

■ The Nation's largest advertisers companies which spent \$2.6 billion on television last year—have come up with a way to simplify and improve the Television Code limits on advertising. They want to guarantee viewers 51 minutes of program content during each prime-time hour.

That would leave nine minutes for such nonprogram material as sponsored commercials, billboards, publicservice announcements, all promotion spots and all credits.

■ The Code now permits 10 minutes and 20 seconds per hour for commercials—not including most credits and some promotion spots. So program content in prime time can be as little as 49 minutes and a few seconds.

The advertisers' suggestion came in the form of a letter from the Association of National Advertisers to Howard Bell, director of the Television Code Authority, who had invited the organization to participate in current efforts to revise the Code.

Mr. Bell has his own ideas for improving it. He believes viewers would be best served by limiting the number of interruptions for commercials. He would permit two interruptions during a half-hour program, four during an hour-long program in prime time. (In non-prime time he'd permit three interruptions per half hour, six per hour.) Each interruption would carry as many as three commercials. Sports programs would be exempt from these limitations, and station breaks between programs would not count as interruptions. Total time permitted for commercials would be 10 minutes per prime-time hour.

WHAT MAKES THOSE DISCUSSION SHOWS CLICK?

An articulate expert (he has a show of his own) has some fun examining the efforts of Messrs. A, B and C BY WILLIAM F. BUCKLEY JR.

What makes for successful television discussion (TD)? After a year's duty on the firing line I must report (a) that I don't know for sure; and (b) that no one else seems to know either. There are four TD's being nationally syndicated at the moment.* The canons of the profession frown on the explicit identification of a fellow-toiler in the vineyard unless the purpose is to praise him. But students of TD will recognize that Mr. A.

specializes in Bringing on the Kooks. His appeal, or so I am told by professional students of human misbehavior, is especially to those who yearn to see and hear someone on television in relation to whom they can feel an exalted superiority.

Yesterday, for instance, it was that paunchy little man who calmly announced that he was Napoleon Bonaparte, returned to deliver the armies of the West from their 150-year-old helplessness. Such a show is particularly appealing to those who are not absolutely certain of their **continued**

own sanity but are *absolutely* certain that anyone who believes he is Napoleon is madder than they; and Mr. A. will frequently adduce someone madder than they—that is his secret.

Tonight it's the lady who was accosted, as she was hanging out the wash, by the pilot of a flying saucer, who asked her where he might pick up a little gasoline, of which he was in short supply. Hmmm. The lady is utterly ingenuous, and you find yourself thinking: Well, stranger things have happened in history. What if it had been a television show in midsummer of 1492 and Mr. A. had presented a mad navigator who announced that he intended to sail west until he hit land? . . Better reserve judgment on the lady of the wash.

And anyway, it is all rather thrilling, in the quiet and security of your living room, to hear the talk of those who have had extraworldly experiences, or who claim convincingly to have had them.

Mr. A. makes fun of his guest, and we see said guest strain with anxiety at the challenge to his dogma; but adamantly, like a Christian martyr facing the lions, he refuses to be shaken. You catch the fanatic's gleam in his eve. And that makes for good watching, in the same sense that the fresh wreck on the side of the highway makes for irresistible ogling. Such people crowd Hyde Park on Sunday afternoons in London to hear the waifs of the intellectual and ideological underworlds ply their nostrums and visions, some of them amiable ("Regain your health by eating only blackstrap molasses"), others mischievous ("Send the West Indians back to the Congo").

Not many converts are won, but that doesn't seem to matter. There are

those who like to visit human zoos. Enough of them to sustain Mr. A .: and also Mr. B., who on a lesser scale is also a Kook-Host, with moreover visions of himself as the Procrustean avenger who by elemental directness ("You are a very stupid man") or metallic derogation ("What makes you think you're so smart?") puts himself forward as the gyroscope of universal sanity. My own thinking is that Mr. B. quite undermines the intended effect. I walk away from his show prepared to enlist in Mr. Bonaparte's army and keep a can of gasoline at hand for straitened spacemen.

Then there is Mr. C. He doesn't specialize in kooks, though he does not always exclude them. He likes, as a general rule, to have a lot of people on his program, on the grounds, one gathers, that any one person, save possibly himself, tends to get pretty boring. So that, typically, he will have a half-dozen people on the show, representing a range of opinion, usually, from left-liberal to left-liberal.

Mr. C. has a lot of moxie, and that ain't bad in show biz. He is almost always a full-fledged participant in his own shows, which means, considering that among his guests one is likely to find the world's leading experts on aardvarks and zoometry, that Mr. C. has a hell of a problem boning up on aardvarks and zoometry sufficient to sound as though he had something relevant to say on the subjects; a difficulty compounded by his difficulty. in the opinion of some of his viewers, in saying anything relevant about anything. Shall we leave it that he doesn't entirely succeed? But then neither would anyone have succeeded since Erasmus, it being generally accepted that he was the last member of the human race to have mastered all the world's then-available knowledge. Not. then, altogether Mr. C.'s fault. Though an occasional profession of continued

ignorance, particularly in advance of some of his most cacophonous demonstrations of such, would perhaps add to the, er, suspense of Mr. C.'s show.

Arrogance. Is it a hot property in TD? I cannot insinuate an arrogance in Mr. C. without acknowledging that my own critics assign that lamentable vice to me. There are various means by which public figures earn that particular reputation. Some people could be deaf, dumb and blind and still appear arrogant. Dean Acheson, for instance. But mostly it has to do with the way you say things.

The correct way, if arrogance is to be safely avoided, is the circumlocutory way, via conversational zigs and zags, ellipses, obliquities, rhomboids, paralogisms, the cumulative effect of which is to communicate to the listener: "My dear friend, the point I am about to make is one which, if you find yourself disagreeing with it, means that that is testimony to your superior skill, intelligence, loyalty and compassion. If, on the other hand, you should agree with it, why you are dynamic, bold, adventurous, and the salt of the earth." Either way, the listener can't lose.

Here, for instance, are three replies, in increasing order of objectionability arrogance-wise, as Mr. C. would say.

Question: "Mr. Buckley, Senator Kennedy said on his return from Latin America that the poor people there are poor because the governments don't ensure them decent wages."

Answer I. "I have a great deal of respect for Senator Kennedy, and I don't doubt that he has learned a great deal from his personal observations during his extended trip through Latin America, but I do believe, though I grant I may be wrong— Senator Kennedy is far more experienced in these matters than I am that the Senator may have neglected to put sufficient emphasis on non-

governmental factors that have contributed to Latin American poverty." Guaranteed to get by "Bobbysoxers" with impunity.

Answer II. "The Senator simply hasn't stressed other factors that, in my judgment, are at least as responsible as the failure of government action for the prevailing poverty." Acceptable, though a wee bit brinky.

Answer III. "Senator Kennedy's ignorance of economics perfectly qualifies him to act as a spokesman for the Democratic Party and solidly advances his imperial mission to confuse the world as to the causes of poverty." Not good. Not good for your own image, if that is what you are out to cultivate. And, as a matter of fact, not particularly damaging to Bobby's, because the sympathy vote will flow to him like the baptismal waters to Sodom. In this respect Messrs. A. and B. run certain risks, as I have pointed out, of catalyzing the sympathy vote. But they don't really care. It is important to them that the listener should gravitate emotionally toward someone, whether the persecutor or the persecutee. Because identification causes the combative juices to stir: and the TD becomes a contest of sorts in which the listener is involved. And then it edges away from a purely informational-type program on over to polemics, to sport. to entertainment.

My own inclination over the years has been toward the third modality, for temperamental and other reasons I will not attempt to justify here. But I have found it difficult to maneuver within that modality in programs in which (as in *Firing Line*) I am not only adversary but also host. If you are merely the adversary, it is easier to be blunt, direct, even at the risk of enhancing your own reputation for arrogance and your opponent's human appeal. When you are so situated as to require that you spend, before the cameras roll, a half hour or so with your guest (who is usually attractive) blahing about this and that, knowing moreover that you will have to chitchat together during the commercial breaks with someone who, after all, is there in response to our own invitation—all of that tends to dissipate such edges as are psychologically necessary for groin-and-eyeball adversary relationships.

Now it is generally supposed that the grudge-meeting is the most satisfactory from the point of view of the listener, and there is at least a half truth there. Nothing but nothing is more tedious than the debate between X and Y one half of which is devoted to X's compliments to Y, the other half to Y's paeans on X's virtues. But then there are ways, not uninteresting to the public, of communicating one's disagreements sharply without taking every opportunity to void a dumptruckful of abuse on the subject; e.g., possible response IIIA to the question above: "Senator Kennedy regularly overstresses the role of government in the building of an economy. Latin American governments are no better situated to produce wealth than our own government was during the growth of American economic power over a period of a century." Less bombast; but perhaps, over the long haul, week after week, the rhythm is easier on the digestion. This doesn't rule out the possibility, here and there, of a good old atavistic sledge hammer, followed by a little controlled gore.

TD, like everything else worth submitting to, must have contrast. The principal contrast in TD is of course to be found among the visiting experts. Steve Allen's style is different from Sidney Hook's. The only similarity between John Williams and John Pastore is that they are both senators. But Pastore, if he yells all the time, will bore; and John Williams, if he never ever raises his voice, will too: and so will the adversary in all likelihood bore if he treats every part of every exchange like a hundred-yard dash. People can get out of breath just plain watching.

I repeat, then: I don't know what it is that makes for totally successful TD. Obviously when the stakes are very high, the listeners will be very numerous, vide the audiences for the Kennedy-Nixon debates. The participation of a major world figure helps, but even that isn't enough to lure the dogged away from the old movies, as witness the exiguous ratings when Premier Khrushchev made his single public appearance, during his visit in 1960, on David Susskind's show.

Public-relations technicians appear to know how to hypo a particular show so as to entice an audience larger than the average. But over the long term, promotion does not seem to pay off. The audience that counts is the steady audience, which will become accustomed to tuning in every week at the same time, barring superior distractions, on the assumption that the hour or the half hour is worth listening to; on the assumption that the guest, even if his name is unknown, will have something interesting to say, and will say it interestingly; indeed that that is why he was invited to appear.

Polling techniques are not yet so refined as to reveal distinctions in audience quality. Those who hover between TD and, say, late-night wrestling, are more easily won to the former if it is full of gore and a brilliant showcase for human conceits. Others are more interested not exactly in information-information is much more concisely got from books or magazines-but in information produced under stress. It is the performance, then, that counts. And performance is often a matter of contrast. Quietness and unflappability are the best reply to bombast; liveliness to pedantry; charity to malevolence. But then I am scarcely preaching what I practice.



wow'do you build a Time Tunnel, a super device to transport the heroes of a series both forward and backward in time, and somehow show a passage of time as well?

In Hollywood the producer dreams up the notion and the art director gives it to him. A relationship like Aladdin and the genie. In this case the producer is Irwin Allen, one of the largest dreamers on the current scene (he produces Lost in Space, and Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea), and the art director is William Creber.

Allen says, "At first we tried a kaleidoscopic effect, lights flashing and whirling. Then we tried using old newsreel shots, blurring them to give the impression of time telescoping, but it looked like dirty soup. We finally went for op art and came up with this tunnel, built at a cost of \$84,000, out of Styrofoam,


sheets of aluminum, and mostly paint for trompe l'oeil effect. It rests on an enormous concrete base. The consoles and ancillary equipment cost \$45,000 and we used war-surplus material. The thing really works. Wheels turn and lights blink. The power towers are made of iron works put together piece by piece like Tinker Toys. They stand 45 feet tall.

"The set fills a complete soundstage at 20th Century-Fox. The infinity segment of the tunnel at the rear goes back an additional 26 feet into another stage, and is built on wheels so that it can be moved into position to join the body of the tunnel or moved back to increase the tunnel's illusion of infinity.

"The front segment of the tunnel is wired for both lighting and special effects, and can shoot jagged streaks of colored lights and smoke."

Melody Patterson was pouting. "They treat me like a juvenile delinquent or something, just because I lied about my age! It's not a mortal sin, is it?"

She was wearing a white rose-petal hat, white kidskin boots, bellyhugging buckskin and pussycat sunglasses. She carried an odd-looking purple knit bag. It contained a plastic bottle of distilled water, the only kind she will drink. She gave it an exasperated twirl and paused before her personal purgatory, the Warner Bros. school room. Aagh!

F Troop was five weeks into production last season before the studio discovered that the little blonde with the sunbright eyes was not 18 as it said on her birth certificate (somewhat altered by her ambitious mother) but a child of $16\frac{1}{2}$ and therefore obliged to attend school four hours each working day. Warners' displeasure—acute—was matched only by Melody's. She hates school.

Melody, who was 17 when I first talked with her a few months ago, sat in her Wrangler Jane canvas-back chair before the teacher's desk in an otherwise deserted room. "Is Singapore in China?" she asked idly. "No," the teacher said. "I always thought it was," mused Melody, her eyes straying to the ceiling. "Lots of people do," said the teacher, an elderly lady named Gertrude Vizzard, who once taught Jane Withers.

Not that Melody was a total academic washout. Her geometry was good and she shone in music appreciation.

("Beethoven's Third. Fifth and Ninth really gas me.") She is a healthfood fanatic-thus the bottled water -a spouter of metaphysical jargon. liberated, uninhibited, who doesn't even care where Singapore is. Homework has been the hangup. She would not do it. How could she, with scripts to read, personal appearances to make (last winter she was simultaneously Miss Shop 'n' Mail Early and Miss Zip Code): rock 'n' roll record sessions to monitor (she digs the group called The Factory), and outings to a Texas ranch with her wealthy, 28year-old boy friend, Sol West? "He has 582,000 acres," she says. "No, I guess it's 5800. No, let's see, I wrote it down. Thirty-six square miles?"

Mrs. Vizzard regularly threatened to yank Melody's work permit if she did not do her homework. And the teacher stood her ground despite high-pitched protests from the studio and from Melody's manager, Byron Griffith, and frequent flank attacks by Melody's ever-present mother, Rosemary.

Mother was a hoofer—at Warner Bros., in fact. And before F Troop ceased production, she accompanied Melody each morning to the studio from the family home in the drab Los Angeles suburb of Downey, where Melody's father worked as a machinist. Mother is a redhead given to black turtle-neck blouses, black slacks, pink fur-collared coats and gold-lamé slippers. She has the same blazing, self-sufficient, unreflective eyes as Melody. "I love it," she says. "I'd rather sit at a studio than sit home doing housework. This has brought life back to me."

She chews on her gum. "I always wanted Melody to be a lawyer," she says. "One of my interests has been political science."

Like all good barristers-to-be, Melody was schooled from an early age in tap dancing, ice skating and voice. Her mother got her a role in a little-theater version of "Mrs. Mc-Thing" when she was 5, bagged her a spot ice skating on the Downey Rose Parade float when she was 7, and eased her into steady work as a photographic model at 9. But at 12 her career was on the rocks and Mrs. Patterson took her fading continued

daughter ("I couldn't get a commercial to save my life," says Melody) to Byron Griffith.

Byron Griffith—part personal manager, part mystic philosopher, part drama coach—practices the occult art of star-making high in the Hollywood hills, in the antique gloom of his living room. Connie Stevens was processed here, and Sharon Hugueny, too. Byron Griffith's group has long been an active supplier of new TV faces.

Griffith sits in the middle of his Wednesday night gathering of acting hopefuls—Jan Davis and Al Hanson to his right, Vince Carroll to his left, and before him, sprawled cheerfully, clutching her jug of distilled water, his current star disciple, Melody.

It is "Word Evaluation" time.

"Adamant," says Griffith, a tall, gaunt, fellow.

"A strong word," says Melody sagely.

"But," says Griffith, "where does it get its strength?"

Melody frowns. "I'm not sure if it's from the ad or the mant."

Griffith, his long, pale hands hanging limply from his coat sleeves, now flings them up toward the ceiling. "Damn," he cries in triumph. "It's from the damn—damn right I'm going to be adamnant about adamant!"

Now a refresher in the basic tenets of the Griffith philosophy, the *KnowerDoerLove* theorem: "There are three types of people," he says, a priest laying down the catechism. "*Knowers*—who learn and feel secure in their knowledge but don't do anything with it; *Loves*—Connie Stevens is a Love—who are governed by their emotions but can't follow through; and *Doers*, who learn by doing things, not by reading or listening. They get it accomplished though they might have to do it all over again.

"I've trained Melody as a Love. But

basically she's a Knower, a Loving Knower. The wonderful thing about Melody is how really deeply she gets into the stuff of life, into all different religions and philosophies."

So here is Melody, this chirpy little blonde from Downey who from the age of 12 picks up on the Word according to Griffith-a pastiche of Christian Science, Zen Buddhism and positive thinking-and absorbs it, in toto, like a good little sponge. She sits in the Warner commissary picking at a cottage-cheese lunch-she has a severe weight problem-rattling off phrases like "orbit of love" and "clashing wills" and "inharmonious vibrations." "This business can be the most materialistic, crudest, awfullest, filthiest business in the world," she says, twitching. "You can't let them destroy you emotionally.

"The biggest obstacle is people. If you let them, they'll destroy you. The way to handle people is to break them down into groups. The first director I had practically looked me in the eye and said, 'You'll never make it.' I could have blown the whole shebang right there, but I knew he was a Love and Loves are batty about eyes so I turned on the eyes." And she turns on the eyes, mint-blue and unclouded as a child's.

"Three things are important to me. One—my career. I couldn't make it as a doctor, but I want to give something to the world, same as a missionary. I feel it's an avenue for goodness and happiness. Two—religion. Not *religion*, but to be religious. Three is music. Someday I hope to find someone who feels the same way."

Melody Patterson, Miss Shop 'n' Mail Early, Wrangler Jane, mystic philosopher, mulls the world for a while. "Everybody in the world is set," she says. "You know what I mean. That's why I can't let anybody in. . . You know the way it is before you sleep, when you're alone? You can't take anyone with you then and I'm not afraid. This is when the *quiet* comes in."

The Quiet?

"It's the way it must have been with Edison. Some days I feel like an inventor. Things come to me.

"There's a point I want to reach," she says. "And I don't want to go through too many doors. I want to learn quite a few languages and I want to be a big, big star."

Why?

"Why not? I'm a very fortunate girl. I've done a series. I'm not hung up on LSD. I don't drink alcohol . . ."

What about school?

The face falls. "Just because of numbers," she says. "Because I was minus a few numbers they picked on me. Time is infinite and they've gone and classified it. Limited it. It's not ignorant. It's stupid. . . . Just stupid."

But wait. Melody is now 18 (she turned that corner April 16) and there she is, still squirming in Mrs. Vizzard's schoolroom. She has decided to get that diploma after all. Other things have changed too. For one, the *F* Troop leg of her trip toward "big, big" stardom has ended—the show won't be back next fall. And, leaving no doubt that Melody Patterson has come of age, she moved out of her parents' home and into an apartment just two days after her birthday, overriding her mother's objections.

THE DOAN REPORT

Citizens Group to Push PTV

The forces pressing for a nation-wide Public TV system have recruited the energetic director of New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art, Thomas P. F. Hoving, to head a 100-member National Citizens Committee, Already enlisted to serve under him: Newton Minow and E. William Henry, ex-FCC chairmen; Gen. James M. Gavin; playwrights Arthur Miller and Paddy Chayefsky; Leonard Bernstein; Yale's Kingman Brewster Jr. and Cal Tech's Lee Dubridge; Myrna Loy; Maria Tallchief, and several dozen others. Financed by six foundations, including Ford and Carnegie, both big backers of PTV, the committee will work to drum up grass-roots excitement for noncommercial video's potentials. While lobbying for pending Congressional legislation creating a Federally supported TV service is ruled out as one motive, it is hard to see how this could not be uppermost in the minds of committee leaders.

The Telephone Hour has been ringing the bell lately. Its old musical Lazy-Susan format, "with something to offend everybody," as one participant saw it, was replaced this season by a music-documentary series that tripled the fan mail. The sponsor happily found that by slotting an elongated commercial at the close of its Sunday evening programs (and just - ahead of the popular Disney shows), Bell's soft-sell messages reached twice as many watchers as the program itself did. Recently Bell

officials picked up their second prestigious Peabody Award for the series. And, as of Sept. 22, NBC will return The Telephone Hour to prime time, Fridays at 10 (ET), alternating as in the past with news specials. Will the sponsor leave the hour unbroken by commercials, even if it means putting the sell just before 11 P.M. in the East? Absolutely, says AT&T's Louis K. O'Leary, overseer of the program. He believes this policy has triggered a healthy trend in TV toward fewer commercial breaks. Next season Bell will offer 14 of these World-of-Music shows. One, already filmed: a Bach festival at Bethlehem, Pa., to be shown at Eastertime. Among others: a Los Angeles Symphony would tour winding up in Bombay and a look inside the world of Duke Ellington.

Briefly: United Network, launched May 1 with the Bill Dana show from Las Vegas, blew its bankroll in just one month and had to quit the game. The odds against winning quickly against the rich networks were too great and United's Texas backers couldn't afford a sustained effort . . . John Daly will do his last What's My Line? on Sept. 3 and check in at the Voice of America as the new boss. succeeding John Chancellor (who's returning to NBC), two days later. The 17-year CBS series apparently is destined to fade out quietly. A plan to wrap it up with an hour-long finale reprising memorable moments has been shelved.

THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

Some week's reruns call for definitions. I mean, we're not about to redefine what we're after as far as network movies go—or what we're getting. Things like "quality" and "mediocrity" don't need redefinition.

What I do mean is something like a Gidget. Go define that. Some wit somewhere along the line said a Gidget is very much like a Tammy, and another insisted it was a generic contraction of girl and midget, with a cranial capacity of the latter being imposed on the former. Should one, then, watch "Gidget Goes to Rome"? If you want to gape at Popsicle-pure teen-age cavortings in Rome by Cindy Carol impersonating Sandra Dee, the original Gidget, and can stand sprightly Popsicle-pure teen-age dialog and romance ("Everyone falls in love in Rome in the summertime. It's that old devil Italian moon," James Darren explains), go dream your Popsiclepure dream. Wiser it won't make you -and sadness is a sometime thing.

Define a made-for-television movie, by the way of "The Longest Hundred Miles," a rerun of the *World Premiere* offering about two Americans, a Filipino priest and a busload of native kiddies fleeing the Japanese invaders in World War II. A made-for-television movie thus means a brand-new Hollywood B-movie, "brand-new" meaning that it is in color and has endless padding to disguise the simple-minded adventure story that the old-brand cheapies used to toss off in half the time in black-andwhite, at a quarter of the price.

Want a definition of a B-movie? "Ferry to Hong Kong" is a non-Hollywood one, which means it has non-Hollywood stars Orson Welles, Curt Jurgens and Sylvia Syms doing themselves no credit in a sloppy melodrama set against some very pretty authentic background. "Escape from Zahrain" is another, very Hollywood in that it has Yul Brynner and Sal Mineo completely incredible as a couple of Arabs involved in a comicstrip kind of political chase.

What separates a B-movie from an A-movie? Hopefully, it's quality—but not always. Sometimes it's sheer size, as in "Can-Can," which has nothing to recommend it beyond the Cole Porter score. In the B-movie manner of miscasting, we get Frank Sinatra and Shirley MacLaine making like they're French, and Maurice Chevalier appearing to be a little unproud of the fact that he is. Telecasting's chopup fashion of movie-running does help this pedestrian tale along, and we'll concede that Juliet Prowse is probably worth catching as the snake in Eden.

So we're left with the pure-kid offering. Definition? "Robinson Crusoe on Mars" is pure-kid kid-stuff, good fun all the way. There are some dandy sci-fi effects, and if you watch early on you'll see Batman himself, i.e., Adam West as the astronaut who doesn't make it to Mars. But Paul Mantee and a monkey do. Pure kidstuff for us kids of all ages.

"We are looking at the middle-class addict," Pendrell says, "not the desperate victims of poverty and ignorance, but the kids from well-to-do families who are destroying themselves with heroin."

At Daytop Village, a treatment center in Staten Island, N.Y., cameras focus on a "marathon"—a 30-hour grouptherapy session in which the patients frankly probe the nightmare of their addiction. Their feelings become harsh, bitter, painful and poignant revelations as they submit themselves to the strain of emotionally spitting out the poison they have injected into their veins. The objective: a complete cure, and a way back into society.

Executive producer Lester Cooper notes that "this is just one method of treatment, not a cure-all. Our final filming was done where some addicts will always wind up-in the morgue."

10:00 ELLINGTON—Documentary

Cameramen stuck close to the Duke for four weeks to tape this 360-degree sweep of the jazz genius at work, on the move and putting his feet up to shoot the breeze.



Ellington is seen with his orchestra —his "traveling workshop"—in performances at Basin Street West and the Monterey Jazz Festival, and shaping the material for his concert in San Francisco's Grace Cathedral. We also get a behind-the-scenes look at the Duke presiding over a recording session.

His music is as elegant as it has been for the past 50 years. Interspersed with the glistening jazz are observations on Ellington by fellow artists Dizzy Gillespie, Jon Hendricks, Earl "Fatha" Hines and Bunny Briggs.

The program includes excerpts from "Take the 'A' Train," "Mood Indigo," "Sophisticated Lady," "Satin Doll," "Sugar Hill Penthouse," "Black, Brown and Beiee" and "Far Eastern Suite."

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TOMMY'S THE **GOOFY ONE** WITH THE BLOND HAIR: **DICKIE'S** THF **OTHER** ONF

U ther what? Other Smothers Brother, of course. And what are the Smothers Brothers? Just the stars of the hottest new show on TV, that's all. Although outnumbered three-totwo, the Smothers Brothers have been shooting it out with Bonanza's Cartwright clan since early February. Up for grabs is the 9-10 Sunday night time slot. And if the Brothers haven't won so far, neither have they lost. And against all that *Bonanza* beef, just holding one's own verges on the miraculous.

Who are the two young miracle men? Unlike many comedians who require the services of high-priced writers to ad-lib "Hello," the Brothers are their own best writers. The reason for this is simple: The boys on stage are simply a logical extension of the boys off stage. Dick tends to act the straight man, while Tommy comes up with the outrageous lines and the goofy business.

For instance, the first meeting we had took place in their dressing room at CBS. Also present were a network publicist and the Brothers' 28-yearold manager, Ken Fritz.

Dick interrupts the interview to take an egg out of the refrigerator and asks, "Is this hard-boiled or softboiled?" Tommy replies, "You do know how to tell, don't you?"

"No."

"Spin it," Tommy says.

Dick walks to the coffee table and spins the egg on its side. Fritz suggests, "Spin it on its end. If it spins it's hard-boiled."

Tommy: "A soft-boiled egg will spin."

Fritz: "Not more than twice."

Dick spins the egg on its end. It spins two or three times.

Dick: "Well?"

Tommy looks at the egg, as if damning it for its stubbornness. "Well," he decides, "there's another sure-fire way of telling."

Dick: "What's that?"

Tommy picks up the egg and drops it on the table. Fortunately it's hardboiled. But the look Dick gives his brother is exactly the same look he'd give him if Tommy had dropped that egg on-camera in front of 20 million viewers.

Although Tommy, 30, is blond and has a light complexion, while Dick, 28 is brown-haired and dark, their jug ears give away their relationship. Both are 5-feet-9, but at 160 pounds, the brawnier, more muscular Dickie is about 10 pounds heavier than his older, balder brother.

In their dressing room Dick sits in a

short-sleeved shirt, exposing a massive scab that runs from about three inches above his left elbow to three or four inches below. It seems he had recently fallen off one of his three motorcycles.

"But," he brags, "every time I fall I learn something new."

"Oh, yeah," Tommy says, taking on the guise of straight man for once, "what did you learn this time?"

"This time I learned to use my brakes."

Just as everything about their first TV show—that disastrous situation comedy about the ghost—bugged them, everything about their present variety show delights them. Well, nearly everything.

Tommy explains: "Part of the reason we hated the first show is we don't like doing film. You sit around all day waiting for them to set up the lights. But we had a much nicer dressing room. We even had a shower. Here we have to stand in the toilet and pour water over our heads."

Almost as if just speaking about their first show had set off a chain reaction in their two stomachs, both boys take out antacid pills and start chewing mouthfuls. Ulcers? Yes and no. Tommy has a full-fledged case, Dickie just has a nervous stomach. The pressure of competing with *Bonanza*?

"Hell, no," Tommy says, "it was that other show we did. Four Star gave me my ulcers."

Popping a few extra pills in his mouth, Dickie adds: "The people at Four Star would have gotten ulcers, too, if they'd been intelligent enough."

Phil Sharp, who produced the first five episodes of their show at Four Star and didn't get ulcers, now says, "I haven't seen their new show, but apparently they're back to doing what they do best. But I can tell you this situation comedy is not what they do best."

For once Sharp and the Brothers agree. What they do best, and no one else can do, is to be the **continued**

Smothers Brothers. On their new show they get to do it. But for how much longer? About that the boys disagree. It's Dick's feeling that "We can't just go on bickering all the time. The sibling rivalry can't last forever." To which Tom replies, "Why can't it? George and Gracie did the same stuff for 90 years and it was great."

If the boys did go on for another 90 years, it wouldn't be long enough for their biggest fan, Bette Davis. Out of affection and admiration for them, she agreed to make one of her infrequent TV appearances on their show. After the Friday night taping, the boys and Miss Davis came back onstage to shoot a promotion spot, and Miss Davis described her first meeting with Tommy.

"We were guests on *The Tonight* Show. And when Johnny Carson introduced Tommy to me, Tommy started going on at some length about how much he admired me, about what a great actress I am, about how much he's always respected me, and so on and so forth."

Tommy interrupts: "I called you a princess."

"Yes," Miss Davis recalls, "he called me a princess. He was very flowery, very charming. And after about two minutes of this, he just stopped dead, looked at me and said, 'Hey, do you mess around?' Well, believe me, I just fell off my chair and rolled on the floor."

"Yeah," Tommy says, smiling wickedly, "you really couldn't wait to mess around, could you?"

Miss Davis replies with a shriek, ϵ . howl and a minute of hysterics. He's done it again.

Kenny Fritz, who in partnership with Ken Kragen has been managing the Brothers for three years, thinks the years have changed Dick far more than they have Tommy. "Dick has become easier to get along with. He's friendlier and more outgoing. In the old days he left a lot more up to Tommy. It's a cliché to say someone eats, drinks and sleeps anything, but Tommy eats, drinks and sleeps the show. You could say Dickie just eats and drinks it."

It's Dick who admits, "We'd consider splitting up the act. Maybe after the run of this show. Tommy's interested in working as a single. He's more interested in show business than I am. I could be happy out of it."

Tommy confesses, "My feeling for performing has left me. There's no challenge to it. I'd love to produce and direct."

Tommy, off-camera, speaks in the same hesitant fashion so much a part of his comedy style on-stage. But away from Dick he speaks more seriously.

As the second interviewing session was just getting under way, Tom got a call that a local motorcycle agency had brought around a pair of bikes for his inspection. There, at the foot of the steps, inside the CBS studio, were two BSA's: the Lightning and the Spitfire. Both were large 650's.

The salesman shook hands with Tommy and informed him that the Spitfire would do 120 miles an hour out of the box. "One-twenty isn't fast enough," sneered one of the onlookers, a long-haired member of a guest rock 'n' roll group. "It's fast *enough*," said Tommy, revving up the powerful engine. "I could easily have one of the shortest TV careers in history."

Back in his dressing room he sprawled on the couch. "You know, my first guitar cost \$12.50. The next new one cost \$185. I put down \$20 and paid off \$12 a month. Now that I've got the cash, they all come around and want to give the stuff to me. Motorcycles, guitars, everything. What would you call it? Inequality? It doesn't seem right. I'll tell you something else—I think we're really overpayed as performers, and I continued

don't just mean me and Dickie. I mean all of us."

Any interest in entering politics?

"I don't know. To tell you the truth, I've been vitally interested in the political scene ever since the U-2 incident and then Cuba. All those lies we were told. The younger people are concerned about the credibility gap, but the older people have grown accustomed to accepting and asking not. I'll tell you what really opened my eyes. In 1964, I think it was, in an Indiana town, we were giving a concert. Well, the American Cancer Society has always had the concession on our souvenir book. At every one of our concerts they sell the book and get all the profits. Well, some high school kid at this one came up to us before the concert to tell us he ran the concessions in the auditorium and wanted 50 percent of the book sales. We told him he could take 10 percent. When we finished the concert, the kid called the cops. They didn't ask any questions, they just started to rough us up. Kenny Fritz got sapped and I had my head opened up with a flashlight. Nine stitches. And as a middleclass white American, it came as a terrible shock. I mean, what if we'd been Negroes?"

The interview over, he phones his mother to invite her down to the studio: "Wear your virgin white gown," he suggests. "You know, with the powdered wig. Remember, how you dress reflects on Dickie and me... Oh, you don't have a virgin white gown. OK, then just wear the overalls as usual."

While waiting for the Smothers Brothers' mother to show up, I get a chance to talk to Dick alone.

He speaks of what's most important to him: his children (Susan, 6, Dickie Jr., 3, Steve, $1\frac{1}{2}$) and his wife of seven years, Linda. "I was working in the Kerosene Club in San Jose. On her 21st birthday she came in and got roaring drunk. That's how we met. Three months later we were married."

At this point their mother arrives. Blonde, bright and fiftyish, she is not Mrs. Smothers but Mrs. Burk. Ruth Burk has been married twice since their father, Maj. Thomas B. Smothers Jr., died in a Japanese POW camp.

In their act, Tommy is always accusing Dick of being Mom's favorite. Did she really like Dickie best? She laughs. "You love all your children. But that Tommy was the biggest bunch of trouble. For instance, Tommy used to get Dickie and Sherry, their younger sister, to take picnic baskets to the cemetery and eat off the tombstones.

"Dickie was always introverted; Tommy was the extrovert. Now it's just the opposite. I think the first show changed them. Tommy was so unhappy about it he lost weight and got depressed. Dickie was always very independent. When they were just kids doing shows at Redondo Beach Union High, Dickie would never do an encore if it was time for lunch."

While scouring her mind for other childhood memories she suddenly starts to laugh. "That Tommy! Shortly after we came back from the Philippines, I discovered he was cutting kindergarten."

It seems that Tommy even owned that crazy chicken he's always talking about in the act. Mrs. Burk swears it was named Brownie and that for two years it was Tommy's favorite pet. "Once I had to spend two nights in the garage," she recalls, "nursing that damn Brownie through the pip. He lost his feathers, but he lived."

As I made my way from Studio 33, visions of defeathered chickens dancing in my head, the Brothers interrupted their rehearsal to yell out their farewells: Tom—"Be kind to us." Dick—"You better be. We've got Mrs. Kennedy's lawyer working for us."

have come to Latin American TV. In Bogota maids shush their tiny wards and plunk down in front of the screen to catch the latest heart-tearing installment. Tear-jerkers have gone Spanish.

soaps

And in five years the daily miseries have become the hottest property on Spanish-language television. With 50 half-hours of drear shown every week in Mexico—largely in prime time—nobody can hope to doubt their success.

Practically the only similarity between American soap operas and their Mexican counterparts is the tears. In the U.S., soap operas go on and on. But in Mexico 60 episodes is the general rule. Then the heroine must die or have a baby. It's usually 60 cliffs, then boom!—a new show all over again. A new storyline, new heroines, new intrigues and new titles.

"The public loses interest in longer stories,"says Luis de Llano, production director for Telesistema Mexicano, the Mexico City private-enterprise broadcasting giant that produces the shows on video tape.

The success formula of these soap operas lies in stories of impossible love, in which the characters are almost invariably wealthy and spend all their time solving their problems. Plots are complex, laden with subplot and permeated with a Romanticism and melodrama strictly outside of the 20th Century.

Consider. A rebellious college-boy son of a Mexican paterfamilias, studying in Washington, falls in love with a cute little girl whom his family considers beneath his station. His father flies in to break it all up, falls in love with the wench himself and marries her over the weekend. The young man in the Mexican soap opera returns home to live with his father and girl friend-turned-stepmother, and has his life further complicated by his own long-lost mother (she disappeared 20 years ago and was given up for dead), now living incognito with all of them as the new family servant.

In a new soap opera, Stronger Than Hate, the daughter of a troop commander in North Africa falls in love with a young Arab. Her father executes his father, and her boy friend swears revenge and murders her father. She swears that he will pay for the crime. But on the eve of his execution she forgives him, persuades the court to banish him to an oasis and secretly joins him there.

How about this virtue-in-peril situation? A faithful daughter has nursed her sick father for years while her brothers and sisters have abandoned the hacienda. Suddenly her father dies, and brothers and sisters fight to dispossess her of all the property left in a poorly drawn will. An inevitable servant falls in love with the daughter of some woman staying with the family, and it turns out that the woman is the daughter of the faithful daughter of the original master of the house.... And that's just the beginning.

These are understatements of the plots, which make *Peyton Place* look as straightforward as Red Riding Hood.

Production of all these sizzling sagas is strictly assembly line at Televicentro. The production complex in downtown Mexico City consists of four soundstages. An entire story takes only four weeks to wrap up. Two cameras zip back and forth through five permanent sets in each of the cramped studios. Actors stagger through an eight-hour schedule of three episodes a day. If you wonder how they do it, the secret is electronic: They carry a miniature walkie-talkie wired to an invisible mike in their ears. They have time to learn only the last line of the previous dialog and the first line of their own. The little voice does the rest. The little voiceproducer Ernest Alonso, who directs the show from the control booth also gives stage directions and even changes the show.

"I never have long camera rehearsals," says Alonso. "It tires everyone. I run through the script for an hour, then go right on tape. Improvisation offers a freshness the audience can feel."

Producers can now use a revolutionary new process, "Gemini," that simultaneously records on video tape and shoots 16 mm. film. The tapes are sent to regional stations in Mexico and Central America with video-tape recording machines, and film usually goes to South America, where tape recorders are still too expensive.

"The soaps are the only television programs made expressly for distribution in the general Spanishspeaking market," comments Gerhard Lux, Telesistema export director. "The subtitles in American shows give the audience the names but don't help the illiterate Latin understand American situations." Alonso reckons an extra reason for their popularity is the inclusion of superior storylines, ranging from Dickens to Balzac, and modern American titles. "Even in New York and Los Angeles," adds the producer, "the Spanish-speaking audience prefers our shows." And, amazingly, production costs are only about \$1500 per episode.

The major problems are keeping a supply of good stories flowing to the assembly line and living with government censorship. Most soaps are on when children are around, so suicide, rape, incest and violence are out.

Still, Alonso feels the future of soaps has never been brighter. "I've turned down offers to do films," says the former movie star, "in order to continue in television.

"Oh, soap operas will evolutionize and modernize as society changes. But they'll never stop.

"The whole world wants to know what's going to happen tomorrow." Here's that <u>Avenger</u> girl, Diana Rigg, in the grooviest jumpsuit on your TV screen. Called the "Emmapeeler" after the character she plays—it comes in eight colors and is made of a stretch fabric called Crimplene. T.B. Jones Ltd. of London is the manufacturer.

What's in the (cue) cards for Arnold Zenker, now that Walter Cronkite's back before the CBS News Cameras?

There may be a clue in gogo colored gag buttons that replaced picket signs at CBS just after the big AFTRA strike. "Bring Back Zenker" is what they urged, and though the buttoneers were kidding, who knows? Arnold Zenker, who achieved a dream of glory for 13 days, some day may be back on the picture side of television.

For the benefit of those with short memories, Arnold ("It's too late to change his name") Zenker is the young lawyer—he'll be 29 Aug. 23 who was Cronkite's sit-in during the Recent Unpleasantness between the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists and the networks.

It was an "unbelievable, strictly Alice-in-Wonderland experience," said Zenker, who is CBS News' personable and cautiously outspoken manager of program administration. "You *know* it's going to come to an end. But I'm glad it worked out the way it did, and I might as well enjoy it while I can."

He has a lot to enjoy.

First, the laughs—the buttons that popped up after the strike; the Old Pro's opening the night after the

> settlement ("Good evening. This is Walter Cronkite, sitting in for Arnold Zenker . . ."); and the friendly comments of colleagues ("You've got a great future behind you").

Then, the ego-builders. The reviews. True, a rival newscaster found the amiable, sober-miened substitute "cold and stiff." But the New

York World Journal Tribune said he "scored under fire" and Newsweek touted him as "easily the smash hit of the strike fill-in."

The mail? As of 10 days after the strike, close to 3000 pieces had come in from all over the U.S. and parts of Canada. Nuns assured him of their prayers; children dictated Zenker fan mail to their mothers; writers spoke of forming a new "Arnie's Army"; and a doctor offered free advice about how to get rid of Zenker's "perpetual perplexed or worried look" because the "upper line of your glasses and the line of your eyebrows do not correspond... It will take a different model frame to correct this—no work on your eyebrows would do it," said the M.D.

There were other joys of newfound celebrity. Friends not heard from in years got in touch. Doormen at his East Side apartment house began calling him "Mr. Television Man." CBS affiliates and others invited him to be a speaker at dinners. And Walter Cronkite phoned to disclaim any part in an unfavorable column item.

By the time the strike was settled, Zenker could complain, "There are agents all over my back," apparently anxious to help him sift numerous job offers—"some interesting propositions and some wild propositions" he'd received.

Zenker, who came to New York to get back into production (he had been on a Wilmington, Del., radio station, WDEL, for five years as an onthe-air man, writing his own newscasts, and had worked briefly for a New Brunswick, N.J., station), said he wouldn't be happy if he didn't explore every possibility. On the other hand, he said he was fond of his job as manager of program administration (in which he follows documentaries through production), a post he had moved to only about seven weeks before being thrust into the limelight. So he'd be quite content to stay where he was, if nothing especially challenging came along. He rationalized, "Even king for a day is better than never being king at all."

Zenker got the Cronkite assignment by doing what's taboo in the Army but not in TV: He volunteered for a radio news program.

He was given a TV show instead— Joe Benti's early-morning newscast starting the Wednesday that AFTRA struck. Here, apparently, he was found pleasing to the CBS eye, for that same afternoon he was ordered out of a deep, exhausted sleep: "You better come in here; you're doing the Cronkite show." "I was too tired to be nervous. Just numb," he said. "Keyed up and excited, but not really nervous."

By strike's end, the 5-foot-11 sub was off 9 pounds from his normal weight of 160. In the 13 days the strike lasted, he had done 20 TV newscasts, 18 radio newscasts and some miscellaneous off-camera announcements.

Philadelphia-born and bred, Arnold (a middle name would be gilding the lily) Zenker attended the University of Pennsylvania and its law school. By the time he was graduated from law school in 1962 and admitted to the New York Bar the following year, he had cooled on the idea of law practice.

In September 1962, he went to work for ABC—ironically as a labor lawyer. In 1965 (he was still doing stringer and weekend on-the-air work for the Wilmington station) he joined CBS as assistant to the director of business affairs, a post he held until this past February.

Has success spoiled Arnold Zenker?

"I heard it went to his head," said a striking newsman at another network. But others disagree.

"He's still the same as ever," comments his secretary of nearly two years, Kathleen Iaia. "Excellent."

"He's still the most lovable person in the world," says his wife Barbara, the NYU psychology student who fell for him hook, line and Zenker when they met at the New York World's Fair, and married him exactly 10 months before his Cronkite debut.

Some TV viewers seem to concur. A woman from Richmond, Va., wrote, "You have looks, personality and a God-given gift in your field of work." And a Rhode Island woman in her 80's, wrote, "You deliver a fine news broadcast and you are a doll." Zenker's comment about the mail: "There's tremendous empathy for the underdog. Look at the Mets."

Better get the "We Henker for Zenker" buttons ready.

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
