as we see it

■ The series of four programs titled "CBS News Inquiry: "The Warren Report" ranks as a major journalistic achievement.

First, it established a new form for news documentaries—one hour of prime time in the same 10 to 11 P.M. hour, for four consecutive evenings. It was the ideal way to report a long, complicated story. Much better, certainly, than trying to tell it all in one three- or four-hour documentary.

Second, the content was superb. The premise was valid: The world is not satisfied with the Warren Report on President Kennedy's death, Many questions have been brought up by critics of that report. CBS News set out to find the answers to the questions. The result was a masterful compilation of facts, interviews, experiments and opinions-a job of journalism that will be difficult to surpass. It took nine months, involved scores of people and cost just about \$500,000. It was well worth every minute, every bit of effort, every dollar.

Third, and most satisfying to those of us who have campaigned for better informational programs during prime time, the four programs were a hit with viewers! The audience was large, with overnight Arbitron ratings giving CBS 39 percent of the sets-in-use for the Sunday and Monday episodes, 37 percent on Tuesday and 35 percent on Wednesday. That was enough to beat nearly every entertainment program scheduled opposite the Report.

We've said it before and we say it again: When serious programs that interest them are scheduled during prime time, viewers will tune in. The trick is to produce interesting serious programs—instead of taking the easy way out and filling evening time with little other than escapist entertainment. It's a matter of responsibility.


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
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They're CATV, and here's a review of the industry's problems and its potential, as it moves into the big cities

One of the best ways to study an industry is to watch the trends of its annual conventions. The National Cable Television Association, representing the community antenna TV (CATV) industry, until quite recently featured conventions which were annual family-fun get-togethers of 200 or 300 small-town operators. The agenda was handled by members themselves, volunteer officers, unpaid. Now the NCTA boasts a former Federal Communications Commission Chairman as its president—Frederick

W. Ford; registrations mount into thousands; the agenda is prickly with dire Washington problems; and one begins to feel he's at a National Association of Broadcasters convention.

CATV is now engaged in a fascinating test: Can it succeed in the big town? Until very recently CATV has been serving the uncomplicated purpose of bringing TV to isolated towns which could not otherwise get satisfactory—or any—TV service. Regular stations couldn't reach such communities because of distance or block—

age of signals by rugged terrain.

The principle of a conventional CATV system is simple. A highly efficient receiving antenna is placed on the highest point near a town. The signals it picks up are strengthened electronically and sent into town via cable, then distributed to subscribers' homes through smaller cables. Usually the cables are strung on telephone and electric power poles; where telephone and power lines go underground, CATV goes with them. Each subscriber is charged, on the average, \$5 a month.

In its 18 years CATV has grown to serve more than 2,000,000 homes through 1800 individual systems. The business is still quite small, in terms of TV generally. CATV's gross revenues amount to about \$120 million a year—compared with more than \$2 billion for TV stations and networks serving more than 60 million homes.

New York City is one of the major testing grounds for metropolitan CATV. A few years ago CATV for New York would have been considered preposterous. Why would anyone pay for cable service when he could get nine stations free, right out of the air? The facts are that scarcely anyone in New York can get all nine with the consistently high technical quality CATV would provide. Color is even more difficult to receive perfectly; and possibly most important of all, CATV has the potential of providing new. non-TV communications services toand from-the home.

Dissatisfaction with technical quality is not confined to New York but is widespread. And the average viewer wants a wider programming choice.

There are strong forces working against a large variety of shows. One of them is natural, the other manmade. The "airwaves," invisible paths which all radio and TV signals must follow, are always a limited natural resource in terms of practical use.

There is always more demand than availability. The Federal Government, through the FCC, has the duty of deciding which services get which portions of the spectrum.

TV requires a very broad channel. You could put hundreds of taxi radio communication channels in the space taken by one TV station. So the FCC more than likely has given TV all the spectrum it will ever get.

The beauty of CATV, in face of such congestion, is that there's no technical limit to the number of channels you can transmit through cables. Most CATV systems have space for 12 channels now, and engineers are working on systems providing 20, 30 or more.

The man-made force limiting the kinds of programs available through conventional stations is money. Supported by advertising, stations naturally compete to provide their sponsors with the largest audiences; and just as naturally, the most popular programs tend to be stereotyped.

Educational TV, not relying on advertising for support, theoretically is free to provide programs appealing to smaller groups. But ETV's struggle for funds needs no elaboration. Furthermore, ETV stations are subject to the same spectrum squeeze limiting commercial stations' growth.

The FCC, by a very narrow majority, has voted to keep severe restraints on CATV. First, it doesn't want CATV to bring signals from distant cities to compete with local stations. Second, it doesn't want CATV to originate its own programs. The Commission's reasoning is this: (1) The ideal national system would provide a great variety of free programs. (2) Stations provide free programs. (3) Stations depend on large audiences for financial support. (4) It's unfair to expect local stations to compete for audience with distant stations provided by CATV. (5) Stations provide programs to people in sparsely continued

settled areas—too far to be reached economically by CATV. (6) Stations must be kept prosperous, so that they can afford to provide local, smallaudience, public-service programs.

CATV operators answer these arguments by stating: (1) There's no evidence that any station was ever driven out of business or hurt by CATV. (2) CATV can provide local public-service programs—even more "local" than those offered by stations, because CATV can pipe different programs into specific areas, even specific streets, if desired. (3) Technical developments promise economical cable service to sparsely settled areas.

For years the owners of TV stations generally welcomed CATV—because it enlarged their audiences by bringing their programs to remote areas. Broadcasters are now split. Some see CATV as a brand-new field for expansion and have joined the rush. Others oppose CATV as a dangerous competitor.

The Bell Telephone System once paid little attention to CATV, renting its poles to system operators at modest rates. But Bell now has no intention at all of letting CATV bring cables into millions of homes, offering "superhighways" for all kinds of possible communications, while mighty Bell stands by with the puny "footpath" into the home, i.e., a telephone wire which can carry little more than conversation. Bell is prohibited, by an antitrust decree, from operating CATV systems-but Bell is perfectly free to build systems and lease them to operators; and it's fighting for that business. The smaller phone "independents," such as General Telephone and United Utilities, have no antitrust restrictions and are expanding into CATV as fast as they can.

One of the TV industry's favorite pastimes is speculation about the kinds of services which might be put through these superhighways or electronic pipe-lines: electronic newspapers, shopping, teaching, voting, surveying, gas and electric meter reading, library research, mail delivery, emergency warnings—you name it. Even now, CATV provides news, weather services and even stock quotations on channels not occupied by local TV stations.

The Associated Press and United Press International provide news ticker services. The viewer can turn to a channel on which is shown the news teletype—giving the householder news as fast as it gets to newspapers and broadcast stations.

Broadcasters operate 29% of existing CATV systems; 46% of new systems started within the last year are owned by broadcasters. This trend worries some members of Congress, and the FCC has started a fact-finding proceeding to measure trends and see whether restrictions are called for.

The TV networks have been moving cautiously. ABC was hot about CATV for a while, but it marked time while the FCC considered its merger with ITT. CBS has been quietly buying systems—but all in Canada, to gain operating experience while avoiding the complications of U.S. ownership. NBC has bought a couple of small systems, also for toe-dipping purposes.

One of the major areas of conflict involves the use of copyrighted material. Since CATV makes money out of programs, the owners of programs believe CATV should pay something for their use, just as stations and networks do. CATV operators say they're ready to pay a "fair" rate. Congress, now amending the copyright laws, undoubtedly will provide for a system of payment.

Until Congress acts, the courts have made it clear that CATV must get clearances from copyright owners. Last year, the Federal District Court in New York held that CATVs violate the law every time they carry programs which are copyrighted—which is most of the time. However, the copyright holders have not attempted to enforce their rights while the decision is being appealed. Recently, the Federal Circuit Court of Appeals in New York unanimously agreed with the lower court. This leaves the U.S. Supreme Court as the final arena for the existing copyright laws.

FCC rules on big-town CATV are still tight, but they're gradually loosening. Congress is in the act, considering new laws which would tell the FCC precisely what to do.

Litigation invariably accompanies major industry developments, and CATV is no exception. The FCC has been regulating the CATV industry. confident it has all the legal authority it needs. Recently the courts both shook and restored this confidence. First, two CATV operators in San Diego challenged an FCC order limiting their expansion last year. The U.S. Court of Appeals in San Francisco agreed with the CATV operators, told the Commission it had overstepped the Communications Act, raising some serious questions about the FCC's whole system of regulating CATV.

Then, a few months later, another Court of Appeals, in the District of Columbia, took a completely opposed view. Ruling in a Toledo case, in which a CATV system challenged the FCC's authority to restrict its distribution of programs from a Lansing station, the D.C. court backed the Commission all the way—asserting that the FCC's CATV rules are both legal and "eminently responsible."

With two Courts of Appeals differing so markedly, the U.S. Supreme Court is quite likely to review the cases and come up with the final word. Then, naturally, the losers will turn to Congress and seek to get the law amended to lean in their direction.




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GRABBING THE
TV AUDIENCE WITH AN

OPTICAL EXCLAMATION POINT

The flashing lights, bursting colors and abstractions of psychedelia are TV's latest attention grabber. "It is an optical exclamation point," said one viewer after seeing a few minutes of psychedelic film. The world of psychedelia, heretofore reserved for the relatively few, has been invaded by a young TV producer-director, Peter Gardiner, who says, "The whole psychedelic movement is just about at the stage where the pop-art movement was when the first clothing manufacturer decided to make a Campbell Soup bathing suit. The influence of psychedelic art is just about to hit TV and




advertising full force." Among those already influenced was Steve Allen's summer show, which uses some of Gardiner's film.

Gardiner, 30, who turns out the film in a "secret workshop" with engineer Bob Beck, is reluctant to reveal his methods. The conglomeration of colors, lights and movement is achieved through a process of colors and patterns passing across a camera lens. Both men (that's Gardiner on the left) are shown during a demonstration of the process, with a model, Autumn, as their subject. "It's difficult to capture the effect," said Gardiner, president of

Charlatan Productions in Hollywood. "Television color cameras are insensitive compared to the human eye. We have a way of capturing the effect so that the colors explode." Effects are made through the use of a cheese grater, a child's kaleidoscope.

The market is opening up for psychedelic producers. "All of a sudden we're in demand, people want us to do psychedelic commercials," he says. "I'm going to capitalize on it while it's a craze." As for the fellow who doesn't own a color set, Gardiner says, "It looks just as wild in black and white."





'I AM WORRIED ABOUT MANKIND'S RATING'

Which, Allen says, is more vital than the size of his audience

Belatedly coveting a late-night, Tonight-style Pooh Bah to call its own, CBS has been fervently romancing Jackie Gleason, wooing Jack Paar, and whispering sweet nothings into the ear of Stephen Valentine Patrick William Allen

Trouble is, Steverino's idea of sweet nothing is precisely that. He doesn't fancy the five-times-a-week late-night grind. The once-a-week prime-time format is the only one he'd consider doing, now that *The Steve Allen Comedy Hour*, well into its summer groove, is a candidate to replace some hapless Nielsen also-ran next winter.

All this came to light over iced tea one recent afternoon in Steve and wife Jayne's informal "California living room" (cheek by jowl to their more elegant "New York living room") at their hillside home in Encino, Cal. It turned out to be a professional seminar on selected short subjects of the television curriculum.

Allen, the well-known producer, director, actor, comedian, musician, songwriter, sculptor, poet, political theorist, lecturer, biographer and novelist, made it clear he would rather have discoursed on penology and prison reform—and indeed he had hopefully turned up brandishing a letter from a criminologist with whom he is corresponding. But penology could



well have led us to capital punishment, narcotics addiction, mental illness, migratory farm labor, political extremism, nuclear disarmament, or goodness-knows-what other human predicament he might be writing a book about this year. (He has 11 published tomes already.) With apparent reluctance he turned to our teatime topic: television.

"Among the reasons I'm not completely enthusiastic about doing another late-night show are these: (1) I can make a lot more money doing an early-evening show, and (2) it would take too much of my time." Time evidently seldom spent glued-to-the-tube: "I watch little television because there are better ways to spend one's time."

He feels his summer Comedy Hour gives him the opportunity to do satire and social commentary on current events. "I like a big, gutsy, meaty sketch where the audience gets its money's worth. We did one recently that was 21 minutes long. My sketches almost always have a point of view; they're not just silly jokes. We've taken on political extremism, for example, and air and water pollution."

Allen hopes the CBS "Program Practices" censors display a little more guts this year than did their NBC "Broadcast Standards" counterparts in 1960 when they axed as "too

controversial" a serious roundtable discussion of crime and punishment with actors portraying St. Thomas Aquinas, Aristotle, Darrow, Dostoyevsky, Freud, Hegel, Montaigne and Socrates. "NBC would have preferred that I function in an intellectual vacuum, restricting myself to making audiences laugh rather than think."

Actually, the terms "sophisticated," "egghead" and "satirical" have always been applied to the various programs Allen has done, though it is his humanism rather than his intellectualism that excites the most controversy. Once asked if he were continued



worried about his rating, Allen replied, "Good God, no, I am worried about mankind's rating." He instinctively takes the side of the underdog, as he once observed: "When I go into a supermarket and see, for example, the various big-name brands of ketchup—Heinz, Smart & Final, Del Monte—alongside a few pitiful bottles of, say, Nussbaum's ketchup, I will usually buy the unknown brand just to help poor Nussbaum out."

Though Allen may have had the late-night chitchat bit up to here, he's the feller who invented it, remember? That was 13 years ago, three years prior to Jack Paar, on Tonight. "But it all started out before that as a discjockey show on radio KNX, Los Angeles, in '48, '49, '50. I was playing fewer and fewer records and talking more and more. One night my guest, Doris Day, didn't show. I picked up a

big heavy microphone stand, never designed for portability, and carried it out to the audience, where I proceeded to interview the people."

What makes for success as a latenight emcee? "There may be only four or five guys in the world who can do it. Not that it's hard. This talent is like wiggling your ears. It's easy to do if you can do it, but you're awfully impressed if you can't do it." Here, then, according to its progenitor, are five of the essential ingredients:

"One. The four most successful at it have been Paar, Carson, Griffin and myself. The four of us came from radio. We don't seem to have been in show biz. We're apparently non-show-biz types. The viewer thinks we're just plain folks, just like himself. In my case it's an illusion. My mother and father were a vaudeville comedy team and I've done about everything there is to do in show business.

"Et one, Bruté

"Two. A big factor is whether the audience considers you a good guy or not. They should feel toward you as toward a friend. Fast wit and repartee is less important than being likable.

"Three. You have to be good at interviewing others and develop the ability to be interested in the person interviewed. A dull person can't really be completely dull. There must be something interesting about him.

"Four. You should be at ease. Bishop seems not yet at ease. Paar was the least at ease, but his keyed-up-emotionalism made him interesting. One got involved with Jack; he was never boring.

"Five. We shouldn't compete with our guests. I never try to top anybody, especially another comedian. My shows have always been a happy hunting ground for comedians coming up, and even for established ones."


Though he has characterized his early years as "frequently rather un-

happy," Allen as a youth was regarded as the "class clown" at most of the 18 schools he attended. "As a child I felt terror at the prospect of being called upon to recite in class or play the piano at a school recital." He attained his present self-confidence, he says, only through years of experience with audiences.

Personally and socially the polaropposite of the public stereotype of a comedian, Steve Allen at 45 is rather shy, quiet and serious. "When I'm in a roomful of people I'm never 'on.' I hardly ever bother to tell a joke. I always forget whether the story is about two Swedes or two Italians. Basically I'm a semi-introvert. On stage I'm an extrovert."

What does this "semi-introvert" think about his extroverted image on the tube? "Watching myself is like watching some stranger whose work I enjoy. Most of the time I'm laughing my head off."

A Rewrite for Huntley-Brinkley

Don't count much longer on a "Good night, Chet-good night, David" every weeknight. The Huntley-Brinkley Report, 10 years old and as familiar as apple pie, apparently is in for some experimental face-lifting beginning around mid-August. According to talk in TV news circles. NBC will take electronic journalism's Dynamic Duo off the daily grind, letting Chet Huntlev and David Brinklev spell one another as anchor men. At the same time the regular cast will be augmented by a foursome of staff newsmen with Sandy Vanocur and John Chancellor standing in from Washington when Brinkley is off, Doug Kiker from New York on Huntley's off-air days and Jack Perkins (lately in Hong Kong) reporting in from Los Angeles. (Tom Pettit was to have been the Coast correspondent, but up and left NBC to join that non-commercial Public Broadcast Lab starting Sunday nights on educational-TV next fall.) On their "off" days, Huntley and Brinkley will try to get out into the hustings to do a bit of firsthand reporting. Reuven Frank, NBC News executive vice president, concedes the network is "toving around" with an H-B format overhaul. but insists the details aren't pinned down, and whatever is tried will be abandoned if it seems not to "work."

It was inevitable: NBC is about to bring on TV's first prime-time double feature. The Beatles' first movie, "A Hard Day's Night," is booked for a 7:30 (Eastern Time) showing the night of Oct. 24. It will be followed at 9 by the usual Tuesday Night at the Movies featuring Jerry Lewis's "Cinderfella." It's a one-time proposition but who knows — if it works ratings-wise, it could be the fore-runner of more double helpings of old flicks.

Pollster Louis Harris has annoyed the TV industry periodically for a couple of years with surveys finding that upper-income, better-educated Americans are so disenchanted with The Tube that they watch it less and less. What has made TVers especially hot under the collar is the fact that Harris was considered half-in-the-family in his continuing role since 1963 as an elections consultant to CBS News. This past week, to no one's great surprise, Harris and CBS let it be known they were parting ways. CBS News president Richard S. Salant denied emphatically that Harris's downbeat findings on TV viewing had anvthing to do with the split-up. "It's simply a case of our deciding to set up our own election research department," Salant explained.

ABC's hopes of coming under the corporate umbrella of big, affluent ITT have again been dampened, this time by a Justice Department decision to fight the FCC-approved merger in the courts. How long this might delay the ABC-ITT marriage, if it gets a court blessing, nobody was prepared to say.

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

Any network-movie week that boasts Jimmy Durante and Martha Raye on one bill, a couple of strictly-for-fun spectaculars, and stars galore in a trio of other vehicles, becomes a top-score session for summer.

Durante and Raye share billing with Doris Day, Stephen Boyd and what Jimmy describes as a "pulchatoobinous pachadoim" named Sydney in "Jumbo," that old Billy Rose circus spectacular that comes to film equipped with a number of dandy Rodgers and Hart tunes and all the schmaltz and corn we want mixed with our sawdust. Suffice it to say that the schmaltz is limited, the corn pops merrily along, the spectacle is fine, and the mood a blissfully happy one.

The show belongs to Durante, of course; watch him immortalize the moment when the sheriff, catching him leading off Jumbo, demands, "Where are you going with that elephant?" And Jimmy, with Jumbo right behind him and a voice brimming with injured innocence, replies, "What elephant?"

The two spectaculars are in the grand style overflowing with dead extras, lusty heroes and busty heroines, and just a smattering of historical fact or classical fiction to soothe the consciences of both screenwriter and screenwatcher. My preference is for "Genghis Khan," a rags-to-riches, upfrom-slavery story of the Mongol warrior. It boasts not only Omar

Sharif as the hero but also Robert Morley as the super-civilized Emperor of China; James Mason as his droop-whiskered, buck-toothed advisor; and Eli Wallach as the snake-eyed Shah of Khwarezm. They all have a grand wallow—and I suspect you will too. Next to them Kirk Douglas and Anthony Quinn are pallid types as "Ulysses" and friend, although there's nothing pallid about Silvana Mangano as both Penelope and Circe.

On a less simple-minded level, there's "That Certain Feeling," one of those ultimately frenetic comedies that's held together by Bob Hope at his best, abetted by lovely Eva Marie Saint and waspish George Sanders, and more plot and nonsense about a stuffy comic-strip artist than needs detailing.

The week's remaining entries are serious melodramas, topical in theme and honorable in intent. "Fail Safe," identical in premise and a variety of situations with "Dr. Strangelove" but opposite in its earnest treatment thereof, is for those who like their melodrama laced with science fiction. sprinkled with soap suds and laden with significance. Henry Fonda's fine as the President trying to avert the ultimate American-Russian nuclear showdown. In "The Ugly American." Marlon Brando's worth watching as Brando rather than as the ambassador involved in Asian affairs. Both films, alas, give unconventional themes purely conventional treatment.

Health care in the U.S. is afflicted by a shortage of approximately 125,000 nurses. At the same time, some 300,000 licensed nurses are not working. Many have found other interests (including marriage), but most have turned away because of poor salaries and heavy workloads.

Producer Edward Magruder Jones took his cameras to San Francisco, where last year nurses won a battle for more money. Films show them treating drunks and gunshot victims in emergency rooms; working in wards and operating rooms; and performing highly technical services in "intensive-care units."

MORE BRITISH THAN BIG BEN

The creator of 'Rat Patrol' wanted a real Englishman to play Sergeant Moffitt, and that's unquestionably what he got

Hollywood, as some ancient creator of clichés once opined, is the Land of Make-Believe.

But in an episode of ABC's The Rat Patrol this season, when Gary Raymond, who plays the British Sgt. Jack Moffitt, wore a cast on his leg, he wasn't fooling. And he didn't get hurt on the playing fields of Eton. He and co-star Christopher George were both seriously injured—a broken ankle for Raymond and a concussion for George—when their Rat Patrol jeep turned over during the shooting of a scene on the desert near Los Angeles.

In the emergency, a script was hastily written, in which Moffitt was injured in the course of being captured by the enemy, but still managed to hold off a small army of TV's ever-inept Germans with his leg in a cast.

The action-filled shoot-'em-up doings of The Rat Patrol seem oddly out of character for Raymond, a gentle sort who still winces every time a gun is fired and who is, in fact, called "The Gentleman" by the program's crew. Although he hopes some day to play "a Hamlet that someone might like," he enjoys gardening better than anything. He says, "I want to be really good at it," and, standing in the barren California desert this spring, before his family came over from England, he told of his wife's letters describing the spring flowers—the roses and white raspberry-near their new home in London. The home is new only to them. It was built in 1840 on a square set aside for Wellington's officers. The Raymonds also have a cottage even older, with no electricity or running water, "buried in the heath" in Surrey.

Tom Gries, who created *The Rat Patrol* and chose the cast, says, "When I was looking for an actor to play Moffitt, I wanted a real Englishman." He got one. Gary Raymond is not

about to become an expatriate or a member of Hollywood's resident British colony, "I'll always go back to England," he says. He has the Times of London flown in every day, and he keeps his watch set on London time. The house he rents in Pacific Palisades, overlooking the Riviera golf course, belongs to English actress Gladys Cooper and was previously rented by Vanessa Redgrave. "They were both recently decorated by the Queen," says Gary, with just the slightest touch of envy-and possibly of hope-in his voice. He will never be knighted for his role in The Rat Patrol. The program was shown briefly in England and promptly taken off the air when the public objected to its implication that an American led that particular part of the African campaign in World War II.

In choosing his "real Englishman," Gries went through a book of photographs of British actors and picked 15 he thought might fit the role. After all of them had been interviewed, Gary Raymond seemed the most promising. Gries then looked at the motion picture "Playboy of the Western World," in which Raymond starred. "That did it," he says. "I didn't even have to watch the whole film. Even through the brogue I knew this was my man. There's a quality of cool in the character of Moffitt that Gary possesses exactly."

Once he received the offer of the part, the actor and his wife, Delena, sat up all night debating whether to accept it. The decision was a difficult one. In addition to requiring long absences from England, the role in an action TV film was entirely different from anything Raymond had done before. After leaving the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts in 1955, he joined Sir John Gielgud and Dame Peggy Ashcroft in the Royal Shakespeare Company. In his first role, a minor one in "King Lear," he

almost maimed Gielgud moving a prop column on-stage. But he went on to tour England and the Continent in "Lear" and "Much Ado About Nothing." Later he joined the Nottingham Repertory Company and the Oxford Playhouse, did TV and little theater in London, and made his motion-picture debut as Charles II in "The Moonrakers." Other movies followed, among them "Look Back in Anger," "El Cid" and "The Greatest Story Ever Told," in which Gary played St. Peter, made his first trip to the United States and learned to play bridge, still one of his favorite pastimes.

The 32-year-old Raymond was probably fated to be an actor from the beginning. His parents, Robert E. Raymond and Paddy Lee, were musichall entertainers, and his mother chose his name-Gary Barrymore Raymond. He is the youngest of three boys-20 minutes younger than his twin brother, who is a butcher in London. His mother died when he was 9 months old, and he and his twin were put in the charge of a "nanny figure," who took care of them and half a dozen other children. The older brother, now an interior decorator in London, stayed with their father, who continued touring the music-hall circuit and "could cope with one but not three."

When Gary was 11, he won a scholarship to the Gateway School in Leicester, where he stayed until he was 16. Returning to London, he worked as a clerk and for a furrier, meanwhile attending drama classes sponsored by the London County Council. One of his teachers there recommended him for a scholarship to the Royal Academy, which he entered in 1953, when he was 18.

It was after he left the Academy and was with the Oxford Playhouse that he met blonde actress Delena Kidd. They were married in 1961 and now have three children—Matthew, 4, Sophie, 2, and Emily, not yet a year.

Raymond is obviously tremendously fond of his family. During June, while he was in California and they were still in England, he was literally counting the days until they would arrive. It was a small joke on the set to go up to him and say, "How many days?" He would say, "Just 10 more." Then the questioner would say, "What time is it in London right now?" He would look at his watch and say, "Eight o'clock in the evening."

Although Gary Raymond is thoroughly the actor and thoroughly British, he is almost completely unlike the classic English actor in the Sir Laurence Olivier-Sir John Gielgud tradition. Instead of having their awesome voices and diction, for instance, he is soft-spoken and mildmannered. He finds it difficult to talk about himself and is conspicuously unflamboyant. The "cool" of Sergeant Moffitt, which Tom Gries saw in him, turns out to be shyness and reticence off-screen.

He also likes to cook exotic. gourmet-type dishes and recently received a copy of Julia Child's cookbook as a gift. But, he says, "The Spanish woman won't let me in the kitchen when she is here." The Spanish woman, Esperanza, who has been with the family four years, is a non-British touch in the Raymond ménage. Although she is that British institution, a nanny, and is thus usually referred to, she is indubitably Spanish, and, because of her, the two older Raymond children speak fluent Spanish.

Thus Gary Raymond, daring nemesis of Nazis on-screen; British gentleman, family man and lover of the quiet life off. Someone close to him on *The Rat Patrol* summoned him up by saying, "He's at peace with himself." Which is something not often said about actors, whatever their nationality.

THE BEST EARLY DATE IN TOWN

San Francisco is talking about Ingrid Bergman's daughter and her 6 A.M. show

For most of her 27 years, Pia Lindstrom has been trying to become rich and famous.

She comes by this drive naturally since she has lived her life among the rich and famous—starting with her mother, Ingrid Bergman, a widely acclaimed actress, a passionate woman who once caused the volcano at Stromboli to explode, aided by Roberto Rossellini, an Italian director, also r, and f.

It is a happy thing to report that Pia Lindstrom may be on the very threshold of her heart's desire.

She appears five days a week on an ABC television show in San Francisco, Cal., a show called A.M. because it takes to the air at 6 in the morning. Later in the day she also appears on the same Channel 7 as a news reporter.

In these days of network notoriety, such local labors might seem as though Pia were hiding her light under a bushel. Not so. She is being groomed for bigger things and her bosses are ecstatic about her potential. "I'm so high on her that I'm walking on eggs," says David M. Sacks, general manager of Channel 7 and an ABC vice president.

Although Pia has been at work only 11 months, the network already is making noises about elevating her to national stature, possibly by installing her in its Washington news bureau.

Pia reached her present eminence "by a fluke," in the words of Zev Putterman, A.M.'s producer, but it was more probably an example of strike while the iron is hot, opportunity knocks only once, a bird in the hand, and things like that.

"Pia came through San Francisco as part of a nation-wide tour for Fiat," Putterman says, "and she was on the Gypsy Rose Lee show here as part of that job. We saw her name on the guest list and a lot of us watched her. She looked good physically and she had presence, that 'it' thing, and we were all interested."

They were all interested because Nancy Fleming, who was Miss America 1961, was leaving the A.M. show to have a baby, and a replacement was needed badly. Eighty girls had been interviewed and all had been found wanting.

"So we replaced warm and beautiful Nancy Fleming with Pia," says David Sacks, "and the first verdict was bad. Everyone said, 'She hasn't had enough experience. She's too cold. She's a good guest but not a regular.' The public did not like Pia and telephoned in to tell her so.

Jim Dunbar, the main prop of the A.M. show, a witty, fast-talking, serious gent, testifies: "When I first talked to her I said, 'My God, she's a monarchist. She was born 400 years too late.' I could see her lolling on a divan, plopping grapes into some grand-vizier's chops, but I couldn't see her on TV at 6 A.M., talking to a lot of people she'd never met."

"I must say I was leery about her lack of experience," says Putterman, "but she really went to work and bit into the material. She had to learn and deliver fast."

Pia's comment on the speed with which she has mastered her new craft is typical Lindstrom: "I'm 27 and I don't have any unending length of

time. Anyway, it happens to be my nature. If people say, 'It will take you a year to learn,' I say, 'Why a year? I'm going to do it faster.'"

What Pia has learned so quickly is a strange art form—the television telephone show. The idea of A.M. is to have a controversial guest, let him say his piece and then loose Jim Dunbar and Pia on him and, on the best of shows, stir up comment from the vast listening audience which can telephone in to have its say.

So Pia has met and dealt with racists, abortionists, income-tax specialists, Birchers, hippies, acid heads and just plain people who have something to say between 6 and 8 in the morning.

Pia has done it so well that Jim Dunbar says: "She's good for the show. I couldn't talk to a dumb broad, but Pia sparks me. She looks like a cold, statuesque *Svenska*, but she has a lot of humor and likes a good 180-degree, head-on argument.

"She has a man's mind except for those lapses when she's a dame when she starts thinking about panty girdles or some damn feminine thing. Then she just boggles the mind.

"But the most important thing is her honesty. She hasn't a trace of guile and she won't use tricks to avoid facing an issue. When she tries to tell a fib, she turns beet red."

Pia won considerable fame around the studio for her conduct when a caller asked her if she "believed in the God of the Bible." Pia's answer was an unembellished "No."

"That's almost sure death for a performer," Putterman says. "She didn't know how to avoid the answer and, anyway, she wouldn't avoid it—she doesn't lie. We got a million blazing letters on that."

On the morning a man was executed in California's gas chamber, most of the listeners and callers argued that capital punishment acted as a strong deterrent to future acts of homicide. Pia dissented. "If capital punishment is such a deterrent, why do we hide it?" she asked. "Why should we have a gas chamber tucked away where no one can see the man die? We should have a guillotine set up in the park and invite all the people. They could bring box lunches."

When she talked with the coach of the San Francisco pro football team, Pia asked: "Doesn't it seem peculiar to you that grown men put on armor and go out on a field and continued rush around trying to maim one another? Why don't you put the players out there with lions, real lions? That way we could all get more vicariously involved."

Pia is involved in certain things herself. She took part in a peace march which took her directly in front of the studio where Sacks and other brass were watching. Pia waved at her bosses. "Oh, ye uncommitted," she cried, "There ye stand."

She says, "I spent the last five years in Europe and I didn't know what people here were talking about. I knew there was some kind of Negro revolt, but I'd never heard of a hippy or LSD. I didn't know anything about labor unions or welfare problems or people with illegitimate children or criminals or alcoholics. This job has been an education for me.


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
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-but when jolly comedy writers go on a job hunt they don't see the joke

Spring and summer may bring to most of the world dreams of frolicking in the woods, loaves of bread and jugs of good stuff; but for the average struggling Hollywood television writer, it's the season for a far different type of fantasy. Because these are the days he dreams of invitations to Advance Showings, those hushhush screenings of the new shows on next fall's schedule. Whether he gets to go to those screenings will pretty much determine whether he has a fat, successful year, or one in which he gets to put in a lot of time on that novel.

The Advance Showings start as soon as the network schedules are firm, and they help explain why the names of the same few writers keep popping up on so many shows. Of course, any show that reaches the pilot stage had to be written by someone, and we might wonder why that someone doesn't go ahead and write it once the show is sold. Sometimes he does, but often pilot writers are so rich and successful they can't do more than a couple of the shows. Or by the time the thing is sold, they aren't speaking to the producer any more. Or maybe somebody in

Sponsorville has decided they aren't the type after all.

Any of these events results in the word going out to agents that the pilot will be screened at the studio at such and such a time, and the producer would like to have some writers drop in and see if they have a "feel" for the show. These invitations are golden. because those who attend the Advance Showings obviously have a long head start on all who have to wait until the program is on the air. In fact, those who have to wait that long might as well forget it.

Anyway, with a little luck a journeyman writer can expect a call from his agent with the word that there's a showing of a pilot that very afternoon. Only a few top writers are being invited, the agent advises, but I was able to squeeze you in. Two o'clock at MGM.



The writer, dazzled by visions of multiple assignments, presents himself at the studio gates. Before he can mention his secret rendezvous, the guard jerks a thumb toward the projection building, "All you writers go to Theater 5"

It is soon apparent that "a few top writers" includes all the writers he knows or ever heard of, and a few dozen more just in from New York. Any Hollywood hand can tell, just by watching the crowd pouring into Theater 5, that the pilot to be seen is a comedy, because it doesn't take much practice to spot a card-carrying comedy writer. He's the middle-aged fellow in the gray suit with the forlorn face. Put him cheek by jowl with a basset hound and the mutt looks jovial. The writers who do heavy drama wear flame-colored sweaters. drive sports cars, laugh a lot and, worse still, are usually seen with blondes draped over their arms.

Studio projection rooms are the last best relics of Hollywood's gaudy past. Enter one, and you can see how it was when real stars and certified titans ruled the studios and mere mortals groveled at their feet. The best of the projection rooms feature at least a few massive leather chairs obviously imported from some London club, and there are phones, desk areas and rows of colored buttons to press. The leather may be a little cracked now, and the buttons no longer summon platoons of flunkies, but the grandeur lingers.

Once the race for the best of these ego massagers is settled, the writers usually have time to exchange some lively banter about their gallstones. who's died lately, mix-ups at the Writers Guild over residual checks, and the rate at which the smog is killing them.

Before the film begins, somebody from the producer's office stands up to welcome the visiting craftsmen. On rare occasions it is the producer himself; more often it is an associate producer; and in many cases the welcome is delivered by some unknown who is never seen by anyone again.

Whoever the speaker, he assures them the show really is in the market for scripts. He also warns that since the pilot was filmed, the network and sponsors have ordered a few minor changes. Nothing to worry about, but the locale has been moved from Venus to the home office of a large insurance firm, and the hero is now a window washer working outside that office, instead of the commander of a spaceship. Actually, as you can see, he's still air-borne, so the change shouldn't be too much of a problem.

The film itself is watched in almost complete silence. The protocol for comedy writers viewing a pilot is never to laugh unless there is a scene so bad, so gauche, that it deserves a reprimand, whereupon a short, despairing cackle is permitted. But they aren't completely impassive during the better offerings. A fine, wellturned comedy bit will often draw an admiring "Hmmm." A really sharp, unexpected line may cause three or four writers to burst into an uncontrollable "Uh." Fledgling producers sitting through one of these showings for the first time have been known to crawl out before the final credits. blubbering for their mommies.


Once the film has been run and the lights return, there's usually an informal critique, whose tenor depends on whether the producer or any of his staff are still present. If the producer does remain, the remarks are likely to be along the line "You've done it again, Harry" and "This one's a cinch to go five years." If the producer and his underlings are safely out of earshot, the evaluations run to "What a turkey!" "Screen Gems had a better version 10 years ago and it flopped"

and "What a lousy credit this would be! I wouldn't touch it."

Sometimes the showings are followed by inspirational talks from the producer. The Smothers Brothers situation-comedy pilot, not to be confused with their current variety program, was previewed on a Friday afternoon at a time when the show was undergoing changes, dissension and the panic of a rapidly approaching air date. Fred de Cordova, the new producer, stood up and said, "I know many of you have wives, homes, children, mistresses. A weekend is ahead and maybe you have Little League, lawn mowing, assignations planned. Forget them, Go home and think Smothers Brothers, morning, noon and night. Then call me Monday morning with the ideas that will save this show!" No one will ever know whether it was Little League or assignations, but somehow the Mondaymorning calls didn't save the show.




