Now that his Fugitive has stopped running, producer OUINN MARTIN is making a new series, Mack, an hour-long detective story for ABC . . . SUSAN OLIVER plays a surf queen in the first episode of producer ROY HUGGINS' latest series, The Outsider, another cops-and-robbers saga for NBC. It'll go on next year . . . Producer BARNEY ROSENZWEIG hired star FESS PARKER to direct a segment of Daniel Boone.

Folk singers ROD MCKUEN and GLENN YARBROUGH compose and perform the music for NBC's special on JOHN STEINBECK's book "Travels with Charley," which will be telecast in the spring . . . PETER USTINOV speaks for "Babar," the animated elephant of storybook fame, who lopes across NBC's screen for a spring special.

RICHARD BASEHART interrupts his Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea this winter long enough to do "Cyrano de Bergerac" at New York's Lincoln Center . . . GARY CROSBY plays a cavalry sergeant on the run from a murder charge in a Hondo . . . STEPHEN BROOKS, ex-FBI-agent partner of EFREM ZIMBALIST Jr., is taking a late season Star Trek.

JUDY CARNE (Love on a Rooftop) plays a newspaper photographer in a Man from U.N.C.L.E. segment which has DAVID McCALLUM playing two roles, one a Nazi spy. GEORGE MACREADY leaves Peyton Place temporarily for a part in the same episode . . . BOB CULP (I Spy) narrates NBC's American Profile special on the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C., Nov. 17.

On Nov. 30 DON RICKLES takes over part of a DEAN MARTIN show to insult more than 25 celebrity guests--stars like BOB HOPE, LENA HORNE, DANNY THOMAS, BOB NEWHART, PAT BOONE, BARBARA EDEN and RICARDO MON-TALBAN . . . DICK CLARK's production company sold ABC Happening '68, a half-hour youth variety-and-information show, for a January start.

• We have yet to meet anyone who opposes televised debates between candidates for President.

The last-and only-time such debates were held, the entire Nation watched fascinated as John F. Kennedy and Richard M. Nixon presented their positions on the major issues. Some say the debates swaved enough voters to win the close election for Kennedy. Others insist he would have won anyway. But all agree the debates were a valuable service to voters, a welcome change from the usual political use of television, which results in Democrats tuning to Democratic candidates. Republicans to Republican candidates, and independent voters getting no opportunity to make a direct judgment of the candidates and their policies.

By now most readers know of Section 315 of the Communications Act and how in effect it precludes broadcast debates between major party candidates. In 1960 Section 315 was temporarily suspended for the Kennedy-Nixon debates. But in 1964 Congress and the incumbent President refused to suspend Section 315. They denied voters in that campaign a chance to see and hear the major party candidates debate the issues.

• Unless the President and Congress do an about-face, the same will hold in 1968. Both parties will spend tens of millions of dollars on TV time, money collected in large part from private sources with special interests, or from all taxpayers if a bill infusing Federal funds into political campaigns is passed by Congress. Both parties will be unable to take advantage of the free time the television industry again would willingly contribute if Section 315 were suspended.

We urge voters, and the press, to insist that Section 315 be suspended permanently.



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

The Second Hundred Years

This show is cool-in fact it is frozen solid. The idea is that back in 1900, before there was any TV or any TV criticism, Luke Carpenter (Monte Markham) bade his wife and infant son farewell and went off to Alaska to look for gold. Along came a glacier -well, nothing in TV moves fastand, before you could turn it off, he was in the deep freeze. In fact, he was on ice for 67 years. Whereupon along came an avalanche, and before you could say cool it, he was all thawed out and ready to serve. Good as new-indeed, better than new because, despite the fact that Luke is chronologically 101, actually he is still only 33. And since his son Edwin (Arthur O'Connell) is 67, you obviously are going to have the granddaddy of all father-son conflicts. Also, since Luke's grandson, Ken, is 33 too and is also played by Monte Markham, you can see that The Second Hundred Years ought to be, like the glacier and the avalanche, all downhill for the men who concoct its plots.

Executive producer Harry (The Flying Nun) Ackerman and producer Bob Claver clearly hoped that there would be a large amount of humor in Luke's unfamiliarity with the modern world and that there would be great appeal in Luke's old-fashioned rugged individualism vis-à-vis today's welfare (or farewell) state. "We think," producer Claver said, "the series will have a particular appeal for the guy —and woman—who, on making it through another eight-hour day of colliding with the establishment, gets home, kicks off his shoes, turns on the TV and enjoys seeing someone like Luke as his proxy in his fight against the world."

If they had only left it at that, the proxy might well have approximated what they hoped. The trouble was, they felt they could ensure the merriment of all by adding to Gimmick No. (the guy 101) Gimmick No. 2 1 (having Luke and Ken also look alike and having both acted by the same man). This frankly becomes a bore. Mr. Markham does a fine job at the very different impersonations of the cool, lusty Luke and the square, proper Ken, but when the episodes depend on this mistaken-identity twist, they have nowhere near the impact of those involving a straight Gimmick No. 1. The very opening episode, for example, was wonderful -when Edwin (well played by Mr. O'Connell) becomes teary-eyed at the very thought of dear old dad coming back and being a kind of Government reissue. Best of all was the moment when Luke turns on his television set by mistake, gets a Western and hears "Reach for the sky!" Quick as a flash, Luke shoots. "By golly," he exclaims, "there's a midget in that box."

Yes there is, Luke. There are lots of them. And, unfortunately, they're not just in that box. There are lots of them *behind* the scenes too.

With hope and trepidation,

Friendlyvision, live and in color, goes Coast-to-Coast this Sunday (Nov. 5).

But the man who had such a prominent role in bringing it to pass insists he hopes the name won't last, even facetiously. Says Fred W. Friendly, the ex-CBS News chief, now the Ford Foundation's TV consultant: "If it flops, let them call it Friendlyvision. If it succeeds, I hope they'll call it Public Television."

It will have plenty of chances to do both. For at least two hours every Sunday night beginning at 8:30 (ET), over a network of 119 of the Nation's educational TV stations covering every major U.S. city except Baltimore and Indianapolis (still without ETV outlets), the Ford Foundation-financed Public Broadcast Laboratory of National Educational Television will try just about everything its producers can think of that will demonstrate what Public Television ought to be.

Friendly's hand-picked boss of the project, 38-year-old Av (short for Avram) Westin, who was executive producer of election coverage under Friendly at CBS News, says the weekly telecasts will be so flexible that "No two will be precisely alike." He is wont to characterize the program, *PBL*, loosely as a news-and-opinion magazine-of-the-air, but then he points out somewhat contrarily that "at least" four Sunday nights will be "total drama." Events of the preceding week, it seems, generally will tend to dictate content of the show. Sometimes, he expects, final decision as to "what we will run with" will not be reached until Sunday morning.

This only does Westin specifically promise: "In the first four weeks we will demonstrate how we expect to play the game. We may try out four entirely different things."

Friendly, Westin & Co. are somewhat on the horns of a dilemma: They do not want to appear to strive for broad mass appeal, à la commercial TV, and must perforce adopt the stance that since they are not interested in ratings they can afford. if they so choose, sometimes to devote their attention to a subject palpably interesting to 50,000 people, a trifling handful in terms of national audience. On the other hand, PBL's producers realize it would be helpful to the cause of Public Television if they could create excitement at the very outset. If they fail to, the undertaking -ratings, sponsors or no-could be quickly dismissed as a dud. In short, they've got to come on like Gangbusters and seem nonchalant about it.

Friendly says he fears overanticipation: "I'm worried everybody is going to expect too much," he confides. "It won't be that good. It never is. See It Now [the famous TV series he and the late Ed Murrow started] wasn't born great. It would be wrong for viewers to turn away from this program after one or two weeks because they were disappointed. *PBL* has got to be ready to *fail* sometimes. It may even not hit its stride until the second year."

McGeorge Bundy, the Ford Foundation president who is determined to see Public TV given a fair trial, is prepared to "see no miracle in the first 13 weeks" of the experiment, Friendly stressed.

Bundy's objective for the highminded demonstration of PTV was spelled out initially as to "pull together the intellectual and cultural resources of this country to speak directly, once a week, to the great issues of the day in every field of action."

The focus appears since then to have been widened. By last summer Westin was depicting the prospective shows as offering "everything from Harper's to Playboy—without the latter's centerfold, of course." Broadly, he said, the telecasts were going to mean "something on television again for people to talk about on Monday mornings." Entertainment entered the picture. By September he was saying the Sunday night affairs would "bring back live television . . . and we may even bring back live drama."

At the same time Westin implied that the première outing almost certainly would deal in depth with "one of the two watershed issues of our time—Vietnam and race relations." "After all," he noted, "we're beginning this program a year to the day before the 1968 elections and our mandate really is laid down for us. We've got to concentrate on the major issues facing the country in this \rightarrow

election year."

Friendly, meanwhile, tried to picture the undertaking as an attempt at "raw-boned confrontation" of modern-day life as contrasted with the "slick, sophisticated kind of job" the commercial networks do in actuality programming.

"The most important thing it's got to prove," he summed up, "is how vital interconnection [networking] is and how you can't have effective public television without it. With it," he continued, "you can create a community event across the country and make the country one community!"

The hopes for *PBL*, in short, are both extravagant and hedged. And there appeared to be some conscious intention not only of staying flexible to cope with late developments, but to withhold details in hopes of building suspense, which is, of course, a legitimate show-business technique.

This much was known several weeks in advance of the first telecast:

PBL has the astute guidance not only of Friendly and Bundy, but of a distinguished "editorial policy" board headed by Dean Edward W. Barrett of Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism. Among the members: William P. Rogers, former Attorney General; U.S. Norman Cousins, editor of the Saturday Review; William Gordon Bowen, provost of Princeton University, and John F. White, president of NET. The board's directive, as White puts it, is "to advise and react; never to censor." It will convene every Wednesday to review PBL's plans.

The programs will be the product of a highly professional staff of about 60 producers, editors and reporters, some recruited from such publications as Newsweek, Look and the New York Times.

The most familiar regular personality on camera will be veteran Washington commentator Edward P. Morgan, who took a two-year sabbatical from ABC to join the experimental project as "senior correspondent." He is berthed in Washington with a newsproduction unit of his own. Why did he leave a comfortable spot for this venture? "I found the idea of cutting new timber exciting as hell," he says. "It was sort of a dare. I just hope we don't fall on our face."

The noted print pundit Walter Lippmann will put in occasional appearances, probably in conversation with students or "others he normally wouldn't meet," as Westin put it.

Groucho Marx has been enlisted to attempt occasional political satire, possibly right in Washington.

Unlike conventional public-affairs programs, the *PBL* telecasts will have no anchor man. "It'll be a repertory company," Westin explains. "We'll have featured players and spear carriers." The program will be the star, he suggests.

There will be no attempt to round up or summarize the week's news.

"Somewhere in the first three programs," Westin promises, viewers can expect "consumer reports done with the slickness of TV commercials."

There may be attempts at instant public-opinion polls.

PBL's cultural explorations are being directed by Lewis Freedman, the project's deputy director and a longtime producer of television dramas for such series as *Play of the Week* and *DuPont Show of the Week*. "We'll make plays where we feel drama can deliver an acute statement about American life," he promises. "Other times we'll present existing works produced by groups like the Tyrone Guthrie Theater or the Washington Arena Stage." Name stars will be sought.

On occasion *PBL* will "travel the show," originating it from some point outside the NBC Rockefeller Plaza studio from which it usually will emanate. There will be live pickups from ETV stations at the scene of stories being covered. "Every station will be a news bureau," Westin proclaims. "We'll have 121 bureaus." (Besides the 119 outlets on the line, where costs would be prohibitive, a few stations will carry the programs on a taped, delayed basis.)

Each telecast will open with: "This is an experiment in Public Television, produced by the Public Broadcast Laboratory, combining elements of information, education and entertainment." Each will close with shared credit: "Produced by the staffs of the noncommercial television stations in your area, with the assistance of the Public Broadcast Laboratory."

PBL will give sudden impetus to weekend programming on the country's noncommercial stations. Last season only 35 of them were lighted up on Sunday nights. Friendly and Westin hope most stations will bracket the network show with local programs related on occasion to subjects of the national telecast.

The commercial-TV people vow they wish the PBL experiment all the best. "I hope it works," Richard Salant, Friendly's successor at CBS News, swears. "It'll be a great thing for all of us. The PBL bunch are full of beans and we'll learn from them."

"Whatever they do, I'm for it," ABC News president Elmer Lower commented. "I think they may goad commercial TV into doing more [of the sort of thing they're undertaking]."

Since the ratings surveys normally report only on sponsored programming, and audience figures probably will not be available on how many people watched the *PBL* programs, how will those concerned get a reading on how they are doing? "The same way you know whether it's a beautiful day," Friendly says. "We'll just feel it in our bones!"





"All you need is love . . . All you need is love . . . All you need is love."*

Love—quite an issue in this our age of flower power, love-ins and "Make Love, Not War" buttons. So when Andy Williams decided to do a special (NBC, Nov. 6), he agreed to use love, flowers, beauty and youth today as its theme. On a gigantic set, costing nearly \$57,000, he assembled a small army of musicians comprising all sorts of ethnic styles (all authentic) ranging from flamenco, through Japanese and Country & Western right on to rock. Jazz will be supplied by Henry Mancini's orchestra and the Erroll Garner Trio. In all, there are as many as 109 people on camera at once, including Claudine Longet (Mrs. Williams), but not including 100 young people used as a "happening" background. And how does one get this many people to work so well together? "Love is all you need."*

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All because of a 5-foot-4 swinger, Yvonne Craig

"B atbroad!" an assistant director yelps. Batbroad? Holy irreverence! Is this a way to talk to the newest crimefighter in Gotham City? "Ready to go, Batbroad?" the man repeats. The luscious brunette named Yvonne Craig nods. She flicks a vagrant hair under her cowl, adjusts her mask, sets her cape in place and draws a deep breath. The camera whirs and Batgirl —for Miss Craig is, of course, none other—leaps foursquare into the fray.

Crunch! Zowie! Men with hearts of evil scatter like bowling pins as Batgirl kicks, whirls and slashes, crumbling the last of the foursome with a savage mock judo chop. Batman himself—bite your tongue as you say it could have dispatched the blackguards no more efficiently. As meticulously choreographed as a rumble in "West Side Story," as stylized as "Swan Lake," the scene is thus set down on a back lot at 20th Century-Fox.

But why a Batgirl in the first place? Can the Dynamic Duo be slipping that they need a mere girl for help? "Look," says *Batman* producer Howie Horwitz. "I don't like to mess with success, but we think adding a Batgirl freshens up the show. We figure we've already got the kids, boys and girls, up to 8. But girls over 8 need someone, a big girl, to identify with. So we give them Batgirl." He smiles. "I rather think," says Horwitz, "the big boys will like to watch her, too."

How true. As Batgirl, who is really Commissioner Gordon's prim librarian daughter when she isn't out belting heads, Miss Craig wears her own feminine version of the Batman garb. It's an eye-boggler, composed of a rubberized purple material, and it is tight-fitting where it is most effective on a healthy girl.

With her other assets, Yvonne Craig has an enticing little walk—"the ballet dancer's duck waddle," she calls it —and she moves with uncommon grace and fluidity. She strolls back to her trailer dressing room, all painted a kind of psychedelic orange, where she's greeted by a feisty Yorkshire named Sebastian.

Petite, standing 5-feet-4, Yvonne has a smiler's teeth, a Mary Tyler Moore nose, myopic green eyes, an insinuating voice, an ample figure for lowcut dresses—which she favors—and a superabundance of energy. She seems surfacely casual, a model of selfsufficiency, but she was hit by an ulcer at 18 and she still gratifies some hidden impulse by biting her nails. Overall, she's a bright, uninhibited talker with a flair for the flip, quotable phrase. Mention a random topic and Yvonne will issue an unhesitating response, as follows:

ON ACTORS: "As men, they have holes in their psyches. Off the set they can be very manly, but put them near \rightarrow

a camera and they get devious and 'female.' They're constantly hollering for makeup or a hairdresser and they complain much more than any actress."

ON SEX: "In this country, everybody thinks everybody else is a swinger and nobody really is. There's an awful lot of talk for the little action that goes on."

ON WOMEN: "We have to be realistic about life so that our men can be stable. There's not a woman alive who isn't always testing men to see how much we can get away with."

ON HOLLYWOOD: "A town of misfits and impermanence, with a dull, unvarying climate, and houses that look like Standard Oil stations."

ON MARRIAGE: "It's not the answer. Man is simply not a marriageable animal. I'm hanging around waiting for a better way that'll work. If the gears mesh with a man and a woman, marriage isn't really necessary." Possibly her views on marriage are tempered by her own abbreviated stab at the institution. In 1960, after a brief courtship, Yvonne married Jimmy Boyd, the singer-actor known for his recording of "I Saw Mommy Kissing Santa Claus." The union ended in divorce two years later.

Says Yvonne: "Actually I married my playmate. We were too young. I wanted to prove it could be done, the marriage, homemaking and career. It couldn't. Not with me, not then." For the last two years, Yvonne has had a warm, close friendship with another actor, Bill Bixby, once of My Favorite Martian. Before that, for three and a half years, Yvonne and humorist Mort Sahl were a consistent twosome. "Mort was an experience, a happening, a stimulating man but so concerned with his mission in life," says Yvonne with apparent if rueful warmth. "As I once told Mort, at my most depressed I'm at the same

emotional level as he is at his happiest." A similarly bittersweet reaction comes from Sahl. "Yvonne," he says, "has something I've never encountered before in a woman-wit. She could keep pace with Adlai Stevenson and. in fact, she did, when the three of us had lunch at the UN. She's politically astute, which makes her rare in this town. She's also a very secret person. She only gives about eight percent of herself. The rest she keeps in the Federal Reserve somewhere. Yvonne, finally, is the most feminine, unaggressive girl I've ever known." Unaggressive. A key word. "I'm very noncompetitive," Yvonne says, "Nobody will play cards or chess or tennis with me because I just don't care about winning. I only want to win at what I really want. Like ballet or acting, where you don't have to beat anybody. You only have to be better today than you were yesterday."

Another key word-ballet. At 14, living in Dallas, Yvonne discovered ballet, its rigors and satisfactions. (She's in her mid-20's now, of Welsh antecedents. Born in Taylorville, Ill., eldest daughter of Maurice and Pauline Craig-her father is a tool-anddie maker, her mother a departmentstore buyer.) Showing inborn talent to go with her dream of being a ballerina. Yvonne became the protégé of Alexandra Danilova of the Ballet Russe, who established a scholarship fund enabling the youngster to study with George Balanchine in New York. Later, she auditioned for the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo, was accepted and told to' report the following season.

She was now all of 16. After signing the contract, she returned to Dallas to complete her high school education. For three straight years, however, she had failed in physical education. "I kept refusing to get dressed for gym," she recalls. "I just wouldn't wear those bloomers, which were droopy in the seat. Principle or vanity, I was stubborn all the way. Without gym credits you couldn't graduate. I didn't graduate." She breezed on to New York, thereafter touring with the Ballet Russe for three years. "Ballet," says Yvonne, "is the most masochistic pleasure you can have. I had the time of my life with the Ballet and, best of all. I knew it while it was happening. The other side is the sleeping in the buses, the total exhaustion and then the disenchantment." She quit the Ballet Russe to resume her dancing studies in Los Angeles. In a Hollywood restaurant one night, she was spotted by a movie director, Jerry Hopper, and promptly won a featured role in a picture, "The Young Land."

Other roles followed, movies and TV, about 30 in all, including Kildares, Ben Caseys, Sam Benedicts and UNCLEs. Her credits embrace a spate of Dobie Gillis episodes. from which she still retains her favorite expletive: "Rats and mice!" Despite her lack of a high school diploma, she has attended classes at UCLA, majoring in Russian. "Yvonne," says Mort Sahl, "is the only actress I know who waits for a director's call on the set by reading Bernard Malamud." "I'd rather be well-read than well-degreed, anyway," she says.

Noncompetitive she may be, but a wry ambition still burns within her. "Rats and mice!" Yvonne cried one afternoon at a restaurant across the street from the studio where Batman is filmed. "How I wish I could be as good as Brando in 'One-Eyed Jacks' or Peter O'Toole in 'Lawrence of Arabia.' Once, in New York, I saw the Burtons, Richard and Elizabeth, getting into a cab after the People were screaming, theater. waving autograph books. The police had to hold back the crowd. Wow, I thought to myself. That's what I want someday-to be trampled in the street by avid fans." END

THIS WEEK'S MOVIES

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

This is a week for looking back, early though it is in the season, and being grateful for the goodies that have already come our way. Certainly the tailored-for-television folk set us —and themselves—a high standard with last week's "Stranger on the Run," an excellently cast, beautifully paced melodrama replete with social and psychological significance and outstanding performances by Henry Fonda, Dan Duryea and Michael Parks.

This week's schedule has little to offer even for comparison. Alfred Hitchcock's "Marnie," for instance, is a run-of-the-mill venture into surface psychiatry (the case of the frigid kleptomaniac) unworthy of the master. Sean Connery and Tippi Hedren try to be Cary Grant and Grace Kelly, but, as Miss Hedren herself puts it, they wind up being "You Freud me Jane." The film is just tolerable.

Another film to tolerate is Luchino Visconti's "The Leopard," based on the fine novel by Giuseppe di Lampedusa. The color and scenery and evocations of mid-19th-century Sicily are beautiful but the film itself is a tedious, disjointed series of scenes and performances. It fails either as an epic view of history, a consideration of social change or a character study. Chances are it may emerge in slightly more satisfactory terms on television, with time strictures to eliminate the rambling effect, and the small screen to make the dubbing (of every voice except Burt Lancaster's) more palatable. Perhaps. But at very least you will see some beautiful settings.

The rest don't even offer visual consolation. There are some laughs, not all of them intended. With "Where Love Has Gone," in fact, it's hard to decide whether to laugh or gag at the combination of sex and soap that results in movies based on Harold Robbins novels. But you can at least smile at the way Bette Davis and Susan Hayward, as a ruthless tycooness and her neurotic offspring, chew up the script and spew it out.

"Bedtime Story" epitomizes that blend of tickle-and-tease schmaltz and hint-and-run vulgarity Hollywood mislabels "sophisticated comedy." It's an aptly titled soporific for those interested in the comedy aspects of mental retardation and psychosomatic paralysis. David Niven's talents for suave farce are throttled; Marlon Brando, at his chubbiest herein, gives no hint of having any such talents, although he does well in one sequence posing as a repulsive half-wit.

"The 7th Dawn" is just another installment in the backward child's version of the post-colonial crisis in Asia, an interminable *mélange* of political, racial and romantic clichés, with performances and dialog as overripe as the jungle setting. It's almost enough to make you settle for "Palm Springs Weekend," one of those youth whoop-de-doo-on-the-beachand-pool frenzies. Well, almost, after all, Troy Donahue does sing in this one.

TV Challenged on Movie-Making

CBS recently bought the old Republic movie lot in Hollywood and corralled Doris Day and Jack Lemmon. ABC has a movie-producing subsidiary about to shoot a picture in Mexico with Sean Connery and Brigitte Bardot. Such ambitious plans as these have so alarmed Hollywood's major film studios that they have appealed to the U.S. Justice Department to look into the possible antitrust aspects of TV networks being both producers and exhibitors. Networks privately profess unconcern. "It's a huge smoke screen," one of them scoffed. "The studios aren't turning out enough pictures to meet our needs and are just trying to keep prices up." The prices are hurting: Each showing of an old flick in prime time now costs the networks about \$400,000.

A new daytime show developed jointly by NBC and TV's biggest advertiser, Proctor & Gamble, will turn up not on NBC, but on ABC. Called The Baby Game, it will feature toddlers being tempted with a variety of lures (rattles, etc.) and motherly contestants guessing which items the tykes will go for. NBC and P&G had second thoughts, but ABC feels the gimmick is worth a whirl. It probably will be introduced in January replacing Dream Girl, an afternoon beauty contest. But the infant-watching derby is likely to be retitled. "It might be in bad taste," an ABC exec mused, "Having Baby Game immediately following the Newlywed Game."

ABC rather than filling out its theatrical movie schedule with madefor-TV movies, has been experimenting with dramas-so far successfully. David Susskind's "Johnny Belinda" starring Mia Farrow outrated all of its Sunday night competition, including Bonanza, in the New York Nielsens, the only survey immediately available. In fact, "Belinda" topped the average of the six prime-time movies shown the preceding week. Further tests for such taped dramas are impending: "Dial 'M' for Murder" on Nov. 15, "Diary of Anne Frank" on Nov. 26.

Pseudo-commercials, stingingly kidding TV's sales pitches for such items as aspirin and long cigaretes, will be sprinkled through those two-hour Sunday night *PBL* telecasts on 120 of the nation's educational stations beginning this weekend (Nov. 5). The anti-plugs will be designed to promote more truth in advertising, according to producers of the Ford Foundationfinanced program. As word of the gambit filtered through Madison Avenue, one giant drug company was reported angrily planning to demand equal time.

President Johnson was rumored last week to be thinking of flying to Denver to sign the public TV bill in the presence of the Nation's educational broadcasters in convention there this week.



STUART WHITMAN'S 'MARSHAL PLAN'

He's counting on 'Cimarron Strip' to end his string of Hollywood disappointments

The marshal wore bell-bottomed Mexican trousers adorned with four silver buttons at each ankle. The flaring sleeves of his blue cotton shirt were rolled back at the cuffs. A thin band of sterling, which twinkled in the klieg lights, circled the crown of his jaunty Stetson. The five-pointed star on his cowhide vest, the bonehandled Colt .44 on his hip and the glare of his steely gray eyes exuded formidability.

"We ain't got much law around here," the marshal bellowed to a crowd of milling extras gathered at CBS Studio Center in North Hollywood. "But what law we have, we're gonna follow."

That emphatic proclamation made it official. Stuart Maxwell Whitman had joined the crowded cadre of celluloid sheriffs, signing up as the star of *Cimarron Strip*, the most costly CBS network show this season. A lucrative one-third partnership in the weekly, 90-minute production had helped the veteran of two dozen motion pictures end his lengthy television series holdout.

He had teamed with Philip Leacock, former executive producer of the durable *Gunsmoke*. Not even the painful clichés bogging the early scripts nor criticism of the numerous resemblances between *Cimarron* and *Gunsmoke* could dampen his ardor.

"My character has got more range than what we've seen in the past," insisted Whitman, whose Jim Crown

patrols 1000 square miles in the vast Kansas borderland rather than Dodge City and suburbs. "Jim Arness limits himself to kissing a girl or getting wounded. Crown has no limitations. He is a policeman with a heart, a Western hero who hasn't been seen for a long time. I hope to live with him for many years."

Any length of tenure would be a welcome conclusion to the disappointments Whitman has endured during 15 years in Hollywood, a series of frustrations which would have disillusioned someone less optimistic.


He never came close to fulfilling the early prophecies of studio publicists who touted him as "the next Gable." Gossip columnists long ago curbed their gushing descriptions of his long eyelashes and rugged good looks. Producers rarely offered him first crack at the roles he coveted, realizing his questionable impact at the box office.

Major studios overlooked Whitman, it seemed, until they had difficulties with recalcitrant top-echelon stars. When Charlton Heston bowed out of "Darby's Rangers," Whitman bowed in. He substituted for Stephen Boyd in "The Story of Ruth," Robert Wagner in "The Sound and the Fury" and David Janssen in "An American Dream." If being No. 2 bothered Whitman, he carefully concealed it. Like Avis, he just tried harder.

In 1965, disgruntled George Peppard fled from the remote location of "Sands of the Kalahari," after just two days of shooting. Producer Joseph E. Levine, desperate for a replacement, promised Whitman \$150,000 plus two additional films following "Kalahari."

Whitman rushed to Swakamond in Southwest Africa and learned Peppard's lines within 48 hours. The handshake deal with Levine was incentive enough for him to endure a thankless three weeks of wrestling with baboons and sustaining numerous simian bites and scratches. "Kalahari" was a financial debacle, Whitman observes, and adds that Levine did not employ him in any more movies. This left Whitman quite bitter about the whole experience and he doesn't hesitate to tell his opinion of Levine to anyone who will listen.

Only once did a last-minute substitution work to more than his fi-



nancial advantage. He inherited the leading role in "The Mark" from Richard Burton and won an Academy Award nomination in 1961. "Even at that time," Whitman confesses, "I wasn't sure I was in the right profession." Skeptics correlated his nomination with the \$3000 he paid for a concentrated trade-paper advertising campaign designed to bring him such an accolade.

Oscar nominations normally result in increased employment for the recipients. Whitman, however, remained saddled under a binding 20th Century-Fox contract which relegated him to relatively undistinguished properties.

He spent six or more months in each of the five years prior to 1965 shooting such films in France, England, Ireland and Italy. These frequent separations from his wife and four children, accompanied by rumors linking him with other women, led to the deterioration of his 15-year marriage.

Patricia LaLonde Whitman, a redheaded model he had met on Muscle Beach when she was 17, ultimately filed for divorce. Little over a year later, in 1966, she married the attorney who handled her case. Whitman consoled himself with the termination of his \$1200 monthly alimony payments.

Meanwhile, a number of his business investments had soured. Whitman and his father, a local land developer, contracted to move 350,000 yards of earth and convert a portion of the 250 acres they owned north of Beverly Hills into a subdivision. Financial setbacks forced them to forfeit half their acreage and 26 pieces of heavy construction equipment. Included in this loss was a \$5800 bulldozer Whitman had profitably operated for years in between acting jobs.

Whitman's off-screen life seemed on the upsurge last year following his marriage to Caroline Boubis, the daughter of a wealthy French industrialist. They moved into a remodeled, 48-year-old wooden shack located on his remaining acreage. On warm nights, he and his wife slept outside their primitive dwelling in his-and-her hammocks. He con- \rightarrow

structed an outdoor shower and a sauna bath to increase her creature comforts.

This serene relationship soon became strained, when a gopher snake invaded the premises. Friends discovered the terrified Mrs. Whitman screaming from a perch on top of a coffee table. Her bags were packed as Whitman, who had been summoned from the studio, returned home.

Since then, the Whitmans have occupied a beachfront home on the Pacific Ocean, half an hour more distant from the *Cimarron* soundstage. Whitman drives to work on a blue, 650 cc. motorcycle, customarily reaching his dressing room well ahead of schedule. Then he strips to his shorts and begins a daily ritual of setting-up exercises—deep-knee jumps, weight lifts and 50 push-ups, before relaxing in his private steam room.

Understandably, at age 38, he shows concern over midriff bulge and muscle fatigue. His pulled thigh muscle, which ended a promising college football career, periodically pains him. The scar tissue over his right eye, a souvenir of his ill-starred fling at amateur boxing, still droops when he gets tired.

Whitman insists on doing most of his own Cimarron Strip stunt work. Between takes of exerting fight scenes, he is likely to remove his marshal's hat and work out with dips and handstands on a set of parallel bars stored just out of camera range. These gymnastics make it easier to return to filming with all the appropriate juices flowing.

Occasionally it is difficult to stem the flow. Following his perfunctory introduction to guest-star Lola Albright recently, the script called for an intimate love scene. The smooching that continued long after director Charles Rondeau yelled: "Cut!" was not in the script. "My intentions got show-

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ing when they shouldn't," Whitman admitted. "It's unfortunate, but you have to restrain yourself in such a situation."

He savored the memory, nevertheless, as he polished off a second bottle of beer in his air-conditioned studio quarters. The inspirational sounds of Maurice Jarre's *Cimarron Strip* theme played on a tape recorder as Whitman inspected his profile in a full-length bathroom mirror. His bushy eyebrows were just as lush as they were in 1952 when he signed his first \$125-aweek contract with Universal Pictures, replacing David Janssen in the studio's stable of neophyte actors.

The shaggy coiffure obscuring his forehead, thatching his ears and wandering down the back of his neck enhanced the credibility of his virile role in the horse opera. He applied some Tan-A-Minit stain to his shadowy cheeks and cleft chin, a cosmetic more appropriate for the outdoor look of *Cimarron* than ordinary makeup.

The fact that the show was running nearly \$50,000 over budget on each episode, thereby cutting into his potential profits, concerned Whitman. Bromidic dialog like "If there's anybody doin' any shootin' around here, it's me" or "Parson, if you don't swear out a complaint, I can't hold him" proved equally disturbing.

His mood, however, was optimistic. "This show is definitely going to hit me with an image," he said, in a clipped, resonant voice bearing traces of a childhood spent partly in Boston. "It's the image that makes the star. I'm on the brink of the stardom that I've always sought and wanted. I wasn't ready for it before."

Nimbly he skittered down a flight of stairs, climbed on a bicycle and secured his kangaroo boots on the pedals. He pantomimed a smack on the flank of the two-wheeler as he rode off in a cloud of dust back toward the set.

Two great soups, one Italian and one French, for hefty eating when chilly weather comes. One is simple and great with sandwiches; the other makes a one-dish meal, needing only a crusty piece of Italian bread. Make plenty, for reheating only makes them taste better.

ONION SOUP

Serves 6

1/4 cup butter or margarine	2½ cups water
3 large onions, sliced	6 1-inch-thick slices French bread
2 tbsp. flour	1 small clove garlic
1 can (101/2 oz.) condensed chicken	broth 1/2 cup grated Romano, Gruyère, Swiss
1 can (101/2 oz.) condensed beef bro	

Heat butter and sauté onions until golden and tender. Sprinkle with flour. Gradually stir in chicken and beef broth. Add water. Simmer, stirring occasionally for 15 to 20 minutes or until onions are tender. Ladle soup into heatproof serving bowls. Toast French bread and rub slices with garlic. Place bread on top of each bowl. Sprinkle bread with cheese. Broil until cheese is golden. Serve at once.



WHO KILLED HOLLYWOOD SOCIETY?

Among status croquet lawns, none surpasses Samuel Goldwyn's.

CROQUET on SUNDAY with SAM and MIKE

After which these gentlemen and Harold Lloyd recall the days of greatness

Once upon a social climb, when men were men and Hollywood was glad of it, a company president is said to have refused an offer to sponsor a radio program at 3 o'clock on Sunday afternoon. "At 3 o'clock on Sunday afternoon," he explained, "everyone is playing polo."

In Hollywood's great days he would have been right—for among polo devotees were such stalwarts as Wallace Beery, Walt Disney, Robert Montgomery, Spencer Tracy and Gary Cooper. Today you could hit a polo ball for miles and not find anyone in Hollywood who knew what it was.

Cricket also, in the great days, was played to a tea—especially among the English contingent which, led by men like Ronald Colman and C. Aubrey Smith, always found the rest of Hollywood a bit of a sticky wicket.

But cricket too is now gone with the winds of change. And now, \rightarrow

virtually alone among status sports in Hollywood, there remains only croquet. In fact, George Sanders, one present-day English contingentman, informed us that Hollywood still clings to croquet with the grasp of a drowning man, as a kind of last vestige of better days. "Take me, for instance," he said. "My interest in anything outside of croquet is purely perfunctory."

One thing is certain. Among status croquet lawns, none tops the Beverly Hilltop lawn of Samuel Goldwyn. And we were, therefore, in a high state of expectation when, on a recent trip to Hollywood, we were thither escorted by one of its regular patrons—long-time usurper to the title of his ex-Imperial Highness, Michael Alexandrovitch Dmitri Obolensky Romanoff, nephew of the last of the Czars of All the Russias. Romanoff, now Citizen Romanoff, also promised to pack us a lunch.



"I play every day at Sam's," Mike told us on the way over. "But today is Sunday and you'll see everybody."

We turned into the Goldwyn estate, parked and walked up the hill to the croquet lawn stretched out before us but there was nobody around. Romanoff looked at his watch. "It's early yet," he said. He removed his mallet from its case, took out some balls, and began practising. A half hour went by . . . then an hour. Romanoff examined his watch again, then looked up and regarded us critically. "Do you play?" he asked.

We told him we used to—as a child. Promptly he selected two balls and a mallet for us. Singles croquet, high Hollywood style, is played, we soon learned, with four balls, and high strategy is involved. We were hard at it, coached by the master, when, suddenly, Romanoff stopped and peered down the hillside. "Here comes Sam," he said.

Sure enough, up the hillside, slowly, step by step, dressed in his Sundaybest croquet suit, complete with patches for the pressure spots, came the awe-inspiring figure of Samuel Goldwyn. Goldwyn and Romanoff compared watches. "Well," said Sam, "I guess nobody else is coming. We might as well play."

This time we begged off, and took a seat in the spectator's arbor. The game began and it was soon obvious that Goldwyn, at 85, was no match for Romanoff, at 77. Romanoff got far ahead, with both balls down by the stake while Goldwyn's balls were still going for the middle wicket—one of them at last in position.

Then Romanoff, with one of his balls, the yellow one, came over to destroy Goldwyn's ball. Suddenly there was trouble. "You can't hit me," Goldwyn exclaimed. "Yellow is threeball dead."

"Yellow is not three-ball dead," Romanoff said calmly and proceeded to go on and hit Goldwyn's ball.

Goldwyn advanced menacingly. "Yellow is three-ball dead," he exclaimed again, raising his voice.

Goldwyn now stood over his ball. "Yellow—" he started to shout. By now Romanoff was shouting. "Sam," he shouted, "you can get away with it with the others but not with me."

This was too much. "I'm not going to stand here," Goldwyn really shouted now, "and aggravate myself shouting at you. I have too much respect for my health!"

And, with that genuine Goldwynism, he stalked off the court and came over toward us at the arbor. Romanoff stood for a moment, then picked up his mallet and started down the hill. Halfway down he turned back. "Are you coming?" he asked us. We thought of our lunch—but by this time Goldwyn was standing beside us and we told Mike we'd see him later.

Goldwyn sat down. For some time he said nothing. Then, as Romanoff drove off, Goldwyn spoke. "He's a wonderful fellow, really, Mike iš," he said, "but he's impossible on the croquet court. I'm the only one who can handle him."

He asked us what we were doing in Hollywood. We told him we had come to write the story of Hollywood Society. "There are so many people who do great things here," he said. "Why, for God's sakes, write the filth?"

We said we weren't going to write the filth—but Goldwyn was now started. "All right," he said, "people have been married seven times. But it's not just actors. It's Barbara Hutton too. But because it's actors, it's Hollywood. People know those people. They identify with them.

"What is Hollywood Society?" he

continued. "You have to have experience in life, you have to struggle your way in life. Take that new fellow at Paramount—whatever his name is. They say he came over here in steerage at 15. Well, I came over in steerage at 14."

Later, at tea, Goldwyn showed us his private autographed pictures—of Eisenhower, Hoover, Churchill, Montgomery. There was one from Lucille Ball too, autographed "To Sam Goldwyn—who started the Ball rolling." And one from Gary Cooper: "To Sam, who made my career possible." "That one," Mr. Goldwyn said, "Coop sent to me the day before he died.

"People think of Hollywood as hard," he concluded. "Well, it is hard. And, remember, it's harder to accept success than failure. Because failure you have to accept. But if you want to write the story of Hollywood Society, you go to the Actors' Home. I gave them a quarter of a million dollars, but I can't go in there. It's too heart-rending. Why, in there are people I paid \$10,000 a week."

We promised Mr. Goldwyn that before we left Hollywood, we would go to the Actors' Home. Before that, however, we paid a call on Prince Mike Romanoff. He told us he was sorry for what had happened at Mr. Goldwyn's. "Sam's a wonderful fellow, really," he said. "But on the croquet field he's impossible. I'm the only one who can handle him."

"The Hollywood community," Mike told us, "is a monster packet of everything on earth. Why, there's a beautiful girl of 30 out here who's been married five times who you never heard of. She owns more land than anybody else on earth.

"Certain people got in the habit of sitting in one place in Romanoff's, but when I built the new place, I knew Hollywood—I planned all the seats equally good. I had every person of importance in every walk of life. \rightarrow

"I had Romanoff's for 22 years. I put in 15 hours a day in it. I had 135 people working for me and, on July 4th, 1958, the day I became a citizen, I had 1500 people to my restaurant."

We asked him why then did he quit? "Frankly," he said, "I disliked it. I'm too much of a snob for it. I'm not a snob for money or possessions. I'm a snob for good taste. I felt it was the end of an era. The type of food I had and the amount I spent on it and the trouble I went to made very little difference. I could have had half the quality, and it would have made very little difference.

"These new people—these television ones," he went on, "don't have either homes or style or even gathering places where they get to know each other. Nearly everyone is uprooted. The changeover in houses is unbelievable. I know of nobody who has lived in the same house for as long as I've lived here.

"Manners are dead—but completely," he concluded. "It's a new form of snobbery, the reverse snobbery. And there is a new no-involvement afoot, too. The old people at least did give rather marvelous parties to repay their obligations—the Clark Gables, the Jimmy Stewarts, the Hank Fondas.

"Can you think of any of the young kids today who would ever think of it? Well, that's not fair—two did. Natalie Wood and Mia Farrow. They gave a charming little affair. They are also the only two girls in town I know who write thank-you notes."

From Romanoff, we moved on to Harold Lloyd, whose "Green Acres" —no relation to the TV show of the same name—is the last of the stilloccupied Hollywood castles in the sand. A huge edifice, it towers over Beverly Hills like a giant, ghostlike reminder of filmdom's great era. Going up the driveway, past the walls and the hedges and the gardens and what was once his private golf course, you are already, by the time you step through the huge front door, in another era. Mr. Lloyd greeted us. How, we asked him, had he been able to hold on to "Green Acres"?

"Holy Crime," he said. "In San Diego once I was down to one nickel. I bought two doughnuts with it. And when I came to Hollywood, I hadn't forgotten it. Whatever I made, I took one fourth of it to the bank. I'd like to say it's because I thought someday it would all end, but I didn't. I did it because I learned, when I had my first troubles with my bosses, that if I had some money in the bank, I could tell them to go to hell.

"No one thought it would ever end, anyway," he went on. "It was all an illusion. Why, I can remember when people didn't hardly feel actors on the screen were real at all. They were puppets or something.

"And everybody," Mr. Lloyd continued, "had time for everything. We used to take time working—in fact, to do a picture, we'd take as long as we cared to. If we didn't like some of it, we took another month and shot it over. A preview then was to find out what was wrong and reshoot.

"It all seems so far away now," Mr. Lloyd concluded. "But everybody had fun. Why, we had parties here four times a week. It was nothing to see, at a party, a couple of hundred stars—and in those days they were kept much more exclusive too. It had to be, for the industry.

"Holy Crime, there were so many servants here you were always stepping on them. There were two gardeners for the potted plants alone. And the golf course, you know, had 17 water hazards. Bobby Jones played it three times before he parred it." [ND]



However, the cabinet is where most of the major difference between this set and many others we make comes to an end.
