



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CIMARRON STRIP

Not long ago, Mr. Michael Dann, CBS's vice president in charge of programming, declared that he never took any ideas from amateurs. If so, he should start now. Because, judging from this show, his professionals are, where ideas are concerned, fresh out. The only difference between this show and the 4084 other Westerns you have seen over the past 44 years is that it lasts an hour and a half, and by the end of the first episode they have killed everything in sight except (a) the hero and (b) the time.

The hero is named Marshal Jim Crown and he is played by Stuart Whitman. Even if at the beginning of the show you love him, and at the middle of the show you still like him, the trouble is, by the end of the show you feel married to him. Some of the fault is his-he has a weird, husky way of speaking-but a lot of it is not. If you had to say over and over, for example, lines like "I'll bet you a steak and a beer," you'd get pretty weirdo too. Also, to use up the 90 minutes, he can't do anything too fast-even think. Which is too bad because, on top of all the other faults here, the whole thing is very psychological. Marsh Jim was once, if you can believe it, a bad guy. No kidding, isn't that a terrific new idea? And he also has-can you bear it?-a past. And, take our word for it, this isn't fair, because no man with the present and future he's got on this show should have to have a bad past too.

The show runs on guest stars. Crown does have two part-time deputies, a young photographer named Francis (Randy Boone) and an itinerant Scot named MacGregor (Percy Herbert), as well as a young Eastern girl named Dulcey (Jill Townsend)-but these have so little to do, and what they do do is so irritating, that if it was left just to them, and to Jim, there would be no show at all. The part of Dulcey, for example, is so unbelievable that it provides, unwittingly, to all the inexcusable violence around her, a kind of comic relief. (Of one monster boy-villain, she says, "His father wants him to be an eagle, but he's only a little sparrow.") And Mac-Gregor's chief contribution to each episode is a series of requests for a drink. It is our theory that he does this because he knows what's coming.

Finally, thick as the guest stars are, they wear thin. Particularly endless in the first episode was the performance of John Saxon as "Screamer." In another one it was a tossup between the misunderstood boy (Tim O'Kelly), a rabblerouser (Larry Gates) and a con man who pretends he's on the side of the angels (Steve Forrest). So what do the writers name the con-angel? Hold on, now. Wylie Harpe.

About midway through the second hour of one show, we think we heard one character say, "You talk like my foot's asleep." We still don't believe it, but we think we heard it.

• A four-hour study of Africa is by no means a college course on the subject, but it is four hours better than nothing. Millions of Americans today have a better comprehension of the variety, the problems, and the past, present and future of The Dark Continent than ever before in history.

The reason is ABC's ambitious and highly successful electronic probe of the subject on a recent Sunday evening. We think it was the best documentary ever produced by ABC-for depth, for organization, for clarity, for photography, for commentary, and for entertainment. In the last-named category, it is an outstanding example of the fascination with which information can and should be imparted on TV. We have all been talking, since television's birth, of the need to make it more usefully informative; ABC's "Africa" may well be one of the breakthroughs to prove how this can be done and still hold on to a respectable portion of the mass audience the circulation-hungry advertiser needs.

The four hours we spent with the show melted magically away. At 11 P.M., instead of the dull, tired feeling that follows a long evening of watching single-minded cowboys and paranoiac gunmen, there was stimulation and a conviction of an evening spent profitably.

• Speaking of cowboys, it is gratifying to note that ABC, the network which achieved some of its initial rating successes with lightweight Westerns and irresponsibly violent *Untouchables*, is the same network that now pioneers with a distinguished "Africa."

And even more gratifying is the fact that once again the viewing public has demonstrated—this time with the ratings—that a substantial part of the audience *does* prefer constructive, interestingly presented information to trivial, mindless, formula fiction.

Marlo Thomas & Co. invade Philadelphia

When producer Danny Arnold chose Philadelphia for a location shooting of the *That Girl* series, he was motivated by the same instincts that led the Continental Congress to pick the city for drafting the Declaration of Independence some seasons back. It is a town where visitors don't have a hard time sticking to the work at hand. There's nothing else to do.

That is known as a Philadelphia joke. It would burn Abe Rosen. Abe is the Philadelphia city representative and director of commerce, and his distaste for jokes that make fun of Philadelphia has become something of a Philadelphia joke itself.

He is very proud of his city and that is why, when Arnold told him he wanted to bring Marlo Thomas and company in to shoot some background for a *That Girl* episode, Rosen was more than delighted to make all the city's facilities available. Through his kindness, viewers of the ABC comedy series next week will be treated to about 90 seconds' worth of random Philadelphia Facilities, including hotel fronts, stage entrances, railroad stations and the Liberty Bell. Arnold wanted Philadelphia because the script called for a Broadway tryout town. The bit calls for Marlo's character, Ann Marie, to hit town delirious with joyful anticipation of her first big shot at stardom. Then the show bombs. This, believe it or not, has happened in real life.

"I wanted a town that people could identify immediately," explained Arnold. "It had to have something everybody knew. So you have Independence Hall and the Liberty Bell. Everybody knows them."

Another consideration was that Philadelphia is close to New York and most of the technical help, so traveling expenses were minimal.

The episode was filmed over two chilly days last May. Total working time came to around 20 hours, which breaks down to about 13 minutes of toil for every second of air time.

Philadelphia, of course, is reasonably sophisticated when it comes to TV. Many Philadelphians own their own television sets, and some network shows have originated there.

The stars arrived in midmorning on a Thursday. With Marlo came Arnold, co-star Ted Bessell, press agent Barry Lowen and the usual assortment of makeup and hair-styling functionaries. Marlo was dead beat from a late appearance in Detroit, but when they finished plastering her face in peach and charcoal, she looked just as live as anybody else in Philadelphia.

There was, strangely enough, not a word of dialog done in Philadelphia. It was strictly background filming. All the clever lines would be added on the West Coast.

The first take was done in front of the Barclay Hotel. Marlo, wincing constantly in excitement, frolicked in and out of taxicabs, assisted by the hotel's real doorman. It was about a 30-second bit; it took three hours to do it. The doorman, Joseph Booth, handled his chance like the pro he is. The Booths always were show-biz people. The hotel wasn't quite as relaxed. The Barclay is one of the world's great staid hostelries and they don't like to give you a room there unless you're senile. You could tell they were a little concerned when the crew borrowed the hotel's wheel chair to wheel the cameraman around.

"It's a rich hotel," Arnold admitted, "too rich for the part. But I like the hotel and we're staying here, so it's convenient. And from the outside you can't tell a rich hotel from any other hotel."

Marlo had been working only about 90 minutes before she was recognized. "I know her," a woman on the fringe whispered. "That's what's-her-name, what's-his-name's daughter. She's on what's-it-called."

Realizing they had been spotted, Arnold moved the show to Independence Hall. The Hall last caught the public eye in 1777, when Ed Sullivan had it on his show. The script called for Ann Marie and Don (Ted Bessell) to do a little sight-seeing. They admired the Liberty Bell from its good side, the cracked one. The bell, which has appeared often in the movies, was marvelous.

It was at this point in time that Bessell began to dominate proceedings on sheer force of personality. A guide, working overtime, showed him the room where the Declaration of Independence was signed. "I think this is fantastic," he gushed. "Just great, Look, right there is the Virginia delegation's table. Just think, in this very room, all those great men. On that table, that's Thomas Jefferson's walking stick. Just think, Thomas Jefferson. And I could jump this railing and steal it right now." Bessell later contemplated stealing the Liberty Bell, but his reverence for history overcame the impulse.

"I have none of the Western callousness that is eating at the heart of

American life," he told a photographer. "Now this man [gesturing to Lowen] is a prime example of the West Coast callousness that is eroding life in Hollywood."

"Don't you live in Hollywood?" he was asked.

"Yes, in a career sense I do, but thank God I am such a humble, wonderful human being that I can come into this hallowed chamber and be overwhelmed with the presence of history. I can identify with the great men, living and dead, who established our great Nation in this very spot. I can feel them here now. Now, in contrast, this fellow is a prime example of the typical West Coast callousness that is eating at the very heart of American life. Now please come over here and take my picture."

Bessell indulged his instinct for entertaining whenever there was a lull in the shooting, which was constantly. He endeared himself to the Barclay management by answering the phone near the door and paging, in excellent voice, the appropriate parties.

The day's final action occurred at the stage door of Philadelphia's Academy of Music, ideally located on a narrow street that is not crowdprone. Ann Marie bounces in the stage door and emerges crushed. One take was ruined by two delinquents who ran in front of the camera in a gesture that appeared premeditated. They were properly cursed.

It was almost 11 at night when work ended. All agreed that the highlight of the day had been the time an assistant director tripped while going through a revolving door.

Marlo was fatigued, but reliable sources say she rested well. She was in excellent spirits the next morning.

By this time word of the conspiracy had reached higher authorities and all three Philadelphia papers had stories about the shooting. Marlo read them with interest.

"Isn't that cute?" she said after reading one.

"I didn't think it was very wellwritten," said Lowen, a young fellow with high literary standards.

"Oh, it's cute," she said. "Besides you wouldn't expect them to send anybody good out on a lousy story like this, would you?" The line was spoken in jest, not in malice. In fact, for sheer good nature the *That Girl* company was disgusting. Show-business people are expected to grouse and fight constantly, but this outfit has no sense of tradition. Producer Arnold, a casual, gum-chewing guy, rarely spoke above a congenial mumble. He was moved to compliment the city on its cooperation.

"Everybody was great," he said. "Abe Rosen gave us everything we wanted. There was none of this youcan't-shoot-this or you-can't-shootthat stuff. They assigned us two policemen and they did anything we asked.

"You know how it used to be in New York before Lindsay. Every time you moved, you were paying somebody off. You'd stop a truck and a cop would come and say, 'You can't stop it there,' and bang, 20 bucks. And then his buddy would come up to get his. That was going on all the time. They ruined New York for shooting until Lindsay got in and changed things."

The nearest thing to a dispute came when Marlo questioned a flashy pink dress she was wearing for the opening-night bit.

"It's your opening night of a twoweek run," Arnold was telling her. "It's your big chance and it's gonna flop, but when you go out you're all excited . . ."

"But dressed like this?" Marlo asked. "I wouldn't be dressed like this. I'd be in tennis shoes, jeans and my hair in curlers."

"No you wouldn't. You've got a date afterward. You want to look great. So you go in this, change, do the show and then go out on your date."

"No actress would go dressed like this. I never would. My first show I only had one line, 'Mom, the fudge is ready,' but I still went in jeans and curlers. Everybody knows that."

"No they don't. Only *you* know that. Most people don't know what actresses wear to opening nights. Nobody in Philadelphia does."

"But all my *friends* know," Marlo insisted. "They'll laugh at me going to an opening night in an evening dress. I hope we're pre-empted in Los Angeles and San Francisco."

They did the scene Arnold's way. Marlo went to her opening night dressed to kill. In Philadelphia nearly everybody does.

The highlight of the second day's shooting, all agreed, was when the company got on a train and left Philadelphia. In the morning a dejected Ann Marie, having apparently bombed the previous eve, was filmed slumping along the platform at the Pennsylvania Railroad station, glumly eying show posters as she waited for the train.

While this tragedy was recorded, Bessell entertained autograph seekers, including a young girl whose parents had brought her a hundred miles from Harrisburg just to meet Marlo Thomas. A reward for getting good grades. Marlo made a huge fuss over the girl and then turned her over to Bessell.

"How old are you?" the girl asked. "I really don't know," he replied. "I was adopted and all records pertaining to my birth were lost, so I don't know how old I am. I often wonder myself."

Before the train pulled out at 3 P.M. Arnold discovered several more Philadelphia stars. He employed two porters and several cab drivers. "When somebody does a little piece of business like this, a cop or cabbie, we usually give him 20 bucks," he said. "They'd just be standing there anyway."

The car chosen for the shooting was the last car on the train, a combination sleeper-parlor car. The bedroom compartments were jammed with electronic gear. The filming was done in the parlor section.

Most of the bits on the train involved Marlo, but when she wasn't working, she stood on a chair and shouted encouragement to Bessell over the cameraman's head. "Terrible!" she encouraged. "Very bad acting."

The train shooting was not without its problems. Arnold was filming Marlo looking out the window as the train came into Newark. She's supposed to be looking for someone. But as the train reached the station, a terrible discovery was made.

"All right," Arnold was saying energetically, "you're looking for him. Now here's the platform. Where is he? Keep looking."

"The platform's on the other side!" somebody yelled.

"Oh, beautiful! What can you see through the camera?"

"I can see a railing and a wall." "That'll do. Keep shooting. Keep looking. Now look this way. He's out there somewhere. Now look the other way. There he is! You see him! You're excited. Wave! Be happy! [Marlo is displaying her joy by banging her palm against the window.] Good! Wave some more. Now look back as you pass him. Stay excited. Fine! Cut! All right, take the train back to Philly and we'll do it again."

They couldn't, of course. By the time they got back to Philadelphia, it would be 5:30 in the afternoon and the place would be closed. (It's just a harmless Philadelphia joke, Mr. Rosen.) So there they were—Ted Bessell, what's-her-name and all those other prime examples of West Coast callousness—stuck for two weeks in New York.

TELLING THE UN STORY TO THE WORLD

It's that time again at the sprawling United Nations compound overlooking Manhattan's polluted East River: From 122 nations, diplomats have gathered for yet another 14-week session of the UN General Assembly, and that means heightened activity for the 65 men and women of the UN Television force whose job it is to purvey the world body's deliberations around the globe.

But the vast meeting hall was empty and echoing recently when this TV GUIDE reporter strolled about it with Michael Hayward, chief of UN Teleare perched and ready to convey the action. "Television organizations all over the world send correspondents to the UN," Hayward said. "It's our job to facilitate their reports and give them access to whatever they need to do their jobs." Hayward is an American, but because he is a UN functioneer, his professional loyalties are extranational and at the service of any foreign TV newsman who needs him.


The UN's TV activities fall into three main categories: 1) providing to TV newsmen the actual facilities for covering the UN; 2) handling the pool

ing into its eighth season.

Oddly enough, the United Nations has no budget for any of this; it's all self-sustaining—paid for by the commercial TV news organizations which buy its TV services. For example, the American networks each pay about \$2500 per week for access to the UN's varied TV facilities, including newly instituted color coverage. And stations using International Zone pay for it on a prorated basis.

The live coverage of Security Council and General Assembly sessions is photographed by UN technicians, fed to a master control room (also manned by UN people), then piped out on coaxial cable to the networks and stations which want to buy it. (The networks can, and often do, have their own cameras in the UN chambers to augment pool coverage.)

During the Mideast crisis in June, UN-TV made daily use of satellites to send both live coverage and wrapups of the debates to networks elsewhere in the world (such as Eurovision and Intervision). Ever since the launching of these synchronous satellites, UN-TV has become more truly international, with such historic broadcasts as the Oct. 4, 1965, visit of Pope Paul VI to the UN.

Aside from hard news coverage, UN-TV also will supply almost any kind of news or feature "package" to its clients—for a price, of course; three times in the last two years they have produced for National Educational Television hour-long programs on matters of public importance: The "Count Down Under" was a scrutiny of the world's oceans and what they promise for man's survival; "The Food Crisis" examined the response of nations to the threat of famine.

The third documentary, "Bridge on the Jordan," took up the problem of the Arab refugees displaced because of the Arab-Israeli war. "We got into areas in the Arab world where no commercial television network would be allowed," Michael Hayward says. These UN film teams travel under the UN flag and thus often receive more cordial treatment than their commercial brethren.

Cordiality notwithstanding, the UN

producers still maintain their right to shoot documentaries inside member nations without interference or censorship. "On a few occasions, countries have tried to exercise control over our product," Hayward says, "but we've simply called off the program instead."

The most ambitious nonnews undertaking of UN-TV is producing the *International Zone* series, which this year is being carried by about 55 stations in the U.S. and is seen also in such countries as Malaysia, New Zealand, Nigeria and Germany.

It got started seven years ago when some prominent broadcast executives saw the need for a series documenting some of the social and economic problems various UN agencies are dealing with. The UN Television people thought it was a splendid idea, but pointed out that there was no money around for such a thing.

So the broadcasters set it up as a nonprofit venture and agreed to buy the series for all the stations which they themselves represented, scaling the price so as to cover the production costs. Thus, a station in a minor market got the 13-week series for as little as \$50 an episode, while the bigger outlets in New York, Chicago, and Los Angeles paid \$400. This year the series is partly in color for the first time, and costs are doubled. Resistance to the series is apparent in some sections of the U.S. where the prevailing political opinion considers the United Nations an organization hostile to the best interests of the United States. This sentiment—or the fear of it by some station owners has helped to retard the series' wider distribution.

But the work goes on, with three or four teams in the field each year, filming stories under tough conditions in the world's underdeveloped areas. *International Zone* avoids the easy generalization. Says executive producer George Movshon, "We have found that some of our best films center on the work of one man, generally a man with his feet in the mud, who is doing a UN job somewhere in the developing world."

But while such documentary reports are important to telling the UN's story, there's scarcely anything more vivid or exciting than a crucial debate in the UN Security Council or General Assembly, and it is in those forums where the UN-TV team performs some of its best journalistic work. Such high-level confrontations, played out in a confined arena, are tailormade for TV's observant eye; as television becomes increasingly global in the years just ahead, this vigorous drama affecting us all will have the distribution it deserves. 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

THE DOAN REPORT

Movies Strong in First Ratings

CBS was the only network crowing much over the first fateful Nielsens of the new TV season. The ratings for the initial week in which all new shows were on the air (Sept. 11-17) ironically, however, only reconfirmed that the miniscreen's hottest come-on is old big-screen fare. The No. 1 and 2 "shows" were CBS's Friday and Thursday night movies; the fourth-ranking attraction (after Bonanza) was NBC's Saturday night movie, and in seventh place (after Family Affair and Gomer Pule) was NBC's Tuesday night flick. Rounding out the Top 10 were a hardy trio: Andy Griffith, Lucy and Bewitched. Everybody inside TV knew, though, that the movie nights won't be such big draws when less enticing pictures than "The Great Escape" and "What a Way to Go!" have to be played off, and the real significance of the new Nielsens lay in how the fresh TV series stacked up. Few professional TV watchers were surprised that The Flying Nun and The High Chaparral fared best, but they were confounded by the quick successes of the Jerry Lewis and Carol Burnett variety hours. Jerry even outpulled that master clown, Red Skelton. Carol made the Top 20 despite 40-odd CBS outlets (including Cleveland's) which considered her prospects so poor they did not even air the show. Other new series high on the Nielsen list were Mothers-in-Law, Gentle Ben and Kraft Music Hall.

Poor initial showings — an almost sure omen of short life — were suffered by such entries as Good Company, Accidental Family, Off to See the Wizard, Custer, Hondo, Maya and Guns of Will Sonnett.

CBS, with a heady 21.1 prime-time average rating to NBC's 19.2 and ABC's 15.4, also was showing its heels to the competition in the traditionally close evening-news race. Walter Cronkite led the new six-man Huntley-Brinkley Report, 14.2 to 11.6.

Sleepy-eyed Joey Bishop Show watchers could be forgiven if something seemed vaguely familiar about recent programs. Joey, along with most other unionized performers including newsmen, was sitting out a technicians' strike against ABC. The network was making do with nightly "Best of Joey" reruns. ABC officials postponed the debuts this week of two new daytime game shows, Temptation and How's Your Mother-in-Law (not to be confused with NBC's nighttime Mothers-in-Law) and said there were enough backlogged episodes of The General Hospital serial to last a few more days. Farmer's Daughter reruns were substituted this week for Dark Shadows. Going into the second week of the walkout, no union-management talks even were scheduled and ABC executives dug in for a long siege. The technicians had not yet struck NBC, which likewise had rejected their demands, but it was expected they might on the eve of NBC's preparations to telecast the World Series. Like ABC. NBC was prepared to throw its brass into the breach. -Richard K. Doan

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THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

MAN'S FAVORITE SPORT? (NBC), Saturday UNDER THE YUM YUM TREE (ABC), Sunday GIRLS! GIRLS! GIRLS! (NBC), Tuesday LOVE WITH THE PROPER STRANGER (ABC), Wednesday SPLENDOR IN THE GRASS (CBS), Thursday SPENCER'S MOUNTAIN (CBS), Friday

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

Hollywood at its ripest—in several senses of the word—is on display in the course of this week's movies, with only a couple of compensating moments on screen.

We can start at the bottom of the barrel with "Under the Yum Yum Tree" and "Spencer's Mountain." The first is an offensive blob of smut and suggestiveness on a 110-minute leer wherein Jack Lemmon, as a dirty, middle-aged sex fiend, manages to be completely revolting. That's not easy with competition coming from a nonhuman tomcat, assorted views of rumps and bosoms of sundry young females, and the burning and featurelength question of whether her fiancé or Lemmon will deflower Carol Lynley before fade-out time.

"Spencer's Mountain" is merely an insult to the novel on which this pointless package of piety and prurience is based, and to Wyoming, where it is set. The leitmotiv for the film is set early on when the folks gather around to watch a bull and heifer mate and Paw Henry Fonda, an inveterate non-churchgoer, makes friends with the new whisky-drinking minister. And from that point on, the folks spend most of their time either prayin' or plavin' around. As one of the nine kiddies on hand (playin' leads to propagatin', among just-folks) puts it: "Damn, damn, double-damn, tripledamn, hell"-and see if, let alone how, that sounds on your TV set!

Just-folks get patronized again in

"Love with the Proper Stranger," whose warm human comedy is blighted by its coldly calculated determination to be a warm human comedy. A pity, that, because the film boasts a fine performance by Steve McQueen, some nice bits of realism and some very good humor. But the synthetic schmaltz of the script (it sounds like a combined rewrite of "Marty" and *The Goldbergs*) smothers the film's several virtues.

Natalie Wood, on hand as the girl who finds true love via pregnancy, is also in "Splendor in the Grass," to portray, with Warren Beatty, the torments that can be brought about by sexual frustration and parental domination. When Miss Wood, author William Inge and director Elia Kazan keep things under control (Beatty manages best of all), there are some splendid moments that *almost* compensate for the spewing and writhing and super-Freudianisms.

Beyond that the silly takes over. There's the usual (it begins to feel almost like weekly) Presley flick, this one labeled "Girls! Girls! Girls!" and involving Elvis with a fishing boat and Stella Stevens as a sultry singer. And "Man's Favorite Sport?" never answers its own question clearly, leaving us to ponder whether it is fly-casting for trout or getting zippers caught in fishing gear or leaving sleeping bags lie. Best to leave the whole thing unsettled. But after spending a typical at-home session with the couple, nobody would come away saying that opposites don't attractand make for fun and fireworks at the same time. In fact, after leaving the Benjamins, one has the unnerving feeling that maybe, just maybe, he's really been to a matinee of "Hellzapoppin." Only Olsen never looked like Benjamin, who, dressed in well-pressed khakis, blue Oxford button-down and loafers, comes across like a Brooks Bros. casual-wear ad. And Prentiss certainly doesn't resemble Johnson. She's all lady, right from the cascading, chestnut-colored hair and warm, pool-deep brown eyes to her miniskirted lower level. But if all resemblance between the Benjamins and the zany comics ends with looks, it doesn't end with dialog.

Like so:

HE: "Paula's not exactly Julia Child in the kitchen. I like plain, solid food. Meat and potatoes. She makes a curry that'll burn your brains out. She puts parsley on everything too. Anything she serves looks like a lawn."

SHE: "Dick's tight. I mean *really* tight. He'll trudge around for hours to save a nickel on a flashlight. And driving into a parking space, he'll turn the motor off and *glide* in. Saves gas. Now that's *tight*."

HE: "Paula's overly generous. She can't help but overtip. I tried to give a cab driver a 15-cent tip once, and Paula wouldn't get out of the cab. She says if she overtips, the cab driver will love her for at least a block. And I got to wondering why certain people liked to make deliveries to the apartment. I found out she was tipping everybody a dollar—or more."

Mr. and Mrs. Wrong-for-Each-Other obviously end up in a spat now and then. Some great ones too, because, Dick says, "Paula's the emotional one," and Paula says, "Dick's so logical about everything. Even a fight. No one should be logical in a fight. It makes me furious."

Seems so. Says he: "We had this terrific fight in a hotel in Chicago. Paula came up with this great exit line, so, of course, she had to exit. Well, she exited right into a closet. I sat down and wondered how long it would take her to come out. I timed it. It took five minutes." Says she: "I felt like a bat in there."

Paula made up for it later, however.

continued

Says she: "Dick seldom drinks. But he went to a party after the theater one night and didn't get home until 7 A.M. I sat up all night figuring, what can I do to him, what can I do to him? He'd just gotten an entire new wardrobe and I knew how much it pained him to spend all that money. I took the clothes and threw them all out in the hallway. I was going to throw his mother's picture out too, but I knew he'd say, 'See. I knew you always hated my mother!'"

The Benjamins' early lives were just as dissimilar as their personalities.



Benjamin was born and brought up in New York, where his father worked in the garment district. "When I was a kid," Dick says, "we didn't have money to throw around, which is probably the reason I'm a bit stingy." In junior high Benjamin found he was good in math-so good, in fact, that a teacher talked him into becoming an engineer. "Dick's always had an extremely logical mind," his sister, Mrs. Linda Hirschson, says, "but he also had a flair for the theater." The theater won out, thanks to his parents. "They suggested I at least give it a try," Dick says, so he took up drama at Northwestern

Prentiss was born Paula Ragusa to an Italian family in San Antonio. Her father was a college professor. Paula's sister, Ann (who was in NBC's flop Captain Nice last year), remembers young Paula as being the "emotional one." Probably "because Dad," Ann goes on, "made a point of teaching her to appreciate everything in life, big or small. She became so responsive." It seemed only natural that the "emotional" Paula would get into acting. But she almost missed the boat. "I really took up acting while at Randolph-Macon Woman's College to supplement my other studies," Paula says. "It was a sensory-perception course. We had to be a tree or a banana or an animal. I loved it." Then, explaining her panic on stage at Northwestern that day, she says: "When I got to Northwestern, I'd never read a line."

The pair became a steady item while in school and, indeed, afterward. They weren't together much, however. They finished at Northwestern in 1960, but not before an MGM talent scout caught Paula in a show there and asked her to make a test. The test lead to "Where the Boys Are," fame of sorts, and money. But the money went fast, says sister Ann. "Paula's always been generous," she says, "and people took advantage of her. Someone would come up and say, 'My kid needs contact lenses,' and Paula would hand him the money."

However, Dick, in New York, didn't have much of a career or money to spare. He took a job in a flop musical and got fired to boot. "We were in Toronto," Jules Munshin, a friend and actor in the show, remembers, "and Dick told me his girl friend the movie star was coming to see him on her way to Europe to plug a picture. He was broke and didn't know what to do. I told him to go along as her boy friend. MGM wouldn't mind."

Not much they wouldn't—which was good in a way, because it got the Benjamins to the altar. Says Paula: "MGM said we couldn't even travel on the same plane if we weren't married." Figured the frugal Dick: "If we traded in our first-class tickets for tourist, we could tour around on the difference." But Paula adds: "We didn't want to be apart any longer."

Still there was a little matter of different religions, "Religion was no problem," Paula says. "My mother was glad somebody wanted me." Dick handled it thusly: "I called my parents and told them I was bringing an Italian friend home. I didn't tell them it was a girl. My mother answered the door and adjusted from that moment on." Few thought the match would last long. Savs actor-friend Tony Roberts: "They lived such a high existence. When they had a fight, they really had a fight. When they laughed, they really laughed. And they were so different. Many felt that, with that kind of tension they'd have to break up."

They haven't so far. And Paula

thinks she knows why. Says she: "We're the same age and we're looking for the same things. There's a sameness and a vast difference between us at the same time. And Dick has made me see things in myself I never appreciated before. Like the kookie things I do. He made me appreciate that they were part of me."

As for Benjamin, Tony Roberts says: "Dick has picked up from Paula a few things he needed. A slight flair for the far out, for instance." And although Ann Prentiss thinks Dick, thanks to Paula, isn't "quite as tight any more," Jules Munshin isn't sure. "In Chicago, once, I thought he might be loosening up," Munshin says. "We were having dinner with Myrna Loy and when the check came Dick picked it up. But he said, 'OK, that'll be \$4.33 for you, Myrna ..."

About the series. Says Benjamin: "We're doing it primarily because we need the strength of marquee value. Besides thinking it's a damn good show, we want to eliminate the situation where producers say, 'You're good, but we have to have a name.'"

One thing seems certain. No matter what happens with the on-the-air pair, life with the off-the-air Benjamins is bound to be a bit wild. As Benjamin tells it: "We were in the Louvre recently and Paula went to the ladies' room. In a minute she was back asking for a *libre*. I asked her why and she said, "To pay for the ladies room.' I didn't have the strength to say *libre* on the door meant free."

As Jules Munshin aptly caps it: "It's a great, crazy love affair."

Here's some hearty eating to go with fall football-watching—a delicious supper that simmers unattended and two great ways to use the leftovers.

NEW ENGLAND BOILED DINNER

Serves 6 with enough left over for hash or sandwiches

Put brisket in a large kettle with a lid. Add water to cover, bay leaves and peppercorns. Cover and simmer over low heat for 3 hours, or until meat is tender. (No need to watch; just let it cook slowly at the back of the range.) Add vegetables and simmer until vegetables are tender, 30 to 40 minutes. Remove brisket and cut into thin slices. Serve meat with vegetables. Serve mustard or horseradish.

RED-FLANNEL HASH

Serves 6

¼ cup butter or margarine
1 onion, chopped
2 cups chopped cooked corned beef

I beef 2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce Salt and pepper

Heat butter in a large skillet and sauté onion until golden. Add corned beef, beets and potatoes and Worcestershire sauce. Stir until mixture is hot. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Let cook over low heat without stirring, until bottom is brown and crusty. Fold over like an omelet and serve. (A Teflon pan is great for this recipe.)

OPEN-FACE CORNED BEEF SANDWICHES

6 sandwiches

Cooked corned beef 6 slices rye bread

2 cups well-seasoned white sauce ¼ cup white horseradish 1 tbsp. prepared mustard

2 cups chopped cooked beets

2 cups chopped cooked potatoes

Heat corned beef in simmering water. Cut into thin slices and place on rye bread. Combine remaining ingredients and heat until boiling. Spoon sauce over sandwiches. Serve with glasses of cold beer.

That's the Hollywood cry during pilot-making season

So you want to put on a television series. First thing is, you get an idea. You talk somebody into putting up the money for a pilot film. You get an actor to play the lead.

Then you hire Telly Savalas as guest star.


This last may be the most important part of all. The bald-pated actor appeared in the test films of two new fall series, *Cimarron Strip* on CBS and *Garrison's Gorillas* on ABC, and he has been in—and helped sell—TV pilots all the way back to the longgone *Grindl*.

That one premiere appearance concludes Telly's portion of the entertainment. After guest-starring impressively in that one episode, he is not seen again. In *Cimarron Strip* and *Garrison's Gorillas*, he was summarily killed off, and other actors carry on the series. These others may be competent, but you rarely hear them described in the glowing terms which producers reserve for Telly.

Selig J. Seligman, executive producer of *Garrison's Gorillas*, says, "The reason we picked Telly Savalas is that he has the rare ability to portray strength and yet to adapt himself to a particular personality. Any time I have a role that requires artistry and strength, I always think of Telly."

Leonard Freeman, who produced the pilot of *Cimarron Strip*, says, "Anything he's in is richer and better for having him. He is one of the potentially great character stars."

And David Susskind, who "discov-

ered" Telly a mere eight years ago, says of him, "He has a unique quality of power, animal strength and sexuality that combine to make a stunning actor."

Telly's impact is immediate-which is good when you're a TV producer trying to sell a series on the basis of one pilot film. In 1959 when, with absolutely no previous acting experience, he stepped into an Armstrong Circle Theatre, producer Susskind was so impressed that he urged him to continue acting, got him an agent and promptly cast him as Lucky Luciano in another series, The Witness. So good was he in this that Time magazine wrote him up and ran his photograph. Two years later his work in the movie "The Bird Man of Alcatraz" got him an Academy-Award nomination as best supporting actor.

His rise to prominence has been so quick and surprising that Telly himself has difficulty believing it. "I'm still afraid I'll be found out and have to go home," he says. And concerning his appearance with major stars, he



. . . Snap it up, the taxi's ignition is making funny lines on the screen.' adds, "I just can't get used to the fact that I'm working with them."

Telly was not the only one surprised at his sudden prominence. When the issue of Time containing his picture reached the American Embassy in New Delhi, India, the ambassador called in Telly's brother, Constantine, who is a career man in the State Department, and said, "I didn't know your brother was an actor." The brother said, "Neither did I."

There are four Savalas brothers, all with resounding Greek names— Constantine Socrates, George Demosthenes, Theodore Praxiteles, and Aristotle (Telly is short for Aristoteles). There is also a sister, less grandly named Katherine. Not surprisingly the children of Greek parents, they were born in Garden City, Long Island—Telly, second of the five, on Jan. 21, 1924. Despite the fact that she had five children, Telly's mother, Christina, was Miss Greece at the New York World's Fair in 1939.

Like his brother Constantine—more familiarly known as Gus—Telly was once in the State Department. There he had the impressive title of Executive Producer of the English Language Transmission of the Near East, South Asia and African Area. This followed wartime service in G-2, which he does not like to talk about, and a premed course and graduate work in psychology at Columbia University.

After the State Department assignment, he joined ABC's New York City station, where he created, wrote and produced a radio program called "Your Voice of America," which won a Freedoms Foundation Award. He is still a staunch advocate of carrying the message of America to other parts of the world. "That's why I like working in feature pictures," he says. "I get to travel, so I'm able to continue my old work in a minimal way."

After three years with WABC, he left in 1956 to become director of the



Stamford (Conn.) Playhouse. An artistic success, this was a financial disaster, and Telly returned home to Garden City. He began teaching adulteducation classes and, harking back to his training in psychology, working with disturbed children. Although he found satisfaction in his work, this was the low point of his life. "Telly had always been a success," he says,



"but now he was a failure."

It was his adult-education classes, however, which led to his becoming a successful actor. Casting directors in New York began to call upon him when they needed people for foreignspeaking roles. When he was unable to locate the man he was looking for to play a part in an Armstrong Circle Theatre in 1959, he went to explain and apologize to the casting director —and ended up playing the part himself. The rest, as they say, is history.

When asked what he would have done if he had not become an actor and had continued as he was going, he says—only half jokingly—"I would have killed myself."

Today, although he says that "acting will never be enough to satisfy me," he seems to enjoy its obvious advantages—the money, which is good; a choice of strong roles in features and television; and a comfortable home, decorated with his mother's paintings. He also seems to enjoy such fringe benefits as the instant recognition he receives when he enters that mecca of moviedom, Schwab's drug store on the Sunset Strip.

Telly and his wife Marilyn live in Woodland Hills in the San Fernando Valley with their three daughters-Christina, 15, Penelope, 5, and Candace, 4. Mrs. Savalas looks very little older than Christina; once, when Telly took her to Marineland, she was given a child's ticket. He says, "I'm ugly, but she thinks I have sex appeal." A few years ago he turned down a part in the motion picture "Taras Bulba," because Marilyn was pregnant, he wanted to be near her, and the picture was to be shot in South America. "But it's a \$6,000,000 production!" he was told. Said Telly, "I have a \$6,000,000 wife at home."

They just don't talk that way in Hollywood; but then, of course, there aren't many Telly Savalases in Hollywood. Or any place else for that matter.

In a small, crowded TV studio in Chicago, a little machine chatters suddenly and spews out a thin strip of pink tape. It says:

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The chart shown below is flashed on the screen.

A commentator with a tired facehe's been talking for a long, long time—steps in front of the camera. He says: "A number of good reports kept the average on the up side. There was, however, some profit-taking toward the bell."

There are comparatively few people in America who understand this peculiar language. It's stock marketese—used on a new kind of daily show that is beamed at this linguistic minority and is making its appearance on UHF stations.

The show, *The Stock Market Observ*er, is six and a half solid hours of market statistics, spiked with economic reports by Dow Jones & Co.,

publishers of the Wall Street Journal. It's a creation of Scantlin Electronics. Inc., makers of data-processing machines used in brokerage offices. Scantlin supplies both machines and data for the show.

The S.M.O. was inaugurated in Chicago recently on channel WCIUa little UHF station tucked away on the 41st floor of the Board of Trade Building. The marathon talker, who comments from 9 to 3:30 daily, amid the avalanche of numbers, is one Ben Larson, former news director of CBS Radio in Chicago. "We get our data from the world's largest computer devoted to financial information." he reports with gusto. "This gives us minute-by-minute alterations on the stock exchange, and they flash right on our board. If you watch this show, you'll have more information about what's going on in the market than if you are standing on the floor of the stock exchange. We're getting information they don't have."

Who, we ask politely, will watch this outpouring of technical financial information?

Ben Larson grins. "We're shooting for as big an audience as we can get. We also have regular news, sports, time and weather bulletins. But primarily it's aimed at the business community and at stockholders. In Chicago alone there are more than a million people who own stocks and are investors in American industry." And Mr. Larson adds with pride: "This is a real break-through in daytime communications. What's more, we think it's going to make money."

hour UHF show in unbreakable code make money?

"Oh, there's a real profit potential here," chuckles George Levine, a vice president of Scantlin. "We're delivering a vertical but affluent audience. Thirty percent of our audience is businessmen. They can buy a business machine, little TV sets for their offices, cars and so on. Sixty percent are women who own stocks. People like Tiffany's and Cadillac can sell directly to them. There are a lot of sponsors who want a highly affluent audience"

So there you have it-a nice selfcontained little operation, with a "profit potential" for both Scantlin and the stations which lease the machines and data. For sponsors seeking a captive audience of the rich, it's a heavensent project. For those in the audience who can break the code, it provides immensely valuable information.

As of its inauguration on WCIU, it's a success: Chicagoans who can understand the show are delighted. "The phones have been going off the walls!" happily reports Gus Chan, assistant manager of WCIU.

Scantlin will shortly be launching the same show in Dallas. Houston, Detroit, Boston, Philadelphia and Los Angeles, and predicts that this will turn gradually into "a little network." 
