as you possibly can in life. I don't mean aim at being President or any such thing. It's a goal of manhood, really. You have to reach to be a man."

By "man," Chris George means the very thing that the critics of Rat Patrol-a hit series about four Allied heroes fighting Rommel's Afrika Korps-have boggled at as being "Superman" and "larger than life." He means: Heroic Man. "They call the Hero bigger than life, but he isn't. There are heroes. And they are heroic. All you have to do is read the exploits of these men to know how fantastically heroic

were. There's nothing unreal about a hero. That's what a man should be."

For Chris, TV acting is a relatively new career. He worked in commercials for a number of years—he won an award for the best film actor in TV commercials at the New York Film Festival. In the early Sixties, he studied acting and toured in such plays as "A Streetcar Named Desire" and "The Moon Is Blue." Then he made three movies: "Gentle Rain," with Lynda Day, "El Dorado," with John Wayne and Robert Mitchum, and "The Ballad of Givilan," with Patricia Rainier. Wayne says of him: "He's just great, a fine actor."

Last spring Chris George was hired for the leading role in Rat Patrol.

As Sergeant Troy, leader of the embattled quartet, Chris projects a grim discipline and a moral severity that is convincingly heroic. He talks of his character with intense concentration. "Sam Troy," he says, "doesn't like authority. He doesn't want anyone trying to control his life. He wants to guide his own destiny-and in that desert patrol, he's found a way to do it. That desert patrol is Sam Troy's world. Anything that comes near it, that will endanger it, he destroys. He's absolutely dedicated to his own values. He'll shoot an enemy cold-bloodedly if it's necessary, to protect those values."

He is obviously talking about himself to some degree. In an era when many young men are assiduously cultivating the role of dove rather than hawk, Chris George is an unabashed

and passionate hawk.

He was born in Royal Oak, Mich., of Greek parents, John and Vaseleke George, and spoke Greek before learning English. His early education was mainly in Greek schools, where he appeared in presentations of classical Greek drama. He is steeped in the ancient Greek tradition. As he grew up he stuffed himself on books: "Mili-

tary heroes and philosophers—that's what I read about. Socrates, Plato, Aristotle, Alexander the Great, Darius, Napoleon, Montgomery, Bradley, Eisenhower. The philosopher represented the mental aspect of life. The military man was the physical aspect of life. It was my aspiration to be in control of both."

Somewhere early in childhood he also added a thick streak of romanticism. He and his brother, Nick George, a high-fashion photographer and movie director, had a "Beau Geste" relationship which perseveres to this day: "Go to the heart of danger . . ." reminisces Chris. "That was the principle of both our lives. If you're afraid of something, dive into it. I remember once we were walking down the street at night and six guys started heckling us. We were about 17. Nick and I were scared. He whispered to me, 'Go to the heart of danger-we'll find safety'-and we dove into them."

Street-corner hecklers were not the only source of Chris's fears, however. "Fear is instilled into the child," he says, "-fear of church, fear of society, fear of parents. It starts a battle that goes on forever-the outside versus the inside. What that little voice says inside of you and what that big, big voice says outside." The "big, big voice" dictated, when Chris was very little, that he enter the Greek Orthodox Church. "My family prepared me for it. I knew all the chants and rants." Says his brother Nick: "All through his childhood, Chris was the altar boy, the choirboy. The priest and the family were trying to groom him to enter the church. They wanted him to become a priest." Chris rebelled. He quit high school in his 11th year and fled. He didn't join the Foreign Legion but the next best thing, the Marine Corps. And brother Nick also fled and joined him. "Were we romantic!" explains Nick. "Rather!"

Once out of the Marine continued

Corps, Chris went to college and once again faced the problem of what to do with his life. "I was scared to death. I was torn by a conflict between the practical and the idealistic. I took a degree in finance. I was going to be an investment broker. But the truth was, I didn't want to do at all. I was being 'practical.' So . . . I went to the heart of danger. I went to New York to do what I really wanted to do—to be an actor."

Through the season, Chris has gotten more than the usual portion of publicity—since the air has been thick with the sound of crashing shows. Triumphant little bulletins from ABC are appearing here and there about his person, his activities and his tastes. A thorough gleaning of these bulletins reveals that he's 5-feet-11 and weighs 175 pounds; he likes gournet food, goes in for skin diving, karate and doing his own stunts; he paints, writes, listens to jazz. He's been married once, is getting a divorce and will not discuss the subject.

Unfortunately, these bulletins make him sound very much like a halfdozen other TV stars-which he is not. The star of Rat Patrol is quite a unique young man. He is still an aspiring Athenian. He made a pilgrimage to Greece several months ago and speaks of it emotionally: "Honest to God, it was like-it was history! Socrates was there! And Aristotle!" he says the name reverently in Greek. "I saw the Acropolis. I couldn't take my eyes off it. It's the history of man to me. It's a tribute to man, a tribute to greatness, to achievement."

In an era of selfless do-goodism, Chris George is a man who worries about not being selfish enough. "Nothing's wrong with selfishness," he says. "It's self-betterment. You can't give-give-give-give. You've got to be someone. What are you if you're

worthless, a loser? What have you done with your life?"

A bona-fide hero-worshiper, he is drawn to certain qualities in people: "people with self-respect, with goals, with strength, control and honesty." He says, "I'll tell you exactly the type of man I like. There's a man named Al Cuesta, I was in the Marine Corps with him, when he was 17 years old. He said to me, 'I'm going to be a cop. The best cop New York City ever had!' At the time, it was the greatest statement I'd ever heard in my life. And it's happened. Today he's a First Grade detective in the DA's office in Queens County, I think he's one of the youngest detectives in the history of New York City. He wants to protect this city the way Sergeant Troy wants to protect his world. That's what I like in a man-a willingness to battle for what he loves. A lot of Al Cuesta is in Sam Trov."

As for Chris himself, despite a lifetime struggle against fear, a lot of him is in Sam Troy too. Says Detective Al Cuesta: "As a man, he's a stubborn son-of-a-gun. He's got a lot of will power, a lot of drive, courage, a lot of ambition. Anything he goes after, he gets. If he believes in something, he believes in it. It's hard to swing him, unless you show him in black and white that he is wrong."

Says John Anthony Hays, vice president of Chris's production company in Hollywood: "The thing that seems to make Chris tick is a belief that you have only so much time in this life and you must take advantage of it. He's never nibbled at life. He has always taken a big bite. He's a man's man."

And, says his brother Nick: "Chris is one of the few I've met in my lifetime that I'd call an individualist. The world, society, comes second to Chris. What comes first for him is the self—he tries to live by what he thinks, what he feels. He tries to pursue what he thinks is right."

Second Thoughts


What kind of a season has it been? Well, for one thing, shows are canceled about twice as fast. Which is often before anybody except Mr. A. C. Nielsen and his immediate family get a chance to know whether they like them or not. But look at it this waya season can't be all bad when it marks the demise of that grand old leastfavorite What's My Line? Honestly, one more go of that and we couldn't be responsible for our reactions. Other demises, however, were sad. One is Combat!, which, as war shows go, wore well. Another is Candid Camera. Finally, it is sad indeed to say good-by to The Fugitive. Somehow we had hoped David Janssen would run forever.

To re-review, we would say that the show we most overcriticized was Star Trek; lately we've enjoyed and admired much in this series. On the other hand, the show we most overpraised was Rat Patrol, often so unbelievable it's silly. We gave only three comedies what we call "A" notices. These were Occasional Wife, Love on a

Rooftop and Run, Buddy, Run—and all three were canceled. Run, Buddy, in fact, did not even get one rerun. Were they too good? Well, whether they were or not, that's what you get when you operate on the system that every show must please everyone—or off it goes. Can you imagine what would happen if TV Gude were edited like that. Where would our column be? We ask you.

On the documentary front the network news departments labored mightily as usual-and, as usual, brought forth, generally speaking, These news departments. mice. weighed down with their endless awards and their almost unbelievable self-satisfaction, constantly complain that few viewers watch documentaries. If they would go out and do some of the very reporting so lacking in their documentaries, they would soon discover that one reason so few people watch is that the average viewer has learned, through bitter experience, that the average documentary is (a) dull, (b) pointless and (c) worst of all, point of viewless.

There are exceptions, of course and, in uncontroversial areas, there were some fine shows, such as "Hall of Kings" and "Dr. Leakey and the Dawn of Man." When they tackle a controversial subject, however, if you know anything at all about the topic of a particular show, you find all too often that it is just a reworked rehash which not only overpublicizes already overpublicized people but also plays up all the already overangled angles. In fact, we can think of only two documentaries in this area which would bear mentioning, let alone repetition—"Whose Right to Bear Arms?" and "Saigon." In a year in which this country was, at home, embroiled in the greatest ferment since TV began; and, abroad, was engaged in the most controversial, unpopular war in our history, this is an appalling record.



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

"The Joker Is Wild" is the story of Joe E. Lewis, a giant in the night-club arena but little more than a name, if even that, to those who haven't crossed his path on the Las Vegas-Copacabana circuit. The sole subjects of his night-club patter are horses and alcohol, and coincidentally his story is a melancholy saga of a man addicted to both. Yet the film, as a film, has surprising appeal, primarily due to Frank Sinatra's versatile portrait of a moody flesh-andblood joker who is as likable as he is pitiable. A singer who incurs gangster vengeance and maining as a result of his ambitions in Chicago in the mobster-dominated Twenties, he turns baggy-pants comedian in burlesque to hide the scars of the slashing that destroyed his vocal chords. Eventually he turns to night clubs; but frightened, insecure, taking refuge in drink, he wavers through life, missing his chance at true love, taking an unhappy fling at marriage. It sounds sentimental at best, lugubrious at worst-but thanks to Sinatra it comes off with warmth and depth, the story of a man whose weaknesses nullified his success.

Sinatra's on hand again in "The Man with the Golden Arm," the oncedaring but now over-familiar story of a poker-playing drug addict. Again Sinatra's performance and those of several supplementary players save the situation from itself.

There's little worth saving from

the rest of the week's network movie reruns. "For Love or Money" is one of those lush, lavish, bright, sprightly and trivial comedies, this one involving a rich widow trying to find mates for her three daughters. It is noteworthy only because Kirk Douglas displays agility in dealing with a light line and comic mood and Thelma Ritter remains her delightful self despite being swathed in jewels and gowns galore. And "Sail a Crooked Ship," as noted recently, is worth preserving only as Ernie Kovacs' last film. He and Frank Gorshin are fine but little else is even bearable.

This week we're also offered a double view of the American family as, let us hope, it does not exist. "Mr. Hobbs Takes a Vacation" presents what might have been a delightfully misanthropic view of togetherness, but winds up being just a series of pat situation-comedy, stock-family-character gags leading to the sugary thesis that there's nothing like a clan gathered into itself. Thanks to the old-pro charm of James Stewart and John McGiver, and some bright lines from Nunnally Johnson's screenplay, it does have its moments en route. "Five Finger Exercise" hasn't a one in its ludicrous dramatics about a viciously culture-conscious woman's dire effect on her husband, her children and a young German tutor. Either film, however, may well serve to make you a bit more satisfied with your own folks at home.

Doris Day Takes the TV Plunge

Doris Day, such a total TV shunner she has not even swapped ersatz pillow talk with Johnny Carson, at long last will take the video plunge. CBS got her, and not just for a weekly situation comedy: the network also will produce her movies. With the hottest box-office name of our time as its replacement for Lucy Ball when she quits-as it seems she really will after next season-CBS will take no unnecessary chances on Miss Dav's suffering the fate of Jean Arthur, whose comedy flopped so quickly last fall; or, worse vet, Carol Channing, whose series pilot was such a disaster her show died a-borning. Both their vehicles were produced outside CBS. At the same time reliable sources denied stories that CBS dangled less money before the elusive movie star than the record amount now paid for the Lucille Ball show. Otherwise not much was buttoned down yet except that D.D. will portray a young widow with three offspring.

CBS News president Richard S. Salant is "a couple of inches" from a decision to spring a large-scale documentary reporting on his staff's eightmonth probe of the Kennedy assassination. "We've got another trip to New Orleans before we decide," he said.

Salant also confirmed talk that he might okay a CBS News Hour about Public Television, a rising competitor to commercial TV in which his predecessor, Fred W. Friendly, is a towering figure. Friendly's recently published account of his 16 CBS years is

so unpopular in his former bailiwick that network employees reputedly have been admonished not to discuss it even among themselves, much less with outsiders. Would the projected telecast be able to ignore Friendly? "Certainly not" Salant replied. "As far as I'm concerned, he can do everything but produce it."

Dean of the print pundits, Walter Lippmann is reliably understood to have succumbed again to the blandishments of Fred Friendly, who first "dragged him kicking and screaming" before CBS cameras several years ago for a series of in-depth interviews. The columnist is expected to try doing occasional on-camera expertizing for a live nation-wide Public Broadcast Laboratory to be aired by educational stations Sunday nights beginning in October. Edward P. Morgan also has been recruited for this project as a full-time "senior correspondent" on two-year leave from ABC News.

President Johnson's preference for boss of a proposed national Corp. for Public Broadcasting, according to insiders, is Douglass Cater, his White House assistant who helped hammer out the Administration's proposals for a federally financed radio-TV system. Cater, former Washington editor of Reporter magazine, is said to be keen for the job. Her life is cluttered with cats, dogs and old boy friends

If Sigmund Freud were still around, he might well decide that the most frustrated actress in Hollywood is a twinkly redhead named Aneta (pronounced Anita) Corsaut (pronounced Core-so).

Consider:

On The Andy Griffith Show, in the role of a schoolteacher unromantically yclept Helen Crump, she leads an almost nun-like existence as Sheriff Andy's girl friend, whose most provocative line is something like, "How would you like to go out to Meyers' Lake?"

Aneta's one and only movie was a low-budget science-fiction thriller made in 1958 called "The Blob." After seeing the first day's rushes of herself, she played the rest of the picture with her face away from the camera.

And in private life, at 33, she is not only unmarried but, untypical of Hollywood actresses, has never even been married. She lives in a cluttered house in the San Fernando Valley with three determined dogs and a constantly fluctuating number of cats.

But, whatever Freud might have thought, things really aren't so bad

for Aneta Corsaut.

For one thing, Andy Griffith takes a more mature view of the relationship between his on-the-air character and Miss Crump than might be apparent from the tepid goings-on seen on CBS every Monday night. Despite his reputation as a rustic comedian, Griffith's acting techniques smack of Stanislavsky-he laboriously figures out and motivates even the most simple scenes and character relationships, Concerning Sheriff Andy Taylor and Miss Helen Crump he says, "They are a couple of adult human beings -unwed. What they do off-screen as adults we indicate occasionally by a look or a touch. They choose to remain single because they want to pursue their separate careers." In other words, there may be something going on out there at Meyers' Lake after all—you just don't see it on TV.

As for Aneta Corsaut's appearance in "The Blob," Steve McQueen was in it, too, and he has done all right.

And Aneta's private life is crowded not only with dogs and cats but with old boy friends. It has been said that "her romances are long-term but not serious." Former swains-from her birthplace. Hutchinson, Kan.; from Northwestern University, where she studied drama; and from New York, where she was a struggling actressare now in Hollywood, evidently eternally loyal and ever ready for an evening of Monopoly or Scrabble or to take Aneta out bowling or to a movie or play. A friend says, "Sometimes I imagine that 50 years from now they'll all still be around, just waiting for her to say yes."

The reasons that an attractive redhead has not said yes probably have their roots back in Hutchinson, Kan. There the white frame house, with its big yard and the swing out in back, was always crowded with boys. "She had more dates than any girl in her class," says Aneta's brother Jesse, now an artist in Carmel, Cal. "The boys came around in relays." One of those boys recalls, "It was a comfortable place to go. The kids would go over after school and play jazz records. There was no sense of 'you can't do things in this house'-everybody was welcome."

Aneta was also a tomboy who liked to play baseball with the boys as well as to go out on dates with them. Even today she says, "I still don't see why I couldn't have been a major league player"—a fact which, she hints darkly, is attributable to prejudice in high places against women. Eventually her nose was broken three times in baseball games, and she had to have plastic surgery. Nose jobs are not uncommon among actresses

—or actors—but it is usually vanity rather than baseball that brings them about.

For Aneta, much of the joy of her home and the boys and baseball went out of her life when her father, a plant pathologist, died suddenly during her second year at Northwestern. Today, recalling that time, she says, "I lost my boy friend." Her brother says, "I think her devotion to our father has been a problem."

Another problem, of course, has been her devotion to acting, which was even greater than her love of baseball. Although, as one friend says, "She has never wanted to see her name in lights," she was, according to her brother, "obsessed with drama by the time she was in high school—she was in all the plays." Before that, when she was a little girl, she made her own

"theatrical" makeup from mulberries and leaves. When the movie "Wait 'til the Sun Shines, Nellie" locationed in Hutchinson, Aneta was fascinated. She got a job as a standin and extra and spent all of her spare time talking to the cast and crew. At night she and her older sister would lie awake, talking in the dark of the future. "My sister said she wanted to get married and have four children—and she did," says Aneta. "All I wanted was to be an actress."

She left Northwestern at the end of her junior year and went to New York "to rescue Broadway." Broadway did not welcome her. She says. "For a year I lived on K-rations. All my friends in the Army-bless their hearts-sent them to me." When nothing turned up in the acting line. she finally worked at a variety of jobs-dental assistant, market researcher, department-store saleslady. Eventually, however, she appeared in a few off-Broadway productions, the aforementioned "Blob," and in such "Golden Age" television programs as Philco TV Playhouse, Kraft Television Theatre, Robert Montgomery Presents and Studio One. After a particularly outstanding Philco, she got a call from Hollywood, but she spurned it. "I was a New York actress," she says.

She also set herself up as a onewoman way-station for struggling young actors and actresses who followed her from Northwestern to New York. "She supported all of us. She offered us a home and money," says an actress who roomed with her during this period, who then adds, "She has never had enough discipline in this particular area."

It was, in fact, Aneta's generosity to old friends which was in large part responsible for bringing an end to the most serious romance of her life. She was in California now. She went West in 1959, not at the invitation of Hollywood, but to nurse her mother,

who had moved from Kansas to California and was terminally ill with cancer. Aneta continued her opendoor policy when her old friends began drifting out from New York. But her new friend—the serious one—objected, and soon the romance was over. Even today this young man, now happily married to someone else, has an edge in his voice when he says, "I didn't like it when starving actors were living in the house."

There may have been more to it than that. The young man adds, "She's a fiercely independent gal"; and Aneta herself admits, "I'm viciously independent." A friend says, "She is strong-willed. There's no man capable of mastering her." Since her mother's death she has lived—independently—with, as noted, her dogs and cats.

Aneta got her role on The Andy Griffith Show almost accidentally. She had played a few small parts in Hollywood television shows, had gone to Europe with a USO troupe, and one season had a running role in The Gertrude Berg Show. Meanwhile, three young actresses had been tried and found wanting as possible girl friends for Andy. By the time Aneta was called to play Helen Crump in 1963, the search for a regular girl friend had been abandoned. Her appearance was to be only a one-shot-otherwise she probably would have been given a more romantic name.

The reaction, as evidenced by the mail, was so good, however, that she was brought back again and again, and then finally signed to a contract. Aaron Ruben, now with Gomer Pyle, USMC, who produced the Griffith show at the time, says, "When she came in, it worked. With the earlier girls, we didn't remember that Andy was a man who had been married and couldn't act skittish like a teen-ager. Aneta had a mature, adult approach."

Aneta Corsaut, who, unlike most actresses, admits her age, doesn't feel that mature. "I consider myself practically a young girl," she says. "When I grow up, I'll get married. I want to get married once and just once, like my parents; and when I do, I'll have kids instead of dogs."

No matter how many kids she has, she will probably never lose her love for animals, which goes all the way back to her childhood when, after Kansas windstorms, she and her brother would go out looking for fallen birds, so that they could set their broken wings.

Andy Griffith, who, like most North Carolinians, is a dedicated hunter, occasionally baits Aneta with tales of shooting birds and wild animals. Recently, after reacting particularly violently to one of these stories, she said, "I'm a soft-hearted broad." Andy said, "You're not a broad."

Not many actors say that about actresses.



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

George Tobias: 'I never got caught.'

135 miles from Hollywood, our man smokes out

THE LAST OF THE OLD-TIME BACHELORS

TV's hardest-to-nail performer must be the 65-year-old character actor who regularly plays Bewitched's next-door neighbor, "Abner Kravitz." He keeps himself incommunicado on a remote ranch 135 miles from Hollywood. No phone. No TV. Only a shortwave radio between himself and the rest of the planet. In emergencies the studio calls the sheriff of Lucerne Valley, who tries to make contact via the Citizens' Band. But the old codger's set is ordinarily turned off.

"The last of the old-time bachelors," they say of him. "A recluse from way back." "You might smoke him out at his spread and then again you might not." We drove up to the high desert valley one weekend, and that's how George Tobias, solitudinarian, got

nailed.

He was standing there under the poplars, stroking the muzzle of a heavily muscled gelding. He was outfitted in red-flannel long johns, dungarees and cowboy boots. A white stubble of two or three days' growth covered his tanned and weathered face. He turned out to be a congenial coot and not opposed to making chinmusic with a stranger.

"I'm not running away. I don't run away from nothin"! I run into it! I've got my ranch, my horses, my guns. When I'm coming down the road late at night and my dogs are barking, it's all nice and peaceful. I know there's nobody who's going to say, 'You're late!' and 'Where ya been?' I get me a log going in the fireplace and light up my pipe and God, it's wonderful."

Yet this is the same George Tobias of the New York legitimate theater in the Twenties and Thirties; colleague of Eugene O'Neill in the Provincetown Playhouse; celebrated as the Russian ballet master in "You Can't Take It with You"; alumnus of the Warner Bros. stable of actors in the Forties; "best friend" of Humphrey Bogart, Errol Flynn, John Garfield,

Dennis Morgan or Jack Carson in countless flicks; veteran character actor over half a century; survivor of decades of hard drinking, high partying and fast living. This is the Lucerne Valley recluse of today, and this is what he says about it: "People think I'm lonely. I'm the happiest guy in the world. How can I be lonely? I can always sit by the side of the road and whittle."

Inside the low, redwood ranch house is a bachelor's paradise of guns, hunting knives, American Indian artifacts. Navaho rugs, 175 briar pipes, Franklin stove, sporting prints, library of Western Americana-and no TV. It's all wood paneling and leathery, and a woman's touch is nowhere in sight. "Don't get me wrong, I'm not a woman-hater. To me friendship is the greatest thing in the world, and if I'd marry a gal, I'd lose a friend. Oh, I've had gals who want to fuss after me or cook me a dinner, and that's when I say, 'Look, I'll cook for you.' There's nothing I can't cook. In all those pictures I never got the girl and they never got me. On or off screen I never got caught."

Tobias retreated to Lucerne Valley in three successive stages. In his Warner Bros. days he had a ranch in Sherman Oaks near the studio "I bought Tom Mix's stable and moved it to my place. Pheasant used to walk across Ventura Boulevard, it was that peaceful. In a few years people started moving out there. It got too closed in for me, so I moved out to Tarzana with the mountain lions.

"People kept following and I had to shift on to a larger place out at Calabasas where we used to have trouble getting through the herds of deer. I always had venison in the icebox. When Calabasas started to get like Coney Island, I got the hell out of the whole San Fernando Valley."

As Tobias beat his strategic retreat from ranch to ranch, a whole en-

tourage of hangers-on moved with him. "Every time a friend of mine got a divorce, he'd come to my place to live. I had sides of beef hanging there. I told my houseman: 'Anybody who comes out here, don't let him go away hungry or thirsty.'

"I always had a houseful of people. There'd be times I'd come home from the studio and there'd be 16 people at the dinner table. Sometimes I didn't know their names. I didn't care what the expense was. I never thought of the future. That's the way it was with actors in those days. We lived for today. Nowadays actors have to think about taking care of themselves. Investments. Business managers."

Samuel and Nettie Tobias, repertory players in the Yiddish theater, hoped their son would become a doctor, lawyer or merchant. But George became an actor at the age of 15, when he appeared in a Galsworthy play at the Neighborhood Playhouse on New York's Grand Street. Yet, as a child on the Lower East Side, he unaccountably developed a horse fixation.

"I remember the horse-drawn streetcars on First Avenue, the livery stables, the horse-drawn carriages. When I was a kid, I used to tie a stocking on my belt for a tail and I'd crawl on my knees under the table kicking people and neighing like a horse. My first job was stable boy at the Black and White Riding School in Brooklyn. Then I was a riding master on the Borscht Circuit in the Catskills.

"I've always had horses. I'm going to breed horses up here. Only saddle horses, no racing horses. I like a big, heavy horse with plenty of muscle on

him, like Duke out there."

He looks out the window. "It makes no sense. Up from the Jewish ghetto, out here to the old corral. I could be a kickback to Jewish history. Except the Jews were always on foot or riding around on donkeys. I don't know how to explain it."
