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The Mothers-in-Law

Honestly, about shows like this, there ought to be a law-in-law. Not that it's all bad; it isn't. But it's at least half bad—and no better than half a hundred half-baked half-hour comedies that once constituted the networks' idea of what, week after week, the TV public wanted—one situation, indivisible, with laugh track for all.

There is one joke here—the motherin-law joke; and one plot-the meddling mothers. There are, however, two mothers-in-law, as well as two fathers-in-law and one bride and groom. The idea is that there are two couples, the Hubbards and the Buells, and Jerry, son of the Buells, has married Suzie, daughter of the Hubbards. They all seem to live in the same living room-they don't reallyand they are so overwhelmingly smothering mothers that, if we didn't know better, we'd call them smothers mothers. In one show, for example, they decide to return a wedding present which those newlyweds have not yet even seen because they are on their honeymoon, They get locked after hours in a department store, whereupon, with one dime left, they attempt to call their husbands but get, instead, a bullfighter in Barcelona who turns out to be Desi Arnaz, the producer of the show. Are you still with us? Well, for those who are, Desi, in turn, calls their husbands, who come down only to find that the mothers have attacked the store's

policeman. When another policeman comes by, all of them—in a very funny scene, incidentally—freeze into mannequins.

Knocking out a policeman worried us, but for even worse taste, there is one that involves the mothers-in-law in bed together watching a TV horror movie about a strangler. Both husbands are away. Then, when Mr. Hubbard unexpectedly comes home, he gets knocked out. A third episode involves the meddling mothers' attempt to spy on the newlyweds' first dinner party. They wind up on top of an automatic garage door.

Eve Arden as Mother Hubbard (yes, that's what the newlyweds call her and there is one joke per show about it) is a good comedienne and deserves better than this. Kaye Ballard (Mrs. Buell) probably does too-but she is permitted to milk every joke for one more laugh. Herb Rudley as Mr. Hubbard is fine as one of the long-suffering husbands and Roger Carmel, as the other, not only acts the part but looks it too. Jerry Fogel is adequate as the young husband, but Deborah Walley has a hard time as the young wife. In a year when the trend is to give the characters the real first names of the actors who play them (Dick and Paula, for example, in He & She), she probably feels left out. She is, after all, the only one here with a different name. It's our theory she should be grateful.

The appointment did not go down well with Congress or with consumer groups, especially when Miss Furness reacted to her appointment by saying, "First thing I did was to ask my housekeeper to tell me the price of eggs." But the opposition went along with the President's gag.

■ Since she took her \$26,000-a-year office last May, the lady has made some speeches, the latest of which reveals a towering ignorance of American business.

Her boo-boo was in an area that concerns us-the lack of service facilities for consumer products. At a regional meeting of the American Association of Advertising Agencies, the former pitchgirl blasted the men who made her rich and famous because their "phony advertising" had turned Americans into "addict buyers" of products that eventually broke down. 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SHE'S A STAR OF STAGE, TV AND MOTEL LOBBIES

Wherever she goes, Carol Channing's magnetism works its unique magic

Eyes like baby blue baseballs peer out myopically from behind an enormous pair of horn-rimmed glasses. The

voice has a high, nasal, little-girl twang. The shocking-pink sailor suit, with the big bow and the bell bottoms, loomslike the woman -larger than life. The body is bigboned, the laugh characteristically itsy - bitsy, the smile pure enamel. Carol Channing is only having lunch, but, baby, is she

She lives in a rented Malibu beach house surrounded by the artifacts of her career - Carol as Dolly, Lorelei Lee, the Gladiola Girl: photos of President Johnson and Sen. Robert Kennedy; a huge sil-

ver tray from David Merrick engraved with love and grosses. She is on the deck, lunching on buffalo steaks, a normal occurrence for the star of "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes" and "Hello, Dolly!" They are the nonchemical kind, like the woman herself uncontaminated with antibiotics, preservatives or insecticides.

"I'm allergic to chemicals in foods," says the girl who has contracted to do six television specials for ABC over the

next three years. "I used to have allergies. Ten years ago the Lunts told me to eat only what agrees with me." Miss Channing takes an enthusiastic swallow of purified spring water from an outsize ounce glass. "I'm in training like a boxer"

But of course! She is strengthening those tentacles of love with which she envelops audiences. The nonchemical foods have become not only a boon to health but a trademark. She takes them with her whenever she goes out for a meal. carrying her

double-lined thermoses in special cases. This even holds true at the White House, where she is a great favorite of the President's.

The grand entrance is her specialty. Once while she was touring the hinterlands with George Burns, they became trapped in a rainstorm in a tiny Missouri town, Burns remembers,



"Practically the entire population was sitting in the motel lobby. There was nowhere else to sit. Suddenly I looked up. It was Carol at the top of the stairs. She was wearing red leotards, a red jersey turtle neck, a red spiral hat, white gloves, white boots, a white cape and a big blonde wig. She was going to a movie in St. Louis. The whole lobby applauded."

Because her talent is as specialized as her diet, she is one of the world's most difficult star comediennes to cast.

She is either way up there on top or she is resting up between triumphs, doing withering impersonations of Marlene Dietrich (who once walked out on one of them) and generally frittering away the larger talent. As a schoolgirl fresh out of Bennington. she excelled at Haitian corn dances and Orestes' funeral oration. and went absolutely nowhere in show business for six vears. thought the whole world was like Bennington," she later said.

She even managed to get herself fired from

Camp Tamiment, a prominent stop on the Borscht Circuit. This was for her a shattering rejection which ultimately sent her running back home to San Francisco. Her father, a journalist, lecturer and devout Christian Scientist, told her she must develop "muscles" to hold an audience.

She took him seriously. It became


a crusade. She hit Broadway first in 1948 in a little revue called "Lend an Ear" in which she played the itsybitsy "Gladiola Girl," a not-so-distant cousin of Lorelei Lee. A year later she took the town by storm as the diamond-loving Lorelei in "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes." Brooks Atkinson called her "the most fabulous creation of this period of history" and compared her arrival to Mary Martin's and Ethel Merman's. Yet it took her 11 more years to find her Dolly

Levi, play 1272 performances of this amazing lady, and put \$17,053,000 into the coffers of producer David Merrick.

During the interim she had managed to (1) flop ignominiously a Broadway musical called "The Vamp," (2) strike out as a movie star ("The First Traveling Saleslady," which she made in 1956 with Ginger Rogers, is remembered as "the movie that sank RKO"), (3) replace another (Rosalind actress Russell) in "Wonderful Town" and (4) maintain superb grace and poise while doing

night-club acts, one-woman shows and stock. When Merrick resurrected her for "Dolly" in 1963, he found her in Millburn, N.J., where she was doing a "terrible" (said the outspoken Merrick) production of Shaw's "The Millionairess."

Marge Champion, wife of Gower, explains: "She is more special than \rightarrow



anybody. It is that tremendous love that boils out. It is on such a grand scale that not every show-or every medium—can encompass it. When she finally finds the right part, no one can touch her."

Her way of working is equally rarefied. She lives with the part down to the minutest detail. Fred Ebb, the lyricist, remembers a patter song he wrote for her once about the hostess at a cocktail party being overwhelmed by her guests. "She had it all worked

out in her mind, where they stood. how tall thev were, what they looked like. whether they were bald or hirsute. She had their charted positions on a piece of paper and would study it before going on." She herself admits although that, there have been some 19 other Dollys playing throughout the world. she never seen one. "All I've got," she explains. what's in my mind. I cannot jeopardize Dolly image."

Carol does not classify herself as a devout Christian

Scientist in the orthodox sense. She goes to church "when I can," which isn't often. Still a great many of her father's precepts have rubbed off on her, particularly the idea that there are always disappointments in life and one must have the power to meet them. Her way of meeting them is to pretend that they are not there.

Earlier this year she had a crusher. When 20th Century-Fox acquired the movie rights to "Dolly" for \$2,000,000 in 1965, everyone assumed, including Carol—that she would play the part. But, the part—her part—went to Barbra Streisand, just as a few years earlier Lorelei Lee had gone to Marilyn Monroe.

Carol could not believe it. During the Chicago run of "Dolly" the producer of the movie, Ernest Lehman, had been in the audience every night

for a week taking notes on the nuances of this, the formances. had even suga film of the stage got the final word in Montreal. She immediately composed a congratuflowers to Miss Streisand and then business. Only later did she confide: "It was like a death in the



As for the diamonds that are supposed to be a girl's best friend, she cares little for themunless the exposure is good, of course. Her style, her friends say, is enjoyment of life, which means her profession and the people in it. She "adores" Thornton Wilder, from whose play. "The Matchmaker," "Dolly" was concocted. Anita Loos, the creator of



Lorelei Lee, treats her "like a daughter." She once said of Carol, "She's nature's own child, fascinating and confusing. No sybarite would envy her enjoyment of living." Gower Champion, who directed her first in "Lend an Ear," later in "Dolly," takes on godlike stature when she talks about him. "Every actress," she says, "has to find her Gower Champion."

In husbands her tastes have run from the Greenwich Village novelist she married in her salad days in New York to the color-

ful Alexander (The Murderous Ax) Carson, the professional football player and private detective who tagged along in her wake during the "Gentlemen" period. Shortly thereafter she divorced him and married Charles Lowe, the producer who was once Aimee Semple McPherson's press agent. Their life centers around Carol and Carol's 14-year-old son by Carson, Channing Lowe, who was adopted by Carol's new husband. Young Channing recently passed a milestone; his first Playboy fold-

out has just been tacked on his wall. Carol sighs when she thinks about it. She once canceled a contract in Las Vegas because it required her to "compete for laughs with nude showgirls." She sighs, too, when she thinks about her career in television. It got off to a fast start in 1966 with the first of the Carol Channing

specials, slowed up some when her pilot for a weekly series failed to make the starting gate this fall, revived when General Foods signed her for a new series of specials.

The first one, "Carol Channing and 101 Men," airs this week. The producers, Alan Handley and Bob Wynn, who say they are specialists in "what mid-America likes," will give the "sophisticated" Miss Channing the benefit of their common touch: Carol Channing singing "Dear Hearts and


She looks at you as if you have just suggested a rendezvous in outer space. "The TV audience is vast and it is rudeness

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WHAT'S BEING DONE TO PROTECT YOU? WHAT CAN YOU DO TO PROTECT YOURSELF?

somewhere deep in the American grain—like fondness for football and hatred of dictators—is a distrust of television repairmen. Too bad, really, because most of that harried breed—as far as we know—are as honest on the average as stockbrokers, or plumbers or haberdashers. But unlike many other practitioners who "deal in a service" (as they used to say on What's My Line?), the TV service technician (they hate the term "repairman") is privy to secrets of such fearsome impenetrability that we're aware he could cheat us if he wanted to and we'd never know the difference. →

There's an excellent chance that your own TV set is suffering from grainy channels, skitterish picture and uncertain sound, and that you've been postponing repairs out of fear of a whopping bill for "condensers," "capacitors" and a couple of other things you've never heard of.

Unfortunately for the conscientious operators, there are enough petty swindlers among TV servicemen to give the whole profession a bad name. And now that transistorized and color sets are so common, the problem is doubly complex and susceptible of even more electronic hanky-panky.

There's "something rotten in the TV repair industry," as Consumer Reports magazine put it so cleverly after reviewing a couple of random surveys made in New York and Illinois.

The New York study—accomplished by WCBS-TV with the help of the Consumer Union and the Attorney General's Bureau of Consumer Frauds and Protection—found that 65 percent of the servicemen sampled were cheats, with an average overcharge of 150 percent, plus one ingenious operator who overcharged 350 percent.

That sample was small, to be sure (only 20 dealers), but it did indicate in its own unscientific way that there's plenty of reason for caution on the part of TV-set owners. The 20 sets were doctored only slightly by the insertion of a single bad tube, which, with service, ought to have cost the customer around \$8.

But the bills submitted included one for \$37.20, another for \$31.45, and another for \$26.55; a total of 51 tubes were replaced, instead of only 20, and repairs accomplished—considered unnecessary by the investigators—on various circuits, tuners, and switches.

In Illinois, Attorney General William G. Clark conducted a survey in more than two dozen service shops in and around Chicago and found that costs ran from \$14.85 to

\$45.70 on repairs that ought to have cost \$5 and \$10. As a result, he charged 18 shops with deliberate fraud.

Unfortunately, statistics on the extent of TV fraud nation-wide are simply nonexistent for the good and obvious reason that fraud is so difficult to detect and prove. Besides, there are about 130,000 independent service technicians at work in the U.S., and that number isn't really large enough to handle the traffic. One estimate has it that 230,000 will be needed in the next five years.

One of the big burs under the saddles of responsible technicians is the "moonlighter"—the part-time serviceman who is usually undertrained. underexperienced, and in business to capitalize on many consumers' search for a bargain in TV repair. Some of these moonlighters operate out of their own homes and simply don't have the sophisticated test equipment to do a decent job. Some have been known-when faced with a repair job they can't solve-to take the set to an established repair shop, have it fixed, then return it to the owner with an additional markup in the bill to give themselves a profit.

"The profession as it stands is a dying profession," says an official of one dealers' association. "There's a tremendous shortage of technical help in this business. It requires training and aptitude. Industry pulls the best technicians away from us. They can pay so much more."

Some TV repairmen are "authorized" by the large set manufacturers such as RCA Victor and Zenith, which have their own service companies in some areas as well, and as such may avail themselves of training programs and consultation. When fraud is proved against one of them, he customarily loses his franchise, but his connection with a large manufacturer is still no guarantee of honesty.

rative to the repair frauds dilemma is a system of licensing whereby service technicians would have to pass competency tests before being allowed to operate. Then if a customer has a complaint, he takes it to the license board, which tries to get at the truth of the matter and find out who's right. If fraud is established, the dealer is fined or perhaps put out of business altogether.

State licensing laws are in effect in Connecticut, Louisiana and Massachusetts; some cities have them, including Buffalo, Detroit, Kansas City, Mo., and Madison, Wis. California handles it a little differently; that state has a Bureau of Electronic Repair Dealer Registration with which all TV technicians must register.

Every month, the bureau covertly sends "doctored" sets to repair dealers about whom complaints have been received. Each dealer is sampled two to four times to determine if a pattern of fraud emerges. If one does, the Bureau might cancel the shop's registration, or even hand the case over to the district attorney for court action.

But licensing as such is an all too imperfect defense against repair fraud. A proposed license law for New York State was defeated recently in the state legislature, but Attorney General Louis Lefkowitz expects to reintroduce it in the 1968 session. New York City license commissioner Joel J. Tyler plans to ask the New York City council for a municipal licensing law, as well as the establishment of a permanent testing lab for the detection of fraud. "The serviceman in the area," Tyler said, "has taken advantage-either innocently or by design-of the consumer for too long."

Many observers oppose, in principle, the licensing of any private business on grounds that such action is repressive, restrictive and adds one more barnacle to the already overcrowded rump of the bureaucratic body politic.

Woodrow Wirsig, for example, president of metropolitan New York's Better Business Bureau, says, "Licensing is no solution in this field of TV repair services—as it is no solution in so many other areas. [It] is restrictive in terms of limiting people who can go into the field. [It] rarely if ever stops the fraudulent operator, for whom there are already laws on the books . . . if law enforcement agencies want to enforce them. . . . A continuous procession of laws tends to cause reputable businessmen to retrench; to cease to be bold and innovative and to grow to obtain more profits and to create more jobs."

Wirsig is almost a minority of one in that opinion. The strongest proponents of licensing laws are the service technicians themselves, as represented by a pair of national trade organizations: NATESA (National Alliance of Television & Electronic Service Associations) and NEA (National Electronics Association).

The full weight of these and other trade groups is behind the licensing of repairmen as a means of getting rid of moonlighters, fly-by-nighters and opportunists who pander to the eternal desire of many set owners to "beat the system" by finding cheap TV service. Frank Moch, the Chicagobased executive director of NATESA. told TV GUIDE: "We believe that the public is generally willing to pay for [responsible service] at rates which would take into account the skills, equipment, continuous training and many other costs, if the public is not bamboozled by 'come-on' ads and offers of bargain service by incompetents who at best are simply using the owners' set as a means of gaining experience and knowledge."

Moch added: "I will bet my position that, once a license is fully implemented, and the marginal quick-buck and unequipped, untrained operators are removed, the actual total cost \longrightarrow

of service will be reduced, since 'thievery' and use of inferior components and pawning off of highly inadequate services will stop and all service will be performed by qualified people who no longer are forced to carry on their backs 'leeches' and so are more nearly 100 percent occupied productively."

That opinion is seconded by Morris L. Finneburgh Sr., chairman of the All Electronic Industry Speaker's Bureau and chairman of the board of The Finney Company of Bedford, Ohio, makers of TV antennas. In states having licensing laws, there is a "very, very small degree of fraud," Finneburgh told TV GUIDE. "although we must recognize that a license obtained even under the most severe regulations cannot guarantee that the individual will not at a later date resort to fraudulent activities, but certainly the great percentage of service technicians who develop capabilities sufficient to pass a licensing examination can usually be depended upon as good citizens and ethical businessmen."

To counter the notion that licensing is a redundant exercise in view of laws already on the books, Frank Moch says this: "That laws already exist adequate to the need is pure hogwash, or we have the most unscrupulous and responsibility-shirking law-enforcement and consumer-protective agencies. How else could one justify the recurring exposés?"

A spokesman for the Manhattan District Attorney's office says there have been "very few" convictions for repair frauds in recent memory because "TV repair fraud as such is not a crime. It must be prosecuted as larceny or some other related infraction. The charge is difficult to prove."

The Better Business Bureau—which is supported by business interests and tries to act as a palliative between aggrieved consumers and accused store owners—claims that the consumer himself has to undertake much of the

responsibility for his own wellbeing; and if he gets gypped, he has himself to blame—in large part—for not checking first with the Bureau.

That thesis breaks down when applied to the TV repair business, however, because dishonest TV repairmen can operate for years or forever without anybody being aggrieved enough -or knowledgeable enough about the quality of service rendered-to take the trouble to sit down and write a complaint letter. A spokesman for New York's Bureau of Consumer Frauds and Protection says: "It's not the consumer's obligation to hunt for honest repairmen. When he sees an advertisement in the paper, he has the right to assume that this serviceman is legitimate and competent. The government must protect the consumer"

There are a few things, obviously, which set owners can do to help protect themselves:

- Ask neighbors to recommend a repairman whom they trust, and check him out with the Better Business Bureau.
- Inquire ahead of time about rates and guarantees.
- Get a price estimate before your set is carted away, or at least before work is started on it.
- Get an itemized bill, with a description of parts replaced.
- Ask the repairman to return to you any bad parts he has replaced (except the picture tube, which is dangerous to handle, or any parts replaced under a new-set warranty, which usually go back to the manufacturer).

These are simple and helpful practices. But until consumers, law-makers and honest technicians grow aroused enough to mount a full attack on petty thievery in TV repair, that odd, instinctive and frequently misplaced distrust of your friendly neighborhood TV repairman will remain deep in the American grain.

'B' Movies Draw 'B' Ratings

"Movies can't miss!" some TV wiseacres have been clucking. "People just want movies on TV. Good or bad, they'll watch 'em!" And so it seemed. Half the Top 10 rankings in the ratings were occupied by movie nights. But most of the highly rated flicks were old box-office hits, the cream of picture "packages" sold to the networks. The hits are shown early in the season to "hypo" ratings. Then the "B" stuff is hauled out. The "B" days of this season now have arrived, and TV's badly mauled weekly series are picking up some of their old followings again. In the Oct. 16-22 Nielsens, the best the movie nights could muster was ninth and 10th places. Leading the hit parade were Lucy, Bonanza, Gomer Pyle, Jackie Gleason, Gunsmoke and Dean Martin, prime-time stalwarts all.

Nothing pulls 'em into the living room, though, like a fondly remembered film. Of all the specials arrayed by ABC during its "Very Special Week" (including "Johnny Belinda," "With Love . . . Sophia," and "Kismet"), the viewers' favorite was the . 11-year-old "King and I."

The network program chiefs foresee more and more prime-time movies. They are agreed there will be seven nights of them (vs. six now) by next fall. "I don't think the day is far off," says NBC's Mort Werner, "when there will be movies against movies on the networks—but maybe not as early as next season." ABC's Len Goldberg feels TV specials have done "so well"

this fall partly because movies on TV "shook people out of their old viewing habits and made them consult the TV listings more often." CBS's Mike Dann concurs: "The Top 20 shows are in constant change, because people are making up their minds by the night, by the hour, what they will watch. It's the healthiest development in all of broadcasting."

ABC confirmed its expected moves: Because of disappointing ratings, Iron Horse, Custer and Good Company will be dropped; Hollywood Palace will be shifted back to its old Saturday night stand; The Avengers will be revived; and a new Robert Wagner tongue-incheek adventure series, To Catch a Thief, will be introduced.

"The Thanksgiving Visitor," author Truman Capote's first story since "In Cold Blood," will be adapted by him for TV and filmed by ABC producer Hubbell Robinson as a companion piece to Capote's earlier autobiographical "A Christmas Memory." Air date: Thanksgiving 1968.

In some areas network movies may not be seen on the days indicated.

Our text for the week comes right out of one of its offerings. "No harm intended," says the African chief in "Call Me Bwana" who has just buried Bob Hope up to his ears in the good earth. "Just part of our culture."

The harmless spate of mediocre movies confronting us at the moment are, alas, part of our culture, complete with Tammy and gunfighters and hospital interns who are enough to make you take to faith healing. (Still another culture-quirk, incidentally, has reduced the week's network movies to five. The time spot of the sixth [Wednesday, ABC] has been pre-empted for the TV version of Alfred Hitchcock's 1954 movie version of "Dial 'M' for Murder," originally a stage play, with television placing Laurence Harvey, Hugh O'Brian and Diane Cilento in the Ray Milland, Robert Cummings and Grace Kelly roles. It's a staple and satisfying melodrama-but I personally feel it a pity that "creative" television has to draw upon other media for its material.)

Well, back to Bob Hope, who is buried not only in sand but also in a script as meandering as the safari he undertakes. The few bright moments and lines scattered about give you a fleeting illusion of being off on that Crosby-Hope road to somewhere (Edie Adams is wasted and no substitute for Bing, although Anita Ekberg has much to offer along that culture-quirk line that substitutes mammary glands for a sarong as a sex

symbol) but it's a weary way through Darkest Africa.

Medically there's "Tammy and the Doctor," wherein the shanty-boat maiden turns a hospital upside down with her shenanigans, and "The New Interns" wherein those clichéd young medicos turn one's intelligence upside down with their triteness. Those interns are about as interesting as any group involved in the sequel of a successful movie that was predicated on the then popularity of medicos on television. As for Sandra Dee's Tammy, she's all sugar and no spice. The film marked Peter Fonda's screen debut as a doctor who romances Tammy. In all, it's a tough week for the profession.

The week's Western, "Invitation to a Gunfighter," starts out with off-beat theme and characters but is defeated by mixed-up motivations, fogged-up plotting and pompous pretensions. Yul Brynner is on hand as a suave gunfighter (looking for all the world like Mr. Clean in a Stetson) and George Segal, who's also one of those interns, gets to be top gun in this one.

For Gina Lollobrigida watchers there's "Woman of Straw," a labored and meandering overdressed bit of Victorian about whether the nurse or the stepson murdered the mean old wheelchair-ridden millionaire who looks Miss Lollobrigida over and says, "You know, Marie, you don't look like a nurse." Right he is. But in a week like this one, who's to quibble?

Harry Reasoner has been plying his trade at CBS News for some 11 years now—as a roving correspondent and a White House correspondent; as the host of Calendar and, currently, Who, What, When, Where, Why and CBS Sunday News: and as a resident sage of CBS Radio's "Dimension." During that time he has had something to say about practically every aspect of human existence. His commentaries on the passing scene are marked by an amused detachment and a gentle but pointed sense of humor. Here are some characteristic Reasoner samples, taken from his broadcasts.

LITTLE GIRLS

There is one family role in which the father is indispensable and unique. Somebody has to like 5-year-old girls and only a father seems able to.

BECOMING 40

You can now legally do anything you want to, except you aren't sure you want to.

WOMEN'S FASHIONS

This discussion is not about whether you should like women or not, but it is about a possible situation in which you would grow not to like them without knowing why, because of the way they dress or appear, and a situation in which, following the established paths of fashion, the ladies are led to cooperate in their own decline.

MEN'S FASHIONS

The revolution is here and the baggypants brigade has lost, apparently without knowing that the war had even started.

YOUNG REPORTERS

It must be one of the happiest times a man can have. You have not yet found out that the glamor of the newspaper business is largely an illusion, that your importance is highly qualified, that the free passes to the burlesque shows are in lieu of salary.

TODAY'S YOUTH

A young man I know very well took

occasion to defend the kids who wear their hair long ... All the crew cuts are down in Fort Lauderdale throwing beer cans at the police, he said, and all the new intelligentsia are up in Central Park wearing signs saying "Love People," and isn't that better? In other words, he went on, isn't it better to wear maybe even a beard and a sheepskin cloak and play a quitar than to look like Norman Rockwell's dream of the all-American boy and then behave like a drunken sot on the sand? He had a point, I thought, although it seems there ought to be a happy medium.

HIPPIES

The reporters who have been dealing with the hippies in San Francisco are almost unanimous: They regard the movement as phony, distasteful and meaningless. You cannot reform the world, they contend, by loading flowers onto old ladies who may have other, more substantial lacks; you cannot improve a society by turning away from it except for material support.

HIPPIE BE-INS

The middle-aged reaction was to wonder what was biting the people who went, in the same way you used to wonder just how miserable life must be for people to make them feel that things would somehow be better if they went down to Times Square on New Year's Eve.

LEGALIZING MARIJUANA

Now we know our country, and we love it, but we are well aware of what it does with anything that is legal and

profitable: It merchandises it. And I think even the most intellectual defender of marijuana as less harmful and more dignified than booze would be well advised to stop and think about the United States five years after marijuana became legal. Can't you imagine Acapulco Gold, The Upbeat Stick That Has No Letdown, presenting *The Ed Sullivan Show?*

REALISTIC SPY STORIES

The spies, instead of being tall and lean and sexy, are short and dumpy and bored and have tiresome girl friends. Stories about spies are basically escape literature. When you make it realistic, you quickly remind people of the fundamental idiocy of the whole business and they will go back to Tarzan.

POLITICS

Be highly suspicious of any political or social group which never under any circumstances thinks there is something funny about itself and its program.

LIFE AND DEATH

The idea of trying to outguess life, to avoid everything that might conceivably injure your life, is a peculiarly dangerous one. Pretty soon you are existing in a morass of fear. A man makes a sort of deal with life, he gives up things because they are undignified or immoral; if life asks him to cringe in front of all reasonable indulgence, he may at the end say life is not worth it. Because for the cringing he may get one day extra or none; he never gets eternity.

I've been observing with growing dismay the appearance over the years of a whole constellation of motion-picture stars in television commercials. Lauren Bacall has hawked Maxwell House Coffee. Joseph Cotten has been pushing those little Bufferin tablets. Louis Jourdan has foamed over Prell Shampoo.

In checking the figures, one is shocked to learn that in one year movie actors were paid \$30,000,000 for doing TV commercials—and only \$20,000,000 for making movies.

What's it all going to lead to? Well,

possibly this . . .

The scene is the elegantly informal Bel-Air home of cinema idol Rip Shirt. Rip is on the phone to his agent, Sidney Korngold, and the actor is up in arms.

RIP: No if's, Sidney! You're just not getting me any decent roles lately.

Sm: Decent roles? What about the lead in "Moses Takes a Wife?" Greatest comedy of the year!

RIP: Some role. A bumbling mes-

siah.

Sm: Be reasonable, baby-

RIP: Reasonable, he says! When Cesar Romero just landed the Thunderbird Wine commercial.

Sm: Well, things are pretty tight—Rip: Don't tight me, Sidney. There's

gotta be something.

Sm: Well, I think I could get you the lead in the Gleamo Toothpaste commercial.

RIP: That's more like it. Now who's

doing the script?

Sm: (warily): The script?

RIP: Come on, Sidney. You know all my movies have been written by the literary *giants*—Faulkner, Shakespeare, Edgar Rice Burroughs—

Sm: Oscar Honeywell's doing the

script.

RIP (worried): Honeywell? Of MGM?

SID: Honeywell of Young & Rubicam.

RIP: What are his credits?

Side: Oscar did a terrific 10-second spot for living bras. This is his first full-length commercial.

RIP: Hmm . . . What about the mes-

sage?

Sm: The message?

RIP: Sidney, you know all my films have to have a message. So what's the message?

Sm: The message, baby, is you should go in and brush your teeth.

RIP: Sounds good. Listen, Sidney, this is important. I've played opposite Sophia Loren—Elke Sommer—Claudia Cardinale. Now who would be supporting me in this one?

Sm: Two little girls with braces. Now look, Rip, it's a good vehicle—

RIP: Like "The Cowboy and the Monster"?


Sm: Better, baby, better.

RIP: All right, I'll do it. But I don't like it.

Mary Pickford, Gloria Swanson, Joan Crawford fondly recall

THE GOLDEN YEARS

Third of five parts by CLEVELAND AMORY

**In the old days," Mary Pickford once told a reporter, "we were willing to believe in fairy tales. Today we want to, but we can't.

"In the old days, too," Miss Pickford went on, "stars were glamorous—they worked at maintaining the illusion they presented on the screen. If fans came on the set to see me and I wasn't dressed for a role, I'd run into my dressing room, let down my curls and put on the little-girl dresses

they expected me to be wearing.

"To this day I don't dance in public, and I'm sure Lillian Gish doesn't. Perhaps we're old school, but I have a strong feeling about staying in character.

"The trouble with glamor today," Miss Pickford concluded, "is that it's all pointed toward sex. There is no such things as an ingénue any more. Sex seems to be concerned with exposure, not ability to play a —

character. Valeska Suratt, Theda Bara and Gloria Swanson were able to be sexy while dressed."

Gloria Swanson seconds Miss Pickford. "We didn't even need dialog, for heaven's sake," she tells us. "We had faces! It wasn't the talkies that killed the whole thing," Miss Swanson goes on, "and it wasn't television. It was the era. The war was over and there was never going to be another one. Everyone was wild and exuberant. The bellboy wanted to serve you because he wanted to own the hotel. And later he did too."

Joan Crawford feels that the "modern ones," as she calls them, are not stars at all. "Stardom used to mean something," she says. "It had to be earned. Now it happens overnight to young actors. But they're not stars—they're just performers."

As for Katharine Hepburn, she asks why stars should ever have pretended they're like other people. "They're not!" she cries. "They're not! Take me. I like driving up to the theater in a golden chariot and not doing my own cooking."

Barbara Stanwyck defined old-fashioned stardom vs. present-day stardom. "They had that unknown X in algebra," she says. "It's vitality and excitement. Today they're all business managers. You know, 'I'm going to do this and that and then I'm going to buy Central Park West.' Bill Holden,

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you know, just bought Hong Kong."

Today Van Johnson, who now lives in New York, thinks the whole idea of Hollywood is gone. He says, "I used to go to Clark Gable's house and Carole Lombard's and Spencer Tracy's. Imagine! Imagine now going to Sandra Dee's or Tuesday Weld's."

Vincent Price is philosophical. "I came in at the end of it," he says. "The first dinner party Mary and I went to was given by Ronald and Benita Colman. The other guests were Clark Gable and [Lady] Sylvia Ashley, and Merle Oberon and George Cukor. The men were in sports clothes and the women were in opera clothes. But there was a difference. They were stars! Today a new TV name is completely ephemeral. Richard Chamberlain, for Pete's sake! He's still Dr. Kildare. And Hugh O'Brian. He's Wyatt Earp."

Princess Grace Kelly, visiting Holly-wood last summer, was amazed at the whole place today. "What changes!" she explained. "Such studios. I'll never get over Universal Studios. They're so horribly commercial, so crowded with sight-seers. Where's the personal touch? It's vanished."

Our next call among the old-timers of Hollywood Society was on Frances Marion, the famous screenwriter whose late husband, Fred Thompson, was a Western star. Of all the views on Hollywood's golden days, hers were perhaps the most philosophical.

"I've been a half century in this business," she told us. "I feel as if I've been in a zoo. I came down here from San Francisco, you know. Mary Pickford and I and the Gish girls shared adjoining bungalows.

"All of a sudden the boom hit, I doubt that anybody anywhere lived like we did. Remember, we all had those riches thrust upon us. My husband and I made Westerns with Joe Kennedy—the father of the late President—backing us. We thought

we might make \$5000 a year. Overnight we were making \$15,000 a week. With no taxes. And we all went wild. We built Brobdingnagian houses.

"Remember," Miss Marion went on, "Tom Mix was a lion tamer. Doug Fairbanks was a bellhop. The girls were picked up here and there—for their big faces and their little bodies. I remember a big star came to me. 'Jeez,' she said, 'I'd like to have nice manners.' I told her she could start by not swearing. 'OK,' she said, 'but I hope you like my Christmas present. It set me back 165 bucks.'

"I remember Joan Crawford's first dinner party. When the couple she had hired came in, they served from the right instead of the left. She was furious. 'I told you, darling,' she said, 'to serve from the left.' Then she turned to the rest of us. 'God,' she said, 'it's going to take me months to train those bastards.'

"We were all in our 20's," she continued, and making piles of money. We were all bejeweled, befurred and befeathered. But one thing—in those days we didn't all look alike. Pickford didn't look like Swanson, and Swanson didn't look like Mabel Normand. If they had straight hair, they had straight hair.

"The change came when the pansies came out here and took over. Then everybody followed a pattern. No French woman, for heaven's sakes, ever followed a pattern. Gloria Swanson was the first to come out and admit she was pregnant. That was a big change, too.

"I think the biggest change, though, is that I don't think anybody today is very happy. In the old days there seemed to be fewer jealousies—and envies. We'd go out of our way to give writers half credit and help them get a job. There seemed to be plenty of everything for everybody.

"Today, when in some ways there's so much more, everyone—even the successful ones—walks around →



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looking so cross. In the old days we'd troop into the commissary smiling. I guess it's really a sad story, what

happened."

So pale does Hollywood Society seem today in comparison to the great days, many Hollywood old-timers have nostalgia even for the old days' great scandals. Take the most famous scandal of all, for example, that of the death of starlet Virginia Rappe, reputedly during a San Francisco hotel sex orgy in which the late Fatty Arbuckle was held responsible.

Fatty's wife, Minta Durfee Arbuckle, who, at 76, is still working—as an extra—was once herself a star of the old Keystone Comedies. To this day she believes her husband actually was framed. "It was all politics," she told us darkly. "Part of it, you know, was the enmity between San Francisco and Los Angeles. Remember, he was tried up there because that was where the girl died, and San Francisco was very jealous of Los Angeles becoming the movie capital."

At the time of the trial, in 1921, Arbuckle was, in Mrs. Arbuckle's opinion, "the world's biggest star." "He was the highest paid," she says. "Three million he had just signed for, and he was loved all over the world. More even than Chaplin. Chaplin may have been cleverer, but remember, Fatty was bigger. He was a big boy and the little women all over the world loved him. He was like their

own big, fat, baby boy."

Mrs. Arbuckle told us that Arbuckle had not one but three trials—the first two, she declared, ended in "hung" juries. At the third trial, she said, Arbuckle asked for, and received, in an attempt to prove his innocence by the hardest test possible, an all-woman jury. "They never even left the jury box," Mrs. Arbuckle said. "It was one of the most dramatic things in courtroom history. They acquitted him in exactly one and a half minutes.

"But it didn't matter," Mrs. Arbuckle

concluded. "His career was ruined. I've always believed he died of a broken heart. I'm not bitter, but I can't help thinking about it all in comparison to nowadays. Why nowadays it would be good for someone's career. Then it ended you. After all, look at the era that was just around the corner—the Errol Flynns and the Lana Turners and the Liz Taylors. And today you can do anything. Today the more they talk about you—no matter what—the bigger you are."

When old-timers gather to discuss the great parties of Hollywood's great days, extraordinary names pop out.

One visitor to the Hollywood community, the late Dorothy di Frasso, gave a particularly memorable "do." Dictaphones had just come in and, to liven up her party, the Countess had stationed the new-fangled machine at strategic points around the house-not only in the living room but also in the bedrooms upstairs. The idea was that, at the end of the evening, a privileged few would be entertained by a kind of party rerun. But, when the moment came, at the sound of the first play-back, everyone suddenly remembered previous engagements—and the hostess alone was left with what was undoubtedly Hollywood's most memorable "do" that didn't.

Only one Hollywoodian, however, ever obtained the exalted title "Mr. Host." He was the late radio magnate Atwater Kent. Mr. Kent had two lists which he called "Social"—and these, depending on the prominence of his guests, he subdivided into "Big" and "Little." He also had not only a group marked "Diplomatic Service" but also, in advance of his time, a "Musical and Art" group. Once he decided to mix all four groups—that evening he found himself host to 1738 guests.


For years Hollywoodians talked of Kent's preoccupation at his parties with something other than the conversation. No one ever found out what \rightarrow

it was, but all manner of ruses were attempted to break the spell. "How do you do, Mr. Kent," one guest would say. "My mother just died." "Glad you could come," Kent would reply.

"How do you do, Mr. Kent," another would try. "I just shot my wife." "Hello," Mr. Kent would say, "glad

to have you here."

Finally one guest tried the crucial line. "How do you do, Mr. Kent," he said, smiling. "You don't listen to a damned thing, do you?" "No," replied Kent, with the same smile. "My mother just died and I just shot my wife."

Finally, as we had promised Sam Goldwyn we would, we paid a call on the Actors Home—or, as it is called, the Motion Picture Country House. Run by the Motion Picture Relief Fund, in the hills above San Fernando Valley, it includes half a hundred separate cottages and a fully equipped hospital.

It also cares for no fewer than 54 categories in the film industry. Under the "p's", for example, we noted "Photographers, Plasterers, Policemen, Producers, Projectionists, Property Men, and Publicists"; under the "W's," "Waitresses, Wardrobe People, Watchmen, Writers" and even "Wranglers." We asked Bill Kirk, the able director of the house, if he took in critics. "No," he smiled, "but we have what we call our boot hill—for agents."

The late Mack Sennett, Hoot Gibson and Herbert Marshall all lived there. So do, or did, Edmund Lowe, Laurence Stallings, Jerry Colonna and Bronco Billy Anderson. We interviewed Bronco Billy, who played in filmdom's first dramatically creative American feature picture, "The Great Train Robbery." "When we first showed it," Billy told us, "all they said was we'd have to cut it. They said nobody would ever sit still that long. It ran 18 minutes."

Director Kirk's greatest rehabilitation project was perhaps Chester Conklin, an ex-Mack Sennett and Chaplin comedian who still carries a droopy mustache in his pocket and insists on putting it on before meeting strangers. Some months ago Conklin asked for extra money to take a vacation. Granted the request, he promptly took off, with the sister of another inmate, and eloped to Las Vegas.

The most remarkable story of all, however, is that of the late Mae Murray. The former blonde beauty, who starred opposite Valentino, John Gilbert and Wallace Reid, entered the House a few years ago. But never for a moment, at least in her mind, did

she give up her career.

She was certain a big producer wanted to see her in New York to star in a musical comedy—and no one could persuade her to the contrary. One day she disappeared. Several days later, the House received a call from a Midwestern policeman: He said that a very polite but very confused lady had asked him, in St. Louis, for directions to the Waldorf.


The policeman was thanked for his trouble and told to put the lady on a New York plane, all right—but one going West—and to tell the stewardess that on no condition was she to be let off the plane until it

arrived in Los Angeles.

And, when the plane did reach Los Angeles, there to meet it was not only director Kirk and a large proportion of House members, but also a carefully pre-arranged group of fans, complete with floral wreath and a huge sign reading "WELCOME MAE MURRAY."

Miss Murray may not have been going to star in a musical, but in an era in which style had gone out of fashion, one star at least, had come back in the Hollywood Society style to which she was accustomed.
